Meeting of September 27, 1904.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Tuesday, September 27, 1904.

The members present were Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Hatch, Kerrick, McKinley McLean, and Nightingale and Mrs. Abbott, Mrs. Alexander, and Mrs. Evans; absent, Governor Yates and Mr. Dickirson. President James was absent. Vice President Burrill was present.

The secretary presented the minutes of the regular meeting of June 6 and 7, 1904, and the special meeting of August 16, and the adjourned sessions of the same held August 23 and August 26, 1904.

The minutes were approved.

Dr. Burrill stated that it had been found that Mr. K. P. R. Neville, who had been appointed at the June meeting instructor in Latin, must continue instructor in Latin and Greek as he had been during the previous year, and it was so ordered.

COMMUNICATION FROM VICE PRESIDENT BURRILL.

To the Board of Trustees:

I have the honor to report to you that the semester opened on Monday, September 12th, under favorable circumstances. Four members of the corps of instruction did not report on that day for service because of their own illness; one was absent by arrangement until September 17th on account of the marriage of his brother; one did not arrive from abroad until the 13th, and one by arrangement did not report until September 26th. Two were in town on the 12th and reported late in the day. Otherwise, all members of the instructional force and all employés were present and ready for duty on time. The new appointees without exception seemed to be capable and anxious to demonstrate this by their work. With the exception of the new quarters on the upper floor of University Hall, the class rooms, laboratories, etc., were all ready and in order for the beginning of the term. The special rooms mentioned were available for use on the 15th instant.

The registration was completed for those applying sufficiently early within the two days regularly devoted to this work. Those who were late in arrival or in beginning were registered as opportunity was found after the instruction began. In order further to secure promptness on the part of students in this matter the Council of Administration recommends that a fee of \$1.00 be imposed for registration after the date designated and set apart for this purpose.

It was voted that beginning with registration of 1905 a fee of one dollar for late registration should be charged all students except those coming to the University for the first time.

It is not possible now to report the number of students enrolled, but it is apparent that there is a very considerable increase over that of last year. The upper class men have returned in at least as large proportion as usual and there have been issued to date 967 permits to register to new people, against 926 a week later in the season last year.

SUMMER TERM.

From the report of Thomas Arkle Clark, director of the summer term for 1904, the total registration is shown to have been 241 against 229 last year. By subjects the attendance for the two years were as follows:

The director says: "These figures seem encouraging when we take into consideration the fact that the percentage of teachers registering this year is larger than ever before, especially those teachers who have graduated from one or another of our normal schools, and the additional fact that practically every other summer school in the country has a smaller registration this year than last, due no doubt to the St. Louis exposition.

We have never before had so good a grade of teachers. School superintendents and high school teachers from some of the best schools of the State were attracted in gratifying numbers by our special lecturers and regular university offerings. The most of those registered remained through the session and took the examinations.

We have had during the session either to conduct courses or to give special lectures, Professor A. B. Hart of Harvard University, Professor Paul E. Hanus of Harvard University, Professor J. V. Denny of Ohio State University, Professor Henry Johnson of the Eastern Illinois State Normal School, Professor William E. Simonds of Knox College, Superintendent C. N. Kendall of Indianapolis, Ind., schools, and Mr. Foster H. Irons of the Superior, Wis., schools. The work of each of these men, as all connected with the session agree, has been successful, and well worth the money expended."

The summer term has evidently demonstrated its usefulness and undoubtedly should be permanently continued. It has gradually attracted in increasing proportions men and women of influence in the public schools and is serving as an advertising medium of the best character. It will no doubt gain in number of students as the offerings become recognized. I recommend that \$7,000.00—the amount of your appropriation last year—be allowed for expenses for 1905. About one-half of this is returned from fees. I also ask that President James be authorized to appoint a director of the work for next year under the terms heretofore adopted. It is important that this be done early in order that suitable arrangements may be made and proper announcements issued.

It was voted to appropriate \$7,000 for the expenses of the summer term of 1905.

The following persons appointed by you at your meeting of June 6th declined to accept and have since sent in resignations:

Maurice G. Fulton, instructor in rhetoric at \$850.00.

Frank C. Touton, instructor in mathematics, part time, at \$400.00.

May Wheeler, assistant in chemistry, \$500.00.

In place of the first I recommend the appointment of Arthur Llewellyn Eno at the same salary; of the second, Albert Harris Wilson as instructor in mathematics at \$100.00 per month for ten months, and instead of the third, Alice Virginia Flather with the same title and salary.

The appointments were made.

I also recommend the appointment of Charles E. Ellis, assistant in chemistry, at \$60.00 a month for nine months beginning Oct. 1st.

The appointment was made as recommended.

It proves necessary to have further assistance in general engineering drawing on account of the increased registration and the crowded condition of the classes. Authority is therefore asked to employ some one as assistant in this department at a salary not to exceed \$75.00 a month for time of service.

The authority asked was given.

SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

My attention has been called to the very low salaries paid the members of the faculty of the School of Pharmacy. It is understood that most of these men have other ways of earning money. Otherwise they could not support themselves. It seems, however, that Professor Day gives his whole time to the school. He has a guaranteed salary of \$1,222.22. To this may be added, but not guaranteed, \$166.67, making a total of \$1,388.89. Even should the latter be paid this is altogether inadequate compared with the services rendered. I mention the matter that those who know more about the situation than I do may do what seems best in the premises.

The question as to Professor Day's salary and other questions relating to the School of Pharmacy were referred to President James with the request that he report on them at the December meeting.

Otherwise, I recommend that the arrangements with the members of the faculty of the School of Pharmacy heretofore in operation be continued as to the coming year, including \$25.00 per month for the seven months of the school year be allowed to the assistants in each of the three laboratories in consideration of additional work attendant upon the leasing of the rooms for an evening school.

This recommendation was approved.

WOMEN INSTRUCTORS AS A COMMITTEE ON WOMEN STUDENTS' WELFARE.

In the absence of a dean of the woman's department it has been thought advisable to organize the women of the corps of instruction in such manner as best to meet the needs and interests of women students in the University. There are in the corps of instruction twenty-six women. The Council of Administration appointed from these a committee of three to have general charge of the whole matter, to make plans and arrangements, to select persons for special duties and to see that all designated duties are performed. Every one of the whole number of instructors has been given something to do and provisions have been made for service by the following committees, each having its own organization and specific duties: (1) The Office; (2) Intellectual Life; (3) Social Life; (4) Home Life. Besides this, certain of these women of the faculty have been appointed to be by turns in the office at designated hours of the day to act as advisors of any students who may choose to consult them. While this adds to duties already burdensome in most cases, all have gladly accepted the duties thus assigned and there is now good reason for the expectation that the matters in question will have more and better attention than they have ever before had.

AGRICULTURAL AFFAIRS.

I submit herewith a communication from Dean Davenport, as dean of the Agricultural College and as director of the Experiment Station, and approve of the suggestion that provision be made for an appointment of an instructor in landscape gardening. I am, however, also of the opinion that something further is demanded in regard to investigation and instruction in what is generally included under the name of forestry. I am myself giving a short course of lectures year by year upon the subject in the department of horticulture and so as a matter of fact under the official charge of Professor Blair as head of the department. Nothing further has been attempted. No systematic effort has been made to study the tree growths or conditions in the State and nothing of moment has been done towards advancing knowledge or practice among our people in this relation. The Department of Agriculture at Washington has had men in the field during the summer and we may before long expect a report upon the preliminary surveys thus made. The general subject has been taken up by the woman's clubs and we are asked for advice as to facts and as to proper procedures. Professor Blair is absent, but he is much interested in the subject and I am sure would gladly have this considered along with the question of landscape gardening, and Dean Davenport is ready to do anything within his power to meet what seems to be a large and growing demand. Whether any one man can be found who could suitably aid in the development of and instruction in the two somewhat allied subjects can not beforehand be determined. Various other state universities have recently established full courses in or schools of forestry, and this larger idea ought to be considered here. But any action looking in this direction must be taken only after careful study of the whole matter and our special conditions and needs be made the basis of procedure rather than what others have elsewhere found desirable or necessary.

I therefore recommend that authority be given the dean of the College of Agriculture and the head of the department of horticulture to find for the next semester one man who may be appointed at a salary not to exceed \$1,200.00 as instructor in one or both of these subjects, and that the former be requested to report further upon the general subject at your next meeting.

Authority was given as asked.

The appropriations asked for in the dean's report are hereby recommended.

HIGH SCHOOL CONFERENCE.

A committee of the Council of Administration has had under consideration possible improvement in the teaching especially of the English language and literature and of the sciences in the high schools. It is widely recognized that the aims and methods of such instruction should be better and more widely understood and that better practice is decidedly needed. The schools generally will gladly welcome any assistance in this and it is believed the University may be able to render some real service in the matter by asking not to exceed 20 selected superintendents or teachers to meet here a committee from the faculty appointed for the purpose in order that a very free and full discussion may be had and that studied conclusions may be reached. Such a meeting cannot probably be best held until sometime after the Christmas holidays, for it will take a considerable amount of preparatory planning and correspondence, but authority to proceed is asked for at this time. Much better results may be anticipated if invitations can be extended to particular persons selected for their known interest and attainments in the subjects and that payment of the necessary traveling expenses be made. For this purpose I respectfully recommend that an assignment of \$200 be made and that so much of this as may be found necessary be expended under the direction of President James.

Two hundred dollars were appropriated as recommended.

TELEPHONE SERVICE.

Very serious complaints have long been made of the service rendered by the public telephones in the University buildings more especially of the so-called Home line. In response to a recent inquiry there are now in my hands reports concerning each instrument by the party best informed concerning it. These are submitted for your inspection but not for publication in the minutes. So unsatisfactory is the service that there is scarcely any hesitation on the part of any one about advising the removal of the instruments even though others should not be put in. Complaints have time and again been sent in to the manager. These have sometimes been followed by attempted corrections, often nothing has been done, but in either case the results have not been very different.

So far as I can ascertain there is no agreement with the company save the original one when the line was first put in. It is surely time that the matter should be brought to an adjustment or the service discontinued. I therefore recommend that the business manager be instructed to confer with the proper officers of the company and to secure if possible the requisite improvement, but failing in that within sixty days, to cause the removal of the instruments and the discontinuance of the contract. It should be said, however, that this recommendation in no wise indicates any lack of appreciation of the general usefulness to the community, and to the University as well, of this enterprise. It is made with a sense of much regret rather than anything like hostility.

CENTRAL UNION TELEPHONE TUNNEL.

The following report from the Committee on Buildings and Grounds recommending that permission be given the Central Union Telephone Company to lay a tunnel across Illinois Field was approved.

To the Board of Trustees:

Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds desires to report that President Burrill submitted to the committee the following communication from the Central Union Telephone Company, and asked the recommendation of the committee thereon:

CENTRAL UNION TELEPHONE COMPANY.

OFFICE OF THE DIVISION SUPERINTENDENT,
SPRINGFIELD, ILL., Sept. 23, 1904.

Mr. T. J. Burrill, President, University of Illinois, Champaign, Illinois.

DEAR SIR—We have under contemplation for this fall, the extensive reconstruction and extension of our local exchange plant at Champaign and Urbana, in view of placing our service on a higher standard in the public eye, and in view of moving, at a later date, our exchange quarters nearer the center of radius of the two cities.

In carrying out detailed plans of the above, we find it important to establish a main trunk cable line in the alley between Stoughton and White streets in Champaign, and Main and Stoughton streets in Urbana. This necessitates our appeal to you and the Honorable Board of Trustees for permission to establish an underground line of six ducts across the University grounds, directly opposite the alley mentioned above, as per the sketch attached. These ducts will be of vitrified clay and covered with cement, at an approximate depth of three feet below the surface of the earth, with a manhole just outside of the fence line on each side of the grounds, thus avoiding the use of poles adjoining the grounds in any manner.

As an assurance to you of my sincerity in endeavoring to assist in retaining the long prized beauty of the University grounds we will agree to establish an additional underground line of ducts and cables from the proposed manhole at the west fence line of the gymnasium building, and at this point enter your present tunnel system, and in this manner reach all of the telephones which we have in the various departments that can be reached through the tunnel and remove the aerial wire and poles that we now maintain for this purpose.

With your approval of the above we will replace the terrace under the supervision of your representatives and will assume the responsibility of remedying any settling of the lawn and terrace caused by the negligence on the part of the Central Union Telephone Company.

Thanking you in advance, we anxiously await your reply and approval.

OPENING BURRILL AVENUE.

URBANA, Sept. 27, 1904.

To the Board of Trustees:

Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds reports concerning the petition of the citizens and officials of the cities of Urbana and Champaign for the opening of a roadway for light driving through the grounds of the University

to the public road running east and west north of the cemetery, that it has considered the matter and recommends the passage of the following resolution as the action of this board.

Resolved, That as the Attorney General has ruled that a State institution cannot dedicate land for a public highway through State property, it is hereby ordered that the gate at the south end of Burrill avenue be opened temporarily till further ordered by the board, with the understanding that only light travel be allowed on this roadway and that no funeral processions are authorized to traverse the roadway at any time. If to the superintendent of grounds it appears necessary to do so, he may cause signs to be put up on the roadway bearing notices of this purpose to the public.

It was voted to accept the bids of John Bennet on masonry work, the Joliet Bridge Company on metal work, and A. W. Stoolman on carpentry work.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds was authorized to accept satisfactory bids for the heating and plumbing.

KEEPING AND PURCHASING HORSES.

Mr. Kerrick called up the following propositions with regard to keeping and purchasing horses, referred to this meeting at the meeting of August 23d.

1. That stabling and care for one team and for one or two carriages, without coachman's service, be afforded the President of the University at \$17.50 a month.

2. That stabling and care for one horse and one carriage be afforded the Dean of the College of Agriculture at \$10.00 a month.

3. That stabling and care for one horse and one carriage be afforded the Professor of Animal Husbandry at \$10.00 a month.

4. That the University purchase a team of typical coach horses and a suitable vehicle for the exclusive use of the University.

The propositions were amended: (1) by striking out the first paragraph; (2) by striking out in the fourth paragraph all after the words "horses" and adding "for the use of the University in the instruction of students;" and the propositions were adopted as amended.

The Committee on Agriculture was authorized to purchase the team of horses at an expense of not to exceed \$1,000.00.

CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATIONS.

The Committee on Students' Welfare offered the following resolution which was adopted:

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees has observed with great satisfaction the effective work of the Young Men's and Young Women's Christian Associations in meeting, welcoming and assisting new students,

Resolved, That we hereby record our appreciation of their effort and request the Secretary of the Board so to inform the proper officers of each of the associations.

The Committee on Students' Welfare was directed to investigate the conditions regarding the accommodations for young women attending the University, whose homes are not in the cities of Champaign or Urbana, and to report at the next meeting of the Board.

PURCHASE OF BOILERS.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds was authorized to contract for 500 H. P. of boilers at a cost not to exceed \$8,500.00, of which not to exceed \$2,000.00 should be paid before July 1, 1905.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The Finance Committee made the following report which was adopted:

URBANA, September 27, 1904.

To the Board of Trustees:

The undersigned, your Finance Committee, would report the following recommendations, touching the matter of keeping accounts of the University:

1. We recommend that all accounts be arranged in accordance with the double entry principle of bookkeeping.

2. The system to provide for a quarterly report of the status of the various funds, showing the amounts received, sources from where obtained and the balances of the different funds available.

3. That a general cash book record be kept showing in itemized form all moneys received each day and disbursements of same. Also, statement of moneys paid over to the Treasurer, and balances shown on said record, and daily balances in hands of Business Manager.

4. As to deposits of moneys by students subject to their order, recommend that separate accounts be kept, but we do not think that such deposits should become part of the University accounts, as same are purely a matter of accommodation for students' benefit, and not for University use.

5. That proper books be obtained to carry out the foregoing recommendations, and that the Business Manager, with the Finance Committee, be authorized to employ such competent assistants as may be necessary, and to pay for such compensation as they deem proper and necessary.

We also submit report of the Audit Company of Illinois on books, vouchers, receipts and disbursements of moneys of the University during the period of six months from January 1, 1904, to June 30, 1904, and recommend that the same be placed on file in the office of the Business Manager, and that "Exhibit A" in this report be published in these proceedings.

REVOCATION OF ACCOUNTANCY DIPLOMAS.

The following communication from the University Committee of Accountancy was received and referred to the Executive Committee of the Board with power to act, and with the direction that it report its action to the Board:

URBANA, Sept. 26, 1904.

Acting President T. J. Burrill:

DEAR SIR—In accordance with rules passed by the Board of Trustees of the University concerning the examination of certified public accountants, the University Committee in charge desires to submit to the Trustees certain matters that have come up, the final adjudication of which is beyond the authority of the University Committee or the Board of Examiners in Accountancy.

The degree of C. P. A. has been conferred upon and diplomas have been issued to Mr. N. C. Johnson, 305 New York Life building, Chicago, and to Mr. Frank E. Webner, American Audit Company, Traction building, Cincinnati, Ohio. These degrees were granted by the Board of Examiners in regular order and the diplomas were duly issued.

About the middle of July the Committee of Accountancy received a letter from a committee appointed by the Illinois Association of Public Accountants and the Illinois Society of Certified Public Accountants, enclosing papers protesting against the granting of the degree to the said N. C. Johnson and F. E. Webner. These papers are submitted and are marked 1 and 2. In the opinion of the Board of Examiners, as well as the University Committee, charges against any one to whom the C. P. A. degree has been issued should be made under oath. We so informed the gentlemen who undertook to make charges. In reply we have received an affidavit by Mr. Allen R. Smart against Mr. Webner. This is marked "Exhibit F" of No. 2. We have received also a sworn statement against Mr. N. C. Johnson by Mr. Richard F. Ring. This is marked "Exhibit 3."

According to the law (Section 5, page 6, of the Regulations), the University may revoke any certificate for sufficient cause; "provided, that written notice shall have been previously mailed to the holder of such certificate twenty days before any hearing thereon, stating the cause for such contemplated action, and appointing a date for a full hearing thereof by the University; and, provided, further, that no certificate shall be revoked until a hearing shall have been had."

Your committee submits these two cases for your consideration.

All papers received by the Board of Examiners in these two cases are on file in the office of the chairman of your committee, excepting those sent herewith.

Upon the call of the President, Mr. F. L. Hatch, there will be a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, Wednesday, November 9, 1904, at 9:00 o'clock a. m., at the University for the following purposes:

To decide upon the name to be put over the main entrance to the Woman's building.

To decide upon the inauguration of President James.

When the Board met pursuant to this call the following members were present: Messrs. Bullard, Hatch, McKinley, McLean and Mrs. Abbott, Mrs. Alexander and Mrs. Evans. Mr. Nightingale came in a little later. Absent, Governor Yates and Messrs. Bayliss, Dickirson and Kerrick. President James was present.

COMMUNICATION FROM PRESIDENT JAMES.

President James presented the following communication, stating that the recommendations were made by Vice President Burrill:

The following appointments are recommended for eight months beginning November 1, 1904:

Karl W. Zimmerschied, Instructor in Chemistry at \$75 a month.

John Terrell Vawter, Jr., Assistant in General Engineering Drawing at \$70 a month.

It is recommended that General Engineering Drawing be constituted a department and that Assistant Professor Victor Tyson Wilson be appointed head of the department.

The University exhibit at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition is presumably to be returned to the University at the expense of the State Commission, but the cases in which it is shown will be offered for sale. At least some of these cases would be of permanent value to the University, and probably may be secured at a very low figure compared with the cost of manufacture. There is also some material from other exhibits which would be of importance here and probably could be procured at small expense. May the matter be referred to a committee with authority to spend not more than \$1,000?

Upon these recommendations the Board took action as follows:

1. The appointments were made as recommended.
2. The recommendation with regard to creating a department of general engineering drawing was referred to President James for report at the next meeting of the Board.

3. The matter of making purchases at the St. Louis exposition was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act; and \$1,000, or so much thereof as might be needed, was appropriated for the use of the committee.

BOND FOR IMPORTS.

The question of furnishing a bond to the United States Treasury Department, in connection with the importation of some glass imitations of gem stones, was referred to the Executive Committee with power to act, and the executive officers of the Board were authorized to furnish the bond, if so directed by the Executive Committee.

NAME OF WOMAN'S BUILDING.

Mrs. Alexander moved that the structure for the women of the University be called the Woman's building. Dr. Burrill was heard with regard to the name and suggested that it might properly be named in honor of Dr. John M. Gregory, the first Regent of the University, but further consideration of the motion was deferred until the afternoon session.

MAJOR FECHET'S COMPENSATION.

With regard to continuing the compensation of \$48.00 a month paid Major Fèchet in lieu of commutation for quarters (not allowed a retired officer on detail at a college or university), the following resolution was passed:

Resolved, That Colonel Fèchet be allowed \$48.00 a month, as heretofore, from the time of the expiration of his first detail until such time as it shall be determined whether or not he get an increase of pay on account of his promotion; and that, if he gets the increase, the payment of the \$48.00 by the University be discontinued thereafter; but that, if he do not get the increase, the payment of the \$48.00 be continued.

A recess was then taken until 1:30 p. m.

Afternoon Session, November 9, 1904.

When the Board met after the recess the same members were present as in the morning.

Mr. McKinley moved to amend the motion with regard to the name of the new building by inserting "John M. Gregory Hall," instead of "Woman's Building."

Mr. Bullard moved to make the name the "Woman's Gymnasium."

Mr. Nightingale moved to lay the motion and amendments on the table.

It was also moved to postpone consideration until the regular meeting in December.

The motion to postpone, the motion to lay on the table, the second amendment, the first amendment, and the original motion were successively lost.

It was voted to postpone the choice of name for the building until the next regular meeting.

INAUGURATION OF PRESIDENT JAMES.

A communication from a committee of the Council and Senate with regard to the inauguration of President James was read, and by the following resolution referred to President James and the Council of Administration:

Resolved, That we approve in general of the plan of inauguration of the new President, Dr. E. J. James, as presented by the Committee of the Council and Senate, and that the general arrangements, as to time, character, etc., be left to the President and the Council of Administration, to consider and report at the regular meeting in December.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE SCHOLARSHIPS.

A report by the Committee on Instruction with regard to the household science scholarships was read, and after a discussion which was brief, inasmuch as the time for a convocation which the Trustees were asked to attend had nearly arrived, was referred back to the committee to be presented at the meeting in December.

The Board adjourned.

Meeting of December 13, 1904.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Tuesday, December 13, 1904.

The members present were Messrs. Hatch, Kerrick, McLean and Nightingale and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Abbot and Mrs. Evans; absent Governor Yates, and Messrs. Bayliss, Dickirson and McKinley. Mr. Bullard came in later. President James was present.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the Board meetings held September 27, 1904, and November 9, 1904, and these were approved as presented.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM PRESIDENT JAMES.

The President of the University presented the following matters for consideration:

1. A recommendation from the Council of Administration that the High School Visitor be added to the Senate by virtue of his office.

The recommendation was approved.

2. A letter from Colonel E. G. Fechét, head of the military department of the University, requesting that a two-story addition be built to the Armory for the necessary storage of guns and ammunition.

Communication referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act and instructions to report.

3. A communication from Vice President Burrill suggesting the name of Watcheka Hall for the Woman's building.

It was voted to postpone the selection of a name for the Woman's building for future consideration.

4. A request from the Director of the Men's Gymnasium that a piano be placed in the gymnasium, and a person be employed to play it, in connection with the gymnasium drill. The estimated expense was \$15 for the rent of the piano for five months, at \$3 per month, and \$72 for the services of a musician, at \$1 a day for four days a week for eighteen weeks; total, \$87.

The matter was referred to the President with power to act.

5. A request from the Director of Physical Training for an addition to the regular appropriation to the department of physical training.

One hundred and fifty dollars was added to the appropriation.

6. A recommendation from Dean Ricker that Robert Clayton Mathews' salary be fixed at \$90 a month from January 1, 1905, and that Hammond William Whitsitt's salary be fixed at \$85 a month for the same period.

The recommendation was approved.

7. Miss Katharine L. Sharp, the Librarian of the University, requests the sum of \$150 to pay for clerical work and other assistants, in connection with completing an historical sketch of the libraries of Illinois which she is at present compiling and which is to be published by the University.

The appropriation of \$150 for this purpose was made.

8. Communications from Dean Kinley, Chairman of the University Committee on Accountancy, relating to various suits which certain persons had threatened to bring against the University; in the one case, for rejecting an application to be registered as Certified Public Accountant under the waiver clause; in another, for the return of the \$25 fee to an applicant whose application for registration under the waiver clause was refused; in the third, a notice of intention to bring a suit to compel the University to give to the applicant a copy of the examination papers used in an examination for Certified Public Accountant.

It was voted that the University should request the opinion of the Attorney General as to the legality of the position taken by the University through its Committee on Accountancy. If the Attorney General held that the action taken was legal, the action of the committee should be approved by the Board. If the Attorney General should hold that the action was illegal, the committee should take such action as he might indicate. In case a suit should be brought against the University, the Attorney General should be requested to represent the University in the proceedings.

9. A statement from the Dean of the College of Science that the faculty of the College of Science had voted to request the Trustees to provide for a course in human anatomy as a part of the preliminary medical course.

Voted that the Board approve the application in principle, and that a definite plan should be submitted, indicating the scope of the instruction, the number of hours to be given, the cost of the necessary equipment and teaching force, definite action upon the subject, however, being postponed until it was evident what resources would be at the University's disposal for the ensuing biennium.

10. A statement concerning the fire at the Agricultural building on December 8, from which it appeared that, in the opinion of Professor Brooks, the fire arose from defective wiring connected with the Home Telephone Company.

On motion of Mr. Nightingale it was

Resolved, That every emergency in connection with the electrical wiring in any part of the University be placed in the hands of Professor Brooks to be attended to at once, and that the general matter of electrical wiring in the University be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds in conjunction with Professor Brooks for investigation and report; and further, that in the future the installation of all wires in the University be under the supervision of the head of the electrical engineering department and that his written approval must be on file before such work be accepted or such wires used.

Voted to present the sum of \$25 to the two volunteer fire companies in Champaign and Urbana for their efficient services in connection with extinguishing the above mentioned fire, and that a vote of thanks be tendered, in the name of the University, through the chiefs of these companies, for their cooperation.

Voted that the Board of Trustees express its appreciation of the efficient and prompt services of the night watchman and the fire brigade of the University in connection with the same fire.

Voted that the question of fire protection should be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with authority to make such emergency provisions as might be necessary to protect the buildings against the immediate danger of fire, and that they present a plan for the more efficient protection of the University.

11. A request from the Dean of the College of Agriculture that a scholarship be granted to Martha Matthews.

Approved.

In this connection a scholarship was granted Sallie Abbott, and a scholarship previously granted George H. Cheny but not accepted because of illness was renewed.

12. A request from Professor S. W. Parr for an appropriation of \$200 to enable him to complete a piece of investigation work into the subject of Illinois coals.

The appropriation was made.

13. A statement as to the subject of extending the privileges of the scholarships in domestic science, now available in the College of Agriculture, to the College of Science, with a suggestion that the matter be postponed for further consideration.

The suggestion was approved.

14. A request from Katharine L. Sharp, Director of the Library School for the appointment of a reviser of cataloging for three months, February to April, 1905, at \$50 a month.

Request was granted, and authority given to the President to appoint said cataloger.

15. Proposed resolution concerning the policy of the State University as to affiliation of other educational institutions.

WHEREAS, Applications from various institutions of learning have been made to the Trustees of the State University to affiliate the institutions in question; and,

WHEREAS, It seems desirable to have some general policy in regard to such affiliations; therefore, be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that no institution be affiliated with the University unless entire control of such institution be turned over absolutely to the Trustees of the University; and further, that the title to all property owned by such institution be vested in the State, without conditions and without limitations.

The resolution was adopted.

Also a further resolution, as follows:

That no such institution be accepted unless there is ample guarantee on the part of its trustees, faculties and other persons interested in the institution that the requisite funds will be placed at the disposal of the University to conduct the institution in a manner worthy of the University and the State of Illinois until such time as the Legislature of the State assumes the financial support of the same.

Lost by the following vote: Yeas, Messrs. McLean, Hatch, Kerrick, and Mrs. Alexander; nays, Messrs. Bullard, Nightingale, and Mrs. Abbott and Mrs. Evans; absent, Governor Yates and Messrs. Dickerson, Bavliss and McKinley.

16. That the President of the United States be invited to visit the University of Illinois at some time to suit his convenience.

Approved.

17. A request from the Rev. Mr. Tobie that the use of the chapel or some other suitable room in the University be granted to him and his congregation during the process of the erection of a new church on the present site of the Parks Memorial chapel, from March 1 to November 1, 1905.

It was voted to grant the request under such conditions as to payment for janitor service and heating as the President of the University might prescribe.

18. A statement that Dean T. A. Clark has been approved by the President as Director of the Summer School, and a suggestion that a conference be held during the Summer School upon the problem of the rural school, and that to this conference the school directors, or some representatives chosen by them, be invited.

The suggestion was concurred in.

19. A statement that the Clay Workers' Association of the State was desirous of securing an appropriation from the Legislature for an economic survey of the State, embracing particularly the materials of use by the ceramic industry. They propose to put the survey under the charge of the State University.

Voted to accept the appropriation, if secured, and undertake the work indicated.

20. A statement that certain persons interested in the improvement of charitable and philanthropic conditions of the State were planning to secure an appropriation from the State Legislature to establish a school for training of philanthropic and charitable workers, hoping that the State University would accept the appropriation and undertake the work.

Voted to accept this trust, if conferred by the Legislature and accompanied by adequate appropriations.

21. A statement as to the possibility of a general geological survey of the State and the attitude which the State University should take toward such a survey.

Voted that the President pursue such course with reference to the survey as he should find best.

LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS. -

22. The report of the committee appointed by the Board upon the legislative appropriations for the biennium 1905-1907.

A careful and prolonged discussion followed, in the course of which several items were changed as follows:

17a was added, Mr. Kerrick, at his own request, being recorded as voting no.

18 was raised from \$2,000 to \$3,000.

20 was raised from \$10,000 to \$35,000.

22 was changed from "for purchase of land, \$10,000" to the form in which it appears below.

Item 24 was approved, Mr. Kerrick, at his own request, being recorded as voting no.

The question of sending the regiment to Springfield January 9, 1905, to attend the inauguration of the Governor was referred to President James with power to act.

The President and Secretary of the Board were given authority to settle with the Hartford Steam Boiler Inspection and Insurance Company for a loss sustained under its policy No. 55,935 by reason of an explosion which occurred October 11, 1904.

FOUNDRY ACCEPTED.

Mr. Bullard, chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, reported that the new foundry was satisfactorily completed and moved that it be accepted, and that the contractor be paid the balance due. It was so ordered.

It was ordered that Professor James M. White be paid \$500 on account for service as architect.

FREE TUITION.

The following resolution offered by Mr. Nightingale was received and it was voted that it be considered at an early date:

WHEREAS, The University of Illinois was established and is maintained by the people of the State, through public taxation; and,

WHEREAS, The benefits and privileges of the University are intended for all the young people of the State, who have such a preparation in the way of mental and moral equipment as will enable them to take advantage of the opportunities afforded; and,

WHEREAS, The State University is in every sense a public school; and,

WHEREAS, All our other public schools, kindergarten, elementary and high, are free; therefore,

Resolved, That on and after the opening of the college year in 1905 the tuition fee of twenty-four dollars a year for students whose homes are in Illinois be abolished, and that for such students the tuition in the academic departments, including the College of Agriculture, be free.

It was voted that when the Board adjourned it should adjourn to 9:00 o'clock a. m., January 17, 1905.

Adjourned Session, January 17, 1905.

When the Board met pursuant to adjournment the members present were Messrs. Bayliss, Hatch, Kerrick, McKinley, McLean, and Nightingale and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Abbott and Mrs. Evans; absent, Governor Deneen, Mr. Barber and Mr. Bullard who was not able to come on account of illness. President James was present.

President James submitted the following matters for consideration:

1. A request from Professor L. H. Bailey of the College of Agriculture, Cornell University, on behalf of the Committee on Graduate Study of the Association of American Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations, to make an annual contribution of \$25 toward the expenses of maintaining a graduate summer school in agriculture.

It was voted that the request be granted.

2. Professor L. H. Bailey also submits a request to the University of Illinois to hold such a graduate school during the coming summer at Urbana.

It was voted that authority be given to the Dean of the Faculty of the College of Agriculture to hold such a graduate school during the summer of 1906, and that the sum of \$300 be appropriated from the college extension funds to meet the necessary preliminary expenses of organizing and advertising the school.

3. The owners of a certain forty-acre tract of land, at the front of the block known as South farm, represented by Mr. Saffell, have offered to lease to the University the said forty acres for the sum of \$500 a year, giving to the University an option to buy the land at the price of \$10,000.

It was voted to authorize the officers of the Board to execute the said lease.

4. A communication from Vice President Burrill, stating that the Trustees of the Young Men's Christian Association, at their meeting yesterday afternoon, had authorized the sale of the lots held by that association, to the east of the Engineering building, to the University for the sum of \$15,000.

It was voted that the proper authorities secure a legal option for the purchase of this property at the said price.

5. A letter from Professor Forbes, requesting that his position in the University and his relation to the various departments be considered, with a view to simplifying his work and reducing somewhat his responsibility for one or another of the various enterprises.

With regard to this letter the following resolution offered by Mr. Nightingale was adopted:

WHEREAS, A communication has been received from Professor Forbes asking for a consideration of his complicated relations to the affairs of the University, and the propriety of readjusting them along simpler lines; therefore,

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees hereby expresses its deep appreciation of the services of Dean Forbes as State Entomologist, Director of the State Laboratory of Natural History, as well as Professor of Zoölogy; and further

Resolved, That the President of the University be requested to have a conference with Dean Forbes concerning his varied responsibilities and his desires and report to the Board in the near future some plan for such a readjustment as will subserve the interests of entomology, those of the University and, so far as possible, meet the wishes of Dean Forbes.

6. A request from Professor Thomas A. Clark, Director of the Summer School, that a free scholarship in the summer session be offered each accredited high school in the State.

Voted that a free scholarship in the summer session be granted to some representative of as many high schools in the State as the President of the University should deem wise.

7. A proposed bill intrusting to the University of Illinois the conduct of a State geological survey.

Voted that the President and the legislative committee be authorized to secure the introduction of said bill into the Legislature.

8. The matter of extending the privilege of scholarships in the Domestic Science Department to the College of Science was referred, at the last meeting of the Board, to the President for further report. The President recommends that the privilege of said scholarships be extended to the College of Science.

Voted that the recommendation be approved.

9. A request from the College of Engineering that engineering drawing be made a separate department of instruction and Professor V. T. Wilson be made the head of the department. Professor Wilson seems to be a very capable and efficient man; but, in the opinion of the President, the subject is not one of such importance as to justify erecting it into a separate department, as the word "department" is now understood in the University, and giving the head thereof the same position in the Senate, for example, as is accorded to the entire School of Law, or School of Music, or Department of Civil Engineering. The object to be attained by the creation of such a department may, perhaps, be reached in another way, in regard to which a recommendation may be made later.

10. The appointment of a Secretary to the President.

Voted that Dr. Wallace N. Stearns be elected private secretary to the President, salary \$100 per month, to begin when he begins service.

11. The request for a two days' encampment of the University Regiment at the State Agricultural Fair in the coming September.

Voted that the matter should be left, with power to act, with the President of the University, the Committee on Agriculture, and the Head of the Military Department.

12. The question of the relation of the Medical Department to the University.

It was voted that it is the sentiment of the Trustees that medical education should be incorporated as an integral part in the work of the University in the same sense as agriculture and engineering education.

