

THE POINT SYSTEM
UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS—JANUARY, 1927

The Point System as here outlined was created by 1926 Mortar Board and accepted by a campus vote of the women in the spring of that year. The administration of the Point System was taken over by the Woman's League at Mortar Board's request. It is the desire of the Woman's League that the Point System should be administered that it may be the means to the following ends:

1. Through the necessity of selection it will encourage a woman to enter only those activities in which she is genuinely interested.
2. More efficient work and a corresponding increase in the number of capable women will result from each woman giving her energy to fewer activities.
3. Supervision through the Point System will gradually induce a voluntary personal regulation as to the amount of time spent in extra-curricular activities.

Each organized activity is given a certain value in points and no student will be allowed to assume more than fourteen (14) points at any one time.

Each girl as a matter of personal honor is expected to limit the number of her points.

EXCHANGES: Activities once undertaken and recorded may be exchanged for others only with permission of the Executive Council, and of the Organization from which the withdrawal is desired. Notice of the exchange must be reported to the Point System Committee.

NOTE: Points are listed as either "T," temporary, or "P," permanent. Temporary points are those given to the activity the duties of which do not extend throughout the school year. Permanent points are those given to an activity the duties of which extend practically throughout the school year.

In case one has office or some active role in an organization, membership in that organization will not count separately, but the points will be given according to the higher responsibility.
