THE APPOINTMENT OF ROBERT B. DOWNS AS Director of the University of Illinois Library and Library I School, effective September 1, is announced just as the News Letter is going to press. A native of North Carolina, Mr. Downs comes

to Illinois from New York University, where he has been Director of the Libraries since 1938. Previous to that time he was University Librarian, Chairman of the Administrative Board of the Library and Library School, and Professor of Library Science at the University of North Carolina, a position he assumed in 1932. Mr. Downs served as librarian of Colby College, 1929-1931. He has also had experience on the staffs of the Columbia University Libraries and the New York Public Library. He holds the B.S. and M.S. degrees, 1927 and 1929 respectively, from Columbia University School of Library Service. During the past year Mr. Downs has been teaching a ROBERT B. DOWNS course in college and university library administration at Columbia University. The new Director is a member of the Council of the American Library Association and served as president of the Asso-Clation of College and Reference Libraries, 1940-1941.

In a publication on American Humor issued in 1938 by the University of North Carolina press, Mr. Downs collaborated with his wife, the former Elizabeth Crooks, who was herself a librarian. The Downs have two children, both girls, aged eight and five. The faculty of the Library School and the staff of the University Library are happy to welcome Mr. Downs and his family to the University of Illinois campus. In view of his wide experience in libraries and of the high esteem in which he is held in library circles, the University, the alumni, and the profession look forward to continued progress under his leadership.

In accepting his new position Dr. White returns to the school from which he received his degree of B.S. in L.S. in 1934. Following his graduation from Columbia he was librarian and professor of philosophy at Fisk University from 1934 to 1938. The next two years he was chairman of the Division of Library and Library School at the University of North Carolina. He is a graduate of Oklahoma Baptist University and received a master's degree in 1928 at Mercer University. In 1933 he received his Doctor of Philosophy degree from Cornell University. 

Director White has wide professional recognition as evidenced by the many responsible positions he now holds, such as the chairmanship of the Policies Committee of the Association of College and Reference Libraries, editorship of College and Research Libraries and membership on the Executive Board of the American Library Association. He has brought to the profession a vision of librarianship as "a career of the human mind." Both Mrs. White and the two daughters, Sherril and Caroline, as well as Dr. White, have made many friends in the University of Illinois community who will join with alumni, Library School faculty, and the library staff in wishing them success and happiness in the new position.

Fiftieth Anniversary Celebration

The fiftieth anniversary of the Library School was observed on the University of Illinois campus in connection with the seventy-fifth anniversary of the opening of the University, on March 2, 1943, at a dinner in the Illini Union. The affair was informal, with buffet style service because of the shortage of student waiters. One hundred and sixty-three members of the Library School faculty and student body, Library staff, and others attended, including twenty-four alumni from out of town.

Anne M. Boyd served as toastmaster, introducing as speakers Director Emeritus P. L. Windsor; Anita Hostetter, B.L.S.'20, secretary of the A.L.A. Board of Education for Librarianship; Director Carl M. White; and Assistant Director Emerita Frances Simpson. In the course of her address Miss Simpson introduced four visiting alumnae representing some of the earlier classes of the Library School: Mary Josephine Booth, B.L.S.'04, librarian of Eastern Illinois State Teachers College, Charleston, Illinois; Anna V. Jennings, B.L.S.'03 and Anna May Price, B.L.S.'00, both of Lincoln, Nebraska; and Ida F. Wright, B.L.S.'04, librarian of the Evanston, Illinois, Public Library.





ASSISTANT DIRECTOR MCDIARMID RESIGNS


The resignation of E. W. McDiarmid, assistant director of the Library School, has just been announced. Dr. McDiarmid will assume his new post of University librarian and director of the Division of Library Instruction at the University of Minnesota about September 1, 1943. Dr. McDiarmid joined the Illinois staff as associate in Library Science in 1937. In 1941 he became assistant professor and the following year was made assistant director of the Library School.