The vote upon this was as follows: Yeas—Messrs. Bayliss, McLean, Hatch, Nightingale and McKinley and Mrs. Abbott, Mrs. Alexander and Mrs. Evans; nay, Mr. Kerrick; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Bullard and Barber.

It was further voted that to this end the necessary steps should be taken to request the Legislature for authority to acquire the property of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of the city of Chicago, by affiliation with which the University has for the past eight years been carrying on successfully the work of medical education.

FEEES DUE FROM STUDENTS.

The Registrar presented a statement of fees due from students of the various departments of the University as follows:

University fees, second semester 1903-1904; Academy fees, second semester 1903-1904; University Summer School fees 1904; College of Medicine for the year ending June 1, 1904; College of Medicine

Summer School ending August 24, 1904; School of Pharmacy for the year ending June 30, 1904; School of Dentistry for the year ending June 1, 1904.

The statement was referred to the Finance Committee.

SALARIES OF PROFESSORS.

The Committee on Instruction presented the following report which was adopted:

URBANA, ILLINOIS, Jan. 13, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees, University of Illinois:

The Committee on Instruction, to which was referred the matter of adjusting the salaries of the faculty, begs leave to report that it found the salary list extending over a series of years full of incongruities and inconsistencies. Among twenty-two (22) members of the faculty, whose salaries during the last ten (10) years have been considered with the thought of a proper adjustment, we find the increase in individual cases to have ranged from nothing to \$1,680. Within ten (10) years six (6) salaries have been raised \$200 each; one (1) \$480; five (5) \$500 each; one (1) \$750; one (1) \$900; two (2) \$1,000 each; one (1) \$1,100; two (2) \$1,300 each; one (1) \$1,500; one (1) \$1,680, and one (1) nothing. All these changes have been with those who have been in the faculty ten or more years. We, therefore, recommend that the whole subject of salaries be referred to the President with a request that he investigate the entire matter and report to the Board as soon as practicable, in the interests of the University.

Afternoon Session, January 17, 1905.

When the Board met after the recess the same members were present as during the morning session.

The claim of the Hibernian Bank, of Chicago, to a balance due on the contract with Kelley and O'Brien was referred to the President and Business Manager with power to act and instructions to reoprt.

President Hatch presented a communication from the Chicago Alumnae Association asking that the new building for women be named Gregory Hall, and it was ordered that the paper be filed with other papers regarding the naming of the building.

SCHOOL OF EDUCATION.

The following resolution from Mrs. Abbott was adopted:

Resolved, That a special committee of three, of which Mr. Bayliss should be chairman, be appointed to report to the Board upon the advisability of establishing a school of education with special reference to the preparation of teachers for secondary schools.

The President appointed on this committee Mr. Bayliss, Mrs. Abbott and Mr. Nightingale.

TELEPHONES.

The following recommendations submitted by Professor Morgan Brooks, of the electrical engineering department, and Mr. J. A. Morrow, Superintendent of Buildings, were adopted.

1. The removal of the Home Telephone Company instruments and connection of their system through our automatic exchange.

2. The extension of the Central Union system moderately, without increased expense, by using party line telephones, except in the President's office and house.

3. Provision for the extension of our automatic system to keep pace with the growth of the University, the estimated cost of this in two years being \$900.

It was voted to accept the following proposition from the Home Telephone Company:

THE HOME TELEPHONE COMPANY OF CHAMPAIGN COUNTY,
CHAMPAIGN, ILLINOIS, Dec. 12, 1904.

President Edmund J. James, University of Illinois:

The Home Telephone Company of Champaign county hereby submits the following proposition for telephone service at the University:

We will install in our office the necessary equipment required to connect our system in both Champaign and Urbana with the automatic system now in use at the University, without expense to the University. We will furnish service for the entire University system, if this connection is made with the automatic, for \$75 a year.

THE HOME TELEPHONE COMPANY OF CHAMPAIGN COUNTY,

Adjourned Session, February 20, 1905.

When the Board met pursuant to adjournment the members present were Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Hatch, Kerrick, McLean, and Nightingale, and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Abbott and Mrs. Evans; absent, Governor Deneen, Mr. Barber and Mr. McKinley. President James was present.

The President submitted the following matters for consideration:

1. Request from Professor S. A. Forbes that he be relieved of the deanship of the College of Science at the close of the current college year.

The request was granted, to take effect June 30, 1905.

2. A report from the special committee to which the matter was referred, with power to act, that the claim of the Hibernian Bank of Chicago to a balance due on the contract with Kelly & O'Brien, \$2,008.49, had been paid to the bank as the representative of Kelly & O'Brien, and that the University holds the bond of the bank for \$5,000 to indemnify it from loss, if any.

The report of the committee was received for record.

3. Letters from Professor Morgan Brooks and the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Company to the effect that the company had donated to the University a 45-kilowatt generator, valued at \$600.

It was voted to accept the gift and to return the thanks of the board therefor.

4. A request, approved by Professor Shattuck, head of the Department of Mathematics, from Joel Stebbins, Assistant Professor of Astronomy, for leave of absence from the University from June 8 to October 1, 1905, to act as assistant to the party which is to be sent to Labrador in June, 1905, by the Lick Observatory of California for the purpose of observing the total eclipse of the sun, which will occur August 30, 1905.

It was voted that such leave be granted.

5. The Council of Administration, after full and repeated consideration, recommends to the Board of Trustees that the privilege of the household science scholarships, hitherto available only in the College of Agriculture, should be extended to all the colleges of the University.

Voted to approve this recommendation so far as to extend the privileges of the scholarships to the College of Literature and Arts, extension having been already made to the College of Science, the extension in both cases to go into effect in relation to students now holding scholarships, at a date to be designated by the President of the University.

6. The following amendments to the rules relating to scholarships in agriculture and in household science:

1. Amend No. 3 in accordance with the rule adopted making the scholarship in Household Science available also in the College of Literature and Arts and in the College of Science.

2. Amend No. 4 by adding:

"Provided, That for counties or districts in which there are no such domestic science associations, candidates may be appointed on the recommendation of the Illinois Farmers' Institute."

3. Substitute for No. 5 the following:

"That in case there should be additional acceptable candidates for either scholarship recommended after the first from any county or district, such additional candidates not exceeding five from any one county or district, may be assigned to other counties or districts from which there are no acceptable candidates."

4. Amend No. 8 by adding:

"To be eligible to either scholarship the candidate must be at the time of the recommendation, and must have been for not less than one year prior thereto, a *bona fide* resident of the county or district from which he is recommended."

A scholarship shall lapse if during the term thereof the holder shall cease to be a resident of Illinois.

The amendments were adopted.

7. A bill for \$205 from the Hotel Beardsley of Champaign for lodging and board for members of the Legislature on the occasion of the visit of said members to inspect the University, February 13, 1905.

The bill was ordered paid.

8. A request from the Medical Faculty of the University to know the view of the Board of Trustees upon a recommendation made to the faculty by its Committee on Educational Policy, to the effect that candidates for graduation in the Medical School be required to attend four full years in a medical institution. Such a rule would prevent the medical faculty from admitting students to advanced standing who had done their scientific work in the College of Liberal Arts or Science in connection with universities having no medical departments.

It was voted that the Board would not approve such a recommendation of the medical faculty, and, further, that this and similar questions should be considered in full by the medical faculty and reported to the University Senate for its opinion.

9. Through an oversight, when last appropriations were made for the College of Agriculture, the receipts from the various departments of the College of Agriculture were not appropriated for the use of the College of Agriculture.

Voted that the income received from the various departments of the College of Agriculture during the present period be appropriated to the use of the College of Agriculture, as follows:

10. A request from Professor Morgan Brooks that the University furnish for a dormitory which he proposed to erect on Wright street opposite the University grounds, heat and light upon such terms as might be agreed upon.

This request was referred to Mr. Kerrick for consideration and report at the afternoon session.

11. The following letters from Doctors Quine and Steele were submitted:

"CHICAGO, Feb. 13, 1905.

"*President Edmund J. James:*

"DEAR SIR—I own \$22,600 in bonds issued by the College of Physicians and Surgeons and \$2,200, par value, of the stock of that institution.

"I wish to donate these securities to the University of Illinois, on the annuity plan, for the maintenance of the library of its College of Medicine—as soon as it requires such a college.

"I am ready at any time to place the securities with a trust company as a guarantee of good faith.

"No details will be insisted upon except such as are acceptable to the President and Trustees of the University.

"CHICAGO, Feb. 16, 1905.

"*President Edmund J. James, University of Illinois:*

"MY DEAR DR. JAMES—In reply to your favor of the 9th inst., I would state that I am willing to endow the Department of Pathology with the sum of \$25,000 on condition that I have the income at the rate of 4 per cent on that amount as an annuity during the life of myself and my wife, when it becomes absolutely the property of the University. This proposition is conditional upon the University of Illinois acquiring absolute ownership of the College of Physicians and Surgeons through the passage of a bill by the present Legislature authorizing the acquisition of the property.

"All details of the proposed gift can be arranged with you or the Trustees later,

The funds in both these cases are in bonds and stocks of the college. The stockholders of the College of Physicians and Surgeons are willing, further, to contribute a considerable sum, the exact amount has not yet been determined, toward endowment of the College of Physicians and Surgeons in case the University should take over the college. These subscriptions are also to be payable in the stock of the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

12. At the last meeting of the Board of Trustees it was voted that the legislative committee should introduce a bill into the present Legislature authorizing the Trustees to acquire the College of Physicians and Surgeons. The proposed bill and an argument in favor of its passage were presented.

Voted that the draft of the proposed bill be approved and that it be printed, together with the argument for the same, and distributed to members of the Legislature.

Voted, further, that the Medical Committee of the Board of Trustees be requested to secure the introduction and urge the passage of said bill.

LEASE OF FARM LANDS.

Mr. Kerrick, to whom the matter had been referred, presented a lease by which Messrs. W. I. Saffell and L. E. Ford leased, with the option of purchase, the n. w. $\frac{1}{4}$ of the n. e. $\frac{1}{4}$ of 19-19-9 east of the 3d P. M. to the University of Illinois, and the President and Secretary of the Board were instructed to execute the lease.

SCHOOL OF EDUCATION.

The special committee on a school of education made the following report, which was adopted:

URBANA, Feb. 20, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees:

Your special committee, appointed January 17, 1905, "to report to the Board upon the advisability of establishing a school of education with special reference to the preparation of teachers for secondary schools," begs leave to report that it is expressly stated in University Bulletin No. 13—Announcements for 1904-5 and Register for 1903-4—page 87, that "the department of education aims to meet the needs of the prospective secondary teacher and of the prospective city superintendent." The resolution, therefore, seems to direct the committee to report upon the advisability of expanding what is now a department of the College of Literature and Arts into a separate school or college.

Your committee is of opinion that at the proper time this should be done, and respectfully recommends that the President of the University be requested to report upon its present practicability at the regular meeting of this Board in June, 1905; and, in the event that he is of opinion that such a reorganization of the department of education would be good University policy at this time, to make such recommendations as he may wish to submit for the consideration of the Board of Trustees.

NAMING WOMAN'S BUILDING.

President Hatch said he had received a large number of letters suggesting names for the woman's building.

It was voted that these letters should be deposited with the secretary for future reference.

The Board then took a recess until 2:30 p. m.

Afternoon Session, February 20, 1905.

When the Board met after the recess the same members were present as in the morning except Mr. Kerrick.

A communication was received from Collins Bros. asking that the time for the completion of the woman's building be extended from March 1, 1905, to July 1, 1905.

It was voted that the request be granted; provided, however, that any additional expenses incurred by the University on account of the salary of the superintendent or in any other ways, because of such extension, should be paid by Collins Bros.

On motion of Mrs. Abbott it was voted that a bronze tablet in the usual form with the names of the members of the Trustees and the President of the University at the time of the erection of the building, be placed in the woman's building, and that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds be charged with the erection of the tablet.

The following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, The present Trustees hold office until their successors are elected and qualified, and deeming it to be the best interests of all concerned,

Resolved, That the retiring Trustees attend the March meeting, to introduce their successors.

OPTION ON THE Y. M. C. A. LOTS.

Authority was given the President of the Board to accept the option on their lots east of Engineering hall tendered by the trustees of the Y. M. C. A. connected with the University, or on better terms as to cash payment or time, if such concessions could be secured, and to report to the Board.

SCHOOL OF DENTISTRY.

URBANA, ILLINOIS, Feb. 20, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees:

Your Committee on the College of Medicine, which, at the meeting of March 8, 1904, was instructed to confer with the College of Physicians and Surgeons in order to arrange, if practicable, for the separation of the School of Dentistry from the College of Medicine and the reorganizing the School of Dentistry as the College of Dentistry, of the University desires to report that soon after being thus instructed by the Board the committee held a meeting with the Executive Committee of the College of Physicians and Surgeons relative to the subject in question.

We found the College of Physicians and Surgeons reluctant to give up the School of Dentistry to the University, as it was a source of revenue to the College under its contract with the University, but they thought that the school should be made a college of the University.

It was agreed, however, in order to give the School of Dentistry the dignity of a school of the University, that no longer should the diplomas issued by the University to graduates of the school indicate that the school was a part of the College of Medicine, but should be issued as from the School of Dentistry of the University of Illinois.

Meeting of March 14, 1905.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Tuesday, March 14, 1905.

The members present were Messrs. Barber (president of the State Board of Agriculture), Bayliss, Bullard, Hatch, McKinley, McLean, and Nightingale, and Mrs. Abbott, Mrs. Alexander, and Mrs. Evans; absent, Governor Deneen and Mr. Kerrick.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the Board meeting of December 13, 1904, and for the adjourned session of the same held January 17, 1905, and February 20, 1905.

The minutes were approved as presented.

The members of the Board elected in November last—Mr. W. L. Abbott, Dr. Charles Davison, and Mrs. Mary E. Busey—were then introduced and, having already taken the oath of office, took their seats as members of the Board.

Mr. McLean offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

WHEREAS, Our fellow members, Mrs. Abbott and Messrs. Nightingale and Hatch are about to retire from the Board, we deem it but simple justice that we should adopt the following:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Board be, and are hereby, tendered to the said members for their faithful and disinterested services, and that we certainly hope that they will have a long and pleasant life. They will be remembered by us in time to come.

The outgoing members, Messrs. Hatch and Nightingale and Mrs. Abbott, having withdrawn, the Board was called to order by the Secretary, Mr. W. L. Pillsbury, and thereupon proceeded to the election of officers.

Mr. Bullard was elected president; Mr. W. L. Pillsbury was re-elected corresponding and recording secretary and registrar; Mr. E. G. Keith was re-elected treasurer.

The Executive Committee, of which the President of the Board is chairman, was filled by the election of Mr. McKinley and Mrs. Alexander to be the other two members.

The matter of securing a bond from the treasurer and the examination and auditing of his accounts for the past term was referred to the Executive Committee. Later during the session it was ordered that the bond of the Treasurer should be \$600,000.00 in amount.

Dr. Edmund J. James was re-elected President of the University.

President James presented the following matters for consideration:

1. John Main Trueman has been recommended by the Dean of the College of Agriculture for appointment as instructor in Dairy Husbandry in the College and First Assistant in the same subject in the Station, at a salary of \$1,800, \$600 of which are to be charged to the College and \$1,200 to the Station. It is desired that his work begin on May 2, 1905.

It was voted that Mr. Trueman be appointed instructor in dairy husbandry in the College and first assistant in the same subject in the Station, at a salary of \$1,800.00 per year, \$600 of which are to be charged to the College and \$1,200.00 to the Station, the appointment to be from May 1, 1905, to August 31, 1905.

2. The Faculty of the School of Pharmacy have presented the following recommendations:

"1. That the course leading to the degree of Graduate in Pharmacy be lengthened so as to include eight months in each school year, instead of seven, as at present; that the entrance requirements be raised to one year of high school work, or its equivalent, and the minimum age of entrance be increased to seventeen years; that the recitation classes be an obligatory part instead of optional as at present and that the present age and experience requirements for the degree of graduate in pharmacy be retained.

2. That a course be installed which shall lead to the degree of pharmaceutical chemist, with the same requirements as the preceding course, the instruction to occupy two years of eight months, and six days a week instead of three days, this course to be concurrent with the graduate in pharmacy course and the work of the two courses to be partly in common, no requirements to be made for graduation excepting the successful completion of the course.

3. That the matriculation fee, diploma fee, the laboratory deposit for both of these courses remain as at present; that the present alumni quiz fee (\$5.00) be added to the tuition fee for the graduate in pharmacy course, making the yearly tuition fee \$50.00, and that the yearly tuition fee for the course in pharmaceutical chemistry be \$100.00.

Voted that this subject be referred to to the standing committee on the School of Pharmacy with power to act, provided that these recommendations be not followed unless the appropriation asked for in the University bill for the School of Pharmacy be obtained.

3. The Council of Administration recommended that the exercises connected with the formal installation of the President of the University be set within the month between the middle of October and the middle of November, taking the week which circumstances seem to make most desirable.

Voted that the recommendation of the Council of Administration in regard to the formal installation of the President of the University, be approved.

4. Mr. Fred Atkinson presents his resignation as superintendent of grounds, to take effect at such time as the Board may think best.

Voted that consideration of the acceptance of this resignation be postponed until the June meeting.

5. The head of the military department announces the loss of 10,000 cartridge primers from the armory, and calls attention to the fact that it is impossible, under present conditions, to safeguard the military property of the University.

Voted that this subject be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for report.

6. A great service may be done the University in the publication of a suitable "Alumni Record." It is believed that this enterprise would pay for itself largely, but to carry it through successfully it would be necessary for the University to advance the money necessary to collect the information for the said volume.

Voted that the publication of such an "Alumni Record" be authorized and the sum of \$1,500 be appropriated toward the expense of such publication.

7. Mr. Shattuck desires to resign his position as business manager.

Voted to refer the consideration of this resignation to the Executive Committee and the Committee on Instruction for report at the June meeting.

8. A letter from Professor L. P. Breckenridge saying that he had been asked to go on as director of boiler trials for the United States Geological Survey, work undertaken in the summer of 1904 with the approval of the Board of Trustees.

Voted that the President be authorized to extend permission to Professor Breckenridge to continue to act in the capacity of director of boiler trials for the Committee of the United States Geological Survey having this in charge, providing this work do not interfere with his regular work in the University.

9. Mrs. Eunice Dean Daniels presents her resignation as instructor in piano and the director of the music school requests authority to look for a successor.

Voted that the President may appoint an instructor in piano in place of Mrs. Daniels at a salary not to exceed \$1,200.00.

10. A petition has been presented, numerously signed by students, that the ground on the south of Springfield avenue, between Wright street and Burrill avenue, be assigned as tennis courts and that the tennis courts now on the campus immediately south of the interurban railway and the new courts south of the gymnasium and armory be put in charge of the University Tennis Association, a branch of the University Athletic Association.

Voted that both recommendations be approved and the Committee on Buildings and Grounds be authorized to construct the tennis courts.

11. The following persons have been recommended for fellows by the council:

Voted that the President be authorized to appoint the above named persons as fellows for the ensuing year and also two others to be named by the Council of Administration later.

ACCOUNTANCY.

The secretary received the following letter from Attorney General Stead in answer to certain inquiries made of him by order of the Board. The letter was received for record.

SPRINGFIELD, ILL., Feb. 24, 1905.

W. L. Pillsbury, Esq., Secretary, Board of Trustees, University of Illinois, Urbana, Ill.

DEAR SIR—I have your favor of the 20th instant, in relation to the action of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, respecting the application of J. A. B. Hossack, who has applied to become a certified public accountant, under the Act of 1903, authorizing examinations and the issuing of certificates of that character.

In my opinion, whether one is entitled to have a certificate granted to him under the provisions of the statute authorizing a waiver upon proof of five years' experience as public accountant prior to the passage of the Act, is a question for the determination of the board and where they honestly determine that question, upon the best evidence submitted to them, or upon such evidence as they are able to secure under reasonable rules adopted by them, their determination is final and conclusive.

I am also of the opinion that where an application is denied, the one who has failed to pass the examination is not entitled to the return of his examination fee. The questions prepared by the board of examiners do not become the property of applicants but may be retained by the board and disposed of in such manner as they see fit.

APPROPRIATIONS.

The appropriations asked for by the Business Manager were made. (See paper I above.)

The receipts of the dairy department amounting to \$5,000 were appropriated for the use of the department.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds made the following report, which was adopted.

URBANA, March 14, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees.

Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds reports as follows with regard to sundry matters referred to it by the Board:

LOCATION OF WOMAN'S BUILDING.

The woman's building is located with its west front sixty-eight feet east of and parallel with the east line of Wright street, and the north line of the building twenty-two feet south of the south line of Daniel street extended east.

FLAGSTAFF.

Your committee advised with Professor White and Colonel Fechét and authorized them to contract for the erection of a steel flagstaff about 100 feet high, if satisfactory proposals were obtained for a sum within the amount of the appropriation. This has been done and the contractors are now putting the flagstaff in place.

ERECTION OF BUILDINGS.

Your committee reports that the woman's building contracts are a little more than half completed. Since the breaking up of the cold weather of winter the work has been started, and as all or nearly all, the materials needed for the completion of the building are on the grounds, there will not be any occasion for further suspension of operations before completion.

The agricultural buildings are nearly completed and the buildings are now occupied by the departments.

The steam laboratory contracts are about two-thirds done.

The plumbing contract for this building has not yet been made.

ADDITIONS TO ARMORY.

The addition to the armory which the committee was authorized to make has not yet been made. It is undecided what it is best to do. Colonel Fechét has been asked to present for the consideration of the committee a plan of what he would recommend.

NEW BOILERS.

In accordance with your instructions your committee authorized Professor Breckenridge to obtain proposals of the best terms possible for two new boilers. The best proposition was obtained from the Stirling Company for two 200-H. P. boilers set in the boiler house and provided with chain grates and automatic stokers, for \$7,400.00—the University to furnish the foundations. The contract was made Oct. 15, 1904, and the boilers have just been put into place. The foundations and the steam and smoke connections have cost about \$1,000.00.

Your committee asks that it be instructed to take out insurance covering these boilers as may be deemed necessary.

RETURN OF EXHIBITS.

Under your instruction your committee authorized the president and deans to have the University exhibits returned to the University from the St. Louis Louisiana Purchase Exhibition, to purchase the cases on which the exhibits were made, and to purchase such other articles at the close of the exposition as in their judgment were of unusual value to the University, the amount to be distributed to the several departments as they should agree.

This work has been done, the exhibits returned, cases purchased and other articles for the several departments purchased, and all expenditures do not exceed the \$1,000.00 appropriated by the board.

ELECTRIC WIRING.

Your committee asked Professor Morgan Brooks to have his department make a careful examination of the wiring in the several university buildings and report with recommendations to the committee. We present his report as follows:

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS, March 13, 1905.

S. A. Bullard, Esq., Chairman Buildings and Grounds Committee, University of Illinois.

DEAR SIR—Regarding the question of defective wiring referred to me at a recent meeting of the trustees through your committee, I have to report that I have inspected the electric wiring in the various buildings of the University and have found a number of places where "an emergency" existed so that I have ordered immediate repairs to be made. A considerable amount

of work in improving the wiring has been done in the Agricultural Building, University Hall, the President's House, the Electrical Laboratory, the Wood Shop, the Armory and the Gymnasium. In the last named building the transformers have been removed from the building and located in the tunnel where any defect could not cause a fire. The troubles located have been caused mostly by causes not directly connected with electric wiring. For example underneath the main floor of the wood shop we found that a shaft hanger had been recklessly put up, the 220-volt wires being merely pushed aside, and remaining in contact with the iron of the hanger. It is a wonder that a short circuit was not caused at once. Only the good quality of the insulation prevented. Such dangers can only be remedied by inspection at reasonable intervals.

I desire to call your attention to the essentially defective wiring of the Natural History hall, of University hall, of the observatory, of the machine shop and of the boiler house. It would be only possible to bring the wiring in these buildings even approximately up to the standard of the Underwriter's rules for wiring by re-wiring the buildings, and this we recommend. The Natural History hall and the University hall are particularly bad. Not a single combination fixture in these buildings has the required insulation joint for one thing. Neither of these buildings is completely wired for electricity, and if rewiring is to be ordered the work should be made to include the unfinished wiring. Also Engineering hall (fairly well wired) is supplied with but half the number of fixtures and lamps needed to light the entire building. In a letter to President Draper, dated June 3, 1903, on this subject, I estimated the cost of completing the wiring of this building, including fixtures, sockets and lamps at \$950.

The lighting of the library building is inadequate, the rotunda suffering particularly. More light is demanded today for lighting than was formerly considered necessary, and I feel that the inadequacy of the lighting in this building is due largely to this fact. The large reading rooms need more light. Some gain could be made by lowering the fixtures, but a satisfactory solution of the problem would include heavier wiring and the purchase of a number of fixtures. I would like so to strengthen the overhead lighting as to do away entirely with the stand lamps on the tables, believing that the result would be to greatly enhance the appearance of these reading rooms. The rotunda, the finest interior architectural feature the University has, is positively gloomy after sunset, owing to insufficient lighting.

It may not be out of place to add here that additional lighting will soon be needed on the University grounds, especially south of University hall.

The present ugly pole line south of University hall along Burrill avenue will be taken down very soon, perhaps within ten days. The circuits supplied from this line will go under ground to the south end of the Agricultural building, thence by pole line on Mathews avenue to the new agricultural buildings.

FIRE PROTECTION.

Your committee has considered the matter of more adequate fire protection and recommends the placing of additional extinguishers in all our buildings, or until there are three, or at least two, in each corridor and each story of the smaller buildings and four in each corridor of the larger buildings.

Your committee recommends that two chemical engines or trucks be purchased and installed, one north and one south of Green street, either in some rooms of buildings conveniently situated therefor or in a small building or buildings constructed for the purpose.

These trucks are to be double charged and provided with sufficient hose to reach from the truck to any part of the building and with hose to reach water plugs and to be re-charged as rapidly as necessary. That the janitors be organized into brigades for handling these trucks, and that during term time a fire brigade be organized among the students, allowing the deduction of semester fees to such as join the brigade. That these brigades practice in the use of chemical engines at intervals so that the service may be efficient.

Your committee believes that this would afford protection against incipient fires and that this service would either put fires out or hold them in check until the city departments could arrive.

Your committee recommends that it be authorized to get proposals for such apparatus, examine more fully where the engine may be placed and advise with the superintendent of buildings with regard to the details of the organization proposed and report at the June meeting of the Board.

The committee is of the opinion that it is possible to unite with the cities of Champaign and Urbana in providing a joint fire department in the vicinity of the University, and recommends that it be authorized to formulate such a plan, if such can be made with the cities, limiting the annual expense to the University to \$600.00 a year, and report to the Board.

CENTRAL UNION TELEPHONE COMPANY.

Your committee reports that the Central Union Telephone Company has not yet constructed its system of wires across the parade ground of the north campus; but the materials are on the ground and we are told that the work will be begun within a few days.

PROFESSOR BROOKS'S REQUEST FOR LIGHT AND HEAT.

With regard to Professor Brooks's request for light and heat at reduced rates for a dormitory building, your committee reports that Professor Brooks, after investigating with regard to the cost of the proposed building and the probable income therefrom, has decided not to proceed with the matter, and so withdraws his request.

The vote by which the incidental fee was reduced from twelve to ten dollars a semester (see p. 45) was reconsidered, and it was then voted not to change the fee.

Meeting of April 27, 1905.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the School of Pharmacy, Chicago, Illinois, Thursday, April 27, 1905, at 10:00 o'clock a. m., in pursuance to the following call issued by the Secretary April 20, 1905:

Upon the call of the President, Mr. Bullard, there will be a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, at the School of Pharmacy, corner of Michigan boulevard and Twelfth street, Chicago, Illinois, at 10:00 o'clock a. m., Thursday, April 27, 1905, to authorize conferring diplomas upon those students of the School of Pharmacy who are to be graduated that day, and to transact such other business as may be brought before the Board."

There were present Messrs. Abbott, Bullard, Davison, and McLean and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans, and Mrs. Busey; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Barber, Bayliss, and McKinley. Mr. Kerrick came in a little later. President James was present.

The President presented the following subjects for the attention of the Board.

PRELIMINARY TRAINING FOR C. P. A. DIPLOMA.

1. Mr. D. M. McClelland applied for an examination for the certificate of Public Accountant. The University Committee on Accountancy decided that Mr. McClelland was not eligible because his preliminary education, in its opinion, was not equivalent to that offered by a four years' high school curriculum. His attorneys, George N. Morgan & Brother, desire to appear before the board on behalf of Mr. McClelland.

After hearing Mr. McClelland's attorneys, the secretary was directed to refer the question as to whether the Board had power to waive the requirements for preliminary training stated in the law, to the Attorney General for his opinion.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR ACCREDITED SCHOOLS.

2. G. T. Ragsdale, principal of the schools in DeKalb, inquires whether the University of Illinois is willing to grant free scholarships to students of high standing in the accredited schools.

Voted that the trustees do not feel justified in adding to the number of free scholarships now fixed by the Legislature.

KEYS TO BUILDINGS AND ROOMS.

3. There seems to be a need for more careful supervision in the use of the various buildings of the University. Different persons have received keys to the various buildings which admit them at any time of day or night and

no rules have been elaborated and adopted upon the subject. A committee appointed on the matter, consisting of Vice President Burrill and Dean Kinley, has worked out a code of regulations relating to this subject.

Voted that the President is authorized to adopt and publish such regulations in regard to this matter as may seem best.

4. Professor George H. Meyer, who has been absent from the University for the past year, desires to have his leave of absence extended, without pay, beyond the current academic year until September 1, 1906.

Voted that such leave of absence be granted.

DEPARTMENT OF DENTISTRY TO BE COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY.

5. There is considerable confusion in the announcements of the University relating to the department of dentistry. It is called in some places a College of dentistry, in some places a Department of Dentistry, in other places a School of Dentistry. The chief executive officer is denominated director or dean. It seems desirable for the Board to adopt a definite ruling in regard to this matter.

Voted that the dental department of the University shall be hereafter officially known as and denominated "The College of Dentistry," and the title of the chief executive officer shall be "Dean of the College of Dentistry."

6. Arrangements have been made for holding a special summer session and conference of school officers and teachers upon the problems of the rural school, in accordance with the vote of the Board passed at a previous meeting. It is estimated that the expenses of the meeting will amount to about \$800.00.

Voted that the sum of \$800 be appropriated for this purpose, to be expended under the direction of the President.

EXAMINER FOR ADMISSION TO COLLEGE OF MEDICINE.

7. Owing to the ruling of the State Board of Health, it is necessary for some officer, not connected with the College of Physicians and Surgeons, to conduct admission examinations to the medical department of the University.

Voted that the President of the University appoint a man as examiner to conduct medical examinations to the department of medicine of the University, to be remunerated on the basis to be agreed upon, such payments to be made from the funds of the medical school.

FURNISHING THE WOMAN'S BUILDING.

8. The time is rapidly drawing near when the matter of furnishing the woman's building should be taken up. It seems desirable that the building be properly equipped and furnished at the very start so that subsequent appropriations for this purpose will not be necessary.

Voted that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds acting with the Committee on Student's Welfare be authorized to furnish the woman's building, including the rooms assigned to the school of music in the south end, the social rooms, and the gymnasium rooms, in a suitable manner, and report to the Board.

9. There is need of three additional typewriters for work in the administrative departments of the University.

Voted that the sum of \$400, or so much thereof as may be needed, be appropriated for the purchase of the necessary typewriters and desks, etc.

INSTALLATION CEREMONIES.

10. A committee has been appointed upon the program connected with the installation ceremonies of next October. Dean Kinley has been made chairman of this committee, and the program is now being worked out rapidly. The time set by the committee is Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, the 17th, 18th and 19th of October. It will be necessary to make an appropriation at present toward the expenses of this occasion.

Voted that the appointment of the committee be approved, also the time fixed for the installation exercises. Voted further that an appropriation of \$600 be made toward the expenses of this occasion.

NEW INSECTARY.

11. A letter from Professor Forbes was submitted as to the construction of a new insectary.

Voted that the communication be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds and the Committee on Agriculture, with instructions to consider the question of the desirability of putting up the building with funds in hand as well as that of location, and report to the Board.

PORTLAND EXPOSITION.

12. The Governor of the State requests that the University shall make an exhibit at the Portland Exposition to be held during the coming summer. The commission undertakes to pay the expense of taking the exhibit from the University to Portland and return it to the University.

Voted that such an exhibit be prepared and sent to the Portland Exposition.

13. The dean of the College of Literature and Arts approves a recommendation of the head of the department of English literature that Mr. Harry G. Paul be elected assistant professor of English literature, at a salary of \$1,200.00 for the coming academic year.

Voted that Mr. Paul be elected to such a position at a salary of \$1,200.00.

SCHOOL OF EDUCATION.

14. At the meeting of the Board held February 20, 1905, a resolution was passed asking his opinion on the advisability of expanding the work of the department of education. The President appointed a committee to report upon this subject.

The report is as follows:

"It is the judgment of your committee that a school of education separate in administration from the existing colleges, and with a separate student registration, is not advisable, because of the difficulty and friction which such a plan would introduce into our administration, and because all the educational purposes of such a school can be well accomplished without it.

"We recommend, however, that all officers of instruction in the University who offer courses especially intended for the preparation of high school teachers be organized as a group, to be known as the faculty of the school of

education,' and that such officers of instruction constitute committees from their respective colleges and represent those colleges in the faculty of the school.

"We further recommend that all matters of educational policy initiated by the school of education be referred back to the several colleges, through their respective committees, for approval, but that, such educational policies having been established, the school of education shall be responsible for the details of their administration.

"We advise that the administrative officer of the school be called its director; that he be charged with the duty of promoting its interests in all ways possible; that all departments represented in the school of education continue to bear their present relations to their respective colleges; that the faculty of the school have power to recommend to the various colleges the granting of a University certificate of qualification to teach in the secondary schools; and that all candidates for the above certificate be expected to hand their names to the director of the school of education at the beginning of their junior year.

"We further recommend that there be added to the department of education two or three instructors in order that its work may be adequately expanded; that instructors also be added to the other departments, where necessary, in order that special courses for teachers may be given; and that the University make adequate appropriations for the expenses of the school, including provision for advertising, lectures, and visits to high schools by the special department teachers.

TREASURER.

REPORT ON ACCOUNTANCY.

2. The following report of the Committee on Accountancy is herewith presented to the board:

URBANA, ILL., June 1, 1905.

President E. J. James:

DEAR SIR:—The Committee on Accountancy hereby makes report of its action for the current year, for report to the Board of Trustees, in accordance with the regulations provided therefor.

The report of last year has a list of fifty-five people to whom certificates had been issued, up to June 6, 1904. It should be noted that in the text of that report, page 389 of the minutes, the number given is fifty-four, although the list that follows is fifty-five.

Since that report thirty-four certificates have been issued, according to the list accompanying this report. Of these, three have been given as a result of examinations, and thirty-one under the waiver clause. The applications granted under the waiver clause were all filed before July 1, 1904, which was the limit of the period within which application could be made under that clause.

As will be seen by the report of the Business Manager, the total expenditures, July 1, 1904, to June 1, 1905, were \$458.11, leaving a balance of \$1,735.23.

Sixteen applicants under the waiver clause were refused certificates. The case of one of these was reconsidered, on his petition, and the certificate recommended by the Board of Examiners.

Seven of the other rejected applicants had a rehearing and were again denied.

One man took the examination last November and failed to pass. The report of the examination held last May is not yet received.

Several differences of opinion between your committee and applicants have been called to your attention during the year. Complaints made against two holders of the C. P. A. certificates were duly submitted to your body and the complaints dismissed. One man insisted as a matter of right on receiving the printed papers of the examination questions before your committee was ready to issue them. One applicant threatened to appeal to the courts to compel us to issue his certificate, and one, through his attorneys, has demanded the right to take the examination, although in the judgment of your committee, he is not qualified therefor in accordance with the law. All of these cases have been duly submitted to your board, and either have been passed upon by you or are still under consideration.

