RESERVATIONS-A.L.A. DINNER

The annual dinner and business meeting of the Association will be held at seven o'clock, Thursday evening, June 24, in the Grill Room at Schrafft's, 556 Fifth Avenue, near 46th Street, two blocks west and three south of the Waldorf-Astoria. Tickets (\$1.75) will be on sale at A.L.A. Headquarters at the Waldorf-Astoria, but, as the number is limited, those who expect to attend are urged to send in reservations as soon as possible (not later than June 18) to Mr. Gordon W. Gray, Reference Department, College of the City of New York Library, 139th Street and Convent Avenue, New York City. Tickets will be set aside first for those who have made advance reservations. Tickets are necessary for admission to the dinner and none will be sold at the door. The dinner will be informal.

DINING IN NEW YORK

The following are some suggestions of inexpensive places for couples and small groups who wish to eat well in pleasant surroundings. As soon as warm weather comes everyone makes for outdoor eating places. Especially in the last two or three years sidewalk cafes have blossomed out all over the city, from the Hotel Brevoort and the Fifth Avenue Hotel, down near Washington Square take a Fifth Avenue bus marked Washington Square), up to the Childs (!) Restaurant at Broadway and 111th Street. If you have an Anglo-Saxon dislike of eating under the eyes of the passers by, there are the roof gardens and the courts and backyards. Tea at the British Empire Exhibition Room at Radio City is a delightful occasion, with big plates full of the thinnest slices of bread and butter you ever ate outside of England itself, out on an English lawn away up above the street—one of the hanging gardens of New York. That, of course, is only two or three blocks from the Waldorf-Astoria. It's also possible to eat at the top of the Empire State Building, American food, but what a view of New York!

If it is warm, you will find it a cooling trip on the top of a Fifth Avenue Bus up to the Claremont Inn just above Grant's Tomb. There you can eat out on a terrace overlooking the Hudson. Plan to be there at sunset. It's usually gorgeous. 'Phone ahead for a table "on the west side of the house toward the north" if you want to be quiet and a bit by yourselves. A Number 5 or Number bus going north ("uptown") by Riverside Drive, or a Number 4, by Fifth Avenue and Central Park, will take you there in about an hour early in the evening. You may have heard that the Claremont is very expensive. It isn't any

more. You can get a dinner for a dollar and a half or less-or more. If you want to go to the "Village" (and what visitor doesn't!!) take bus marked Washington Square, going downtown, get off at Eighth Street, don't cross the Avenue, but turn on to Eighth Street and in a couple of blocks or so you will reach the Jumble Shop on one side of the street and Alice McCollister's on the other. Both set tables outdoors in the back. If it is rainy there is the Brick House on MacDougal Street opposite the Jumble Shop, which is very good, (the Jumble Shop itself is quite quaint on the inside, too) and further along Eighth Street is the Pepper Shop.

Remember you do not get any views in the Village. You are all shut in by buildings. Another place to eat where you can get a fine water view, this time

over the harbor to the famous sky-line (instead of the Claremont's view up and down the Hudson) is the Marine Roof Garden at the Bossert Hotel in Brooklyn You have to take the subway, which isn't so pleasant on a hot night, but it really worth it when you get there. Sunset there is also glorious. The St George Hotel Roof in Brooklyn offers a splendid view of the harbor and sunser has a less interesting dining room than the Marine Roof, but is also less

expensive and there is a wonderful swimming pool in the hotel.

Places nearer Headquarters? Well, there's Theresa Worthington Grant's southern cooking, outdoor tables, and leisurely service! Many New Yorkers librarians and other professional people with refined tastes and slim pocketbooks say they have gotten the best dollar dinner in New York at the Hearthstone on 48th Street just south of the Waldorf, (the Blue Bowl just opposite the Hearthstone is also recommended)—but if you are up near Columbia University you can get just as good a one, if not better, for 99 cents or less at Butler Hall 119th Street and Morningside Drive. That is a roof garden and has a terrace with a fine view over the city in every direction, and is very cool.

Foreign places? They are apt to be rather hot and stuffy in the summer time. Some of the Italian restaurants west of Fifth Avenue have "gardens," but they are inside buildings. However, if you are hungry, of course there is no cheaper way of getting filled up than an Italian restaurant, unless it is a Chinese or Japanese one. It is fun to eat at the Japanese restaurants where they cook on your table, if you have plenty of time! Wherever you see a sign Suki Aki you will find Japanese food. There are two or more in the Forties, west of Fifth Avenue. Good Swedish places abound, Stockholm offers a cool quiet place for lunch or dinner and a Smörgåsbord table loaded with delectable dishes, both

hot and cold.

Places outside the city? If you have a car at your disposal, drive out over the new Spuyten Duyvil Bridge and the Hendrik Hudson Parkway, at the upper end of Riverside Drive, and on out the Sawmill River Parkway to Woodland Tavern. That's a very pleasant place to eat dinner overlooking the Sawmill River. You may get a very poor dinner or a very good dinner there. It's a toss-up. It's a pleasant drive anyway and you seem to be much farther from the

city than you really are.

Finally, if you can spare the time from four or five in the afternoon on into the evening, you can drive to the nicest place of all, the terrace of the central pavilion at Jones Beach where you can look out over the greenest grass and the pinkest flowers and the whitest sand in the world to the open sea and watch the great ocean-going vessels steam by 'way out on the horizon. Don't let the waiter inveigle you inside. Better a simple blue-plate of sea-food out in the open than a full course dinner shut up in a dining room. With a car you can get there easily inside two hours without breaking the law (Mr. Windsor can probably do it in an hour, if he doesn't get pinched) by way of the Tri-Borough Bridge, which is a marvelous sight in itself and the easiest bridge to drive on and the Grand Central and Southern State Parkways. The sign for Jones Beach is a seahorse. So follow the seahorses and you'll reach the sea in due time And surely any one from the inland doesn't want to visit the coast and not put at least his fingers into salt water!

Perhaps a picnic would appeal more. Cross the George Washington Bridge take the drive along the Palisades and continue on to Bear Mountain, here on the very top is the quietest picnic spot in the world, and a view of New York State. Take an afternoon for this or have lunch there on your way home, if you

are driving by the Roosevelt Trail.

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
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