In going to Minnesota Dr. McDiarmid assumes the directorship of a state university library second in size only to that of Illinois. He succeeds Frank K. Walter, who is retiring after twenty-two years as head of the Minnesota library.

Dr. McDiarmid is the author of The Library Survey, published by the American Library Association in 1940, and has collaborated in various other professional publications. His recently completed study, Public Library Administration, is to be published shortly as the third volume of the University of Illinois Contributions to Librarianship. He has been associate editor since 1941 of College and Research Libraries and has contributed to many professional periodicals. He serves as chairman of the A.L.A. Constitution and By-Laws Committee.

During his short time as assistant director, Dr. McDiarmid has made an intensive study of the Library School curriculum and of the problems of placement. As a result of the latter he has inaugurated a new scientific system of records.

To quote Director White: "Illinois has been Dr. McDiarmid's proving ground. He has come through magnificently and this step forward is fitting



FACULTY NOTES

Planning for postwar foreign library service is at present a special concern of Director White, who acts as advisor to the A.L.A. Board of Education for Librarianship for a study devoted to this subject. Dr. White served as chairman of the Conference of Middle Western Research Libraries held at the University of Chicago in January to discuss cooperation between such libraries. Alumni who attended the conference were Kanardy L Taylor of the John Crerar Library, Jackson E. Towne of the Michigan State College Library, and Grace Van Wormer of the State University of Iowa Library.

"Changes in organization at the University of Illinois Library" is the subject of an article by Dr. White in the December, 1942, issue of College and Research Libraries. His discussion of "The battle of the books" appears in the January 1943 issue of Illinois Libraries.

Director emeritus Windsor delivered the address at the annual Honors Day convocation at the University of Illinois, May 1, 1943. His subject was "Books and the Studious Life." Dr. Windsor is serving as chairman of the A.L.A. Committee on Council Terms of Office. As a member of the Advisory Committee of the Illinois State Library, Dr. Windsor attended the regional library institutes on war and postwar issues held in April in Chicago and St. Louis. Other faculty members attending the St. Louis conference were Professor Anne M. Boyd and Alice Lohrer.

The eightieth birthday anniversary, May 18, of Frances Simpson, assistant director emerita, was marked by many alumni and other friends. She was guest of honor at a dinner for fourteen given on Sunday, May 16, at the University Women's Club, Urbana, by Emma R. Jutton, Ioan librarian, and Alice S. Johnson, reference librarian. Members of the Woman's Guild of the Episcopal Chapel, of which Miss Simpson is a member, entertained her at luncheon, May 18. 

You Can Help

There is a rapidly increasing shortage of trained librarians for beginning positions. In consequence many libraries have found it difficult (sometimes impossible) to fill such positions. Some libraries have been called upon for extra services, and have had to undertake these services with no additional staff, even with a reduced staff. Although beginning salaries have been increasing, the demand is greater than the supply.

Each librarian has two opportunities to help relieve this situation. The first is by faithfully performing one's duties to the best of one's ability. We may individually and collectively be able to help "take up some of the slack" left by vacancies.

The second opportunity for each librarian to help is by encouraging promising students to prepare themselves for librarianship. Library schools generally are equipped to train many more students than they have had either in 1941-42, or in 1942-43. Larger library school classes in 1943-44 will not solve 1943's problems but they will greatly help in 1944. We should begin now before it is too late. Otherwise it seems likely to be another story of too little and too late. In encouraging students to enter librarianship, several points may prove helpful. 1. Libraries have been recognized as rendering important services in wartime by such persons as President Roosevelt; John W. Studebaker, Commissioner of Education; and Elmer Davis, Director of OWI. 2. Beginning salaries have been increasing, the amounts varying with particular localities. 3. Librarianship offers an opportunity for important services of

education and information. 4. Librarianship offers opportunity for promising young people to prepare now for a career.

The success with which librarianship meets the challenge ahead will depend directly upon each individual's effort. If each Illini talked to one prospect and encouraged her to consider library service, these recruits



from the college graduating classes of 1944 would aid very materially in alleviating the present shortage of qualified librarians for beginning positions.