According to the rules adopted by your body, the term of office of Mr. C. W. Knisely, one member of the Board of Examiners, expires on July 1, 1905. Mr. Knisely has acted as secretary of the board since its organization and is thoroughly familiar with the requirements of the law. He has worked hard in the discharge of his duties in this office and has in many ways proved himself a valuable friend to the University. Your committee thinks that it is only a fit recognition of his work that he be reappointed a member of the Board of Examiners for a term of three years. Accordingly we so recommend.

SIR—"The Act to regulate the profession of public accountants" provides: "That any citizen of the United States * * * being a graduate of a high school with a four year course, or having had an equivalent education, and who shall have received from the University of Illinois a certificate * * * shall be styled and known as a 'certified public accountant,'" etc. Sess. L. Ill., 1903, p. 281, Sec. 1.

"The University of Illinois shall determine the qualifications of persons applying for certificates under this Act," etc. Sec. 2, *ibid.*

The university has refused to admit to the examination persons who have neither graduated from a high school with a four-year course nor, in its judgment, had an equivalent education, independently of the technical training needed to pass the examination in "theory of accounts," "practical accounting," auditing" and "commercial law."

I am directed by the Board of Trustees to ask you whether or not the university has rightly interpreted the statute in so far as it relates to the determination of the qualifications of persons applying for certificates.

Also, whether or not the statute in question gives the university any such discretionary powers that it may lawfully, in the case of an applicant for examination, waive the requirement of a high school or equivalent course, admit him to the examination, and, if he pass, grant him the certificate?

DEAR SIR—Your letter of the 2d inst., in regard to "An Act to regulate the profession of Public Accountants," approved May 15, 1903, duly received.

You state that the University has refused to admit to examination persons who have neither graduated from a high school with a four-year course, nor, in its judgment, had an equivalent education, independently of the technical training needed to pass the examination in "Theory of Accounts," "Practical Accounting," "Auditing" and Commercial Law."

The Board of Trustees of the University has rightfully interpreted the statute in regard to the determination of the qualifications of persons applying for certificates.

Section 3 of said Act provides as follows:

"The University of Illinois may, in their discretion, under regulations provided by their rules, waive all or any part of the examination of any applicant possessing the qualifications mentioned in section 1, who shall have had five successive years' previous experience as a public accountant previous to the date of application, who shall apply in writing within one year after the passage of this Act, and who shall have been practicing in this State as a public accountant, on his own account, for a period of not less than one year next prior to the passage of this Act; also to any person who shall have been actively in practice as a public accountant for not less than five years next prior to the passage of this Act, outside of the State of Illinois, who shall have passed an examination equivalent, in the opinion of the University of Illinois, to the examination to be held under the provisions of this Act."

The qualifications of candidates for examination, in my opinion, are under said Act mandatory. The Act makes no exception as to the *qualifications* of such candidates. By section 3 above quoted, the University may waive all or any part of the examination of any applicant under certain conditions, but it specifically states that said applicant must possess the qualifications mentioned in section 1, which qualifications are that he must be a citizen of the United States, or must have declared his intention of becoming such citizen, must be twenty-one years of age, of good moral character, a graduate of a high school with a four-year course, or have had an equivalent education. The University has a wide discretion in determining what an equivalent education may be, but it can not waive the requirement of the law that such applicant must be a graduate of a high school with a four-year course of instruction, or an education equivalent thereto. Successful applicants are given a certificate, by which they are entitled to be known as "Certified Public Accountants," and the Legislature has seen fit to prescribe the qualifications of such persons to whom such certificates may be issued, and these qualifications can not be waived.

WOMAN'S DEPARTMENT.

3. It is necessary to make some provision for the coming year in order to take care of the work previously assigned to the Dean of Women. The women members of the Faculty have attempted during the past year to perform these various duties. While they have been thoroughly conscientious, and, everything considered, highly successful in carrying on this work, they earnestly request that some other arrangement be made by which this responsibility will not be added to the work necessarily connected with their positions. In response to this request it is proposed that there should be a division of the functions which have thus far been associated with the office of Dean of Women, a portion of these duties to be assigned to one person, a portion to another. The following recommendations are accordingly made:

(a) That the south wing of the Woman's building be known as the "Woman's hall," and that the charge of those rooms intended to provide social facilities for young women shall be placed in charge of the Head of the Woman's hall, whose function it shall be to organize, as far as may be, the social life of the women of the University and be as helpful in the way of advice and consultation, etc., as possible in these and similar matters, her particular duties to be defined by the President of the University, and that Mrs. Eunice Dean Daniels be appointed Head of the Women's hall for the academic year beginning July 1, 1905, at a salary of \$1,200.

(b) It is further recommended that Miss Martha J. Kyle be appointed Assistant Dean of Undergraduates for the year beginning Sept. 1, 1905, with the understanding that she perform the duties of this office in addition to her duties as instructor in the Department of English, and that she receive for the same the sum of \$250 in addition to her salary as instructor. The duties of this position are to be more accurately defined by the President of the University.

These recommendations were severally adopted.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR FILIPINO STUDENTS.

4. Application has been made from the gentlemen representing the War Department of the United States asking that free scholarships for the Summer Session be given to certain Filipino students, forty in number, more or less, whom the War Department desires to send to the University during the summer for instruction.

Voted that such students be accepted for the Summer Session without payment of tuition.

MILITARY AT INSTALLATION.

5. The Professor of Military Science and Tactics asks that the Trustees request the War Department to send an officer of high rank as its representative at the exercises to be held in October in connection with the installation of the President of the University, and that such representative inspect the University Regiment while present on that occasion.

It was voted to make such request.

6. The President recommended that the salary of Professor Stephen A. Forbes be fixed at the present sum; namely, \$3,750; and that the salary be assigned among the various funds as follows: Two thousand dollars to the State Entomologist's office; \$1,000 to the general University account, which may be further distributed; and \$750 to the State Laboratory of Natural History; it being understood that he is to give about one-fourth of his time to the duties connected with his University work and divide the rest of his time between the work of the State Entomologist's office and that of Director of the State Laboratory of Natural History.

Voted that said recommendation be approved.

7. The President presented a communication from the Misses Sarah and Alice Abbott in regard to certain furniture for the Woman's building.

Said recommendation was referred to the Committee on Furnishing the Woman's Building.

8. A communication from Dean Kinley was presented in regard to a proposed School of Accountancy.

It was referred to the Committee on Instruction of the Board of Trustees.

COURSE IN CERAMICS.

9. It was recommended that a course in Ceramics be constituted in the University, at a cost not to exceed \$5,000 per year, the amount appropriated by the Legislature at its last session for this purpose, and that the President of the University be authorized to submit to the Board the outline of a suitable curriculum and to nominate the necessary instructors in this department so that, if possible, work may begin in the coming autumn. It is further recommended that in the organization of such a course an Advisory Committee be constituted, to which the Illinois Clay Workers' Association and other similar organizations may be invited to elect members; and, further, that 102 free scholarships—one for each county—be granted in this course, to be assigned by the University on nomination of the City Workers' Association.

Voted that these recommendations be adopted.

10. The President announced that by virtue of the authority given him at a previous meeting of the Board he had appointed Mr. Henry J. Van den Berg as instructor in piano in the Music School of the University at a salary of \$1,200, beginning Sept. 1, 1905.

ADDITIONAL RIFLES AND BOND.

11. The President presented a letter from the Professor of Military Science and Tactics asking that a requisition be made upon the War Department for 160 additional rifles and equipments, and that the Board pass a resolution authorizing the proper authorities to furnish a bond for double the value of the property called for.

Voted that the proper authorities of the Board be authorized to furnish a bond to the War Department of the United States to the amount of \$5,114.88 for the purpose of obtaining from the War Department 160 additional rifles and equipments for the University regiment.

AUDITORIUM.

12. The President recommended that a commission be appointed to report to the Trustees of the University, at the earliest possible date, a suitable plan for an auditorium building, the cost not to exceed \$100,000, with recommendations as to the place where it shall be located on the campus; and that such commission consist of the President of the University, of the members of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, of the Board of Trustees, of Professors Ricker, White and Wells of the Department of Architecture of the University and Messrs. Clarence Howard Blackall and Lorado Taft of the Alumni of the University. And further recommended that Mr. Clarence Howard Blackall of Boston, Massachusetts, be selected as architect of the auditorium building, if satisfactory terms can be arranged with him.

Voted that the first part of the recommendation be approved, and that the second part, relating to the choice of an architect, be deferred for final action until the meeting of the Board on Monday, June 5.

HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS.

13. The President recommended that the Board create the following new positions in the University of Illinois, with salaries not to exceed \$3,500 per year:

(a) Head of the Department of Chemistry and Director of the Chemical Laboratory.

(b) Head of the Department of Modern Languages.

(c) Head of the Department of English.

(d) Head of the Department of Classics.

And that the President be requested to nominate men to fill these positions as soon as may be convenient.

The recommendations were adopted.

DUTIES OF VICE PRESIDENT.

14. The President recommended that he be authorized to delegate to the Vice President of the institution such duties now connected with that office as it may be found feasible to transfer.

Voted that such recommendation be approved.

15. The President recommended that the resignation of Dr. Thomas Jonathan Burrill as Dean of the Graduate School be accepted, to take effect when his successor may be selected and enter upon his duties.

Voted that the recommendation be approved.

Recommended that Professor E. J. Townsend be appointed Acting Dean of the College of Science until further notice.

Voted that the recommendation be approved.

ENGINEERING EXPERIMENT STATION.

17. The President recommended that the Engineering Experiment Station be organized as a separate department of the University; that Professor L. P. Breckenridge be made Director of the Station, and the heads of the other departments of the College of Engineering be constituted members of the staff of the Engineering Experiment Station, with such other members as may be appointed for that purpose; and that the President of the University be authorized to draw up a plan of work for the Station and submit to the Trustees a proposed budget of the same.

Voted to approve the recommendation.

18. The President recommended that the resignation of Professor N. C. Ricker as Dean of the College of Engineering be accepted, to take effect at such time as his successor may be appointed and enter upon his duties.

Voted that the recommendation be approved.

SCHOOL OF EDUCATION.

19. The President recommended that Professor E. G. Dexter be appointed Director of the School of Education for the year 1905-6; that Mr. Frank Hamsher be appointed Assistant Professor of Education in the School of Education for the year 1905-6; that a second assistant professorship in Education be established at a salary not to exceed \$1,500 per annum, and that the President be authorized to nominate a man for such a position at his earliest convenience.

That the sum of \$1,000 be appropriated for special lectures in the School of Education for the year 1905-6.

That the sum of \$1,000 be appropriated for incidental expenses in the School of Education for the year 1905-6.

Voted that these recommendations be approved.

HONORARY DEGREES.

20. The President presented a recommendation from the Council of Administration and the Senate of the University that the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws be conferred upon Professor Stephen A. Forbes of the University, and upon Honorable George B. Cortelyou, Postmaster General of the United States.

It was voted to confer at commencement the degree of LL.D. upon George Bruce Cortelyou, LL.D. and upon Stephen Alfred Forbes, Ph.D.

The Secretary stated that the records of the Board contained nothing with regard to the conferring of honorary degrees in 1903 and 1904, and asked leave, which was given, to insert in the minutes of this meeting the following:

At commencement in 1903, upon recommendation of the Faculty and by authority given by the Board of Trustees, honorary degrees were conferred as follows:

Upon Honorable Shelby M. Cullom, Honorable J. G. Cannon, Honorable James R. Mann and Herbert Putnam, the degree of Doctor of Laws; upon Ira O. Baker, Samuel W. Stratton, Colonel Richard P. Morgan and John A. Ockerson, the degree of Doctor of Engineering; upon Thomas M. Hunt, the degree of Doctor of Agriculture; upon John E. Wright and Mary Tracy Earle, the degree of Master of Arts.

At commencement in 1904, upon the same recommendation and authority, the degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred upon Honorable W. J. Bailey, Honorable Frank White, Honorable S. N. D. North, John W. Cook and Dr. W. E. Quine; upon W. F. N. Goss and Lincoln Bush, the degree of Doctor of Engineering; upon William A. Henry, the degree of Doctor of Agriculture.

DUPLICATE DEED.

The Secretary stated that in an assignment made of the University's contract No. 201, the residence of the assignee was given as Rockford, Floyd county, Iowa; when it should have been Stitzer, Grant county, Wisconsin; that final payment having been made on the contract, he made out a deed following the assignment of the contract in the matter of residence of the grantee; that the deed was duly executed and forwarded to a bank for delivery; and that a request had been made to have the deed changed, or a new deed made, giving the correct residence of the grantee. The Secretary further stated that he had declined to do this, inasmuch as he did not consider he had any authority to make a deed in any other form without being first so directed by the Board of Trustees.

It was ordered that a second deed should be made giving the correct resident of the grantee, and stating that it was the same person named in the previous deed as a resident of Rockford, Floyd county, Iowa.

INSECTARY.

The following report with regard to the building of an Insectary was adopted:

URBANA, May 16, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees:

Your Committees on Buildings and Grounds and on Agriculture, to which was referred the question of building an insectary for Professor Forbes, the State Entomologist, desire to report that at a meeting held May 16, 1905, the committees considered the matter with Professor Forbes and decided to recommend the building of a two-story insectary and offices for the State Entomologists. The State Entomologist has only \$3,000 appropriated for this purpose, and the two-story building would cost near \$5,000.

It was therefore decided that since the offices of the State Entomologist, which are now in the Agricultural building, would be released for the uses of the Agricultural Department, that the additional funds not to exceed \$2,000 for putting up this building should be taken from the Agricultural College funds.

The committees examined the grounds and decided to locate the building near the greenhouses of the Agricultural Department, the exact location to be determined at a later time.

The committees therefore ask that the above recommendations be approved.

Meeting of June 5, 1905.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Monday, June 5, 1905.

The members present were Messrs. Abbott, Bayliss, Bullard, Davison, Kerrick, McKinley, McLean and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Busey, and Mrs. Evans; absent Governor Deneen and Mrs. Barber. President James was present.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the Board meetings of March 14, 1905, and April 27, 1905, and they were approved as presented.

ELECTION OF TREASURER.

The Finance Committee presented the following report:

CHICAGO, June 2, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees:

In the matter of H. A. Haugan, candidate for the position of Treasurer of the University of Illinois, the Finance Committee, which was instructed to consider his application, begs leave to submit the following report:

We called at the State Bank of Chicago, of which Mr. Haugan is president, but on learning he was absent, had an interview with Mr. Lindgren, cashier, and in the course of the conversation we stated in general the conditions which we would expect the treasurer to comply with, viz.: a \$1,000,000 bond and a division of the deposits; a portion, at least, being kept in some other bank than his own, preferably the First National Bank. He, however, suggested the Corn Exchange Bank, in which case Mr. C. L. Hutchinson would act as one of the bondsmen. He also gave us a copy of a book which contains Mr. Haugan's biography, which we submit herewith.

Upon leaving the State Bank we proceeded to the Western Trust and Savings Bank and asked the cashier, Mr. J. J. Abbott what his opinion of Mr. Haugan was as to his ability, integrity and general qualifications for the position of Treasurer of the University. Mr. Abbott replied, in substance, that while there were greater bankers in the city than Mr. Haugan, there was no one qualified morally, financially or with sound business judgment to better serve the University as Treasurer than the man we had under consideration.

We also called at the bank of the Merchants Loan and Trust Company, and in an interview with Mr. Orchard asked him the same questions we had Mr. Abbott of the Western Trust and Savings Bank, and his reply was almost an exact confirmation of Mr. Abbott's.

Mr. H. A. Haugan is president of the State Bank of Chicago, located in the Chamber of Commerce building, where it occupies the greater part of the first floor, and is apparently doing a thriving business. A statement of the condition of this bank, issued May 31, 1905, as made to the State Auditor, is attached hereto.

We requested Mr. Lindgren to have Mr. Haugan at the University at the time of the Trustees' meeting, and Mr. Lindgren said he thought this could be arranged.

In conclusion, we will state that your committee is of the opinion that the funds of the University would be in safe hands if entrusted to Mr. H. A. Haugan, and we recommend that he be elected to the office of Treasurer of the University of Illinois, subject to his furnishing a satisfactory bond.

It was voted that the Committee on Finance, together with Mr. McKinley, should meet Mr. Haugan and confer with him with regard to his election.

After a brief conference the committee returned with Mr. Haugan and reported that satisfactory arrangements with regard to details had been made with Mr. Haugan, who was, thereupon, on motion of Mrs. Alexander, unanimously elected Treasurer for the unexpired term ending March, 1907.

The following resolutions were adopted:

AUTHORITY TO ISSUE REQUISITIONS.

Resolved, That the President and Secretary be directed to draw upon the Auditor of Public Accounts such requisitions as the law requires, in order that he may issue to the Treasurer of the University his warrants upon the said Treasurer for the sums of money appropriated by the Legislature to the University of Illinois or to any of its departments.

AUTHORITY TO RECEIVE MONEYS.

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is hereby authorized to receive and receipt for all moneys and to endorse all orders, drafts and checks due and payable to the said Board of Trustees, or to the said University of Illinois, and especially all drafts drawn by the Treasurer of the United States, payable to the said Board of Trustees or to the said University of Illinois, on account of the Agricultural Experiment Station of the said University.

ELECTION OF ARCHITECT.

The election of an architect for the auditorium which had been postponed to this time from the meeting of June 2nd was brought up and Mr. Clarence H. Blackall was elected architect and the Committee on Buildings and Grounds was instructed to make definite arrangements with him for his services and to report to the Board.

Mr. Bayliss offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Resolved, That the commission to recommend to the Board of Trustees the plan for and a proposed site for a new auditorium be advised that in the opinion of the Board of Trustees it is desirable that the seating capacity of the said auditorium be as great as possible, consistent with suitable architectural effect and approximately perfect acoustics.

RESIGNATION OF PROFESSOR SHATTUCK.

President James presented the resignation of Professor Samuel W. Shattuck as head of the department of mathematics, and the resignation was accepted.

Messrs. Bayliss and Abbott and Mrs. Busey were appointed a committee to present to the Board an appreciation of the services of Deans Burrill and Ricker and of Professor Shattuck. Later during the session the committee presented the following, which was adopted.

WHEREAS, Professor Thomas J. Burrill, after ten years' service as Dean of the Graduate School; Professor Nathan C. Ricker, after twenty-seven years' service as Dean of the College of Engineering; and Professor Samuel W. Shattuck, after service as head of the Department of Mathematics since September, 1868, have each asked to be relieved from further service in the capacities named;

Resolved, That in ordering that each of these requests be granted, the Board of Trustees desires to record its very high appreciation of the value of their work to the University and to the State of Illinois. It would be difficult to name three members of the faculties of the University whose combined services have counted for more in the development of the greatest of the State educational institutions, and impossible to name an equal number of individual members of the teaching body who have wrought with greater fidelity, skill or singleness of purpose; and it is hereby ordered that the Secretary of this Board shall furnish to Deans Burrill and Ricker and to Professor Shattuck a certified copy of this expression.

INSTALLATION CEREMONIES.

A report on plans for the installation of President James and an estimate of expenses therefor was presented by Dean Kinley, chairman of the committee in charge of arrangements.

The report was considered at length and was then made a special order for further consideration the first thing at the afternoon session.

A recess was then taken until 4:00 o'clock p. m.

Afternoon Session, June 5, 1905.

When the Board met after the recess the same members were present as in the morning.

INSTALLATION CEREMONIES.

The plan for installation ceremonies as proposed by Dr. Kinley consisted of exercises beginning Sunday, October 15th, and continuing until Friday, October 20th, and the estimate of expenses was \$5,650 in addition to the \$600 previously appropriated.

After discussion it was voted, on motion of Mr. Bayliss, that \$4,000 be appropriated for expenses and that the ceremonies be continued during three days, October 17th, 18th and 19th.

Mr. Abbott moved to reconsider in order that the question of time might be further considered.

Upon explanation by Dr. Kinley as to the character of the ceremonies on the several days, it was voted to amend by making the time therefor the same as proposed by the committee—from Sunday, October 15th, to Friday, October 20th, inclusive—and the motion as amended was adopted.

OFFICE OF THE BUSINESS MANAGER.

The question of adjustment in the office of the Business Manager made necessary by the resignation of Professor Shattuck, was referred to the President and the Committee on Finance, with instructions to report at the adjourned session, June 23d.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

Upon recommendation of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, it was voted to install a fire alarm system offered by the Western Electric Company as follows:

HEATING PLANT.

The following letter was received from Professor Breckenridge:

URBANA, ILLINOIS, June 1, 1905.

Hon. S. A. Bullard, President Board of Trustees:

MY DEAR SIR—It was exceedingly unfortunate that we failed to get the appropriation of \$35,000 for extending the heating plant. There are some things which it seems to me will have to be done. I do not see how we can

get along without expending perhaps \$12,000 on new equipment and changes. Some things may be left until next summer, but some should be done this summer. I estimate that the cost of the work which should be done this summer will be about as follows:

Purchase and installation of new water-tube boiler of about 250 H. P. to replace old fire-tube boiler of 120 H. P.	\$5,000 00
Extension of coal and ash handling machinery and coal storage bins in front of the New Stirling boilers.....	2,000 00
New supplies: Feed pump, safety valves, blow-off valves, exhaust head, oil extractor, small tools.....	1,000 00
Total.....	\$8,000 00

I recommend that authority be granted to purchase and install the above apparatus. Further expenditures which are absolutely necessary can be determined when it is known at what date the new auditorium will be finished and ready for heating.

When the Board met pursuant to adjournment the members present were Messrs. Abbott, Bayliss, Bullard, Davison, Kerrick, McKinley, McLean and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Busey and Mrs. Evans; absent, Governor Deneen and Mr. Barber. President James was present.

AUDITORIUM BUILDING.

President James presented the report of the commission on the Auditorium Building.

URBANA, ILLINOIS, June 8, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois:

The commission which you appointed on recommendation by President James at your meeting of June 2, 1905, "to consider and report to the Board of Trustees a suitable plan for an Auditorium building, costing not to exceed \$100,000, with recommendations as to place where it shall be located on the campus," held two sessions; one on Monday, June 5, and one on Tuesday, June 6.

The following members of the commission were present at both sessions: Messrs. Abbott, McLean and Mrs. Evans of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds; President James and Mr. Blackall and Professors Ricker, White and Wells. Messrs. Bullard and McKinley of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds were present at the first session, and Mr. Lorado Taft was not present at either session.

The commission organized by choosing President James chairman and W. L. Pillsbury secretary.

Suggestions were presented by Mr. Blackall as follows:

1. That the building be located north of the crest of the rear campus between the line of Burrill avenue and the front line of the Agricultural building.

2. That the building be planned to seat 2,500 in addition to the accommodation of the stage.

3. That the stage be of such dimensions as to accommodate a chorus of 300 and an orchestra of fifty, with ample dressing rooms under the stage, ante-rooms, etc.

4. That provision be studied in the plan for two wings to receive other departments.

5. That the approaches and surroundings be planned with distinct reference to the general plan of the University grounds, and that such general plan be made at once, for which purpose it is recommended that \$300 be appropriated, to be expended from the general fund under the direction of the architect.

6. That the portion of the whole scheme to be built now include only the Auditorium proper, without the stage, without ante-rooms or wings, and with final entrances and stairs only in the front, and that the exterior be of such design that the portion now built appear simply as a hall complete in itself on all sides.

7. That the entire appropriation of \$100,000 be devoted to (6), and that the furniture thereof consist of seats or settees such as are now used in seating the Armory, and of the strictly necessary heating, ventilating and electric equipment, a simple platform being built out into the Auditorium to serve as a stage.

8. That the interior of (6) be finished very simply, with plaster walls and with all the finish of such a nature as would permanently accord with the larger scheme, and that ample opportunity be given for decorations to be added in the future.

9. That the construction be made as nearly fire proof as possible, within the limits of the appropriation, but without unduly sacrificing architectural effects.

10. That the exterior be constructed of brick and stone.

These were, with the exception of the first, approved by the members of the commission who were present at the second session.

Upon the first, the vote showed four in favor, one opposed, Mr. Blackall and President James not voting.

Mr. Abbott, who voted "no," explained that before he would be willing to vote in favor of the proposed site he wished to have more information on two points: (1) Whether it would be wise, in view of the future development of the University, to select this as the site of the Auditorium; and (2) whether transportation facilities are likely to be such as to make it a desirable site.

W. L. PILLSBURY, *Secretary.*

The report was received and ordered printed.

Mr. Bayliss moved that paragraph 2 be changed by inserting 3,000 instead of 2,500.

Mr. Abbott moved to amend by instructing the architect and the commission to provide for as many seats as practicable.

Mr. Bayliss moved to add "provided the number be not less than 3,000 without counting the stage and orchestra."

The motion and amendments were laid on the table.

On motion of Dr. Davison it was voted to take up the items in the order of the report.

On motion of Mr. Abbott the Board went into committee of the whole to consider the report of the commission.

Afternoon Session.

When the Board came together at 2:00 o'clock p. m. after recess, the committee arose, reported progress, and asked to be allowed to sit and consider further the question before it at some future time.

The report was received and the request of the committee allowed.

PAPERS SUBMITTED BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

1. That the budget of the Medical College, as presented at the last meeting, be accepted and approved, with the condition that further expenditure may be required of the college authorities in such departments as may stand in need of improvement, and to enable such expenditure to be made when needed, the surplus indicated in the budget shall not be divided between the University and the College of Physicians and Surgeons until further notice and express permission of the Board to that effect.

Approved.

2. That the budget of the School of Pharmacy for the coming year, as herewith presented, be approved, and that the same conditions of employment be tendered to the Faculty for the academic year 1905-6 as for the year 1904-5.

SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

CHICAGO, June 17, 1905.

President Edmund J. James, University of Illinois:

DEAR SIR—I enclose herewith several statements containing the information that you asked me to furnish. In order to make these more intelligible I have begun with a statement for the last year of the school in the old building on State street. Financially, this was the best year the school has had since joining the University, there being a surplus at the end of the year amounting to about \$2,500. This good showing was due in part to a large attendance, 186 students being enrolled, and in part to the advantageous arrangement with the Dearborn Medical College, which netted us about \$1,200, after allowing for the increase in expenses caused by their tenancy. (Statement A.)

We had realized, however, that neither the building nor location on State street were desirable, and sharing the quarters with the Dearborn College made the inadequacy still more apparent. Then, too, the landlord refused to give a lease for more than a year at a time, except for a considerably increased rental. So, when the opportunity for getting the present quarters came, we were strongly in favor of making the move.

At the time when it was decided to move, it was not expected that the school would be able to meet the expense of moving and equipping the new quarters from its current income, so the Trustees granted two appropriations as a loan, to be repaid from the income or property of the school—one of \$2,000 and one of \$3,000 for these purposes. It was expected that with this aid the income of the school would meet all other expenses, including salaries. An arrangement was made with the Dearborn Medical College whereby Dr. Baldwin agreed to pay a part of the expense of moving and a half of the rent, janitors' and engineers' wages, heating and lighting bills and repairs to the building itself and of such rooms as are used by both schools. This was done, and accounts for the comparatively large amount received from this source. Unfortunately the attendance at our school fell off about a fifth, with a corresponding shrinkage in fees, and this prevented us from paying the salaries in full. (B.)

Our expenses for the present fiscal year will be considerably less than last year (Statement C), but it will require a larger attendance than we had this last year to meet all expenses and pay salaries in full. It will require at least a 10 per cent increase. I think we can reasonably expect to have this or a greater increase in attendance, and I look for a prosperous year.

Of course, my statements are only intended to be correct approximately regarding the different items of expenditure, outside of rent, salaries, etc.

Edmund J. James, LL.D., President of the University of Illinois:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to submit for your consideration and transmission to the Board of Trustees the following report of the conditions of the College of Agriculture and the Agricultural Experiment Station, together with the recommendations for the ensuing year.

GROWTH OF THE COLLEGE AND STATION.

The rapid growth of the agricultural interests of the University in recent years is unprecedented in educational history. Six years ago we had but twenty students and six instructors; the work of investigation was limited to the government appropriation of \$15,000, and we were housed wherever room could be found, generally in basements and attics.

We have more instructors now than we had students then, for the college has grown to number 406 students, with twenty-five teachers, offering eighty-four distinct courses of technical instruction. We now have four permanent buildings, a fund for college and building purposes amounting to \$90,000 per year and one for research amounting to \$110,000 annually. Over forty people of college training are devoting their entire time to technical agriculture, either in the College or Station, or both. These are the largest numbers in men and money involved in this work at any single point in the world.

WHY WE HAVE SUCCEEDED.

Our complete collapse under the responsibility and strain of this sudden growth has been almost universally predicted in other states, even by our best friends. That this has not occurred is due to the following reasons:

1. The growth was the spontaneous and natural result of a determination of the farmers of the State to make this a leading college of agriculture and to promote the highest possible development of agricultural practice through scientific investigations by the Experiment Station.

2. Special funds were appropriated for special purposes, and back of each was an organized group of men interested both in the University and in that particular line of agriculture.

3. We organized, not with many departments, but with few; each with its own funds and well defined lines of work, and each headed by a man of exceptional training, of high personal quality and of tireless energy.

4. Both instruction and research have aimed not to revel in scientific speculation nor to advance and uphold any special theories; but, on the contrary, the single purpose has been to discover and promote the scientific facts bearing upon the best and most permanent agricultural practice in this particular State.

5. We have succeeded, last of all, because we have been able to render substantial service to the agriculture of the State and because our students succeed when they go out. So pronounced has the feeling of confidence in the University become that it is now regarded as the natural agent of the State for the discovery of new facts bearing upon agricultural development.

WHAT HAS BEEN ACCOMPLISHED.

Upon the request of the Farmers' Institute a system of scholarships was devised and by our initiative a method of admission was instituted altogether unique. That both worked well is shown by the fact that the "special students," on the whole, do good work; that we have gathered together the largest body of students actually studying agriculture throughout the year of any similar institution, and that we are graduating a percentage of our total enrollment very close to that of the University in general.

Our equipment for teaching is, upon the whole, excellent. The men are specialists and the illustrative and laboratory materials are well chosen. The subject is new and neither matter nor methods are well established. Perhaps better teaching could be done, from the pedagogic standpoint, were we to confine our work to more general lines wherein the matter is supposed to be known and the facts well established. But this is not progress in a new subject and we have chosen to combine instruction with investigation in the hands of specialists, expecting each to discover new material and then to hammer it into pedagogic form as rapidly as possible. In this way we shall increase our stock of information as we improve our methods, and for any lack of pedagogic perfection the student must be recompensed by that freshness and mental alertness that always attend explorations into new and hitherto undeveloped territory. In this way we pay the penalty of the pioneer, but we also reap the benefits.

Space forbids even a bare enumeration of the lines of research finished and in progress, and with which everybody is now more or less familiar. The most distinctive work of the Experiment Station has been along the following lines, in every one of which we have been successful:

1. Examination of the various typical soils of the State to discover their natural qualities, whether superior or defective.

2. Working out a system of permanent and profitable agriculture for each.

3. Making a soil survey of every county of the State in order to locate boundaries of typical soils and to discover and bring out the character and treatment of local and minor types. Nineteen counties will be finished by the end of the present year, and ultimately all will be mapped in, colors showing soil differences.

4. Breeding corn for oil and protein. This was the first attempt ever made to change the natural chemical composition of seeds. Corn has now been bred richer in nitrogen than is that great naturally nitrogenous grain, wheat.

5. Identification, description and illustration of the forty-eight market classes and grades of cattle, a classification now used in the daily live stock market reports.

6. Determination by actual test of the comparative feeding value of the various grades of steers in this classification.

7. Discovery of the cause of bitter rot in apples, a disease that destroyed a million dollars' worth of fruit in four counties of Illinois in a single year.

8. Determination of the comparative value of insulating materials and exhaustive experimentation upon the cold storage of apples.

9. Control of insect and fungous orchard pests by spraying with arsenical poisons.

10. Exhaustive investigation of the relative efficiency of dairy cows, showing that some individuals are able to make three times as much as others from the same amount of the same kind of feed.

11. Working out methods for the production and handling of sanitary milk and stimulating a movement for better dairy methods generally.

These bulletins aggregate 334 pages and have been issued in editions of 35,000 each. The circulars running to 120 pages, are issued in smaller editions and circulated only within the State.

BUILDINGS.

By the original understanding we are to provide at least one permanent building a year out of section 1 (\$50,000) of the "Association Bill," until the agricultural interests are fully and comfortably housed. Three buildings have been erected out of the last biennial appropriation and the time has now come for deciding what will next serve the agricultural interests of the University to the best advantage.

DIRECTOR'S RESIDENCE.

In this connection existing circumstances call for a word concerning the subject of an official residence representing agricultural interests.

It will be remembered that at one time I offered to donate an especially valuable site for the purpose, if the University would, as most similar institutions have done, erect a suitable residence for the Director of the Experiment Station and maintain it rent free in consideration of the natural demands upon a position so intimately connected with large masses of people. The proposition was not accepted on the ground that no funds had been especially appropriated for this purpose. Considerable disappointment at the outcome has been expressed by many leading farmers and this is the occasion for alluding to the matter again. The history and facts of the case are as follows:

The original policy of the University in this regard was the same as that of other institutions; but it was changed a number of years ago when rent was charged for the occupancy of the farm house. I lived in this house almost ten years. However suitable it may once have been, it would certainly not be regarded as representative of Illinois' agriculture today. It was no longer even comfortable and, paying rent, I felt free to move, and therefore decided to build a home containing some of the modern comforts of life.

After making this decision and while looking about for a suitable site the full significance of a permanent change in policy was forced upon me, and I came to realize what it would mean if the abode of the executive head of the agricultural interests here should be no longer identified with the University and if successive incumbents felt free to live at whatever point in either town might be most convenient or economical to them. Ours had become clearly the leading institution of its kind and I was loth to see this permanent handicap come upon us, placing us at decided disadvantage as compared with similar leading institutions whose object it is to develop and elevate agriculture.

It was then that I made the proposition to donate the site upon which I have since built. Upon its rejection I went forward with my building operations. The site was a valuable one, worthy of a good building, and with Professor White as architect I have built a comfortable home.

Since this has been done there has been a widespread expression of regret that the University has changed its policy and is apparently pursuing a different one from that of similar institutions elsewhere. Of course this house was not built and I cannot afford to maintain it as an official residence. If I were wealthy and could afford to do so I would be glad to open it freely to the farmers of Illinois and of other states and countries who come here on official or semi-official business. But the salary paid here is lower than at any other institution of this rank, and the simple truth is that I can not under existing conditions meet obligations of this sort as they should be met and as they are met at many other institutions of this character.

Farmers have not been slow to express their disappointment at the evident change of policy and to indicate their desires upon the general question, and I have been asked if I would now sell this property to be used for this purpose.

I have answered that I would do so if it were desired; that it was built by a University architect, and that I would sell it for what it cost, if it could be done while it is new and its value clearly evident, and further that I would maintain it as such residences are usually maintained; in short, that I would do everything for the University and for Illinois' agriculture that is financially possible.

In connection with the discussion of section 1, of the Association Bill, from which the funds for such a purpose would naturally come, the general question of building or buying such a residence was freely discussed both before the House and the Senate appropriations committees, where it met with only favorable comment, the chairman of the latter committee expressing his special interest in the matter.

After speaking historically at so great a length I feel like saying on my own account, and quite independent of personal considerations, that I feel fully convinced such a move should be made and that for the best interests of agriculture and the University a residence suitable for this purpose should be either bought or built, whichever is considered most advantageous to the University.

I have alluded to this subject at considerable length (though it is naturally one of personal embarrassment) because I believe it is far-reaching in its consequences and because it is evidently very much in the minds of those farmers who have been chiefly instrumental in securing the funds with which to place this college and station in a leading position.

As a guide to action, now that the matter is up, I give the following facts regarding some of our leading institutions; all of which has a direct bearing not only upon this matter, but also upon recommendations made elsewhere as to salaries of leading positions in college and station:

WISCONSIN—W. A. Henry, Dean and Director. Salary, \$4,000 and use of a \$10,000 residence, rent free. This house was built some ten years ago when building was relatively inexpensive.

MINNESOTA—Wm. M. Liggett, Dean and Director. Salary \$4,000 and privilege of a \$12,000 residence, rent free.

NEW YORK (ITHACA)—L. H. Bailey, Dean and Director. Initial salary, \$4,500, no residence and no responsibilities for entertainment.

NEW YORK (GENEVA)—W. H. Jordan, Director (no college connection). Salary, \$4,000 and a \$16,000 residence, rent free.

PENNSYLVANIA—H. P. Armsby, Dean and Director. Salary \$3,900 and residence on the campus, rent free.

VIRGINIA—A. M. Soule, Dean and Director. \$3,500 initial salary and a \$10,000 residence heated and lighted free of charge. Salary to be increased \$100 a year for five years.

A number of other states might be added, but I have mentioned those most clearly in our class. This list serves to show two things—first, that it is the custom in the leading institutions to provide an official residence, costing from \$10,000 to \$16,000, rent free; and, second, that there is a practical uniformity in a salary of \$4,000.

This will afford data on which to base action. The farmers say that they want a residence of this kind and they have secured funds for the purpose. Its service to agriculture is apparent and will be increasingly so with passing time. The Legislature approves the expenditure and the Advisory Committee, identified with this section, asks that it be made, as is shown by their records herewith transmitted. I have made full presentation of the facts in the case and it remains for the Trustees to determine what the final policy is to be.

FARM MECHANIS BUILDING.

It is the opinion of those best acquainted with the conditions that the next building erected in the series should be one to provide additional room for farm mechanics and to relieve the congested condition that is beginning to be felt in the Agricultural Building. This building should cost approximately \$25,000 and every effort should be made to have it ready for occupancy a year from next September.

The funds now available will provide these two buildings; they would not provide the two next in the series, which should cost \$25,000 each. For personal as well as other reasons I hope that early action may be taken on both recommendations.

SALARY RECOMMENDATIONS.

This is the time for any substantial alteration in salaries of leading positions, which are commonly not changed during the biennial period. In view of all the considerations involved I beg to make the following recommendations, classified according to title and responsibilities:

These recommendations are well within good precedent and are made deliberately with full knowledge of the facts involved both here and elsewhere.

* These men are absolutely responsible for all plans devised and work done in their respective lines in both college and station. The amounts in parentheses are the funds for which they are directly accountable.

I have served the University a little over ten years and have seen the development of this college and station from the smallest proportions until it has come to be by far the foremost institution of the kind in the world. This is now true, whether we regard the number of instructors, the range of subjects taught, the value of the equipment, the size of the student body, the annual expenditure of funds, the amount of research work in actual progress, the number of investigators continually employed, the character and difficulty of the problems under investigation, or the influence of their correct solution upon the business interests of our constituency.

During this development the difficulties and the responsibilities of administration have of course increased enormously, and the natural demands upon energy and resources have enlarged out of all proportion to conditions a few years back and until they are second to no other in this country or abroad. The bulk of this burden rests upon these four men, who, by the way, have been in no small sense the instruments of this unprecedented development.

I believe that all this gives me the right to say that I fail to understand why the emoluments of leading positions here should longer remain inferior to those of corresponding positions in any other institution of similar character, particularly when it is remembered that *any one of our departments taken alone is larger than the average experiment station taken as a whole, and that there are but two stations in the United States that taken as a whole, will equal our department of agronomy alone whether we consider the funds involved, the nature of the work, or the number of men employed.* (\$51,000, twenty-one men of college grade, three clerks, a varying force of common laborers here and the caretakers of the experimental fields in twenty-five different places in the State.)

I have accordingly recommended Dr. Hopkins for a total salary of \$4,000. The truth is that his responsibilities as head of his department and his capacity for business are fully equal to those of any dean and director in the list quoted above, and his training is superior to that of any one of them. Not only that, Professor Hunt gets this salary at Cornell as Professor of Agronomy alone with only nominal duties in connection with experiment station work. (While the duties of the heads of the other departments are not so heavy as those of Dr. Hopkins in respect to amounts of money involved they are the same in character and equally difficult; indeed in some instances excessively so.)

It is from men who can carry responsibilities of this sort that directors are made, and President Wheeler, who is now looking for a director, told me in my office that he would not hesitate to pay \$5,000 or even \$6,000 for a man fitted for the place at his institution, whose demands do not compare at all equally with ours. I believe our policy should be to pay our *leading men what they are worth while they are settled with us, not waiting until they are disturbed by offers from elsewhere.* The stability of research work demands it. Nobody but the heads of departments long in service can safely interpret and make the most of data that are accumulated under our heavy expenditures. A change here means a frightful loss in time and money even if successors are successful.

Moreover these positions are not to be compared with those involving college duties only. Responsibility for class room work is by no means so difficult, so hazardous, or so wearing as responsibility for the conduct of investigations affecting large business interests both public and private; and experience shows that few men are fitted by nature and training to do the work, or are able to endure its wear and tear.

Again, this work is continuous. For these men there is no "summer vacation" and if a few days are taken for rest, which in practice is seldom done, there is no relief from responsibilities which no one else can carry. It is not too much to say that responsibilities are more than doubled and the length of service increased from twenty to twenty-five per cent, by reason of

connection with both College and Station. These four men occupy positions of extreme difficulty and great responsibility, and their service is practically continuous.

Finally, we must have men for these positions whose financial and business instincts are strong, else our experiments will not be planned and conducted along useful lines. Only maximum salaries will retain this class of men in our service for any considerable time. The disaster of frequent change is evident and leading farmers are outspoken in favor of better salaries for the heads of important departments.

It is therefore with full realization of all the conditions involved that I make these recommendations concerning our four leading positions, fully believing that the Trustees will no longer maintain a schedule of salaries inferior to those of any other institution, particularly as we now occupy clearly the leading place among them.

Because of our rank among the colleges and stations of the country the salaries of young men just beginning may well be comparatively low. We are starting graduates at \$50 a month, and they are glad of the opportunity to become identified with prominent lines of work in progress here and that upon almost any terms. It is graduate work to them, and we can fill these minor positions at low figures.

To illustrate this latter point I insert a list of all employes above the grade of common laborers and not holding Trustee appointment. Names starred are college graduates:

I think we are justified in this policy; indeed I believe the tendency is to pay young and inexperienced men carrying little or no responsibility a far greater recompense for services actually rendered than we are willing to pay to those really carrying the burden. An increase of a few leading positions to comparatively high figures insuring ability and stability is not therefore necessarily a question of expending more money. It is rather a question of *distribution of funds* between those who do and those who do not carry heavy responsibilities.

HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS NOT CONNECTED WITH EXPERIMENT STATION.

DR. D. McINTOSH, as Professor of Veterinary Science, \$2,100.

Dr. McIntosh has been a faithful teacher. He came many years ago at \$1,800. Though the cost of living has increased enormously and though his duties have been more than doubled he has never had an increase of salary. It ought to have come long ago. I hope the recommendation may be looked upon with favor.

PROFESSOR ISABEL BEVIER, as Professor of Household Science, \$2,100.

Miss Bevier has shown rare tact and organizing ability. Moreover she spends money freely in keeping herself abreast of developments in her line of work. I believe the time has come when she should have this salary.

OTHER EMPLOYEES.

I recommend the following changes in titles and salaries, payment to be made in twelve installments and changes to take effect Sept. 1, except otherwise noted:

AGRONOMY—

That Mr. L. H. Smith be given the title of Assistant Professor of Plant Breeding on the college side at \$300, and advanced to the corresponding title, Assistant Chief, on the station side without change of salary (\$1,500), making a total of \$1,800, all to take place upon his return from Germany, which will be in March or April, and by which time he expects to have earned the doctor's degree.

That the salary of Assistant Professor J. G. Mosier, in Soil Physics, (\$600) be unchanged, but that as Assistant Chief on the station side it be increased from \$900 to \$1,200; total \$1,800.

That the salary of Mr. J. H. Pettit, as instructor in Soil Fertility (\$400) be unchanged, but that as First Assistant on the station side it be increased from \$1,000 to \$1,200; total \$1,600.

That the salary of Mr. A. N. Hume, as Instructor in Crop Production, (\$600) be unchanged, but that as First Assistant on the station side it be increased from \$600 to \$800; total \$1,400.

That the salary of Mr. F. R. Crane, as Instructor in Farm Mechanics, be increased from \$1,200 to \$1,400, and paid in ten installments.

That Mr. E. M. East be reappointed First Assistant in Plant Breeding without change of salary. His present position is largely due to Mr. Smith's absence and no advance is necessary.

That Mr. Clifford Willis be given the position of Instructor in Soil Physics on the college side at \$300 and that on the station side his title be First Assistant at \$900; total \$1,200, an increase of \$200.

That Mr. W. F. Pate be reappointed Assistant in Chemistry in the station without change of salary.

That Mr. J. E. Readheimer be reappointed Superintendent of Soil Experiment Fields without change of salary.

That Mr. Robert Clinton Lloyd be appointed Superintendent of Soil Survey at a salary of \$1,000. Mr. Lloyd graduated from the University in 1903, and has had three seasons' experience in the field, besides much special work during his course.

That Mr. Orlo Dorr Center be appointed Assistant in Crop Production in the college at \$300 and Assistant in Crop Production in the station at \$700. Mr. Center graduates this year, but he is a mature man who for four years has had charge of our field affairs at the University.

That Mr. H. H. Love be reappointed Assistant in Chemistry in the station and that his salary be increased from \$600 to \$720.

That Mr. Andrew Ystgard be reappointed Assistant in Chemistry and that his salary be increased from \$720 to \$840.

That Mr. Clyde Everet Leighty be appointed Assistant in Chemistry at the usual initial salary of \$600. Mr. Leighty is a graduate of Illinois Wesleyan University, has been temporarily employed on trial and has proved himself a good analytical chemist for the special work required.

That Miss Clara Louise McClain be appointed Office Assistant in Agronomy for the station at a salary of \$720.

ANIMAL HUSBANDRY—

That Mr. L. D. Hall be reappointed Instructor in Animal Husbandry in the college at \$800, and First Assistant in Animal Husbandry in the station at \$800, an increase of \$200.

That Mr. William Dietrich be reappointed Instructor in Swine Husbandry in the college at \$700 and First Assistant in Swine Husbandry in the station at \$700, an increase of \$200.

That Mr. R. C. Obrecht be reappointed Instructor in Horses in the college at \$900 and First Assistant in Horses in the station at \$500, an increase of \$200.

That Mr. E. S. Good be reappointed Instructor in Animal Husbandry at \$500 and Assistant in Animal Husbandry at \$900, an increase of \$200.

DAIRY HUSBANDRY—

That Mr. Carl Emil Lee be appointed Instructor in Dairy Manufactures at \$800, to replace Professor Hart, resigned to go to South America, and that he be reappointed First Assistant in Dairy Manufactures in the station at a salary of \$600. This is a new position on the college side and a reduction of work and salary on the station side; total increase \$200. Mr. Lee has been temporarily filling this vacancy and is doing it acceptably.

That Mr. C. C. Hayden be reappointed Instructor in Dairy Husbandry at \$400 and Assistant in Dairy Husbandry in the station at \$800, an increase of \$100.

That Mr. H. E. Hopper be reappointed Instructor in Dairy Husbandry at \$400 and Assistant in Dairy Husbandry in the station at \$800, an increase of \$200.

HORTICULTURE—

That the salary of Assistant Professor J. W. Lloyd in the college (\$1,200) be unchanged, but that as Assistant Chief in Olericulture in the station it be increased from \$400 to \$600; total \$1,800.

That the salary of Professor C. S. Crandall in the college (\$600) remain unchanged, but that as Assistant Chief in Pomology in the station it be increased from \$900 to \$1,200; total \$1,800.

These two last are extremely strong men.

That Mr. A. C. Beal be reappointed Instructor in Floriculture and that his salary be advanced from \$1,200 to \$1,400.

That Mr. James R. Shinn be appointed Field Assistant in Pomology in the station at \$1,000, to begin July 1. Mr. Shinn is a graduate of this University and has been employed in a temporary way for three years, and last year gave his whole time to field work, successfully discharging responsible duties.

That Mr. A. Phelps Wyman be elected Assistant Professor of Landscape Gardening at \$1,000 to be paid in ten installments, commencing Sept. 1, 1905, with the understanding that he render service to the University for two and one-half days each week and that he defray his own traveling expenses.

It will be remembered that a position in Landscape Gardening was created last September at \$1,200. It has not proved possible to find an acceptable man to give his whole time at that salary. Mr. Wyman is practicing his profession in Chicago, and has been conducting our class most acceptably the present semester, giving the latter part of the week to this work. It is believed that part time of a strong and well trained man in actual practice is far better for us than the full time of any man who could be had for \$1,200.

In his letter to me recommending Mr. Wyman, Professor Blair says of him:

"I have already called your attention to the fact that Mr. Wyman is undoubtedly one of the best landscape gardeners in the country. His interest in landscape gardening work was first aroused when taking Professor Bailey's lectures on the subject at Cornell in 1894. Although he was graduated from the College of Agriculture in that institution, he made an earnest effort to secure instruction in other colleges also, in all subjects allied to landscape gardening. Upon leaving Cornell in 1897, he began working with Mr. O. C. Simonds of Chicago, a landscape gardener of high rank; probably no one in the profession having a greater sympathy for natural things. After spending a year with Mr. Simonds, Mr. Wyman went to the nurseries of Ellwanger & Barry, Rochester, N. Y., for the purpose of gaining more accurate knowledge of planting and materials used in the art of gardening. The following year he pursued similar work in the Arnold Arboretum, where he became associated with Professors Sargent and Hack. One winter was

spent in the office of D. W. Langton, a landscape gardener in New York City, and three years in the planting department of Messrs. Olmsted of Brookline, Mass. In the latter office Mr. Wyman secured invaluable instructions, having been intrusted with the plant ordering and with the working up of many important planting plans. At this period in his study Mr. Wyman realized that he needed more knowledge of general design and consequently entered the architectural department of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where he took a two years' course in architectural design, landscape design, and in civil engineering. During his summer vacation Mr. Wyman was associated with Mr. Chas. A. Platt of New York, a landscape architect of the finest feeling. After a four months' trip abroad, studying landscape gardening in Italy, France, and England, Mr. Wyman came to Chicago, where he has since opened an office for the practicing of his art. During the late fall and the present winter, Mr. Wyman was associated with me in the improvement work at Fort Massac, where I formed a high regard for the man and his abilities.

"If the University is fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Wyman permanently, I am sure that we will be in a position to do a grade of work for the institution and the State in the subject of landscape gardening which few institutions are now in a position to do. I feel, too, that the time is fully ripe for such a movement and I hope that the above recommendation will meet with your hearty approval and that of other executive officials of the institution."

The interests of landscape gardening in the University and in the State will undoubtedly be advanced if we secure the services of Mr. Wyman. It would be impossible to secure all of his time or that of any other really live landscape gardener upon any terms the University could meet, and I feel that we are fortunate if we secure a portion of the time of so good a man.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE—

That Miss Susannah Usher be reappointed and given the title of Instructor in Dietetics and that her salary be increased from \$1,000 to \$1,100, to be paid in ten installments.

That Miss Myrn Brockett be appointed Instructor in Household Science at \$1,000, to be paid in ten installments.

Miss Brockett is a graduate of the University of Michigan, of the class of 1892. She was a teacher in the high schools of Cassopolis and Muskegon, Mich., and at Elgin, Ill., continuously from graduation until 1901, when she entered the household science course at Pratt Institute, from which she graduated in 1903, and has since been employed at Northfield Seminary, Mass.

Miss Brockett is spoken of as a strong and well-trained woman, succeeding well as a teacher.

That Miss Anna R. Van Meter be appointed Assistant in Household Science at \$600, to be paid in ten installments. Miss Van Meter is a member of the graduating class and a woman of known skill.

That Miss Charlotte Gibbs be appointed Assistant in Textiles, to give one-third time for \$300, to be paid in ten installments.

BOTANY—

That Mr. J. T. Barrett be reappointed Assistant in Botany in the Experiment Station and that his salary be increased from \$840 to \$1,000.

That Mr. Fred H. Rankin be reappointed Superintendent of Agricultural College Extension at the same salary as heretofore, \$1,800.

That Miss Catherine M. McIntyre be reappointed secretary of the Agricultural Experiment Station.

That Miss Grace Maxwell be reappointed as stenographer at a salary of \$720.

The recommendations of the Agricultural College Advisory Committee are in accordance with the recommendations of the Dean, approved by the President, as will appear from the following memorandum in the minutes of the meeting of the Committee May 11, 1905:

"Meeting called to order at 7:30 p. m. There were present the following members of the College Advisory Committee:

A. P. Grout, President of the Illinois Live Stock Breeders' Association.

H. A. Aldrich, President of the Illinois State Horticultural Association.

Joseph Newman, President of the Illinois Dairymen's Association.

E. E. Chester, President of the Illinois Corn Growers' Association.

B. F. Wyman, President of the Illinois State Farmers' Institute was absent.

Dean Davenport presided and Mr. Grout was asked to act as Secretary.

NEW BUILDINGS.

The matter of new buildings for the College of Agriculture provided for in the college appropriation recently passed by the 44th General Assembly was discussed.

Motions were unanimously carried recommending to the Board of Trustees that an official residence for the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station be provided free of rent as is customary in other leading institutions, and that the next building after the Dean's residence should be a Farm Mechanics Building to cost \$25,000.

CONSOLIDATION OF SCHOOLS.

While no definite action was taken in the matter, it was generally agreed that all connected with the Agricultural College and the agricultural organizations of the State should encourage and lend support to any effort put forth looking to the consolidation of country schools.

CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOL

The sentiment was generally expressed that the section of the University Bill, asking for an appropriation for the establishment and maintenance of a correspondence school, which was dropped by the General Assembly recently adjourned, should be inserted until such appropriation is made."

Agricultural matters were considered later, see page 123.

The President submitted the following communications:

June 23, 1905.

President Edmund J. James, University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois.

DEAR SIR—The Business Men's Association of this city has appointed the writer chairman of a committee to investigate the expense of publishing a book of views of the best features of Champaign, Urbana, and the University. A recent speech made by you at a banquet given by the Association has led us to believe that by putting forth the proper effort we may be able to increase our population to 50,000. It is evident from the number of families who have come here to reside during the past few years that there must be many in the aggregate who are looking for a desirable residence city where can be enjoyed the advantages of much larger cities without the accompanying disadvantages.

We recognize that the University is our greatest attraction and believe that these cities should be made model places of residence so that the environments of the University may be ideal.

Our residence streets already possess many attractions and we are anxious that the people of the State may be informed of them.

This book of views, if published in an attractive manner, is going to cost from \$1,500 to \$2,000 for an edition of 25,000 copies. We are hopeful that the University will encourage us in our efforts by subscribing for 10,000 copies at cost of publication, and to that end I beg that you will kindly take the matter under consideration and advise me at your earliest convenience. We hope to have the book ready for distribution by August 10.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION.

DEAR PRESIDENT JAMES—Professor Lake and Dean Clark have asked me to lay the matter of the expense of the Alumni Dinner before you at once. Professor Lake has just handed me the bills and they amount to \$239.27. The receipts from the sale of tickets amounted to \$136.00, leaving a deficit of \$103.27. The deficit is larger than in former years and is due to the fact that we provided somewhat more liberally and had a considerably smaller attendance.

The Secretary, also, presented a request from the Alumni Association for an appropriation of \$175.00 to defray the expense of publishing and distributing the proceedings of the annual meeting of the association.

A motion to appropriate \$300.00 to meet the deficit and to publish and distribute the proceedings prevailed by the following vote: Yeas, Abbott, Bayliss, Bullard, Busey, Davison, Evans, McKinley and McLean; nays, Alexander and Kerrick. Absent Governor Deneen and Mr. Barber.

Y. M. C. A. HANDBOOK.

A communication from the Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. connected with the University asking for an appropriation of \$100.00 in aid of its students' handbook was submitted by President James .

The appropriation was made, Mr. Kerrick voting no.

EXPLANATION OF VOTES BY MR. KERRICK.

On the question of paying out University funds to defray the expenses incurred by the Alumni Association, and on the question of appropriating \$100.00 in aid of the Y. M. C. A. hand book, I desire to explain my negative votes by saying that in my judgment the Board has no warrant in law for such use of public funds.

TREASURER'S BOND.

The following report made by the Finance Committee was adopted:

URBANA, ILLINOIS, June 23, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

Your Finance Committee begs leave to report that, in accordance with your instruction, the Committee met Mr. Haugan, of Chicago, your Treasurer-elect, and obtained from him a good and sufficient bond containing the usual statutory provisions, with approved securities in the sum of \$1,000,000.00

The bond is as follows:

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That we, Helge A. Haugan, as principal, and John R. Lindgren, John H. Dwight, Theodore Freeman, William A. Peterson, Hauman G. Haugan, Calvin Durand, and George E. Rickords, as sureties, are held and firmly bound unto the University of Illinois, of Urbana, in the County of Champaign, State of Illinois, in the sum of one million (\$1,000,000.00) dollars, good and lawful money of the United States, for the payment of which, well and truly to be made, we bind ourselves and our heirs, executors and administrators, jointly, severally and firmly by these presents.

WITNESS our hands and seals this fourteenth day of June, A. D. 1905.

THE CONDITION OF THIS OBLIGATION IS SUCH THAT WHEREAS the above bounden Helge A. Haugan was on the fifth day of June, A. D. 1905, duly elected to the office of Treasurer of the University of Illinois for a period ending on the second Tuesday of March, A. D. 1907, or until his successor shall be appointed and qualified, and is about to assume the duties of said office:

Now, if the said Helge A. Haugan shall well and truly perform and faithfully discharge the duties of Treasurer of the said University of Illinois during his term of office, and shall faithfully keep and truly account for all moneys, bonds, securities, and other property coming into his hands as such Treasurer, during his term of office, and at the expiration of his term of office shall pay over to his successor in office, or to any other person duly authorized by the Board of Trustees of said University of Illinois to receive the same, all moneys, bonds, securities, or other property received by him as such Treasurer and not otherwise lawfully paid out or disposed of, and shall deliver to his successor in office or other person appointed to receive the same, the property, books, papers, and other things in his hands belonging to said office, and shall, at the expiration of his term of office, or oftener if there-

unto requested by the Board of Trustees of the said University of Illinois, render a just and true account of his doings as such Treasurer, then this obligation to be void; otherwise to remain in full force, effect, and virtue.

Evening Session, June 23, 1905.

When the Board met after the recess the same members were present as during the afternoon session, except Mr. Abbott.

APPOINTMENTS AND SALARIES IN THE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE.

The recommendations of the Dean of the College of Agriculture with regard to appointments and salaries, as approved by the President of the University, were adopted.

HOUSE FOR THE DIRECTOR OF THE AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

It was voted that it was desirable that the University furnish a house for the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station. The whole matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds and the Committee on Agriculture for investigation and report.

CHEMICAL LABORATORY.

Upon the recommendation of President James, \$5,000.00 of the State appropriations for the Chemical Laboratory was appropriated for further equipment of the laboratory, bills for all purposes to be approved by the President of the University.

COLLEGE OF LAW.

Upon the recommendation of President James, the State appropriation for the College of Law—\$10,000—was assigned for certain improvements in the building, the balance to be used for the college library.

Upon the request of the Secretary \$35.00 a month for additional typewriter service was appropriated for the year beginning July 1, 1905.

At the request of the Business Manager, \$1,170 were appropriated for the payment of band scholarships for the year 1904-05.

COAL CONTRACTS.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds was authorized to advertise for bids for supplying the University with coal for the year beginning September 1, 1905, and the hauling of the same, and to make contracts on satisfactory bids, and report the same to the Board.

PURCHASE OF Y. M. C. A. LOTS.

The Business Manager was directed to complete the purchase of the Y. M. C. A. lots and to pay the purchase price which was appropriated therefor, \$16,000.39, this including the expense of the pavement on Mathews avenue, upon receipt of a warranty deed for the premises and an abstract thereof showing good title in the grantor.

CHANGES, REPAIRS, BUILDINGS.

Mr. Bullard from the Committee on Buildings and Grounds presented the following communication from Professor White:

CHAMPAIGN, ILLINOIS, June 20, 1905.

Hon. S. A. Bullard, Chairman Committee on Buildings and Grounds, Springfield, Illinois.

DEAR SIR—There are so many changes which have been suggested to be made upon University buildings this summer that I have thought it would be well to enumerate them, so that none of them would be overlooked: and I therefore give below a brief statement of each, with the expectation that all of them will be brought to your notice otherwise.

Library.—Miss Sharp desires to have a dumb waiter, and some wood floors laid on top of present concrete floors in basement; estimated cost \$240.

Engineering Building.—Dr. Carman desires some changes on the lower floor, in order to get more laboratory space. Approximate cost \$75.00.

Hydraulic Laboratory.—Professor Talbot wishes to have the second story of the front of the Hydraulic Laboratory finished off into rooms. Probable cost, \$1,000.00.

Electrical Engineering Laboratory.—The rooms in the second story of Electrical Engineering Laboratory are rather small and poorly lighted. Professor Brooks would like to have some changes in partitions made and a skylight put on the roof, so as to make these rooms available as class rooms. In order to get some additional rooms, he suggests changing the stairway. Estimated cost, \$1,200.00.

Mechanical Engineering Laboratory.—The Engineering Faculty recommends the addition of another section to the new Mechanical Engineering Laboratory, at a cost not to exceed \$12,000.00.

Armory.—I have received two bids for the extension of the Armory, in accordance with plans already approved by your committee; one from English Brothers at \$1,899.00; one from A. W. Stoolman at \$1,795.00. I recommend the acceptance of the latter proposition.

Tool Room.—I enclose drawing of the tool room which is to be added to the Metal Shops. I received bids on this on the basis of a one-story structure extending about 30 feet to the north, but afterwards changed it to a structure with the finished basement and extending only two-thirds of that distance to the north, which will certainly make a better appearance. Mr. Stoolman's bid on the first plans was low, and I asked him to refigure it on the basis of the present drawing, and he submits a figure of \$1,198.00. I believe that we are authorized to close this contract without further action of the Board, and if it meets with your approval I will close this up at once.

Insectary.—I also prepared plans for Dean Forbes' insectary, which the Board located south of the Agriculture greenhouses, and I wish to submit the plans to you for your approval, and also wish you to settle on an exact location. I recommend that the building be faced south on axis with the Observatory and just north of the north line of Nevada street. This will make a presentable termination for the group of greenhouses and will also curtail the Agricultural people from further extensions to the south.

Chemical Laboratory.—There will probably be about \$5,000.00 out of the special appropriation for furniture and equipment for the Chemical Laboratory which will have to be put into special furniture, and I have already gotten the drawings under way for this work. I have placed it in the hands of Mr. Bevis, subject to your approval. There is a good deal of special detail work about it, and I think the most economical way to proceed is to prepare the drawings quite fully and then to contract for all of the mill-work possible, but to do the erecting and finishing by the day and to contract as much of the plumbing as possible. If I have the drawings prepared by one man, then he will have to give very close supervision to the carpenters who are erecting it, which makes altogether too much expense for the superintendence.

Mr. Bevis attended the Architectural Department of the University for three years and then went into contracting. He and his brother were the contractors on the President's House, and this one afterwards ran a planing mill. For the last three years he has been doing superintending, and for two years worked for Patton & Miller at a salary of \$130.00 a month; since then he has been on government work in South Dakota. He is very anxious to be located here, because he wishes to be with his children, who are cared for by his sisters, as his wife died about a year ago. He is therefore willing to work here for \$90.00 a month and is perfectly willing to do carpentering along with his superintending. It therefore seemed to me that a man of this sort would be an economical one to place in charge of that work, as we would not have anybody standing around watching somebody else work. I do not feel like trusting him solely with the financial responsibility, but under such supervision as I could give him I believe he would be an excellent man, and I suggest that he be employed at \$90.00 a month as long as we find need for him, his work to be specifically in connection with the Chemical Laboratory, but he can be used on other work if at any time he is short of work there.

As you will see from the above list, there is going to be a great deal of work to be looked after, and I desire to be relieved from the immediate daily supervision of the work, though I am perfectly willing to carry the general

responsibility; and I suggest that Mr. C. R. Clark of the Department of Architecture be paid \$250.00 for his services during the vacation in looking after all of the balance of this work. Mr. Clark is a thoroughly competent and careful man and I am sure that he can carry it very successfully. For any supervision which I may give the work after that time, I do not expect any remuneration, but shall consider it a part of my regular work if I can have this amount of assistance. If there is anything coming to me for work done in the past, I should like to get squared up to date.

The plans for all the above work are already completed, except for the insectary, which Dean Forbes must pay for out of his own appropriation.

Woman's Building.—The Woman's Building will not be completed by July 1st, though the contractors are making good progress. I think it would be in order for you to instruct me not to issue any more certificates of payment to the general contractors until the final certificate is issued. I do not think that this should apply to sub-contractors who have been delayed in their work through general contractors and who are entitled to their regular monthly payments until the completion of the work.

I would like very much to have the walls of the woman's gymnasium painted, and shall have a proposition ready to submit to you in time for your meeting.

Grandstand.—Mr. Huff is out of the city, but before leaving requested me to remind you that your committee voted to report favorably to the Board on the appropriation of a sum of money for beginning the erection of a reinforced concrete grandstand. I do not remember whether any specific sum was mentioned, but I believe Mr. Huff is hoping to get \$3,000.00.

It was voted to go on with the matters referred to by Professor White with the exception of the addition to the engineering laboratory and the grand stand, and the appropriations were made therefor as recommended, and the plans suggested for carrying on the work were authorized.

ARCHITECT'S COMMISSION ON AUDITORIUM.

Mr. Bullard reported that, as directed, he had consulted with Mr. Blackall with reference to his compensation as architect on the Auditorium, and had agreed to pay him five per cent of the amount expended for his fees as architect, including superintendence, and in addition thereto his expenses for the several trips which it will be necessary for him to make to the University.

The agreement was approved.

EVENING SCHOOL OF ACCOUNTANCY.

URBANA, ILLINOIS, June 23, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees:

Your committee appointed to consider the advisability of establishing an evening school of accountancy and finance in Chicago, are not able upon present information to judge whether such a school would be a public educational service which the University should undertake. In order to determine this, your committee recommends the appointment of a committee

of inquiry to consist of the chairmen of the committee on instruction, Mr. W. L. Abbott and Dean Kinley, to canvass the matter and get information as to the extent of the demand and the likelihood of its being self-supporting and report to the Board at its September meeting.

Meeting of the Executive Committee, Board of Trustees, of the University of Illinois, July 21, 1905.

Immediately after the adjournment of the Board of Trustees, as stated in the record of its meeting of this date the Executive Committee convened, there being present two members, Mr. Bullard and Mrs. Alexander, and absent the other member, Mr. McKinley.

The committee, in conference with the other members of the Board present, took action as follows:

SUBJECTS SUBMITTED FOR THE CONSIDERATION OF THE BOARD BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

REPORT OF APPOINTMENTS MADE.

1. In accordance with the authority given by the Board at its last meeting, I have appointed H. S. Woods Assistant in Chemistry, at a salary of \$600, in place of B. D. Ingles.

George McPhail Smith, Instructor in Chemistry, at a salary of \$1,000, in place of Mr. J. L. Sammis, resigned.

F. K. Ovitz, Instructor in Chemistry, at a salary of \$700, in place of K. W. Zimmerschied, resigned.

G. H. Jernberg, Assistant in Forge Shop, at \$60 a month for ten months.
Loma William Goben, Urbana, Illinois, Assistant in Machine Shop, at \$75 a month for ten months.

Aden G. Pippit, Assistant in the Wood Shop, at a salary of \$75 a month for ten months, beginning September 1, 1905.

Archie A. Stanley, Laboratory Mechanic, at a salary of \$85 a month for twelve months, beginning July 1, 1905.

C. S. Hudson, Instructor in Physics, at a salary of \$75 a month for ten months, beginning September 1, 1905.

Otto Manthy Zorn, Instructor in German, at a salary of \$900 a year.

Emil Carl Wilm, Instructor in German, at a salary of \$350.

Tillie Joe Schumacher, Assistant in German, at a salary of \$400.

Katherine Alberta Layton, Assistant in German, at a salary of \$400.

E. A. Fath, Instructor in Astronomy, on half time, at a salary of \$400.

Approved.

COURSE IN CERAMICS.

2. In accordance with the authorization given by the Board at a previous meeting, I nominate Professor C. W. Rolfe as Director of the Course in Ceramics, with the recommendation that \$300 of his salary be charged to the appropriation for instruction in Ceramics.

I nominate Mr. S. Geijsbeek as Assistant Director of the Course in Ceramics, at a salary of \$1,700 per year, to begin the first of September, 1905.

I recommend that the President of the University be authorized to issue a circular concerning the Course in Ceramics, to be drawn up by the Director and Assistant Director of the Course and approved by the President, and that the expenditure of \$2,000 of the appropriation made by the Legislature for the Course in Ceramics for materials and equipment be authorized, such expenditures to be made on the recommendation of the Director of the Course and the approval of the President.

Approved.

SPECIAL LECTURES.

3. I recommend that the sum of \$5,000 be appropriated for special lectures before the University by distinguished men, and that the President be authorized to select the lecturers

Approved.

APPOINTMENTS.

4. I nominate Dr. Stephen E. Slocum as Assistant Professor of Mathematics, at a salary of \$1,800, to date from September 1, 1905.

Lewis I. Neikirk to be Instructor in Mathematics, at a salary of \$1,000, to date from September 1, 1905.

Clyde Emmons and Walter J. Risley to be Assistant in Mathematics, to be remunerated at the rate of \$250 per class of five exercises a week and to be guaranteed at least two classes.

Frederick Hayes to be Mechanician in the Physical Laboratory, at a salary of \$840 a year from September 1, 1905.

L. H. G. Weld to be a Fellow in Economics in place of Mr. Phelan, resigned.

Gilbert M. Wood to be Office Clerk of the Mechanical Engineering Department, at a salary of \$50 a month, to date from July 1, 1905.

Frank A. Randall to be Instructor in Mechanics, at \$850, in place of Mr. Engstrom, resigned.

Thomas M. Gardner to be Assistant Professor of Electrical Engineering, at a salary of \$1,700.

I recommend that the salary of J. M. Bryant, Instructor in Electrical Engineering be made \$1,100 for ten months from September 1, 1905, and that the salary of F. G. Wilson, instructor in the same department, be made \$950 for the same period.

Approved.

PURCHASING COMMODITIES FROM BOARD OF PRISON INDUSTRIES.

5. I desire to submit certain communications from the Secretary of the State Board of Prison Industries at Springfield, Illinois, calling attention to the fact that the University as one of the state institutions is expected to purchase such commodities as it may need from the State Board of Prison Industries so far as the latter may have them for sale.

I stated to the secretary that while this was a matter for the Board to act upon, I felt certain that every member of the Board would desire the University to comply not only with the letter but with the spirit of the law, and asked him to submit a list of the commodities which the Board of Prison Industries is able to furnish, with some indication as to their quality and price. Some price lists have been received which will be distributed among the different administrative departments of the University. I shall with the approval of the Board call their attention to the law, and direct them to comply with its provisions.

Approved.

In this connection the following resolution offered by Mr. McLean was adopted:

Resolved, That in answer to letters dated June 28 and July 6, 1905, written by Mr. C. M. Tinney, Manager of Sales for the State Board of Prison Industries, and written under instructions from Governor Deneen, with regard to the purchase by the University of supplies of every kind manufactured within the penitentiaries and the Reform School as required by the law of the State, this Board declares that it will comply with the law in every respect; and to this end requests the Sales Agent, Mr. Tinney, to furnish to this Board catalogs of all commodities manufactured as aforesaid with prices for the same.

In this connection the Secretary of the Board was instructed to correspond with Mr. Tinney with regard to printing for the University.

SUMMER SESSION OF 1906.

6. I recommend that the sum of \$12,000 be appropriated for the expenses of the Summer Session of the University for the year 1905-06, to be expended under the supervision of the President.

Approved.

UNIVERSITY PHOTOGRAPHER.

7. That Professor S. W. Parr be appointed University Photographer, and that to him be entrusted all photographic work needed by the various departments of the University. Further, that an Assistant be appointed, at a salary not to exceed \$1,000, and that the sum of \$300 be appropriated for material and incidental expenses.

Approved.

ASSISTANCE IN THE CHEMICAL LABORATORY.

8. That the sum of \$2,000 be appropriated for additional assistance in the Chemical Laboratory, to be distributed upon the approval of the President as the needs of the Chemical Laboratory may make necessary.

Approved.

INVESTIGATION IN APPLIED CHEMISTRY.

9. That the sum of \$200 be appropriated for certain investigations in the Department of Applied Chemistry, to be conducted by Professor Parr.

Approved.

NUTRITION INVESTIGATIONS.

10. That the sum of \$2,000 be appropriated to continue the investigations in nutrition which have been carried on by Professor Grindley for some time past, and that the same be charged to the Agricultural Experiment Station Account, under the head of Animal Husbandry.

Approved.

GRADE OF WRIGHT STREET.

11. I submit a communication from the City Council of Champaign in regard to changing the grade of Wright street.

CHAMPAIGN, ILL., July 19, 1905.

Edmund J. James, President University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois.

DEAR SIR—Relative to the matter of changing the grade on S. Wright street, the following are extracts from the minutes of the city council of the meeting held July 18, 1905:

"Alderman Wallace moved that permission be granted the University of Illinois to change the grade of Wright street a distance of 150 feet north from the south end of the present pavement, as petitioned for by the University, provided the entire expense be borne by the University; and provided, further, that the University place the proposed new fence along the north side of their property lying west of Wright street and south of what would be Davidson street if opened, at a distance of 33 feet south of the center line of said Davidson street, and allow the city to use the 33 feet so set off for street purpose." Vote: Ayes—Ald. Giese, McCann, Armstrong, Clinkenbeard, Heffernan, Eagleton, Matheny, Stewart, Nelson, Mollet, Howard, Morton, Wallace—13. Nays—0.

"Alderman Wallace moved that, in the event of the acceptance by the University of the permission granted by the preceding motion, with the provisions attached, that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to enter into an agreement with the Trustees of the University that if any pavement or sidewalks be laid along the University frontage on said Davidson street where the ground of the University is used for street purposes, unless by petition of the University, the University shall not be asked or required to pay any part of the expense thereof." Vote: Ayes—Ald. Giese, McCann, Armstrong, Clinkenbeard, Heffernan, Eagleton, Matheny, Stewart, Nelson, Mollet, Howard, Morton, Wallace—13. Nays—0.

Voted to leave the grade of Wright street as it is, and that the new fence be put on the north line of the University property from Wright street to Fourth street.

DEDICATION OF WOMAN'S HALL.

12. The Committee on the Installation of the President have included as one of the features of the week the formal Dedication of the Woman's Hall.

They suggest as a program:

- (a) An address by one of the Trustees, turning over the building to University.
- (b) An address by the President of the University or one of the Faculty accepting the trust.
- (c) A dedicatory address.

Approved.

SOUVENIR BOOK OF CHAMPAIGN AND URBANA.

13. The committee appointed by the Champaign County Merchants' Association on the preparation of a souvenir for the two cities proposes to issue a book of views, the total cost of which would be somewhat in excess of \$2,300 for 25,000 copies of the booklet. They request the University to purchase 10,000 of these at the proportional cost price and pay the cost of making the plates of any picture of the University grounds or buildings which may be included. This would make the cost of these 10,000 booklets to the University somewhere between \$800 and \$900.

Inasmuch as the University has already contracted for a book of views soon to be issued, it is undesirable to order copies of the above souvenir.

It was voted not to accept the proposition.

A BAY ON NORTH OF MECHANICAL LABORATORY.

14. I recommend that the University proceed immediately to the erection of another bay as an addition to and on the north side of the present Mechanical Laboratory, at a cost not to exceed \$12,000, and that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds be instructed to let contracts and proceed with the construction as rapidly as possible.

Approved.

APPROPRIATION FOR ENGINEERING COLLEGE AND STATION.

15. (a) That of the \$150,000 appropriated for the further equipment of the College of Engineering and for the expenses of the Engineering Station ten per cent. be set apart as a general fund from which may be defrayed the expenses of general equipment of the College of Engineering and unexpected expenditures in connection with either the College of Engineering or the Engineering Experiment station.

(b) That the sum of \$12,000 be assigned to defray the expenses of the additions to the Mechanical Engineering Laboratory already recommended.

(c) That the sum of \$3,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary be assigned to defray the expenses of special equipment needed in other departments of the University for the use of engineering students.

(d) That the remaining sum, \$120,000, be distributed, one-half, \$60,000, to the College of Engineering for further equipment, and the other half, \$60,000, to the expenses of the Engineering Experiment Station. That the following assignment of the \$60,000 be made for the further equipment of the College of Engineering, namely:

General engineering drawing.....	\$ 1,000 00
Architecture.....	5,000 00
Electrical engineering.....	8,000 00
Civil engineering.....	5,000 00
Mechanical engineering.....	21,000 00
Mechanics, applied, etc.....	9,000 00
Physics.....	11,000 00

provided that the expenses of reconstruction, etc., in the different buildings of the Engineering College, which may be authorized by the Board of Trustees, shall be charged to these various allowances. One-half of the portion assigned to the equipment fund of the College of Engineering, namely, \$30,000, shall be available for the year 1905-06, and the other half, namely, \$30,000, for the year 1906-07, and the expenditure within the various departments for equipment must be adjusted to this appropriation.

(e) That in estimating the expenses of the Engineering Experiment Station all the expenditures which are clearly incurred for that department alone shall be charged to this account, and such a proportion of the salaries of other men taking part in the work of the Station as may seem equitable.

Approved.

BUDGET OF ENGINEERING EXPERIMENT STATION.

16. That the following preliminary budget be adopted for the Engineering Experiment Station for the coming year, to be expended on the recommendation of the staff of the Station and approved by the President:

Station Clerk and Stenographer, at a salary of \$75 per month for twelve months, appointment to begin August 1, 1905.

H. B. Dirks, Assistant in Mechanical Technology, at a salary of \$90 a month for ten months, appointment to date from September 1, 1905.

Maurice L. Carr, Assistant in Physics, at a salary of \$70 a month for ten months, appointment to begin September 1, 1905.

REGULATIONS FOR CLUB ROOMS IN WOMAN'S HALL.

20. The Head of the Woman's Hall has submitted the following preliminary regulations for the use of the Club Rooms in Woman's Hall.

(a) The Club Rooms are for the use of women students of the University, and with the exception of general University functions are open to women only.

(b) Any woman registered in the University is, by virtue of her registration, entitled to the privileges of the Club Rooms upon registering with the Head of the Woman's Hall and taking out a card of admission. Such card may be withdrawn for any abuse of the privileges it confers.

(c) Alumnae of the University and ex-students who left the University in good standing may enjoy the privileges of the Club Rooms upon registering with the Head of Woman's Hall and taking out a card of admission as prescribed in the case of undergraduates.

(d) The wives of members of the Faculty and all women connected with the educational work and administrative offices of the University shall be entitled to the privileges of the Club Rooms upon registration with the Head of the Woman's Hall and taking out the card of admission as prescribed for undergraduates.

(e) Women students may obtain the privileges of the Club Rooms for visiting friends by applying at the office of the Head of the Woman's Hall. They may introduce friends for one day by entering their names in the register; provided that no resident of Champaign or Urbana shall be introduced oftener than once a semester.

(f) The Club Rooms will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 5:30 p. m.

(g) The Rooms may be used for social purposes by organizations of women students Friday afternoon after four o'clock, Saturday afternoon, and Friday and Saturday evenings by obtaining permission at the office of the Head of the Woman's Hall.

OF THE

Meeting of September 12, 1905.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Tuesday, Sept. 12, 1905.

The members present were Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Davison, Kerrick, McLean and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Busey, and Mrs. Evans; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Barber, Abbott and McKinley.

The Secretary presented the minutes of Board meetings as follows: June 2, 1905; June 5, 1905, and the adjourned sessions of the same held June 23, 1905, July 21, 1905; and the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board held the same date. These minutes were approved except that it was voted to insert after the paragraph relating to the School of Music, on page 106 of the minutes of the meeting of June 23rd, the following: "Mrs. Alexander moved that Mrs. Smith's salary be made \$1,100 a year, and the motion was referred to President James."

The acts of the Executive Committee were confirmed.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

The President submitted the following matters for the consideration of the Board:

AUDITORIUM.

1. The first matter is the further consideration of the report of the Commission appointed by the Board on the subject of an auditorium. The Board requested Architect Clarence H. Blackall to prepare preliminary plans for two possible sites. Mr. Blackall has done so and is present to submit the plans in person.

Mr. Blackall presented sketches for the south site, also for a building upon the site south of the Library.

After a full explanation of these and a discussion of their merits and of the advantages and disadvantages of the two sites, Dr. Davison moved the conditional selection of the south site recommended by Mr. Blackall, the condition being that there be presented by him satisfactory plans, with estimates of cost, for a building to be erected thereon, and the motion prevailed.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR FILIPINO STUDENTS.

2. I have a letter from William Alexander Sutherland, Superintendent of Filipino students, War Department, Bureau of Insular Affairs, Washington, D. C. He desires to know whether it would be possible to receive from four to six Filipino students in the College of Agriculture and an equal number in the other departments of the University for the present year, without charge for tuition. He calls attention to the fact that in a letter dated May 25, 1903, Dr. Andrew S. Draper, then President of the University of Illinois, wrote as follows:

"We would be willing to receive the students from the Philippine Islands to a small number, say five or six, who are prepared for our work, without any charge for tuition."

On motion of Mr. Bayliss it was voted that the President of the University be authorized to receive, at the request of the United States Government, without payment of tuition, certain Filipino students not exceeding twelve in number.

HOME TELEPHONE COMPANY.

3. The Trustees voted on January 17, 1905, (see minutes for current year, page 40,) to pay the Home Telephone Company of Champaign County, the sum of seventy-five dollars a year for certain services connected with the automatic system now in use at the University. This was done on condition that the company should install three metallic circuits to Champaign and one to Urbana, and further lines if they were necessary.

The service rendered by this company is extremely unsatisfactory from every point of view. It does not appear that it has carried out its agreement in regard to extra lines, and certainly, if general complaint is any indication of the facts of the case, the service is extremely unsatisfactory.

Voted on motion of Mrs. Busey, that the Business Manager may refuse to pay the next installment of money to the Home Telephone Company until the company has complied with the agreement with the University in every respect.

FEES FOR CHANGES OF STUDY LISTS.

The Council makes the following recommendations in regard to charging fees for changes in study lists after the beginning of instruction:

Council Meeting, July 20, 1905.

RULES ON REGISTRATION.

1. The study list must be filled out completely, in accordance with the rules.
2. Changes of study lists in the work of the first semester may not be made after the end of the first week of class work as scheduled except on payment of a fee of \$1.00.
3. Study lists for the second semester must be completed not later than 5:00 p. m. of the day preceding the examinations of the first semester. If received later than this, they will be subject to the late registration fee of \$1.00.
4. Changes in schedules of studies for the second semester, made necessary by the results of the examinations of the first semester, may be made not later than 5:00 p. m. of the second Wednesday of the second semester, and may not be made after that time, except on payment of a fee of \$1.00 for each change.

After amending by striking out the words "the first week" in paragraph two and inserting in the place thereof "ten days," and by striking out in paragraph four the words "second Wednesday" and inserting in place thereof the words "ten days," the rules were approved on motion of Mr. Kerrick.

5. The University Senate asks for an appropriation of three hundred dollars to defray expenses of the general University meetings for the coming year with the purpose of securing occasionally, at least, speakers of distinction, outside of the general faculty.

Voted, on motion of Mrs. Alexander, to postpone consideration of the request until the next meeting.

6. The acting Dean of the College of Science requests an appropriation of the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars for the incidental expenses of that college. It appears that no appropriation of this kind has thus far been made, chiefly because the Dean of the College of Science used his own office as Director of the Natural History Survey during the time of his term of office as Dean.

Voted, that such an appropriation be made.

7. I am requested by Dean Davenport and Professor Hopkins to submit the following letters in regard to their connection with the Phosphate Company to the consideration of the Board:

Voted, on motion of Mr. McLean, that these communications be sent to the committee appointed by the Board to consider this matter.

On motion of Mrs. Alexander, 3:00 o'clock was made the time for hearing the report.

8. Owing to the fact that Mr. Hamsher is to give instruction in the School of Education, and in order to do this must be relieved of a certain amount of teaching in the Academy, and owing to the fact that we desire to give more careful attention to certain matters in the administration of the Academy than they have thus far received, the request is made for an additional instructor in the Academy at a salary of one thousand dollars.

Voted, on motion of Mr. McLean, that such request be granted and the President authorized to appoint such instructor.

9. The Business Manager desires to know to what fund the expense for the grading work on the extension of Wright street, be charged.

Voted, that it be charged to the agricultural funds.

10. The committee on the installation of the President requests the Board to appoint a member of the Board to perform the ceremony of handing over the Woman's Building to the care and administration of the Faculties.

Voted, on motion of Mr. McLean, that the President of the Board be requested to act on such occasion, for the Board.

11. A request has been submitted by Mr. Robert F. Work of Rushville, for a University scholarship under the provisions of the law referring to soldiers and sailors of the United States.

Voted, to grant such scholarship but not for attendance in a professional school or college.

12. Eric J. Everett requests that the University consent to be a party to a friendly suit to determine his rights in the matter of an application for the Degree of Certified Public Accountant, without examination.

Voted, that the University is unwilling to be a party to such a suit.

On motion of Mrs. Alexander the Secretary was instructed to refer the question to the Attorney General for an opinion.

The Board then took a recess until 1:30 p. m.

Afternoon Session, September 12, 1905.

When the Board met after recess the same members were present as during the morning.

AUDIT REPORT; BUSINESS OFFICE.

The Finance Committee made the following report which was adopted after voting that the salary of the Chief Clerk should be \$1,500.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS, September 12, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees:

The undersigned, your Finance Committee, would report as follows:

First, we present a report of the Audit Company of Illinois which shows in detail the receipt of all moneys and disbursements of same for the period from January 1 to June 30, 1905, and recommend that the same be approved and copy of same be incorporated in the minutes of the Board.

Second, we recommend that the following changes be made in conducting the financial business of the Board: That the duties now performed by the Business Manager be assigned to three different persons to be denoted respectively as a Comptroller, a Chief Clerk, and the Purchasing Agent. In a general way the duties of these officers may be stated as follows:

The Chief Clerk shall be the general financial accountant of the University. He shall collect and account for all moneys from dues, fees, tuition, and all other sources not required to be collected by the Treasurer. He shall keep the financial books of the University and make out under the direction of the Comptroller all required financial reports to the Board of Trustees, the State Government, and the United States Government.

The Purchasing Agent shall make or shall issue an order for the purchase of all articles and materials for the University in all cases where the Board has not given this authority to some other persons or committees.

The Comptroller shall have general charge of the business operations of the University. He shall certify for payment all bills and pay rolls of the University on account of which warrants are to be drawn. He shall report quarterly to the Board as is now required of the Business Manager. He shall assist the Finance Committee as it may desire in the audit of the accounts of the University.

The details of above organization can be worked out more fully if desired by the Board and as necessity may require.

Third, we recommend that the salary of Professor S. W. Shattuck continue as it is now for the year from September 1, 1905, and that he be Comptroller. That the salary of O. E. Staples, Chief Clerk, be \$1,500 per annum from September 1, 1905, and that he be required to execute a good and sufficient bond for the faithful discharge of his duties as Chief Clerk, and that the said bond be made to the Trustees of the University.

Fourth, when a competent Purchasing Agent is obtained that his salary be \$.....

Fifth, we recommend that Elmer C. Harris be appointed clerk at a salary of \$60.00 per month, also that Marsh E. Thompson be appointed a clerk at a salary of \$45.00 per month for the ensuing year.

COAL CONTRACTS, 1905-6.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds made the following report with regard to the contracts entered into for coal supplies for 1905-6 and for hauling the same:

URBANA, September 12, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees:

At the June meeting the Board instructed the Committee on Buildings and Grounds to obtain proposals for coal for the year beginning September 1, 1905, and bids for hauling the same and to contract therefor if suitable bids were received.

Your Committee reports that proposals were publicly invited for coal and for hauling the same to be in the hands of the Secretary, Mr. Pillsbury, July 20, 1905. Notices were published in three papers in Champaign and three in Springfield for ten days prior to the 20th day of July; and in addition thereto notices were mailed to about thirty large coal dealers and operators whose names and addresses were obtained by the Committee.

In response the following proposals were received:

Dering Coal Company, Chicago—15,000 tons 1" x 2" nut coal from Paisley, Illinois, \$1.694 per ton delivered at Urbana, \$1.704 per ton delivered at Champaign.

Springfield Coal Mining Company, Chicago—15,000 tons No. 2 nut or pea coal, \$1.50 per ton delivered at Urbana; 15,000 tons screenings containing No. 2 nut and slack, \$1.20 per ton.

L. A. Barnard, Chicago—15,000 tons Carterville washed pea coal through a $\frac{3}{4}$ inch and over a $\frac{1}{4}$ inch screen, \$1.82 per ton delivered at Urbana or Champaign; 15,000 tons washed slack, all through a $\frac{1}{4}$ inch screen, \$1.32 per ton.

Perwell Coal Mining Company, Pana—5,000 tons pea coal through roller screen, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch and over $\frac{3}{4}$ inch screen, \$1.60 per ton delivered at Champaign.

Missouri & Illinois Coal Company, St. Louis—15,000 tons pea coal well cleaned, \$1.35 per ton delivered at Champaign.

Illinois Traction System, Danville—15,000 tons best Oakwood and Kelly pea coal, \$1.50 per ton delivered at Urbana, \$1.68 delivered in wagons at the University, \$1.58 on cars at the dump near heating plant on University grounds.

Bell & Zoller Coal Company, Chicago—15,000 tons of pea coal from Newburt mines at Pana, Illinois, \$1.60 per ton delivered at Champaign.

C. J. Boedeker Company, Chicago—15,000 tons Odin No. 2 nut through a $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch screen and over a $\frac{7}{8}$ inch screen, \$1.65 per ton delivered at Champaign.

Consolidated Coal Company, St. Louis—15,000 tons Mt. Olive and Staunton No. 3 (washed pea) through a $1\frac{1}{4}$ inch and over a $\frac{3}{4}$ inch screen, \$1.85 per ton delivered at Urbana; No. 4 (washed buckwheat) run through a $\frac{3}{4}$ inch and over a $1\frac{1}{4}$ inch screen, \$1.70 per ton; No. 5 (washed slack) run through a $\frac{1}{4}$ inch screen, \$1.30 per ton.

Chester A. Harris, Champaign—5,000 tons No. 4 washed coal from Carterville mines, \$2.04 per ton delivered at Champaign or Urbana; 5,000 tons No. 5, \$1.64 per ton.

A. J. Reeves, Champaign—8,000 tons Hurrican washed pea coal from mines near Carterville, Illinois, \$2.22 8-10 per ton delivered at Champaign.

Your Committee also received proposals for hauling the coal as follows: Pearl Adams, Urbana, Illinois, from either Champaign or Urbana, 15,000 tons, 17c a ton.

Renner Brothers, from either Champaign or Urbana, 18c a ton.

Some of the proposals which seemed low were on coals that had not been analyzed by our steam department, and Professor Breckenridge was asked to submit some of these coals to test and report upon them.

Subsequently Professor Breckenridge reported, and on the information submitted, your Committee let the contract to the Springfield Coal Company at \$1.50 per ton for pea coal and \$1.20 for screenings, which was the best offer received.

At the same time the contract for hauling coal was awarded to Pearl Adams of Urbana for 17c a ton.

On motion of Mrs. Evans, the Committee on Buildings and Grounds was authorized to accept from the contractors the Woman's Building when the work is done according to contracts and to settle with them.

TRANSPORTATION TO ATTEND INSTALLATION EXERCISES.

The President of the Board received from Dr. Steele, Actuary of the College of Medicine, the following telegram:

CHICAGO, September 12, 1905.

S. A. Bullard, President.

Will the Board authorize transportation for the College of Medicine faculty and students to installation exercises paid out of undivided funds?

D. A. K. STEELE.

Mr. McLean moved that the Board authorize the transportation of College of Medicine faculty and students and of faculty and students of College of Dentistry to attend the installation exercises and the payment of the cost of the same out of undivided funds, on presentation of a detailed statement of railroad fares showing how many attended said exercises.

The vote on this motion was as follows: Ayes, Messrs. Bayliss, McLean, Bullard, Kerrick, Davison, and Mrs. Evans; nays, Mrs. Alexander; not voting, Mrs. Busey; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Abbott, Barber and McKinley.

PROMOTION OF PHOSPHATE MINES.

The special committee appointed to consider this matter at the meeting of March 14, 1905, presented the following report, which was accepted:

To the Board of Trustees:

Your special committee, appointed March 14, 1905, "to ascertain and report the facts of the rumored imprudent connection of any person responsible for the good name of the University with the promotion of certain phosphate mines in Tennessee," respectfully submits the following:

We find: 1. That, some time in June, 1904, Dr. Cyril G. Hopkins, Professor of Agronomy in the Agricultural College of the University, purchased \$1,500 in bonds of the New York and St. Louis Mining and Manufacturing Company, a corporation organized in New York with a capital stock of one million dollars, and an authorized bond issue of \$500,000—paying \$1,500 in cash therefor, and receiving as a stock bonus, in addition to the bonds thirty shares, (\$3,000) of capital stock from the Treasury stock, and also received from a Mr. Coburn, then the general manager of said Mining & Manufacturing Company, four hundred and seventy shares of his personal stock in the company.

That on or about the same time Professor Eugene Davenport, Dean of the Agricultural College and Director of the Experiment Station, purchased one \$500 bond, and received ten shares of the stock.

That at sundry times, others who share with Dr. Hopkins and Dean Davenport the responsibility for the investigation of Illinois soils became financially interested in the same company.

2. That these purchases of stock in the said New York & St. Louis Mining and Manufacturing company were made nearly two years after the published statements in bulletins and circulars of the Experiment Stations as well as in many public addresses of the need of phosphorus for the preservation and improvement of Illinois soils.

3. That both Dean Davenport and Professor Hopkins justify this connection with the said company on the ground—briefly stated—that it had been found that the element of phosphorus is deficient in most Illinois soils, is greatly needed, and that these purchases, which together with others, by persons not connected with the University, resulted in the control of about ten thousand acres of phosphate land in Tennessee by Illinois men, justified

themselves by securing to Illinois farmers a source of supply of this element sufficient for the needs of Illinois soils for a long time. Both acknowledge that the element of personal financial gain entered into the motive impelling them to these purchases.

4. That upon consultation, recently, with the President of the Board of Trustees, both Dean Davenport and Professor Hopkins agreed that such a connection with the Phosphate Manufacturing Company could not be considered consistent with their relations to the Experiment Station, and immediately took steps to dispose of their stock and bonds.

We further find that, August 31, 1905, Dean Davenport informed the President of this Board that he could "say in the most positive terms that this disposal of interests is absolute, that neither the stock nor any part of it is in our possession, nor will it be at any time hereafter. I think it is essential in this connection and for the upholding of the principle which we are now attempting to maintain that all parties understand and believe that this transaction is absolutely genuine." (E. Davenport to S. A. Bullard, Aug. 31, 1905.)

Also that Professor Hopkins, reporting to the President of the University, through Dean Davenport, states: "Consequently I have severed my connection with this phosphate company and have absolutely no financial interest, direct or indirect, in any phosphate enterprise, except in the use of rock phosphate on my own Illinois farm.

"I may add that some of my associates who share the responsibility for the investigation of Illinois gave financial support to the development of this Illinois phosphate company; but the end sought having become an established fact, they, too, without exception have already severed all connection with the enterprise or have taken steps to do so in the near future."

The committee returns herewith the papers referred to it as part of this report.

Edmund J. James, LL.D., President of the University of Illinois:

DEAR SIR: I transmit for your official knowledge and information a communication from Dr. Hopkins, head of the Department of Agronomy, that will explain itself.

It is scarcely necessary for me to add that Dr. Hopkins' connection with this company has been entirely open and well understood from the beginning, not only by myself and others interested in the agricultural work of the University, but also by the general public. A number of other University people including myself, lent encouragement and financial support in the development of this project. But the original object is now accomplished; I have already withdrawn and no one who has any responsibility for the direction or execution of soil investigations will retain any connection with the enterprise, for the reasons stated in Dr. Hopkins' communication.

This matter, in which Dr. Hopkins has acted the major part, is one of the greatest services to the State—how great will be better recognized a decade or so hence. The Station saw the opportunity, but was powerless. The service could be rendered only by individuals and in a private capacity. Accordingly it was done at no little personal inconvenience. In all this matter Dr. Hopkins has been actuated by the highest motives of public service not only in exerting his influence to secure for Illinois the practical control of a valuable, nay indispensable, public utility, but also withdrawing when the object was accomplished, lest his continued connection might prejudice the University and his future services in the eyes of the public, which is not in a position to know all the motives of men.

I respectfully second the request that these facts be placed on the public records of the University.

Director Eugene Davenport, University of Illinois Agricultural Experiment Station:

DEAR SIR—As you are aware I have taken an active interest in the development of an enterprise by which a large number of Illinois farmers and land owners have obtained full control of an immense supply of the element phosphorus in the form of lands containing natural rock phosphate deposits. You are also aware that I thus assisted in making some provision for obtaining large quantities of this element at moderate expense, hoping that the adoption of a more nearly permanent system of agriculture by the farmers of Illinois might thus be made possible.

The specific object desired having been accomplished, I wish to report that I have now completely severed my connection with this enterprise, and I beg to submit the following statement of facts to yourself and if you please to the President and Trustees of the University, for permanent record. Because of the nature and possible importance of the subject, I ask the privilege of including in this statement some general information and explanations which seem to me essential to a fair understanding of the matter.

That the continued prosperity of Illinois depends very largely upon the profitableness and permanency of the agriculture of the State, is a truth evident to all. To my mind it is no less evident that the permanency and profitableness of Illinois agriculture is dependent upon the control of a supply of phosphorus far more than upon any other one thing.

It is estimated that the total rock phosphate deposits of the world thus far discovered will furnish between 150 million and 200 million tons. The present annual consumption is about 3,000,000 tons. Thus the total supply so far as now known will be exhausted in about fifty years, or in much less time if the rate of consumption increases in the future as it has in the past. The most extensive deposits known are in southern United States. About 1,600,000 tons are being mined annually from these deposits and more than 1,000,000 tons of this is exported to European countries.

Phosphorus is the plant food element which already limits the crop yields on at least 80 per cent of the soils of Illinois, and liberal applications of this element must be made to Illinois soils if their productive capacity is to be increased or maintained.

Steamed bone meal and raw rock phosphate are the two most economical commercial forms of phosphorus. They are natural products and they have absolutely no injurious effect on the land either immediate or subsequent. A good grade of either of these materials contains about 12½ per cent of phosphorus. They may be applied in any amount and will remain in the soil until removed by cropping. As much as five tons to the acre of ground rock phosphate containing 12½ per cent phosphorus have been applied by way of experiment without deleterious effects. This excessive quantity contains as much phosphorus as would be removed from the soil by fifty crops of corn of 100 bushels each, which is as much phosphorus as is contained in an acre of the ordinary corn belt soil to the depth of plowing and double the amount of phosphorus contained in the plowed soil of an acre of the commonest type of land in the Illinois wheat belt.

The use of acid phosphates, acidulated bone meal or acidulated manufactured so-called "complete" fertilizers is not advised for general farming on any Illinois soil, not only because they are exceedingly expensive for the relatively small amount of phosphorus which they contain, but also because of their ultimate injurious effect upon the soil.

This general information relating to phosphorus and Illinois soils has been given the widest possible publicity in Illinois during the past three years by means of Experiment Station bulletins and circulars, articles in the agricultural press, and addresses at farmers' institutes. Considerable quantities of steamed bone meal and hundreds of car loads of raw rock phosphate are already being used in this State, and with very gratifying increase in crop yields and satisfactory profits.

During the past four years I have been largely responsible for the investigation of Illinois soils. It was hoped that methods might be discovered whereby agriculture in this State might be made not only more profitable

but also permanent. The only obstacle which has seemed insurmountable to the accomplishment of this most desirable end has been the limited supply of phosphorus.

Some phosphorus can be saved in the manure made from the coarser farm products, and if all grains are also fed and some concentrated feeds purchased, such as bran and oil meal, the phosphorus content of the soil can be maintained and even increased without the purchase of any commercial phosphorus. But such a system can be adopted by only a limited number of the farmers of any state.

Steamed bone meal also furnishes phosphorus in an available and harmless form, and the fact that this comes originally from the farm is perhaps an additional reason why it should be returned to the farm; but the total supply of bone meal in this State is very limited compared with the phosphorus removed from Illinois soils.

The slag produced by the Illinois Steel Works has been investigated, but it has been found that the iron ore used in these works contains so little phosphorus that the slag produced in the process of converting the iron into steel has no value as a source of phosphorus.

Every possible source of this element of which I could conceive has been investigated, with the result that the only present adequate supply is found to be in the natural rock phosphate deposits and even these appear to be exceedingly limited when measured by the probable needs of future generations.

In the spring of 1904 I was rejoiced to learn of a large tract of phosphate land in western Tennessee, less than 200 miles from Cairo, which possibly could be secured for Illinois. I made this fact known to large numbers of Illinois farmers and land owners, announcements being published in the agricultural press that an effort was being made to obtain control of this phosphate property. Largely to induce others to assist in the enterprise, I invested, myself, as heavily as possible.

The effort was finally successful and this large supply of phosphorus is now controlled by people whose greatest interest is in Illinois agriculture. My only regret is that every Illinois farmer does not have absolute control of an unlimited supply of phosphorus for his own farm, as he already has of nitrogen and (in most soils) of potassium.

While it seemed necessary and wise for me to invest in the enterprise personally in order to encourage others to do so, it is not now necessary for me to retain my financial connection with it, although surely entitled to do so by any legal or moral standard of justice.

It has seemed best, however, to sacrifice this right and the future possibility of personal profit from the investment in order to avoid even unfair and unreasonable suggestions that might place any discount upon the advice which I gave two years before I knew of the possibility of this investment, and which I must continue to give, regarding the use of phosphorus on Illinois soils. Consequently I have severed my connection with this phosphate company and have absolutely no financial interest, direct or indirect, in any phosphate enterprise, except in the use of rock phosphate on my own Illinois farm.

I may add that some of my associates who share the responsibility for the investigation of Illinois soils gave financial support to this Illinois phosphate company; but, the end sought having become an established fact, they, too, without exception have already severed all connection with the enterprise or have taken steps to do so in the near future.

On motion of Mr. Bayliss it was voted that the President of the Board of Trustees and the President of the University be requested to report a general principle relating to and governing the financial relations of teachers in the University to other businesses and employments.

Upon recommendation of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds Professor Breckenridge was authorized to sell the horizontal fire tube boiler which is about to be removed from the power plant, the terms of sale to be agreed upon between him and the Business Manager.

RESIDENCE FOR THE DIRECTOR OF THE AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

Mr. Kerrick, from the joint committee appointed to report on providing a residence for the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, presented the following report, which, after discussion was referred to the next meeting of the Board for further consideration.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

Your Committees on Buildings and Grounds and on Agriculture, to which was referred the matter of providing an official residence for the Director of the Experiment Station and Dean of the Agricultural College, in joint meeting July 20th, after having the matter under consideration for some time, visited and inspected carefully the house now owned and occupied by Dean Davenport. It will be recalled by the members of the Board that about two years ago, Dean Davenport selected a lot on the west side of Wright street fronting the University Campus between the Library and Woman's Building, and offered to donate it to the University if the University saw fit to accept it and build thereon a suitable house for the official residence of the Director of the Experiment Station and Dean of the Agricultural College. The proffer, for what seemed a good reason at the time, was not accepted by the University. Nevertheless, it was the opinion of Dean Davenport and others interested in the Experiment Station and Agricultural College, that no more suitable site for an official residence for the Director and Dean could be found. In planning his residence which he afterwards built on his Wright street lot, this fact and the possibility that the property might sometime be chosen for an official residence for the Director of the Experiment Station and Dean of the Agricultural College was kept in mind. Your committees found a building which appeared to them to be exceedingly well adapted for an official residence for the Director of the Experiment Station and Dean of the Agricultural College. We carefully examined every apartment from cellar to garret. From one of the superintending architects (Professor White) we learned that the cost of the building was \$12,500. There are on file with the Secretary of the Board, estimates, vouchers, etc., showing that the house cost the sum named. The money seems to have been providently expended, and the house, to your committees, appears to be worth the money it cost. In estimating the value of the ground, your committees took the cost price, adding six per cent interest from the time Dean Davenport made the purchase. The lot, if vacant, would probably sell for considerably more than the amount now asked first of the University by Dean Davenport. Altogether, house and lot have cost \$16,500; and seeing the property is worth the money and is eligibly located and well adapted to the uses that will be required of it, we recommend the purchase by the University, at \$16,500.

There are two mortgages on the property—one for \$3,000 dated May first, and another for \$1,000 dated October first. These can be paid on the dates named, and possibly arrangements can be made to pay earlier.

We add to our report a memorandum of action taken at a meeting of the Agricultural College Advisory Committee, held at the University May 11, 1905. The members of this committee are A. P. Grout, President of the Illinois Live Stock Breeders' Association; H. A. Aldrich, President of the Illinois State Horticultural Association; Joseph Newman, President of the Illinois Dairymen's Association; E. E. Chester, President of the Illinois Corn Growers' Association; B. F. Wyman of Sycamore, President of the Illinois State Farmers' Institute; the latter, however, was not in attendance.

The matter of new buildings for the College of Agriculture provided for in the College appropriation passed by the 44th General Assembly was discussed.

Motions were unanimously carried, recommending to the Board of Trustees of the University that an official residence for the Dean and Director of the College of Agriculture and the Agricultural Experiment Station be provided, free of rent, as is customary in other leading institutions, and that the next building after the Dean's residence, should be a Farm Mechanics Building, to cost \$25,000.

Members of the Board will recall that the committee, the names of whose members are given above, is the same whose function it is to advise on what lines shall be expended the \$50,000 granted by the Legislature in section one of our Agricultural Bill.

Robert Watt Stark, Assistant in Chemistry in the Department of Agronomy, at a salary of \$840 a year, term of service to begin October 1, 1905.

A. A. Harding, Assistant Director of Military Band, at a salary of \$50 a year, and Teacher of Band Instruments in the School of Music, at a salary of \$200 a year, from September 1, 1905.

Harry F. Nightingale, Instructor in the Academy, at a salary of \$100 a month for ten months, beginning September 1, 1905.

A. R. Warnock, Assistant to Professor Clark in the Department of Rhetoric, at a salary of \$35 a month for the remainder of the academic year from October 1, 1905

Sophie M. Voss, Instructor in Preparatory Piano work in the School of Music, remuneration to be seventy-five per cent of the fees collected by the University from those taking her work.

C. P. A. DEGREE.

The Secretary reported that, pursuant to instructions given by the Board at the meeting of September 12, 1905, he sent to the Attorney General the papers submitted to the Board in case of Eric J. Everett, asking his opinion thereon, and in reply received the following letter:

STATE OF ILLINOIS, OFFICE OF ATTORNEY GENERAL,

SPRINGFIELD, October 12, 1905.

Mr. W. L. Pillsbury, Secretary Board of Trustees, University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois.

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your favor of the 11th inst. in regard to "An Act to regulate the profession of public accountants," approved May 15, 1903.

You ask for a construction of Section 3 of said Act, commonly referred to as the "Waiver Clause." This section reads as follows:

"The University of Illinois may, in their discretion, under regulations provided by their rules, waive all or any part of the examination of any applicant possessing the qualifications mentioned in Section 1, who shall have had five successive years' previous experience as a public accountant previous to the date of application, who shall apply in writing within one year after the passage of this Act and who shall have been practicing in this State as a public accountant on his own account for a period not less than one year next prior to the passage of this Act; also to any person who shall have been actively in practice as a public accountant for not less than five years next prior to the passage of this Act outside of the State of Illinois, who shall have passed an examination equivalent, in the opinion of the University of Illinois, to the examination to be held under the provisions of this Act."

The University of Illinois, pursuant to said Act, has established a University Committee on Accountancy. This Committee on Accountancy has adopted certain rules and regulations as to the conduct of examinations of candidates for certificates as certified public accountants and for issuing such certificates to persons coming within said Section 3 of said Act. These rules and regulations, so far as they relate to candidates for such certificates under said Section 3, are as follows:

Rule 7.

"This Committee shall also examine the papers of applicants under Section 3 of the law and shall certify to the President the names of those who are eligible under the section to receive the degree of certified public accountant."

Applications. Rule 1.

"Applicants for the degree of C. P. A. on the basis of previous practice, under section 3 of the law, shall file their applications with the University Committee on Accountancy, together with a sworn statement setting forth their age, legal residence, the length of time during which they have practiced, the place where such practice was had, and the time, place, and scope of examinations, if any, passed in accountancy."

Rule 3.

"Applicants for examinations, or for the degree under section 3 of the law, shall send a fee of \$25, payable to the University, in accordance with section 4 of the Act."

Examinations. Rule 11.

"The applications and credentials of applicants for the degree of C. P. A. on the basis of previous experience, under section 3 of the law, shall be examined by the board of examiners. If the credentials furnished by such an applicant are sufficient, in the judgment of the board of examiners, they

shall certify him to the University Committee for the degree of C. P. A., as in the case of applicants who seek the degree by examination. Diplomas shall be issued in the same way and under the same conditions as for applicants by examination."

From the above quoted rules and regulations, it is obvious that the University has, in its discretion, asserted that it will give such certificates to such candidates making application under section 3 of said Act having the qualifications mentioned therein.

The facts concerning which your inquiry relates appear to be as follows: A candidate has made application for such certificate under said section 3. From such application it appears that said candidate has fulfilled all the requirements provided for in said section 3 to the satisfaction of the University, with this exception—the candidate claims to have had five years of experience as a public accountant prior to October 27, 1903, but something more than a year of this five years was during the period of his minority, and the question is, whether under said section said five years' experience as a public accountant must have been wholly after the candidate had passed his minority.

Prior to the passage of this Act, there were no restrictions upon any person practicing the profession of a certified public accountant. The law does not prevent minors from practicing any calling not prohibited or regulated by statute simply because he is a minor. The proofs show that during the last year or more of the minority of this candidate he was in the active practice of the business of public accountant, as much so as if he had attained legal age. While minors are under certain disqualifications, yet any person who desired the services of an accountant could legally employ this candidate to perform such services, although he might be a minor at the time, and such person would be bound in law to pay said minor for the services so rendered.

As the University, in its discretion, has adopted rules and regulations for the issuing of certificates to candidates under said section 3, in accordance with the provisions of said section 3, it is my opinion that the candidate in question has fulfilled all the requirements of said section and the rules and regulations of the University and is entitled to receive his certificate of certified public accountant.

I return herewith the application of said candidate and all letters, statements and memoranda sent to me with your letter of the 11th inst.

After the reading of the opinion, it was ordered that in accordance therewith the usual certificate should be issued to Mr. Everett, conferring upon him under the waiver clause the degree of certified public accountant.

PURCHASE OF A HOUSE FOR THE DIRECTOR OF THE AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

Mr. Kerrick called up the report of the joint committee concerning the purchase of Professor Davenport's house as a residence for the Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, and moved its adoption.

While the discussion of the report was going on, it was voted to hold a special meeting of the Board in Springfield soon, next week if practicable.

Further consideration of the report was thereupon, at the suggestion of President James and upon motion of Mr. Kerrick, postponed until such special meeting.

THE AUDITORIUM.

The architect of the Auditorium, Mr. Blackall, made the following report:

URBANA, Oct. 20, 1905.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois:

I would respectfully report that I have received from Jobst & Sons, Builders, of Peoria, Illinois, preliminary estimates for constructing your Auditorium at a probable total expense not exceeding \$100,000. This would include the structure as shown by my plans as far back as the line of the proscenium opening but not including the stage or the rear wings. The building would be finished substantially as shown by my drawings, but would not include decorative paintings or sculpture or any landscape work or any piping,

steam or electrical work outside of the building, and the interior would be furnished very simply, but ready for occupancy. This building is planned for the site on the south campus which has been provisionally approved by you.

Upon motion of Mr. McKinley, the report was received, and Mr. Blackall was directed to prepare plans and specifications so that bids for the erection of the building upon the south site might be called for, keeping in mind in their preparation that the cost of construction must not exceed the appropriation, \$100,000.

Mr. Blackall asked that \$500 be appropriated for the construction of models of the building, and the appropriation was made.

Meeting of October 27, 1905.

The following call for a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was issued October 21, 1905:

"Upon the call of the President, Mr. Bullard, there will be a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois at the office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction in Springfield, Illinois, at three o'clock. p. m., Friday, October 27, 1905, for the purpose of considering the report of the joint committee relative to purchasing the house now occupied by Dean Davenport for a residence for the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, and any other business that may be brought before the Board."

When the Board was called to order the members present were Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Davison and Kerrick and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Busey and Mrs. Evans. Governor Deneen and Mr. Abbott came in a little later. President James was present.

Mr. McKinley, who had been elected to Congress, had handed to the Governor his resignation, and the Governor had appointed in his place Mr. Lewis L. Lehman of Mattoon. Mr. Lehman having qualified took his seat as a member of the Board.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM PRESIDENT JAMES.

1. A statement with regard to the organization of the School of Ceramics, and a recommendation that a kiln be constructed for the use of the School.

Referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act.

2. The recommendation that the salary of Mrs. Constance Barlow Smith be made \$110 a month for ten months beginning September 1, 1905.

On motion of Mrs. Evans, the recommendation was adopted.

A RESIDENCE FOR THE DIRECTOR OF THE AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

The report of the committee on the purchase of Professor Davenport's house for a residence for the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, the consideration of which had been postponed to this time, was then taken up. (See minutes of September 12, 1905, p. 270, and of October 19, p. 283.)

During the discussion which followed, Mrs. Alexander presented and had read a letter addressed to her by the Attorney General relative to the subject under consideration. (For this letter see page 288.)

Some members of the Board having said that it would be more satisfactory to them to have an opinion from the Attorney General addressed to the Board, Mrs. Alexander moved that the Attorney General should be asked to meet and confer with the Board.

The motion was lost by the following vote: Aye, Mrs. Alexander; noes, Governor Deneen, Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Lehman, Kerrick, and Davison, and Mrs. Evans and Mrs. Busey; absent, Messrs. Barber and McLean.

Mr. Kerrick moved to postpone the consideration of the question until the December meeting, and that the opinion of the Attorney General as to the legality of the proposed purchase be meanwhile asked by the Board.

The motion was lost by the following vote: Ayes, Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Kerrick, and Abbott and Mrs. Evans; noes, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Lehman and Davison, and Mrs. Alexander and Mrs. Busey; absent, Messrs. Barber and McLean.

The pending motion, to adopt the report of the committee recommending the purchase of a house was lost by the following vote: Ayes, Messrs. Bullard and Kerrick; noes, Governor Deneen, Messrs. Bayliss, Lehman, Abbott, and Davison and Mrs. Alexander and Mrs. Busey; absent, Messrs. Barber and McLean. Mrs. Evans was excused from voting.

The following resolution was adopted on motion of Dr. Davison:

Whereas the Forty-fourth General Assembly passed an appropriation bill in aid of the College of Agriculture and the Experiment Station, section one of which reads as follows:

"Section 1.—That it shall be the duty of the College of Agriculture to give thorough and reliable instruction in the economic production of crops; the treatment of the different soils of the State in such manner as to secure the largest returns from each and without impairing its fertility; the principles of breeding and management of live stock, including animal diseases and a thorough knowledge of the various breeds and market classes; the economic and sanitary production of dairy goods, and the best methods of meeting existing market demands and of extending and developing trade in the agricultural production of the State.

"That it shall be the further duty of said College to provide and maintain such live stock specimens, laboratories, apparatus and other material equipment, together with teachers of such experience and skill as shall make instruction effective.

"That to carry out the provisions of this section, there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of 50,000 dollars annually for the years 1905 and 1906—*Provided*, that the disposition of the funds from time to time to carry out the intent of this act shall be along lines agreed upon by the dean of the College of Agriculture and an advisory Committee consisting of the President of the following State Agricultural organizations, to-wit:—The Illinois Farmers' Institute, The Illinois Live Stock Breeders' Association, The Illinois State Horticultural Society, The Illinois Corn Growers' Association, and the Illinois Dairymen's Association," and

Whereas the Advisory Committee appointed by the act of the Legislature consisting of the following persons:

A. P. Grout, President of the Illinois Live Stock Breeders' Association.

H. A. Aldrich, President of the Illinois State Horticultural Association.

Joseph Newman, President of the Illinois Dairymen's Association.

E. E. Chester, President of the Illinois Corn Growers' Association.

B. F. Wyman, President of the Illinois State Farmers' Institute;

have agreed upon the recommendation that a part of the appropriation should be expended, in order to best carry out the intent of the Act, for the erection

or purchase of a house to be used as a residence for the Director of the Experiment Station and have so certified their recommendations to this Board and

Whereas, this Board is charged by the Act with the responsibility of using the moneys appropriated therein for the purposes severally set forth in the Act as stated in the latter part of Section 8 which reads as follows:

"Section 8.—Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to take away from the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois the usual authority conferred by law over the expenditure of moneys appropriated to said University. The recommendations of the Committees herein provided for shall be advisory, but the use of the moneys herein appropriated shall rest in the discretion of said Board for the purpose herein set forth, and said Board shall account therefor," and

Whereas, this Act does not clearly state that it was a part of the purpose of the law to provide a residence for the Director of the Experiment Station; but it does clearly charge that the College of Agriculture shall give thorough instruction in economic production of crops, treatment of soils, the principles of breeding live stock, and economic and sanitary production of dairy goods; and that the College shall provide and maintain live stock specimens, laboratories, apparatus and other material equipment and shall provide experienced teachers in order to satisfy the law in expenditure of the money appropriated, and,

Whereas, it is the desire of this Board in order that it may properly account for the moneys entrusted to it by the legislature to follow as definitely as possible the directions which the law gives in the expenditure of the money appropriated.

Therefore, be it resolved that it is the sense of this Board that it cannot concur in the recommendation of the Advisory Committee that a residence be erected or purchased for the Director of the Experiment Station and be paid for from the said fund.

On motion of Governor Deneen it was voted to print the following letter written to Mrs. Alexander as a part of the minutes of the meeting:

STATE OF ILLINOIS, OFFICE OF ATTORNEY GENERAL,

SPRINGFIELD, October 26, 1905.

Mrs. Carrie Thomas Alexander, Leland Hotel, Springfield, Illinois:

DEAR MADAM—Your favor of the 24th inst., duly received. You state that a meeting of the Trustees of the University of Illinois is about to be held, for the purpose of taking action on the matter of purchasing a residence for the Dean of Agriculture, and ask whether any of the funds appropriated for the College of Agriculture by the Appropriation Act of 1905 could be used for that purpose.

If any of the funds appropriated by said Act could be applied for such purpose, it would have to be from the fund of \$50,000 mentioned in the first section of said Act. This section states, in substance, that it shall be the duty of the College of Agriculture to give instruction in the economic production of crops; the treatment of different soils of the State; the principles of breeding and management of live stock; the economic and sanitary production of dairy goods; to provide and maintain live stock specimens, laboratories, apparatus and other material equipment, together with teachers of experience, etc., and \$50,000 is appropriated for such purposes. The other appropriations in said Act are for specific investigations and experiments.

It will be noticed that the appropriation in said section 1, in addition to the instruction designated, is for the provision and maintenance of live stock specimens, laboratories, apparatus and other material equipment, together with teachers. I can see nothing in this section nor in this Act which would authorize the Trustees to appropriate any of the funds mentioned for the purchase or construction of a residence for the Dean of the College of Agriculture. The Dean of the College of Agriculture would probably be classed as a teacher within the meaning of said section, but in making it the

duty of the College to provide and maintain teachers, it was the evident intention of the Legislature that the College should provide a salary for such teachers, and it cannot be construed as giving the College authority to erect residences for them.

Meeting of December 19, 1905.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Tuesday, December 19, 1905.

The members present were Messrs. Bullard, Davison, Lehman, McLean and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans, and Mrs. Busey; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Abbott, Barber, Bayliss, and Kerrick. President James was present.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the regular meeting of September 12, 1905, and the special meetings of October 17, 1905, and October 27, 1905. These minutes were approved as presented.

The vacancy on the Executive Committee, because of Mr. McKinley's resignation, was filled by the election of Mr. Lehman.

Mr. Bullard announced that he had appointed Mr. Lehman in place of Mr. McKinley on the following committees: Buildings and Grounds, College of Medicine, and Engineering, and that he had made Mr. Abbott chairman of the Committee on Engineering.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY THE PRESIDENT.

1. The Dean of the College of Literature and Arts approves a request of Professor Frederick, of the Department of Art and Design, for an appropriation of \$50 for the expenses of the public school drawing exhibit which is regularly held in the spring.

Voted that such appropriation be made.

2. The Dean of the College of Literature and Arts requests an appropriation of from three to five hundred dollars for the cost of a course in accounting in the College of Literature and Arts, of two hours a week from six to ten weeks during the second semester of the current academic year, the amount to be charged to the appropriation for instruction in commerce.

Voted that the President be given authority to make such appointment, and that the appropriation be made.

3. The Dean of the College of Engineering requests an appropriation of \$750 for general college expenses for the years 1905 to 1907, to be charged to the appropriation for Engineering College equipment.

Voted that such appropriation be made.

4. The Dean of the College of Engineering recommends the appointment of Mr. Edward L. Wenger as instructor in electrical engineering at a salary of \$130 per month, from December 1, 1905, to July 1, 1906.

Voted that such appointment be made.

CO-OPERATION WITH STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

5. The Acting Dean of the College of Science recommends a proposal of the Director of the State Water Survey, Professor Bartow, for a plan of cooperation between the State Board of Health and the State Water Survey. The State Board of Health agrees to appropriate \$1,000 to the University to pay the salary of an assistant in the State Water Survey department who shall undertake chemical and bacteriological investigations for the State Board of Health. It is understood that the University shall select and appoint the said chemist and bacteriologist. In case this arrangement is approved, the Director of the Water Survey asks authority to engage a chemist at a salary of \$1,000 to act as bacteriologist and chemist. The \$60 a month already allowed for a second assistant in the Water Survey, which place has not yet been filled, will be used for obtaining additional equipment, and in paying the transportation and traveling expenses of the representative of the Water Survey in a thorough study of the municipal water supply of the State.

Voted that this matter be referred to the President of the University with power to act.

MEDICAL STUDY AT THE UNIVERSITY.

6. The following communication in regard to the combined course in science and medicine is submitted by the faculty of the College of Science:

"To the Faculty of the College of Science:

The undersigned committee, appointed by the Dean, in accordance with an action of the general committee of this College, and instructed to report to the College faculty upon the relations of medical study at the University, respectfully reports as follows:

WHEREAS, the combined course in science and medicine offered by this University, consisting of three years' prescribed work in the College of Science and three years' work in the College of Medicine, is and always has been one continuous six years' course intended throughout as a thorough and liberal preparation for the student for the practice of medicine; and

WHEREAS, it contains all the scientific and professional matter of the ordinary four years' course at the Medical College, and much additional study of physics, chemistry, biology, and physiology prescribed because of their relations to the professional medical studies, together with modern language, rhetoric, mathematics, military, and physical training not required at the Medical College but regarded by us as useful to the physician and necessary to graduation with the liberal degree,

Resolved, that in our judgment this course unquestionably affords a much better general education and a materially better preparation for the practice of medicine than the four years' course of the Medical College, and that any discrimination against it as compared with this four years' course is unjust to the University, unfair to the student, and detrimental to the progress of medical education.

We consequently advise that this course be henceforth be called a medical course, and that students registering in it with a view to graduation from a medical college be classed as medical students.

We further recommend that such students be registered as members of the College of Medicine from the beginning of the third year of this six years' course, and that they be carried on the register of the University as candidates for the bachelor's degree in science during the fourth year of this course, at the end of which they become entitled to that degree.

We advise that University instructors who give instruction to students in this medical course in subjects required for the medical degree be regarded as instructors in the Medical College, and listed accordingly in the University publications.

We also recommend that authority be requested for the publication of a new circular concerning medical education at the University which shall be drawn up in accordance with the facts here recited and the views here

presented, and that a sufficient edition of such a circular be printed to reach every physician in the State, and every member of the graduating class of the current year from Illinois high schools.

A resolution offered by Dr. Davison with regard to conferring degrees upon such graduates was referred to the President.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR CHEMISTRY.

7. The following communication from Professor Grindley, approved by the Dean of the College of Science and by Professor Parr, requesting the assignment of the balance of the fund appropriated by the last Legislature for equipment and improvements in the chemical laboratory is herewith submitted:

"URBANA, ILL., November 25, 1905.

Dean E. J. Townsend, Natural History Building.

MY DEAR SIR—I respectfully request that the Trustees of the University be asked at their next meeting to appropriate \$15,000 of the \$20,000 which was granted by the last Legislature for equipment and improvements in the chemical laboratory.

The first \$5,000 of this amount has been used under the direction of Dean White in putting in additional desks and fixtures in the chemical building. It is desired to expend the \$15,000 as follows:

First, \$5,000 is to be used for making improvements in the laboratories of applied chemistry and in purchasing supplies for Professor Parr's work in technical chemistry.

Second, \$5,000 is to be used to continue the building of additional necessary desks, hoods, shelves, and for necessary plumbing in connection with the same in the several laboratories of the department.

Third, the remaining \$5,000 is to be used in purchasing permanent apparatus for the use of the several lines of work in the department. The apparatus referred to is as follows: Analytical balances, electrical appliances for physical chemistry such as thermostats, ammeters, galvanometers, voltmeters and motors, lecture apparatus, combustion furnaces, etc.

It is desirable that this money be made available at present although we do not expect, of course, to spend it during the current year. However, if it be made available now we can properly plan to spend it judiciously and to better advantage than we could otherwise.

Voted that the balance of the appropriation, amounting to \$15,000 be hereby assigned to be expended on the recommendation of the professors in chemistry approved by the President of the University.

8. The following request for an appropriation for additional microscopes and accessories in the physiological laboratory, made by the professor of physiology and approved by the Dean of the College of Science, is herewith submitted:

"Students for physiology 4 have been registering along until the class now shows a registration nearly double that of last year. We shall be short fifteen microscopes and accessories. The actual cost of the microscope outfits alone will be \$660. The accessories will be about \$30.00. We shall therefore absolutely require, say, \$700 for the outfits. If provision can be made for an extra hundred dollars to be used in case more students come it would be advisable.

I have tried to borrow microscopes from botany and from Zoölogy, but they will have all theirs in use,—except possibly a half dozen old stands, which are not in order, and repairs on these will not pay. Two students cannot use a microscope at once so I can not 'double.' Very respectfully yours,

GEORGE T. KEMP."

Voted that an appropriation of \$800 be made for the purchase of the desired microscopes and microscopic outfits in the physiological laboratory.

9. The Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station has requested that Professor Rietz of the department of mathematics, be permitted to do certain work in statistics for the Agricultural Experiment Station. He proposes to offer to Professor Rietz an opportunity for two months' service in the summer, to be exclusively devoted to this work. The Department of Mathematics joins in this request. The remuneration for the extra work in the summer would be \$300, which, added to the \$1,500 which Professor Rietz now receives as Assistant Professor of Mathematics, would make his total remuneration \$1,800 for eleven months' work. The departments join in the recommendation that Professor Rietz' salary be fixed at this sum, and that \$600 be charged to the Agricultural Experiment Station fund and \$1,200 to the general University fund.

Voted that Professor Rietz be permitted to do the work described and that his salary be \$1,800 a year from January 1, 1906, distributed as recommended.

10. Professor Stebbins requests that authority be given to let the contract for a small building and dome to cover the 4-inch telescope at the observatory.

Voted to refer to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, with power to act.

"The Director of the Experiment Station requests that authority be given to proceed with the construction of plans and the location of the farm mechanics building, which it is proposed to erect during the coming year, and which was authorized by a vote of the Board June 23, 1905. The building should be completed and ready for occupancy at the opening of the next college year in September.

Voted that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds and the Committee on Agriculture be requested to prepare and submit to the Board at its next meeting, proposals for the location of this building and plans for its construction.

12. The Director of the Experiment Station requests that the expense of making the Wright street extension and grading the grounds to be thrown into the general University campus should be charged to other than the Agricultural funds.

Voted that, inasmuch as this grading was an incident to the grading and preparation of the grounds and buildings intended especially

for the College of Agriculture and the Experiment Station, it is proper that the entire expense should be charged to the agricultural funds.

13. Robert Clinton Lloyd has tendered his resignation as Superintendent of the Soil Survey in the Agricultural Experiment Station, to take effect November 30, 1905, which resignation has been accepted.

14. The University Librarian requests that the following titles be used for the positions indicated, namely: Instead of the term Loan Desk Assistant, Loan Desk Librarian; instead of the term Order Assistant, Order Librarian; instead of the term Catalog Assistant, Catalog Librarian.

Voted that such changes in title be approved.

15. The University Librarian requests the appropriation of \$150 for a reviser in the Library School for three months at \$50 per month.

Voted that the President be authorized to appoint such reviser.

16. The University Librarian requests the addition to the Library staff an assistant whose work it shall be to provide for keeping up a continuation list. The duties of such person, among others, would be to keep track of all public documents, National, State and local, and such other reports of societies, organizations, etc., as may be of value to the Library. She estimates that such an assistant may be obtained for a salary of \$60 a month.

Voted that an appropriation of \$60 a month be made for a continuation assistant, and that the President be authorized to appoint such assistant.

17. The University Librarian requests that an appropriation of \$1,200 be made for shelving in the east reading room, east tower room, east basement room, and Library School room, and for a moving platform to connect the stack room on the main floor with the work room in the basement.

Voted that such appropriation be made.

18. The University Librarian requests that \$100 be appropriated to the library for student help in filing the Library of Congress catalog cards.

Voted that such appropriation be made.

19. The University Librarian requests the appropriation of \$150 for the final expenses of preparing the History of Illinois Libraries, upon which she has been working for three years.

Voted that such appropriation be made.

20. The University Librarian requests leave of absence from the University for three or four months, beginning January 1, 1906. It is understood that this in lieu of any claim for leave of absence on the ground of a "sabbatical" year, and that such leave of absence is conditional upon the Librarian finding and paying for a suitable substitute who shall be satisfactory to the President of the University.

Voted that the leave of absence be granted on conditions named.

21. The University Librarian recommends that the College Library be kept open Friday and Saturday evenings until 10:30 p. m. This recommendation is in answer to requests from the faculties of the College of Literature and Arts and of the College of Science that the Library be thus kept open. It is estimated that the extra cost would be about \$30 a month.

Voted that the Library be kept open each week day evening until 10:00 o'clock p. m., and the necessary appropriation be made for the extra cost involved.

HISTORY OF LIBRARIES OF ILLINOIS.

22. The Director of the *University Studies*, Dean Kinley, requests authority to write to the various libraries of the State and other libraries throughout the country, asking them to subscribe for the History of Libraries in

Illinois which the University Librarian has been preparing for the past three years, and, if a sufficient number of subscriptions be obtained to bring the cost of publication down to the average cost of one number of the *Studies*, that he be authorized to accept the volume as one of the *Studies* in the series and to proceed with the printing.

Voted that such authority be granted.

23. The Director of the Music School requests authority to canvass for a subscription to a fund for the purchase of a practice organ for the School of Music.

Voted that the subject of purchasing a practice organ for the School of Music be referred for report to the Committee on Students' Welfare.

24. The Director of the Department of Physical Training requests an appropriation of \$471.94 for the purchase of 144 gymnasium lockers.

Voted that such an appropriation be made.

A recess was then taken until 2:30 o'clock p. m.

Afternoon Session, December 19, 1905.

When the Board met after the recess the same members were present as in the morning, and President James presented further matters for consideration.

PRINTING PROCEEDINGS OF INSTALLATION WEEK.

25. The chairman of the Committee on Installation Exercises estimates that the total cost of publishing the proceedings of the various conferences will be about \$1,200.

Voted that Dean Kinley be made chairman of the publishing committee and that a sum not to exceed \$1,200 be hereby appropriated for publishing said proceedings, the vote being as follows: Yeas, Messrs. Bullard, Davison, Lehman, McLean, and Mrs. Busey and Mrs. Evans; present and not voting, Mrs. Alexander; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Barber, Bayliss, Abbott and Kerrick.

26. In answer to an inquiry of the President of the University, Professor James M. White states that, in his opinion, the chapel can be properly ventilated for an outlay of about \$800.

Voted that the matter of ventilating the Chapel be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act.

SCHOLARSHIPS AT SUMMER SESSION.

27. Dean Thomas A. Clark, the Director of the Summer Session, requests authority to make the same proposition in regard to high school scholarships for the coming Summer Session as was made for the last Session, namely: that a free scholarship should be granted to one member of the faculty of each high school in the State, such person being approved by the board of education, the principal of the high school and the superintendent of the school.

Voted that such arrangement may be made.

28. The chairman of the Committee on Installation submits, with his approval, a recommendation from Colonel Fehét, that the names of those juniors who drilled during installation week should be printed in the min-

utes of the Board, with an expression of the thanks of the Board, for their assistance in making the exercises of installation week the great success they were.

Voted that the list of names submitted be printed with the thanks of the Board in the minutes of this meeting.

29. The Board of Examiners of Public Accountants request a reconsideration of the action of the Board in granting a diploma as Certified Public Accountant to Mr. Eric J. Everett.

The Illinois Society of Certified Public Accountants protest, through their secretary, against the issuance of such a certificate to Mr. Everett, on the ground that he has not had the requisite five years' experience, and has not been practicing on his own account at any time.

Voed that this matter be referred to Messrs. Abbott and Davison with a request to examine into the matter and report to this Board; and that, in the meantime, the certificate be not issued to Mr. Everett.

SUPPLEMENTARY BUDGET OF COLLEGE OF MEDICINE.

30. Dr. D. A. K. Steele, Actuary of the College of Medicine, University of Illinois, submits herewith a supplementary budget, recommended by the Executive Faculty of the College of Physicians and Surgeons to the Trustees of the University for its adoption.

From the Minutes of the Executive Faculty: "Recommended for the immediate betterment of laboratory teaching, to go into effect this year: That the Department of Bacteriology be given a culture media assistant, to receive \$1.00 a day; two graduate assistants for the winter term and one graduate assistant for the summer term, each to receive \$100.00. That the Department of Embryology and Biology be given charts for each subject; that the number of dissecting microscopes be brought up to fifty; that the matter of the salary of the head of the department be referred to the Faculty; that the graduate assistants be paid \$100.00, the student assistants being already provided for. That the Department of Anatomy be given two paid student assistants as demonstrators; that there be built for the preservation of specimens several tanks to take the place of specimen jars, these tanks to be of such size that a large number of specimens or dissections could be kept in each; there should be also provided tables with drains so that the specimens could be used by students for purposes of study. It was considered that in this way the material in the museum could be used to better advantage by the students and at little expense.

That the Department of Histology be given two student assistants at \$50.00 each and one graduate assistant at \$100.00; that a set of charts be provided.

That the Department of Chemistry be given two student assistants, to receive full fees, and four student assistants at one-half fees. There were other recommendations from this department which it was not considered advisable to take up at this time.

That the Department of Clinical Microscopy be given one student assistant, to receive one-half fees.

The Department of Pathology had no recommendations to offer for immediate requirements.

The Committee also wishes to suggest that the supply room be kept open for all laboratories during laboratory periods, and also that the microscopes provided with oil immersion lenses be set aside for use in the laboratories of Bacteriology and Clinical Microscopy only, as the other laboratory courses do not require the use of the 1-12 lenses, and since there are 104 microscopes without 1-12 lenses, there would always be a sufficient number. It was considered advisable that a room be set aside for the stereopticon and projection apparatus, and that this room be at the disposal of the teachers requiring such apparatus in this work; the selection of the room to be left to the building committee; the stereopticon to be repaired and put in working order. This committee further wishes to recommend to the Faculty that the College make some provision for research work. This is the only institution of like size and standing from whose laboratories there comes no original work and the reasons for this condition of affairs are several: (1) The laboratory teachers are so overworked in the routine of teaching as to have no time for original scientific work; (2) lack of equipment; (3) lack of research scholarships, to stimulate interest in recent graduates who are capable of doing this line of work. The committee believes that in no better way could the reputation of the College be enhanced than by providing for work of this kind. That the opportunity for such work could be given at comparatively small expense to start with seems reasonably certain. An outlay of \$2,000.00 for equipment and the doubling of the present cost of running the laboratories would give a fair start. The committee also suggests that the museum be conducted on a plan by which the students would derive more benefit from the material in the museum, by being able to see and handle the specimens. To this end we suggest that the Librarian or some competent person be put in charge to catalogue in card system the specimens, to be present in the museum at certain hours in order that the specimens might be given out for study and to receive and catalogue new material. Also that a preparation man be employed, who shall have the care of the new material, replenishing of fluids, etc. In this way the museum, like the library, could be of great value to the students. Approved by the Executive Faculty Sept. 29, 1905.

Recommended that an expenditure of \$500.00 for the maintenance of the quiz class be made. Approved by the Executive Faculty Nov. 2, 1905.

Voted that such supplementary budget, with the appropriations therein recommended, are hereby approved.

31. The Class of 1906 request permission from the Board of Trustees to erect an ornamental gateway at the John street entrance to the campus.

Voted, on motion of Mr. McLean, that the Board of Trustees highly appreciates and commends the good will shown by the senior class in proposing to erect a memorial gate at the John street entrance to the University grounds; that, however, it anticipates that the cost of such a structure would probably be more than the class would wish to meet; and, further, that the plans of the grounds have not as yet been so definitely made as to warrant the erection at present of a memorial gate at the point named; and that, therefore, the Board suggests that the class committee confer concerning a memorial with the chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, Mr. A. S. Bullard.

32. The Director of the staff of the Engineering Experiment Station requests the appointment of Mr. Francis K. Ovitz as Assistant in Chemistry for the Engineering Experiment Station at a salary of \$75.00 per month, from Jan. 1 to July 1, 1906.

Voted that such appointment be made.

33. The Dean of the College of Science requests the appointment of a successor to Mr. Ovitz at a salary of \$70.00 per month, from Jan. 1 to July 1, 1906.

Voted that the President of the University be authorized to make such appointment.

34. Mr. Albert R. Curtiss, Instructor in the Woodshop of the Mechanical Engineering Department, has resigned, with the request that his resignation be accepted as soon as possible. The Dean of the College of Engineering recommends that his resignation be accepted, to date from Feb. 1, 1906, and that authority be given to appoint his successor at the same salary for the rest of the year.

Voted that the President of the University be authorized to make such appointment.

35. The Helvetia Milk Condensing Company of Highland, Illinois, has offered to give the University the sum of \$1,000.00 to establish a research fellowship in chemistry for a period of two years. The investigation to be made by this fellow is to be upon the value of evaporated cream as a food for infants.

Voted that while the Board of Trustees express their sincere appreciation of this kind offer, they do not see their way clear to accept it at present.

36. Under authority given by the Board of Trustees the following appointments have been made by the President of the University since the last meeting of the Board:

Miss Edith Williams, assistant in Woman's Gymnasium, at \$70.00 for the academic year, filling the place made vacant by the resignation of Miss Mary Davison.

Miss Florence Wilson, stenographer in the Vice President's office, at a salary of \$40.00 a month, beginning Nov. 1, 1905, vice Lulu M. Lego resigned.

Miss Eleanor Beardsley, instructor of Elementary Voice Students, to receive 75 per cent of their tuitions as her remuneration.

Frederick Post, Armorer and Administrative Assistant in Military Department, at a salary of \$45.00 a month for seven months, from Nov. 1, 1905.

R. B. Otis, instructor in General Engineering Drawing, for eight months, at a salary of \$80.00 a month, in place of G. W. Eckhard.

Earl D. Finch, stenographer in Law School, at a salary of \$15.00 a month, beginning Dec. 1, 1905.

Truman L. Kelley, stenographer in the Library, full time, from Jan. 1 to Sept. 1, 1906, at \$50.00 a month.

PRINTING AT THE REFORM SCHOOL AT PONTIAC.

37. The attention of the Board is called most earnestly to the fact that the claim made by the State Board of Prison Industries, that the University of Illinois must have all its printing done at the Reform School in Pontiac, is interfering seriously with the efficiency of the University work. It is doubtful whether the law ever contemplated including the University in the list of institutions subject to the provision of this convict labor law. And the question should be raised with the proper authorities whether the law applies to the University at all or not. If it be decided that it does, then an urgent representation should be made to the Board of Prison Industries to give releases from the provisions of the law, as they are authorized to do in all those cases in which insistence upon its provisions would embarrass the work of the University.

It is not an extreme statement to say that the University cannot be efficiently administered if its publications are to be hampered by the provisions of this law.

After considerable discussion the following resolutions, presented by Dr. Davison, were adopted:

1. WHEREAS, The Board of Prison Industries of the State of Illinois is classing the University of Illinois as one of the State institutions covered by the "prison labor law" and requiring the purchase of supplies from the penal institutions;

2. WHEREAS, the University of Illinois is not "a State institution owned, managed and controlled by the State of Illinois;"

3. WHEREAS—

(a) The University of Illinois is a corporate body that *has power to make contracts*, to sue and be sued, to acquire, hold and convey real and personal property, to make and establish by-laws and to alter or repeal the same for the management of its various departments (Charter),

(b) The title for United States land script was vested in the Trustees of the University of Illinois, and not in the State of Illinois,

(c) The real estate of the University of Illinois is vested in the Trustees and not in the State of Illinois,

(d) The State of Illinois is not responsible or liable for financial deficits beyond the appropriations by its Legislature,

(e) The Trustees are elected directly by the people;

4. WHEREAS, The University of Illinois is partially under Federal control—

(a) Certain departments partially directed by and required to report to the Secretary of Agriculture;

(b) The Secretary of the Interior is charged with the administration of the Morrill College Act of the United States Congress, under which the University of Illinois enjoys financial support;

(c) The University of Illinois is partly supported by Federal appropriations;

(d) Compulsory military instruction is given by a United States officer paid by the War Department; and,

5. WHEREAS, The Trustees of the University of Illinois believe that this institution should not be included by the Board of Prison Industries in the list of State institutions covered by the "prison labor law," and that such purchase of supplies is a hardship to the University by reason of excessive prices and loss of time; be it

Resolved, That an opinion of the Attorney General be asked covering the application of the "prison labor law" to the University of Illinois.

President James, Mr. Bullard and Mr. Lehman were on motion appointed a committee to present the resolution to the Attorney General.

WHEREAS, The College of Physicians and Surgeons, the medical department of the University of Illinois, is conducted as such by certain contractual relations by which it is to be acquired at the end of the period of contract; be it

Resolved, That the opinion of the Attorney General be asked covering the application of the "prison labor law" to the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

TIME FOR PRINTING MINUTES OF BOARD MEETINGS.

On motion of Mr. Lehman the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board hereby renews its instruction to its Secretary to print and distribute the minutes of each Board meeting within ten days after adjournment and sooner, if practicable, in order to facilitate the prompt transaction of University business.

ATHLETICS AT THE UNIVERSITY.

At the suggestion of President James, the following was adopted:

WHEREAS, There have appeared in the public prints charges that many of the larger institutions of learning of the country, this University among others, are using unworthy means of increasing their success in athletics, and thus admitting the spirit of professionalism into such contests; and,

WHEREAS, It is believed by many people that the dangers from injury to those engaging in the more severe athletic exercises of colleges should be reduced or the rougher games abolished entirely; therefore,

It is hereby ordered that a committee of five be appointed from this Board, with instructions to examine into and report to this Board upon the condition of athletics in this University, together with any recommendations which the committee may desire to make.

Mr. Bullard was by motion made chairman of the committee, and the committee was filled by the appointment of Mrs. Alexander and Messrs. Abbott, McLean and Davison.

EVENING SCHOOL IN ACCOUNTANCY.

Mrs. Alexander, from the Committee on Evening School in Accountancy, reported progress, and asked for further time. The request was granted.

PURCHASING AGENT.

It was voted that the salary of the Purchasing Agent, when appointed, should be \$1,800 a year.

ADVISORY BOARD OF THE SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

A communication was received from the Illinois State Pharmaceutical Association recommending several persons from whom a member of the Advisory Board of the School of Pharmacy might be chosen. The letter was referred to President James.

INSTALLATION COMMITTEES.

The following resolution offered by Mr. Bullard was adopted:

Resolved, That the amount of labor involved in preparing and executing the program for the week's exercises in connection with the installation of President James, and the very acceptable manner in which the work was done, make it a duty and pleasure for this Board to acknowledge the gratuitous services rendered by the general committee and the several sub-committees having this work in charge; and especially the efficient work of the chairman of the general committee, Dean Kinley. And this Board hereby expresses its thanks to each member of the several committees and commends them for the unstinted labor given to make the week's exercises the greatest ever held at the University.

Meeting of January 30, 1906.

The following call for a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was issued January 20, 1906:

Upon the call of the President, Mr. S. A. Bullard, there will be a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois at 9:00 o'clock a. m. Tuesday, Jan. 30, 1906, at the University, to transact such business as the President may have to lay before the Board, and also any other business duly presented.

When the Board was called to order the members present were Messrs. Abbott, Bullard, Davison, Kerrick, Lehman and McLean and Mrs. Alexander and Mrs. Evans; those absent were Governor Deneen and Messrs. Barber and Bayliss and Mrs. Busey. President James was present.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY THE PRESIDENT.

DONATION TO QUINE LIBRARY.

1. Dr. William E. Quine has given notice that if his offer of an endowment fund of \$25,000.00 for the support of the library of the College of Medicine is not formally accepted by the Trustees of the University on or before Jan. 1, 1908, the proffer will be withdrawn and cease to be operative on that date.

Voted that this matter be referred to the Committee on the School of Medicine and the President with the request that they interview Dr. Quine and report as to what may be feasible or desirable in regard to this subject.

ADVISORY BOARD OF THE SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

2. The Illinois State Pharmacy Association has submitted the following list of five names from which the Trustees are expected to appoint one member of the Advisory Committee of the School of Pharmacy, in place of Mr. Bennett of Urbana, whose time has expired: George R. Baker, Herman Fry, W. T. Adams, Albert Zimmerman, Frank Thomas.

It was voted that Mr. Frank Thomas, of Cairo, Illinois, be appointed on the Advisory Committee on the School of Pharmacy.

GRADUATE SCHOOL.

3. The Senate of the University has made a formal recommendation to the Trustees that a special faculty of the Graduate School be constituted which shall have charge of the Graduate School in the same way and to the same extent as other faculties have charge of their respective schools and colleges.

Voted to approve said recommendation.

4. I recommend that Professor David Kinley be appointed Dean of the graduate faculty (in place of Dean Burrill, resigned) and Director of the courses in commerce, at a salary of \$4,000.00 a year; said appointment and salary to date from Feb. 1, 1906.

A motion to adopt this recommendation was postponed until the afternoon session in order that the Board might have a report as to balance available for further appropriations.

AUDITORIUM.

Mr. Blackall, architect of the Auditorium, presented plans and a model of the proposed building, also plans for the grounds of the University. Upon motion of Mr. Abbott, the Board voted to go into committee of the whole for the consideration of these.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

The committee rose, and through its secretary, reported that it had organized by the choice of Mr. Bullard as chairman and Mr. Pillsbury as secretary; and that it made the following recommendations:

1. That an appropriation of \$250.00, or so much thereof as may be needed, be made in order that the architect may get expert advice upon his plan of the grounds.
2. That bids be called for for the erection of the Auditorium, according to the plans and specifications prepared by the architect.
3. That the plans and specifications be first submitted to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for approval.

Upon motion of Mr. Abbott, the report of the committee of the whole was adopted as presented.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds was authorized to advertise for bids for the construction of the Auditorium.

FIRE ALARM.

Mr. Abbott, who had been charged with the installation of a fire alarm system, reported that he had tested the efficiency of the alarm on two occasions, and that on the second occasion there had been a very prompt response on the part of the fire department of the University, as well as a considerable number of students.

ELECTRICAL EXHIBIT.

Mr. Abbott reported that at the electrical exposition held recently in the Coliseum in Chicago our electrical department and the electrical departments of several other institutions were represented, and that their exhibits attracted a great deal of attention. He said, further, that the exposition was very successful and that a similar exposition would doubtless be made hereafter annually, and that it would be a good thing for the University if we took pains to make a creditable exhibit next year.

The Board took a recess to meet at 2:00 o'clock p. m.

Afternoon Session.

When the Board met after the recess the same members were present as in the morning.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY THE PRESIDENT.

DEAN OF GRADUATE SCHOOL.

The motion to adopt the President's recommendation with regard to the Dean of the Graduate School was passed.

5. I recommend that the statutes of the University be so amended as to make the Vice President of the University and the Dean of the Graduate School both members of the Council.

Voted that said recommendation be approved.

DEAN OF COLLEGE OF LITERATURE AND ARTS.

6. I recommend that Prof. Evarts B. Greene be appointed Acting Dean of the College of Literature and Arts at a salary of \$2,500.00 a year. Appointment and salary to date from February 1, 1906.

Voted that said recommendation be approved.

DEPARTMENT OF RAILWAY ENGINEERING.

7. I submit herewith a communication from the College of Engineering in regard to a Department of Railway Engineering:

“UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS, Jan. 30, 1906.

“*Professor James M. White, Acting Dean of the College of Engineering:*

“DEAR SIR—Your committee, to which was referred the communication of President James, concerning the establishment of a school for railway service, begs to submit the following report:

“We have carefully considered the President’s communication and are of the opinion that it is very desirable to increase greatly the amount of attention given to railway subjects. But, in our opinion, it is better to organize a Railway Engineering department in the College of Engineering than to establish a school somewhat upon the plan of the School of Education. Already the College of Engineering has most cordial relations with various railroad interests. For example, many graduates of the civil engineering department occupy positions of prominence on several of the great railroad systems and for several years the department of mechanical engineering has been coöperating with the Illinois Central and Big Four Railroads in carrying on an extensive series of trials relating to locomotive performance and train resistance, for which these roads have borne the major portion of the expense. And the Department of Electrical Engineering has recently purchased an electrical dynamometer car and is now about ready to operate it on the lines of the Illinois Traction Company. So far as it is known, no other educational institution in the world has any similar equipment or opportunities for this important work.

“Three distinct lines of railway work should be offered; one in civil engineering, one in mechanical and electrical engineering and one in railway administration.

“1. We suggest, as a tentative outline, that a course be offered in railway civil engineering, to consist of the present civil engineering course to the end of the first semester of the junior year; that in the second semester of the junior year a comparatively small amount of railroad instruction be offered, and that in the senior year a considerable amount be given.

“2. A course should be offered in railway mechanical and electrical engineering differing from the present course in mechanical and electrical engineering by giving special emphasis to car and locomotive design, locomotive performance, train resistance, electric traction, etc.

“3. A course in railway administration should be arranged by combining the subjects common to the present civil, electrical and mechanical engineering courses, with such subjects from the Department of Economics as principles of economics, economic history, commercial geography, railway management, railway systems, etc., and possibly some of the special topics in the railway engineering courses proposed above.

“To carry out this work would necessitate the employment of a head of the department, who would probably do part of the work above; but we are of the opinion that he should not be burdened with any large amount of teaching, so that he could be free to attend meetings of railway associations and present papers upon railway subjects, and also to visit railroad men at their offices.

“In addition, there should be a strong man employed to do the chief technical work in the proposed course in railway mechanical and electrical engineering; and if at first there are not many students in this course he could employ his time with profit in working up and publishing the results of tests already made with the mechanical engineering dynamometer car and in planning and carrying out additional investigations with the mechanical and electrical engineering dynamometer cars. There is now in the mechanical engineering department an instructor in railway mechanical engineering who is doing some work along these lines. And if the Department of Railway Engineering is established it would probably be wise to transfer the above instructor to the new department.

"A third man would probably be required to act as general assistant to the head of the department to look after his classes in his absence. It would be wise also to give the new head of this department considerable stenographic assistance.

"If the above propositions should be made for railway instruction, the University of Illinois would be very much in advance of any other institution on the continent. No institution attempts to emphasize more than one of the three lines of instruction mentioned above, and in the opinion of your committee the provisions here recommended are greater than those possessed by any one of the institutions offering any similar work. Your committee begs to express the hope that the University may vigorously enter upon the above work at an early day.

"In view of the foregoing, your committee begs to make the following recommendations:

"1. We recommend that a Department of Railway Engineering be established in the College of Engineering.

"2. We recommend the appointment, as head of the new department, a man who has had considerable pedagogical experience on railroad lines and who has an acquaintanceship and a standing with railroad men. Your committee is unanimously of the opinion that Professor William D. Pence, a graduate of this institution, a former member of the engineering faculty and at present Professor of Civil Engineering at Purdue University, is abundantly qualified for this position and is the most desirable man known to any of us. For several years past he has served as editor of the publications of the American Railway Engineering and Maintenance of Way Association, the leading association of railroad men in the United States.

"3. We further recommend the appointment of an associate professor of railway mechanical and electrical engineering.

"4. We also recommend the appointment of an instructor in railway civil engineering to act as an assistant to the head of the department.

"5. We recommend the employment of an additional stenographer and typewriter for the College of Engineering, chiefly because of the needs of the new department.

"The total additional cost of the proposed innovation would be about as follows:

1. Professor of railway engineering in charge of the department	\$2,500 00 to \$3,000 00
2. Associate professor of railway mechanical and electrical engineering.....	2,000 00 to 2,500 00
3. Instructor in railway civil engineering.....	1,000 00 to 1,200 00
4. Stenographer and typewriter	600 00 to 900 00
Total.....	\$6,100 00 to \$7,600 00

I recommend that a new department be created in the College of Engineering, to be known as the Department of Railway Engineering and Administration, and that the expense of this department be charged to the special fund for the enlargement and equipment of the Engineering College and Engineering Experiment Station; and that a sum not to exceed \$7,600.00 be set apart for the payment of salaries in this department for the academic year 1906-07; and that the President be authorized to proceed with the announcement and organization of said department and to nominate incumbents for the necessary positions.

Voted that said recommendation be approved.

8. Mr. George F. Schwartz, instructor in violin in the School of Music, wishes to spend a year in Europe for further study. It is very desirable, indeed, that the members of our staff be encouraged to take a year's leave of absence now and then for the purpose of preparing themselves still better

for their work, and we ought to extend every reasonable facility in our power in all such cases. As Mr. Schwartz is instructor and his term of office is annual, we can not, of course, give him leave of absence in the ordinary sense of the term, but I recommend that he be appointed instructor in violin in the University for the academic year beginning Sept. 1, 1907, his salary to be fixed at the time the budget for the year 1907-08 is prepared.

Voted that said recommendation be approved.

9. Assistant Professor F. G. Frink desires to resign his position as assistant professor of civil engineering, to take effect Sept. 1, 1906.

It was voted that said resignation be accepted.

10. I beg leave to inform the Board that in accordance with the authority vested in me at a previous meeting, I have appointed Mr. W. A. Chase of Chicago lecturer on accountancy in the University at a salary of \$400.00 for twenty lectures.

11. Professor D. T. Randall of the Engineering College has submitted his resignation, to take effect Sept. 1, 1906.

Voted that said resignation be accepted.

DEPARTMENT OF MODERN LANGUAGES.

12. I recommend that the President of the University be given authority to offer Professor Gustav E. Karsten a professorship of German and the headship of the Department of Modern Languages in the University at a salary of \$3,000.00 per year, service and salary to begin Sept. 1, 1906.

This is on the understanding that the *Journal of English and Germanic Philology*, hitherto edited by Professor Karsten, be continued by him, be published in Urbana, be issued at least four times per year, and that it be indicated on the title page that it is published under the auspices of the University of Illinois.

In case the above arrangements be made, I recommend that an appropriation of \$500.00 be made for the year 1906-07 toward the support of the *Journal of English and Germanic Philology*, and further, that a special appropriation of \$500.00 be made for the purchase of books and other necessary material for the advanced work in the Department of Modern Languages.

Voted that the above recommendations be approved.

DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY.

13. I recommend that the President of the University be authorized to offer Professor W. A. Noyes of Washington, D. C., a professorship of chemistry and the headship of the Department of Chemistry and the directorship of the chemical laboratory of the University at a salary of \$3,500.00, salary and work to begin Sept. 1, 1906.

Voted that such recommendation be accepted.

GRADUATE SCHOOL STUDENTS AND MUSIC.

14. It seems that members of the Graduate School have thus far been excluded from the privilege extended to college students in the matter of fees in the Music School.

Voted that students who are residents of Illinois, including members of the Graduate School who pay the full incidental fee, will, if they are matriculated, pay for instruction in music of college grade no additional fee.

15. I recommend that Mr. Junius S. Krehbiel be appointed instructor in ceramics at a salary of \$75.00 a month from Feb. 1, 1906, his salary to be charged to the School of Ceramics.

Voted to approve said recommendation.

16. The faculty of the College of Agriculture recommends that a new course be announced in that college, to be known as landscape gardening.

Voted that this matter be referred back for further consideration.

SADDLES AND BRIDLES.

17. The head of the Military Department requests the purchase of four horse equipments for the use of the Military Department of the University. It is estimated that the cost would not exceed \$122.00.

Voted that said horse equipments be purchased.

18. The Class of 1906 requests permission of the University Board of Trustees to place a sun-dial on the campus as a class memorial.

Voted that such permission be given and that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds be authorized, in cooperation with the class committee, to select a suitable site.

19. I recommend that an assistant professorship in geology be created at a salary not to exceed \$1,500.00, and that the President of the University be authorized to look for a suitable incumbent for the year 1906-07.

Voted that said recommendation be accepted.

20. I submit a communication from the caretaker of grounds in relation to a needed addition to the greenhouses.

Voted that the communication be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for a report.

ENGINEERING EXPERIMENT STATION.

21. I submit certain proposals from the staff of the Engineering Experiment Station for the assignment of \$10,000.00 of the sum set aside in the budget for 1905-06 for the Engineering Experiment Station:

The preliminary budget No. 1 of \$20,000.00 was approved at the meeting of the Board on July 21, 1905.

The equipment for "Boiler Trials with Illinois Coals" is now nearly ready. Some experiments in the Department of Civil Engineering are being arranged on the "Distribution of Pressure of Granular Masses." For this work two additional assistants will be needed. I, therefore, recommend:

1. The appointment of an Experiment Station assistant in charge of "Fuel Tests," at a salary not to exceed \$1,600.00 for twelve months.

2. The appointment of an Experiment Station assistant in civil engineering, at a salary not to exceed \$90.00 a month, for twelve months.

It will be very desirable to have the cooperation and advice of representative Illinois organizations and industries in some matters concerning certain tests of importance which are from time to time projected. I have accordingly invited the following organizations to appoint one of their members to act on a conference committee concerning the proposed "Boiler Trials with Illinois Coals:"

- The Western Society of Engineers.
- The Western Railway Club.
- State Electric Light Association.
- State Geological Survey.

Illinois Manufacturers' Association.

Illinois Coal Operators' Association.

The Building Managers' Association of Chicago.

Similar committees will doubtless be desirable relating to the tests of "Materials of Construction;" "Electric Traction" and "Tests of Municipal and Sanitary Appliances." It is my belief that the appointment of such committees will do much towards securing an interest in our work, and that it will place us in such relations to the various State organizations as will enable us to secure their help when needed to support an extension of the work of the Engineering Experiment Station. It is probable that one meeting a year will be all that is necessary at the University; additional matters can be taken up by letters. I believe that we should expect to pay the ordinary traveling expenses and hotel bills of the members of such conference committees. It is probable that \$500.00 a year would provide for all such expenses. I, therefore, recommend:

(a) That the Director be instructed to approve of the expenses of such members of conference committees as may be invited to confer with the Station Staff on matters relating to tests projected by the Engineering Experiment Station.

(b) That the appointment of all conference committees made by the Station Staff of the Engineering Experiment Station must first receive the approval of the President.

(c) That \$500.00 be appropriated for the expenses of such conference committees, to be paid from the reserve fund of \$15,000.00 specified in Item 15a of appropriation for the Engineering College and Experiment Station. (See Board meeting report, July 21, 1905.)

The above budget and recommendations were submitted to the Station Staff at a regular meeting held Jan. 29, 1906, and were approved by them.

The motion to adopt the recommendations, subject to approval by the President, prevailed by the following vote: Yeas, Messrs. Abbott, Bullard, Davison, Lehman, McLean and Mrs. Evans; nay, Mr. Kerrick; present and not voting, Mrs. Alexander; absent, Governor De-
neen and Messrs. Barber and Bayliss.

Mr. Kerrick filed the following explanation of his vote:

Mr. Kerrick votes "no" because the plan recommended involves the appointment by private organizations of committees who may travel, board and lodge at State expense, while there has been no legislation looking to the appointment of such committees or providing for the payment of the expenses incurred by them.

22. I have not yet had time to prepare my bill for traveling expenses during the time since I have been President of the University. I hope to present the bill shortly, and would be glad to have the Board make some order for its payment upon approval by the proper committee.

Voted that the President's bill for traveling expenses be paid after it has been approved by the Finance Committee.

A request by Mr. Huff, Director of the Men's Gymnasium, for seats near the swimming tank was approved.

A communication from Professor Shattuck, Comptroller, with regard to finances was referred to the Finance Committee.

RESIDENCE FOR DIRECTOR OF THE AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

Mr. Kerrick moved that the house now occupied by Professor Davenport be rented for the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and Dean of the College of Agriculture, at \$1,000.00 per year.

On motion of Mr. Lehman, the question was referred to the Committee on Agriculture and the Committee on Buildings and Grounds to investigate and report at the next regular meeting.

On motion of Mr. McLean, Nathaniel Hay was appointed Purchasing Agent for six months from February 1, 1906, and it was ordered that he should furnish a satisfactory bond to the amount of \$10,000.00.

The Board adjourned.

Meeting of March 13, 1906.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the University at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Tuesday, March 13, 1906.

The members present were Messrs. Abbott, Bullard, Davison, Kerick, Lehman, McLean and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans and Mrs. Busey; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Barber and Bayliss. President James was present.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the regular meeting of December 19, 1905, and the special meeting of January 30, 1906. These were approved as presented.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Election of officers for the ensuing year being in order, on motion of Mrs. Evans, Mr. Bullard was elected President.

On motion of Mr. McLean, W. L. Pillsbury was elected Corresponding and Recording Secretary and Registrar.

Mr. Lehman and Mrs. Alexander were elected to constitute, with the President of the Board, the Executive Committee.

Professor Shattuck was elected Comptroller.

O. E. Staples was elected Chief Clerk.

BOND OF PURCHASING AGENT.

The bond of Mr. Nathaniel Hay, Purchasing Agent, in the sum of \$10,000.00, by the American Surety Company of New York, was presented by Mr. McLean, chairman of the Finance Committee, with the recommendation that it be approved and filed with the Secretary.

The recommendation was adopted.

AUDITORIUM.

President James submitted letters from Mr. C. H. Blackall, the architect of the Auditorium, and Olmstead Brothers, who were invited by the authority of the Board of Trustees to inspect the campus of the University and make suggestions as to plans for the present and the future.

Mr. Lehman moved to concur in their recommendations.

Mr. Bullard offered the following substitute:

WHEREAS, the law making the appropriation for an auditorium building for the University states that the money therein appropriated is for a complete auditorium building; and

WHEREAS, this Board is asking \$200,000.00 of the Legislature for an auditorium and music building had in view a single building so constructed that the music department could be accommodated in the building; and

WHEREAS, in appropriating \$100,000.00 for an auditorium it is evident that it was not made clear to the Legislature that a single building was desired but that two buildings were wanted so connected as to promote the interests and usefulness of both, one of which could readily be erected without the other; and,

WHEREAS, for the appropriation of \$100,000.00 only an incomplete auditorium can be erected, as evidenced by the proposals we have received from published calls for the erection of such a building; and,

WHEREAS, the building which has been planned and on which proposals have been received is not large enough for the purposes of an auditorium in this University, the greatest seating capacity being 2,600 persons when it should be 3,500 persons; and,

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board in the erection of this building to conform to the law making the appropriation which calls for a complete building, and it is further good policy for this Board in all its actions to keep absolute good faith with the Legislature; and again it seems necessary to erect a larger building than our plans call for now; therefore,

It is hereby ordered that the erection of this building be postponed for fifteen months and until the next Legislature shall express its will upon the construction of this auditorium.

That the President of the University and the Board ask the Legislature to re-appropriate the \$100,000.00 already appropriated and appropriate \$150,000.00 more for the purpose of erecting a larger and complete building.

That in the event the Legislature refuses to enlarge the appropriation that it be asked to authorize this Board to erect this incomplete building as contemplated by the present plans.

That the contractor, who is the lowest bidder, be asked to enter into bonds for \$5,000 that he will take the building within fifteen months at his proposition now submitted, with the mutual privilege of increasing or decreasing the amount of the proposal by the increase or decrease of the cost as compared and made known by a *bona fide* schedule of his proposal which he is requested to present with his bond.

On motion of Mr. Abbott, the substitute was laid on the table by the following vote: Ayes, Messrs. Abbott, Davison, Kerrick, Lehman and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans and Mrs. Busey; no, Mr. Bullard; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Barber and Bayliss

Mr. Bullard offered the following substitute:

Ordered, that the architect be asked to restudy the scheme for an auditorium and present to this Board additional sketches for a complete auditorium as required by the law, and recommend a location for it on our campus.

For this Mr. Lehman offered the following substitute, which was adopted:

Ordered, that the architect be requested to restudy the scheme for the auditorium as to its south side, to be within the limit of appropriation, and to report forthwith.

The Board then took a recess until 2 :00 o'clock p. m.

Afternoon Session March 13, 1906.

When the Board met after the recess, the same members were present as during the forenoon session.

On motion of Mr. Abbott, it was voted that when the Board adjourned for the day it adjourn until 9:00 o'clock Wednesday morning, and that the question of the Auditorium be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with instructions to report at that time.

STREET RAILWAY CROSSING CAMPUS.

The following letter was received with regard to allowing the street railway to cross the University campus:

CHAMPAIGN, ILL., March 2, 1906.

To the Trustees of the University of Illinois:

GENTLEMEN: In connection with the building of the new auditorium verbal communications have been carried on about our building a line for street cars across the University grounds between Daniel street on the west and California avenue on the east, passing between the Chemical and Agricultural buildings, and north of the Woman's building.

I submit herewith plat of the grounds at that point, showing the proposed line, and ask that the Board of Trustees authorize the President of the Board of Trustees to execute with us a contract giving permission to us to construct and operate this line for a period of twenty (20) years. The tract to be maintained in the manner of the tract now on Green street.

It is important that this should have prompt action, therefore I will ask that you give it such consideration.

With regard to this request, President James recommended that permission to cross the campus at the point indicated be granted. He further submitted certain recommendations as to the conditions on

which such permission should be granted; which after full discussion and after being amended in various particulars were adopted in the following form:

1. That prior to the construction of the track across the campus from California avenue to Daniel street the interurban road shall remove its tracks, poles, etc., from the present right of way across the campus to Springfield avenue, and it shall grade and sod the present right of way as the University may direct.

2. That the street car company as soon as its track across the campus from California avenue to Daniel street is available for use shall take up the rails at present on Green street and resod the track from Matthews avenue to Wright street, provided that upon the demand of the Board of Trustees of the University the company shall restore the tracks upon Green street.

3. That the street car company in constructing its line across the campus from California avenue to Daniel street shall thereby admit the correctness of the claim always made by the University and indorsed by the Attorney General of the State that said street car company in crossing the campus is a "mere tenant at will" of the University and occupies said right of way at the discretion of the University; and that it hereby promises to vacate any crossing at the demand of the Board of Trustees of the University, especially that at any time after five years, upon six months' notice, it will change its line from California avenue to Daniel street to a point further south on the campus which may be designated by the Board of Trustees.

4. That the street car company shall erect within the University property at points to be designated by the Trustees, two neat and comfortable waiting rooms, one on each of the lines crossing the campus, the plans to be agreed upon between the company and the University.

5. That the company shall use trolley wire and poles of ornamental design approved by the University.

6. That the company shall issue such form of rules as may be prescribed by the Board of Trustees.

7. That the company hereby agrees to accept and comply with such regulations as to signals, rate of speed in crossing the campus, points of stopping within the campus, etc., as the Board of Trustees of the University may determine.

8. That the company shall operate its cars on the ten-minutes interval at least up to 11:30 p. m. in such a way that the last cars from the campus for Urbana and Champaign respectively shall leave at least as late as 11:30 p. m.

President James and Mr. Abbott were appointed a committee to confer with the street car company with regard to this matter.

MATTERS SUBMITTED BY THE PRESIDENT.

The President submitted the following matters for the consideration of the Board.

1. The Head of the Department and the Dean of the Engineering School unite in nominating John Charles Thorpe as Assistant Professor of Stem Engineering, in place of Professor Randall, resigned, at a salary of \$1,700.00 per year, work and salary to begin Sept. 1, 1906.

Voted to adopt this recommendation.

2. The Head of the Department of Physical Culture urges that the salary of Mr. Hana, Assistant Director of Physical Training, be fixed for the coming year at \$1,000.00, to begin Sept. 1, 1906.

It was voted to adopt this recommendation.

3. The Professor of Psychology urges that an instructorship in Physiological Psychology be created in his department, with a salary not to exceed \$1,000.00 per year.

It was voted to adopt the recommendation, and that the President be authorized to select a suitable candidate for the place.

4. The Faculty of the College of Science recommends that an Administrative Board of Museums be created, consisting of the curators of the various collections now in the possession of the University, with general responsibility for the supervision and care of these collections.

It was voted to adopt the recommendation, and that the President be authorized to nominate the members of such board for the ensuing year.

5. The University Senate recommends that a new grade of instructor be established in the University, to be known as Associate, and of a rank between instructor and assistant professor, and that associates be appointed for a definite term of two years or more.

Voted that such recommendation be adopted.

6. The University Senate recommends that the Senate be enlarged so as to include all the full professors in the University.

Voted that such recommendation be adopted.

7. The University Senate recommends that the degree of bachelor of arts be conferred upon John C. Dallenbach at the next annual commencement. Mr. Dallenbach has taken up three years in the six-year medical course of this University and is now taking his fourth year in the medical department of the University of Pennsylvania.

Voted that this recommendation be adopted.

8. The following report, made to the Senate by its committee on educational policy upon the question of granting the bachelor's degree in the six years' medical course, was approved by the Senate March 5, 1906:

"Your committee has been asked by the Council of Administration to report to this body upon the inquiry whether it is sound educational policy for the University to decline to give its bachelor's degree to students who have taken here three years of our six years' medical course and have fulfilled the requirements for the fourth year of that course at some other medical college than the College of Physicians and Surgeons in Chicago. Your committee has carefully considered this question, and believes that it would be an injurious policy so to limit the University action in respect to this degree. The six years' course leading to two degrees was organized and offered for the primary purpose of inducing as large a number of prospective physicians as possible to take a sound scientific college training in connection with their professional studies. The effect of the suggested restriction would be to discourage from taking this course with us all those who do not intend to graduate in medicine at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, and would thus defeat in a measure the purpose of the offering.

"According to our present system, a student who has taken his three years of medical work here, and a fourth year of work equivalent to that prescribed by us at a medical school of high standing, has earned his bachelor's degree and should not be deprived of his right merely because he has chosen one medical college rather than another. As the professional school itself cannot grant this degree, it must be given by the University or not at all."

9. The Director of the School of Music recommends that the salary of Mr. Van den Berg, instructor in piano, be fixed at \$1,500.00 for the academic year, 1906-07, beginning Sept. 1, 1906.

Voted to adopt this recommendation.

10. The Head of the Department of Modern Languages and the Dean of the College of Literature and Arts recommend that a position be created for the teaching of Spanish, the rank not to exceed Assistant Professor, at a salary not to exceed \$1,500.00.

Voted that the recommendation be adopted and that the President be authorized to nominate candidates for such position.

11. The Department of Physical Culture submits a petition that the old agronomy warehouse on the south campus, which has been abandoned by the Agricultural College, be assigned to the use of the athletic department and that the instructor of physical culture be authorized to make such changes in the building as are indicated in the schedule herewith submitted.

Voted to refer this subject to the Buildings and Grounds Committee with power to act.

12. Mr. Fred Atkinson, Superintendent of Grounds, has submitted his resignation to take effect as soon as may be convenient.

Voted that the President may accept the resignation as soon as he thinks best.

13. A suggestion has been made that it will be well to call a national conference to discuss the subject of fraternities and their place and function in modern university life.

It was voted that the President of the University be authorized to call such a national conference to meet at the University of Illinois during the latter part of October, 1906.

14. The Secretary of State, Mr. Elihu Root, has invited the President of the University to accept an appointment as one of the Government Commissioners to attend the Pan-American Congress to be held in Rio Janeiro, Brazil, beginning July 21, 1906. He states that it is not anticipated that the delegates will be kept away from this country later than the month of September.

Voted that the President of the University be authorized to accept this appointment.

15. Mr. George S. Pope, late captain of Company E, University regiment, requests that he be allowed a rebate of one-half of the yearly military scholarship.

Voted that the request be denied.

16. A letter is herewith submitted from Professor Edward Kremers of the University of Wisconsin, on the subject of the School of Pharmacy of the University of Illinois.

Voted to refer the communication to the President of the University for consideration.

17. The Military Department requests permission to award the granting of the contract for military uniforms to the firm of Fred Kaufman of Chicago without further bids.

It was voted that the Comptroller and Commandant should call for bids for furnishing uniforms and report the results, with recommendations, to the Board.

18. The University of Aberdeen sends an invitation to the University to be represented at the celebration of its four hundredth anniversary to be held in the middle of the coming September.

Voted that Dean David Kinley be authorized to represent the University on such occasion.

19. I submit a communication from Dean Davenport as to desired changes in the agricultural building.

Voted to refer to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act.

20. I submit herewith a request from Professor Charles C. Pickett of the Law School to be granted leave of absence on half pay during the academic year commencing September 1, 1906.

Professor Pickett has served the University continuously for a period of ten years.

Voted to grant this request.

21. The Geological Survey, through its director, H. Foster Bain, proposes that the Geological Survey be authorized to assume a portion of the salaries of Professor Parr and Professor Bartow during the remainder of this year, in return for which the University of Illinois will do certain work for the Geological Survey during the coming year.

Voted that the President of the University may make such distribution of salaries as he deems expedient.

22. Certain citizens of Champaign have submitted a request that the University give the use of thirty-three feet of land lying along the north side of the horticulture tract from Wright street to Fourth street, for a public street.

Voted that the Trustees regret that they can not see their way clear to granting this request.

23. At a meeting of the University Council held March 7th it was voted to request the Board of Trustees to permit the Council to award either two of the fellowships for the coming year with a stipend of \$300, or in their place three scholarships with a stipend of \$200 each.

Voted that this request be granted.

24. The resignation of Professor Charles F. Perry as Assistant Professor of Machine Construction to take effect June 30, 1906, is herewith submitted, with a recommendation from the Dean of the College of Engineering and the Professor of Mechanical Engineering, that such resignation be accepted and that the President be authorized to nominate a suitable man for the position of Assistant Professor of Machine Construction who will have charge of the mechanical shops, at a salary of \$1,800, from July 1, 1906, if a suitable man can be found by that time.

Voted that Professor Perry's resignation be accepted and that the further recommendations be approved.

25. The Department of Geology requests permission to appoint two assistant professors on half time instead of one assistant professor on full time.

Voted that such request be granted, and that the President be authorized to nominate men for such positions.

26. Col. Fehét asks authority to exchange the present cadet rifles for a new rifle proposed by the War Department; and recommends that a new bond be made out by the University covering the value of the entire outfit furnished to the University by the government.

Voted that such exchange of rifles be made, that the bond be made, and that the President of the Board be instructed to sign it on behalf of the University.

27. By authority given me by the Board of Trustees, I have made the following appointments, which are here reported in order that they may be made a matter of record:

Bradley Charles Gardner, student assistant in chemistry, at a salary of \$200.00 for the ten months beginning September 1, 1905.

Miss Edith Williams to fill the place made vacant by the resignation of Miss Mary Davison, as assistant in the woman's gymnasium. Miss Williams is employed under the same terms as Miss Davison, namely \$70 for the academic year.

Florence Wilson has been appointed stenographer in the Vice President's office at a salary of \$40.00 a month, beginning November 1, 1905.

Eleanor Beardsley to instruct elementary voice students, she to receive seventy-five per cent of their tuitions as her remuneration.

Frederick Post armorer and administrative assistant in the military department, at a salary of \$45.00 a month, for seven months, beginning November 1, 1905.

Robert B. Otis, instructor in general engineering drawing, in the place of Mr. G. W. Eckard, resigned, for eight months, at a salary of \$80.00 a month.

Earl D. Finch, stenographer in the Law School at a salary of \$15.00 a month, beginning December 1, 1905.

Truman L. Kelley, library stenographer on full time from January to September 1, at \$50.00 a month.

Miss Bertha J. Bond has been appointed loan desk assistant in the Library at a salary of \$30.00 a month for half time, beginning January 1, 1906.

Miss Helen V. Calhoun has been appointed continuation assistant at a salary of \$60.00 a month, beginning January 1, 1906.

Mr. James Renwick Withrow has been appointed instructor in analytical chemistry in the place of Mr. Ovitz, transferred to the Engineering Experiment Station, at a salary of \$70.00 a month, beginning February 1 and running to July 1, 1906.

Mr. Perry Fox Trowbridge has been appointed instructor in general chemistry, in place of Mr. Withrow, at a salary of \$70.00 a month, beginning February 1 and running to July 1, 1906.

I have appointed Miss Jessie Jane Bullock as assistant in the department of mathematics to take charge of the class which Mr. Reddick would have taken during the second semester. She is to receive \$30.00 per month from February 1 to July 1, 1906.

The President of the Board was authorized to satisfy on the record a mortgage given by Angus McLennan, conveying the S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 21, Township 19 North, Range 9 East of 3d R. M., to secure the payment of a part of the purchase money upon the sale of said tract of land, the purchase money having now been paid in full.

An inspection of the items which I have suggested will show you that none of the changes affects in anywise either the stability of the building or its external appearance. The substitution of tin for the copper roofing is something which I believe would be justified by local conditions here, as I have every assurance that a tin roof would last from 15 to 20 years in your climate.

I have also considered the possibility of further reductions in cost of building by cutting off the vestibule entirely. If this were practicable it might result in a saving of anywhere from \$12,000 to \$18,000, but this would preclude the possibility of adequate stairs to your balcony; it would necessitate the construction of a brick wall through a portion of the space now devoted to the vestibule, and would make it an expensive operation later on to revert to the original plan if so desired. I felt that this proposed reduction was so unwarranted by the practical considerations that I did not obtain a specific price for this. I would advise the acceptance of the bid of English Bros. on the basis given above.

In regard to the location of the building: I discussed it on the ground Saturday with Mr. Olmstead and he concurred with me in the location which I had previously indicated to you, i. e., with the north and south axis of the building on a line midway between the center of the front of the Agricultural Building and a line 50 feet to the west of the avenue of trees on Burrill avenue. The center of the dome would be located on the axis of Nevada street prolonged. This location would not necessitate changing any of the trees on Burrill avenue nor the avenue itself until such time as you would take up the laying out of the grounds on a more studied basis.

The prices which I have named in the statement for plumbing, heating, and electrical work are approximates and are not distinct bids. I believe the work can be done for the price which I have named, but I will revise the specification, putting in a 1-pipe system for heating, a wiring system on 440 volts, and will have prices to report to you later on this basis, but I can not feel it necessary to wait for this if you wish to award the building at once.

My recommendations would therefore be (1) that the contract be given to English Bros. for the general work at \$89,748.78, and (2) that the building be located on the axis of Nevada avenue and a new axis located between the Agricultural Building and Burrill avenue.

There is one point to which I wish to call your attention. In all of my calculations for the proportioning of the foundations, I assumed a fairly even quality of subsoil. I believe no borings have been made to determine the exact nature of the soil; consequently I am unable to say that the foundations are sufficient in case we should meet anything out of the ordinary run. I have no reason to believe, however, that this matter would cause you any added expense.

Dr. Edmund J. James, President University of Illinois.

DEAR SIR—As requested, we submit in advance of a more comprehensive report on the future arrangement of the University buildings and grounds our opinion as to the location proposed by Mr. C. H. Blackall for the new Auditorium.

We note that the Trustees have evidently planned to have two rows of buildings, with an open campus between them extending southward from University Hall. It is not so evident, but we judge that it must have been the idea that this arrangement would extend to the cross row of new permanent farm buildings, a distance of over 2400 feet.

Mr. Blackall proposes to interrupt this extraordinarily long campus by placing the new Auditorium in the middle of it. One justification for thus breaking the long campus in two is found in the low crosswise ridge that breaks the view. This ridge could be eliminated by grading, and it has been suggested that this should be done. The ridge, however, should be preserved, and its presence does justify, from an architectural standpoint, the forming of two quadrangles in place of one.

The Auditorium is designed as a permanent monumental building—one which will be a beautiful object, symmetrical, grand in scale, and sufficiently elaborate in detail to be interesting and effective, when fully completed, from whichever side it is seen. It is manifestly such a building as is thoroughly well adapted to a central symmetrical, commanding position in respect to all other buildings in the vicinity. It is not such a building as can just as well take a place in a miscellaneous row of buildings. In architectural character it will correspond in symmetry and ornamental effect to

the great Low Library Building which forms the architectural center of the group of principal buildings of Columbia University, and therefore will probably be located in the middle of the great south campus.

We unhesitatingly approve of the general location proposed.

We have one recommendation as to its location in detail. This is that the center of the dome be placed on the center line (extended) of Nevada street. Heretofore no attention has been paid to relating the University buildings to the axis lines of intersecting streets. This we believe is a great mistake. The University grounds and the surrounding street system should be considered together from the esthetic point of view. The opportunity to place this fine dome so that it will be seen at the end of one street at least should not be lost.

In determining the position of the center of the Auditorium east and west, we advise as follows: Lay out along the east side of the new campus a new avenue with a double row of trees to correspond with Burrill avenue. Burrill avenue is not parallel with the Agricultural Building and the meridian. Therefore the new avenue should converge slightly toward the Auditorium so that it and Burrill avenue will be precisely symmetrical about the meridian line. The position of this avenue we determine arbitrarily by assuming that the east row of trees should be 50 feet from the middle of the west front of the Agricultural Building. The Auditorium should be in the middle of the space between the two avenues with its axis upon the meridian line.

Whenever University Hall is replaced by a larger and better building the new University Hall should center on the axis of the Auditorium building. The end pavilions of this future building should be designed so they will center one on Burrill avenue and the other on the new avenue.

CHANGES IN AGRICULTURAL BUILDINGS.

Your committee had also before it the following communication from Dean Davenport, asking for changes in the agricultural buildings:

URBANA, ILLINOIS, March 8, 1906.

Edmund J. James, LL.D., President University of Illinois.

DEAR SIR—I beg to call attention to a matter requiring action of the Trustees.

The increased size of classes and the enlarged demands for laboratory space are making imperative some radical changes in the agricultural buildings. We have no room but Morrow Hall large enough for our largest classes, and we have been obliged this year to limit the numbers in certain laboratory courses.

After thorough discussion with all parties interested, and with Dr. Burrill, who has charge of room assignments, I recommend the following changes:

1. Main building; lower floor—

a. Enlarge N. W. class room by removing partition between that and the office room on the south. b. Move partition so as to put Professor Fraser's office in N. E. corner, deaden wall next to class room, and set entrance to

dairy office out to end of main hall, saving space. c. Make entrance to agronomy store-room from main hall. d. Throw S. E. and S. W. laboratories together for farm crops work.

2. Main building; second floor—

a. Throw N. E. and N. W. laboratories together for work in soil fertility, making entrance at end of main hall. b. Divide ladies' toilet by partition, so that one-half, opening from the hall, may be available as professors' toilet, the other half to open from the ladies' dressing room, no change in plumbing except to reset one lavatory. c. Abandon present professors' toilet, making the room available for office uses. d. Move partition in ladies' rest room to avoid drip from piping above. e. Make vault next to offices for storage of horticultural records.

3. Dairy wing; second floor, former household science rooms—

a. Move partition dividing laboratories to one side, making the milk testing laboratory larger. This is a board partition and easily moved. b. Remove entry partition, now unnecessary, increasing space.

4. East wing—

Floor the space over stock judging room for class room, to be used for exceptionally large classes, especially in live stock. This is the largest and most expensive change proposed, as it involves flooring a space 44x70 feet, to be supported upon not more than two center columns, in order to obstruct the room below as little as possible.

5. Southwest wing—

Fit up for soil physics on lower floor, and farm crops on second floor.

All this should be done from the building portion of the agricultural funds, and the work should go forward as rapidly as possible consistent with the almost constant use of the building. As it is all small work and likely to be considerably drawn out, and as we need to control its progress with reference to noise and other interruptions to class work, I propose that the work be carried out in charge of the Superintendent of Buildings.

The President of the Board was authorized to contract with English Brothers for the erection of the Auditorium on the basis of the above report.

LOCATION OF THE AUDITORIUM.

President James presented the following:

I recommend that the location of the Auditorium Building proposed by Mr. C. H. Blackall and approved by a representative of Olmstead Brothers as indicated in a letter of March 12th, appended to this recommendation, be hereby approved, and that the Auditorium be located in such a way that the center of the dome be placed on the center line extended, of Nevada street; and that the axis of the Auditorium be upon the meridian line of the space between two avenues, the present Burrill avenue and a new avenue projected on the eastern side of the south campus, whose east row of trees should be fifty feet from the middle of the west front of the Agricultural Building.

The recommendation was approved, and the location described adopted.

SUPERINTENDENT OF AUDITORIUM CONSTRUCTION.

It was voted that Professor J. M. White be allowed to act for Mr. Blackall as superintendent of the construction of the Auditorium.

CHANGES IN AGRICULTURAL BUILDINGS.

It was moved to approve the recommendations of the committee as to the agricultural buildings. To this motion Dr. Davison moved as an amendment to omit the floor in the stock judging room. This amendment was lost, and the motion to approve the recommendation of the committee was adopted.

EVENING SCHOOL OF ACCOUNTANCY.

The special committee, appointed to consider the question of establishing an Evening School of Accountancy in Chicago, made the following report, which was adopted:

Voted that there be included in the statement made in reply to a request of the Urbana and Champaign Railway, Gas and Electric Company for permission to cross the University grounds from California avenue to Daniel street that the Board wishes the double service on Wright street, and also that the University campus be crossed on a line south of the proposed Auditorium site, just north of the observatory.

By the report of the committee, it appeared that the cost of the building on the plans which had been prepared would be something over \$33,000, while but \$25,000 was available for that purpose. After considerable discussion, the following resolution, offered by Mr. Bayliss, was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Advisory Committee created by section 1 of an Act of the General Assembly, regarding the College of Agriculture, approved May 13, 1905, advised that of the \$50,000 appropriated for the College for the year beginning July 1, 1905, by said section of said Act, \$16,500 be used to provide a residence for the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station; and

WHEREAS, the Attorney General has advised the Board of Trustees of the University that it may not lawfully use said sum of money as recommended; therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the University requests the said Advisory Committee to reconsider said recommendation and in the exercise of its discretion advise the Trustees further as to the best use of the said sum of \$16,500.

On motion of Mr. Lehman, the President of the Board was authorized to close contracts with the lowest bidders for the construction of the farm mechanics building, as recommended by the special committee, in the event that the additional money needed therefor be made available by the Advisory Committee.

ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT TO HAVE A ROOM IN FARM MECHANICS BUILDING.

Mr. Abbott, Chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, reported with reference to a request made by Mr. Huff that the warehouse building on the south campus be given to the athletic department

and fitted up with lockers, baths, etc., recommending that, instead a part of the present Farm Mechanics Building be given to the athletic department to be fitted up at the estimated cost of \$534.20.

The report was approved, and the amount of money needed appropriated, the work to be in charge of the Committee.

SALE OF WAREHOUSE BUILDING.

Professor Shattuck was authorized to sell the warehouse building, and was directed to put the amount received to the credit of the proper fund.

The President presented the following matters:

1. The Dean of the College of Agriculture requests authority to convert the small room adjoining the offices of the present animal husbandry department and to the right of the main entrance, into a fire-proof vault for storing and filing the experimental records of the department. It is estimated that the cost of this alteration would be \$150.

Voted that the request be granted and the expenditure be authorized and charged to the funds of the agricultural department.

2. The Director of the School of Music recommends that Mr. Henry C. Scheld be elected Instructor in Violin and Theory for the year 1906-7 at a salary of \$1,200 a year, work and salary to begin September 1, 1906. This man is to take the place of Mr. Schwartz who will be on leave of absence for the coming year. The salary is the same as that which was paid to Mr. Schwartz.

Voted that the recommendation be approved.

3. I submit the lists of persons recommended by the Faculties of the School of Pharmacy and the College of Dentistry for graduation at the approaching commencements of the respective schools.

Voted that the President be authorized to confer the appropriate degrees upon the persons whose names are in these lists.

4. I recommend that the Trustees give to the President of the University authority to offer to Professor Arthur Fairbanks of the University of Iowa, the position of Professor of Archaeology and head of the classical department in the University at a salary of \$3,000 a year, work and salary to begin September 1, 1906.

Voted that this recommendation be approved.

5. I recommend that the Trustees give the President of the University authority to offer John Paschal Brooks of the State College of Kentucky the position of Assistant Professor of Civil Engineering at a salary of \$2,250 a year, work and salary to begin September 1, 1906.

Voted that this recommendation be approved.

6. I recommend that the Trustees give to the President of the University authority to offer the position of Associate Professor of Mathematics in the University to Dr. G. A. Miller of Leland Stanford Jr. University at a salary of \$2,000 a year, work and salary to begin September 1, 1906.

Voted that this recommendation be approved.

7. I recommend that the Trustees give the President of the University authority to offer the position of Assistant Professor of Mathematics to Dr. Charles Haskins of Cornell University, at a salary of \$1,500 a year, work and salary to begin September 1, 1906.

Voted that this recommendation be approved.

THE OBSERVATORY.

The following letter from Mr. Stebbins, Assistant Professor of Astronomy, was presented by President James and it was ordered that it be printed in the minutes.

URBANA, ILLINOIS, April 16, 1906.

President E. J. James, University of Illinois.

MY DEAR SIR—In reference to our recent conversation, I wish to present on behalf of the Observatory, a vigorous protest against the laying of any street car track south of the new Auditorium. I am not sure just what effect the large building will have, but I do know that the passing of street cars near the Observatory would seriously hamper our work, on account of the vibrations they would cause. Several times we have had occasion to ask the men who were cutting grass to work farther away while our students were making observations, and there is no doubt that cars passing every few minutes would prove an intolerable nuisance.

Any astronomer would call it folly to build an observatory so close to a car line. It should be remembered that our instruments exaggerate the small vibrations of the earth just as much as they magnify objects in the sky. At the University of Wisconsin they have found that certain kinds of work can not be done within five minutes after the passing of a train nearly half a mile away. Drake Observatory is within fifty feet of a car line, and they can do absolutely nothing while a street car is in the same block.

Our present building and equipment are worth about \$16,000, and the location has so far been almost ideal for this vicinity. We have been close enough to other buildings for convenience, and far enough away to avoid heavy traffic. If at any future time a sum of say \$25,000 or more should be available for other instruments, there would be a good site just south and east of the present Observatory, provided the street cars do not encroach upon us. To move any of our instruments farther away from the other buildings would practically preclude their use by students. The experience of every University where the Observatory is not near the main campus bears this out.

I hope that the importance of this will be fully appreciated by the Board of Trustees, and I would be glad to appear before them and answer any questions if necessary.

Mr. Abbott will file later a memorandum of repairs to be made.

LINE FENCE ON SOUTH FARM.

A letter written by Mr. William Sutherland, also one by Professor Davenport, with reference to a line fence on the south farm, was referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

MR. HAY'S BOND.

The bill of the surety company for Mr. Hay's bond—\$50—was referred to President Bullard with power to act.

CADET UNIFORMS.

The committee appointed to secure bids for cadet uniforms made the following report and recommendation:

URBANA, ILLINOIS, April 20, 1906.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

GENTLEMEN—By resolution of the Board of Trustees, the undersigned were constituted a committee to call for bids for uniforms, and report with recommendations.

Pursuant thereto several firms known as uniform manufacturers were invited to make proposals. Three of the firms responded, sending in bids. One of the firms invited to bid, objected to the manner of receiving and opening bids. Acting on the advice of your President, we advertised in three local papers (copy attached), bids to be opened at noon Monday, April 16th. Subsequently it was decided to change the hour to 2:30 p. m., in order to accommodate Chicago bidders; of this all the known competing firms were duly advised. When it was determined to advertise, the bids already received were returned to the firms making them, with a copy of the advertisement:

Bids were received from the firms, as shown in the abstract attached, and opened at 2:30 p. m., Monday, April 16th, in the presence of your President and representatives of the firms of A. E. Armstrong & Co., Fred Kauffmann, and J. H. Hirsch & Co. The firm of M. C. Lilley & Co. presented with its bid a complete uniform made in accordance with our specifications and a standard suit furnished them. The suit is presented for your examination, pending your final action.

The acceptance of Fred Kauffman's bid is recommended. He is not only the lowest bidder, but he has had the contract for several years and has filled it satisfactorily.

The original bids are attached to this report.

Meeting of June 5, 1906.

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Palmer House in Chicago, June 5, 1906, upon the call of the President; the purpose of the meeting being to authorize conferring degrees upon those to be graduated from the College of Medicine on that day, and to transact such other business as might be presented.

The members present were Messrs. Abbott, Bullard, Davison, Kerrick, McLean, and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans, and Mrs. Busey; absent, Governor Deneen and Messrs. Barber, Bayliss, and Lehman. President James and Mr. Haugan, Treasurer, were present.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY THE PRESIDENT.

1. Dr. Evarts B. Greene, Professor of History in the University, has received a most flattering call to the Professorship of History in one of the oldest and largest of our eastern institutions, offering him an immediate salary of \$3,500 to be advanced within a comparatively short time to \$4,000 with a possibility of its going higher than that in case the general average of salaries is raised. It contains also the extra inducement which a well defined and well established system of retiring allowances already adopted in that institution, provides, with the opportunity to share in the grant from the pension fund for American college professors recently established by Andrew Carnegie.

This call is certainly a very just recognition of a worthy man. I think it would be a great misfortune to the University of Illinois to lose Professor Greene's services. I think the Board should improve his situation here as far as in their judgment would be feasible, considering our resources and the claims of other departments and other men.

Voted:

1. That Dr. Greene's salary as Professor of History and head of the Department of History be fixed at \$3,000 per annum, beginning September 1, 1906.

2. That he receive in addition to this for his work as dean of the College of Literature and Arts the sum of \$500 a year, beginning at the same date.

3. That in addition to the present force in the department of history, another professorship of history be established with a salary of not to exceed \$2,500, and that the President of the University be authorized to recommend an incumbent for this position at his earliest convenience.

4. That the sum of \$1,000 be appropriated from the general funds to be placed at Professor Greene's disposal for the purchase of additional books in the department of history for the University Library.

2. The Faculty of the Engineering College have made a recommendation approved by the Dean of the College that Edward C. Schmidt be appointed Associate Professor of Railway Engineering at a salary of \$2,500, to date from July 1, 1906.

Professor Schmidt is a graduate of Stevens Institute of Technology, 1895, in the course of Mechanical Engineering. After three years of practice work, he served for five years as instructor and assistant professor in the College of Engineering in this University. Since 1903 he has been engaged in practical work. His work done at the University of Illinois seems to have been of an unusually high character, according to the testimony of those who stood nearest to him. He seems to be a man of good training, initiative, enterprise, and professional ambition, in every way competent as a member of the staff in the new department of Railway Engineering and Administration. It seems to be desirable for him to begin his work on the first of July, since it will be necessary for him to do considerable work in organizing the department and adjusting the equipment for the most efficient work during the coming year.

I recommend that this appointment be made.

Voted that the recommendation be approved.

3. Professor Grindley has informed me that the cold storage interests of Chicago have offered to the University the sum of \$500 to be expended in scientific investigation of the effect of refrigeration on meats and other food supplies.

He requests permission to accept this money and recommends that a research fellowship be created with a salary of \$300 for the coming year, and that \$200 of the same be utilized in the necessary expenditure for materials, etc., connected with this investigation.

Voted that the University accept the money to be expended under the direction of Professor Grindley, and that said research fellowship be created and the President of the University be authorized to appoint the incumbent.

4. The head of the Military Department requests that Mr Frederick Post be appointed Armorer and Administrative Assistant in the Military Department for thirteen months, beginning June 1, 1906, at a salary of \$45 a month.

Voted that such appointment be made.

5. The Secretary of the Medical College of the University has submitted the list of candidates for the degree of Doctor of Medicine at the approaching commencement.

Voted that the President of the University be authorized to confer the degree of Doctor of Medicine upon the following named persons who have, according to the certificate of the Secretary of the Medical Faculty, completed the work of the Medical course.

RUNNING TRACK.

2. I submit a communication from Mr. Spencer with regard to the running track in the Gymnasium.

CHAMPAIGN, ILL., June 4, 1906.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois:

GENTLEMEN: I feel it my duty to call your attention to the matter of the construction of the running track in the Men's Gymnasium for which I was architect, also to the fact that it is being used in a manner which was

strictly forbidden during the first two years after the building was completed, a matter which was carefully considered and agreed on at the time the plans were being made.

At that time it was considered objectionable to have any posts or obstructions on the main floor, so construction was made accordingly, but when proposals for the building were received, it was found necessary to make a reduction in order to keep cost within the appropriation. This was done to the extent of something like five or six thousand dollars with the distinct understanding with the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, and with President Draper that the running track was made for running purposes only, and not for seating purposes in any way, though we allowed a maximum number of two hundred, equally distributed, during exercises in the building.

Mr. Bullard will doubtless recall this fact, as the matter was talked over particularly with him.

The running track is, in its present form, suspended from the roof. When loaded to its capacity it simply throws a heavy strain on the roof, which might, especially in time of wind, cause a serious accident. It should not be used this way in its present condition.

If it is desirable to continue to use the track as a seating for spectators, it can be made safe by the addition of steel posts under the track, which in turn will cause additional strain on the girder below, which can easily be reinforced. I think the expense of strengthening as suggested would not exceed five hundred dollars and the obstruction would be so slight as not to be objectionable to work in the gymnasium.

I have been prompted to lay this matter before you from the fact of having recently attended exercises in this building, when the running track was loaded far beyond the safe limit. I beg of you not to let this matter go unnoted.

Voted that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds be directed to make such alterations in the gymnasium as will put the safety of the building beyond question, even when crowded to the utmost.

HIGH SCHOOL CONFERENCE: VISITATION.

3. I submit herewith a communication from Professor H. A. Hollister, High School Visitor:

President Edmund J. James:

DEAR SIR—As chairman of the Committee on High School Conference, and after consultation with other members of the committee, I wish to recommend that the appropriation for the conference of the ensuing year be \$500.00, the same as for the past year.

As High School Visitor, I would like to suggest, also, that the appropriation for expenses of my office, including cost of visitation, furniture, and supplies, printing, and postage, be the same as that of last year, viz.: \$750.00. This sum will readily cover all expenses for the year 1906-07.

An invitation received from the executive committee of the Alumni Association of the University of Illinois, inviting the members of the Board of Trustees to be present at the address to be given in the Physics lecture room at 10:00 o'clock, Tuesday, and to be the guests of the Alumni at the dinner to be given in the armory at 12:00 o'clock, was received and gratefully accepted.

COAL BIDS.

Upon motion of Mr. Abbott the following was adopted:

It is hereby ordered that the Purchasing Agent advertise for proposals for coal for the year beginning September 1, 1906, and for the hauling of the same, and with the approval of the Committee on Building and Grounds be authorized to contract for such supply of coal and hauling.

REPAIRS IN HEATING PLANT.

Mr. Abbott submitted a request from Mr. J. A. Morrow, Superintendent of heat, light and power plant, with regard to changes and repairs in the heating plant as follows:

"It will be necessary to make some changes and repairs in the equipment of the steam department during the coming summer. The estimated cost of these will be about \$2,400.00, divided as follows:

(a) General repairs to boiler house piping system, boilers, stokers, coal and ash machinery, etc.....	\$1,000 00
(b) General repairs to tunnels and tunnel piping, heating, lighting and plumbing systems of the various buildings.....	1,400 00

I have on file in my office an itemized list of this work, and should be glad to consult with you concerning it at your convenience.

These requests were approved by Professor Breckenridge.

ADDITIONAL EQUIPMENT FOR HEAT, LIGHT AND POWER PLANT.

Mr. Abbott submitted the following letter:

URBANA, ILLINOIS, June 8, 1906.

Hon. William L. Abbott, Chairman Committee on Buildings and Grounds, University of Illinois:

DEAR SIR—In my communication of June 1, 1905, to Mr. S. A. Bullard, President of the Board of Trustees, I indicated that it would be necessary to expend \$12,000.00 during the two years following for additional equipment for the heat, light and power plant. I recommended at that time the expenditure of \$8,000.00. The recommendation was approved, and this amount has been expended for the equipment and repairs indicated. It seems to me that some additional equipment should be provided for the power plant. All of the items listed below are very much needed, and I trust that the Board will see fit to approve the purchase of these items, if you so recommend.

I estimate that the cost of the items given below will be approximately as indicated:

1. Air compressor	\$1,200 00
2. Electric motor for coal and ash conveyer.....	350 00
3. Electric motor for wood shop.....	160 00
4. Electric generator, direct current, for power plant.....	1,200 00
5. Tunnel mains for direct current generator.....	350 00
6. Water meters for boiler room.....	350 00
7. Wattmeters for buildings.....	250 00
8. Preparations of plans for extension of plant.....	250 00
9. Installation of Paul system in laboratory.....	50 00
10. Thermostatic control for fan system.....	100 00

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

LAND FOR USE OF MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

4. I submit herewith a request from the head of the Military Department for the assignment of the field south of the experiment fields and east of Mathews avenue and north of the Agronomy building, extending to the forestry, for the purposes of military drill.

Voted that such assignment be made.

LAND FOR USE OF CIVIL ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT.

5. I submit herewith a request from Professor Baker for permission to use the campus of the University for the purposes of the Department of Civil Engineering:

URBANA, ILLINOIS, May 29, 1906.

"Edmund J. James, President of the University of Illinois:

"DEAR SIR—In accordance with our verbal conference of a few days ago, I beg to submit the following requests:

"1. That the Civil Engineering Department be permitted to use the area between the Chemistry building and the Woman's building for field practice in surveying.

"2. That the Civil Engineering Department be permitted to use the tract of ground bounded on the west by Mathews avenue, on the north by the agricultural experiment plats, on the east by the forestry reservation and on the south by the cultivated plats and enclosures of the Agricultural Department. It is agreed by Dr. Hopkins that the use of the above tract for field practice by the civil engineering students will not interfere with the agricultural experiment. The above use will not seriously interfere with the use of the same tract for military drill, since the surveying exercises nominally close at 3:00 o'clock, while the drill does not begin until 4:00 o'clock. It is the intention of the Civil Engineering Department that no stakes shall be left which will be liable to trip a cadet; and the few stakes that may possibly be left are very unlikely to cause any embarrassment.

"3. I request the authority to use the rectangle of ground southwest of the Observatory, between Burrill avenue and Mathews avenue, for surveying purposes; excluding, of course, the cultivated plats near the Observatory. It is understood that the use of this tract for surveying purposes is not in the least to interfere with the use of the tract by students for games. It is further understood that the Civil Engineering Department will not attempt to use this tract on Saturday or after 3:00 o'clock on other days, at which time it is likely that students may desire to use it for games.

"4. I respectfully urge that the Civil Engineering Department be permitted to use the north campus for topographical surveying, it being understood that instrument stations are to be established only upon the walks, driveways or in the corners of the walks where the grass is already trodden down, and it being understood that civil engineering students are not to be on the grass, except to carry a stadia rod to the various topographical features, and upon any evidence that this use of the ground is damaging the lawn, said use is to stop.

"In consideration of the fact that the Civil Engineering Department has no other area for field practice for 120 students during the first semester, and about 250 during the second semester, I respectfully urge that the above requests be granted. On account of the uncertainties of the location of buildings and of our occupancy, the facilities for field practice are in a very unsatisfactory condition. And if the above requests can be granted soon, I shall take steps during the summer vacation to re-establish the points used in field practice, and thus greatly improve our facilities in that direction.

"*Mr. S. A. Bullard, President University of Illinois Board of Trustees, Springfield, Illinois:*

"DEAR SIR—As I have two opportunities to dispose of my ground right away (the ground that is the corner just north of the Y. M. C. A. ground you bought), thought I would give the University of Illinois the first chance before either of the other two, as it is a corner right out of the University campus, as well as the north end of the engineering strip. Whatever is done will have to be done inside of a week, or I will close out to one of the other companies before the end of next week. It is now or never for the University of Illinois to ever own this ground. One offer is from a hotel syndicate, who want to build a hotel there. The other company wants a perpetual lease on the ground for another and still better purpose financially. The latter would be a big income for me always, \$25,000.00. Answer, 'yes or no' by first part of next week.

When the Board met pursuant to this call the following members were present: Messrs. Abbott, Bayliss, Bullard, Davison, Kerrick, McLean and Mrs. Alexander, Mrs. Evans, and Mrs. Busey; absent. Governor Deneen and Messrs. Barber and Lehman. President James was present.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT JAMES.

COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE.

1. I present the report of the Dean of the College of Agriculture asking for appropriations.

On motion of Mr. Abbott this was sent to the Committee on College of Agriculture for examination and report.

It was voted that the University Council be instructed to report to the Board as to the advisability of crediting the funds of one college for instruction given to students of other colleges.

With regard to the resolution offered by Dr. Davison, presented at the last meeting of the Board (see page 357), the Committee on Finance presented the following report, which was adopted:

To the Board of Trustees:

Your committee, appointed to take into consideration the resolution offered by Dr. Davison, requesting that the applications of the several colleges for appropriations be made in detail, recommends that all such requests be in sufficient detail so that the Board may readily see to what purposes such moneys are to be applied.

COLLEGE OF LAW.

2. I present the following recommendation from the College of Law, approved and recommended by the Senate, and advise its adoption:

"On the recommendation of the College of Law, the Senate voted to recommend to the Board of Trustees:

"That the degree of Bachelor of Laws be awarded only to students who, before the academic year in which they receive it, have satisfactorily completed a full year's work as registered students in the College of Literature and Arts, or the College of Science, or in a corresponding department of another university or college of recognized standing; or to students who have attained in the courses which they present for the degree an average grade of 85 on a scale of 100.

"This rule shall apply only to students who enter the College of Law after the end of the academic year of 1906-07.

"June 4, 1906.

The recommendation was adopted.

3. I present also the following extract from Dean Harker's report with regard to the College of Law:

"Several of the state university law schools give instruction to resident students free of tuition charges. Others offer prizes for superior work in certain lines. We charge tuition and offer no prizes. Inasmuch as a competing law school in the State has within a year offered to one of our best students half tuition and to another free tuition as an inducement to change, I think it would be well to procure the consent of the Board of Trustees to offer as prizes the following: Free tuition during the Junior year for the best student in substantive law during the Freshman year, one-half tuition for the next best student in substantive law during that year; free tuition during the Junior year for the best Freshman student in the law of procedure; one-half tuition for the next best Freshman student in the law of procedure; free tuition during the Senior year for the best Junior student in substantive law; one-half tuition for the next best Junior student in substantive law; free tuition while a Senior for the best Junior student in the law of procedure, and one-half tuition while a Senior for the next best Junior student in the law of procedure."

The President was authorized, in his discretion, to award scholarships for the coming year in accordance with the recommendation.

Dr. Davison offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That a committee be appointed by the President of the Board to consider the question of scholarships in the professional schools of the University.

Mr. Bullard appointed as members of this committee: Dr. Davison, chairman, Mr. Bayliss, Mrs. Evans, President James, Dean Harker, Dean Quine, Dean Cigrand, and Dean Goodman.

SALARIES AND APPOINTMENTS FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 1906-07.

In accordance with the action of the Board at its last meeting, I have reappointed all instructors in the University who were recommended by the heads of the respective departments, so far as no change was proposed either in salary or rank and so far as I could approve the recommendations. The following recommendations are made concerning those persons whose appointment is new or whose salary it is proposed to alter or whose rank it is proposed to change. All salaries and increases in salaries date from Sept. 1, 1906, unless otherwise stated.

Voted that the President of the University be requested to report to this Board whether in his opinion the Executive Faculty of the College of Medicine is providing adequately in this budget for the needs of the Medical College.

Voted, on motion of Dr. Davison, that the President of the University and the Committee on the Medical College of the Board of Trustees confer with the representatives of the College of Physicians and Surgeons as to the terms on which the lease of the Medical College may be terminated.

The Secretary was instructed, on motion of Dr. Davison, to have printed four hundred copies of the contract between the University of Illinois and the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

24. That certificates be issued to following persons as Certified Public Accountants:

a. *Upon Examination*—David J. Levi, Louis A. Keidel, H. E. Addenbrooke.

b. *Under Section 3 of the Regulations*—R. O. Berger, C. L. Brown, H. J. Dirks.

Approved.

25. That Professor Schmidt and Mr. Wenger be assigned to the staff of the Engineering Experiment Station.

Approved.

26. That Nathaniel Hay be appointed Purchasing Agent for the year beginning July 1, 1906, at a salary of \$1,800; and that an allowance of \$900 be made for Clerk and Stenographer in the office of the Purchasing Agent and a further appropriation for incidentals of \$250.

Approved.

27. That Evelyn Atkinson, now Assistant Superintendent of Grounds, be appointed Superintendent of Grounds at a salary of \$1,000 per year, to date from September 1, 1906.

Approved.

MT. HOPE CEMETERY.

28. I submit two communications from F. B. Vennum, President of Mt. Hope Cemetery Association, both dated June 20, 1906:

"In consideration of Mt. Hope Cemetery Association granting the University a passage way through its grounds and the further privilege of driving through the center of its grounds to the farm on the south, we ask if an arrangement could not be made by which we could get water from your water system.

"We would not want a great quantity of water and only for about four months in the year. We would not use a hose and only draw from hydrant and carry for the purpose of watering plants and flowers. We would not expect you to enter into a contract for a number of years, but one which could be cancelled at any time.

"We understand that you have pipes laid to the road across from our grounds.

"We think within a few years the city system will extend near enough so we can use from that source.

"We would expect to put in a meter and pay for every gallon used."

"The Mt. Hope Cemetery Association desires to tile the burying grounds.

"We find that about eight acres drain north and about three across south through your grounds. If you could grant us the privilege we would like to know the distance from each road to the tile, also the size of tile we would connect with.

"We would call your attention to the lay of the surface of the ground which shows a fall of over ten feet in 400 yards. This water passes over your ground and we think it preferable to have it pass under, through tile."

The first of these communications was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for investigation and report. The second was referred to the Agronomy Department of the College of Agriculture for investigation and report.

29. That the President of the University be authorized to reappoint clerks and stenographers for the coming year at the present salaries, reserving until the autumn any propositions for increases in salary or promotions in rank.

Approved.

PURCHASING AGENT AND PURCHASES.

30. The Purchasing Agent states that he is now ready to handle in his office the entire purchasing business of the University.

Voted that all purchases for the University by any officer or employe thereof be made hereafter through the Purchasing Agent.

ENGINEERING COLLEGE AND EXPERIMENT STATION.

31. There seems to be some difference of opinion as to the proper relations of the Engineering College and the Engineering Experiment Station. From consideration of convenience the Deanship of the College and the Directorship of the Station have been vested in different persons. This may easily lead to a separation of interests and functions unless carefully watched.

Voted that the Engineering College and the Engineering Experiment Station be administered in the closest possible harmony and as nearly as may be as if they were one department; to this end the personnel of the Engineering Faculty and the Engineering Experiment Station staff shall be as far as possible the same; each member of the Engineering Faculty being a member of the Station staff and *vice versa*; looking to a time when all members of the instructing staff shall be engaged in work in the Engineering Experiment Station and all the members of the Station staff be engaged in instruction.

APPOINTMENTS.

The Secretary reported that since the March meeting of the Board, he had, by direction of President James, sent notices of appointments to persons not named above, as follows:

1. Dr. G. A. Miller, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, at a salary of \$2,000 a year, from September 1, 1906.

2. John Pascal Brooks, Assistant Professor of Civil Engineering, at a salary of \$2,250 a year, beginning September 1, 1906.

3. Charles Wilson Haskins, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, at a salary of \$1,500 a year, beginning September 1, 1906.

RULES AS TO THE WOMANS' BUILDING.

It was voted that the rules governing the use of the Womans' building be referred to the President and Council for revision, the Committee on Students' Welfare being requested to make suggestions to the Council.

CHANGES AND REPAIRS.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds made the following report, which was adopted:
