MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

July 30, 1946



The July meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Tuesday, July 30, 1946, at the University Club, 76 East Monroe Street, Chicago, according to the following schedule:

Executive session, as in Committee of the Whole, 11 a.m.

Open session, 1 p.m.

President Stoddard was present; also Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Mr. I. L. Porter, Treasurer, Mr. W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of May 29, 1946.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 1097 to 1148.

PRESIDENT STODDARD PRESENT

President Livingston stated that President George Dinsmore Stoddard was present for the first time since taking charge of the affairs of the University on July 1, 1946, and asked him if he cared to make any statement.

President Stoddard made a brief statement touching on the functions and aims of a State university, and the problems facing all educational institutions at the present time.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR WELL

(1) The Physical Plant Department has received the following bids on a test well and a new well to be located on the South Farm on the Urbana campus:

The test well will first be sunk, and if the supply of water is found adequate the well will be finished. The additional water supply is urgently needed for reasons explained in a letter dated July 15 from the Director of the Physical Plant Department to the Comptroller, a copy of which is hereby given to the Secretary of the Board for record.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the contract be entered into with Layne-Western Company, the lowest bidder, for a test well at \$700 and for the completed well if dug at an additional \$8,485. Funds are available in the State appropriation of \$120,000 for "Water Station improvements" made to the University of Illinois for the biennium of 1945-1947.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was awarded as recommended.

REASSIGNMENT OF FUNDS FOR STUDENT HOUSING

(2) On May 29, 1946 (Minutes, pages 1112-1113, 1116, 1122), the Board approved a recommendation from President A. C. Willard for the assignment of funds for

student housing at Urbana-Champaign as follows:

(a) Additional temporary housing, supplementing present facilities, to provide accommodations for 150 families and 1730 single students, at a cost of \$572,600, to be assigned from the \$1,500,000 State appropriation for Students' Residence Halls and equipment. These facilities would include remodeling the West Hall of the Stadium and the Ice Skating Rink to house 738 single students, and Federal Public Housing Authority temporary buildings to house 150 families and 902 single students.

(b) Assignment of \$356,275 in this appropriation and \$250,950 in the fund for Contingencies in the State appropriations for buildings (total \$607,225) for

the partial cost of a new women's residence hall.

Requests for releases of funds for such uses were submitted to and have been approved by the Governor. In the meantime, more complete data on the cost of temporary housing are available which indicate a probable cost of \$1,032,000, compared with the previous estimate of \$1,070,000. Two factors which will affect the ultimate cost of the temporary housing program are not yet determined: (a) the exact amount of reimbursement due the University by the

United States Government for expenditures on the installation of 275 houses, said reimbursement being estimated to be \$320,600; (b) the cost of additional

sanitary sewer facilities if existing utilities are found inadequate.

The program approved by the Board on May 29 provides for the use of only a part of the temporary housing requested by the University and allocated by the Federal Public Housing Authority. The latter still has available 143 buildings, tentatively assigned to the University and subject to acceptance, which will provide additional facilities for 18 families and 400 single students. The FPHA has also ruled that five per cent of the total number, or 36 family units, may be used by non-veteran staff members, and such use of these facilities is greatly needed. Acceptance of the additional facilities will require expenditure of \$151,000 of University funds, making a total cost of \$1,183,000, compared with \$1,032,000 (previously estimated to cost \$1,079,600) for the temporary housing program as heretofore approved. It seems desirable that these additional facilities be accepted. Allowing for units available to staff members, there would be an excess of only 382 over the estimated enrollment of 15,000.

The temporary housing program, for both students and staff, is the University's most immediate and urgent need in dealing with the housing problems. The University has requested an additional State appropriation of \$1,000,000 to replace expenditures from the appropriation of \$1,500,000 for Students' Resi-

dence Halls and equipment and used for temporary housing.

If the assignment now suggested is made, there would remain a balance of \$317,000 in the State appropriation of \$1,500,000 for housing, of which \$64,125 has been assigned for preparation of plans and specifications. To this could be added the balance of \$250,050 in the Contingency fund, leaving a total of \$567,050 for permanent housing. The estimated cost of the proposed permanent residence hall, for which plans have been completed, is \$1,515,000, but no bids on it have been received. It appears advisable to take no steps toward encumbering or expending these funds until the temporary housing situation is more clear or additional funds are made available.

Accordingly, it is recommended that the program for housing approved on

May 20 be amended as follows:

1. Additional housing be requested from FPHA to provide for 18 families

and 400 single students.

2. The budget for the temporary housing be increased from \$1,079,600 to \$1,183,000 and the Governor be requested to release an additional \$103,400 for this purpose by transfer from the amount previously released for permanent housing. Bids secured indicated that the cost of the Stadium and Skating Rink dormitory projects will total \$157,000 instead of the \$120,000 previously estimated. It will be necessary to secure a revision of the releases of funds by the Governor, in a lump sum to provide for variations in the actual costs.

3. No further work be done on the permanent housing program until final costs of the temporary program are known or until additional funds are pro-

vided through State appropriations.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

AMENDMENT OF POLICY AND RULES RELATING TO COMPENSATION AND WORKING CONDITIONS OF NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES

(3) The Director of Nonacademic Personnel, with the concurrence of the Nonacademic Personnel Advisory Committee, recommends to the Board of Trustees that Section III, page 3, of the "Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees" be amended by deleting the italicized material as follows:

III. METHODS OF DETERMINING RATES OF COMPENSATION

I. All proposed changes in group rates shall be submitted to the Director of Nonacademic Personnel not later than September I preceding the biennium beginning the following July 1, shall be effective not before the beginning of the biennium, and shall not be exceeded during the biennium.

A. Subject to the foregoing limitations, The University will pay prevailing rates to all employees in any group when such a rate has been determined or can be determined by the University for that group under the following conditions: Such rates are to be paid only after they have been put into effect locally; they are effective from the date they have been made effective locally; provided that notice has been given the Director of Nonacademic Personnel before the expiration of a local agreement upon which the local prevailing rate is based; if notice is not given in accordance with the preceding condition, rates will become effective only from the date that notice has been given to the Director of Nonacademic Personnel that the rates are in effect locally; no retroactive pay shall be effective prior to the beginning of a biennium in which the rates are made effective by the University; if the local prevailing rate declines during a biennium, the University will follow such declines, but no rates at the University will be reduced below those in effect at the beginning of the biennium. Vacations, disability leave, retirement and death benefits are granted to prevailing rate employees only in accordance with Sections VI to XI inclusive irrespective of local prevailing practice in these matters. In some classifications the University will pay rates below the prevailing rates during the probationary period of not to exceed six months. (Schedules are available showing the classifications subject to the prevailing rate rule as of July I, 1945. Changes in these schedules will be made only with the approval of the Director of Nonacademic Personnel. Employees concerned will be advised whenever such changes are made.)

In this connection, a telegram from representatives of labor organizations was read.

Mr. Morey commented on this matter, and stated that action is needed on the present recommendation of the Director of Nonacademic Personnel, and that other proposed changes, including those referred to in the telegram, were under discussion.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the amendment to the rules was approved as recommended, and the telegram was referred to the President of the University and the Director of Nonacademic Personnel.

APPOINTMENT OF "M." SHIMPE NISHIMURA AS RESEARCH ASSISTANT IN BOTANY

(4) Professor Robert Emerson, now at the California Institute of Technology, has been appointed Research Professor of Botany in the Graduate School beginning September 1, 1946. He will be in charge of an important new development

of research and teaching in the field of photosynthesis.

Professor Emerson desires to have as his Research Assistant "M." Shimpe Nishimura, now a Research Assistant at the California Institute of Technology, who has been associated with Professor Emerson in research work before. Mr. Nishimura has a combination of professional qualifications useful in photosynthesis research which probably could not be duplicated. He is trained in physics and chemistry, and especially in the study of nuclear phenomena, which training is essential for the research program in photosynthesis. He has acquainted himself with biological problems at the research level and has had much practical experience in the growth of plants. He is known to Professor Emerson as a stimulating investigator in such fields as photosynthesis as the University of Illinois will necessarily cover. Because of his special qualifications and because he is Professor Emerson's first choice, I recommend his appointment as Research Assistant in Botany for the period beginning September 1, 1946, and ending August 31, 1947, at a salary of \$2,760.

Authorization of this appointment by the Board of Trustees is necessary because of the rules of the Board governing the employment of noncitizens of the United States. Mr. Nishimura was born in Japan and he can not under existing laws become a citizen of the United States. He came to this country as a small child and was educated in the public schools of California and in the

institutions of higher learning in that state. The University of California has a regulation similar to that of the University of Illinois but has made exceptions similar to the one in the proposed appointment of "M." Shimpe Nishimura.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was authorized as recommended.

REAPPOINTMENT OF PROFESSOR WALTER S. MONROE AS ACTING DEAN OF THE COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

(5) A year ago when the deanship of the College of Education became vacant, Professor Walter S. Monroe was appointed Acting Dean of the College for the academic year 1945-1946. President Willard recommended the appointment of an acting dean in order to leave the way open for his successor to select a dean. Although I have given a good deal of thought to this position and have had

Although I have given a good deal of thought to this position and have had conferences with representatives of the faculty of the College of Education, it has not been possible to reach any definite conclusions which would justify my recommending the appointment of a dean at this time. It seems to me that the best interests of the University would be served by continuing Professor Monroe in the position of Acting Dean. I have discussed this with him and he is willing to carry on for another year.

I therefore recommend that Professor Walter S. Monroe be appointed Acting Dean of the College of Education for one year from September 1, 1946, under the same terms as heretofore, viz., at a salary of \$1,000 in addition to his salary of \$6,500 as Professor of Education and Director of the Bureau of Educational Research.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this appointment was made as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF DIRECTOR OF THE INSTITUTE OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

(6) I recommend that Dr. Phillips Bradley, now Professor and Director of Extension of the New York State School of Industrial and Labor Relations, Cornell University, Ithaca, be appointed Director of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations with the rank of Professor at the University of Illinois, effective August 1, 1946, at an annual salary of \$9,000. His appointment as Director will be until August 31, 1947, conforming in tenure to other appointments of this rank, and his appointment as Professor is on indefinite tenure.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this appointment was made as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF PROFESSOR HENNING LARSEN AS HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH

(7) Professor H. N. Hillebrand, who was Head of the Department of English and who has been on leave of absence because of physical disability since November 1, 1944, has resigned his position as Head of the Department. During his absence Professor Henning Larsen has been Acting Head of the Department.

A year ago the President of the University on recommendation of the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences appointed a special committee to consider candidates for the permanent headship and to make recommendations. This committee has unanimously recommended the appointment of Professor Henning Larsen as permanent Head of the Department.

In accordance with the University of Illinois Statutes, all members of the Department of English of professorial rank were consulted concerning the committee's recommendation, and the result is an overwhelming endorsement of Professor Larsen. I am, therefore, recommending that Professor Larsen be made Head of the Department of English on indefinite tenure beginning September I, 1946, at an annual salary of \$8,000.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this appointment was made as recommended.

HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ART

(8) A committee of the Department of Art and the Dean of the College of Fine and Applied Arts recommend the appointment of Dr. Frank J. Roos, now Professor of Art History at Ohio State University, to the position of Professor and Head of the Department of Art, on indefinite tenure, at an annual salary of \$6,000, effective September 1, 1946. This appointment is to replace Professor James G. Van Derpool, who has resigned to accept a position at Columbia University. I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this appointment was made as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF MECHANICAL ENGINEERING

(9) I recommend that Professor Norman Alwyn Parker, now Professor and Head of the Department of Mechanical and Aeronautical Engineering at the University of Colorado, Boulder, be appointed Professor of Mechanical Engineering and Head of the Department at the University of Illinois, on indefinite tenure, effective September 1, 1946, at an annual salary of \$8,500.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this appointment was made as recommended.

EXCHANGE OF PROFESSORS FRED C. HOOD AND AMIR BOKTOR

(10) Dr. Fred C. Hood, Assistant High School Visitor with the rank of Associate Professor, has been offered a position in the American University at Cairo, Egypt, as an exchange professor for a period of approximately ten months of the school year, 1946-1947. In exchange, the University of Illinois will have the services of Professor Amir Boktor of the American University at Cairo.

The exchange plan will necessitate Doctor Hood's absence from the University of Illinois during the period beginning approximately September 1, 1046, and ending July 1, 1047. Under the provisions of this plan Doctor Hood will receive his salary from the University of Illinois during the period of his absence. His replacement, Doctor Boktor, will receive his salary from the American University at Cairo during the time that he is serving as an exchange professor at the University of Illinois. He will be assigned to teaching duties in the College of Education and will also be given an opportunity during the academic year 1946-1947 to visit selected high schools with a member of the staff of the High School Visitor's Office and to participate in regional educational conferences sponsored by that office. Doctor Hood's duties will be distributed among other members of the High School Visitor's staff at no additional expense to the University.

The High School Visitor recommends approval of this exchange arrangement and I concur.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this arrangement was approved as recommended.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(11) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded the following who have made applications therefor under the Accountancy Act of 1943 and who have presented evidence to the Committee that they are properly qualified:

EASEMENT FOR INTERCEPTING SEWERS

(13) The Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District is about to construct additional intercepting sewers and appurtenances thereto to connect with the lateral sewers now constructed and hereafter to be constructed in the cities of Urbana and Champaign for the purpose of furnishing additional means for the disposal of domestic sewage. The Board of Trustees of the University on February 24, 1945, appropriated \$39,200 as the University's share of the cost of constructing two new intercepting sewers.

In order to construct these sewers it will be necessary for the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District of Champaign County, Illinois, to obtain a perpetual easement upon, under, and through property which this sewer will cross. The Board of Trustees has been asked to grant the perpetual easement, privilege, right, and authority to construct, reconstruct, repair, maintain, and operate said additional intercepting sewers upon, under, and through the following described real estate situated in the County of Champaign, and State of Illinois, and along a course generally from east to west through this real estate, to wit:

A strip of ground known as the old right-of-way of the street railway company, 40 feet wide and extending from Wright Street in Champaign east to what is known as Nelson or Mathews Avenue in Urbana and located in the Northwest Quarter of the Northeast Quarter of Section 18 in Township 19 North, Range 9 East, 3rd P.M., and

A part of the North ½, Northwest ¼ of Section 18 Township 19 North, Range 9 East of the 3rd P.M. described as follows:

Range 9 East of the 3rd P.M. described as follows:

Commencing at the NE corner of Block 6 of J. S. Wright's addition to the City of Champaign, thence North along the West line of Wright Street in the City of Champaign, Illinois, a distance of 40 feet more or less to the SE corner of Block 1 in said Addition, thence West along the South line of said Block 1 to the SW corner thereof, being the East line of Sixth Street in said City of Champaign, thence South along the East line of Sixth Street, a distance of 40 feet more or less to the NW corner of Block 6 in said J. S. Wright's Addition to the City of Champaign, Illinois, thence East along the North line of said Block 6, to the place of beginning situated in the City of Champaign, County of Champaign, State of Illinois.

In consideration of the grant of easement the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District agrees to protect all interests and rights of the University with regard to the location of the sewer and the standard of construction and also to protect the University from any loss, damage, or expense in the nature of legal liability which may result from the construction of this sewer.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees grant the easement requested and that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute

the same.

DEFICIT IN CHICAGO ILLINI UNION OPERATING BUDGET FOR 1946-1947

(14) The Physical Plant Department reports that it will not be possible to maintain the standard of service needed in the Chicago Illini Union Building as rendered in the past on the funds available in the budget. This is partially due to the fact that because instructional schedules for the coming year result in a reduction in the number of terms in which student fees are collected, the income will be less than in the past. It is also due to the fact that the University has not increased its appropriations to the Union for the fees of faculty members who have been added to the staff. The Board approved the principle of paying such fees in its meeting of August 31, 1943 (Minutes, page 514). The indicated deficiency is \$3,045 and the reductions in service would be of a rather serious character.

On July 18, 1944 (Minutes, page 11), the Board made an appropriation of \$50,000 to apply toward the deficit in the Illini Union Building for the bicnnium 1943-1945, with the understanding that when the operations of the building showed a net surplus which would be available for the repayment of these sums they would be repaid to the University from this surplus. During the year 1945-1946 there has been charged against the fund charges of the Union against the University in excess of the amount provided in the regular 1945-1946 budget. As a result there is a balance in this fund as of June 30, 1946, amounting to \$40,705.

Provision should be made for the added cost in the Chicago Illini Union budget for 1946-1947, and this charge may be taken from the above-mentioned balance. The Comptroller recommends that the Board authorize such a charge.

I concur and recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this transfer of funds was authorized as recommended.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(15) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following purposes:

These proposed improvements have been carefully studied by the Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures. Its reports giving details of the reasons for these improvements are submitted herewith.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these appropriations were made as recommended by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS AND AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(16) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association requests approval of the following actions:

(1) Appropriations from the unappropriated surplus of the Athletic Association and the award of contracts as indicated for permanent improvements.

(a) Concrete structures within the Stadium to provide a storage room for certain volatiles, such as turpentine, kerosene, shellac, etc.; a central ticket office; and an equipment room. Contract to be awarded to the Bolton Company for \$2,350.

(b) Drilling a well at the southwest corner of the Stadium to furnish water for greens at the golf course, the gridiron, or the practice fields adjacent to the Stadium. Upon recommendation of the Geological Survey, the contract is to be

awarded to Hayes and Sims for \$3,000.

(c) Purchase of new bleachers for Huff Gymnasium at a cost of \$8,575.50.

Contract to be awarded to the Leavitt Manufacturing Company.

(d) Concreting steps and approach area at the south end of the Stadium at a cost of \$4,512.50. Contract to be awarded to Mr. Lynne Meyer. (Emergency action was requested on this action, and it has been approved by the Comptroller.)

(e) Concreting the approaches and walks at the north end of the Stadium

at a cost of \$2,285. Contract to be awarded to Mr. Lynne Meyer.

- (f) Construction of ticket windows for the Stadium at a maximum cost of \$9,000. Contract to be awarded to King and Petry.
- (2) Appropriations from the unappropriated surplus of the Athletic Association for operating expenses in 1946-1947.

(a) Purchase of equipment necessary to establish a training table at the

Stadium, total cost not to exceed the sum of \$1,500.

(b) A special appropriation to the Alumni Association in consideration of the ticket sales in the Illini Center in Chicago, and the services of the Alumni Field Secretaries. Amount of the appropriation, \$3,000.

Contracts, unless otherwise indicated, have been awarded on the basis of

competitive bidding.

The above actions have been reviewed by the Comptroller, and he submits them for approval. I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these awards were approved.

APPROPRIATION FOR COOPERATIVE PROJECT IN GENERAL EDUCATION

(17) Developments during the last few years have greatly intensified national interest in general education. The experience of a number of colleges and universities in trying to provide programs of general education has resulted in fairly common agreement on the answers to certain questions that are raised in the process of developing such work. There is common agreement that the purpose of general education is to provide the education necessary for the intelligent layman and citizen. There is also common agreement that a major part of the educational emphasis through the fourteenth grade should be on general educa-tion. Experience has demonstrated that it is difficult, if not impossible, to get an adequate program of general education through the use of courses limited to specific subject fields and that general courses cutting across subject lines are usually necessary.

The Provost of the University has been meeting with representatives of about twenty other universities and colleges to discuss informally and without commitment the possible development of a cooperative project in general educacommitment the possible development of a cooperative project in general educa-tion. These discussions have now reached the point from which it is desirable to proceed on an official basis. The steps indicated are (1) to give official recog-nition to the organization of the project and the participation therein by the University of Illinois, (2) the assignment of \$500 to be matched by an equal assignment from each of the other institutions, the entire sum to be placed at the disposal of an Executive Committee for the expenses of the project, (3) designation of an official representative of the University of Illinois.

I recommend that the Board authorize the participation of the University in

this project and that an appropriation of \$500 be made from the General Reserve Fund to cover the University's share of the cost.

On motion of Dr. Luken, the participation of the University was authorized and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green.

INCREASE IN FEDERAL FUNDS FOR EXTENSION WORK IN AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS

(18) The internal budget for 1946-1947 includes a budget for Federal extension funds based on the same allotment received during 1945-1946. On June 7, 1946, the University was advised that the Bankhead-Flannagan funds allotted to the University of Illinois for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1946, had been increased by \$125,089 to a total of \$249,859. At the time this notice was received, the preparation of the internal budget had progressed too far to include this additional sum, and a revised budget is submitted now.

It is proposed to allocate the increase in the funds as follows:

COMMITMENTS AGAINST ANTICIPATED APPROPRIATIONS

APPOINTMENTS OF ASSOCIATE DEANS IN DIVISION OF UNDERGRADUATE STUDIES IN CHICAGO

(25) Pursuant to authorization given the President of the University by the Board of Trustees (Minutes, May 29, 1946, page 1121) to employ the necessary personnel for the operation of a branch of the University in Chicago, the following major appointments have been made in the Division of Undergraduate Studies in Chicago:

FEES FOR INSTITUTE OF AERONAUTICS FLIGHT TRAINING PROGRAM

(26) On May 29, 1946 (Minutes, page 1100), the Board approved fees for Institute of Aeronautics flight training courses on the basis of \$6.00 an hour for solo flight instruction and \$9.00 an hour for dual flight instruction. These basic rates led to variations in the total course fee for courses then approved from \$222 a term to \$345 a term.

The Committee on Fees and Scholarships has now reviewed the entire program of instruction with Dr. Leslie A. Bryan, Director of the Institute of Aeronautics, and has studied a breakdown of the actual costs of instruction and

operation for the courses offered by the Institute of Aeronautics.

The Committee on Fees and Scholarships recommends that the previous action of the Board be modified by establishing a materials and supply see of \$250 a term for each of the following courses, namely, Institute of Aeronautics 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6. The Committee further recommends that authorization be recommended to establish the committee further recommends that authorization be granted to establish the same fee for any further courses in flight instruction which are comparable with the courses already being given. All students registered in these courses also pay the usual tuition charges unless by reason of a scholarship they are exempted.

It is recommended that these changes in the program become effective

beginning with the first semester of 1946-1947.

I concur in the recommendations.

The Provost presented this matter.

Scovill be reappointed as Acting Dean of the College of Commerce and Business Administration beginning September I, 1946, and continuing until further notice under the same conditions as heretofore, namely, at a salary rate of \$1,000 a year for his services as Acting Dean in addition to his salary of \$7,750 for his services as Professor of Accountancy and Head of the Department of Business Organization and Operation.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this appointment was authorized as recommended.

GIFT OF ROBERT ALLERTON

(28) A report of the progress of discussion with Mr. Robert Allerton on the terms of his gift of land for the Robert Allerton Park and for the maintenance thereof. It seems most desirable to preserve and make use of the house, and it is hoped that the income from the land will be sufficient to maintain both park and house.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the President of the University was authorized to have further conversations with Mr. Allerton and to report the result to the Board.

PROPOSED BRANCH AT GALESBURG

(29) The Provost, the Comptroller, and other officers have inspected the Mayo General Hospital at Galesburg, which is about to be released by the Army, and have found that the buildings are easily convertible for use in the housing and instruction of about 2000 students. There is no equipment suitable for use in instruction. The authorities of Galesburg, and of Knox College, are agreeable to the establishment of a branch of the University at the Mayo Hospital. We have reasonable assurance that the University could get the plant under a temporary lease, I feel that we should have more information before making a recommendation.

The Provost presented this matter.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the President of the University was authorized to explore this project and to develop it as far as possible within the resources available.

RESPONSIBILITY OF THE UNIVERSITY FOR HOUSING RACIAL MINORITIES

(30) A report on conferences which have taken place between University officials and representatives of various organizations relating to student housing policies and practices in Champaign-Urbana. Since these conferences began before the President took office, he has not had an opportunity to participate in them but stated that they will be continued, and he is planning to confer with a number of interested parties at Urbana during the month of August.

Action on this matter was deferred.

FINANCIAL SITUATION

(31) We have asked for an early conference with the Governor to give the President of the Board and the President of the University an opportunity to present the need of the University for a supplemental appropriation of \$6,000,000 to enable it to take care of veterans and other students who want to attend. If a special session is out of the question, it would appear that the Governor and members of the General Assembly should make public announcement of their support of the program of the University.

The Provost and the Comptroller commented on this matter.

The Secretary read the resolution adopted June 15 (Minutes, page 1152).

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the Board reiterated the resolution adopted June 15, 1946, and instructed the Secretary to transmit the resolution and a statement of the facts to Governor Green.

HOSPITAL AND MEDICAL SERVICE INSURANCE

Mr. Williamson presented the following:

The finance committee has received from the Comptroller a report of bids secured by the Purchasing Agent on hospital and medical service insurance in the Urbana-Champaign departments for the year beginning September 19, 1946. Total premiums were stated on the basis of uniform benefits the same as in past years but with the following additions:

1. Extension of insurance to cover confinement in the individual's residence location for any period in which space is not available in a hospital in the University community.

2. A family rate covering spouse and children. The lowest bid, allowing for estimated dividend at the close of the policy year, was submitted by the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company through Earl H. Clay, agent, of Chicago, for an estimated total of \$158,478.

The Finance Committee recommends acceptance of this bid.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this bid was accepted as recommended.

INVESTMENT OF ENDOWMENT AND STUDENT LOAN FUNDS

Mr. Williamson presented also the following report.

The Finance Committee, on advice of the First National Bank of Chicago, investment counsel, authorized the purchase of the following securities on April 8, May 21, and July 15, 1946.

CIVIL AERONAUTICS BOARD HEARING

The Legal Counsel stated that the Civil Aeronautics Board on July 12, 1946, had granted Leave to Intervene in the Great Lakes Area Case on the joint petition of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois

The Legal Counsel was directed to prepare the necessary exhibits and briefs and continue with the case.

CONDEMNATION OF SITE FOR CHEMISTRY BUILDING

The Legal Counsel presented also the following Resolution and recommended its adoption:

Trelease, have been made to Robert E. Milligan to purchase these tracts of real estate, and each and both of them, and Robert E. Milligan has refused to accept the offers so made for the purchase thereof; and Robert E. Milligan has, in said negotiations, offered to sell and convey this real estate to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois for a consideration and price which the Board of of the University of Illinois for a consideration and price which the Board of Trustees has refused to pay therefor.

Be it further resolved, that it is hereby declared that compensation to be paid for the purchase of said property can not be agreed upon between this Board of Trustees and Robert E. Milligan, and that Robert E. Milligan and this Board of Trustees are unable to agree upon the purchase price to be paid Robert

E. Milligan for the property.

It is further resolved by the Board of Trustees, that the necessary and appropriate action be taken for the acquisition of this property by proceedings in eminent domain, and that the Legal Counsel of the University and of the Board of Trustees, is hereby authorized to proceed accordingly and to employ legal counsel to assist in the prosecution of eminent domain proceedings.

Mr. Britton stated that the Resolution seeks to consolidate the various actions of the Board of Trustees with respect to the condemnation of the Milligan property.

Authority is granted in the Resolution for the appointment of outside counsel.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this resolution was adopted by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green.

QUIT CLAIM DEED TO HOWARD PROPERTY

The Legal Counsel presented also the request of Attorney Edwin W. Sale for a Quit Claim Deed to "South 55 feet and 1 inch of Lot 4 in Minnie R. Murray's Replat of Lots 4, 5 and 6 in Block 5 of W. C. Barrett's Addition to Champaign, Illinois." Mr. Britton explained that this lot was left by the Will of Charles P. Howard to Hartwell C. Howard and the First National Bank of Chicago as Trustee for Hartwell C. Howard for life, with remainder interest in one-half of said lot to the Y.M.C.A. of Champaign and one-half to the University of Illinois.

The trust contained an unrestricted power of sale in the trustee. The trustee exercised the power of sale and sold the lot for \$3,500. This money is now held by the Northern Trust Company of Chicago.

The Quit Claim Deed is asked in order to clear up a technical objection to the title arising from the fact that one of the trustees, Hartwell C. Howard, was the life beneficiary, and that after the sale of the lot to the grantees, these grantees in turn conveyed the lot to Hartwell C. Howard who, in turn, now proposes to sell it to Charles L. Ferguson and his wife.

Mr. Britton stated that for the above information he was relying on a conference with Mr. Sale and a letter from Mr. Sale. He recommended that the Board of Trustees execute the Quit Claim Deed as requested, subject to his confirmation of the above information by examination of the terms of the trust instrument and other documents.

President Stoddard concurred in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois were authorized and directed to execute the Quit Claim Deed on receipt of certification from the Legal Counsel that the University's interests were in no way adversely affected by the execution of such instrument. This motion was adopted by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 20, 1946

The Secretary presented for record the minutes of a meeting of the Executive Committee.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at 2 p.m. on Friday, September 20, 1946, at the Univer-

sity Club, 76 East Monroe Street, Chicago.

Mr. Park Livingston, Chairman, General Chester R. Davis, and Dr. Karl A. Meyer, members of the Executive Committee, were present; also Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, and Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary.

Matters Presented by Mr. Morey

The Executive Committee considered the following matters presented by the Comptroller.

Use of Mayo General Hospital for Proposed Undergraduate Branch at Galesburg

(1) On July 30, 1946 (Minutes, page 17), the President of the University was authorized to explore the possibilities of securing from the government the Mayo General Hospital at Galesburg for use as an additional undergraduate branch of the University for a temporary period to aid in taking care of demands for admission to the University, especially by veterans, which exceed existing facilities.

The President reports that, in accordance with this instruction, he contacted the appropriate federal authorities and found that the Hospital had been assigned to the State of Illinois in response to its request for use by the Department of Public Welfare as a hospital. The President of the University and the President of the Board then conferred with Governor Green, who, after thorough consideration, released the Hospital to the University for a temporary period estimated

at three to five years.

President Stoddard reports that he and other University officers have secured the necessary action by the federal agencies involved to turn over to the University on or about September 20, 1946, the land, buildings, equipment, and supplies constituting the Hospital, under conditions which University officers

consider satisfactory.

Be it resolved, by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University, that the actions of the President of the Board of Trustees and the President of the University in securing the allocation of the Mayo General Hospital at Galesburg to the University are hereby ratified and confirmed, and

Be it further resolved, that Park Livingston, President, and Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, of the Board of Trustees, be and are hereby authorized to execute any and all receipts, contracts, and other documents that may be required to complete the transfer to the University of the land, buildings, equipment, and supplies constituting the Mayo General Hospital at Galesburg.

The President of the University is further authorized, if the arrangements for the transfer of the Mayo General Hospital to the University are concluded, to approve and authorize the execution of contracts for reconstruction and remodeling, to authorize the purchase of equipment and supplies that may be necessary, and to authorize the appointment or employment of necessary personnel for instruction, administration, and operation of the Undergraduate Division at Galesburg, subject to the presentation of a complete budget to the Board of Trustees as soon as practicable.

The Comptroller is authorized to make payment on account of such contracts and other obligations, from existing funds of the University, with the

understanding that a special additional emergency appropriation for this project

will be requested of the General Assembly when it next convenes.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these resolutions were adopted.

Engineering and Construction at Mayo General Hospital

(2) Proposals from the C-S Engineering Company, of Springfield, and from Ostrom and Maguire Construction Company, for engineering and construction, respectively, necessary to adapt the Mayo General Hospital for University purposes. The Physical Plant Department requests authority to execute these contracts on the basis of proposals which it considers acceptable, at fixed fees in addition to the direct construction costs.

On motion of General Davis, the appropriate officers of the Board were

authorized to execute these contracts.

The Executive Committee adjourned.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

GIFT OF ROBERT ALLERTON AND PURCHASE OF RUGS

(1) The University will soon receive from Mr. Robert Allerton his estate near Monticello, Illinois. This has been considered by the Board on a number of occasions, and the offer was formally accepted at the meeting on June 27, 1946. The estate consists of a large Georgian mansion which may be used for any purpose the University desires; a garden, forest, and prairie area of approximately 1,685 acres to be used for educational and research purposes, as a forest wildlife and plant reserve, as an example of landscape architectural gardening, and as a public park; approximately 4,500 acres of farm lands will endow the maintenance and operation of the estate.

For several weeks Mr. Allerton has been considering revisions in his proposed deed of gift, which will make it even more attractive than when his offer was accepted by the Board of Trustees. The original proposal provided that the income from the farms may be used only for the operation and maintenance of the park area. He is now providing that part of the income from the farms may be used for the operation and maintenance of the house, which is very important to the University. He is also making changes in the deed of gift which will eliminate the contingent interest of parties other than the

University and the general public.

As a part of the acquisition of these splendid facilities for the promotion of educational, scientific, and general cultural interests, the University has been offered the opportunity of purchasing from the Chicago Art Institute an unusual collection of thirty-six oriental rugs. These rugs were originally purchased for the Allerton House but are now the property of the Art Institute. They are for the most part antique rugs of great value and have been offered to the University for the nominal sum of \$5,000, which is a small fraction of their original cost and of their present market value. They belong and are needed in the Allerton House, and if they were not acquired now, ultimately some other, and perhaps less suitable, floor coverings will have to be purchased at probably greater cost.

I recommend that the purchase of these rugs be authorized and that an appropriation of \$5,000 be made from the General Reserve Fund for this purpose. The University will receive during the current farm-year income from the endowment farms which will offset by several times the cost of these rugs.

Professor Britton outlined the terms of the draft of the deed as modified during conferences with Mr. Allerton and his attorney, all changes being favorable to the University, and stated that he expected to receive the final draft of the deed within the next few days.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the terms outlined were approved.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR REMODELING OF NAVY PIER

(2) The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees on August 22, 1946, authorized a contract with Michael J. McDermott and Company, Chicago, for the remodeling of that part of Navy Pier leased by the University for use as the "Division of Undergraduate Studies of the University of Illinois in Chicago."

Michael J. McDermott and Company are completely familiar with the Pier,

Michael J. McDermott and Company are completely familiar with the Pier, having done much of the work of remodeling for the United States Navy. There was no opportunity nor time enough to secure competitive bids on this remodeling job if the Pier were to be ready for use on or about October 15. No other construction company could be chosen from among those who might be willing to accept the assignment, because the preparation of new drawings and specifications would consume a great deal of time, whereas Michael J. McDermott and Company could start the job immediately with their own previously prepared drawings.

In view of these considerations, the President of the University recommended and the Executive Committee approved a contract for the remodeling of Navy Pier with Michael J. McDermott and Company on the basis of cost plus fixed fee. The fee will be based on the estimated cost of the project as agreed upon by the contractor and the University. The University will pay the fixed fee plus the actual cost of the work which may ultimately be above or

below the estimate.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the Board concurred in the action of the Executive Committee.

CLINICAL FACULTY OF THE COLLEGE OF MEDICINE 1946-1947

(3) A recommendation that appointments be made (as printed in the Appendix, page 78) to the nonsalaried or clinical faculty of the College of Medicine for the academic year beginning September 1, 1946; and that the President of the University be authorized to make such additional appointments and other changes as are desirable and necessary.

ENGLISH REQUIREMENT FOR FOREIGN STUDENTS

(7) The University Senate recommends adoption by the Board of Trustees of

the following policy requiring proficiency in English of foreign students:

1. A foreign student shall attain the proficiency in English necessary for adequate work in his other academic courses. The judgment of this proficiency shall be under the jurisdiction of the Senate Committee on Student English in conjunction with the college in which the student is registered. Such proficiency may on recommendation of the Committee on Student English be accepted in lieu of Rhetoric I and 2.

2. No student shall be allowed to register for a full academic program in

other fields before attaining such proficiency.

3. The University is under no obligation to give special training for foreign students inadequately trained in English. Yet it is good university policy to do so,

for it is most important that the foreign students gain an appreciation of the language, culture, and the social ideals of our country.

4. The Department of English shall, therefore, be instructed to set up such course, or courses, as seem necessary for adequate training of foreign students.

5. On a student's completion of such courses, appropriate elective credit

shall be assigned him by whatever college has jurisdiction.

6. It is further recommended that the University authorities on admission study the possibility of checking in advance the proficiency in English of foreign applicants and of limiting admission to such students as are sufficiently trained to profit by study in America.

7. Any adequate intensive language program is costly. Therefore, it is further recommended that the University administration consider the assessment

of special fees for courses in English for foreigners.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these recommendations were approved.

ADDITIONAL APPOINTMENTS TO MAJOR POSITIONS IN THE DIVISION OF UNDERGRADUATE STUDIES IN CHICAGO

(8) Pursuant to the authorization of the Board of Trustees, the President of the University has made the following appointments to major positions in the Division of Undergraduate Studies in Chicago:

H. W. BAILEY, former Director of the Student Personnel Bureau and Associate Professor of Mathematics, to the position of Associate Dean of Liberal Arts and Sciences and Associate Professor of Mathematics, beginning August I, 1946, and continuing through August 31, 1947, at an annual salary rate of \$7,500.

J. O. Jones, former Instructor in Physical Education for Men, to the position of Director of Physical Education and Associate Professor of Physical Education for Men, beginning September 1, 1946, and continuing through August 31, 1947, at an annual salary rate of \$4,400.

H. E. TEMMER, former Assistant Director of the Division of Special Services for War Veterans, assigned to the Registrar's Office, to the position of Examiner and Recorder, beginning July 22, 1946, and continuing through August 31, 1947, at an annual salary rate of \$4,500.

D. K. Maxfield, to the position of Librarian, beginning September 1, 1946,

and continuing through August 31, 1947, at an annual salary rate of \$4,500.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the action of the President of the University in making these appointments was approved and confirmed.

BUDGET FOR UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION AT CHICAGO (NAVY PIER) FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1946-1947

(9) The internal budget for the new Undergraduate Division of the University at the Navy Pier in Chicago for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1946, and coverappointments for the academic year 1946-1947, is submitted herewith (see Appendix, page 90). The budget has been compiled by Dean Caveny with the assistance of Business Manager Hazleton on estimates supplied by the various educational officers at the branch and the general University offices represented there. It is summarized as follows:

This budget is considerably greater than the preliminary estimate of \$2,000,000 submitted to the Budgetary Commission on June 26 and to the Board of Trustees on June 27 (pages 1168-1169). Reasons for this increase may be summarized as follows:

1. The preliminary budget was compiled on very incomplete information and

before any detailed review of the program had been completed.

2. The amount of space required for the division is considerably greater than that originally contemplated, thus requiring a considerable increase in rent.

3. The cost of remodeling and equipping the area is much greater than originally expected, due to the fact that many facilities were removed by the Navy which it was earlier thought would be available to the University.

4. Detailed studies have indicated that the original estimates for academic,

administrative, and physical plant services were much too low.

I recommend:

1. That this budget be approved.

2. That the President of the University be authorized to (a) make such changes or adjustments as are needed, (b) make such additional appointments as may become necessary, and (c) accept such resignations as are offered, as the needs of the division may indicate from time to time, all within the total of the budget as submitted.

3. That the Comptroller be authorized to pay out of funds presently appropriated by the General Assembly, expenditures against this budget in anticipation

of the additional income and special appropriations above indicated.

The Comptroller commented on this budget.

PETTY CASH FUND FOR GALESBURG BRANCH

(10) In connection with the proposed undergraduate division of the University at Galesburg, Illinois, a petty cash fund and local depository bank will be necessary. The University Statutes (Article 50-E) provide that the Board must approve each such fund of more than \$1,000 and designate the bank in which it

is to be deposited.

It is difficult to anticipate the exact amount of fund that may be required, as the exact conditions of operation are yet subject to development. The Comptroller requests authority to establish a fund to such an amount as may be found necessary, not to exceed \$25,000, and requests an assignment from the General Reserve Fund for this purpose. He also recommends, on advice of Treasurer I. L. Porter, that the First Galesburg National Bank and Trust Company be designated as the depository for this fund.

Approval of these recommendations is requested.

ADMISSION TO THE UNDERGRADUATE DIVISIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

(11) The Provost of the University recommends the adoption of the following policy governing undergraduate divisions of the University of Illinois:

Priority of admission to the Undergraduate Divisions of the University of Illinois in Chicago and Galesburg will be given to former students of the University and to those who previously have been issued permits to enter in September, 1946, at Urbana. Other applicants who are nonresidents of Illinois will be admitted only if facilities are available after provision has been made for qualified residents of the State.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this policy was adopted as recommended.

HOSPITAL AND MEDICAL SERVICE FEE AND INSURANCE AT CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(12) In 1943 (Minutes, April 29, 1943, page 325), the Board of Trustees approved a recommendation for an assessment of a uniform hospital and medical service fee of \$5 a semester against all students in the Urbana departments. Exempted are certain groups of part-time and nonresident students, students who are also on the staff, and others who present evidence that they have insurance providing the same benefits as those provided by the University plan. On July 30, 1946 (Minutes, page 18), the Board approved an insurance contract for this service with the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company.

The Dean of Students has recommended that this fee and the service which it covers be extended to all students in the Undergraduate Division at Navy Pier in Chicago under the same conditions as those applying in the Urbana departments. The Dean of the Division and the Provost concur in this recommendation. The Liberty Mutual Insurance Company is willing to extend this policy for 1946-1947 to include this added division (as well as the Galesburg Division if established) at the same rates as previously quoted for Urbana. The

Comptroller recommends that this offer be accepted.

I concur in these proposals and recommend that hospital and medical services and the uniform fee assessed for this purpose be extended to any undergraduate divisions of the University established at locations other than Urbana.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

INSURANCE ON NOYES LABORATORY

(13) One policy of fire and extended insurance on the Noyes Laboratory requires renewal on October 1, 1946, covering the building for \$59,648 and contents for \$30,727. In addition there is other insurance on the building amounting to \$258,352 and on contents amounting to \$133,273. The policy is for five years on an 80 per cent co-insurance basis. The insurance is on a 75/25 per cent ratio between stock and mutual insurance companies, in accordance with the rules of the Board. Renewal of this insurance in a stock company is necessary to preserve this ratio.

All agencies quoted a uniform premium of \$1,092.02. The Purchasing Agent's office recommends that the insurance be placed with the Westchester Fire Insurance Company through the DeLong Insurance Company of Champaign, in order to maintain an equitable distribution among agencies and companies.

The Comptroller requests approval of this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this recommendation was adopted.

CONTRACT FOR COAL FOR TEMPORARY HOUSES

(14) The Purchasing Agent reports that he has secured bids on 1,750 tons of 3 x 2 lump coal required for the operation of temporary student houses for the current school year through June 30, 1947. Southern Illinois coal was specified as being needed for this purpose. The following quotations were received, all of which were subject to future price adjustments except those of the Acme Coal Company:

(15) Bids were received on July 9, 1946, for the installation of underground steam service and return in woodlog for the Physics Research Laboratory (Betatron Building). Specifications were prepared by Sargent and Lundy, engineers for this work, who also reviewed the bids received, which were as follows: Robert Gordon, Inc., \$18,892; Carson-Payson Company, \$26,269.

The lower bid is a firm bid without an escalation clause.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend ac-

ceptance of the bid from Robert Gordon, Inc.

In order to expedite the work on this contract, the matter was submitted to the Executive Committee of the Board, which approved the award to the lower bidder as recommended.

RESOLUTION FOR SECURING EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES FOR VETERANS FROM THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

(19) Public Law 697, approved by Congress on August 8, 1946, amended Title V of the Lanham Act to provide for assistance to educational institutions in relieving acute shortages of educational facilities required for persons who are being educated under the provisions of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944. The law provides that the required assistance will be in the form of structures or facilities including lands, improvements, equipment, materials, or furnishings, and the disassembling, transporting, and re-erecting of buildings. These buildings and facilities must be under the jurisdiction or control of any federal agency and no longer required by such agency. Administration of this part of the Lanham Act has been placed under the Federal Works Administration.

The extent to which such assistance can be secured for the University is problematical. The length of time required to secure certain facilities would make it impracticable to attempt to secure them under the authority of this bill. The Federal Works Administration has encountered some difficulty in securing surplus equipment to distribute since veterans have a higher priority in obtaining possession of surplus equipment.

Even though the extent to which assistance can be obtained is so uncertain, the University has filed with the Federal Works Administration documents indicating their needs. If these are approved it will be necessary for the University to file a formal application for the desired facilities. As a part of this application,

it is necessary that the Board of Trustees adopt the attached resolution.

I recommend that this resolution be adopted.

RESOLUTION FOR VETERANS' EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES PROGRAM

Authorizing the Filing of an Application with the United States of America for Provision of Veterans' Educational Facilities, and Designating and Authorizing

a Representative

Whereas, the University of Illinois (herein called the "Applicant"), acting by and through its governing body, upon the basis of available data, has found that there exists or impends an acute shortage of educational facilities required for persons engaged in the pursuit of courses of training or education under Title II of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, as amended, and to relieve such shortage proposes to request the United States of America through the Bureau of Community Facilities, Federal Works Agency (herein called the "Government"), to provide educational facilities, pursuant to Public Law 697, 79th Congress (Section 504 of the Lanham Act, as amended), and in connection therewith, has examined and considered such law, the Regulations, the Information for Applicants, the form of application and the form of proposed agreement;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the Applicant (herein called the "Governing Body") that a justification of need and that an application or applications be filed, in such form as may be required by the Government, to provide such educational facilities as are required to alleviate such acute shortage, and that the Applicant will comply with the various requirements and conditions necessary to enable the Government to provide such

Be it further resolved that Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, is hereby designated as the Applicant's Representative and is authorized in his capacity as such Representative to file with the Government a justification of need and an application or applications to negotiate, execute, and enter into an agreement or agreements with the Government in substantially the form of agreement considered by the Governing Body, to negotiate, execute and enter into such other agreements and instruments and to perform and do any and all acts as may be necessary to provide a suitable site and site preparation, streets or roadways, sidewalks, landscaping, utility mains, technical or engineering data, architectural or engineering services, necessary rights of entry and rights of way for Government operations, to accept on behalf of the Applicant ownership and possession of such facilities, to assure the Government that such facilities will be utilized by the Applicant to carry out the purposes of such law, and to do or perform any and all other acts that are necessary to accomplish the purposes of the Applicant's application, to perform the Applicant's obligations under its agreement with the Government, and to obtain the provision of such facilities.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this resolution was unanimously adopted.

FINAL SETTLEMENT OF THE LYDIA E. BATES BEQUEST

(20) As previously reported to the Board (Minutes, April 28, 1941, page 271), the late Lydia E. Parker Bates bequeathed to the University the bulk of her estate to establish a fund to be known as "The Lydia E. Parker Bates Fund for the Advancement of Fine Arts." The trust estate which she established provided that the trustees should convert into cash all assets, and after all taxes, insurance, repairs, and other expenses and certain minor legacies had been paid, the bulk should be transferred to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois. The trustees have completed this liquidation and have submitted their final report.

The total receipts of the University from this trust amount to \$178,277.86. The sum of \$164,156.77 of this amount comes from the liquidation of the principal, and \$14,121.09 from the realization of income by the trust during this liqui-

dation.

Since funds have been transmitted to the University of Illinois at various times during the life of the trust, the University has been able to invest, and since 1941, has realized endowment income of \$18,459.19. During this same period, scholarships have been paid in the total amount of \$6,845.00, leaving on hand a total of \$11,614.19. Of this balance \$10,000 is temporarily invested.

This report was received for record.

CHANGE IN NAME OF COMMERCE BUILDING TO DAVID KINLEY HALL

(24) At the meeting of the Board on March 9, 1946 (Minutes, pages 1934-1935), the Board authorized the naming of the Commerce Building "Kinley Hall" as a memorial to the late Dr. David Kinley, former President of the University.

It is now recommended that this name be changed to "David Kinley Hall."

It is now recommended that this name be changed to "David Kinley Hall." A number of buildings in Champaign-Urbana have been constructed through the benevolences of the late Senator William B. McKinley and have been named for him, viz., the University Y.W.C.A. in Champaign which is also known as McKinley Hall, the McKinley Y.M.C.A. in Champaign, the McKinley Memorial Presbyterian Church in Champaign, and the McKinley Foundation. This has resulted in a confusion in names between these various buildings, and adding Kinley Hall might increase difficulties. However, "David Kinley Hall" would be quite distinctive.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this change in name was authorized as recommended.

STATEMENT ON THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE UNIVERSITY FOR THE HOUSING OF RACIAL MINORITIES

(25) The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois has already expressed its general policy on the question of equal and fair treatment for all citizens of this country irrespective of race, creed, or color. In carrying out this policy the University fully appreciates the fact that it has certain responsibilities for action. In addition to the many specific actions it can take and does take as the need may arise, there are four large programs which would substantially modify the circumstances which now give rise to race tensions on and near the campus and to actions which might appear to be discriminatory.

1. It has been, and will continue to be, the obligation of the University to provide facilities for higher education for all qualified young people who may choose these facilities rather than the facilities of other colleges and universities.

2. The University will provide as many educational facilities on the Urbana campus as possible, especially in the professional fields of higher education which could not be offered elsewhere without duplication of buildings, equipment, specialized staff, and services at unnecessary expense to the taxpayer.

3. The University will expect to expand the use of its present facilities and of any new facilities it may secure by the addition of University owned and operated housing to which its own standards of health and of social and moral conduct can be applied.

4. The officers of the University will continue a policy of long standing which will favor and strengthen those attitudes and social philosophies which are necessary to create a community atmosphere in which race prejudice can not thrive.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this statement of policy was approved.

AGREEMENT WITH STATE DEPARTMENT OF REGISTRATION AND EDUCATION FOR CONSTRUCTION OF WATER SURVEY BUILDING

(27) The appropriations made by the 64th General Assembly of Illinois for the biennium of 1945-1947 for a "State-wide system of public works projects" include appropriations to the Department of Registration and Education for additions to the Natural Resources Building at the University of Illinois (which houses the State Natural History and State Geological Surveys), to the Geological Survey

Laboratory for applied research, and for the construction of a new office building and laboratory for the State Water Survey. By State law these three scientific surveys are administered by the State Department of Registration and Education and a Board of Natural Resources and Conservation, but are housed in University of Illinois buildings. In 1939-1940 a new Natural Resources Building was constructed at the University by the State of Illinois for which an appropriation, separate from University appropriations, was made, supplemented by a Federal grant. The construction work was directed by the State Department of Public Works and Buildings (which has charge of all State construction projects except those of the University of Illinois). Once constructed, that building became the property of the University, and the maintenance and servicing are the University's responsibility. Therefore, an agreement was entered into by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the Department of Registration and Education which, in addition to other conditions protecting the interests of both parties, provided that the plans, specifications, and contracts were subject to approval by the University.

A similar agreement has been prepared in relation to the construction of the State Water Survey building. The agreement has been approved by the Director of the Department of Registration and Education and is now submitted to the Board of Trustees. In the meantime, the Physical Plant Department has been working with the architects employed by the State to provide the architectural services for this building. A final understanding as to details covering the general work, drawings, and specifications subject to minor changes has been reached. The Physical Plant Department recommends approval of drawings for the general work and elevator installations; recommendations regarding plumbing, heating, ventilating, and electrical drawings and specifications will be sub-

mitted later.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize its officers to execute an agreement with the State Department of Registration and Education relating to the construction of the State Water Survey building subject to the approval of that agreement by the Physical Plant Department and the Legal Counsel.

I further recommend approval of the drawings and specifications for the

general work.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were approved and authority was granted as recommended.

HOUSING NEEDS FOR CHICAGO DEPARTMENTS

(28) Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Colleges, has requested consideration of plans for meeting the urgent housing needs of the Chicago departments.

Dr. Ivy, being introduced, presented this matter and Mr. Todd

Wheeler discussed possible locations.

The President of the University was requested to study the over-all needs of all departments of the University, and to present his recommendations to the Board.

President Livingston appointed as special committee to work with President Stoddard on this matter: Dr. Meyer, Chairman, Mr. Fornof, and Dr. Luken.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

The Board in executive session considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

SUMMARY OF LEASE OF SPACE ON THE NAVY PIER

(29) Professor Britton's report on the lease of the Navy Pier.

Date of the Lease

When signed, the lease is to be dated August 1, 1946. The lease will be ready for signature as soon as the Navy releases the space. This document has

been drafted and submitted to Captain Ransford of Great Lakes, and orally agreed to.

Term

Until June 30, 1947, with the privilege to the University to renew for successive biennial periods until June 30, 1951, and for successive annual periods until June 30, 1954.

The North Transit Shed, west of Frame 108; the frame building known as the New Mess Hall; office spaces in the head houses; loft space in south passenger building; boiler room at east end of South Transit Shed; the boiler shop; refrigeration and cold storage rooms at east end of North Transit Shed; passageway along east end of Pier roadway; the Recreation Section; the Escort House underneath the approach ramp, and parking space northeast of North Head House.

Rental

The original agreement was 35¢ per square foot for the 253,615 square feet on the Pier, making a rental of \$88,765.25, plus 20,000 square feet for parking at \$5,000.00, making a total of \$93,765.25.

When the University acquired the 99,735 square feet of additional space, at the suggestion of the City it was agreed to state the rent, not in terms of a price per square foot, but as an annual rental. At 35¢ per square foot, 353,350 square feet would have been \$123,662.50. This sum, plus the rental for parking space of \$5,000.00 would be \$128,662.50.

The present agreed annual rental is \$117,000.00 per year. For the period

ending June 30, 1947, the rental is \$115,000.00.

Additional Payments

Electricity: Current rates plus an additional charge of 5% on demand meter readings, and 3.5% on net energy readings, to cover pro rata share of line and transformer losses.

Gas: Current rates. (The University may contract direct with the Commonwealth Edison Company and the Peoples Gas Light and Coke Company.)

Water: Current rates.

Heat: Office spaces—\$100.00 per month. The University is to heat the City shop space.

Insurance

The University is to pay \$1,120.00 per year (30¢ per lineal foot) in lieu of insurance against loss to the City from fire, tornado, or other casualty on the Pier.

The University may carry its own Workmens' Compensation Insurance. The University is required to take out Public Liability insurance for the protection of the City-\$100,000.00 for property damage, \$250,000.00 for personal injuries and death in any one accident, and \$50,000.00 for bodily injury.

Insurance companies are to be approved by the joint action of the Comp-

trollers of the City and of the University.

Termination

The University may terminate on six (6) months' notice. After four years, the City may terminate on any June 30, on six (6) months' prior notice.

Navy Property

The City agrees to leave on the Pier for use by the University, any property left there by the Navy, the University to be deemed a lessee thereof from the City, and to pay as rent therefor over a period of four (4) years, the amount that the Navy charges for such property.

Restoration

The University agrees to restore the Pier to the condition it was in when the Navy took possession. The University agrees to deposit in escrow with the First National Bank of Chicago \$100,000.00 on the signing of the lease and an additional \$100,000.00 on or before August 1, 1947, to guarantee restoration.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the terms of this lease were unanimously approved.

PURCHASE OF ILLINOIS TERMINAL RIGHT-OF-WAY

(30) For a number of years the Illinois Terminal Railway Company has had a spur track extending through the business and residential part of Urbana to the University service area on North Mathews and North Goodwin Avenues, Urbana. Formerly the right-of-way extended to a section between Wright Street and Sixth Street in Champaign. When that was abandoned a few years ago, the University acquired the portion within its campus.

The owners of this right-of-way have asked whether the University wishes to acquire the right-of-way. The Physical Plant Department and representatives of the University Planning Committee agree on the desirability of owning this right-of-way which lies between two parts of University property. The property is needed for the service area of this locality. The recommendation is concurred in by the Purchasing Agent and the Comptroller. If the University does not acquire this property, undoubtedly it will promptly fall into other hands, which would be a distinct disadvantage to us.

I recommend that the officers of the University be authorized to negotiate for the purchase of this property and that an appropriation of \$2,500, or as much

thereof as may be found to be required, be made for this purchase.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this purchase was authorized and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell.

BUDGET FOR THE CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION 1946-1947

Explanatory Notes

Appropriations for salaries are available for the term indicated in each case but not for more than one year from September 1, 1946.

When appointments are made at salary rates less than the amounts provided

in the budget, the unused balance lapses at that time.

Funds appropriated for positions in the salary budget which are not yet filled may, pending regular apopintments, be drawn against by voucher to the Business Office for services of employees temporarily engaged to do the work contemplated by the position. Such temporary charges may not exceed the amount of time provided by the position unless indicated herein or otherwise approved by the President.

All unexpended balances remaining in the salary budget lapse at the close

of each calendar month unless previously assigned or encumbered.

Departmental appropriations are made under the captions "Salaries," "Wages," and "Expense and Equipment." No transfers may be made between "Salaries" and other captions except with the approval of the President of the University. Requests for such changes should be submitted to the Comptroller. Adjustments may be made between "Wages" and "Expense and Equipment" upon

written request to the Comptroller.

Appropriations for Expense and Equipment, Wages, and Nonrecurring Items are available for one year beginning July 1, 1946, and ending June 30, 1947. All unexpended balances in Wages appropriations lapse June 30, 1947, and unencumbered balances in Expense and Equipment appropriations lapse on that date. Allowable encumbrances for which funds will be carried forward on June 30, 1947, are only those for the purchase of equipment and other capital items.

All new positions classified as permanent and continuous should be included in the salary budget and must not be charged to any wages appropriation except in those departments submitting supplemental budgets detailing such wage ap-

propriations.

Unless otherwise indicated in the Budget:

I. The service required under appointments in this budget to positions on the teaching faculty covers the academic year of the University, not including the Summer Semester. Salaries of such positions of the rank of Assistant Professor and above are paid in eleven equal monthly installments; salaries of other

ranks, in ten equal monthly installments.

2. The service required in administrative, clerical, and service positions is for a full year of twelve months, with allowance for vacations, and salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments. All such positions in the academic budget are indicated by the letter "Y" following the tenure symbol.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

October 21-22, 1946



The October meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Monday and Tuesday, October 21-22, 1946, at the University Club, in Chicago, according to the following schedule:

Monday, October 21, 6 p.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

Tuesday, October 22, 11 a.m. — Open meeting.

Ivy, Vice-President for the Chicago Colleges, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, Professor W. C. Huntington, Chairman of the Building Committee, and Mr. F. E. Bell, Manager of the University of Illinois Foundation.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

Following an informal discussion of the items on the agenda for the meeting on Tuesday, the Board took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE ON ARCHITECTURE

(1) In view of the many special demands on the University's Physical Plant Department for the construction of new buildings and other campus developments, it seems to me very desirable to have a consultative committee on architecture to be appointed by the President of the University. The personnel of the committee would include three or four architects of outstanding professional reputation, and experience in the construction of the kind of buildings the University of Illinois needs.

I recommend that the Board authorize appointment of such a committee and the payment of nominal honoraria and travel expenses for services. I do not wish to announce appointments at this time as I have not yet approached

anyone.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the President of the University was authorized to select and appoint this committee under the terms recommended.

DEPOSIT OF UNIVERSITY FUNDS IN STATE TREASURY

(2) The organization act of the University provides that the University shall have a treasurer. The treasurer is made responsible for the custody of all funds received by the University and is required to make an accounting for those funds. He is required to give bond adequately protecting the University from loss. Disbursements are to be made by him on a warrant signed for the Board

of Trustees by its president and its secretary.

Until about 1919 all funds of the University were handled in this manner. Even state appropriations were remitted to the University in quarterly allotments and the University submitted to the State Auditor for examination an itemized report of disbursements paid from such funds. At that time the act was changed to provide that disbursements from state appropriations (state tax funds) were to be made on vouchers certified to the Auditor of Public Accounts, the Auditor to draw his warrants to individual payees. For non-payroll items the warrants are mailed directly to payees by the Auditor. Payroll warrants are returned to the University for distribution to staff members and employees.

In 1933 the General Assembly passed an Act requiring the deposit of all University income, other than trust and Federal funds, in the State Treasury, to be held in a special fund from which appropriations are made at each session of the General Assembly. This Act permits the University to retain a "working cash fund," originally set at \$100,000. Additional legislation since that time has increased the working cash fund to \$200,000, and has authorized the retention by the University in its treasury of certain receipts required to meet debt obligations created as a lien against the income of self-liquidating projects

such as residence halls, union building, etc.

As the University's business operations have grown in volume and com-

plexity, it has become more difficult to operate under the Act of 1933, viz.:

1. The difficulty of making an accurate estimate of the receipts for the biennium. The outstanding example is the current biennium, 1945-1947, in which, as the result of greatly increased enrollment and increased compensation from the federal government for veteran students, the aggregate will be several million dollars more than the original estimate. This money accumulates in the State Treasury and can not be used for any other purpose and yet can not be disbursed until appropriated by the General Assembly.

2. The large volume of transactions through the working cash fund to meet payrolls and satisfy the needs of employees as well as other transactions requiring immediate payment. The capital of this fund is \$200,000, but the total

amount of transactions during the year 1945-1946 was \$1,566,000. This means a tremendous volume of items which must first be paid by the University, itemized receipts taken, and submitted to the State Auditor for reimbursement. Such transactions could be completely avoided if the income of the University were in its own treasury, since it could handle emergency transactions directly from these funds. It would relieve the State Auditor's Office of considerable office expense.

3. The requirement that receipts of residence halls, farms, stores, and other services be paid into the State Treasury also makes a very difficult problem of estimating. These transactions represent largely the turnover of cash and do not represent to any material extent net income available for general educational operations of the University, yet they are a part of the grand total of the State appropriations. At the present time receipts of union buildings and residence halls are exempt from the requirement of deposit in the State Treasury, because they are covered by trust indentures; however, when these arrangements terminate, such receipts will have to go into the State Treasury and this change will involve many difficulties of operation. All receipts from the new Undergraduate Divisions in Chicago and Galesburg must go into the State Treasury.

4. The public gets the impression that the State of Illinois is appropriating the gross amount of the appropriations to the University out of its tax revenues. In spite of all publicity efforts to the contrary, it is difficult to inform the

public that University income makes up, at the present time for example, \$6,000,000 of the \$25,000,000 appropriated to the University.

The General Assembly should be requested to authorize a return to the former method of operation, thus making it possible for the University to retain all of its income in its treasury and make disbursements of that income from that point entirely instead of through the State Treasury.

Mr. Morey and Mr. Janata commented on this matter. On motion of Mr. Williamson, the President of the University and the President of the Board were authorized to request the General Assembly to make this change.

REQUEST FROM PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY FOR LEAVE OF ABSENCE

(3) I have been appointed one of the five voting delegates to the First Session of the General Conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization which will convene in Paris in November. This is a public service which I feel it is a duty to perform, but before the appointment was made I received informal permission from the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees to accept.

The conference will convene in Paris November 19 and the delegation will leave the United States between November 11 and 16. It is anticipated that this service will require my absence from the University for a period of about six weeks, and I am, therefore, requesting a leave of absence for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this leave was granted as requested, and the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, President George D. Stoddard has been selected as one of five voting delegates to the first General Conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, to convene in Paris in November. 1946, which selection is a signal recognition of Dr. Stoddard's high attainments in the educational world gives him for the education of the edu in the educational world, gives him further opportunity for great service, and

reflects honor on the University of Illinois, be it

Resolved, that the Board of Trustees hereby congratulates Dr. Stoddard on the honor that has come to him, and wishes him a happy and successful journey

and a safe return; and be it further

Resolved, that the Secretary be instructed to spread this resolution on the minutes and to provide Dr. Stoddard with a copy thereof.

GIFT OF MR. ROBERT ALLERTON

(4) Mr. Robert Allerton of Monticello, Illinois, has given the University his beautiful country estate for educational and research purposes to be used as a forest, wild life, and plant life reserve, as an example of landscape gardening, and as a public park. This homestead includes an English-Georgian mansion, other buildings, and approximately 1,500 acres of garden, park, and forest areas. A part of the homestead area has been deeded to the Board of Trustees for the specific purpose of providing a site for a 4-H Club Camp and 4-H Club activities.

The homestead is described in his deed of gift as the "Woodland Property." At the suggestion of the University, it will be known as the "Robert Allerton Park." To endow this park, Mr. Allerton has also given the University farm lands, the income from which is to be used for the maintenance and oper-

ation of the park, including the house.

This is a magnificent gift to the University and to the general public. It will provide the University new facilities for educational and research services in many fields. It will also provide a unique center for conferences, institutes,

and special activities.

The Board of Trustees has previously accepted Mr. Allerton's gift. I now present two indentures between Mr. Allerton and the Board of Trustees, one conveying to the University the "Woodland Property" and the endowment farms, and the other conveying to the Board of Trustees of the University the land to be used as a 4-H Club Camp and for 4-H Club activities. These deeds will be recorded in the Piatt County Court House. I suggest that they be printed in full in the minutes of the Board of Trustees. (See appendix, page 155).

In addition to the previous formal acknowledgment of this gift by the Board of Trustees, I should like to ask that the Board now record an expression of deep appreciation on behalf of the University and of the people of Illinois for this splendid gift made to them by Mr. Robert Allerton. I should like also to record my personal appreciation to Mr. Robert Allerton, Mr. John Gregg, and Mr. A. L. Green, Counsel for Mr. Allerton, for their fine attitude and cooperation in the negotiations we have had with respect to the terms of his gift.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the Secretary, in collaboration with the President of the University and the Legal Counsel, was instructed to prepare a suitable resolution of appreciation of Mr. Allerton's generous gift and report it to the Board.

The Board adjourned, at 12:20 a.m., to meet at 11 a.m. on Tuesday.

SESSION ON TUESDAY, OCTOBER 22, 1946

When the Board convened at II a.m. on Tuesday, October 22, 1946, at the University Club, in Chicago, the following members were present: President Livingston, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson. During the forenoon, Dr. Meyer and Mr. Nickell took their places with the Board.

President Stoddard was present; also Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. I. L. Porter, Treasurer, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President for the Chicago Colleges, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, Mr. D. E. Dickason, Director of Nonacademic Personnel, and Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENT OF DR. JOHN BARLOW YOUMANS AS DEAN OF THE COLLEGE OF MEDICINE

(r) A special committee of the faculty, appointed by the former Executive Dean and the President of the University, to study the qualifications of the candidates for the position of Dean of the College of Medicine, has recommended that Dr. John Barlow Youmans of Vanderbilt University School of Medicine be appointed Dean of the College of Medicine, Medical Director of the Research and Educational Hospitals, and Professor of Medicine, effective as soon as he can report for duty. The Vice-President of the University in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges concurs in this recommendation.

I recommend approval of this appointment at a salary of \$15,000 a year, the appointment as Dean and Director to be until September 1, 1947, and thereafter on a biennial basis, and the appointment as Professor of Medicine to be on indefinite tenure. Since immediate action on this appointment was necessary, it was submitted to the Executive Committee which gave informal approval.

A biographical sketch of Doctor Youmans is attached.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this appointment was made as recommended.

CLINICAL FACULTY OF THE ILLINOIS EYE AND EAR INFIRMARY

(2) A recommendation that additional appointments (as printed in the Appendix, page 153) be made to the nonsalaried, or clinical, faculty of the College of Medicine, in the Illinois Eye and Ear Infirmary, for the academic year beginning September 1, 1946; and that the President of the University be authorized to make such additional appointments or other changes as are desirable and necessary.

On motion of Dr. Luken, these appointments were made, and authority was granted as recommended.

APPOINTMENTS TO MAJOR POSITIONS IN THE UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS AT GALESBURG

(3) Pursuant to authorization given the President of the University by the Board of Trustees (Minutes, September 24, 1946, page 38) to employ the necessary personnel for the operation of a branch of the University in Galesburg, the following major appointments have been made in the Undergraduate Division at Galesburg.

Frederic R. Hamilton, to the position of Dean beginning September 27, 1946, and continuing through August 31, 1947, at an annual salary of \$8,000.

MAURICE J. GALBRAITH, to the position of Director of Student Welfare beginning September 19, 1946, and continuing through June 30, 1947, at an annual salary of \$4,800.

Lewis O. Kerwood, to the position of Examiner and Recorder in the Registrar's Office beginning October 1, 1946, and continuing through August 31, 1947, at an annual salary of \$4,500.

WILLIAM J. ENGLISH, to the position of Business Manager beginning October 10, 1946, and continuing through August 31, 1947, at an annual salary of \$4,500. Since July 28, 1943, he has been on leave for military service and is now on terminal leave from the Army with the rank of Major. Before he went on leave for war service he held the position of Tabulating Machines Supervisor in the Business Office.

Appointments of an Associate or Assistant Dean and a Director of the Division of Special Services for War Veterans are yet to be made.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these appointments were made as recommended.

EASEMENT TO ILLINOIS BELL TELEPHONE COMPANY FOR UNDERGROUND CABLE

(4) The Illinois Bell Telephone Company has requested permission to place a buried cable across the 70-foot strip of land owned by the University which crosses the Ross property in Section 1 of Tolono Township, Champaign County, for the purpose of providing additional circuits to the Airport and to take care of the pole line along the east side of Route 45 which must be relocated due to the widening of this road from Champaign to the University Airport entrance road. This cable will be buried not less than 30 inches below the surface of the ground and the University-owned drainage tile will not be disturbed.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees grant the Illinois Bell Telephone

Company an easement for this cable.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this recommendation was adopted.

TEST DRILL HOLE AND TUBULAR WELL AT AIRPORT

(5) Bids were called, on uniform specifications, for the construction of a test hole and a finished well to supply water to the University Airport. However, only the firm of Hayes and Sims submitted a bid. The Physical Plant Department has checked this bid and believes the quotations received are in line with what should be expected at this time. Additional test wells will be arranged for as may be necessary at the unit bid price by means of change orders. Funds are available in the Airport appropriation for all costs.

The Directors of the Institute of Aeronautics and of the Physical Plant Department recommend the award of a contract to Hayes and Sims on the basis of unit prices submitted, based on one rotary test drill well and one tubular well, at a total quotation of \$4,194, with the understanding that if water is not found work will be stopped and payment made only for the test well on a unit

cost basis.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute such a contract.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this recommendation was adopted.

COMBUSTION CONTROL AND GAUGE BOARDS FOR ABBOTT POWER PLANT ADDITIONS

(6) A proposal has been received from the Republic Flow Meters Company for furnishing of combustion control and gauge boards with instruments for the Abbott Power Plant Additions. This is a negotiated proposal and bids were not taken. Sargent and Lundy, our consulting engineers, indicate that it is impracticable to use the product of any other manufacturer in as much as the present combustion control is manufactured by Republic and any extension thereto must be their equipment. Furthermore, the gauge boards and instruments are essentially duplicates of similar items furnished by Republic in 1940. A good many engineering details, therefore, are already in their files and would greatly facilitate the necessary duplication in arrangement and appearance. The proposal is in strict accordance with the specifications.

The proposal includes a provision that any escalation in cost will be limited to 15 per cent of the proposal prices on equipment of Republic's own

manufacture.

Sargent and Lundy consider this a fair proposal, and the Physical Plant Department requests authority to execute a contract with Republic Flow Meters Company for a total encumbrance of \$11,862.25, the base hid being \$10,315.00 plus an allowance for the maximum escalation of 15 per cent.

I recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be author-

ized to execute such a contract.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this contract was authorized as recommended.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(7) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following purposes:

PURCHASE OF HENRY BALDWIN WARD LIBRARY COLLECTION IN PARASITOLOGY

(8) The late Henry Baldwin Ward, for many years Professor and Head of the Department of Zoology in the University, left a notable library in the field of parasitology. The executors of the estate have offered to sell this library to the University at a price of \$15,000. The collection consists of at least 15,000 volumes of books and journals and an estimated 35,000 classified reprints. The price offered for the library is considered very reasonable and its purchase is strongly recommended by the Director of the University Library, R. B. Downs.

The financial position of the University with respect to the difficulty of funds has been discussed with the executors. They have offered an option of purchase to the University under a contract which would include the following

conditions:

1. That the purchase of the library be definitely accepted in writing by the University of Illinois, or definitely rejected in writing before February 15, 1947.

2. That the library remain where it is now housed until the purchase thereof is accepted by the University of Illinois, or until 45 days after the purchase is definitely rejected by the University of Illinois.
3. That the Executors of the Henry Baldwin Ward Estate have the privi-

lege of showing the library to other persons who may be interested bidders therefor, in the event that the same is not ultimately purchased by the University of Illinois.

4. That the library receive the same care and protection which is presently

provided by the University of Illinois.

I recommend:

1. That the Board of Trustees authorize the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to conclude a contract for the purchase of this library with the foregoing conditions which it is noted include the provision that the University may have the right to reject the purchase before February 15, 1947. This will protect us with respect to the possibility of getting additional funds that will be necessary for this purpose.

2. That an appropriation of \$15,000 be made by the Board out of the General Reserve for this purpose, with the provision that it will become effective only when and if sufficient funds are available in the General Reserve beyond

other essential commitments which make possible this allocation.

3. When and if such funds do become available, that the Director of the Library be authorized to conclude the purchase and take over the library.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, these recommendations were adopted, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell.

AUTHORIZATION OF SIGNATURES FOR GALESBURG UNDER-GRADUATE DIVISION PETTY CASH FUND

(11) On September 24 (Minutes, page 44) the Board of Trustees authorized a petty cash fund for the Business Office at the Galesburg Undergraduate Division, and designated the First Galesburg National Bank and Trust Company, of Galesburg, Illinois, as despository. That bank has requested that the Board, by resolution, designate the authorized signatures on checks against that fund.

The Comptroller requests approval of the following resolution:

Whereas the Board of Trustees on September 24, 1946, designated the First Galesburg National Bank and Trust Company of Galesburg, Illinois, as depository for a petty cash fund for the Galesburg Undergraduate Division of the University;

Be it resolved that Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, is authorized to delegate to the person who from time to time shall be duly appointed and acting as Business Manager of the Galesburg Undergraduate Division, authority to sign

checks against the said petty cash account, and

Be it further resolved that Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, specifically is authorized to delegate such authority to Lyle M. Dahlenburg for the period in which he may serve as Acting Business Manager, and to William J. English during the period of his incumbency as Business Manager.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this resolution was adopted.

REPORT OF AUDIT OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(12) The Committee on Athletic Activities has received a copy of the report on the examination of the accounts of the Athletic Association of the University of Illinois for the year ended June 30, 1946, by Arthur Young and Company, auditors. The report is supplemented by a report from the University Auditing Division covering the detailed audit of ticket sales for the year. The report of Arthur Young and Company includes a certification of the balance sheet and statement of income, expenses, and operating surplus. The report of the University Auditing Division shows that all matters relating to ticket sales have been satisfactorily handled.

This report was received for record.

STAFF HOUSING FOR UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION AT GALESBURG

(13) The Federal Public Housing Authority is holding for the University 110 temporary housing units of family type and has agreed to erect these units at Galesburg where they will be seriously needed for accommodation of staff members required at that place. The Physical Plant Department has recommended that these units be accepted. The cost of moving and erection is borne by FPHA, but the cost of utility connections and certain other expenses must be borne by the University. These expenses will be included in the budget of the Galesburg division when presented.

Because of the urgency, I authorized the acceptance of this offer. I request approval of my action and authorization to the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board to execute the necessary contracts with FPHA and any other con-

tractors from whom service will be required for their erection.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the action of the President in authorizing the acceptance of this housing was approved and confirmed, and authority was granted as recommended.

AMENDMENT OF RULES FOR THE CLASSIFIED CIVIL SERVICE

(14) The Director of Nonacademic Personnel recommends the following change (indicated by italic type) in the rules for the classified Civil Service as originally adopted by the Board of Trustees December 16, 1941:

X. Promotion

The Board shall, by its rules, provide for promotions whether to fill vacancies or otherwise, solely on the basis of ascertained merit. To that end, it shall fix lines of promotion wherever practicable. Employees who are promoted in accordance with this section shall have their seniority determined by the length of service in the promotional line.

Any change of a classified employee from a position of one class to a position of another class within the promotional line requiring an increase in compensation, an increase in duties or responsibility, or a combination of both, shall be deemed a promotion. Promotions shall be made from promotional registers and determined on merit and ability, to be ascertained by examinations in which the employee's service rating, education, personal qualifications, seniority, and personnel history are all considered.

The University's regulations implement the State Civil Service law, and the above change is recommended to bring these regulations more in line with the provisions of the law.

I recommend that this be referred to the Committee on Civil Service and Employees. The Director of Nonacademic Personnel met with this Committee today, preceding the Board meeting.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the rules were changed as recommended.

AMENDMENT OF "POLICY AND RULES RELATING TO COMPEN-SATION AND WORKING CONDITIONS OF NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES"

(15) The Director of Nonacademic Personnel recommends certain changes in the "Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees," adopted by the Board of Trustees June 30, 1945, as amended.

I recommend that this be referred to the Board Committee on Civil Service and Employees. The Director of Nonacademic Personnel met with this Committee today, preceding the Board meeting.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, certain sections of the rules on nonacademic employees were amended to read as follows:

IV-4-B. "Eight-hour day or four-hour half-day shift, 40-hour week within the period Monday morning through Saturday noon inclusive."

IV-4-C-a. "Employees now working under a basic 44-hour week, and wishing to be permanently transferred to Plan B, will be so transferred upon request to the Department Head, who shall notify the Office of Nonacademic Personnel of all such transfers. Employees now working under a basic 44-hour week, and eligible for a month's vacation, who are thus transferred, will suffer no reduction in total weekly or monthly compensation as a result of such transfer."

VI-2-B. "Other employees, except administrative employees employee in classifications listed under Schedule U-IX and C-VI, will be compensated at time and a half, payable in cash in addition to regular compensation."

VII-1. "Vacations are granted only to permanent and continuous employees who complete not less than eleven consecutive months of service. In the case of seasonal employees whose services are not required for eleven consecu-

tive months, service shall be regarded as consecutive if (1) period of seasonal operations in which he is employed is at least six consecutive months; (2) the individual is employed for six consecutive months during the entire period of seasonal operations; and (3) the only breaks in employment are due to seasonal layoffs.

VII-2-A. "One calendar month vacation in each year of service. . . . " VII-2-B. "Progressive vacation schedule: Two work weeks in each of the first two years of service; three work weeks in each of the next two years of service; one calendar month in the fifth and each succeeding year of service."

VII-2-C. "Two work weeks vacation in each year of service."

VIII-I-B. "Such employees may elect to use portions of allowances for disability provided under sub-section 2 hereof to supplement payments made under the Workmen's Compensation Act, provided that in no case during a period of disability shall total payments exceed the full compensation paid the

individual at the time the disability occurred.

VIII-2-A. "Each full-time permanent and continuous employee is entitled to a disability leave of two work weeks with pay in each year of service, no part of which shall be cumulative. Each permanent and continuous employee employed regularly but on a part-time basis is entitled to such fraction of two work weeks with pay as is represented by the relationship between this parttime employment and the full-time schedules in his classification. Any permanent and continuous employee who is disabled before completing his first year of service will be allowed the same proportionate amount of the two work weeks disability leave as the portion of the year completed."

VIII-3-b. "Disability benefits from the System are payable to any

participant for mental or physical disability arising from any cause as a result of which the individual is unable to perform the duties of his position. Benefits begin 60 days after the beginning of the disability, provided an application has been filed and salary suspended. Benefits amount to 50% of the earnings at the paid is 50% of the total earnings during service credited in the Retirement System."

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IX-2. "Leaves of absence with pay on account of death or illness of relatives may be granted by the Director of Nonacademic Personnel to the extent considered reasonable and necessary in each case, taking into consideration length of service, condition of work in the department, previous leave granted the employee, and recommendation of department head. Such leaves when granted shall be charged against the employee's annual disability leave in accordance with Section VIII-2-A, unless otherwise approved by the Director of Nonacademic Personnel.'

XIII. "Grievances shall consist of all matters of dispute affecting the employer-employee relationships, excepting those set out in Section III to Section IX inclusive, other than questions of interpretation of those sections or their applications to individual cases and except as stated in paragraph 5 of this section. If any employee has a grievance which he desires to have con-

sidered, he shall present it in the following manner:"

XIII-5. "Cases of suspension or cases arising under section III-3-C may be appealed by or on behalf of an employee in accordance with paragraphs 1 to 3 of the foregoing procedure. The Director of Nonacademic Personnel is authorized to make final decision in such cases."

XIV. "Employees shall acquire seniority rights retroactive to date of employment after the completion of the probationary period of six months as provided in the University Civil Service Rules. Seniority shall be by length of service in the promotional line; and seniority rights shall be limited to the locality in which the work is performed, that is Urbana, Galesburg, the Chicago professional colleges, the Chicago Undergraduate Division, the Agriculture Experiment Station at Dixon Springs, and any other locations which now are, or may be, established by the University. If an employee is on disability leave, or is on leave for service in the armed forces of the United States, the tenure for seniority will continue as though he were continuously employed. If the employee is laid off for lack of work, or if a leave, other than a disability leave or

for service in the armed forces of the United States is granted at the request of the employee, seniority will be based on the actual months of service in the

promotional line.

"If an employee accepts a position in a classification outside the promotional line, he may be given a leave for one year from his old classification in order that he may preserve seniority for the months of service in the promotional line of which that classification is a part. After one year's service in the classification outside the promotional line, the employee's continuation in that classification will be deemed a waiver of seniority rights in the old promotional line.

CHANGES IN CIVIL SERVICE CLASSIFICATION

At this point, Mr. McLaughlin reported that the Committee on Civil Service and Employees of the Board of Trustees received from President Stoddard the revised classification descriptions of University positions which were put into effect during the past year by the Director of Nonacademic Personnel for the purpose of bringing such positions into accord with current requirements. After a review of this report the Committee recommended that it be received for record.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this list of revised descriptions was received for record.1

BIENNIAL BUDGET FOR OPERATIONS, 1947-1949

(16) I present the biennial budget for the operation of the University of Illinois for the two years beginning July 1, 1947, covering all funds for which appropriations must be made by the General Assembly. This estimate is submitted as the proposed basis for the budget to be filed with the Department of Finance by November 1, 1946, as required by law.

In accordance with the principles outlined in this report and on the basis of detailed schedules presented to the Board, I recommend a total operating budget for 1947-1949 of \$65,083,818. Of this amount, the sum of \$48,083,818 would come from the tax funds of the State and \$17,000,000 from the Univer-

sity's own income.

The original appropriation for 1945-1947 was \$25,407,250, of which \$19,207,-250 came from tax funds and \$6,200,000 from University income. However, early in the 1947 session of the General Assembly, the University will request supplementary appropriations presently estimated at \$9,003,146 which, when granted, will bring the total appropriations for the current biennium to \$35,310,396. This means that the total requested increase for 1947-1949 over 1945-1947 is actually about \$30,000,000. In view of the extraordinary increase in educational services to be rendered in the coming biennium, as indicated in this report, the increase is not out of proportion. It also should be noted that the extra sum of nearly ten million dollars is needed entirely for the second year of the present biennium.

PRINCIPLES GOVERNING BUDGET

Many complex and diverse problems face the University with respect to its

budget for 1947-1949. Among these may be mentioned the following:

I. Increased Enrollment. Appropriations to the University for 1945-1947 were based on the assumption of the Illinois Budgetary Commission that the enrollment would remain static at about 8,000 students during that period. Accordingly no provision was made for increased staff, and relatively little for supplies and equipment. Actually, we will be serving during 1946-1947 approximately 26,000 students, or over three times the number on which the current biennial appropriation is based. Of this number 18,500 at Urbana will continue through 1947-1949. Material additions must be made to enable the University to serve satisfactorily this greatly increased body of students. The increase requested for this purpose is \$4,389,712 annually or for the biennium \$8,779.424.

- 2. New Undergraduate Divisions. To take care of the greatly increased enrollment, two new undergraduate divisions have been established at Chicago and Galesburg. As already authorized by the Board, additional emergency appropriations for the second year of the current biennium will be requested when the General Assembly convenes. For 1947-1949 it will be necessary to place these appropriations on a biennial basis. Students in the new divisions are in the freshman and sophomore classes only. We plan to provide for 4,000 students at Navy Pier and 2,000 at Galesburg. During the next biennium provision must be made for serving many of these students in the upper classes of the University at Urbana. This will result in an increase in the average cost per student on the Urbana campus. The amount requested annually for the new undergraduate
- divisions is \$3,837,372, or for the biennium—\$7,674,744.

 3. Chicago Professional Colleges. While the enrollment of the Chicago professional colleges is relatively stable at about 1,500 students, a considerable increase in the budget is necessary to carry out an adequate program and maintain personnel. A major increase is needed in the budget of the Research and Educational Hospitals to enable the hospitals to serve patients satisfactorily and provide adequate material for research and instructional purposes. An annual
- increase of \$946,694 is requested, or for the biennium \$1,893,388.

 4. Increased Operating Expenses. The added student load, additional new buildings being erected, and increased wage scales and cost of supplies necessitate major increases in the budgets of the Library, the Physical Plant, and administrative offices. In the Physical Plant there is also the problem of deferred maintenance and rehabilitation costs resulting from the fact that material and labor have not been available in recent years to keep the plant as a whole in a satisfactory condition of repair. A considerable addition to the item of contributions to the Retirement System also is necessary to cover the increased number of retirement annuities and increased costs due to larger University staff and payroll. An annual increase of \$1,886,791 is requested, or
- for the biennium—\$3,773,582.

 5. Salary and Wage Scales. Salaries of academic staff in the University have not kept pace with the increase in living costs in recent years. Also they are inadequate to meet competition from industrial, governmental, and professional, as well as other institutional employment. To maintain the high level of morale in the faculty, a major increase in salaries for the coming biennium is essential. The Board has already received petitions from the faculty which have been referred to the President and by him to the University Council for study and recommendation.

The Council recommends the following increases which are included in the budget estimates submitted herewith:

(a) Cost of living adjustment in 1946-1947 salaries:

30% of the first \$4,000 of each salary. 20% of the next \$1,000.

10% of the next 1,000.

No adjustment on the portion of any salary which is above \$6,000.

(b) Deans, directors, and general administrative officers shall be authorized to recommend such reductions in the above schedule as are appropriate in the salaries of those staff members who have been added to the staff during the current year at higher than the usual rates or whose salaries have been especially adjusted to meet unusual circumstances.

(c) New minimum salaries for full-time service during the regular academic year beginning in September and ending in June for the various ranks are recommended as follows:

Suitable adjustments may be made in salaries if service is required through the

entire year, i.e., from September through August.

(d) A substantial amount should be available for merit increases over and above the recommended cost-of-living increases and for the correction of inequities produced by such increases and for adjustments of salaries of administrative officers on the recommendation of the President.

The annual amount requested for academic salary increases is \$2,776,386, or

for the biennium - \$5,552,772.

While nonacademic salaries and wages on the whole have been adjusted more adequately than faculty salaries in recent years, there is still need for considerable adjustment in this area. Provision also must be made for wage adjustments in prevailing rate groups to meet local wage agreements. The annual amount requested for increases in rates paid to prevailing rate groups is

\$282,010, or for the biennium — \$565,220.

The Director of Nonacademic Personnel, after a thorough survey of the situation, has recommended that funds be provided which would make possible cost-of-living adjustments for non-prevailing rate employees by July 1, 1947, averaging 25% of the salary as of July 1, 1946, subject to individual adjustment to correct inequities and to provide merit recognition. The amount requested annually for nonacademic salary increases is \$1,320,690, or for the biennium -\$2,641,380.

6. Improved Educational Programs. In 1945 the University made an effort to secure funds to strengthen its educational programs at many points in order to provide opportunity for better instruction and to develop research in certain fields not now adequately covered. Only a moderate part of the amount requested at that time was secured. A restudy of the whole situation has been made and a sum of \$856,530 is recommended for this purpose annually, or for

the biennium — \$1,713,060.

7. Auxiliary Enterprises. Because the receipts from many auxiliary self-supporting activities go into the State Treasury, it is necessary that the budget include the estimated amount of the operations of these activities for the biennium. For 1947-1949 these activities in the new Undergraduate Divisions at Chicago and Galesburg, such as food service and housing, must be included. These activities do not require appropriations from State tax funds since their operations are covered entirely by their own income. This income is deposited by the University in the State treasury. The annual appropriation necessary is

\$3,105,360, or for the biennium — \$6,210,720.

8. General Considerations. As pointed out in connection with the 1945-1947 budget, through successive biennial periods since 1933, the University's biennial appropriations have been materially less than requested by the Board of Trustees. During the two periods 1943-1945 and 1945-1947, appropriations were increased but not sufficiently to take care of the backlog of accumulated and deferred needs. In the meantime, the tremendous increase in student enrollment has resulted in a vast increase in teaching load and other responsibilities. It is my judgment that we should present to the State a budget which represents what is necessary to place the University in a secure financial position and

enable it to meet its responsibilities in instruction, research, and public service.

The educational portion of the budget as here submitted has been reviewed by the Provost and the entire budget was submitted to and endorsed by the University Council. The schedules submitted were prepared by the Comptroller.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, the biennial operations budget was unanimously approved as presented, to be filed as a tentative biennial budget under the State Finance Act, and the President of the University and the President of the Board were requested to take charge of the matter from now on.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON HOUSING

At this point, Dr. Meyer presented the following report.

The Special Committee on Housing appointed to consider and report on student and staff housing at the Chicago Professional Colleges and at Urbana-Champaign reports as follows:

1. We recognize the need of new permanent housing for 3500 men, 1500 women, and 450 graduate students and staff at Urbana, and for 320 men, 300 nurses, and

100 staff at Chicago; the total cost is estimated to be \$26,000,000.

2. We recommend for the 1947-1949 biennium provision for 2,000 students and 400 graduate students and staff at Urbana, and for 320 men and 300 nurses at Chicago; the total cost is \$14,100,000, of which \$10,060,000 would be derived from State appropriation and \$4,040,000 from borrowing; the necessary utility services are to be provided separately.

3. We recommend that the Board request extension of its borrowing power by the General Assembly to cover as much as possible of the total cost of the housing

program.

TRIBUTE TO HENRY E. WILSON

In the recent death of Henry E. Wilson, for thirty years General Secretary of the University Y.M.C.A., the University of Illinois lost a loyal friend. While not an official member of the University staff, Mr. Wilson's contribution to the University's welfare and student life has been far-reaching and outstanding. His able leadership brought him, and the University, national and world-wide recognition in Y.M.C.A. circles, and the Association he so ably led has had top rank rating for many years.

Mr. Wilson's chief concern was that the Y.M.C.A. should serve the University by providing leadership and a program in the area of moral and spiritual values. The beautiful building which is the house of the Y.M.C.A., while a gift of friends interested in the moral and spiritual life of students, is also a testimonial of

the dreams and the untiring efforts of Mr. Wilson.

Therefore, be it resolved, that the Board of Trustees hereby records its appreciation of Mr. Wilson's contribution to the life of the University over so many years, and directs its Secretary to spread this resolution on the minutes and to send copies to Mrs. Wilson and to the officers and directors of the Y.M.C.A.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this resolution was adopted by unanimous vote.

DR. BRADLEY INTRODUCED

At this point, President Stoddard introduced Dr. Phillips Bradley, Director of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations.

INDENTURES

I. INDENTURE BY AND BETWEEN ROBERT ALLERTON AND THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

This Indenture made and entered into this 14th day of October, 1946, by and between Robert Allerton, a bachelor, of Monticello, Illinois, hereinafter referred to as the Grantor, and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a public corporation organized by and under the laws of the State of Illinois, hereinafter referred to as the Grantee, Witnesseth:

WHEREAS, the Grantor desires to give part of his homestead, hereinafter referred to as the "Woodland Property", to the Grantee for educational and research purposes, as a forest, wild and plant-life reserve, as an example of landscape gardening and as a public park, and desires to give to said Grantee the farm property hereinafter described so that the income therefrom may be used to carry out the purposes of this gift;

Now This Indenture Witnesseth that the said Robert Allerton, Grantor, does hereby give, grant and convey to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, Grantee, in trust, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, the following described real estate situated in the County of Piatt and State of Illinois, viz.:

Together with all buildings and improvements thereon and the personal property thereon used by the Grantor in connection with the upkeep and maintenance thereof, (said real estate, buildings, improvements and personal property being hereinafter referred to as the "Woodland Property"),

and

The west half $(W \frac{1}{2})$ of the northwest quarter $(NW \frac{1}{4})$ and the west half $(W \frac{1}{2})$ of the southwest quarter $(SW \frac{1}{4})$ of Section Three (3); the south seventy (70) acres of the east half $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the southeast quarter $(SE \frac{1}{4})$ of Section Four (4); the southwest quarter $(SW \frac{1}{4})$ and the west half $(W \frac{1}{2})$ of the southeast quarter $(SE \frac{1}{4})$ of Section Five (5); all of Sections Seven (7) and Eight (8); the west half $(W \frac{1}{2})$ of the northwest quarter $(NW \frac{1}{4})$ and the west half $(W \frac{1}{2})$ of the southwest quarter $(SW \frac{1}{4})$ and of the west half $(W \frac{1}{2})$ of the southeast quarter $(SW \frac{1}{4})$ and of the west half $(W \frac{1}{2})$ of the southeast quarter $(SW \frac{1}{4})$ and of the west half $(W \frac{1}{2})$ of the southeast quarter $(SW \frac{1}{4})$ of Section Fourteen (14) lying north of the Sangamon River; the north half $(N \frac{1}{2})$ of the northwest quarter $(NW \frac{1}{4})$ and the east half $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the southeast quarter $(SE \frac{1}{4})$ of Section Eighteen (18); the east half $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the northeast quarter $(NE \frac{1}{4})$ and the east half $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the southeast quarter $(NE \frac{1}{4})$ and the east half $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the southeast quarter $(NE \frac{1}{4})$ and the east half $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the southeast quarter $(NE \frac{1}{4})$ and the east half $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the south half $(S \frac{1}{2})$ of the northeast quarter $(NE \frac{1}{4})$ and the east half $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the south half $(S \frac{1}{2})$ of the northeast quarter $(NE \frac{1}{4})$ and the east half $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the south half $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the northeast quarter $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the northwest quarter $(E \frac{1}{2})$ of the northwe

Meridian, (excepting therefrom those parts thereof included in and hereinabove described as a part of the Woodland Property and also excepting therefrom those parts thereof this day conveyed by the Grantor to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois for a 4-H Club camp and other purposes).

hereby conveying all the Grantor's farms, lying north of the Sangamon River, in said County of Piatt, together with the buildings and improvements thereon, all equipment, tools and machinery thereon, and the Grantor's share of the crops growing or stored thereon at the date hereof, (said real estate, buildings, improvements and personal property being hereinafter referred to as the "Farm"), hereby releasing and waiving all rights under and by virtue of the Homestead Exemption Laws of the State of Illinois.

To have and to hold the said property upon the following charitable trust, terms and conditions, viz.:

- 1. The Woodland Property shall be used, maintained, preserved, operated, improved and developed by the Grantee for educational and research purposes, as a forest, wild and plant-life reserve, as an example of landscape gardening, and as a public park.
- 2. The Grantee may carry on such educational and research activities on the Woodland Property as the Grantee, in its sole discretion, may deem desirable and may change such activities from time to time as it chooses.
- 3. The Grantee may, at its sole expense, construct on the Woodland Property and maintain and use thereon such building or buildings for educational and research purposes as the Grantee may deem necessary or desirable, provided that such buildings are erected eastward of the entrance drive (which runs from the gardener's lodge to the main house) and northward of the main house, and that such buildings are similar in appearance to the main house and gardener's lodge.
- 4. The trees on the Woodland Property shall be well cared for and cultivated to the end that the forests thereon will be preserved.
- 5. The statues, garden ornaments, ornamental garden buildings, paths and roads on the Woodland Property shall, so far as practicable, be kept, maintained and preserved as they are on the date hereof. The Grantee shall be under no obligation to replace or restore any of the property mentioned in this paragraph which has been destroyed, removed, or damaged by fire, windstorm, flood, other casualty or by the act of any person, if, in the judgment of the Grantee, the damage, destruction or removal of such property is of such a nature or extent as to make restoration impossible or impracticable. The Grantee may, however, substitute other property for that damaged, destroyed or removed if, in the judgment of the Grantee, the substituted property will harmonize with the property then located on the Woodland Property.
- 6. The Grantee may construct on the Woodland Property and maintain thereon pavilions, shelters, toilets, other structures, roads and paths and may keep, preserve, maintain and use the greenhouses, gardeners' houses, garages, garden house, pavilions, sheds and similar buildings which are now on the Woodland Property and may rebuild and replace them at any time or times. All said buildings and structures shall be used for the maintenance, preservation, operation, improvement, development or use of the Woodland Property as a public park, but the appearance of all new buildings and structures shall be in harmony with the forests and landscaping and other buildings and structures on the Woodland Property.

- 7. The Grantee may defer opening the Woodland Property to the public as a park until November 15, 1947, but from and after said date the Woodland Property shall be open to the public as a public park, provided that the Grantee may establish reasonable rules and regulations for the use and enjoyment of said Property.
- 8. The Grantee shall at all times employ and use a sufficient number of men for the maintenance and preservation of the Woodland Property and the trees and gardens thereon. The net income from the Farm, after payment of expenses for the management, care, preservation, maintenance, use and operation of the Farm, or such portion of said net income as may be necessary, shall first be devoted to the purposes of this Paragraph 8 before any thereof is used for any of the other authorized purposes set forth in Paragraph 9 hereof.
- 9. The Grantee shall maintain and operate the Farm and, except as hereinafter provided, shall use the income therefrom solely for the management, care, preservation, maintenance, use, operation, improvement and development of the Farm and the Woodland Property, except that none of said income shall be used for the management, care, preservation, maintenance, use, operation, improvement, development or construction of the buildings and structures referred to in Paragraph 3 hereof and except that not more than 15% of the net income from the Farm may be used for the care, maintenance, preservation, insurance, operation and use of the Main House or a building which replaces it. If any portion of the income from the Farm is not expended by the Grantee for the foregoing authorized purposes during the calendar or fiscal year in which such income accrues or is received by the Grantee, the unused portion of such income may be held as a reserve by the Grantee; and such reserve, or any part thereof, may be used by the Grantee for the foregoing authorized purposes in any subsequent year or may be invested and reinvested by the Grantee and the income from and proceeds of such investments used by the Grantee for the foregoing authorized purposes in any subsequent year. If and whenever said reserve shall comprise cash and/or investments whose aggregate value is in excess of the then estimated expense of carrying out the foregoing authorized purposes during the ensuing five years, such excess may be used by the Grantee for such educational, scientific and research purposes as it in its sole discretion may determine.
- Io. The Grantee may, with the written approval of the President of the Alumni Association of the University of Illinois and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Illinois, sell the Farm or any portion thereof at any time by public or private sale for such price and upon such terms as the Grantee in its discretion may deem advisable and the President of the Alumni Association of the University of Illinois and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Illinois shall approve. The proceeds of such sale shall be put, kept, invested and reinvested by the Grantee in income-bearing securities selected by the Grantee and approved by the President of the Alumni Association of the University of Illinois and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Illinois without restriction as to the kind or character of investment, and the net income arising therefrom shall be used by the Grantee solely for the management, care, preservation, maintenance, use, operation, improvement and development of the Woodland Property and for the other authorized purposes set forth in Paragraph 9 hereof.
- 11. The Grantee shall have the right and privilege of using but shall not be obliged to use income and funds from sources other than the Farm to accomplish and carry out the purposes of this gift.

- 12. The Woodland Property shall be designated and known as the Robert Allerton Park.
- 13. If the Woodland Property, the Farm, any portion of either or the trees or improvements thereon are damaged or destroyed by fire or other casualty, the Grantee shall, within a reasonable time thereafter, repair the damage and restore the loss to the extent that it is practicable to do so.
- 14. Whenever but only so long as the Grantee is prevented by causes beyond its control, including but not restricted to, acts of God or of the public enemy, fires, floods, epidemics and acts of the government, from performing any of the conditions or covenants hereinabove set forth, the Grantee shall be excused from performance thereof.
- 15. At such of the times referred to in Paragraph 10 hereof as the Alumni Association of the University of Illinois shall not be in existence, the President, or other Chief Executive if there [is] no President, of the association of alumni of the University of Illinois which comprises a larger number of such alumni than any other association of such alumni, shall act in lieu of and shall have the same rights and authority as are vested, by said Paragraph 10, in the President of the Alumni Association of the University of Illinois.
- 16. The said ROBERT ALLERTON, Grantor, expressly gives, grants and conveys to the said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, Grantee, the Main House on the Woodland Property, to have and to hold the same and to maintain, preserve and use said Main House for any purpose for which the Grantee is organized. If the said Main House is destroyed or removed, the Grantee may replace it with a new building or buildings and may from time to time replace such new building or buildings with other buildings, provided that the appearance of all buildings constructed on the land underlying said Main House shall be in harmony with the forests, buildings and other structures on the Woodland Property. Such new buildings may be used by the Grantee for any purpose for which the Grantee is organized, but, except as provided in Paragraph 9 hereof, the expense of constructing, maintaining, preserving and using the Main House and said new buildings shall be borne solely by the Grantee. If for a continuous period of more than five years, the land underlying the Main House shall be vacant, said land shall thereafter be used by the Grantee for the same purposes and in the same manner as the other premises comprising the Woodland Property.
- 17. The Grantee shall have the right to and is hereby authorized to convey and assign the Woodland Property, Main House, and Farm to the State of Illinois subject to all the terms, conditions and covenants hereinabove set forth, and upon completion of such conveyance and assignment the State of Illinois shall be vested with the right, title and interest herein conveyed to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and be subject to and bound by all the terms, conditions and covenants of this instrument. In the event of such conveyance and assignment, the term "Grantee", wherever used in this instrument, shall refer to and designate the State of Illinois. to be used by said BOARD as a 4-H Club camp and for other 4-H Club activities. Said premises may also be used and maintained by 4-H Clubs for related recreational and educational purposes, but shall not be used for any other purpose. The BOARD in its sole discretion shall determine for which of said 4-H Club activities and purposes the above described premises shall from time to time be used.

If 4-H Clubs shall cease to exist or if for a continuous period of more than one year no 4-H Club shall use said premises, the BOARD may make this property a part of the Robert Allerton Park by filing a written declaration thereof in the Office of the Recorder of Deeds of Piatt County, Illinois, and in such event the BOARD shall hold and use the above described premises upon the trust terms and conditions set forth in the deed of gift of the Woodland Property made this day by said Robert Allerton to the Board of Trustees of the University of ILLINOIS, or instead of making this property a part of the Robert Allerton Park, the Board may authorize and permit the above described premises to be used by the Boy Scouts of America, the Girl Scouts, and similar youth organizations, in which event said premises may be used as a camp for such organizations, or any of them, and for other activities of such organizations and may also be used and maintained by them for related recreational and educational purposes, but not for any other purpose, the BOARD in its sole discretion to determine by which of said organizations and for which of said purposes the above described premises are from time to time to be used.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

November 22, 1946



The November meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Friday, November 22, 1946, at the University Club, 76 East Monroe Street, Chicago, according to the following schedule:

Executive session, as in Committee of the Whole, 10:30 a.m.

Open session, 11:30 a.m.

When the Board convened, the following members were present: President Livingston, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson. General Davis took his place with the Board during the open session.

Provost C. R. Griffith was present, acting for President Stoddard, also Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and, during the open session, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

During the executive session, the Board discussed items on the agenda, and took action on the following matters.

SITE OF HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION BUILDING

Mr. McKelvey reported a recommendation of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds that the site designated by the Faculty Committee on the Campus Plan for the Building for Health and Physical Education, immediately north of the Memorial Stadium, be officially approved by the Board.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this recommendation was adopted.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PROVOST GRIFFITH

The Board considered the following matters presented by the Provost, acting for the President of the University.

PATENTABLE DISCOVERIES

(1) The Faculty Committee on Patents has submitted the following recommendations:

1. Release to Dr. Robert G. Kesel, Professor of Applied Materia Medica and Therapeutics and Head of the Department, the right to file application for a patent on a discovery of a method for the prevention of dental caries. He proposes to work out with the University of Illinois Foundation a plan for financing the cost of securing a patent and for the promotion of the sale of the product when and if a patent is obtained. If it is successful the Foundation

will benefit financially

2. Release to Mr. R. H. Reed (formery Assistant Professor and Assistant Chief in Agricultural Engineering), now on the faculty of the University of Wisconsin, the right to apply for a patent on his invention of a special pickup finger used in picking up hay before it is delivered to the crushing rolls. This invention is an outgrowth of work done by Mr. Reed and others on the development of a horse-drawn quick haymaker. The Board of Trustees on June 4, 1949, released to the inventors all rights to two inventions in connection with this work. Mr. Reed will negotiate with the University of Illinois Foundation for financing the patent application and marketing the product if a patent is issued.

Mr. Britton commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these patents were released as recommended.

PURCHASE OF ILLINOIS TERMINAL RIGHT OF WAY

(2) On September 24, 1946 (page 57), the Board authorized negotiations for the purchase of the right of way of the Illinois Terminal Railway Company within the campus, and appropriated \$2500 for this purchase. It has developed during the negotiations that all the right of way between Mathews Avenue and Harvey Street, a total area of 41,580 square feet, can be purchased for \$4000.

I recommend that this purchase be made, and that \$1500 additional be appropriated from the General Pagerne Fund to meet the cost

propriated from the General Reserve Fund to meet the cost.

The Comptroller commented on this matter.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this purchase was authorized. The appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson: no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell.

OPEN SESSION, NOVEMBER 22, 1946

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(1) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the Certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded to the following who have qualified for the same under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943, by presenting evidence that they hold valid and unrevoked certificates issued by some other state or territory on the basis of having passed written examinations and evidence that they comply with other requirements of the law:

ADDITIONAL DELEGATION OF SIGNATURES

(2) The Comptroller requests adoption of the following resolution as an addendum to the resolution for delegation of signatures approved by the Board on March 9, 1946. The purpose of this addendum is to provide for the preparation and issuance of checks against the University Treasurer by the Business Office at Galesburg in connection with funds relating to that division. The officers to whom the proposed deputies are responsible have concurred in this arrangement. All employees thus deputized are placed under suitable bond.

Resolved that the President of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to William J. English and to James E. Osborn, of the Galesburg Division, authority to sign his name as President of the Board of Trustees, to checks drawn against the account: "University of Illinois, I. L. Porter, Treasurer, Galesburg Division," in the First National Bank of Chicago; the Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to L. O. Kerwood and to Lois Herron, of the Galesburg Division, authority to sign his name as Secretary of the Board of Trustees, to checks drawn against the same account.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this resolution was adopted.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES SERVICE FEE IN UNDERGRADUATE DIVISIONS AT CHICAGO AND GALESBURG

(3) A recommendation that beginning with the second semester, 1946-1947, there be levied and collected from students in the Undergraduate Divisions at Chicago and at Galesburg a student activities service fee of \$2.00 a semester, to be used in general accord with the principles followed for Union Building service fees at Urbana and at the Chicago Professional Colleges, to be held in trust as a student organization fund and to be expended under the direction of a joint student-faculty committee.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this fee was authorized as recommended.

CONSTRUCTION OF EMPLOYEES' DRESSING AND LOCKER ROOMS IN ILLINI UNION BUILDING

(4) The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends the construction of employees' dressing and locker rooms in a ground-floor area, now partly used for storage, in the Illini Union Building, the cost to be paid from the Illini Union operating surplus. Present permanent dressing room facilities are not adequate. Some of the guest rooms on the fourth floor are being used as employees' rooms because they were not furnished, but furniture is now available to equip them as sleeping rooms. Within a few years the added income from them will equal the capital expenditure for converting the storage area into dressing and locker rooms.

An estimate of \$7,638 has been secured from Clarence H. Siems, contractor, Urbana, for the construction of employees' dressing and locker rooms. The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends, and the Comptroller concurs, negotiating a contract with Mr. Siems for the construction of these rooms at an estimated cost of \$7,638. Bids have not been taken and it is unlikely

that competitive bids can be secured.

I approve and recommend that the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees be authorized to execute a contract with Clarence H. Siems in accordance with this proposal.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was authorized as recommended.

BUILDING POLICY

(5) The University of Illinois has a tremendous educational building program responsibility to the public and it is important that this be pushed as rapidly as possible. Experience has demonstrated that under present conditions it is practically impossible to obtain firm prices or lump-sum bids on building projects. If fixed bids are obtained, they are so high as to render the system of competitive bidding impracticable. The Physical Plant Department recommends continuing the use of the practice of the guaranteed maximum, plus fixed fee, form of contract which has been used for the past year or two. Under such form of contract the contractor assumes any cost beyond the guaranteed maximum, and any savings are divided between the contractor and the University. The Physical Plant Department has, therefore, proposed the following procedure:

1. The University will take fixed bids for an entire project on a guaranteed

maximum, plus fixed fee, basis.

2. The University will take alternate bids to reduce the amount of the immediate contract to funds available, even though this will involve major portions of the contract in some cases. A clause will also be included giving the University the right to reinstate such omissions in the contract by August 1, 1947. The award in general would be made on the lowest bid for the completed project.

Thus the University could enter into contracts within funds available and yet secure bids for a completed building, so that if additional funds are not provided the work will not proceed beyond the original contract.

Present Federal regulations require government approval to begin construction. Priorities can be obtained by the University only on veteran housing projects. On all other projects the University can obtain "authorization to begin construction" if sufficient justification is shown. Regardless of the form of authorization, there is still the problem of securing materials and labor.

The President of the University has authorized the Physical Plant Department to follow the policy and procedure outlined above for taking bids, provided that recommendations for awards of contracts shall be made through the usual

channels as heretofore.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the action of the President of the University in authorizing this procedure was approved and confirmed.

The above-listed costs are base bids to which escalation of 10 to 15% will need to be added for encumbrance purposes at the time of preparation of the contract. A total of \$12,000 of the above base bids is to be charged to the Special State Appropriation "Water Station," and the balance to "Fire Protection Facilities," funds for which are available.

CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF MEDICAL EXHIBIT IN MUSEUM OF SCIENCE AND INDUSTRY

(10) A proposal has been received from the C. W. Haynes Company for work to be done in connection with the University's Medical Exhibit in the Museum of Science and Industry. Funds for this work have previously been allotted,

and the proposal meets with the approval of Vice-President Ivy.

Considerable difficulty has been experienced in obtaining any quotations whatsoever on this work. Drawings were sent to numerous contractors, and bid openings were set for August 14, 1946, but no bids were received. Major Lohr of the Museum of Science and Industry then recommended several contractors are the second contractors. tractors who do work for the Museum. Of all the contractors contacted, the following three proposals were received:

The proposal from the C. W. Haynes Company suggested that this work be done on a cost-plus basis with a guaranteed upset price. This firm submitted a proposal based on this suggestion involving several alternates. The Physical Plant Department recommends that a guaranteed upset price of \$25,586 be accepted in lieu of the lump sum bid with the additional potential cost to the University of \$1,100 in order to: (a) substitute materials at the job that are available on the market in order to expedite completion of work; (b) obtain the completed job with the standards desired by the University and the Museum of Science and Industry in these days of increasing prices; (c) obtain the work

The lowest bid. However, this firm later stated that it would have to increase its bid and would be forced to withdraw its estimate.

specified at the least possible expense to the University of the quality desired in these times of material and labor shortages; (d) avail the University of the offer of Major Lohr with the services of his staff in assisting us in the supervision and in the substitution of materials that are available.

The Physical Plant Department recommends that a contract in the amount of \$25,586 on a guaranteed maximum basis be awarded to the C. W. Haynes Company for the above-described construction work on the Medical Exhibit. I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute such a contract.

The Comptroller presented this matter.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this contract was authorized.

REPORT OF AUDIT OF UNIVERSITY ACCOUNTS

(II) The Secretary of the Board reports that he has received from Arthur Young and Company, auditors of the University, the report of their examination of the accounts of the University for the year ended June 30, 1946. Copies of the report have been sent to President Stoddard and all the members of the Board of Trustees. The report includes a certification of the balance sheet, a statement of current income and expenditures and current funds surplus, and summaries of transactions of all departments.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

(12) The Comptroller presents his quarterly report to the Board as of June 30, 1946. Copies of this report have been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting.

ESTIMATES OF ENROLLMENT CHANGES FOR THE PERIOD FROM 1946-1950

(13) At the request of President Stoddard, I present herewith two sets of data on the flow of students through the University of Illinois during the period from 1946-1950. There is also submitted a flow chart on which these data are shown.

The first set of data is as follows:

The two tables presented above are based on the following assumptions:

1. The first table assumes that the total enrollment of students under the direct control of the University will be 26,000, divided as follows: Urbana campus, 18,500; Chicago Pier, 4,000; Galesburg campus, 2,000; Chicago Professional Colleges, 1,500. (The data show 2,000 students for Galesburg even though only 460 are now enrolled. It is anticipated that from 1,500 to 2,000 will be enrolled in February.)

2. The survival rates for veterans from class to class, based on previous experience, are expected to remain as follows: freshman to sophomore, 71.5%; sophomore to junior, 78%; junior to senior, 85%. (Note: There are some

signs that survival rates may be even higher than these.)

The comparable data for nonveterans are: freshman to sophomore, 55%; sophomore to junior, 70%; junior to senior, 85%.

3. The distribution of transfer and former students with advanced standing

is likewise based on previous experience.

4. It has been assumed that the first obligation of the University is to all the freshmen now under the direct auspices of the University, and to the freshmen now enrolled in the high school extension program. It has been further assumed that, after this year, the first obligation of the University will be to survivals into the sophomore, junior, and senior classes from this year's entering class.

The typical prewar distribution (1940-1941) of students by classes is as follows: freshmen, 3,772; sophomores, 2,312; juniors, 2,546; seniors, 1,993; graduate and professional, 1,611; Chicago professional, 1,193; total, 13,327.

5. It follows from these assumptions that available openings for new freshmen must be limited by the capacities of various campuses as listed in "I, above. In order to protect the University from an excessive flow of advanced students later on, it has been necessary to suggest a limited enrollment of freshmen in the high school program for the years after 1946-1947. The figure has been set at 1,500. This figure is to be compared with potential demands on the part of freshmen of the following order: 1947-1948, 17,500; 1948-1949, 17,800; 1949-1950, 18,400.

6. It has been assumed that the building program projected for the present biennium will be completed, without fail, by September 1, 1948. It has also been assumed that the University will proceed promptly to secure adequate staff housing. It is further assumed that there will be no substantial additions to

housing facilities for students.

7. It has been assumed that the departments, especially in the scientific fields, can actually provide for the maximum number of sophomores, juniors, and seniors listed in the above data. This is not certain at the moment, but studies are in process on this point.

These data suggest a number of conclusions which are crucial to future plans for the University. They are submitted to the Board of Trustees at this time for its information. They show:

I. That the only cushion for a larger number of freshmen lies (a) in the high school extension program, (b) in an expanded junior college program, (c) in a small number of regional institutes of the terminal technical type, or (d) in larger facilities at the University of Illinois by increased construction or by a reduction in advanced students, or both.

2. That the University of Illinois will increasingly become a senior college

and graduate school, including the several professional schools. In 1948-1949, the junior, senior, and graduate divisions of the University will enroll more

students than were enrolled in the entire University in 1940-1941.

The 1947-1949 biennial budget estimates for the University of Illinois have been based on approximately the figures submitted in Table A above. Any major decisions which would change the above estimates would call for an equally major change in the budget estimates. The only decision that could materially decrease the budget would be one in favor of drastic screening at all levels.

3. That the completion of the projected building program of the University on three fronts, viz., student housing, faculty housing, educational buildings (including power plant and utilities), is absolutely imperative.

- 4. That a system of screening both for initial admission to the University and for admission to its several divisions is unavoidable unless the whole structure of higher education in the State is revised to meet the predicted demand.
- 5. That presently crowded quarters, especially in engineering, in the basic sciences, and in commerce and business administration, will continue to be used to capacity. This holds true both of existing facilities and of the facilities to be added according to the schedule prepared by the University Building Program Committee.

These conclusions suggest certain questions of policy which are presented

to the Board of Trustees at this time for its information:

1. Shall the present limits of 18,500 at Urbana, 4,000 at the Pier, and 2,000 at Galesburg remain fixed for the next biennium? If so, what devices shall be used for admission to each of the several campuses, and under what conditions shall an extension of the high school program be approved?

2. In addition to possible support of a new junior college bill, shall the University of Illinois advocate and assume temporary administration of three to five regional institutes of the technical, terminal (two-year) and subprofes-

sional type?

- 3. Shall plans be made to absorb on the Urbana campus all transfers from the branches, including the high school program, the junior colleges, and the institutes, or (a) shall a four-year program be planned for Chicago or for Galesburg, or for both, and (b) shall the high school program be increased to include two years, or (c) shall Galesburg be maintained only as a freshman unit?
- 4. If, by accepting transfers to the campus at the sophomore, junior, and senior levels, the number of new Urbana freshmen to be admitted must be reduced, how approach (a) fraternity and sorority problems in relation to housing; (b) admission of special students (foreign students, nonstate students, athletes, scholarship holders, etc.); (c) the present staff and laboratory balance in favor of a heavy load of freshman and sophomore instruction?

5. Shall a ceiling be fixed for the Graduate School and the Urbana professional schools? If so, by what selective criteria? If not, how proceed with

a reconstruction of Urbana facilities and when?

6. In February, a limited number of new students can be admitted to the Pier, and a much larger number at Galesburg. Shall new students be admitted at Urbana?

The above data have not taken account of new students that might be admitted on any campus, and especially on the Urbana campus, in June for the

summer session. Shall new students be admitted in June?

The choice in these two instances is not between full utilization of all student housing versus nonutilization to capacity, but between a smaller and a larger burden of advanced students one and two years from now. Each new student admitted in February and June adds to the total number to whom we will be committed in subsequent semesters.

7. In case new facilities are not provided, what form of selective admission

shall be adopted:

(a) For entrance into the University? (i) High school rank. (ii) Ability

and achievement tests. (iii) Residents of the State.

- (b) For distribution to the branches and to the several Urbana divisions? (i) Higher standards with greater mortality. (ii) Requests from Deans and Directors for closing registration at a specific figure. (First come, first served.) (iii) Achievement.
- 8. What will be the policy of the Board of Trustees toward the bill to be proposed to the next General Assembly on State aid to junior colleges?
- 9. Should a screening policy be devised for terminal curricula, and if so, should Galesburg or the Pier or some other facility be set aside for terminal training? Should new facilities be sought?

In the midst of these complex and confusing issues, one fact remains wholly clear. The demand of students for higher education—general, terminal, technical, and professional—now exceeds and will continue to exceed the available facilities. The alternatives are to make the facilities meet the demand

of students, or screen the student demand so that it will be reduced to the size and character of the facilities. If the student demand is reduced, then the supply of trained personnel will not equal another demand, the demand of commerce, industry, agriculture, the professions, and of the public welfare for a far larger number of educated people.

President Stoddard and his administrative assistants are making a far-flung

study of this whole problem, toward the following ends:

I. Increased strength in the foundations of higher education at the elementary and secondary school levels.

2. Increased strength for the University of Illinois in those lines of work

it is best qualified to do.

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3. Diversion of that portion of the potential college population which could profit more greatly thereby into junior colleges and regional institutes, thus reducing the wasteful part of the upper-class program at the Urbana campus.

reducing the wasteful part of the upper-class program at the Urbana campus.
4. Financial support for a State-wide system of education at all levels adequate to the wealth and the culture of the State, and to the demands of the

post-war world for trained personnel.

This report was discussed in detail in connection with item 14 by the members of the Board and the officers of the University; at the end of the discussion, action was taken as shown on page 175, below.

ADMISSION OF NEW STUDENTS

(14) In preparing for the second semester of 1946-1947, it is necessary to establish policies and procedures which will limit the admission of students to the number that can be taught with available instructional staff and other facilities in the several courses and curricula. The following administrative actions have been taken by the Provost, acting for the President:

1. No permits to enter will be issued to new students of advanced standing (i.e., students desiring to transfer from other colleges and universities) who if admitted would be on probation because of previous unsatisfactory scholastic

records.

This is simply an extension of an existing policy of long standing. Students with previous unsatisfactory scholastic records have been permitted to transfer to the University of Illinois only upon recommendation of the dean of the college or director of the school in which such student desires to enroll. The present policy will automatically exclude such students without consideration of individual cases.

2. In several curricula it is necessary to limit enrollments.

COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

No new undergraduate students will be admitted in February, 1947.

No students now in other colleges of the University of Illinois will be permitted to transfer to the College of Engineering except in special cases where commitments have been made. Most of these exceptions will be in the Division of Special Services for War Veterans, which enrolled students who could not be accepted by the College of Engineering for the first semester, 1946-1947, with the understanding that they would later be permitted to transfer to engineering.

COLLEGE OF FINE AND APPLIED ARTS

Architecture.—No new students will be admitted in February, 1947, and no students will be permitted to transfer from other colleges of the University except to carry out previous commitments as in the College of Engineering.

Landscape Architecture.—No new students will be admitted in February.

Art.—The Department of Art will admit 50 new students in February.

COLLEGE OF LAW

The number of new first-year students accepted for the second semester, 1946-1947, will be limited to 75.

School of Journalism

The present enrollment is 253, and in the Director's opinion the School of Journalism can accommodate up to 285 students, in addition to any students

transferring from the Division of Special Services for War Veterans, who will be admitted without limitation. The Director and the Registrar have been authorized to close enrollments when the quota of new students is reached.

SCHOOL OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION

In the professional curricula, the number of new first-year students entering in February will be limited to 50 (15 women; 35 men) who will be admitted only upon approval of the Director. All transfer students with at least two semesters of credit for advanced standing, and who will not be on probation, will be admitted without limitation as to numbers.

The University of Illinois will admit new freshmen to the Undergraduate Divisions at Galesburg and the Navy Pier and to the Urbana campus in February, 1947, with the following exceptions. Because of limited facilities on the Urbana campus, new freshmen will not be admitted to any of the curricula in the College of Engineering or to the curricula in the Department of Architecture. The number of new freshmen that can be admitted to Physical Education, Art, and Music will be restricted to the facilities available, as indicated above. Because of the limited facilities on the Urbana campus, the University reserves the right to assign new freshmen to Galesburg or to the Navy Pier.

New students with advanced standing will be admitted to the Urbana campus in February, 1947, except that no such students can be accepted for curricula in Engineering and in Architecture and except that restrictions must be placed on the number that can be accepted in Law, Journalism, Physical Education, Art, and Music. Students completing two years at Galesburg or the Navy Pier will have priority in transferring to Urbana.

In the College of Law and the School of Journalism, the restriction on the number to be admitted will apply both to new and to former students. The College of Engineering and the Department of Architecture will not accept transfers from the other schools and colleges on the Urbana campus excepting cases of individual students to whom commitments have already been made.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the President of the University was requested to formulate and present to the Board at the earliest possible moment a complete plan for an educational system for the State of Illinois, at all levels, adequate to the wealth and culture of the State and to the demands of the post-war world for trained personnel, with estimates of the funds involved for all branches and recommendations to be made to the General Assembly, and the President of the University and the President of the Board were authorized to discuss this matter with the Governor and other State authorities.

CONTRACT WITH VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

(15) The Comptroller reports that he and the Bursar, with the assistance of the Legal Counsel, have concluded a contract with the Veterans Administration under Public Law 346 which provides for the payment to the University by the Veterans Administration of costs of teaching personnel and supplies necessary in the training of veterans under the G.I. Bill. This payment is in lieu of tuition and is in addition to the Union Building, matriculation, and hospital fees, which are also paid by the Veterans Administration. The contract covers the second semester of 1945-1946 and subsequent terms.

Costs of teaching personnel and supplies, following the instruction of the Veterans Administration, were arrived at by adding the total salaries paid the teaching staff of the University during the most recent semester prior to the contract, which was the first semester of 1945-1946, excluding the portion of any such salaries devoted to administration, research, or extension, and dividing by the total credit hours earned by all University students during such period. The regulation directed that 15 per cent be added to this amount to provide for personnel related to actual teaching, and supplies; and the result gives a teaching cost per credit hour. The resulting rate is \$9.65 a credit hour. This rate will be revised annually.

The tuition so paid to the University is approximately 80 per cent more than that which would be paid under the arrangement previously existing, under which the Veterans Administration paid the University the regular nonresident tuition, but the rate of \$9.65 a credit hour contracted for does not yet pay half of the total cost of education of the veteran. A rate of \$17.00 a credit hour would be necessary to reimburse the University for all cash expenditures incidental to instructional service in departments of the University during the same period, excluding all research, extension, and auxiliary enterprises. Furthermore, this rate does not contain any provision for depreciation of buildings and other capital assets. The State of Illinois is still, therefore, contributing more than half of the cost of the G.I.'s training, after the receipt of the \$9.65 a credit hour from the Veterans Administration.

the \$9.65 a credit hour from the Veterans Administration.

The payment of such fees by the Veterans Administration has no effect on the total amount of subsistence benefits available to the veteran, so long as the total of such charges, plus incidental fees and books and supplies does not exceed \$500 for any two semesters or \$764 for any three-semester year, since if total costs do not reach these amounts, no credit is given to the individual veteran for the amounts not so used. The \$9.65 results in total tuition of \$150 to \$165 a semester, so that ordinarily the charges for training are well within

the allowed annual maximum.

The Veterans Administration will not pay any fees which are in the nature of fines or fees incurred because of some action of the veteran, such as late registration, lost book charges, library fines, and change fees, and such charges will be collected directly from the veteran by the University.

The Comptroller presented this report, which was received for record.

APPROPRIATION OF AGRONOMY DEPARTMENT INCOME

(16) The Agronomy Department has an unused accumulated balance of income of previous years from sales of products amounting to \$18,368. The Head of the Department and the Dean of the College request that this balance be appropriated to the Department for the following nonrecurring purposes for the current year subject to adjustment within the total: soil maps and other bulletins, \$8,606; equipment, \$9,762.

During the war it has not been possible to keep up the regular flow of

During the war it has not been possible to keep up the regular flow of printing of soil maps initiated many years ago as a long-time project ultimately to cover the entire state. Two maps and one soil report are now in process of completion, and funds are needed to cover their cost. Four other important

bulletins also are in preparation.

With respect to equipment, many items of farm and laboratory equipment were not available during the war and are now urgently needed to carry on the department's experiment station and research program.

The Comptroller concurs in this recommendation and approval is requested.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell.

OFFER OF FUNDS FROM NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR INFANTILE PARALYSIS

(17) The Cook County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Inc., after negotiations with Vice-President Ivy and Hospital Administrator Millizen, has agreed to pay the University of Illinois the sum of \$143.84 a day for a period of ninety days, or a total of \$12,945, for hospital care for poliomyelitis patients. This sum is based on the estimated per diem cost of 16 patients a day in the Research and Educational Hospitals.

The University has agreed to make available 16 beds in the Hospital for infantile paralysis cases. However, this arrangement has necessitated the opening up of an unused portion of the Hospital so as to make space available for the 16 beds needed. In addition, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has agreed to make available some equipment to be used in connection with the

patients' care.

The opening of the 16-bed convalescent unit for the use of these patients will result in extra expense to various departments of the Hospital and the Physical Plant. CONTRACT FOR ERECTION OF BOILER AND MISCELLANEOUS EQUIPMENT FOR ADDITION TO POWER PLANT

(19) Bids were received and publicly opened at 2:00 p.m. October 8, 1946, for the erection of boiler and miscellaneous equipment in connection with the addition to the power plant. Bids received are summarized as follows:

Note A: Subject to escalation in prices and certain other additional expense.

Note B: "This amount is based on an estimated average hourly labor rate of \$1.85.

Should the actual average hourly labor rate (total COMPANY payrolls divided by total hours worked) paid by the COMPANY for the erection of this contract vary from that given above, the amount to be paid by the PURCHASER for the erection shall be increased or decreased proportionately.

"If during the performance of work covered by this Proposal, the local labor crafts employed have duly authorized, recognized and approved rulings requiring the payment of carfare, expense and/or other compensation besides wages for work performed, the Company shall be reimbursed for such extra expense at actual cost, plus 15 per cent."

It is the opinion of Sargent and Lundy, engineers on this project, that if the contracts should be awarded to Oberle-Jordre Company that the University should anticipate an escalation of approximately 25 per cent over the amount

listed in the above tabulation.

Due to the fact that the proposal from the American Boiler & Tank Company is a firm proposal and the proposal from the Oberle-Jordre Company, the lowest bidder on this work, is subject to unlimited escalation, Sargent and Lundy recommended, and the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller concur, that this contract be awarded to the American Boiler & Tank Company in the amount of \$45,750 for the erection of boiler and miscellaneous equipment.

Funds are available in the existing funds released for the power plant addition project for the award of this contract.

CONTRACT FOR PURCHASE OF COAL FOR UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION OF UNIVERSITY AT GALESBURG

(20) Bids were invited from 33 concerns for 15,000 tons of 11/4" to 0" coal screenings as required during the period October 1, 1946, through June 30, 1947, inclusive, to be delivered at the rate of one car a day, for the Undergraduate Division of the University located at Galesburg.

The only quotation received was from the Central Indiana Coal Company of Galesburg, Illinois, at a price of \$2.45 f.o.b. mine, plus 79¢ freight, or a total cost of \$3.24 a ton f.o.b. Galesburg, subject to price adjustment.

It is recommended by the Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller that the contract be awarded to the Central Indiana Coal Company at an approximate cost of \$40.100.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

December 28, 1946



The December meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Saturday, December 28, 1946, at the University Club, 76 East Monroe Street, Chicago, according to the following schedule:

10:00 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

12:00 m. — Open session.

When the Board convened, the following members were present: President Livingston, General Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell. Dr. Meyer took his place with the Board during the morning.

President Stoddard was present; also Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. I. L. Porter, Treasurer, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, and Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meetings of October 21 and 22 and November 22, 1946.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 113 to 100 above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

CONTRACTS FOR GENERAL AND ELECTRIC WORK FOR REMODELING DAVENPORT HOUSE AND ALTERATIONS AT 1202 WEST GREEN STREET, URBANA

(1) Bids were received and publicly opened at 3 p.m., November 19, 1946, for the general and electric work in the remodeling of Davenport House and alterations at 1202 West Green Street, Urbana. Bids received are summarized as follows:

The electric bid is on a basis of a guaranteed maximum plus fixed fee, while the general work bid is based on a fixed fee plus estimated cost. For this reason, the Physical Plant Department recommends that the total be considered in connection with electric work which would result in the Bland Electric Company's being lowest at a guaranteed maximum cost of \$4,994 plus \$2,497, or \$7,491.

On the general work bid, Clarence H. Siems is lowest at a fixed fee of \$4,435, the total additional cost estimated at \$39,060 (the latter figure of course is not fixed). On this basis, a total cost of \$43,495 is indicated for general work.

These changes are a part of the program for relocating the Health Service, funds for which are provided in the State Building Appropriation for 1945-1947. The Home Economics Department (which now occupies Davenport House) will be moved to 1202 West Green; the Health Service will be moved to Davenport House; and the present Health Service Building will be razed to make room for the new Electrical Engineering Building.

I recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to conclude a contract with the Bland Electric Company in the amount of \$7,491 in accordance with their proposal, and a contract with Clarence H. Siems at a total cost of \$43,495, in accordance with that proposal.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these contracts were authorized as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR PLUMBING, HEATING, AND VENTILATING FOR REMODELING DAVENPORT HOUSE (HEALTH SERVICE RELOCATION)

(2) Bids were taken on November 26, 1946, for plumbing, heating, and ventilating in the remodeling of Davenport House, in which the Health Service will be relocated.

Only one bid was received, from the Champaign Plumbing and Heating Company bidding on the basis of a total estimated cost of \$19,261 including a fixed fee of \$3,571, the work otherwise to be on a cost basis. The Physical Plant Department considers this a satisfactory estimate. It was therefore recommended that the contract be awarded to the Champaign Plumbing and Heating Company.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was awarded as recommended.

RETIREMENT OF DIRECTOR F. B. STIVEN

(3) Professor Frederic B. Stiven, Director of the School of Music, has requested that he be retired from active service beginning September 1, 1947, under the provision in the law creating the University Retirement System of

Illinois which permits retirement "on or after the attainment of age sixty-five (65) in exceptional cases and for substantial cause at the request of the Employee and upon certification of the Employer."

Professor Stiven will be 65 years of age on July 17, 1947, and has requested retirement because of his health. At the end of the current academic year Professor Stiven will have been in the service of the University 26 years.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this request was granted.

GIFT FROM MR. AND MRS. MERLE J. TREES

(4) Mr. and Mrs. Merle J. Trees offer the University of Illinois \$10,730 to be added to the endowment fund established by them last year and accepted by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees December 11, 1945 (Minutes, page 937). The income from this fund is to be used for the maintenance of the "Emily Nichols Trees (Class of 1905) and Merle Jay Trees (Class of 1907) Collection of Paintings" which they established in 1937 and to which they have added paintings from time to time.

Mr. and Mrs. Trees suggest that as soon as possible the money they have contributed this year be invested in United States Savings Bonds, Series F, of which the sum given would purchase an amount of bonds which, if held to maturity, would have a par value of \$14,500 and would represent an average

annual return of 2.53%.

I recommend acceptance of this gift with an expression of deep appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. Trees for their continued generosity to the University of Illinois. I also recommend approval of the investment.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these recommendations were adopted.

CONTRACT WITH THE ALUMINUM COMPANY OF AMERICA

(5) The Aluminum Company of America, 801 Gulf Building, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, has offered the University the sum of \$30,000 for a cooperative investigation "to determine the suitability of aluminum for equipment, devices and structural parts for use under the conditions found in and around farm buildings; to make improvements in design; test specific devices; find practical new uses for aluminum and study its value and limitations for various products."

The company desires a contract with the University covering this research project which will conform with the established policy of the University governing research sponsored by outside agencies except for the following modification with respect to patentable discoveries: (a) joint action by the University and the sponsor on decisions as to making patent applications, and (b) joint ownership of patents and issuance of a royalty-free, nonexclusive, irrevocable licenses to any applicant. Thus the sponsor will not derive any commercial value from patentable discoveries. The policy of the University and the rights of the public are adequately safeguarded.

I recommend approval of the contract in accordance with these modifica-

On motion of Mr. Davis, this contract was authorized under the terms recommended.

ARCHITECTURE OF ENGINEERING BUILDINGS

GENTLEMEN:

I have given long and careful consideration to the subject matter of this communication before addressing it to the Board. As an Alumnus of the University of Illinois and as an Architect, I wish to record here my vigorous protest relating to the style of architecture which it is proposed to incorporate

into a large contemplated building program. The designs of some of these buildings were published in the September issue of the Illinois Alumni News.

The present Campus development was begun many years ago under the direction of one of America's most distinguished Architects, Mr. Charles A. Platt, whose coming to Illinois was the foresight of Professor James M. White, then Supervising Architect of the University. It is well known that prior to Mr. Platt's initial work at the University, the buildings of the Campus had no particular design or arrangement. Under his able guidance and direction the Illinois Campus has become one of the most renowned in the land, so distinguished by the elegance and charming simplicity of the Georgian Period.

The proposed program is a trend away from those traditions which made of Illinois a center of culture. Such a sinister departure is repellent to those who

hold a justifiable pride in the aesthetic value of the University.

It is my considered opinion that your Honorable Body has been poorly advised or is lacking in appreciation of the charm and the beauty of the notable buildings which bear Mr. Platt's influence. Inasmuch as the ultimate cost of the proposed buildings represents a huge investment to the taxpayers of the State of Illinois, it would be better that their design be corrected now at additional cost rather than to place a blight on the remainder of the Campus structures through their execution as now planned.

I refuse to believe that the Board of Trustees of this great Institution will commit the error of permitting the construction to proceed of the design as now formulated. I am prompted in my criticism in the interest of the people as a whole, and from a professional standpoint in support of what I believe to be fine architecture.

BIDS ON RESIDENCE HALL FOR WOMEN

(7) The University's capital appropriations for 1945-1947 (Senate Bill 417) include \$1,500,000 for "students' residence halls and equipment." There is submitted herewith a schedule of bids received December 6, 1946, on a residence hall for women at Urbana covering: (1) foundation and related work only, and (2) balance of general work to complete building.

The lowest qualified bidder is Warner Construction Company at a guaranteed limit cost of \$180,000 for foundation, and \$1,820,000 for balance of general work, contractor to receive fixed fees as stated in the schedule, the University and contractor to share 75 per cent and 25 per cent respectively in any savings under maximum totals.

An estimate of other costs in addition to those covered by bids indicates that the final cost of this building for 498 students and 10 residents and counselors may total \$3,600,000. The University now has only about \$600,000 of funds available for this project. (See Board Minutes, July 30, 1946, page 3.) A special appropriation of \$1,000,000 will be requested of the next General Assembly to replace in part funds expended under this appropriation with the Governor's approval for temporary housing. Further appropriations are being requested for 1947-1949 to supplement building appropriations made for 1945-1947, and \$7,550,000 to extend the residence halls program. Authority now exists to borrow up to \$1,500,000 for residence halls construction. A loan can not be secured unless it is possible to complete a project which will produce sufficient income to service the loan and then only to the extent that such income makes possible. The project can not be completed without additional appropriations.

The situation has been reviewed in detail by the Provost, the Comptroller, the Chairman of the University Building Committee, and the University Architect. Because of the housing situation and the importance of getting additional

projects started at once, these officers recommend, and I concur:

I. That a contract for the foundation work on the women's residence hall be awarded to Warner Construction Company, the lowest bidder, subject to the following conditions:

(a) When and if additional funds are available prior to August 1, 1947, the University will extend the contract by acceptance of the contractor's bid for the

balance of the general work to complete the building.

(b) If funds are not available prior to August 1, 1947, the contractor may refuse to accept the additional work, and the contract will terminate with completion of work authorized to that date.

2. That University officers negotiate with the contractor to secure structural steel or do other work which can be done within the limits of available funds before the close of the current biennium.

The proposed contract conforms with the principles governing construction contracts approved by the Board on November 22, 1946.

The Comptroller presented this matter.

President Stoddard discussed the policies involved, and stated that he felt the situation to be critical, and that it was most important to start construction of the foundation.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the award of contracts for the construction of the foundation was authorized, and the procedure recommended was approved.

REPORTS ON LEGAL MATTERS

At this point, Professor Britton, on request of President Livingston, reported on the following legal matters.

CHANGES IN CIVIL SERVICE CLASSIFICATION

Professor Britton recommended that the Board reconsider and rescind its action of October 22, 1946 (Minutes, page 125), receiving for record a list of revised descriptions of University Civil Service classified positions.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the action of October 22, 1946,

recited above, was reconsidered.

This matter was discussed at length.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the action of October 22, 1946, was

Detailed information covering these changes shall be available in the office of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, at Urbana, Illinois.

In connection with the discussion of this matter, Professor Britton raised the question of the nature and function of the Board when acting on Civil Service matters, as to whether or not the Board then became a Civil Service Commission for the University, under the Civil Service amendment of 1941, and whether or not the minutes covering such actions should be more distinctly separated (while still incorporated in the general minutes of the Board).

During the discussion of this matter, Dr. Meyer took his place with the Board.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this matter was referred to the President of the University, for consideration with the Legal Counsel and for recommendation to the Board.

CONDEMNATION OF LAND

Professor Britton reported also that the suit for the exercise of eminent domain on land in Urbana required as a site for the Chemical Engineering Building would be in court on January 13, 1947, and that Mr. H. I. Green, who is acting as special counsel in this suit, recommends that as many of the members of the Board as can do so arrange to be present.

LEASE OF NAVY PIER

Professor Britton reported also that the lease for the Navy Pier had not yet been executed, and that certain matters pertaining to the valuation of personal property left by the Navy were still under discussion

by the Navy and the City of Chicago. Also that the lease for the use of the drill hall for athletics would be considered by the City Council of Chicago on December 30.

Mr. Morey made a statement on these matters.

LEGISLATIVE BUDGET

Mr. Nickell stated that there had been some discussion of the effect of the increased program of the University on the private colleges of the State, and that some apprehension had been expressed lest the smaller colleges might not survive in competition. The suggestion had been made that the University should seek a larger proportion of its income through large increases in the tuition fees.

President Stoddard discussed this matter in some detail, referring to the total college and university enrollment in Illinois as compared to other states, where the ratio to the total population is shown to be much higher.

This matter was referred to President Stoddard, to study in connection with the over-all plan for an educational system for the State.

President Livingston, being called to the telephone, requested General Davis to take the chair.

OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened in open session, the same members and officers were present as during the morning; also Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information, Mr. F. E. Bell, Manager of the University of Illinois Foundation; Dean M. T. McClure, and Major L. R. Lohr.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR COLLEGE OF VETERINARY MEDICINE

(1) The Dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine recommends the appointment of the following to the Advisory Committee of the College for the year 1946-1947:

Mr. Davis moved that these nominations be approved, with the addition of several names suggested by him; he also suggested three names to be added either to the Agricultural Advisory Committees or to the General Advisory Committee. President Stoddard stated that he would accept these nominations and make them part of his recommendation, subject to clearance with the respective deans, and the motion was passed.

APPOINTMENT TO COLLEGE OF PHARMACY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

(2) The Dean of the College of Pharmacy recommends the appointment of Mr. Edwin Brown, Quincy, Illinois, as a member of the College of Pharmacy Advisory Committee for a term of five years from December 1, 1946. The other members of the Committee are:

Mr. Davis moved that this appointment be made, and suggested the addition of six other names to the committee. President Stoddard stated that he would accept these nominations and make them part of his recommendation, subject to clearance with Dean Serles, and the motion was passed.

COMPENSATION FOR SUMMER SESSION TEACHING

(3) The University of Illinois Statutes specify that salaries for teaching in the summer session shall be approximately 16 per cent of the annual salaries for the ranks involved, with a maximum of \$900. This is for eight weeks of summer teaching. When the University increased the period of the summer session as a part of the accelerated program, this formula was used for extending the maximum of summer teaching appointments beyond eight weeks on the basis of

\$112.50 a week maximum salary.

The Director of the Summer Session recommends that the maximum for eight weeks of summer teaching be established at \$1200 and that this be used as the basis for calculating maximum compensation for assignments beyond

eight weeks. Reasons for this recommendation are:

(a) The previous maximum was based on a salary schedule which, in general, was much lower than the 1945-1947 schedule, and will be even further out of line if any substantial upturn in salaries is possible during the next biennium.

(b) The extension of the summer session to a full sixteen-week period

means almost continual service on the part of the members of the staff, and while it is true that some of this extension is already recognized in increased salaries, nevertheless the virtual elimination of vacation periods for the last five years has placed an undue burden on the staff.

(c) The Director points out that it is becoming increasingly difficult to recruit a summer session staff because of the increased number of opportunities for remunerative employment in government service and in industry. This outside pressure is particularly troublesome in the technical fields. This is one of the main reasons why other institutions have been forced to raise the maximum

for the supplementary stipend for summer session service.

The total amount required to meet this maximum increase in stipend is \$31,600. Provision for it has been included in the biennial budget estimates for

1947-1949.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this recommendation was adopted.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION PROGRAM IN COLLEGES OF MEDICINE AND DENTISTRY

- (4) The University Senate has recommended adoption of the following program in Physical Education for the Colleges of Medicine and Dentistry and I concur in this recommendation:
- 1. All men students in the Colleges of Medicine and Dentistry are required to secure 6 hours (two academic years) credit in Physical Education. One hour credit must be in Physical Education Theory and 5 hours in Physical Education Practice. All classes are to meet two times (for one hour) a week. All courses in Physical Education carry one hour credit each quarter.

2. All entering men students are required to take a Health Examination before registration. (This examination is to be given by the Department of

Health Service.)

(a) Students with seriously handicapping defects (e.g., organic cardiac condition, arrested tuberculosis, or total blindness) are to be permanently excused from the Physical Education requirement by the Department of Health Service.

Students with slightly handicapping defects (e.g., functional cardiac conditions) or improvable defects (e.g., partial paralysis or inguinal hernia) or minor handicapping defects (e.g., absence of one hand) or temporary handicapping conditions (e.g., post-operative cases) will be assigned to the course "Prescribed Exercise and Sports" by the Department of Health Service.

Students with temporary handicapping conditions (e.g., broken ankle) may be temporarily exempted from enrolling in Physical Education (e.g., one quar-

ter) by the Department of Health Service.

(b) Students enrolled in regular classes who develop a slightly handicapping condition (e.g., post-operative cases) may be transferred to the course "Prescribed Exercise and Sports" at any time by the Department of Health Service. An activity program will be prescribed for these individuals by the Health Service. This program will be carried out by the Department of Physical Education.

(c) Students enrolled in "Prescribed Exercise and Sports" may be removed at the end of any quarter by the Department of Health Service. (Such

students would then register in regular Physical Education courses.)

3. The Department of Physical Education will carry out the recommendation of the Department of Health Service in excusing, readmitting, assigning, and reassigning students in Physical Education courses. Students who are not excused from Physical Education courses, or who are not assigned to a particular course or category of courses, will be enrolled in Physical Education courses as prescribed by the Department of Physical Education.

4. All entering students except those permanently excused by the Health Service are required to take a Physical Fitness Test. This test is to be given by the Department of Physical Education in Chicago. Men students who fail to pass the Physical Fitness Test must register in Physical Education Practice. Men students who pass the Physical Fitness Test will receive one hour credit in Physical Education Practice. A student may continue to receive credit for one hour in Physical Education Practice by repassing the Physical Fitness Test each quarter.

5. All women students of the College of Medicine are required to take Physical Education Theory (1 hour). All women students except those permanently excused by the Department of Health Service, are required to take a Physical Fitness Test. Due to the present limited facilities, no course in Physical Education Practice can be offered to women students. The findings of the Physical Fitness Test with recommendations will be reported to each student by the Department of Physical Education in Chicago.

The new program differs from the present one as follows:

1. At present the physical education requirements are up to each college to determine. In the future physical education will be included in the requirements for graduation.

2. The College of Pharmacy already requires two years of physical

education for graduation.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this program was approved as recommended.

CHANGES IN POLICY AND RULES FOR NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES

(5) The Director of Nonacademic Personnel submits for approval a proposed change in Section IV, paragraph 4 of the "Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees" for Chicago Professional Colleges as approved by the Board of Trustees on June 30, 1945, to be effective Innuary I 1975.

to be effective January I, 1947.

The effect is to provide for a basic five-day work week with two weeks' vacation for nonacademic employees other than administrative groups, in lieu of the generally prevailing five and one-half day work week with progressive vacation now in effect. The plan as proposed has met general acceptance by both employer and employee groups concerned. The proposed changes are the result

of extended conferences between the Director, the Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, deans and heads of departments in Chicago, and other general administrative officers, and employee groups.

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Because of the urgency of the problem and the delays incident to completion of details, employees have been advised that the Board would be requested to authorize this change. Funds are available within budgets of the current year for the increased cost of the change, estimated at \$180,000 a year (\$90,000 for one-half year 1006-1007). It is covered by the proposed hudget for 1007-1000.

one-half year, 1946-1947). It is covered by the proposed budget for 1947-1949.

The Director also requests approval for making the work schedules supplementary to the basic "Policy and Rules" instead of being included as an integral part therein. This will do away with the necessity of printing separate, complete editions of the Policy for each campus and will make it possible to revise detailed schedules from time to time as required as supplementary to the main policy. The authority for approving such revisions of detailed schedules already has been delegated to the Director of Nonacademic Personnel by the Board.

By way of clarification, the Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees, Chicago (effective July 1, 1945), IV, Hours (page five), Paragraph I, should be revised to read as follows:

1. The University recognizes work schedules as set forth in this section. Each employee classification is allocated to an appropriate work schedule as to the work day and the work week. See pages 17-22 for schedules showing which work schedule applies to any specific classification. Changes in these schedules will be made as to prevailing rate groups when prevailing local practices change and the University is notified accordingly. Changes affecting other groups may be made by the Board on the recommendation of the Director of Nonacademic Personnel and the President. Employees in groups concerned will be notified of all such changes.

I concur in these recommendations and request approval.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these changes were approved.

APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL FUNDS FOR PREPARATION OF PLANS FOR NEW BUILDINGS

(6) The Bureau of Community Facilities of the Federal Works Agency has been given the responsibility for the administration of Title V of the War Mobilization and Reconversion Act of 1944. The purpose of the Act is to encourage States, their agencies, and the political subdivisions of the States to complete the plan preparation of specific public works and to take other steps necessary to enable them to undertake the construction of their public works.

This Act authorizes the Federal Works Administrator to make advances of Federal funds to non-Federal public agencies to assist in the preparation of plans for specific public works and to issue regulations for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of Title V of the Act. The Act specifically provides that the making of advances shall not in any way commit the Federal Government to assist in the construction of the public works so planned. The Act and regulations provide that advances shall be repaid to the Federal Government if and when construction is undertaken either under contract or by the applicant's forces.

If the University of Illinois applies for and receives funds, it will be possible to start now on the preparation of plans for those buildings included in the requests for state appropriations for the biennium 1947-1949. If an appropriation is received, construction can be started at an earlier date than otherwise would be possible. If the appropriation is deferred, plans will be ready whenever funds are available.

The extent to which the University can receive funds from the Federal Works Agency under this program is not known. Representatives of the FWA have indicated that \$179,000 has been set aside for the State of Illinois and that it appears that the foremost need in the State of Illinois is at the University of Illinois.

The Comptroller recommends, and I concur, that the University attempt to obtain funds under this program. It is requested that the Board adopt the fol-

lowing resolution indicating their desire to participate in the program and designating the Comptroller as the official representative:

The Comptroller discussed this matter.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the following resolution was adopted.

RESOLUTION

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, having become familiarized with Public Law 458, 78th Congress, as amended, and the regulations promulgated by the Federal Works Administrator pursuant thereto, and having determined that such law and regulations are applicable to the University of Illinois in the planning of non-Federal public works, and

Whereas, the University of Illinois has for a period of time recognized the need for additional building to provide a more comprehensive, economic, and practicable facility serving the educational needs of the University of Illinois, and

Whereas, the University of Illinois has been and is unable to initiate such plan preparation because of its inability to provide funds for the purpose, and Whereas, the University of Illinois is requesting an appropriation from the State legally empowering it to plan, construct, finance, operate, and maintain the public works under consideration, and

Whereas, pursuant to the above-mentioned law administered by the Federal Works Agency, Bureau of Community Facilities, advances of public funds are made available for public works plan preparation in order to make advance provision for the construction of non-Federal public works, not including housing.

Now, therefore, be it resolved, by the Board of Trustees of the University

of Illinois as follows:

1. That an application be submitted to the Bureau of Community Facilities of the Federal Works Agency for an advance of funds to prepare plans and specifications for any or all University buildings for which appropriations are

being requested of the General Assembly.

2. That Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, is hereby designated as the official representative of the University of Illinois for this purpose and is hereby authorized to sign such application and all other documents required in obtaining the advance of funds referred to and to furnish the Government with such general, technical, and financial information and data as may be requested; and

3. That in accordance with Section 8 of the Regulations of the Bureau the University of Illinois plans and reasonably expects to initiate the construction of the proposed public works within four years after receipt of the advance and

to prosecute the public works to completion.

RELEASES OF FUNDS FROM STATE-WIDE PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS APPROPRIATION

(7) A report that Governor Dwight H. Green has authorized the release of funds from the appropriation made to the University of Illinois by the 64th General Assembly in the "Act making appropriations for a State-wide system of public works projects, including all ordinary and contingent expenses relating thereto," as follows: Release No. 288

"For contingencies to cover expenditures for purposes for which the amount appropriated in any item above enumerated is or becomes

This money was previously released (Release No. 116) to supplement other funds for the remodeling of the old power plant into a Naval Science Building. The Navy Department is attempting to secure an allotment of Federal funds to

aid in this construction. Release No. 289 "For contingencies to cover expenditures for purposes for which the

amount appropriated in any item above enumerated is or becomes insufficient\$500 000"

This is to be used to augment Release No. 217 in the amount of \$42,000, for the removal of the Health Service Station to another University building, the original release having proved insufficient to complete the project.

I recommend that these funds be appropriated by the Board for the expendi-

tures specified in the release.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the amount released (\$33,000) was appropriated as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell: no, none: absent, Mr. Green, Mrs. Grigsby, Dr. Luken, Mr. Williamson.

AUTHORIZATION FOR GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS AND FELLOWSHIPS

(8) The Dean of the Graduate School requests an appropriation of \$150,000 for

graduate scholarships and fellowships for the academic year 1947-1948.

The biennial budget for 1947-1949 as approved by the Board of Trustees includes a provision for graduate scholarships and fellowships at the rate of \$150,000 a year. It is necessary to set up provisions for scholarships and fellowships well in advance of the regular budget because of the common practice among universities of making scholarship and fellowship appointments on April I of the year preceding that in which the appointments will be held. Consequently it is necessary to plan for scholarships and fellowships prior to the action of the General Assembly of Illinois on the biennial budget.

I do not believe it is advisable to make a commitment for the full amount of the budgetary provision, but I recommend at this time authorization of appointments to graduate scholarships and fellowships for 1947-1948 not to exceed

On motion of Mr. Davis, this authorization was made as recommended.

SUPPLEMENTARY APPROPRIATION FOR CIVIL ENGINEERING SUMMER SURVEYING CAMP, 1946

(9) The Board of Trustees made an appropriation of \$10,000 for construction and equipment for the Civil Engineering Camp on December 11, 1945 (Minutes,

page 945). Actual costs were \$13,809.48.

The work included four toilet and bathrooms, a kitchen building, including construction of a walk-in refrigerator and installation of equipment, remodeling one barracks into staff quarters, and constructing a building for hot water supply and laundry. Unexpected expenditures were necessary on the power plant because the local electric company was unable to supply current. It was expected that equipment could be secured from two prisoner-of-war camps near the surveying camp. This equipment, however, was taken away and stored, and efforts to secure it proved futile. The necessary cots, mattresses, dishes, kitchen equipment, and truck had to be purchased.

Operation and maintenance expenditures totaled \$9,091.16, while charges to

students resulted in an income of only \$6,488.42.

The Civil Engineering Department has paid these excess costs from its current year's budget, but as a result is left without sufficient funds to complete the year. It requests an additional appropriation of \$3,810 for construction and equipment and \$2,603 additional to its current budget to cover the deficit on camp operations.

The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures has concurred in the request and recommends approval. I concur and request nonrecurring appropriations from the General Reserve in the amounts stated.

(15) The Comptroller presents his quarterly report to the Board as of September 30, 1946. Copies of this report have been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting.

ADMISSION OF STUDENTS TO THE COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

(16) It is impossible to expand instructional staff and other educational facilities to provide for more students in the College of Engineering than are now enrolled, plus those in the undergraduate divisions in Chicago, Galesburg, and in the high-school extension centers to whom the University has definite obligations to permit their transfer to the College of Engineering as sophomores and juniors.

Further restrictions on enrollments in that division are necessary and the

following are recommended:

1. No permits to enter, or to transfer with advanced standing from other colleges and universities (other than divisions of the University of Illinois) will be issued to candidates for admission to the College of Engineering for the summer session of 1947. This is an extension of restrictions already applicable to new admissions for the second semester, 1946-1947.

2. When new students are again permitted to enroll in the College of Engineering, permits to enter will be issued to nonresidents of Illinois only as

follows:

(a) To those ranking in the upper twenty per cent scholastically in their high-school classes, if applying for admission as first-year students.

(b) To students applying for admission with advanced standing by transfer from other colleges and universities who have a scholastic average equivalent to B (or 4.00) in the University of Illinois grading system.

The College of Engineering Executive Committee recommended even more stringent restrictions, but the above are as much as I recommend for the present.

The Provost commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these recommendations were adopted.

ACTIVITIES AT THE PIER AND AT GALESBURG

On request of Mr. McLaughlin, the Provost reported on activities at the Chicago and Galesburg branches.

PRESIDENT STODDARD'S REPORT ON THE UNITED NATIONS EDUCATIONAL, SCIENTIFIC, AND CULTURAL ORGANIZATION

President Stoddard reported briefly on the Educational Conference in Paris, from which he had just returned as a delegate to the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, and gave his impressions of the projects for the eradication of illiteracy and the promotion of amity throughout the world.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

January 25, 1947



The January meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Saturday, January 25, 1947, at the University Club, 76 East Monroe Street, Chicago, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session, as in Committee of the Whole.

11:30 a.m. — Open session.

When the Board convened, the following members were present: President Livingston, General Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell. Mr. McLaughlin took his place with the Board early in the forenoon. On invitation of the Board, Mrs.

Doris S. Holt, Trustee-elect, was present during the day.

President Stoddard was present; also Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, Mr. Ernest L. Stouffer, Architect, Mr. Howard A. Hazleton, Business Manager of the Chicago Colleges, and Mr. Norval D. Hodges, Assistant Legal Counsel. Professor Phillips Bradley, Director of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations, was present during part of the day.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of December 28, 1046

On motion of Mr. Davis, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 191 to 214 above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in executive session the items on the agenda and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR PURCHASE OF CLARK PROPERTY

(1) On June 30, 1945 (Minutes, page 506), the Board of Trustees approved the purchase of the so-called Clark property in Urbana adjoining the property at the corner of Goodwin and Green Streets (Fay property) acquired for the apartment building project. At that time it was expected that the property could be secured for \$25,000, and an appropriation providing this amount was made. There was an appropriation of \$60,000 for the Fay property but only \$55,095 was required.

A further resolution indicating the necessity of this purchase was approved by the Board on August 29, 1945 (Minutes, page 633), this resolution being necessary to enable the Conservator for the owner of the Clark property to

apply for a permit to sell.

The court has made an independent survey of the value of this property, as a result of which it appears that the cost will be between \$35,000 and \$40,000. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller feel that this addition is necessary to provide the minimum amount of ground necessary for the apartment project and request an additional appropriation of \$10,000, or so much thereof as may prove to be necessary, which, together with the unused balance from the Fay property, should be sufficient to cover the outside possible cost of the Clark property.

I concur and recommend such an appropriation from the General Reserve

Fund.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for consideration and recommendation to the Board.

PURCHASE OF KNIPP PROPERTY

(2) A recommendation from the Faculty Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures that the residence of Professor C. T. Knipp at 1003 West Nevada Street, Urbana, be purchased, and that an appropriation of \$20,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be made for the purchase and remodeling of this property.

This property is in the range of development of future women's residence halls, being two properties removed from our present holdings and immediately adjoining the forestry on the north. The original price asked was \$22,000, but a tentative offer of \$19,000 was made by University representatives, which offer the owners have indicated they would accept. The price is reasonable as compared with other purchases made by the University.

It is proposed to use this property for the remainder of 1947 and to September, 1948, for faculty housing. At that time it will be assigned to the Bureau of Educational Research, since by that time the Bureau must be found a new location to replace its present location in Gregory Hall which will be required for other purposes.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for consideration and recommendation to the Board (see page 219 below).

SALE OF LAND IN ROSELAWN CEMETERY

(3) The Board of Trustees has approved disposing of the University's holdings in Roselawn Cemetery at a price sufficient to recover the University's investment and expenses incurred in holding the property, and has referred the matter to the Finance Committee, which reports as follows:

The Board of Trustees has referred to the Finance Committee for recommendation the problem of disposing of land owned by the University in Roselawn Cemetery near Champaign. The Board had previously indicated that the University should "recover its present investment and expenses incurred in

holding this property" (Minutes, February 24, 1945, page 364).

Since that time continued efforts have been made by University officers to secure an offer which would accomplish this result. This has not been found possible. The best offer received is from Russell L. Earl of Champaign to buy all land owned by the University in the Cemetery, consisting of 789 quarter lots, 230 single lots, and a small, unplatted area in the northwest corner for a purchase price of \$14,000, payable, cash on execution of contract, \$5,000, balance within three years with 3% interest on the unpaid balance, a contract to be drawn mutually satisfactory to the University and the purchaser.

On this basis, the University would not realize its complete investment expenses by \$2,204.15. However, it has not been necessary to expend any part of the appropriation of \$2,220 made by the Board for improvement of the Cemetery

in May, 1945; consequently, that expense has been saved.

The Legal Counsel has advised that it is not possible for the University to attempt to recover any land, in which interments have been made or use any vacant lots now or formerly owned by the University, for building purposes. For that reason, it seems highly desirable to dispose of the University's holdings at the earliest possible date.

The Finance Committee recommends that the offer of Russell L. Earl for the purchase of this land be accepted and the officers of the Board authorized to

conclude a contract and execute all necessary documents.

FRANK H. McKelvey, Acting Chairman CHESTER R. DAVIS K. E. WILLIAMSON

The President recommended that this offer be accepted.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this sale was authorized as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson.

LEASE OF NAVY PIER AND PURCHASE OF NAVY EQUIPMENT

(4) Officers of the University have been negotiating a lease with officials of the City of Chicago for a portion of Navy Pier for use by the Chicago Undergraduate Division. They have also been discussing with them and with officials of the Navy Department a basis for purchase of certain equipment left on the Pier by the Navy, which the University needs. Complete agreement has now been reached by representatives of all parties, the principal conditions of which are:

by representatives of all parties, the principal conditions of which are:

1. The lease of approximately 373,350 square feet of space at a rental of \$115,000 for the 11 months ending June 30, 1947, and \$117,000 a year thereafter, from August 1, 1946, to June 30, 1951, with renewal privilege for three ad-

ditional years.

2. The University is to pay for electricity, gas, water, and heat.

3. The University is to pay \$1,120 a year in lieu of insurance, and to provide

public liability insurance protection to the City.

4. The University is to pay the cost of restoration of the Pier to the condition when Navy took possession, which is estimated at \$200,000, the sum of \$100,000, to be deposited in escrow with the First National Bank of Chicago on the signing of the lease, and an additional \$100,000 on or before August 1, 1947.

5. All equipment left on the Pier by the Navy Department to be sold by the City to the University for the sum of \$85,000, with the provision that the University may sell surplus equipment and credit proceeds against this payment to an amount not in excess of \$22,000, any realization in excess of this amount to be paid to the City. The University will use at least seventy-five per cent of this property.

I recommend that this lease and purchase be approved, that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the lease when approved by the Legal Counsel, and that the Comptroller be authorized to conclude the

purchase of equipment from the Navy as described, with the understanding that immediate sale of equipment not wanted for educational purposes be made.

During the presentation of this item, Mr. McLaughlin took his place with the Board.

Mr. Morey, Mr. Britton, and Mr. Hodges commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the lease was approved and authority was given as recommended.

ARCHITECTURAL AND ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR APARTMENT BUILDING

(5) On June 30, 1945, the Board of Trustees authorized the employment of architectural and engineering firms for designing and planning buildings and other permanent improvements in the University's building program for 1945-1947. This authorization included employment of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill, Chicago, as architects for an apartment building for married students. A contract for professional services was executed as of August 6, 1945.

Subsequently the University's housing plans changed. The sudden termination of World War II necessitated providing quickly a great deal of housing for both married and unmarried veterans. Available funds were used for installation of temporary housing secured through the Federal Public Housing Authority. Work on the plans for the permanent apartment building project was suspended after Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill had already done some preliminary work for which the firm has been paid \$1,604.84.

Recently the apartment building project has become again active due to the interest of lending agencies in financing it. Therefore, the contract with Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill, which had been suspended, has been reactivated.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the continuation of these services was approved.

INSTALLATION OF PRESIDENT

(6) A request that the Board of Trustees authorize ceremonies for the installation of the President of the University, and appropriate funds to cover the cost of the same.

A two-day affair would be in order, with one day devoted to ceremonies in Chicago in which the Chicago Professional Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, and Pharmacy and the Undergraduate Division at Navy Pier would participate, and the other the formal inaugural on the following day at Urbana-Champaign. On both occasions it would be appropriate to have addresses by distinguished educators, scientists, and public officials. It is difficult to make an accurate estimate of the cost, but an appropriation of \$10,000 is suggested.

It is proposed also to have a meeting of the Citizens Advisory Committee on the day following the installation, to sum up, in terms of interest of the entire state, the significance of the ceremonies.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR INSTITUTE OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

(7) The faculty council and advisory committee on the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations recommends the appointment of an advisory committee of five representatives each from labor, management, and the public. I have asked Dr. Phillips Bradley to present this matter to the Board.

Dr. Bradley presented the names of the proposed members, and explained the method of selection.

After discussion, President Stoddard suggested that Dr. Bradley, in conference with the faculty council, revise the list so that it does not contain more than one person from any company or city (except Chicago), and to recommend varying terms for the first appointees, looking toward a regular term of three years, with one member from each group appointed each year, with alphabetical rotation within each of the groups.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the President of the University was requested to submit the revised personnel of this committee to the Executive Committee for approval.

PURCHASE OF KNIPP PROPERTY

At this point, Mr. McKelvey reported that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds approved the purchase of the Knipp property as recommended (see page 216 above).

CONDEMNATION OF LAND

Professor Britton reported that in the trial of the suit for condemnation of land in Urbana to be used as a site for the Chemical Engineering Building, the jury had returned a verdict placing valuations on the property at 606 South Mathews Avenue at \$45,000 and on that at 1201-1203 West California Avenue at \$42,750, a total of \$87,750.

After discussion, on motion of Mr. Fornot, the Executive Committee was authorized to take all necessary and advisable action in this matter pending the next meeting of the Board.

OPEN SESSION

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board continued, in open session, its consideration of matters presented by the President of the University.

ARCHITECTS FOR BUILDING PROGRAM FOR CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(1) The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends that contracts be made with the following architectural firms:

1. Shaw, Naess, and Murphy, Chicago.—Preparation of building studies and detailed working drawings to the extent funds will permit for the student residence bells for the College of Medicine Dentity and Pharmacy.

dence halls for the Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, and Pharmacy.

This is an outstanding architectural firm in Chicago and has been selected because of its accomplishments in the housing field. This firm has furnished satisfactory services on the new women's residence hall now under construction at Urbana, and its architects are therefore familiar with the University's policies and standards. This will expedite their work.

2. Schweikher and Elting, Melrose Park.—Preparation of plans and specifications on the Experimental Research Building for the Drug Plant Experimental Station near the Morton Arboretum in DuPage County.

This firm has achieved a national reputation in the field of functional archi-

tectural design. The amount of land available for this project, the open and rolling character of the country, and the relation of building requirements to farming and other out-of-door activities point to the desirability of such style of architecture. This firm is located not far from the Drug Plant Experimental Station site. This will make it possible for them to give the project full attention during the construction stages.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these contracts were authorized as recommended.

BUDGET FOR UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION AT GALESBURG, FISCAL YEAR 1946-1947

(2) The internal budget for the new Undergraduate Division of the University at Galesburg for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1946, and covering appointments for the academic year 1946-1947, is submitted herewith. The budget has been compiled by the Dean, with the assistance of the Business Manager of the Galesburg Division, on estimates supplied by the various educational officers and the general University offices represented there. REAPPROPRIATION OF BIENNIAL CAPITAL APPROPRIATIONS

(13) Of the total of \$16,809,000 of capital appropriations approved by the General Assembly in 1945, the sum of \$916,606.31 was actually expended as of December

31, 1946. A further sum of \$1,662,891.04 was encumbered. Releases by the Gov-

ernor to that date total \$7,817,077.

Present conditions make it impossible to expend these funds for the projects for which they were appropriated prior to September 30, 1947, when the unexpended balances will lapse unless reappropriated. With the exception of the appropriation of \$38,000 for the telephone extension service, which will be expended in full by the end of the present biennium, and the appropriation of \$140,000 for the purchase of student housing, which will not be used, all of the appropriations are needed for their original purposes and should be kept available.

Bids have recently been taken on some of the projects and bids will be taken within the next few months on others, but few if any can be completed and paid for by September 30, 1947. It is necessary that the funds be reappropriated before the contracts are executed. Hence, it is recommended that the Board authorize a request to the present General Assembly for the reappropriation of balances existing on June 30, 1947, in the several projects remaining uncompleted at that time. The estimated maximum total of reappropriation which may be required is \$15,626,500 (see Schedule A, page 226).

The rate of progress on the various construction projects during the coming biennium will be determined by the amount of labor and material available and the delivery dates on material required. Under present conditions if all projects are initiated at approximately the same time all will proceed at a very slow rate. Certain projects must be completed by September, 1948, if the University is to meets its commitments to maintain the present student enrollment.

In view of these facts, it is necessary to establish a priority with respect to the schedule of construction of all University projects, both those included in present appropriations and those being requested for the coming biennium. I have conferred with the University officers concerned and submit a schedule of priorities which I recommend be adopted (see Schedule B, page 227).

It is noted that all projects are classified under three headings:

AAA—Construction to begin as soon as possible with the expectation that they will be ready for use in the fall of 1948 or earlier.

AA — Construction to begin only as soon as such construction will not interfere

with progress of AAA projects.

A — Construction to begin to the extent that funds become available and at such time as they will not interfere with the progress of either AAA or AA projects. It is doubtful that any of these A projects can be completed during the coming biennium.

The necessity of such priority of construction applies only to Urbana-Champaign. Conditions in Chicago do not require such classification, and all construction projects there may proceed as rapidly as plans are completed and funds made available.

It is understood that architectural and engineering work will proceed on all projects as rapidly as possible, but bids will not be taken until construction

conditions permit.

The completion date of all projects will be determined primarily on the availability of brick masons and the delivery of structural steel. Accordingly, it is recommended that orders for steel on AAA projects be placed as rapidly as

possible, in advance of the taking of bids for construction of the buildings.

With respect to any contracts and orders executed, it should be recognized that the same situation will exist as was faced with the women's residence hall, namely, that construction may have to be started before sufficient funds are made

available to complete the project.

In order to complete AAA projects in the time indicated, all other local competition must be eliminated in so far as possible. Accordingly, it is recommended that the Natural Resources Board be requested to defer construction of the three buildings for which funds have been appropriated to them, for approximately one year, in consideration of the University's critical needs for completing certain classroom buildings to provide for instruction of veteran students.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these recommendations were approved and adopted, and priorities were established as recommended.

CONTRACTS FOR UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

(14) Bids were received in the office of Sargent and Lundy on January 13, 1947, for the construction of additions to the Utilities Distribution System at Urbana, for which an appropriation of \$791,000 was made for the current biennium.

It is recommended that contracts be awarded as follows:

1. Piping in steam distribution tunnels, to William A. Pope Company, Chicago, the only bidder, \$94,038, with escalation clause for maximum increase of 18% over current labor and material prices.

2. Insulation for piping in tunnels, Asbestos and Magnesia Materials Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, \$52,362 (firm bid).

3. Electrical distribution system, A. S. Schulman Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, \$133,850, with escalation clause to a maximum of 16.4%.

4. Construction of tunnels and conduits, Warner Construction Company, Chicago, \$354,511. This concern is considered to be the lowest responsible bidder

on the complete program.

The total of these contracts, \$634,761, is within the appropriation for the Utilities Distribution System. The requests for capital appropriations for 1947-1949 include a provision for additional funds for extension of the Utilities Distribution System sufficient to cover the total cost of this project plus additional

services to buildings contemplated in the 1947-1949 building program. Extension of the Utilities Distribution System is necessary to service adequately existing buildings as well as new buildings to be constructed in various

campus areas.

Mr. Stouffer discussed this item and Item 15 together.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these contracts were awarded as recommended.

CONTRACTS FOR ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(15) Bids were received on January 21 for construction contracts and for structural steel for the Electrical Engineering Laboratory, for which a State appropriation of \$875,000 is available during the current biennium. A schedule of the bids and a report from the Director of the Physical Plant Department are submitted herewith.

The present estimate of the total cost of this project is \$1,615,775. The Board of Trustees has authorized a request for an additional appropriation of \$5,100,000 to supplement funds appropriated for the current biennium to cover the increased cost of building construction, which includes an allocation of \$325,000 for the Electrical Engineering Laboratory.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends the award of contracts, to the lowest bidder in each case, within the total of the present available funds and after allowing for the cost of architectural and engineering services, as follows:

1. John Felmley, Bloomington, Illinois, construction and structural steel, \$401,000, with the provision that an addition to the contract of \$347,600 may be

made at any time prior to August 1, 1947.

2. Carson-Payson Company, Danville, Illinois, heating and ventilating, \$106,-000, with provision for an increase in the total contract up to \$176,954. This includes a fixed fee of \$19,661.

3. Leverenz Electric Company, Danville, Illinois, electrical wiring, \$67,000, with a provision for an increase in the total contract up to \$111,869.

4. W. T. Mahoney and Sons Company, Chicago, Illinois, plumbing, \$33,000, with provision for an increase in the total contract up to \$54,400, and with an escalation clause allowing for adjustments to cover increases in costs of labor and material.

These contracts will enable the University to proceed with the project within present financial limitations, and will also permit increasing the contracts on the basis of the bids received if additional funds for this project are made available for the biennium beginning July 1, 1947.

I request approval of these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were approved.

AUTHORITY TO CONFER DEGREES

Explanatory Notes

Appropriations for Salaries are available for the term indicated in each case but not for more than one year from September 1, 1946.

When appointments are made at salary rates less than the amounts provided

which appointments are made at sataly lates less than the amounts provided in the budget, the unused balance lapses at that time.

Funds appropriated for positions in the salary budget which are not yet filled may, pending regular appointments, be drawn against by voucher to the Business Office for services of employees temporarily engaged to do the work contemplated by the position. Such temporary charges may not exceed the

amount of time provided by the position unless indicated herein or otherwise approved by the President.

All unexpended balances remaining in the salary budget lapse at the close

of each calendar month unless previously assigned or encumbered.

Departmental appropriations are made under the captions "Salaries," "Wages," and "Expense and Equipment." No transfers may be made between "Salaries" and other captions except with the approval of the President of the University Requests for each other transfers. University. Requests for such changes should be submitted to the Comptroller. Adjustments may be made between "Wages" and "Expense and Equipment"

upon written request to the Comptroller.

Appropriations for Expense and Equipment, Wages, and Nonrecurring items are available for one year beginning July 1, 1046, and ending June 30, 1947. All unexpended balances in Wages appropriations lapse June 30, 1947, and unencumbered balances in Expense and Equipment appropriations lapse on that date. Allowable encumbrances for which funds will be carried forward on June 30, 1947, are only those for the purchase of equipment and other capital items.

All new positions classified as permanent and continuous should be included in the salary budget and must not be charged to any wages appropriation except in those departments submitting supplemental budgets detailing such wage

appropriations.

Unless otherwise indicated in the Budget:

I. The service required under appointments in this budget to positions on the teaching faculty covers the academic year of the University, not including the Summer Semester. Salaries of such positions of the rank of Assistant Professor and above are paid in twelve equal monthly installments; salaries of other ranks, in nine equal monthly installments.

2. The service required in administrative, clerical, and service positions is for a full year of twelve months, with allowance for vacations, and salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments. All such positions in the academic budget are indicated by the letter "Y" following the tenure symbol.

A — Indefinite tenure. D — One year from September 1, 1946.

F — Nine months from October 1, 1946. G — Special tenure.

Housing:

In a number of instances, as a practical and emergency arrangement, housing facilities are being temporarily furnished to staff members without charge, for the convenience of the University. As rapidly as possible, the arrangements are being revised, and final determination as to each case is being concluded.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

February 27, 1947



The February meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Thursday, February 27, 1947, at the Blackstone Hotel, Chicago, according to the following schedule:

12:30 p.m. — Open session.

Ivy, Vice-President, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, and Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel.

The Board recessed.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

FEBRUARY 27, 1947

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met on Thursday, February 27, 1947, at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, during the recess of the meeting of the Board on the same day. Mr. Park Livingston, Chairman, and Dr. Karl A. Meyer, member of the Executive Committee, were present; also the members and officers of the Board and the officials of the University enumerated above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

CHANGES IN ACADEMIC RANKS OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION STAFF

(1) At the request of Professor Seward C. Staley, Director of the School of Physical Education, I recommend the following promotions in academic ranks of members of the staff of the Athletic Association who are also members of the University faculty, effective September 1, 1947:

DOUGLAS R. MILLS, Director of Intercollegiate Athletics, Head Basketball Coach, and Assistant Professor of Physical Education, to the rank of Professor

on indefinite tenure.

RAYMOND ELIOT, Head Football Coach and Assistant Professor of Physical

Education, to the rank of Associate Professor on indefinite tenure.

WALTER H. ROETTGER, Head Baseball Coach, Assistant Basketball Coach, and Assistant Professor of Physical Education, to the rank of Associate Professor on indefinite tenure.

Burton A. Ingwersen, Assistant Football Coach and Instructor in Physical Education, to the rank of Associate Professor on indefinite tenure.

Leo T. Johnson, Head Track Coach, Assistant Football Coach, and Associate in Physical Education, to the rank of Assistant Professor for two years from

September 1, 1947.

The University of Illinois Statutes provide that an appointment as professor or as associate professor shall be for an indefinite term; provided, however, that when a person's first appointment in this University is to a professorship, or an associate professorship, such appointment may be for any limited term, but a reappointment following shall be for an indefinite term. Appointments below the rank of associate professor shall be made for a definite term. It is customary to make appointments to the rank of assistant professor for one or two years to coincide with the fiscal biennia.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these appointments were approved as recommended.

ADJUSTMENTS IN SALARIES OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION STAFF

(2) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has authorized the following new schedule of salaries for members of the Athletic Association staff effective March 1, 1947, subject to approval by the Board of Trustees:

In the cases of joint appointments, that is, of staff members whose salaries are paid partly by the Athletic Association, the Board of Directors has also voted the assumption of whatever amounts are necessary to provide in full the increases recommended above. In other words, the Association assumes all the increases to be given until such time as the University makes changes in the salaries of staff members holding joint appointments.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these salaries were approved as recommended.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

(3) At the meeting of the Board of Trustees on December 28, 1946, the Legal Counsel raised the question whether the Board of Trustees, in acting on Civil Service matters, should not sit as a Civil Service Commission and have minutes of such meetings separately recorded. The Board directed that this be referred to the President of the University for consideration with the Legal Counsel and for report to the Board.

This question has been studied by the Legal Counsel, the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, and several other University officers. Memoranda from the Legal Counsel and the Director of Nonacademic Personnel are submitted

herewith.

Having considered their report, I recommend:

I. That the minutes of actions of the Board of Trustees on Civil Service matters be published from time to time separately from other minutes of the Board of Trustees and that copies be supplied for distribution to persons who have legitimate reason for receiving them.

have legitimate reason for receiving them.

2. That following any meeting of the Board of Trustees at which action on Civil Service matters has been taken, the Secretary of the Board shall supply a report of such action for the information of persons who have a legitimate

interest therein.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

REPORTS OF PATENTABLE DISCOVERIES

- (4) The Faculty Committee on Patents submits the following report and recommendations relating to patentable discoveries made by members of the staff:
- I. A chemical process for making a culture medium used in growing a fungus from which streptomycin is made. This is a discovery by Professor H. H. Thornberry of the Department of Horticulture as a result of research work by himself and Professor H. W. Anderson on a project sponsored and financed by Eli Lilly and Company, Parke, Davis, and Company, the Upjohn Company, and the Abbott Laboratories. The sponsors have expressed a desire to have this discovery patented by the University and a willingness to pay the cost of securing patents in the United States and in certain foreign countries, in return for which the sponsors shall be given the use of the patent under a non-exclusive license. Such an arrangement is specifically permitted in the policy and regulations of the Board of Trustees relating to research sponsored by outside agencies. The Committee recommends that applications for patents be filed and that the officers of the Board of Trustees be authorized to sign all necessary documents relating thereto.

2. Certain antimalarial compounds by Mr. Peter Kovacic, employed in the Department of Chemistry on research work under a restricted contract (No. OEMcmr-321) with the Office of Scientific Research and Development of the United States Government. Under this contract the Government has the right

to determine whether or not a patent application shall be filed and to determine the disposition of the title to and the rights under any application or patent that may result. The Government has asked for an assignment by the discoverer of his rights in the discovery. The Committee recommends that the discoverer be authorized to execute such an assignment and that the University release to the United States Government any rights which it may have therein.

3. Methods for the preparation of sulfuryl fluoride, and a practical method for the manufacture of sulfamide, by Dr. Mark M. Woyski, Instructor in Chemistry. The Head of the Department of Chemistry is of the opinion that these methods are of scientific interest only and he doubts the practicability of these operations in any commercial processes. The Committee recommends that this discovery be released to the discoverer.

I concur in the recommendations of the Committee.

Professor Britton presented this matter.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

AUTHORIZATION OF HONORARY DEGREES

(5) The University Senate has selected the following Committee on Honorary Degrees:

Professor ROGER ADAMS, Head of the Department of Chemistry, Chairman¹

Professor H. M. Gray, Department of Economics, and Associate Dean of the Graduate School

Professor WILLIAM E. CARROLL, Department of Animal Husbandry, and Associate Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station

Professor Henning Larsen, Head of the Department of English

Professor William L. Everitt, Head of the Department of Electrical Engineering

Dr. Eric Oldberg, Professor and Head of the Department of Neurology and

Neurological Surgery

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the award of not to exceed eight honorary degrees to be conferred at the time of the installation of the President of the University, May 16, 1947, on the nomination of this Committee and the recommendation of the President of the University, and with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees if it becomes necessary to act between meetings of the full Board.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this authority was granted as recommended.

PURCHASE OF CLARK PROPERTY

(6) The recommendation for an additional appropriation of \$10,000 to cover the outside possible cost of the purchase of the Clark property was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for appraisal and recommendation to the Board (Minutes, January 25, 1947, page 216).

Mr. McKelvey commented on this matter and recommended that the appropriation be made.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this purchase was authorized, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; absent, Mr. Davis.

APPROPRIATION TO ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

(7) The University of Illinois Alumni Association requested an appropriation of \$48,773 from University funds for operating expenses during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1946, of which amount \$39,553 was appropriated. The officers of the Association have requested that because of the great increase in the cost of maintaining the Alumni Records the original request for an appropriation of \$48,773 be reconsidered.

I recommend that a supplementary appropriation of \$9,220 be made to the Alumni Records Office for the balance of the current fiscal year.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appropriation was made as recom-

mended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Meyer; absent, Mr. Davis.

SECOND SESSION, FEBRUARY 27, 1947

When the Board convened following the recess on February 27, 1947, the same members and officers were present as during the first session; also General Davis.

PURCHASE OF MILLIGAN PROPERTY

At this point the Board took up consideration of the acquisition of the Milligan properties at 606 South Mathews Avenue and 1201 to 1203 West California Avenue, in Urbana.

President Stoddard expressed the opinion that since prices had been established for these properties by due process of law in condemnation proceedings in circuit court, the Board of Trustees is now justified in purchasing the properties at the prices so fixed as a part of the site for the Chemical Engineering and Chemistry Buildings so that construction of these essential buildings will not be unduly delayed.

Mr. McKelvey, Chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, also expressed the opinion that the property should be purchased at the prices fixed by the jury.

The Comptroller stated that there were sufficient funds in the appro-

priation for the purchase of land to meet this expenditure.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this purchase was authorized as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Grigsby, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Fornof, Mr. Green, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matter presented by the President of the University.

PURCHASE OF TEXACO PROPERTY

(1) The Director of the Physical Plant Department requests authority to offer the Texas Company \$40,000 for the property at the northeast corner of Green Street and Mathews Avenue, in Urbana, with the understanding that if this offer is not acceptable to the Texas Company, he may negotiate on their continued use of the site for a period not to exceed five years.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, authority was given to Director Havens to proceed as recommended.

OPEN SESSION

The Board, at 12:30 p.m., declared that the meeting was open to the public.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of January 25, 1947.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 215 to 252 above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

BEQUEST OF JOHN A. FAIRLIE

(1) The late Dr. John A. Fairlie, Professor of Political Science, *Emeritus*, who died on January 23, 1947, included the following bequest in his will:

ARTICLE FIVE

I give and bequeath unto the University of Illinois, a public corporation of the State of Illinois, with its principal offices in the city of Urbana, Champaign County, Illinois, the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars, the income from which shall be used under such rules and regulations as may be determined and promulgated by the said University of Illinois for the maintenance of a graduate fellowship in political science at said University of Illinois.

Professor Fairlie was one of the distinguished members of the University of Illinois faculty. His active service covered a period of 32 years from 1000 when he joined the faculty until 1041 when he retired. Many alumni of the University who had the privilege of studying under Doctor Fairlie will long remember him as a great teacher and scholar. I am sure we are all deeply grateful for his generous gift which will be instrumental in stimulating and rewarding scholarship in a very important field.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this bequest was accepted, for the purposes stated by the donor.

SUPPLEMENTARY EMERGENCY STATE APPROPRIATIONS FOR 1945-1947

(2) The 65th General Assembly has passed and it is expected that the Governor shortly will approve Senate Bill 17 making supplementary emergency appropriations to the University for the current biennium totaling \$9,903,146, of which \$5,933,996 will come from State tax funds and \$3,969,150 from University income.

Of the above items, the entire amount has been appropriated by the Board, or is related to self-supporting auxiliary activities, except the last item of \$1,500,000. This is an additional appropriation from tax funds not yet appropriated by the Board or committed in any manner. It is based on the action of the Board of Trustees, March 9, 1946 (Minutes, page 1028), to be used for the following purposes:

⁽c) Supplies, equipment, operation, maintenance, and replacement..... 575 000

The first item is required to provide for services through the second se-

mester of 1946-1947 of new staff members who were employed for the first semester, and for other necessary staff additions.

The last item of \$575,000 will be needed for emergency adjustments in regular departmental expense and equipment budgets for the remainder of the current year, and for nonrecurring items.

It is proposed to allocate the fund for salary adjustments to the various departments on the basis of the principles to be established by the President on the recommendation of the University Council.

I recommend that:

1. The appropriation of \$1,500,000 be added to the General Reserve Fund of the University.

2. The sum of \$800,000 be appropriated for salary adjustments of academic and nonacademic staffs in the Urbana-Champaign divisions and the Chicago Professional Colleges.

3. The President be authorized to make emergency adjustments out of the remaining funds for staff additions and departmental expense and equipment for the remainder of the year, all such adjustments to be reported to the Board.

Recommendations for nonrecurring appropriations from remaining funds

will be submitted to the Board for consideration from time to time.

STAFF HOUSING PROJECT

(3) On May 29, 1946 (Minutes, pages 1113-1115), the Board approved a plan for the purchase of lots in residential areas in Urbana and Champaign and of 50 prefabricated houses to be constructed on these lots for rental or sale to University staff members. This project is being financed jointly by the University and the University of Illinois Foundation. The Board of Trustees appropriated \$176,000, and the Foundation has secured a mortgage loan of an equal amount. With this sum it was possible to finance only 44 houses.

The University has an opportunity to purchase an additional house of this type, located at 503 South Garfield, Champaign, which was constructed by a private owner for his use but who is now leaving the University. He is willing to sell the house for what it and the lot cost him—\$8,500. There may be some additional cost to the University in securing the transfer of title. An option which expires February 28 was secured on this house to control it for University in the control of the the

versity staff use.

I recommend that the Board authorize the purchase of this house as a part of the staff housing project and that an additional appropriation of \$8,600, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be made for this particular acquisition.

SUPPLEMENTARY STAFF HOUSING PROJECT

(4) In spite of all efforts made by the University, the staff housing situation in the Urbana-Champaign departments remains acute. Heads of educational divisions indicate that the housing shortage presents one of the most serious obstacles to securing needed additions to the staff. The situation will be aggravated next year if the staff additions provided for in the biennial budget are realized.

The Provost has recommended that the University extend its staff housing program by the erection of an additional group of houses similar to the project approved by the Board on May 29, 1946 (Minutes, page 1113), and now nearing completion. At my request, the problem has been reviewed by the Comptroller, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Provost, who jointly recommend that a new project of 25 prefabricated houses be authorized. This project is to be financed in part by a special State appropriation and in part by a self-

liquidating loan. The amount which can be amortized will be about one-third of

the total.

Among the Federal housing units supplied to the University are 331 family units available for assignment to staff members if so needed. These units are now subject to (a) limitation by the government to veteran use, and (b) limitation to student use because the University funds used for their construction came entirely from a student residence hall appropriation. University officers have applied to the government for a relaxation of the ruling which permits only veterans to use these houses. (Such a relaxation has been secured for the Galesburg division.) It is now proposed that the special State appropriation be applied in part toward the Federal units to compensate for the use of a portion of them by members of the staff.

It is also proposed to incorporate the additional \$250,000 with the request

for a State appropriation of \$2,200,000 for housing.

I recommend that the Board authorize an additional staff housing project to acquire 25 units according to the following plan:

to acquire 25 units according to the following plan:

1. Total estimated cost, \$238,450, including sites, buildings, and other necessary construction work.

2. Estimated net annual income available for debt service, \$8,236.

3. Estimated amount which can be borrowed and amortized on income, \$70,700.

4. A request to the General Assembly for an appropriation of \$250,000 for staff housing to be used in part for completion of the new project and in part for expenditures on Federal housing units that may be used for staff members, the understanding being that the present State appropriation of \$140,000 made for the purchase of student housing be allowed to lapse.

5. A request to the University of Illinois Foundation to cooperate in secur-

ing the needed loan for this project.

On motion of Dr. Luken, authority was granted as recommended.

APPROPRIATION FOR AUTOBIOGRAPHY OF DAVID KINLEY

(10) The University has a policy, established several years ago, of publishing biographies of former presidents. In 1923 it published "Selim Hobart Peabody, a Biography" by Mrs. Katherine Peabody Girling, his daughter, and in 1934, "The Life and Work of Andrew Sloan Draper" by Harlan Hoyt Horner. A biography of the first President, John Milton Gregory, by his daughter, was written and published elsewhere during the 1920 decade.

The Director of the University Press has the manuscript for the "Autobiography of David Kinley." He requests authority to publish it and an appropriation of not to exceed \$5,000 for that purpose.

APPROPRIATION FOR BAND UNIFORMS

(11) In previous years members of the University of Illinois Bands were required to purchase uniforms. Students in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps are furnished Army uniforms by the War Department, but the War Department does not furnish Band uniforms. Students in the Bands receive credit for military training during their first two years and for this they are required to drill regularly and to perform at military ceremonies. In addition, Bands perform at numerous University functions each year for which the members receive no compensation. It does not seem to me, therefore, that they should be expected or required to buy their own uniforms. In previous years this was not a large item of personal expense, but now many students can not afford to buy uniforms.

I therefore recommend that the Board of Trustees make an initial appropriation of \$6,500, or so much thereof as may be necessary, toward the purchase of 200 Band uniforms and for the rehabilitation and replacement of overcoats and capes which were purchased over twenty years ago from funds contributed by alumni. It is estimated that the total cost will be \$13,000. The Athletic Association will contribute approximately one-half of the total funds required, from profits accruing to it from the football game in the Pasadena Rose Bowl on January 1, 1047.

Time is an important factor in the acquisition of these uniforms. Shortage of fabrics suitable for Band uniforms is also a factor. It is therefore recommended that this be considered a unique purchase and that the Board authorize a contract with DeMoulin Brothers Company, Greenville, Illinois, for the manufacture of uniforms. This company has supplied uniforms to Band members satisfactorily for a period of many years at prices as low as could be obtained anywhere, quality and service considered. It is believed that this manufacturer can best meet all specifications and requirements involved and that purchasing uniforms on the basis of competitive bids under present conditions would not be practicable.

BARNES COLLECTION OF STUFFED ANIMALS

(13) The R. M. Barnes Collection, Lincoln, Illinois, of mounted birds, mammals, reptiles, amphibians, skins of birds, and birds' eggs has been offered to the University of Illinois and the State Museum at Springfield. The estimated value of the specimens and specimen cases to the University is \$6,620. It would be a valuable addition to the Museum of Natural History. The cost of moving the collection to the University and of making space usable for housing and displaying it for study is estimated at \$1,100.

I recommend acceptance of this collection and an appropriation of \$1,100 to

cover the expenses incidental to its acquisition.

BIDS FOR FURNISHING STRUCTURAL AND REINFORCING STEEL FOR CONSTRUCTION OF MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(14) The following bids were received on February 5 for furnishing structural and reinforcing steel for the new Mechanical Engineering Building:

Subsequently, the Bethlehem Steel Company reported that their escalation on the structural steel would not exceed \$1,800, which would limit their maximum bid to \$16,700. Joseph T. Ryerson similarly reported that their escalation clause would be 10%, making their maximum bid \$17,215. On this basis, the bid of the Bethlehem Steel Company is lowest, and the University Architect recommends an immediate award to them on the basis of a base bid of \$14,900 subject to escalation, but not to exceed \$16,700.

The University Architect also recommends that the bid of Joseph T. Ryerson and Son for reinforcing steel be rejected, inasmuch as only one bid was received and it is in excess of previous preliminary estimates. He proposes to include reinforcing steel as a sub-bid in the general contract work for which bids are to be received on February 27.

Fugard, Burt, and Wilkinson, Architects for the Mechanical Engineering Building, concur in the above recommendations and further recommend that the contract for structural steel include a provision that it may be transferred to the successful general work contractor.

The Comptroller recommends approval of these proposals and I concur.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these proposals were approved as recommended.

PURCHASE OF STEEL FOR CONSTRUCTION OF BETATRON

(15) The betatron to be constructed in the new Physics Research Laboratory, which is moving toward completion, will be built under the supervision of members of the research staff of the Physics Department. Steel and other material are needed for this purpose. During 1945-1946, President Willard authorized members of the Physics staff to contact steel mills to determine where suitable steel could be obtained. These persons have conferred with officials of Carnegie Illinois Steel Company, American Rolling Mill Company, Wheeling Steel Company, and Allegheny Ludlum Company. Any order placed will be entered at the current price but will be accepted only with the understanding that billing will be at the price in effect at the time of delivery.

Representatives of the Physics Department recommend that orders be placed with the American Rolling Mill Company of Chicago, Illinois, as follows:

This recommendation is based on the following points:

- 1. No other company is prepared to supply transformer steel of sufficient width.
- 2. No other company can supply steel in lengths greater than 10 or 11 feet, whereas we need sheets of considerably greater length. Armco can supply in continuous coils of greater length.

3. The base price of transformer steel is the same for all companies. The

exact cost depends on extra charges for special widths, coiling, and cutting the edges as straight as possible. These were obtained only from Armco, since they were the only ones prepared to provide the correct widths.

The Purchasing Agent and Comptroller submit this recommendation with their endorsement. I concur and request approval.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this purchase was authorized as recommended.

SUPPLEMENT TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR PHYSICS RESEARCH LABORATORY

(16) On December 11, 1945 (Minutes, page 949), the Board approved a contract for general work on the Physics Research Laboratory with King and Petry, Champaign, on a cost plus fixed fee basis in the estimated amount of \$162,700. This was based upon a fixed fee of \$9,725. Increased material and labor costs require a revision in this estimate resulting in an increase of \$60,100 to date, which includes an increase in the contractor's fee in the amount of \$1,800, making the revised estimated cost of the work \$222,800, including a fixed fee of \$11,525.

This particular contract provides that the fixed fee shall be subject to adjustment if the total cost of the project including the fixed payment varies more than 20 per cent more or less than the original estimated cost. Adjustment of the fixed fee shall be on the basis agreed upon between the contractor and architect in advance and shall apply to only such costs which are more or less than the estimated cost, i.e., plus or minus 20 per cent. No adjustment is to be made if the cost is within the allowable variation. Since the total cost will run more than 20 per cent over the original estimates, an upward adjustment in the fixed fee is in order under the contract provisions.

The University Architect and the Comptroller recommend approval of this change in the estimate and fixed fee of the contract, the latter not being subject to reduction in case of saving under estimated cost.

Approval of the Board is requested.

On motion of Dr. Luken, these adjustments were approved as requested.

CONTINUATION OF OFFER OF FUNDS FROM NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR INFANTILE PARALYSIS

(17) At the meeting on November 22, 1946 (Minutes, page 177), the Board approved an offer of funds in the amount of \$12,945 from the Cook County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Incorporated, for hospital services for a 90-day period. The Foundation has requested a continuation through February 28, 1947, of the agreement entered into, in which the University of Illinois makes available 16 beds in the Research and Educational Hospitals for infantile paralysis cases.

The continuation of this agreement will involve the payment by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to the University of Illinois the additional sum of \$5,796. The Business Manager of the Chicago Colleges recommends that the estimated income of the University be increased by \$5,796 and that temporary

(21) The Comptroller presents his quarterly report to the Board as of December 31, 1946. Copies of this report have been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting.

UTILITY AND FIXED EQUIPMENT CONTRACTS FOR WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL

(22) Bids for utility and fixed equipment contracts for the new Women's Residence Hall were opened February 7. A complete schedule of bids is submitted herewith. The total of lowest bids is \$692,671, but funds are not now available for this amount. It is therefore proposed that contracts be made with lowest bidders for such work as can be completed within present appropriations and by September 30, 1947, with the understanding that when and if additional funds become available prior to August 1, 1947, the contracts will be extended to the full amounts of the bids. If additional funds are not received the contracts will be terminated and the actual amounts of work finished will be paid for as certified by the architects.

These bids decrease the estimated cost of the building from \$3,600,000, as reported to the Board on December 28, 1946 (Minutes, page 195), to \$3,500,000. An additional State appropriation of \$2,200,000 is required, for which a bill is ready for introduction in the General Assembly.

These recommendations are submitted by the University Architect with the concurrence of the consulting architects, Shaw, Naess, and Murphy, and the Comptroller. I recommend approval and authorization to the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute the necessary contracts.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these contracts were authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR SEWER AND WATER SERVICE CONNECTIONS TO TEMPORARY STUDENT HOUSING PROJECT 11306

(23) The Director of the Physical Plant reports that an addition of \$2,053.88 to the contract with Cutler and Price Plumbing and Heating Company for sewer and water service connections to the temporary student housing in the area north and west of the Stadium is necessary because of construction conditions found at the site. Following is a list of the items covered by this increase:

1. Furnishing and installing two six-inch water valves so that Projects

11277 and 11287 can be operated prior to the installation of water mains on

Project 11306.

2. Revising the elevation of the main sewer line in order to give coverage

at the highest point.

3. Relocating the water main at Fourth Street and Peabody Drive in order not to interfere with the installation of the steam tunnel for which a contract was recently awarded.

4. All water to the temporary housing on the west side of the campus is now fed from connections at Oak Street. This supply is inadequate to supply the housing on the drill field and southwest of the Stadium. Accordingly, a new service is to be provided extending across the south end of the drill field to connect to the main University water supply at Fourth Street.

5. FPHA revised the design of the dormitory buildings on the drill field in order to save their cost, reducing the toilet rooms from two to one a building, enlarging the one remaining. This causes changes in the service connections covered by this last item of the change order.

The original contract with this firm is on a cost basis with a guaranteed maximum. This change order will increase the amount of the guaranteed maximum. Payments, however, will be based on actual cost. Sufficient funds are available to take care of this increase.

The Comptroller recommends approval of this proposed increase, and I

concur.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this increase was approved as recommended.

¹ Duparquet, Inc. submitted two bids on kitchen equipment, a firm bid of \$175,825 and a base bid of \$157,033, plus escalation limited to 12 per cent. The maximum escalation would result in a total cost of \$175,877. It is, therefore, recommended that the bid with escalation clause be accepted as the maximum cost would be only \$52 over the firm bid and the escalation is not likely to run as high as 12 per cent.
² Escalation clause provides for a decrease as well as an increase, the maximum possible obligation being \$42,997.20.

APPROPRIATION FOR ERECTION OF TEMPORARY WAREHOUSE THROUGH FEDERAL WORKS AGENCY

(25) In accordance with action of the Board on September 24, 1946 (Minutes, page 47), authorizing the Comptroller to apply for needed additional facilities which might be available through Federal Works Agency, application was made for a temporary warehouse in order to help relieve the critical storage problem of the University and release for other use space in University buildings now used for storage. This request was approved and a temporary building providing space for about 13,000 square feet will be moved to the campus and erected by the Agency. It will be located in the Physical Plant service yard east of Goodwin Avenue, Urbana. The University must meet the expense of clearing the site, grading, drives or walks, heating, and lighting. Heating will be extended only to a portion of the building where material to be stored requires protection from extreme cold.

The preliminary estimate of the Physical Plant Department of the cost of this work, subject to receipt of bids on various items of construction, is \$15,000, which includes a fire alarm system and also necessary engineering and architectural services. The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends an appropriation of this amount at this time so that necessary work can proceed at once. It is understood that the exact amount required may be less than this figure, or that some supplement to the appropriation may later be found necessary, after the exact bids are secured.

I concur and request an appropriation of \$15,000 from the General Reserve Fund for this purpose.

BEQUEST OF MRS. LILLIAN M. LARSON

(27) The will of the late Mrs. Lillian M. Larson, widow of Professor Laurence M. Larson, former Head of the Department of History, includes the following

bequest to the University:

"To the Trustees of the University of Illinois, in trust, the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for the following uses and purposes, to-wit: The principal of said fund shall be kept intact and invested and the income from said fund used to provide a scholarship or scholarships for graduate students attending the University of Illinois and pursuing courses in medieval or English history and majoring in history. It is my hope that such students, with this aid, may carry on in a general way the work pursued by my late husband, Laurence M. Larson, and I establish this trust fund as a memorial for him to be designated as the Laurence M. Larson Scholarship Fund.

... The above gift or trust fund is to have priority and be paid over and

above other gifts herein. . . .

Professor Larson was a distinguished member of the faculty of the University of Illinois. He came to the University in 1907 and served continuously until his retirement in 1937. From 1926 to 1937 he served as Head of the Department of History. He died in 1938. In reporting this bequest, I should like to express for the students, faculty, and, I am sure, the Board of Trustees, our appreciation of this generous gift.

On motion of Mrs. Grigsby, this bequest was accepted and dedicated to the purposes indicated by the donor.

APPRECIATION OF SERVICES OF MRS. GRIGSBY

At this point, Mr. Davis presented the following resolution and moved its adoption.

Whereas, Mrs. Helen M. Grigsby is now completing her third term of service as a Trustee of the University of Illinois; and

Whereas, that service has been marked by a public-spirited and intelligent interest in all the affairs of the University, and particularly in those matters affecting the welfare of the students; and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees considers that Mrs. Grigsby's service has

been a substantial contribution to education in Illinois; therefore

Be it resolved, that the Board of Trustees hereby makes record of its appreciation of the able and gracious services of Mrs. Grigsby, and of its regret at their termination.

This resolution was adopted by unanimous standing vote.

Mrs. Grigsby expressed her appreciation, and spoke on the changes that have occurred in the University since she became a Trustee in 1921.

TUITION FEES

President Livingston stated that it had been suggested in the General Assembly that the Board give consideration to an increase in tuition fees.

President Stoddard reported that on his request the Secretary of the Board had prepared a report on the history of fees in the University, and the Provost had prepared a statement on the policies involved.

The Provost presented a summary of these reports and commented on them.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the President of the University was requested to study this matter and report at the next meeting of the Board.

EXPANSION OF FOOD SERVICE REQUESTED

The Secretary reported that he had received since the January meeting the following communication from Mrs. Frances Snell, a graduate student, together with a petition signed by approximately 1500 students.

problem is the one which we are now looking forward to.

PARTIAL SETTLEMENT OF BEQUEST OF EDWARD C. EARL

Mr. Davis, for the Finance Committee, reported as follows.

Pursuant to authorization of the Board on May 26, 1945 (Minutes, page 485), Comptroller Morey has been serving as executor of the estate of Edward C. Earl. The entire estate was bequeathed to the University of Illinois for an endowment fund for prizes for architectural students.

Final settlement of the estate is not yet possible. The executor desires to make a partial distribution and requests the Board of Trustees to accept the transfer of the following assets of the estate, subject to final approval of his account as executor by the court having jurisdiction:

100 shares Northern Pacific Railroad Company common stock. Market value approximately \$2,100. Present dividend \$1.00 a share.

100 shares Great Northern Railroad Company preferred stock. Estimated value \$4,800. Dividend \$3.00 a share.

300 shares Pennsylvania Railroad common stock. Estimated value \$7,500. Dividend \$1.50 a share.

\$200 par Pennsylvania Railroad 3½% bonds, due April 1, 1952. \$6,000 cash.

Rainier sometimes known as 3729 Wells Avenue, as per plat recorded in Liber JWB 5 at Folio 694, one of the land records of Prince George's County, Maryland and being all of the same property described in a deed from Homer S. Patterson and Ruth W. Patterson, his wife, to Edward C. Earl, dated September 14, 1928 and recorded in Liber 324, Folio 174 of said land records," and

to Joseph E. Bouiguignon and Pearl Bouiguignon, his wife, for a consideration of Five Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty and oo/100 Dollars (\$5,950.00),

Cunningham, the Comptroller and Secretary, respectively, of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, be and the same are hereby authorized and directed to execute and acknowledge a Deed to the property above described and, in accordance

with said Contract, to deliver the same to Mr. Arthur L. Barton with authority to deliver said Deed to the Grantees named therein upon their full compliance with the terms of the Contract and Deed.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

March 27, 1947



The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, on Thursday, March 27, 1947, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session, as in Committee of the Whole.

12:30 p.m. - Open session.

The following members were present: President Livingston, General Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt (present for the first time as a member of the Board), Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

President Stoddard was present; also Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. I. L. Porter, Treasurer, Professor Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and, during part of the day, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENT OF WILLARD B. SPALDING AS PROFESSOR OF EDUCATION AND DEAN OF THE COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

(1) I recommend the appointment of Dr. Willard B. Spalding, now Superintendent of Schools of Portland, Oregon, as Dean of the College of Education and Professor of Education effective June 1, 1947, at an annual salary of \$11,000. The appointment as Professor will be on indefinite tenure. The appointment as Dean will be set up in the budget for 1947-1948 on a two-year tenure in accordance with the statutory provision for the appointment of deans biennially.

The College of Education faculty is unanimous in its support of Doctor

Spalding.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this appointment was made as recommended.

TUITION FEES

(2) The Senate of the 65th General Assembly of Illinois in Senate Resolution No. 15 requested the Board of Trustees "to review carefully the rates of tuition to be charged students at said University, and to consider making such increases therein as will cause a reasonable and equitable portion of the increased cost of operation per student to be shared by the students and to report such action as may be taken pursuant hereto at the earliest possible opportunity."

The Board considered this resolution at its meeting on February 27, 1947. The Provost, who is Chairman of the Committee on Fees and Scholarships, presented a report prepared by the Secretary of the Board of fees in the University and of a study of the fee structure which had been made by the

Committee.

The President of the University was requested to study this matter further

and report at the next meeting of the Board.

In view of all factors involved, the President recommends that no action on tuition fees be taken at this time.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the President of the University was requested to inform the Senate that this matter has been considered and that the Board does not deem it advisable to increase the tuition fees at this time. The President was requested to include in his reply full supporting data.

In accordance with this action, the President of the University sent the following letter to the President of the Senate under date of

March 31, 1947.

Honorable Hugh W. Cross President of the Senate 65th General Assembly Springfield, Illinois DEAR MR. PRESIDENT: March 31, 1947

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois has considered at two separate meetings Senate Resolution No. 15 by Senator Wallace Thompson requesting the Board "to review carefully the rates of tuition to be charged students at said University, and to consider making such increases therein as will cause a reasonable and equitable portion of the increased cost of operation per student to be shared by the students and to report such action as may be taken pursuant hereto at the earliest possible opportunity." The Board has directed me to report the result of its deliberations to the Senate.

On March 27, 1947, the Board of Trustees voted that, in view of all factors

On March 27, 1947, the Board of Trustees voted that, in view of all factors involved, no action changing tuition fees charged at the University of Illinois be taken at this time. The Board based its conclusion on the following consider-

ations:

I. The fees charged in the undergraduate colleges at the University of

Illinois are about the average of fees charged by other state universities.

2. Nearly two-thirds of the students enrolled at the University of Illinois are veterans. The Government pays the University a part of the cost of instruction of these veterans. The annual reimbursement per veteran is more than the tuition fees he would pay. Consequently, an increase in tuition fees would not produce additional income from that source.

3. All students who are residents of Illinois and are veterans, who served in the armed forces during World War II and have been honorably discharged, are entitled by State law to receive military scholarships exempting them from paying tuition fees. They may elect to use these scholarships and defer accepting Federal aid. Over 600 students are now attending the University on military scholarships.

4. There are approximately 900 other students enrolled in the University of Illinois this year who are holders of General Assembly and County scholarships also established by law. There are 150 students attending the University of Illinois

on scholarships established by the Board of Trustees.

5. Altogether there are 1,650 undergraduate students attending the University on scholarships this year, and 13,750 veterans receiving Federal benefits, making a total of 15,400 students who do not pay tuition fees. This represents

approximately two-thirds of the total enrollment.

6. All non-resident students pay a tuition fee double that charged residents of the State. The State of Illinois "exports" twice as many students to statesupported universities elsewhere as it "imports" from other states. Stated otherwise, for every non-resident student at the University of Illinois there are two residents of Illinois attending state universities and colleges in other states.

7. It is clear that the burden of any increase would be carried by a minority

of the students.

8. For students from families in modest circumstances, higher expenses would be a genuine hardship, and not conducive to the equalization of educational opportunity over the State.

The Board of Trustees respectfully requests that this communication be

presented to the Senate and made a part of its record.

RETURN OF SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS TO REPRESENTATIVES OF DONORS

(3) The University has received funds for student aid in the College of Medi-

cine as follows:

1. The Theodore Shnitzer Memorial Scholarship in memory of a former student in the College of Medicine. This is a scholarship of \$100 a year to be assigned to upperclass students in the College of Medicine of the Jewish faith. There is now a balance of \$400 in the fund. (Reported to the Board March 10, 1936, page 567.)

2. The Isador Janowitz Memorial Scholarship. This is a scholarship for fourth-year students of the Jewish faith in the College of Medicine. There is a

balance of \$200 in this fund.

In my judgment it is contrary to sound public policy for the University to accept and administer funds for any purpose under conditions which require

sectarian or religious tests.

I have therefore directed the authorities of the College of Medicine to discontinue awarding these scholarships and to return to the donors or their representatives the balances in these funds. Officials of the College of Medicine are authorized to assist any persons or agencies who may take over the administration of these scholarships by supplying information about scholastic records of candidates, but the University will not officially participate in the selection or the award.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this action was approved and confirmed.

HONORARY DEGREES

(4) The University Senate Committee on Honorary Degrees has nominated to the Board of Trustees candidates for honorary degrees to be conferred at the installation of the President of the University on May 16, 1947.

It is not intended to confer these degrees unless the recipients are present at the installation, nor to announce the names in advance. The list is given to

the Secretary of the Board for record.

On motion of Mr. Davis, honorary degrees were authorized as recommended.

RETIREMENT OF DIRECTOR OF UNIVERSITY PRESS

(5) The Retirement Act provides that persons shall retire on September 1 following their 68th birthday unless they request continuation and that request is approved by the employing institution.

Mr. H. E. Cunningham was continued for two successive years. He occupies a dual position: (1) Secretary of the Board, for which he is elected in March for a term of one year, and (2) Director of the University Press, to which he is appointed for one year as of September 1.

Only in rare instances has the service of persons been continued past the legal retirement age and then only for short periods. Practically all such requests have been denied, since any other procedure would tend to break down the whole retirement plan. With respect to Mr. Cunningham, I am allowing his retirement as Director of the University Press to take effect as of September

I know that Mr. Cunningham would be pleased to continue as Secretary of the Board on a part-time basis. He would be entitled to receive any amount less than his retiring allowance without interfering with his pension. Such action is, of course, a matter for the Board of Trustees; it would not in any way embarrass us as we proceed to find a successor in the University Press.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this arrangement was approved and authorized.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the President of the Board and the President of the University were requested to prepare an expression of the Board's appreciation of the services of Mr. Cunningham as Director of the University Press during the past twenty-nine years, to be inserted in the minutes.

President Stoddard, on April 9, 1947, instructed the Secretary to incorporate the following expression in the minutes:

In re-electing Harrison E. Cunningham as Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois for another year, the Board takes note of the fact that Mr. Cunningham has been serving as its Secretary continuously since 1914, and as Director of the University Press since 1918. In both of these

Members of the Board of Trustees desire to express and record their appreciation of Mr. Cunningham's services and of his personal courtesies to each member, and to wish for him and Mrs. Cunningham many years of happiness

and good health.

PRIORITY OF ADMISSIONS FOR 1947-1948

(6) The Committee to Study the Student Registration System submits herewith certain recommendations to govern the priority of admission of new students for the first semester of 1947-1948 at Urbana.

The Provost presented this matter.

After discussion, action on these recommendations was deferred, pending the receipt of President Stoddard's report and recommendations on an educational system for the State of Illinois.

OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened in open session, on the afternoon of March 27, 1947, the same members and officers of the University were present as during the morning session.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of February 27, 1947.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 253 to 300 above.

MR. PARK LIVINGSTON ELECTED PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin was made chairman of the meeting for the election of a president.

Mr. Fornof nominated Mr. Park Livingston, of Chicago, for the office of President of the Board for the ensuing year.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the nominations were closed, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous vote of the meeting for Mr. Livingston as President. The ballot was cast, and Mr. Livingston was declared elected President of the Board.

Mr. Livingston took the chair and expressed his appreciation of the honor.

MR. HARRISON E. CUNNINGHAM ELECTED SECRETARY

On nomination of Mr. McKelvey and on motion of Mr. Davis, Mr. Harrison E. Cunningham, of Urbana, was elected Secretary of the Board for one year.

PROFESSOR LLOYD MOREY ELECTED COMPTROLLER

On nomination of Mr. Williamson and on motion of Dr. Meyer, Professor Lloyd Morey, of Urbana, was elected Comptroller for one year.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ELECTED

Mr. Fornof nominated Mr. Chester R. Davis, and Mr. Davis nominated Dr. Karl A. Meyer, to serve, with the President of the Board as Chairman, as members of the Executive Committee for the ensuing year.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the nominations were closed, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous vote of the meeting for Mr. Davis and Dr. Meyer as members of the Executive Committee. The ballot was cast, and Mr. Davis and Dr. Meyer were declared elected.

MR. IRVIN L. PORTER ELECTED TREASURER

On motion of Mr. Davis, Mr. Irvin L. Porter, of Chicago, was elected Treasurer for two years, under the same conditions of bond as at present.

TREASURER'S BOND

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the amount of the Treasurer's bond was fixed at \$3,000,000, and the Finance Committee was instructed to see that the Treasurer secure a satisfactory bond, and to report it to the Board for record.

AUTHORITY TO RECEIVE MONEY

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be, and he hereby is, authorized to receive and receipt for all moneys, and to endorse all orders, drafts, and checks due and payable to the Board of Trustees or to the University of Illinois, and especially all drafts drawn by the Treasurer of the United States payable to the Board of Trustees or the University of Illinois.

DELEGATION OF SIGNATURES

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that the President and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois are authorized to delegate the signing of their names as President and Secretary, respectively, to vouchers to be presented to the State Auditor, and to warrants drawn on the Treasurer of the University, under

the following conditions.

The President of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to C. H. Pratt, to L. M. Dahlenburg, and to W. D. Green in Urbana, and to H. A. Hazleton, to J. F. Knight, and to H. J. Kasik in Chicago, authority to sign his name as President of the Board of Trustees to vouchers against the State Auditor; and to C. C. DeLong, to H. F. Thornes, and to R. W. Zimmer in Urbana, and to H. A. Hazleton, to J. F. Knight, and to H. J. Kasik, in Chicago, authority to sign his name to warrants on the University Treasurer covering vouchers approved in accordance with regulations approved by the Board.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to Anna L. Neuber, to Maude Archdeacon, and to Helen L. Smith, all in Urbana, and to G. R. Moon, to Ethel Engeljohn, to Helen Wyle, and to Velma M. Davis, in Chicago, authority to sign his name as Secretary of the Board of Trustees to vouchers against the State Auditor and to warrants on the University Treasurer, covering vouchers approved in accordance with regulations of the Board. And

be it further

Resolved, that the First National Bank of Chicago as a designated depositary of Irvin L. CHANGE IN STATUS OF ROBERT B. BROWNE

(2) I recommend that Dr. Robert B. Browne, Professor of Education, Director of the Summer Session, and Director of University Extension, be appointed Dean of the Summer Session and of University Extension, effective April I, 1947. These changes in administrative titles are recommended because:

I. The Summer Session is an integral term in the University's educational program and the chief administrative officer's duties are comparable with those

of a college dean.

2. The Division of University Extension, established in 1933, extends University educational programs to students away from the campus through correspondence courses, extramural classes, speech aids, visual aids, and to persons in military service through the Armed Forces Institute.

3. The educational programs offered during the Summer Session and through the Division of University Extension are at the college and graduate levels, and these services should have the same administrative status as a college.

4. During the past year we have created deanships at the Navy Pier and at Galesburg — both undergraduate divisions. Doctor Browne has general supervision over about 3,000 University freshmen in twenty-five high schools.

Doctor Browne has been serving as Director of University Extension since this service was organized in 1933 and as Director of the Summer Session

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this appointment was made as recommended.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(3) The by-laws of the University of Illinois Athletic Association provide for the appointment of its Board of Directors by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois at its annual meeting in March of each year. Nominations are made to the Board of Trustees by the President of the University. There are seven members, three selected from the membership of the Alumni Association and four from the faculty of the University.

Professor Sanford will replace Professor R. B. Browne, Director of University Extension, who has served as a member of the Board of Directors since July, 1941. Professor Sanford has been a member of the University faculty since 1930. From 1932 to 1943 he served as Principal of the University High School and for the past three and one-half years he has been Coordinator of Teacher Education.

Mr. Olander will replace Mr. Waldo B. Ames, who also has been a member of the Board of Directors since July, 1941. Mr. Olander is an alumnus of the University of Illinois, Class of 1922. While an undergraduate student he was on the Varsity Football Squad for four seasons and on the Freshman Track Team. He was also a member of the Coaching staff from September, 1924, until February, 1935, when he resigned to accept a position as Personnel Director for the Owens-Illinois Glass Company at Toledo. He is now Director of Industrial Relations of that company. Mr. Olander served for a short period (March 11 to July 15, 1941) on the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association, and it seems appropriate that he be reappointed at this time for a longer period.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these directors were appointed as recommended.

SABBATICAL LEAVES OF ABSENCE

(4) The University Statutes provide that on recommendation of the Head of the Department, the Dean of the College, the President of the University, and with the approval of the Board of Trustees, a member of the faculty of professorial rank who has served at least six years since his original appointment or since termination of his last sabbatical leave may be granted a leave of absence for one year on one-half pay for the purpose of study, research, or other pursuit, the object of which enables him to increase his professional proficiency and usefulness to the University.

In lieu of this privilege, leave may be granted for a half-year for the same purpose, on full pay, provided, that the department in which the applicant is teaching or working undertakes to carry on, so far as practicable, during his absence and without increase in the departmental budget, such of his work as the

interests of the University require to be continued without interruption.

A leave may also be granted for a half-year on one-half pay at the end of three consecutive years of service, provided that the granting of the leave does not involve expense to the University in excess of the portion of salary released.

A member of the faculty to whom a leave has been granted agrees to return to the University on the expiration of his leave and remain in its service for at least one year thereafter, and the University also agrees to retain him in service for at least one year after his return from leave.

During the war years few leaves were granted. In fact, the Board of Trustees voted to suspend the granting of sabbatical leaves for the duration of the war except in very special cases.

Sixteen applications for sabbatical leaves of absence during the academic

year 1947-1948 have been received.

In accordance with long-established practice, the applications were submitted to the University Research Board for its advice to the President. The Research Board reviewed the program of study, research, or travel contemplated in each case, and its value to the University. The Research Board has recommended approval of the following applications for leave:

Although some of the temporary replacements will be difficult, I am informed by the Provost that arrangements can be made in each case. With respect to Professor Perry, it is understood that his leave is contingent on the appointment of a Chairman of the Department of Classics by September 1.

With respect to all these leaves, the University will reserve the right of postponement, without prejudice, if in the judgment of the President and the Dean or Director concerned such postponement is necessary for the welfare of

the University.

I concur and recommend that sabbatical leaves be granted to the thirteen staff members as indicated above.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these leaves were granted as recommended.

DEPARTMENT OF SPEECH

(5) I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the establishment of a new Department of Speech in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences to

which would be transferred the present personnel and instructional programs in speech or public speaking, now a part of the Department of English.

I further recommend that Dr. Karl R. Wallace, now Chairman of the School of Speech and Drama at the University of Virginia, be appointed Professor and Head of the Department of Speech on indefinite tenure beginning

August 1, 1947, at an annual salary of \$8,000.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this department was established and the head was appointed as recommended.

ARCHITECTS FOR NURSES RESIDENCE

(6) The Vice-President of the Chicago Professional Colleges and the Director of the Physical Plant Department recommend employment of the firm of Perkins and Will, 300 West Jackson Boulevard, Chicago, for architectural services for the Nurses Residence in Chicago. I concur in this recommendation.

Director Havens reports that Mr. John C. Goodall, an alumnus of the Uni-

versity of Illinois, Class of 1925, is a member of this firm,

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the employment of this firm was authorized as recommended.

CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE ON ARCHITECTURE

(7) On October 22, 1946, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois authorized the President of the University to appoint a Consultative Committee on Architecture to advise him and other University officials on the construction of new buildings and campus development in general, in view of the extraordinary plans for the expansion of the University's physical plant. The following have been appointed:

HOWARD L. CHENEY, Class of 1912, Architect, 208 South LaSalle Street, Chicago, Illinois.

CHANCE S. HILL, Class of 1914, Landscape Architect, Oak Park, Illinois. GEORGE L. HORNER, Class of 1928, Superintendent, Division of Planning and Construction, University of Iowa, Iowa City, Iowa.

Construction, University of Iowa, Iowa City, Iowa.

ELIEL SAARINEN and J. ROBERT F. SWANSON, of Saarinen, Swanson, and Saarinen, Architects, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan. (Mr. Swanson, a partner of Mr. Saarinen, will represent him when the latter can not attend meetings.)

The first meeting of the Committee was held in Chicago on November 30 with Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, and other University officials to consider and advise on plans for the development of new buildings for those Colleges. Subsequent meetings of the Committee have been held on February I at Urbana-Champaign and on February 28 in Chicago. The University is fortunate in having the services of these men whose counsel is very valuable in making important planning decisions.

This report was received for record.

APPROPRIATION FOR CONSULTANT'S FEES

(8) The Board of Trustees has previously authorized the appointments of such advisory groups as the Advisory Board on Aeronautics, and the Consultative Committee on Architecture, and the payment of consulting fees and traveling expenses.

It is desirable for the President to employ from time to time the services of professional consultants in other fields on a per diem basis. No appropriation has been made by the Board for such purposes. I should like to ask the Board to set up an appropriation of \$2,500 a year for such expenses. It may be added to the President's incidental and emergency fund. For the balance of the current fiscal year an appropriation of \$1,500 will be sufficient.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer.

APPROPRIATION FOR PRINTING AND PUBLISHING

(9) There is regularly included in the University's operating budget an appropriation for General Printing and Publishing to cover cost and distribution of administrative publications. The appropriation at present is \$2,500. This is inadequate. In previous years it has been as much as \$5,000.

I request that a supplementary appropriation of \$5,000 be made for this

purpose for the current fiscal year.

APPROPRIATION FOR PUBLICATION OF UNIVERSITY HISTORY

(10) The Director of the University Press requests an appropriation of \$12,000 for the publication of 3,000 copies of the History of the University of Illinois, written by Mr. Carl Stephens, University Historian, assisted by Mr. Charles W. Paape.

It is estimated that the book will contain 600 pages of text. It will be liberally illustrated. This project was authorized by the Board of Trustees on

January 24, 1942 (Minutes, page 759).

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson: no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer.

PURCHASE OF PRINTING EQUIPMENT

(11) On November 18, 1941 (Minutes, page 704), Mr. John R. Fornof, as a special committee of one assigned to make an inspection of the University Press, made a report to the Board in which he recommended the ultimate consolidation of the mechanical equipment and production facilities of the University of Illinois Press and the Illini Publishing Company and making these facilities available to the School of Journalism for instructional purposes. As one step in this direction, I have authorized a plan to establish a closer relationship between the Illini Publishing Company and the School of Journalism and the use of the facilities jointly. This will require moving the equipment of the Company from its present location on the ground floor of Illini Hall (the old Illinois Union Building) to Gregory Hall and the employment of an editorial supervisor jointly by the School of Journalism and the Company.

It will be necessary for the Illini Publishing Company to replace its present newspaper press which was built in 1902 and purchased by it in 1920. It is neither feasible nor economical to move this press to Gregory Hall. Three possible types of replacement are considered: (1) a new flat-bed press of the type used now, (2) a used rotary press, and (3) a new modern unitubular rotary press. The most desirable would be a new unitubular press which could be used for experimental work, especially color printing, in the program of the School of Journalism; also for printing the Illinois Alumni News and other types of presswork now done by the University Press. It is, therefore, proposed that the University share with the Illini Publishing Company the cost of a new unitubular press to be used jointly by the School of Journalism, the University Press, and the Illini Publishing Company. It is estimated that the cost of the press and installation will be \$50,000.

I recommend that the Board authorize the purchase of such a press and that an appropriation of \$25,000 be made to the School of Journalism for the Uni-

versity's share, subject to release by the President of the University.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this purchase was authorized and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Ave. Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey. Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson: no, none: absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR REMODELING ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING LABORATORY

(12) On July 30, 1946, a special appropriation of \$50,000 was made for remodeling the Electrical Engineering Laboratory in order to provide facilities for the vacuum tube research being carried on under government contracts.

The appropriation was based on the best estimate that could be made at that time. Subsequently, detailed plans and specifications were drawn indicating that the total cost will be approximately \$130,000. This is due in part to increased cost of construction and in part to a more exact statement of requirements for the research program, which were tentative in character at the time the original appropriation was made.

Between \$20,000 and \$25,000 will accrue to the University from these contracts to cover Physical Plant administrative costs over and above direct departmental expenditures for research. While the proposed facilities are necessary for this research program, they will be valuable to the department on a long-time basis.

Bids for the general work and electrical work already have been received and approved (Minutes, January 25, 1947, page 221, and February 27, 1947, page 271). Bids were received on March 11, 1947, for heating and miscellaneous piping, plumbing, and vacuum cleaning and air conditioning.

The lowest bidder on all work was the Carson-Payson Company for the

PURCHASE OF LAND FOR STAFF HOUSING

(14) On February 27 the Board approved the acquisition of 25 additional prefabricated houses for staff use. The Physical Plant Department recommends as the most satisfactory location for these houses 25 lots on the north and south sides of Hessel Boulevard between South Neil Street and South Elm Boulevard in Champaign. These lots are a short distance from the Stadium Drive subway under the Illinois Central Railroad.

This tract of land is offered by Lewis S. Colbert of the Twin City Real

Estate Exchange under the following conditions:

1. Total purchase price, \$34,750, payable \$5,000 at the time of signing the contract and the balance on or before May 1, 1947, subject to a merchantable abstracted title for all the lots.

- 2. The University to contract with Mr. Colbert for the erection of 25 National Homes on said lots, contingent upon the University's securing an appropriation of \$250,000 now pending in the General Assembly. (It has passed in the House.) Price of said houses, including land, erection ready for use, gas gravity heat connected to each house, and public sidewalk in front of each lot, to be \$8,750 for a three-bedroom house and \$8,250 for a two-bedroom house.

 3. This proposal is subject to acceptance on or before March 31, 1947.

Various types of prefabricated houses have been considered and the National Home is found to be the lowest in cost of any available. The total cost of lots and houses, including necessary additional construction work, will be well within the estimated total of \$238,450 reported to the Board on February 27.

In case the appropriation now pending before the General Assembly is not approved, it would be necessary for the University to pay for the land from general funds. There would be no further obligation under the proposed contract.

The Comptroller concurs in the recommendation and requests authority for himself and the Secretary of the Board to execute all necessary contracts.

I concur and request approval.

The Comptroller discussed this matter.

ALLOTMENT OF FEDERAL FUNDS FOR PLANS FOR NEW BUILDINGS

(15) Pursuant to Board authorization (Minutes, December 28, 1946, page 200), the Comptroller applied to the Federal Works Agency for funds for the preparation of plans and specifications for certain building projects approved by the Board of Trustees and included in the building appropriations requested for the biennium of 1947-1949.

Advice has been received of the following allotment of funds:

Staff apartments, Urbana	100 400

The regulations provide for an initial payment of 50 per cent of each allotment as soon as an acceptance has been signed. Further payments will be made to cover actual expenditures for preparation of plans and specifications. Whenever an appropriation is received for a project, the amount advanced is to be repaid to the Government from that appropriation. If no appropriation is secured and the project is not carried out, no repayment is required.

This report was received for record.

ALTERATIONS IN ILLINI UNION BOOKSTORE

(16) The Physical Plant Department, under whose supervision the Illini Union Bookstore is operated, requests approval of the following alterations in the Illini Union Bookstore:

(a) Convert present corridor into storage room and office space, and build

a fireproof partition in present storage room.

(b) Extend the Bookstore into area previously occupied by office to provide additional sales space.

The estimated total cost of the work is \$10,000, to be paid from available funds in the Illini Union Bookstore. The Physical Plant Department recommends that the work be done under the standing cost-plus contracts, separately recommended, as follows:

The Gage Structural Steel Company bid is \$1,700 lower than that of the Duffin Iron Company, However, their delivery date is approximately three months later than that of the Duffin Iron Company. The selection of the Duffin Iron Company, in the opinion of the Physical Plant Department, is necessary

if utility service is to be available for the new buildings by September, 1948.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the contract be awarded to the Duffin Iron Company on the price per pound for steel indicated above, at an estimated total cost of \$22,840. Funds are available within the total estimated cost of this project which assumes

additional appropriations in the 1947-1949 biennium as requested.

I concur and request approval.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was awarded as recommended.

AGREEMENTS WITH UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE COVERING RESEARCH PROJECTS

- (18) The Industrial Research and Development Division of the United States Department of Commerce proposes to finance the following projects at the University of Illinois.
 - I. Investigation of concrete slab floor construction for houses without base-
- ments: \$20,000. 2. A study of the industry engineered house for the Producers' Council:
- \$40,000-\$50,000. 3. A study of size variation and lamination in clay products: \$16,000.

The first two are projects of the Small Homes Council. The third is a

project of the Department of Ceramics. The form of contract for each project drafted by the Department of Com-

merce contains three provisions which depart from the University's policy and regulations governing research. These variations are shown by the following quotations:

"ARTICLE 5. (c) . . . In the event that the Contractor and licensee are unable to agree on the terms of the license, they shall submit all differences to arbitration according to a mutually acceptable plan or to the rules of the

American Arbitration Association, then obtaining.

"(d) The Contractor agrees to return to the Government at quarterly intervals fifty per centum (50%) of all royalty and other profit from any Subject or Related Invention or combination of Subject and Related Inventions until the portion of the contract funds, from the expenditure of which this invention developed, as determined by the Contracting Officer, is paid back to the Government in full.

"(e) The Contractor shall enter into a contract with each individual or organization owning the Related Inventions, so worded as to assure the ability of the Contractor to fulfill its obligations under paragraphs (b), (c), and (d).

Sub-paragraph (b) reads as follows:

Sub-paragraph (b) reads as ionows.

"The Contractor agrees to grant to the Government a non-exclusive, irrevocable, royalty-free license to make, use and sell for governmental purposes, according to law, all Subject and Related Inventions, and patents issued thereunder."

"Related Invention" means each invention improvement and discovery (whether or not patented or patentable), other than a "Subject Invention," which is necessary to or useful in connection with any manufactures and improvements based on the use

of the subject matter of this contract or any subcontract for research hereunder.

The faculty Committee on Patents has considered these contracts and recommends that the Board of Trustees authorize their approval with the variations from the University standard form contract, as set forth above.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these contracts were authorized, with variations as recommended.

4-H CLUB CAMPS

(19) On November 23, 1945 (Minutes, page 912), the Board of Trustees was asked to accept a 4-H Club memorial camp for activities sponsored by the University Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics. The request was referred to the President to consider in relation to other camps and for

report to the Board.

Mr. Robert Allerton has given the University land for a 4-H Club camp and other 4-H Club activities. In the meantime, a group of farm and home advisers in northern Illinois has organized a nonprofit corporation and accepted a site for a camp near Kankakee. Camp sites in two other areas of the State, the southern and western sections, are being considered.

Problems present themselves as to (a) the program of soliciting funds, (b) an agency for receiving, holding, and disbursing funds, and (c) the plan

of ownership, management, and operation of the camps.

It is proposed that a coordination committee be set up consisting of five farm advisers, five home advisers, and three members of the University staff engaged in agricultural extension work, to supervise the solicitation of funds for the acquisition and development of these camps.

It is further proposed that the funds be deposited with the University of Illinois Foundation to be held in trust and disbursed on the order of the aforementioned coordination committee. Donors will be permitted to specify the areas to which their gifts will go. If no designation is made, the committee

will allocate the funds among the various camps.

The ownership of the property may take one of two forms: (a) The camp may be turned over to the Board of Trustees to hold and operate in a manner similar to the Allerton 4-H Club memorial camp. (b) Separate corporations may be set up in each area of the State to hold and operate the projects. In either event, the University's Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics would supervise programs.

The Board is asked to:

1. Request the University of Illinois Foundation to assume this responsibility of receiving, holding, and disbursing funds for these camp projects.

2. Authorize the acceptance of sites which may be provided for the various camps under conditions generally comparable to those of the Allerton gift.

3. Authorize farm advisers and home advisers and their successors in the respective areas to participate as individuals in nonprofit corporations, to own and operate such camps.

These proposals have been reviewed by the Dean of the College of Agriculture, the Legal Counsel, and the Comptroller, all of whom recommend their adoption.

I concur and request approval.

This matter was referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

It recommends rejection of the bid of the Cleveland Tramrail Company for mechanical equipment. This bid is on equipment for the shop area if used as a Foundry, and change in use of this area has changed equipment requirements.

It is proposed that contracts be drawn for totals listed under "Part A," to keep contracts and other immediate expenditures within the total present appropriation of \$1,102,000. If construction should be terminated with the completion of these contracts as proposed, the building would not be completed but

additional appropriations will be requested in accordance with the authorization of the Board (Minutes, January 25, 1947, page 227). The additional sums would increase funds for this project to \$1,602,000.

Consideration is being given to changes in the internal arrangement and the exterior design of the building. These changes will not affect the basic structure of the building, and it is believed that their cost can be met within the total estimates.

The architects concur in the above recommendations.

The Governor has been requested to release the balance of the present appropriation for use in this construction; execution of contracts is contingent on such a release.

The Comptroller recommends approval of these proposed awards, and authority for the Secretary of the Board and himself to execute contracts when funds are available.

I concur and request approval.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were adopted.

CONTRACTS FOR MINOR ALTERATIONS

(21) The Physical Plant Department finds itself unable to do minor alterations and remodeling, because of the total of operation and maintenance work and the extra burden of major building projects in the Urbana-Champaign division. Many of the jobs are so small and of such character as to make competitive bidding impractical. The Department has recommended, and the Comptroller concurs, the award of standing contracts until June 30, 1947.

Bids have been solicited for the several types of services rendered on a cost-plus fee basis, the latter based on a fixed percentage of direct cost of labor and material, with a minimum in each case. The lowest bidders are as follows:

FOOD SERVICE IN THE ILLINI UNION BUILDING

(29) The Board of Trustees at its meeting on February 27 received a communication which had been delivered to the Secretary of the Board (Minutes, page *2*73).

The Board referred the petition to the President of the University. The Manager of the Illini Union Building has reported on a study made of all possibilities of expanding the food service in that building. A copy of the full report is submitted herewith for the information of the Board and is given to the Secretary for record. It shows that a great deal has already been done during the past year to expand the food service in that building. For example, it is significant that the number of meals served has increased from approximately 3,000 a day in March of 1946 to over 7,500 a day in March, 1947. All logical possibilities for expansion have been considered. Any further expansion would require taking over areas in the building used by students for other purposes. All students pay the Illini Union Building service charge, but many of them do not eat in the building and their only use of it is for social and other extracurricular activities. It would not be fair to deprive them of the only facilities they use.

This report was received for record, and the Secretary was instructed to send a copy to Mrs. Snell.

INSURANCE ON NOYES CHEMISTRY LABORATORY

A. For a number of years, in accordance with action of the Board of Trustees, fire and extended coverage insurance has been carried on the Noyes Chemistry Laboratory. The insurance, totaling \$318,000, is distributed among six agencies and companies, and distributed between stock and mutual companies in accordance with Board policy. Policies are for five-year terms, staggered so that a uniform amount expires each year. Additional insurance of \$164,000 is carried on contents.

Since this insurance carries the 80% co-insurance clause, a recent appraisal was secured in order to determine whether the insurance is adequate. This report indicates a current replacement cost, less depreciation, of \$1,112,000. Accordingly, it is necessary to increase the amount of insurance by \$526,000, making a total of \$844,000.

One of the policies expires April 15, 1947. A request for quotations was submitted to all agencies which had requested an opportunity to quote on this insurance. The lowest offer is submitted by Boggs & Cogdal, of Urbana, for Hartford Fire Insurance Company, who now have this policy. On renewal, it is proposed to increase this policy from the present \$59,648 to \$158,250.

To secure the increased insurance necessary to adjust the present replacement costs, it is proposed to increase the policies for the unexpired period as per the following schedule:

AFTERNOON SESSION

When the Board convened in executive session at the Blackstone Hotel on the afternoon of March 27, 1947, the following members were present: President Livingston, General Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

President Stoddard was present; also Mr. Janata, Professor Griffith, Professor Morey, Professor Britton, and Mr. Cunningham.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

LEASE OF NAVY PIER DRILL HALL

(1) The University has been using the Drill Hall at Navy Pier under an informal agreement with the Chicago municipal authorities since November, 1946, at an annual rental of \$15,000 for approximately 60,000 square feet of space. Negotiations for a formal lease have been going on for several weeks. In so far as possible, the terms of the Drill Hall lease are identical with the terms of the lease of other areas on Navy Pier. The essential terms and important variations are as follows:

 Subject of the lease. The Drill Hall, with adjoining land totaling approximately 75,000 square feet.
 Term. January 1, 1947, to June 30, 1947, renewable for successive biennial periods until June 30, 1951, and renewable annually thereafter until June 30, 1954. The term is the same as that of the Navy Pier lease, except that the latter began on August 1, 1946.

The most unusual feature of the Drill Hall lease is that it requires the University to vacate the main hall, 100' x 464', and the main floor office space, 31' x 40', for a period not to exceed two weeks at any one time, on thirty (30) days' notice to the University, for permitting conventions to occupy the premises during such period.

No representative of the University is satisfied with this arrangement, but Commissioner Hewitt has stated that he was committed to the policy of renting the Drill Hall to conventions, and that the University's acceptance of this arrangement was a condition to his granting a lease to the University.

This matter has been gone into thoroughly by those responsible for the conduct of Physical Education programs in the Drill Hall, and while they do not like it, they have acquiesced in Commissioner Hewitt's position because all things considered, it was the best thing they could do.

3. Rent. One Thousand Five Hundred Sixty-two and 50/100 Dollars (\$1,562.50) a month. The lease provides for certain deductions from the rent during the periods of time when conventions are occupying the Drill Hall. The

University gets the following credits with the Lessor:

(a) The cost to Lessee of gas, electricity, water, and insurance, estimated

at \$255 a week;

(b) Credit of \$262.50 a week during the first ten (10) weeks of convention usage in any one calendar year and \$485 a week for each week of convention usage in excess of ten (10) weeks.

These last two figures represent the credits for the cost of operation to be

furnished by Lessee during such periods.

4. Insurance. The University agrees to carry fire, tornado, and casualty insurance, in the amount of \$200,000 for the benefit of the City of Chicago and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois as their interests may appear.

This provision differs from that contained in the lease on the Navy Pier in that, in the latter case, the University pays \$1,120 a year to the City in lieu

of carrying insurance against fire, tornado, and other casualty.

5. Repairs. This lease obligates the Lessee "to make all necessary repairs and maintain the demised premises, except that the Lessee shall not be liable to make repairs of loss or damage to said premises resulting from occupancy thereof by conventions.'

In the Navy Pier lease the City obligated itself to make all necessary structural repairs. Commissioner Hewitt refused to incorporate this provision in the Drill Hall lease. The University opposed this in numerous discussions, but to no avail. The University's added obligation here is to be read in connection with the Lessee's obligation to "yield up said premises to Lessor in as good condition and repair as when received, loss by fire or other casualty, and ordinary wear and tear excepted.'

The Legal Counsel submits the following resolution authorizing the officers of the Board to execute the lease for the Drill Hall in accordance with the

provisions summarized above.

BE IT RESOLVED:

That, the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board of Trustees are authorized to execute, on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, a lease from the City of Chicago to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois of premises known as the Drill Hall situated on land adjoining the Chicago Navy Pier, together with adjacent land to be prescribed by the Commissioner of Public Works, said demised premises comprising approximately 75,000 square feet, for use by the University for educational purposes, for the term beginning January 1, 1947, and expiring June 30, 1947, with the privilege to the Lessee to renew at the expiration date for successive biennial periods up to June 30, 1951, and annually thereafter until June 30, 1954, upon sixty days notice in writing to the City, and subject however to temporary release by the University for such periods as the City desires the premises for reletting for convention purposes, upon thirty days' notice in writing to the University of such desired use, and upon the understanding that a proportionate reduction in rent will be allowed the University during such convention occupancy, and provided that the City will utilize the premises and relieve the University from payment of rent for a period of not less than ten weeks during any one year, the space to be released to the City for convention occupancy to comprise the

main hall of said Drill Hall approximately 100 x 464 feet, plus main floor office space at the North East corner of the Drill Hall approximately 31 x 40 feet, plus use of toilet facilities; at a monthly rental of \$1,562.50, payable to the City monthly in advance; the University to maintain and keep in repair the demised premises during the term of the lease, heat and light the same, but to be allowed credit for the pro-rata costs and expenses of covering heat, light, fuel, power and water during convention occupancy; said lease to be on such other terms and conditions and form as shall meet the approval of the City Council, the Commissioner of Public Works and the Corporation Counsel, and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

The Legal Counsel presented this matter.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the resolution was adopted as recommended by the Legal Counsel.

REPORT ON FUNDS FOR ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(2) The General Assembly in 1945, in the Post-War Bill for Capital Appropriations, made an appropriation to the University for construction of an Electrical Engineering Building and equipment at Urbana-Champaign in the amount of \$875,000. This and all similar appropriations are subject to the following provision: "No contract shall be entered into or obligation incurred for any expenditure from any appropriation herein made until after the purpose and amount of such expenditure has been approved in writing by the Governor." On October 31, 1945, the Governor released the sum of \$39,375 for plans and specifications for that building. In anticipation of the need of this fund for construction purposes, the Comptroller on November 19, 1946, addressed a request to the Governor for the release of the balance of \$710,625 in this appropriation.

It is the practice of the Governor to refer all such requests to the Illinois Post-War Planning Commission for advice. On December 18, 1946, the Comptroller received a request from Mr. Oscar Nelson, Executive Secretary of the Commission, raising a question as to whether the balance of the appropriation would be sufficient to complete the building and also requesting that bids for the building be submitted to the Commission. The Comptroller informed Mr. Nelson of the status of this project and of the great importance of proceeding with construction as soon as possible, that additional funds would be necessary to complete it, and that a request for such funds is included in the biennial budget request of the University.

On January 25 bids were submitted to the Board showing a total cost of \$1,615,775 for the building. The Board approved the award of the contracts to the extent possible within the present appropriation on the understanding that the additional bids would be subject to acceptance by August 1, 1947. On January 27 the Comptroller transmitted to Mr. Nelson a copy of the schedule of bids, urging approval of the release of present funds.

No contracts have been signed with any of the successful bidders on this building. A letter of intent was issued by the Comptroller and the Architect to the John Felmley Company, general contractors, informing them of the action of the Board and authorizing them to "initiate work at the site in advance of the formal signing of the contract."

Hearing nothing from the request for release of these funds by March I, the Comptroller took up the matter with various offices at Springfield. He was referred by the Post-War Planning Commission to the Governor's Office. The Governor's Office referred him to the Director of Finance. The matter was reviewed in detail with that office. The Director indicated that, if the President would address his new request to the Governor, outlining the situation on this building and all buildings of a similar status, he would present it at once to the Governor for the earliest possible action. Under date of March 12 such a report, in full detail, was sent to the Governor covering the Electrical Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Chemistry, and Fine Arts buildings.

In the absence of word from either the Office of the Governor or the

In the absence of word from either the Office of the Governor or the Director of Finance, the matter was followed continuously from March 14 on. The President was advised that the Governor had received the request but had referred it back to the Director of Finance for additional information. No

additional word could be secured from the Director of Finance. Further efforts on the part of the President to secure a conference with the Governor thus far

Following the letter from the Architect and the Comptroller the contractor has moved his equipment on the site, moved the Health Service Building, started excavating, and done other work. Costs amounting to \$228,000 have been incurred to this date. Unless the release of funds can be secured, it will be necessary immediately to request the contractor to cease work. Every day's delay in the construction work on this building reduces the certainty of its completion by September, 1948, at which time the building is absolutely required for the necessary instructional work in electrical engineering for students (largely veterans) now registered in that curriculum. Much the same situation applies to the other three buildings mentioned, one of which, the Mechanical Engineering Building, is before the Board for consideration and award of bids at this meeting.

This report was received for record, and the matter of securing the release of funds was left in the hands of the President of the University.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON INSTALLATION OF PRESIDENT STODDARD

President Livingston reported the appointment of the following special committee of the Board, to cooperate with the general committee on arrangements for the installation of President George Dinsmore Stoddard: Dr. Karl A. Meyer, Chairman, Mr. John R. Fornof, and General Chester R. Davis.

President Livingston stated that Dr. Meyer would be active on matters pertaining to the ceremonies in Chicago, Mr. Fornof at the University, and General Davis at the Robert Allerton Park.

MR. FORNOF APPOINTED TO RETIREMENT BOARD

After the meeting, President Livingston notified the Secretary that he had designated Mr. John R. Fornof to serve as a member of the Board of Trustees of the University Retirement System of Illinois for the duration of his present term as Trustee of the University (1947-1953).

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

April 24, 1947



The April meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, on Thursday, April 24, 1047, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session, as in Committee of the Whole.

12:30 p.m. -- Open session.

President Stoddard was present; also Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. I. L. Porter, Treasurer, Professor Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and, during part of the day, Professor J. C. Spitler, Associate Director of Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics, and Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board discussed in executive session several matters included in the agenda, and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

PURCHASE OF TEXACO PROPERTY

(1) Pursuant to action of the Board on February 27 (Minutes, page 257), an offer of \$40,000 was made to the Texaco Company for the property at the northeast corner of Green and Mathews, Urbana, on which there is a filling station. This land is needed as part of the site of the new Mechanical Engineering Building, contracts for which were approved at the March meeting. The Company, after careful consideration and after securing two independent appraisals of the property which exceeded the above offer, declined it. The Company states that it will sell the property to the University for \$45,000, possession to be given within sixty days.

The contractor states that unless this property is secured promptly, additional

cost will be incurred because of extra storing and moving of equipment.

After thorough consideration, the Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that the offer of the Texaco Company be accepted, and the

purchase of the property at \$45,000 be authorized. I concur.

The amount required for this and other necessary purchases for which a State appropriation of \$127,000 was made in 1945, exceeds this appropriation by \$25,000. An appropriation of \$25,000 from the General Reserve is therefore needed, and I so recommend.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this purchase was authorized and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR E. W. DOLCH

(2) I recommend that Associate Professor E. W. Dolch of the College of Education be given a sabbatical leave of absence on one-half salary for the second semester of 1947-1948 (March I through August 31, 1948).

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this leave was granted as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF H. R. BOWEN AS DEAN OF COLLEGE OF COMMERCE AND BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

(3) I request authority to appoint Howard Rothmann Bowen as Dean of the College of Commerce and Business Administration, for two years beginning September 1, 1947, and Professor of Economics, on indefinite tenure, at an annual salary of \$13,000.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was authorized as requested.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES EXPENSE AND EQUIPMENT

The Secretary requested an additional appropriation of \$5,000 for Board of Trustees Expense and Equipment for the remainder of the fiscal year.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this appropriation was made as requested by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell.

4-CLUB CAMPS

Mr. McLaughlin presented the following report and recommendations of the Committee on Agriculture with respect to 4-H Club Camps.

The Committe on Agriculture has considered the recommendations of President Stoddard on this matter (Minutes, March 27, 1947, page 315), has conferred with Professor Spitler and others, and recommends that the Board approve the fol-

lowing:

I. That the University of Illinois Foundation be requested to assume the latting and disbursing funds for these camp projects. responsibility of receiving, holding, and disbursing funds for these camp projects.

2. That the acceptance of sites be authorized, under conditions generally com-

parable to the gift of Robert Allerton.

3. That farm advisers and home advisers, and their successors, in the respective areas be authorized to participate as individuals in nonprofit corporations, to own and operate such camps.

Professor Spitler commented on this matter.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were approved and adopted, and the appropriate officers of the Board and of the University were authorized to execute and to carry out the program, without financial responsibility of the University for development or operation and maintenance beyond the limits of funds received for these purposes from gifts or camp income.

The President of the University was requested to have a study made of the responsibilities of the University arising from this

program.

OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened in open session on the afternoon of April 24, 1947, the same members and officers were present as during the morning session.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of March 27, 1947. On motion of Mr. Davis, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 301 to 332 above.

TRIBUTE TO FRANK A. JENSEN

General Davis presented the following:

It is appropriate that the Board of Trustees pause in its deliberations today to pay tribute to the memory of a former colleague and friend, Frank A. Jensen, Superintendent of the LaSalle-Peru Township High School and LaSalle-Peru-Oglesby Junior College, and a member of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois from 1939 to 1945, who died suddenly at his home in Peru, Illinois, on Sunday, March 30, 1947.

Doctor Jensen was one of the great public school men of Illinois. He began teaching at an early age. All of his adult lifetime was given to education, as teacher and as school administrator. The last twenty-four years of his life, covering onehalf of his professional career, were spent in Illinois as Superintendent of Schools of Rockford, Illinois, from 1923 to 1935, and as Superintendent of the LaSalle-Peru Township High School and the LaSalle-Peru-Oglesby Junior College from 1935

until his untimely death.

He was an outstanding citizen, a distinguished educator, a public leader, and a loyal friend. His devotion to education was far beyond the call of public or professional duty. Only two weeks before his death he was at the University participating in a conference on teacher education. He was the leader among public school men of Illinois in the movement for an expanded system of junior colleges needed to provide more adequate facilities for higher education in this State.

These same qualities of leadership, of unselfish devotion to public interest, and of doing more than his share of work marked his faithful service as a member of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois. During his six-year term he missed only one meeting, and that because of illness. Those members of this Board who served with him are grateful for the opportunity of having worked with an

inspiring colleague and a loyal friend whom they will never forget.

Be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that this memorial be published in its records and a copy be sent by the Secretary to Mrs.

Jensen and her family, with an expression of the Board's sympathy in the great loss they have suffered.

On motion of General Davis, this resolution was adopted.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

BIENNIAL OPERATING BUDGET FOR 1947-1949

(1) On April 5, 1947, Senator Everett R. Peters, Chairman of the Illinois Budgetary Commission, held an all-day conference with officials of the University of Illinois to make an analysis and revision of the biennial budgetary requests. The following officials took part: Park Livingston, President of the Board of Trustees, George D. Stoddard, President of the University, Coleman R. Griffith, Provost, and Lloyd Morey, Comptroller.

At the close of the meeting, Senator Peters stated that he was convinced the lowest amount on which the University can operate during 1947-1949 is \$60,083,018. This is a reduction of \$5,000,000 in the original University budget approved by the

Board of Trustees on October 22, 1946.

This change in the operating budget of the University would be made in the appropriation from tax funds, reducing it from \$48,083,018 to \$43,083,018. The appropriation of \$17,000,000 of the estimated income of the University for the

biennium would not be changed.

The reduction indicated can be made without serious damage because not all of the staff additions anticipated when the budget was presented to the Board in October, 1946, can be secured.

Allocation of the total reduction will be determined after further study of the entire operating budget. Approximately \$4,000,000 will be taken from the salaries and wages section of the budget and the remaining \$1,000,000 from expense and equipment items.

I recommend that the action of the President of the Board and the President of the University, in assenting to this readjustment, be confirmed by the Board of Trustees.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this action was approved and confirmed.

RELEASES FROM STATE BUILDING APPROPRIATIONS

(2) At the Board meeting on March 27 (Minutes, page 325) a report was made on the status of releases of building appropriations for 1945-1947. Subsequently the President of the University communicated with the Governor and conferred with the Director of Finance. The Director indicated that the State will follow the policy of releasing funds for construction work only if a sufficient appropriation is available to make possible the completion of a usable unit. He also requested that the University recommend a redistribution of its appropriations for 1945-1947 to provide sufficient funds for the total cost of each high priority project which should be completed within the 1947-1949 biennium.

In accordance with that request, the following schedule was presented, showing the minimum funds required for (1) completion during 1947-1949 of all projects in the AAA priority list approved by the Board of Trustees on January 25, 1947; (2) expenditures and commitments on other projects; (3) essential funds for those projects in Chicago which can be completed during 1947-1949 within available funds, including preparation of plans for the complete hospital addition; (4) use of existing appropriations for land (most of which already have been expended and all of which are encumbered); and (5) an amount for contingencies.

The schedule shows that after reallocation of the entire 1945-1947 appropriation (except for the \$140,000 for purchase of student housing which is being allowed to lapse in view of a special appropriation of \$250,000 for staff housing already passed and approved), there would be a deficiency of \$2,000,000. The Director of Finance agreed to recommend this readjustment of funds, including an addition of \$2,000,000, in the State budget for 1947-1949. It is understood that H. B. 175, a separate bill for an appropriation of \$2,200,000 for student residence

halls, will be considered as a special item and that the remaining items will be included in a new State-wide program of building projects for which appropria-

tions would be requested for 1947-1949.

The Director of Finance stated that this may represent the total amount of capital funds that can be made available to the University through 1947-1949. This statement was not accepted as binding on the University, since the attached schedule was submitted without prejudice to further building needs.

Funds for the Electrical Engineering Building have been released in full, and we are advised that all releases will be granted promptly on request.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this redistribution of funds was approved.

ADDITIONAL STATE BUILDING APPROPRIATION REQUESTS

(3) On October 22, 1946 (Minutes, page 129), the Board approved for filing as a part of the biennial budget for 1947-1949, a schedule of capital appropriations totaling \$29,450,000. This schedule is in addition to the reappropriation of all capital funds of the biennium 1945-1947.

As separately reported at today's meeting, the amount which probably will be included in the State budget for 1947-1949 in excess of reappropriations of \$16,-631,000 is \$2,000,000, or a total of \$18,631,000. The reappropriation program does not include a number of projects for which appropriations were made in 1945 but the funds for which have had to be applied toward other projects of higher priority.

In assenting to the redistribution of funds, University officers indicated that a reservation would be made on submitting directly to the General Assembly a request for additional capital appropriations for 1947-1949. This problem has been reviewed in detail with the University officers concerned at Urbana and Chicago. As a result, a revised schedule of urgent capital appropriation needs for 1947-1949 is submitted. This includes:

I. The most urgent projects at Urbana-Champaign of AAA or AA priority which were omitted or reduced in the schedule recently submitted for the State

2. Urgent projects for the Chicago Professional Colleges, also omitted in the

schedule recently submitted.

With respect to the Urbana-Champaign campus, all projects included in the basic budget of \$18,631,000 are scheduled for completion by September, 1948. If no additional appropriations are made for 1947-1949, this will mean that little construction work can be carried on during the entire year of 1948-1949. This would be a mistake in view of the fact that the need for all projects will be increasingly

serious as the next biennium progresses.

With respect to Chicago, it was found impossible to utilize the full amount appropriated (for Chicago) in 1945 because of the fact that, other than the atmospheric research unit and the completion of a part of the utilities distribution system, no unit could be carried to completion within existing funds. As already reported, the Department of Finance insists that no funds be released unless a sufficient appropriation is available for the completion of a usable unit. Thus, it became a question of either losing this sum or applying it at points where complete projects are assured. Hence, the sum of \$1,300,000 originally intended for the hospital addition in Chicago was reallocated to Urbana-Champaign projects. The transfer was done after consultation with Doctor Ivy and on assurance to him that the amount of this transfer would be added to appropriation requests for 1947-1949. Unless new appropriations are secured, no material progress will be made during 1947-1949 on the urgently needed program of the Chicago Professional Colleges.

I recommend that the President be authorized to seek the introduction and passage of an appropriation bill totaling \$20,472,000 for capital projects for 1947-1949 as set forth in the schedule submitted. This replaces the original schedule of \$29,450,000 approved and filed in October, 1946.

On motion of Mr. Davis, authority was given the President of the University as recommended.

RELEASE OF FUNDS FROM STATE-WIDE PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS APPROPRIATION

This change of grade makes Mr. Theodore John Banka, 2134 West Lyndale Avenue, Chicago, eligible for the Illinois C.P.A. certificate, and the Committee recommends that his name be presented to the Board of Trustees for the C.P.A. certificate, to be issued as of September 24, 1946, the date on which the Board approved other certificates for candidates in the May, 1946, examination.

The Committee also recommends that the following candidates, who have presented evidence that they hold C.P.A. certificates in other states, which certificates were obtained by passing the regular written examination, be granted the Illinois C.P.A. certificate under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943:

APPOINTMENT OF GEORGE W. WHITE AS PROFESSOR AND HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF GEOLOGY

(6) I recommend the appointment of Dr. George Willard White, Professor of Geology at Ohio State University, as Professor and Head of the Department of Geology on indefinite tenure beginning September 1, 1947, at an annual salary of \$8,500.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was made as recommended.

ADDITIONS TO CONTRACTS FOR ELECTRICAL WORK AND PLUMBING, HEATING, AND VENTILATING WORK ON PHYSICS RESEARCH LABORATORY

(7) The Director of the Physical Plant Department reports that an addition, in the amount of \$17,828.94, is necessary to the contract with the Anderson Electric Company for electrical work on the Physics Research Building.

The Director also reports that an addition, in the amount of \$6,505.68, is necessary to the contract with the Carson-Payson Company for plumbing, heating,

and ventilating work on the Physics Research Building.

The contract for electrical work was authorized by the Board on December 11, 1945 (Minutes, page 949), and the contract for plumbing, heating, and ventilating work, on December 17, 1945 (Minutes, page 956). The Board had previously authorized the construction of this building on a cost plus fixed fee basis. The additions to these contracts are necessary to provide for increased costs of labor and materials encountered since construction was begun.

The Comptroller recommends approval of these increases, and I concur. Funds

are available in the special state appropriation for this building.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these increases to contracts were authorized as recommended.

STEEL WORK FOR NEW CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(8) Bids for fabricated structural steel for the new Chemistry Building were opened in the office of the architects (Graham, Anderson, Probst, & White) at Chicago on April 15, 1947, as follows:

It is the opinion of the architects that, on the basis of bids submitted, the Bethlehem Steel Company's bid is the most favorable, and they recommend that it be accepted. The Physical Plant Department concurs in this recommendation. Funds are available.

This building is one of highest priority included in the proposed readjustment of funds recently agreed upon with the Director of Finance. The contract should be awarded at once so that the steel will be ready when needed in the construction program.

I recommend approval and authorization to the Comptroller and Secretary of

the Board to execute a contract.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this contract was awarded and its execution authorized as recommended.

SUPPLEMENTARY STAFF HOUSING PROJECT

(9) On February 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 259), the Board of Trustees authorized a request to the General Assembly for a special emergency appropriation of \$250,000 for staff housing. The General Assembly has passed and the Governor has approved the appropriation.

On March 27, 1947, the Board authorized contracts for the purchase of sites and 25 prefabricated houses. The total cost of these houses is estimated at \$225,000, of which \$70,700 can be borrowed and amortized out of the net income which will be available from the rental of the houses. An appropriation of \$154,300 will be necessary from the State appropriation for staff housing to complete this project.

Since the original request for a supplementary appropriation was submitted to the General Assembly, the U. S. Department of Commerce has offered to advance funds to the University of Illinois for the purpose of studying the site fabrication of small houses. The purpose is to determine methods of reducing the manhours required for the erection of small houses. It is proposed to build six small houses, three of frame and three of masonry construction. The houses will be built in the same area as the 25 prefabricated houses. The construction of the proposed six houses of a conventional type in this area will improve the appearance of the entire project as well as provide six additional houses for staff housing.

The Department of Commerce offers to advance \$45,000, \$19,200 of which can be used for construction labor in the erection of the houses. The remaining funds

will be used for research costs.

The cost of the homes is estimated by Professor W. H. Scheick, Coordinator of the Small Homes Council, at \$10,025 a house, or a total cost of \$60,150, including the necessary land. The sum of \$19,200 to meet labor costs will be provided by the Department of Commerce, and \$40,950 must be provided from other funds. Based on estimates of net income which will be available from the rental of the completed homes, about \$13,000 can be borrowed and amortized within a ten-year period. To complete the project, an appropriation of \$27,950 from the supplementary appropriation for staff housing will be necessary.

The Legal Counsel has given an opinion that, under the contract, the government will not have any title to, lien, or encumbrance on any of the houses there-

under, but that such houses will be the sole property of the University.

It is proposed to use the remaining funds in the supplementary state appropriation, estimated at \$67,750, for expenditures on federal housing units.

Approval of the revised project and appropriation of the funds to become available are requested.

APPROPRIATION TO UNIVERSITY RETIREMENT SYSTEM OF ILLINOIS

(10) The costs of operating the University Retirement System of Illinois, including benefits payments and administrative expenses, are distributed among the agencies in the System, and are included in their biennial appropriations. The charges against the University of Illinois were based on the staff and payroll during the biennium of 1943-1945; the annual total used in the computations was \$9,549,451. The actual salary and wage budget for 1946-1947 is approximately \$16,830,000.

The actual salary and wage budget for 1946-1947 is approximately \$16,830,000.

The increase in this payroll affects the amount of disability costs, death benefit costs, and possibly retiring annuities. There is a surplus from previous years on death benefit costs, and there is no deficiency in the provision for retirement benefits, but there is an estimated deficiency of \$30,272 in the provision for disability costs. Administrative costs of the System have also increased as a result of the added number of participants and benefits. The University's share of this increased administrative expense is \$7,230.

The University has, therefore, been requested to increase its payment to the System for the current fiscal year from \$239,507 to \$277,009. I recommend that a supplementary appropriation of \$37,502 be made from the General Reserve Fund of the University for this purpose.

I request that an assignment of \$2,000 be made from the General Reserve to the Public Functions fund of the President's Office to pay the expenses of this inspection and visit.

INSURANCE ON AIRPORT HANGAR

(13) The Board has previously authorized insurance on the hangar at the University Airport. The present insurance of \$80,000 expires July 1. It should be increased to \$160,000 in view of increased replacement costs. Insurance is on an 80 per cent co-insurance plan to be written for three years, premiums for second and third years deferred. All agencies requesting an opportunity to quote on this insurance were advised. From quotations received, the Purchasing Agent and Comptroller have recommended that the insurance be placed as follows:

PURCHASE OF COAL FOR GALESBURG UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(14) Bids have been requested on 15,000 tons of screenings (1½" x 0") estimated as required during the period June 1, 1947, through May 1, 1948, for the plant at the Galesburg Undergraduate Division. Bids were requested from 35 concerns, known or thought to be interested in and possibly able to furnish this coal. The only bid received was from the Central Indiana Coal Company, Galesburg office, for coal from its Victoria, Illinois, mine at \$3.00 a ton, f.o.b. mine, subject to price adjustments, freight rate 88¢ a ton, estimated total of contract \$45,000, estimated total cost of coal delivered \$58,200.

A contract is necessary in order to be assured of a continuing supply. The period involved covers parts of two biennial periods. Hence an order will be issued for the estimated 600 tons required before June 30, 1947, and an additional contract for the remainder required after July 1, 1947.

for the remainder required after July 1, 1947.

The Business Manager of the Galesburg Undergraduate Division, the Purchasing Agent, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Comptroller recommend approval of this contract. Under the state constitution the contract also must be submitted to the Governor for approval.

I concur and request authority for the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute the contract when approved by the Governor.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was approved and its execution was authorized as recommended.

UNIVERSITY'S SHARE OF SEWAGE DISPOSAL COSTS

(15) Officers of the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District have requested the University to assume a share of the operating cost of sewage disposal, for the following reasons:

A. The University did not contribute anything toward the cost of constructing the treatment plant and interceptors built in 1923-1924 and has likewise contributed

nothing toward the cost of plant maintenance and operation since that time. It did, in 1945, agree to bear its share of the cost of additional intercepting sewers now under construction.

B. The University as a state-supported institution would not be setting a precedent in making an annual contribution toward the cost of sewage treatment. The Southern Illinois Normal University pays the City of Carbondale a sum approximately equal to one-half the cost of its water bill. The State hospitals at Anna, Jacksonville, Lincoln, Kankakee, and Peoria, contribute toward the cost of

sewage treatment provided by their cities.

C. For the past six years the Sanitary District has levied taxes in sufficient amount so that a portion could be set aside as a fund for "construction of additions." In 1945 this fund of some \$43,000 was expended to meet a portion of the cost of constructing additional interceptor sewers whose cost will be greater than anticipated at the time of financing. A normal population increase would have required some additional expansion at the treatment plant in about ten years. Due to the rapid increase in local population and unprecedented registration at the University, some additional plant expansion will probably be required within five years. It is therefore necessary to build up a fund for construction of additions as rapidly as possible. An annual contribution from the University, while based on the cost of sewage treated, would be used to restore the construction fund.

D. It seems reasonable that the University contribute its proportionate share

for the cost of the operation of the plant.

E. The University now has arrangements for exchange of services with the

local cities on fire protection, police service, and maintenance of the streets.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that the University assume its proportionate share of the cost of operating the sewage disposal plant of the District, subject, however, to a determination of the sewage load from the University in relation to the total load. It is estimated that the cost to the University will be approximately \$6,000 a year.

I recommend that this proposal be approved with the understanding that the cost will be covered in the internal budget of the Physical Plant Department be-

ginning July 1, 1947.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this proposal was approved as recommended.

LANDSCAPING FOR TEMPORARY HOUSING UNITS

(18) Bids for the remainder of the landscaping work required in the veterans housing areas were invited, and only one bid was received. An analysis indicates it is an excellent bid, by a capable firm, and it is considerably below the Physical Plant Department's preliminary estimates. Several prospective bidders stated that they have too many previous contracts to undertake additional landscaping work.

This bid includes preparation of ground, planting of lawn, and setting of trees. This firm has previously done landscaping for the Illini Union Building, Gregory Hall, and the McKinley Hospital Addition. It has an excellent reputation.

The Physical Plant Department recommends award of the contract to Swain Nelson and Sons, Glenview, Illinois, on a base bid of \$33,214.88 with costs distributed among the various F.P.H.A. contracts. I concur and request approval and authority for the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to complete the contract.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this contract was approved and authorized as recommended.

INCREASE IN PURCHASE PRICE OF GASOLINE TEST ENGINE AND DIESEL TEST ENGINE FOR DEPARTMENT OF MECHANICAL ENGINEERING

(19) An order has been placed with the Waukesha Motor Company for a gasoline test engine and a Diesel test engine for the Department of Mechanical Engineering. The price indicated on the order was \$15,558.80 and the transaction was approved by the Board of Trustees on March 9, 1946 (Minutes, page 1019). The order was placed subject to any increase in price which might be made prior to shipment, and the Purchasing Agent is now advised that the total price will be \$20,635.50. The Department of Mechanical Engineering reports that there is

urgent need for these machines and requests that the order be permitted to stand, the excess cost to be paid from the special building fund.

The Comptroller concurs in this request, and I recommend that the Board approve the purchase in spite of the increased price.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this increase in price was approved.

UNIVERSITY CENTER IN CHICAGO

(20) For several years the Alumni Association has been operating in the LaSalle Hotel an Illini Center as a headquarters for alumni activities in Chicago. When the University Placement Bureau was established by the Board it was understood that the Chicago end of this service would be a part of the Illini Center. A temporary arrangement was made within existing space. The fire in the LaSalle Hotel delayed the development of a complete program.

delayed the development of a complete program.

The Hotel is preparing to open in the near future. It has offered the University the complete space of about 3,000 square feet on the 20th (top) floor of the building. This is about four times the amount of previous space and is offered at a rental of \$4,500 a year, or about \$1.50 a square foot, which is reasonable in comparison to other rentals in the Loop. In addition to the interest of the Alumni Association and the Placement Bureau, the Extension Division has need of a Chicago head-quarters. The Registrar also requires a center for information activities during several weeks in the spring. A number of general University officers are interested in having such space available.

It is desirable that the University have an attractive and well-located center in Chicago which can serve the needs of these various activities and constitute an informational headquarters for the University as a whole. Dining service is available on the floor below, and the Chicago Illini Club intends to establish its headquarters on that floor.

To make the project fully useful, an additional clerical position, telephone service, and minor incidental expenses are involved, representing a total budget of about \$7,350 a year. It is proposed to finance this budget by an equal distribution of \$1,850 a year among the Alumni Association, the Placement Bureau, the University Extension Division, and general University purposes, the latter including a present allotment of \$350 to the Registrar's Office. Thus, an additional appropriation of \$1,500 a year would be required. A nonrecurring appropriation also would be necessary for furnishings and for such remodeling and decorating as the Hotel might not be able to furnish, the amount of which should not exceed \$10,000. It is proposed to make the lease for a two-year period with an option of renewal.

All officers concerned have indicated their approval of the location and of the financial plan.

I recommend that the Comptroller be authorized, in conference with the officers concerned, to conclude a lease with the LaSalle Hotel under the conditions mentioned, effective July 1, 1947, or as soon thereafter as the space can be made available, with the understanding that provision for the expense will be included in the internal budget beginning with 1947-1948 and that at a later time a specific request for a nonrecurring appropriation for furnishings and other expense will be submitted.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this lease was authorized as recommended.

SALE OF STOCK RIGHTS

(21) The University holds 45 shares of American Tobacco Company stock on which rights have been issued to subscribe to one share of Common B stock for each five shares of stock held. The First National Bank of Chicago recommends that these rights be sold rather than to increase the holdings in this company, and the Finance Committee concurs in such recommendation.

In order to complete such sale, the approval of the following resolution is necessary:

RESOLUTION REGARDING SALE OF STOCK RIGHTS ON AMERICAN TOBACCO COMPANY STOCK

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is the owner of 45 shares of American Tobacco Company stock and has the right to subscribe to one share of Common B stock of such corporation for each five shares now held, and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees has approved the sale of such stock rights in its meeting of this date.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, and H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, be authorized to execute any and all such documents necessary to complete such sale.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this resolution was adopted as recommended.

PROGRESSIVE ADMISSIONS PLAN

(22) Studies have been made by faculty committees and the other educational and administrative officers concerned to devise ways for utilizing the University's capacities most effectively in the admission of new students in all divisions.

The aim of the officers concerned was to admit all qualified students if any way could be found to achieve this goal, and if not, to suggest a progressive plan of admissions whereby the facilities of the University will be used to best advantage by the students most qualified to use them. The purpose of the plan is not to deny admission to any student. On the contrary, the purpose of the plan is to control admission so that all students will have the best possible chance to enter.

The University has a first obligation to those students now enrolled and in good standing in the colleges at Urbana-Champaign, in the undergraduate divisions in Chicago, and at Galesburg who are ready to transfer to Urbana, and to those enrolled in the University Extension Centers established by thirty-one high schools last year at the request of the University. It also has an obligation to accept former students in good standing who desire to continue their education. All these groups have stronger claims and higher priorities than new students who have not been previously enrolled.

Consequently, the approach to this problem has been to establish the maximum capacities in all divisions, estimating the number of students to whom the University is already committed for 1947-1948, and thus to determine the number of new students who may be admitted. The capacities and the number of new students

who may be admitted are estimated as follows:

Number of new students who can be admitted Capacities in 1947-1948 Urbana-Champaign..... 18 500 5 400 Undergraduate Divisions: 4 000 1 300 Chicago 2 000 Galesburg..... I 400 Chicago Professional Colleges..... I 500¹ 26 000

It has also been determined how the present capacities and facilities for new students can be used most effectively by the several colleges and schools at Urbana-

Champaign.

Subject to the capacities established and to changes in these capacities resulting from student choices for programs of study within each division, every effort will be made to accommodate all qualified students who desire to enroll, but it must be recognized that the demand could easily exceed the facilities available. Hence, the following progressive admissions plan has been adopted, and the Registrar has been authorized to admit new students to the University of Illinois for the first semester of 1947-1948 in accordance with the schedule indicated below:

A. Period I, up to June 15, 1947

1. Veterans (whether entering as freshmen or as transfer students) who are residents of Illinois and who are eligible for admission under the present entrance requirements.

New freshmen — nonveterans who are residents of Illinois and who rank in

the upper twenty-five per cent of their high school graduating class.

3. Transfer students - nonveterans who are residents of Illinois with not less than a 3.5 average in their college work in terms of the grading system of the University of Illinois.

¹ The Chicago Professional Colleges (Medicine, Dentistry, and Pharmacy) with a total capacity of 1,500 are not included in this new admissions plan. The present admissions procedures, especially established for those colleges, will continue in effect.

B. Period II, from June 16 to July 15, 1947

1. Veterans (whether entering as freshmen or as transfer students) who are residents of Illinois and who are eligible under the present entrance requirements.

2. New freshmen - nonveterans who are residents of Illinois and who rank

in the upper fifty per cent of their high school graduating class.

3. New freshmen — nonresidents of Illinois who rank in the upper twentyfive per cent of their high school graduating class, first priority to be given to children of alumni of the University of Illinois.

4. Transfer students — nonveterans who are residents of Illinois with not less than a 3.5 average in their college work in terms of the grading system of the

University of Illinois.

- 5. Transfer students nonresidents of Illinois with not less than a 4.0 average in their college work in terms of the grading system of the University of Illinois. C. Period III, after July 15, 1947
- 1. Veterans (whether entering as freshmen or as transfer students) who are residents of Illinois and who are eligible under the present entrance requirements. 2. New freshmen—all residents of Illinois or graduates of accredited Illinois

high schools who are eligible for admission.

- 3. New freshmen nonresidents of Illinois who rank in the upper twentyfive per cent of their graduating class, first priority to be given to children of alumni of the University of Illinois.
- 4. Transfer students nonveterans who are residents of Illinois with not less than a 3:5 average in their college work in terms of the grading system of the University of Illinois.

5. Transfer students - nonresidents of Illinois with not less than a 4.0 average

in their college work in terms of the grading system of the University of Illinois.

Priority of admission for any group will not extend beyond the dates indicated for that group. For example, credentials received after June 15 but prior to July 15 for a resident of Illinois who ranks in the upper twenty-five per cent of his graduating class will be passed upon along with, but not prior to, credentials received for a student ranking in the upper fifty per cent of his class. To obtain the indicated priority, credentials must be received before the close of the priority period.

The date upon which an applicant's official credentials are received in complete form at the Registrar's Office is considered to be the date of application.

Summer Session of 1947

Permits for new freshmen and transfer students to enter the summer session

of 1947 will be restricted to the following groups:

- (a) Veterans (whether entering as freshmen or as transfer students) who are residents of Illinois and who are eligible for admission under present entrance requirements
- (b) High school graduates who are in the upper twenty-five per cent of their
- (c) Transfer students nonveterans who are residents of Illinois with not less than a 3.5 average in their college work in terms of the grading system of the University of Illinois.
- (d) Transfer students nonresidents of Illinois with not less than a 4.0 average in their college work in terms of the grading system of the University of Illinois.
 - (e) Students who will be registered for the summer session only.

The Provost commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this plan was approved and adopted.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, authority was given to assess a nominal fee for the issuance of a permit to register, to be refunded only in case the candidate completed his registration and entered the University.

ADMISSION OF STUDENTS FROM HIGH SCHOOL **EXTENSION CENTERS**

(23) At its meeting on May 29, 1946 (Minutes, page 1122), the Board of Trustees adopted as item 3 of a four-point emergency educational program, the following: "3. Provide for an expansion of postgraduate work in the high schools.

In accordance with the action of the Board, thirty-one High School Extension Centers have been in operation during the current year, enrolling for the first semester a total of about 3,000 students and for the second semester a total of about 2,000 students.

In the study of facilities in relation to the progressive plan of admissions submitted to the Board, eligible students from the High School Extension Centers have been treated as former students of the University of Illinois, provided they were enrolled in the High School Extension Centers as of September, 1946. Because of first priority granted to former students of the University, and because of limited facilities for taking care of sophomores and especially of juniors and seniors during 1947-1948 and 1948-1949, the University was compelled to announce that new students enrolling in the Extension Centers as of February, 1947, could not be looked upon as former students. In the progressive plan of admissions presented to the Board, such students will be accepted as transfer students.

not be looked upon as former students. In the progressive plan of admissions presented to the Board, such students will be accepted as transfer students.

In making plans for 1947-1948, school boards, superintendents, and principals cooperating with the University of Illinois have been told that the University can no longer look upon new students enrolling in the Extension Centers as former students. The effect of this announcement will be to discontinue the High School Centers in all cases, save those where a surplus of tax funds, the ability to employ additional staff, and the desire to work toward a junior college division make it possible for the high school concerned to operate on its own initiative. Beginning in September, 1947, postgraduate students who elect to go to such high schools will, upon completing their programs in the high schools, have the status of transfer students to the University of Illinois.

Full appreciation has been extended to all the cooperating schools for the splendid work that was done to meet the emergency in 1946. The emergency in 1947 may be even more intense, but the college preparatory character of the programs offered in the High School Extension Centers simply increases the burden on the University of Illinois at the upper-class levels and, since the facilities of these levels will be heavily overtaxed, the University can not afford to create even the moral obligation to provide for more students than already have a claim to admission at the upper-class levels.

The Provost presented this item.

This report was received for record.

APPOINTMENT OF DR. WILBUR SCHRAMM

(24) I recommend the appointment of Dr. Wilbur Schramm, now Director of the School of Journalism at the State University of Iowa, as Director of the University Press, Director of the Institute of Communications Research, with the rank of Research Professor of Journalism, and Assistant to the President, for one year beginning September 1, 1947, at a salary of \$10,000.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was made as recommended.

TAXATION OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY

On request of President Stoddard, Professor Britton made a statement on the problems connected with the taxation of property of the University not used for educational purposes, but for income purposes only.

After discussion, and on motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this matter was referred to the Committee on General Policy for consideration and recommendation.

TREASURER'S ACCEPTANCE AND BOND

The Secretary reported the receipt of the acceptance by Mr. I. L. Porter of the office of Treasurer, and of his bond in the amount of \$3,000,000.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

May 27, 1947



The May meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Abraham Lincoln Hotel, in Springfield, on Tuesday, May 27, 1947, according to the following schedule:

10:30 a.m. - Executive session, as in Committee of the Whole.

12 m. — Open session.

President Stoddard was present; also Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Professor Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and, during part of the day, Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President, and Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board discussed in executive session several matters included in the agenda, and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

PURCHASE OF HOUSING FOR FACULTY

(1) The Board of Trustees has made a number of important appointments to the faculty and more will follow. Most of these people will eventually buy or build homes in Champaign-Urbana, but in the meantime they need to rent homes for a

year or two. Residence properties are for sale but not for rent at this time.

I request that the Board consider the purchase of a limited number of residences for rental to members of the faculty with the view to selling these properties when housing conditions improve sufficiently to warrant disposing of them. In the meantime, we would fix the rents at an appropriate carrying rate. Unless this is done, the University is in danger of losing the services of some of the top-flight men it has recently appointed. In fact, we have made appointments of deans with the understanding that suitable homes may be rented. Thus far, in spite of much

discussion in faculty and community committees, the homes are not to be found.

A preliminary estimate of the maximum amount that might be needed or could be used for this purpose is \$150,000. I recommend that I be given authority to authorize negotiations for the purchase of properties to a total not to exceed this sum and payment for options where necessary, such negotiations when completed to be presented to the Executive Committee for approval and appropriation of necessary funds. I further recommend that the Executive Committee be given authority to approve the purchase of properties made under this proposal.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, authority was given to the President and to the Executive Committee as recommended.

APPOINTMENTS OF FACULTY COUNCIL AND ADVISORY COMMITTEE, INSTITUTE OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

(2) The plan for the organization of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations as approved by the Board of Trustees provides for a Faculty Council to be appointed by the President of the University from the various colleges, schools, and departments of the University which have a part in the Institute and an Advisory Committee chosen from recognized leaders of public life, with equal representation from labor, management, and the public interests.

It was the judgment of the Board that the list should be revised so that it will not include more than one person from any one company or city (except Chicago) and will provide for varying terms for the first appointees, looking toward regular terms of a specified number of years with one or more new members in each group appointed annually.

LAND IN MEDICAL CENTER DISTRICT, CHICAGO

(3) On July 28, 1943 (Minutes, page 450), the Board approved a policy for the purchase of property in the block bounded by Wood, Polk, Taylor, and Hermitage Streets in Chicago, immediately east of the Professional Colleges and Research

Hospital, as such property becomes available.

In the expansion of the Chicago Professional Colleges as approved by the Board on October 22, 1946 (Minutes, page 129), acquisition of land in additional areas in the Medical Center District is essential. Vice-President Ivy and Director Havens recommend that the Board now approve the policy of acquiring property, as it becomes available and as funds are provided, in the area bounded by Wolcott Avenue, Taylor Street, Damon Avenue, and Polk Street. This is an area of two blocks lying west of the Professional Colleges and Research Hospital in which the University already owns some property.

Because of the necessity of prompt action on certain properties, Vice-President Ivy and Director Havens request an appropriation for options and other expenses that have to be met before June 30, 1947. There is included \$300,000 for land in Chicago in the reappropriation capital budget of \$18,631,000 for 1947-1949; and \$500,000 is included in the additional capital budget of \$20,472,000 for the same

I concur in the above recommendations and request:

(a) The approval of property purchases in the area bounded by Wolcott Avenue, Taylor Street, Damon Avenue, and Polk Street.
(b) The appropriation of \$10,000 from the General Reserve Fund for neces-

sary expenditures before June 30 on contracts for such purchases.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were adopted, and the appropriation made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell.

APPOINTMENT OF LOUIS N. RIDENOUR AS PROFESSOR AND DEAN OF THE GRADUATE SCHOOL

(4) I recommend the appointment of Louis N. Ridenour, now Professor of Physics at the University of Pennsylvania, as Professor of Physics on indefinite tenure and as Dean of the Graduate School for two years beginning September 1, 1947, at a total annual salary of \$12,000; provided that if Doctor Ridenour can begin his service prior to September I, the effective date of his appointment will be advanced accordingly. This recommendation is made after consultation with the Executive Faculty of the Graduate School as required in the University of Illinois Statutes.

During the discussion of this matter, Mr. Nickell took his place with

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this appointment was made as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF JOHN M. KUYPERS AS PROFESSOR AND AS DIRECTOR OF THE SCHOOL OF MUSIC

(5) I recommend the appointment of John M. Kuypers, now Professor and Head of the Department of Music at Cornell University, as Professor of Music on indefinite tenure and as Director of the School of Music from July 1, 1947, to August 31, 1949, at a total annual salary of \$8,500. This appointment is unanimously recommended by the Dean of the College of Fine and Applied Arts and a committee of the faculty appointed several months ago to study the qualifications of candidates for this position.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this appointment was made as recommended.

HEARING OF CASE OF OTIS TAYLOR

Professor Britton made an oral report on the proceedings in the case of Otis Taylor, and recommended that the following resolution be adopted:

Be it Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois: That the action of its President Park Livingston in appointing the Advisory Committee for the Division of Nonacademic Personnel, the members of which are: Professor R. N. Sullivan, *Chairman*, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Director C. S. Havens, Professor E. B. McNatt, Professor F. B. Seely, Professor E. W. Lehmann, Professor H. W. Bailey, Dr. E. H. Shideler, Dean E. R. Serles, or any of them, to arrange for a Hearing on the complaint of C. S. Havens, Director of the Physical Plant, and Donald E. Dickason, the Appointing Officer, against Otis Taylor, an employee of the Physical Plant Department of the University of Illinois, in which the Complainants ask that Otis Taylor be discharged for just cause as charged in the Complaint and the Amended Complaint, and on the Answer of the Respondent,

That the action of the Director of Nonacademic Personnel, in extending the period of suspension of Otis Taylor from May 7, 1947, to June 5, 1947, be and

the same is hereby affirmed, ratified, and approved, and

That the suspension of Otis Taylor is hereby continued until terminated by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and

That all actions of the Hearing Committee in calling and conducting the Hearing, in making findings of fact and conclusions of law with respect thereto and reporting their recommendation to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, be and the same are hereby affirmed, ratified, and approved.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this resolution was adopted.

OPEN SESSION

The Board considered in open session the following matters presented by the President of the University.

RETIREMENT OF ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR WILLIA K. GARVER

(1) Miss Willia K. Garver, Associate Professor of Library Science and Assistant University Librarian for Acquisitions, has requested that she be retired from active service on September I, 1947, under the provision in the law creating the University Retirement System of Illinois which permits retirement "on or after the attainment of age sixty-five (65) in exceptional cases and for substantial cause at the request of the Employee and upon certification of the Employer." Professor Garver will be 67 years old next July, and at the end of the current academic year will have been in the service of the University for 28½ years.

I recommend approval and that Miss Garver be retired September 1, 1947, with the rank of Associate Professor *Emerita*.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these recommendations were adopted.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(2) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded the following who have made applications therefor under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943 and who have submitted satisfactory evidence that they hold valid and unrevoked C.P.A. certificates issued by other states on the basis of their having passed the regular written examinations:

PAUL JAMES ADAM (Mo.) FRANK ANTON FURAR (Ohio) JEROME MALEVAN (Mo.) Edward Saunders Reinhard (N.Y.) William Templeton (Ore.) Gerrit Van Deth (N.Y.)

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these certificates were awarded as recommended.

RESIDENCE CLASSIFICATION OF MILITARY PERSONNEL APPLYING FOR ADMISSION TO THE UNIVERSITY

(3) Army and Navy personnel stationed in the vicinity of the University who desire to enroll as students are classified as temporary residents of Illinois for the purpose of assessment of tuition fees, by specific authority of the Board of Trustees (Minutes, August 5, 1941, page 421; October 21, 1941, page 673). The Board has also authorized classifying as temporary residents of Illinois the children of military personnel during the time they are stationed at posts in the State of Illinois regardless of the fact that previous residence may have been outside of Illinois.

Unless otherwise specified by the Board of Trustees, this special residence classification would entitle such persons to all the privileges of residents of Illinois for purposes of registration in the University, including the new priorities of admission approved by the Board under the progressive admissions plan. The Registrar therefore recommends that, except for Army and Navy personnel assigned to the University staff for R.O.T.C. and N.R.O.T.C. duty, the special residence provision for military personnel be discontinued. The residence of such persons will then be determined on the basis of their residence when they entered the service.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this recommendation was adopted.

CHANGES IN SCHEDULES OF FEES AND SCHOLARSHIPS

- (4) The Faculty Committee on Fees and Scholarships submits the following recommendations:
- Adjustment in Student Activities Service Fee Charged Students in the Undergraduate Divisions at Chicago and Galesburg

The Board of Trustees at its meeting on November 22, 1946 (Minutes, page 165), approved a recommendation authorizing the collection from students in the Undergraduate Divisions at Chicago and Galesburg a student activities service fee of \$2 a semester.

To provide athletic participation for students in the undergraduate branches of the University, both Divisions have under consideration a program of intercollegiate and intramural athletics. The Committee on Fees and Scholarships recommends that in order partially to finance this program, the service fee of \$2 a semester in the Undergraduate Divisions at the Pier and at Galesburg be increased to \$4 a semester, effective September I, 1947. This fee is to include admission to all home-ground athletic contests on presentation of student identification cards. The amount collected will be transferred to the Athletic Association, which will finance the entire program.

2. Discontinuation of Matriculation and Graduation Fees and Increase in Laboratory, Library, and Supply Fee

For many years the University has charged a matriculation fee of \$10 payable by every new student, which fee is not refundable. It has also charged, at the

time of graduation, a graduation fee of \$10. Collection of the latter fee involves special entries and accounting in both the Registrar's and Business Offices and therefore adds to administrative expenses.

In line with its previous recommendations for simplification of the fee structure of the University, the Committee on Fees and Scholarships recommends that the matriculation and the graduation fees be discontinued, effective September

I, 1947.

To offset this and provide a suitable adjustment in total fees payable, the Committee further recommends that the laboratory, library, and supply fee of \$5 a semester charged at Urbana-Champaign and at the Undergraduate Divisions in Chicago and at Galesburg be increased to \$8 a semester. This fee would be refundable under the same conditions as tuition fees. Students in extramural courses will also pay the laboratory, library, and supply fee of \$8, except that \$5 of that fee may be waived by the Dean of University Extension where no instructional materials are supplied by the University.

The Committee recommends that in the case of the Chicago Professional Colleges the matriculation and graduation fees be also discontinued, effective September 1, 1947, that the laboratory materials fee charged in those Colleges be changed to "laboratory, library, and service fee," and that the fee be increased by \$6 a year in each college. This additional amount would be refundable to students

withdrawing from the University.

3. Scholarships

(a) Increase in number of University Scholarships. The Illinois State Academy of Science and the Chicago Academy of Sciences are cooperating to extend to Illinois the National Science Talent Search, conducted each year by the Science Clubs of America. During the present year, Illinois had four winners and 13 honorable mentions in the national contest. Of the remaining large group of entrants, many were outstanding students and many were also residents of Illinois. It is from this group that the Illinois State Academy of Science plans to select scholarship winners in Illinois. In view of the rigid basic requirements and the careful judging by both national judges and the State committee, it is felt that the students selected will be highly worthy of consideration for scholarships by colleges and universities in Illinois. The University of Illinois has been asked to consider the possibility of making available one or more scholarships for students selected by the State committee.

On September 27, 1940 (Minutes, page 45), the Board established new undergraduate scholarships known as "University scholarships," the number being limited to ten each year. The Committee recommends that these scholarships be increased by two each year for four years in order to give consideration to providing scholarships for outstanding students recommended by the Illinois State Academy of

(b) Scholarships for foreign students. In April, 1946, the Committee on Fees and Scholarships recommended that the number of scholarships available to foreign students be increased from ten to 25, as of September, 1946, and to 50 as of September, 1947. After consideration of this recommendation, the Board voted to defer any increase in scholarships for foreign students until 1947.

The Committee on Fees and Scholarships recommends that the number of scholarships available to foreign students be increased to 25 as of September, 1947. Members of the Committee are still of the opinion that the reception of as many foreign students as possible would be a genuine contribution to international

good will.

4. No Special Fee for Courses in English for Foreign Students

On September 24, 1946 (Minutes, pages 42-43), when the Board approved the adoption of English requirements for foreign students, it recommended "that the University administration consider the assessment of special fees for courses in English for foreigners.

The Committee on Fees and Scholarships has considered this but recommends that no special fee be assessed for courses in English which are designed for

foreign students.
I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these recommendations were approved

with the exception of Section 3 (b) (foreign scholarships); this matter was referred to the faculty committee for further consideration and recommendation to the Board.

PER DIEM CHARGE FOR SERVICE AT RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITAL

(5) All patients treated in the Research and Educational Hospital are admitted on recommendation of their family physicians. A significant number of the patients carry hospital prepayment insurance. It would appear proper for the University to collect this insurance. The Executive Committee of the Hospital and the Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges have sub-

mitted the following recommendation:

"That patients admitted to the University Research and Educational Hospital may be required to pay an established per diem cost of hospital care and other services, excepting doctors' services, or such proportions thereof as may be properly charged according to a liberal interpretation of their ability to pay, such ability to include coverage of hospital prepayment insurance, similar plans, or other resources; provided, however, that no restriction be placed on the admission of patients without charge when such admission is otherwise indicated.'

To collect this insurance it is necessary for the University to establish a per diem hospital charge for patients, but there will be relatively few occasions for putting it into practice except in cases of insured patients. This proposal has been

approved by the Council of the Chicago Medical Society.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this recommendation was adopted.

CHANGES IN UNIVERSITY CLUB CONTRACT

(6) Pursuant to action of the Board on October 29, 1943, the University executed, effective December 1, 1943, a contract with the University Club of Urbana under which the property was leased to the Club, subject to certain conditions, included in which was the following statement:

"The Club will operate the building and property described in this agreement and make available food service and living quarters thereon, for all of which it

will assume full financial responsibility. . .

Since the execution of the agreement, the Physical Plant Department through the Illini Union Building organization has taken over, on an invoice basis, the janitor service at the request of the Club. This arrangement has proved satisfactory. The Club has now asked that the Physical Plant Department, through the Union Building management, also assume the responsibility for food service at the Club. It is proposed that the Union accept all financial responsibility for the operation, assuming losses and receiving profits resulting from the operation. Such a proposal will necessitate a change in the contract with the University Club.

The acceptance of such a proposal involves the following:
(a) Capital expenditures (equipment) in the amount of approximately \$16,000.

(b) Assumption of possible operating losses. To date the Club has not been able to operate the food service on a self-supporting basis. The best estimate of the operation indicates an annual deficit of approximately \$1,800.

As authorized by the Board on August 31, 1943, the University pays to the Illini Union the service charges for staff members, which the Union concluded it should not attempt to collect. The Union Building, with the increased student enrollment, is unable to serve the demands of the entire faculty and students. It seems reasonable, therefore, in view of the lack of adequate facilities in the Union Building for use by staff members, that the Union assume, at least on a trial basis, the responsibility for operating the food service at the University Club, as requested.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend:

(1) That the contract with the University Club be amended to place responsibility for food service at the Club on the University through the Illini Union, subject to termination at the end of any University year.

(2) Authorization of the expenditure of approximately \$16,000 for necessary

equipment from the surplus funds of the Illini Union.

I concur in these recommendations and request authorization of the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board to execute the necessary addendum to the University Club contract.

After discussion, this matter was referred to a special committee, consisting of Mr. Fornof, Mr. Williamson, and Mr. McKelvey, for consideration and recommendation to the Board.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL CONNECTIONS AT UNIVERSITY AIRPORT

(7) The University has a contract with Hecker and Company, Inc., for the installation of an electrical distribution system at the University of Illinois Airport.

The Director of the Institute of Aeronautics and the Director of the Physical Plant Department request an increase of \$4,292 in this contract to cover additional work necessary to provide electrical connections to (1) a brick residence and garage; (2) a frame residence and old well house; (3) new well house;—all at the Airport. This was not included in the original contract as authorized by the Board of Trustees on October 18, 1945 (Minutes, page 874).

Funds are available and the work can be completed by August 31, 1947. The

Comptroller recommends approval of this increase. I concur.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this increase in contract was authorized as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR DRAWINGS AND CONSULTING SERVICES IN CONSTRUCTION OF BETATRON

(8) Engineering services are needed in the preparation of the design and working drawings for the betatron, the principal item of equipment in the new Physics Research Laboratory. The Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, is qualified to do this work satisfactorily because of its wide experience in building heavy electrical equipment and the excellent engineering work of that company on the 20-million-volt betatron developed during the war.

This company has estimated that the cost of making the detailed design of the principal parts of the 300-million-volt betatron, following specifications determined from calculations and work on models by the Physics Department, is \$35,000, but the company has proposed a contract which can be increased by not more than 30 per cent if the costs run above the stated figure, and which would be reduced if the costs are less.

The contract will cover consulting services in the design of the betatron; the preparation of detailed working drawings; consulting services during erection of the betatron; and in the interpretation of the drawings or alterations of design and drawings, if necessary. It will not cover cost of fabrication and erection.

Professor F. W. Loomis, Head of the Department of Physics, Professor Donald W. Kerst, inventor of the betatron, Dean M. L. Enger of the College of Engineering, and Comptroller Lloyd Morey recommend acceptance of this offer as a basis for a contract. I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract along the general lines indicated herein, subject to approval of the contract by the Legal Counsel as well as the other officers mentioned above.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was authorized.

STRUCTURAL STEEL AND CELLULAR FLOOR SYSTEM FOR NEW FINE ARTS BUILDING

(9) The following bids have been received for fabrication and delivery of structural steel and for the cellular floor system for the new Fine Arts Building:

Only one bid was received for the cellular floor system, as this is a patented construction, available only from the H. H. Robertson Company.

These bids have been checked and are considered satisfactory. They contain a 30-day acceptance clause, extending from the bid opening date, after which the

bids may be withdrawn by the bidders.

The Physical Plant Department recommends immediate award of contracts to the Midland Structural Steel Co., the lower bidder for structural steel on the basis of the lump sum quotation at \$62,713, and to the H. H. Robertson Co. for the

cellular floor system on the basis of the bid of \$42,942.

I concur in these recommendations and request authority for the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute the contracts as recommended, subject to release of funds, a request for which has been submitted to the Governor.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these contracts were authorized.

STRUCTURAL STEEL FOR PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT ADDITION

(10) The following bids have been received for furnishing and delivering of fabricated structural steel for the Physical Environment Unit of the Research and Educational Hospital in Chicago:

Although the Bethlehem Steel Company's bid (\$.0818 a pound) is slightly lower than that of the Duffin Iron Company, the architects recommend that the award be made to the Duffin Iron Company, based on their delivery date of 150 days, or approximately October 1, if the contract is awarded immediately. The Bethlehem Steel Company delivery date is December 31, approximately three months later. The Physical Plant Department approves the recommendations of the architects.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract as soon as funds are available. This recommendation will involve a total encumbrance of \$11,800, based on an estimate of 72 tons. A request has been submitted to the Governor for the release of the entire appropriation for this project.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these recommendations were adopted.

NEW SMOKESTACKS FOR TEMPORARY HOUSES

(11) During the entire period of operating the temporary veterans' housing units there has been trouble with the metal smokestacks. Last fall some of the stacks were replaced with stacks designed to eliminate the trouble, but results have not been satisfactory.

The Physical Plant Department has concluded that it is necessary to construct stacks with vitreous enamel exterior. Only one proposal has been secured—

from the Gas Service Company of Champaign.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends the award of a contract for \$3,681 for the replacement of 275 smokestacks within the budgets established and approved by FPHA for repairs, maintenance, and replacements under this project.

I concur and request authority for the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board to complete such a contract.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, authority was granted as recommended.

RELEASE OF FUNDS FROM STATE-WIDE PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS APPROPRIATION

(12) Governor Dwight H. Green has authorized the release of funds from the appropriation made to the University of Illinois by the 64th General Assembly in the "Act making appropriations for a State-wide system of public works projects, including all ordinary and contingent expenses relating thereto," as follows:

Release No. 361

"For construction of Mechanical Engineering Building and equipment..\$1 102 000" Amount released (to be used as designated in the title for this item)...

Release No. 377

"For construction of Fine Arts Building and equipment...... \$ 740 000" Amount released (to be used as designated in the title for this item)...

I recommend that these funds be appropriated by the Board of Trustees for the expenditures specified in the releases.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these funds were appropriated as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson: no, none: absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer.

PURCHASE OF ILLINOIS TERMINAL RAILWAY COMPANY RIGHT-OF-WAY

(13) On November 22, 1946 (Minutes, page 164), the Board authorized the purchase of a part of the right-of-way of the Illinois Terminal Railway Company within the campus which has become available as a result of the discontinuance of the use of the track through this right-of-way. At that time the University purchased all the land that was offered to it. It now develops that an additional tract of a total area of 12,740 square feet can be purchased at a price of \$1,000. The land extends from the west line of Harvey Street about halfway to Gregory Avenue in Urbana. The land is needed for additional storage space adjacent to the present Physical Plant yard.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend this purchase. I concur and request an appropriation of \$1,000 from the

General Reserve Fund to meet the cost.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this purchase was authorized and the appropriation made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer.

PURCHASE OF AIRCRAFT AND AVIATION INSURANCE

(14) The Purchasing Agent recommends the purchase of aircraft and aviation

insurance effective July 1, 1947, for one year as follows:

Aircraft Insurance—Liberty Mutual Insurance Company of Chicago, the lowest bidder, with a bid of \$2,037.80, less 20 per cent at the termination of the

policy, or a net premium of \$1,630.24.

Aviation Insurance - Associated Aviation Underwriters of Chicago, represented by H. R. Bresee Agency, Champaign, one of the lowest bidders, at a premium of \$3,293.80. However, Bresee requires no deposit premium for the admitted liability (accident insurance to University members), while the others make such requirement.

The aircraft insurance covers the following:

A. Hull coverage, including all-risk insurance on the planes, covering against fire, lightning, windstorm, hail, and so forth, while the plane is on the ground. Also, coverage against fire to the plane while in flight. Coverage includes the plane, its instruments, and equipment ordinarily attached thereto.

B. Hangar keepers' legal liability, covers the University's legal liability for any aircraft in the care or custody of the University, damaged or destroyed by fire, windstorm, land damage, theft, and so forth. This does not cover the actual loss occasioned by the elements but only the University's legal liability.

The aviation insurance covers the following:

A. Aircraft liability for any accident caused by the operation of aircraft both on and off the premises, owned, leased, or operated by the insured, covering bodily injury with \$50/250 limits and property damage to the extent of \$50,000. Also includes admitted liability in the amount of \$5,000, covering all members of the University of Illinois who may ride in an aircraft.

B. Airport liability for accidents occurring on the University's premises and adjoining ways by reason of accidents resulting from the use, maintenance, and control of the premises, covering bodily injury liability with \$50/250 limits and

property damage to the extent of \$50,000.

C. Products' liability, covering the sale of defective gas, oil, and so forth; also improper repairs and service of parts, to the extent of \$50/250 public liability and \$50,000 property damage.

D. Accident insurance for student flyers, in the principal amount of \$3,000,

with medical benefits of \$500.

The Comptroller recommends approval and has submitted the proposal to the Finance Committee, which has indicated its approval. Confirmation by the Board is requested.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the purchase of this insurance was authorized as recommended.

PURCHASE OF BUILDERS' RISK INSURANCE ON WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL

(15) The Purchasing Agent recommends the purchase of builders' risk insurance, including fire, estimated coverage, vandalism, and malicious mischief, on the women's residence hall now under construction, from the following four lowest bidders:

The above companies meet our requirements and quote identically low vandalism rates. Lumbermen's is the only mutual company quoting on this risk that will accept a full one-quarter of the risk.

The amount of insurance is based on an ultimate valuation of \$3,200,000, completion estimated at September 1, 1948, with any unearned premium to be cancelled on a short rate basis. The earned premium is to be calculated on an estimated insurable valuation of \$2,800,000.

Under its usual contracts with builders, the University carries such insurance. This is more advantageous than requiring various contractors to carry the insurance and including it in their cost charges to the University.

The Comptroller has recommended approval and has submitted the proposal to the Finance Committee, which has indicated its approval. Confirmation by the Board is requested.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the purchase of this insurance was authorized as recommended.

APPROPRIATION FOR MILITARY STABLES REPAIR AND REPLACEMENT OF EQUIPMENT DAMAGED BY FIRE

(16) The Military Stables on the south campus were constructed by the University in 1919-1922 (the inventory value as of June 30, 1946, was \$48,690) to house horses assigned to the University of Illinois for the training of students in the Cavalry and Field Artillery Units of the Reserve Officers Training Corps. Several years ago when the Cavalry and Field Artillery were mechanized, the horses were removed. A part of the Stables was assigned to the Chemical Engineering Division of the Department of Chemistry during the war for use in research work on military problems for the United States Office of Scientific Research and Development. The rest of the building was used for storage. Since the war the Chemical Engineering Division has continued to use part of the building for graduate research work.

Early in the morning of April 30 a fire originated in the northeast wing in the space assigned to Chemical Engineering. The fire apparently originated in or around equipment used in the development of a new sulphur burner. Other sections of the building were also seriously damaged. They had been used for the temporary storage of furniture received from the Federal Public Housing Authority, storage of materials purchased in connection with the Physics Research Laboratory, and general storage.

The north unit and connecting center area are a complete loss and in the judgment of the Director of the Physical Plant Department, in which the Professor of Military Science has concurred, the University would not be justified in expending funds for rebuilding this unit now, although at some future time expenditures may be necessary to provide housing for mechanized equipment. He estimates the cost of repairs and replacements necessary as follows:

Repairs to and replacement of housing equipment.....\$ Replacement of doors and other construction materials purchased for the Physics Research Laboratory..... Replacement of insulating materials purchased for temporary warehouse being constructed as a Federal Works Agency Removal of north section of Stables and repairs to south unit.. 14 800

The Director recommends that:

I. The south unit be repaired to the extent necessary for its use as a warehouse; and that the north and center units not be rebuilt.

2. The cost of replacing the destroyed and damaged materials purchased for the Physics Research Laboratory be charged against funds for the construction of that building.

3. The repairs and replacement of the temporary housing equipment be charged against the State appropriation for student housing.

4. A special appropriation of \$15,325 be made for (a) removal of debris and reconstruction of south unit, and (b) replacement of insulating material purchased for the temporary warehouse.

Losses of chemical research equipment will be charged against Government funds provided for the research programs for which the equipment was being used. Contracts with the Government provide allowances for indirect costs of such projects and these funds are available to apply on the loss.

I concur in these recommendations, including the appropriation requested.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these recommendations were approved and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer.

FIELD OFFICE FOR SMALL HOMES COUNCIL

(17) The Small Homes Council was established by the Board of Trustees in September, 1944, to coordinate the resources of the several divisions of the University and focus their research and other services on the small home problem. In May, 1045, the Board authorized setting up a "Home Research Center" for demonstration and experimentation. On June 30, 1945, a special appropriation of \$50,000 was made by the Board for the Home Research Center of the Small Homes Council; \$20,500 was assigned for the purchase of property, and the balance was set aside as a reserve for purchase of other properties and to develop the physical services such as drainage, drives, and other improvements required for the construction of the first technical research homes.

These funds have been used for some of the purposes indicated and there remains approximately \$17,000. The Coordinator of the Small Homes Council requests the use of this balance for the construction of a field office for the Small Homes Council and a research house. The field office has been designed to provide facilities for the advancement of housing research, not as quarters for the Small Homes Council. Plans have been prepared for an attractive, efficient, service-type building which is not of permanent construction and which can be erected in a short time.

I recommend that the Board authorize the use of the remaining funds in the appropriation for the Home Research Center for the construction of a field office and another research house.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the use of these funds was approved for the purposes requested.

CHANGES IN THE BUDGET OF THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(18) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association requests approval of

the following actions:

1. An appropriation of \$6,752 to cover the cost of rehabilitating and strengthening all of the bleachers owned and used by the Athletic Association on the campus to bring them up to the minimum specifications set by the committee appointed by President Stoddard, the contract for the work to be awarded to the Leavitt Manufacturing Company, from whom most of the bleachers were purchased.

2. An appropriation of \$2,000 for the Intramural Festival, which was a combination of the intramural activities for the Galesburg Division, Chicago Undergraduate Division and the Medical College, and the Champaign-Urbana

- 3. An appropriation of \$1,250 for the intramural and intercollegiate activities at the Galesburg Division. The original appropriation for this purpose was in the amount of \$750 and was intended to cover only the intramural activity. The additional appropriation is necessary to cover the cost of the intercollegiate activities, particularly basketball, and will bring the total amount appropriated to \$2,000, which is approximately the same as that appropriated for athletic activities in Chicago.
- 4. An appropriation of \$3,000 to the Alumni Association for the services rendered to the Athletic Association by the Field Secretary of the Alumni Association during the fiscal year 1946-1947.

The above actions have been reviewed by the Comptroller, and he submits them for approval. I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these changes in the budget of the Athletic Association were approved.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

(21) The Comptroller presents his quarterly report to the Board as of March 31, 1947. Copies of this report have been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting.

EMERGENCY LOAN FUNDS

(22) The Finance Committee has authorized the Comptroller, as an emergency measure, to transfer from long-term loan funds to emergency loan funds any balances necessary to provide for the demand for emergency loans. Such authorization permits the transfer of any student loan funds, except those in which the deed of gift prohibits such action, and makes available approximately \$150,000 for such purposes if there is sufficient demand for such amount.

On September 30, 1936, the Board authorized the transfer of \$10,000 from long-term loan funds which, together with several small loan funds given specifically for emergency purposes, has until recently been adequate. Due to the de-lays experienced by veterans in receiving subsistence checks from the Veterans Administration, at times the demand for the emergency loan service maintained in the Bursar's Office becomes unusually heavy. Experience shows that such loans are almost without exception paid promptly when the subsistence checks are received, within 60 to 90 days after the loan is made.

The demand for long-term loans is at present negligible, and approximately only 12 per cent of the funds administered at Urbana are lent to students, the balance being invested in government bonds or carried as cash.

Confirmation of this action is requested.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the action of the Finance Committee in transferring these funds was approved and confirmed.

CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF SUB-STRUCTURE OF POWER PLANT ADDITION

(23) The following bids have been received on the sub-structure of the Power Plant Addition: Kuhne-Simmons Company, \$56,825; John Felmley Company, \$61,600. Both are firm bids, and the contractors state that they can start work 10 days after the award of the contract and complete the work in 15 weeks.

Funds are available for this work. The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends the award of the contract to the Kuhne-Simmons Company

in the amount of \$56,825. I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute such a contract.

REPLACEMENT OF RESEARCH FACILITIES IN CHEMICAL ENGINEERING

(25) The fire at the Military Stables on April 30 (see page 371) destroyed facilities which were used for research work under a contract with the United States Navy. New facilities for this project must be found. It is proposed that space for this be provided in a new building to be erected as an extension to one of the Quonset Huts which is being constructed for the Department of Aeronautical Engineering at the University Airport. This location is desirable because:

1. The nature of the work on this contract is closely related to the research in Aeronautical Engineering. Much of the equipment that is needed by the two research groups can be used in common. The Navy is furnishing a large part of the equipment for our contract. The facilities that are being installed by Aeronautical Engineering in the new building will provide us with a greater supply of high pressure air than we can obtain at any place on the campus because of limitations

in electrical power.

2. A part of the program on this contract will require work at supersonic velocities and will produce a noise of high intensity that may be objectionable in the residential areas.

3. By planning an extension to the new building before construction is started, the additional cost will be held to a minimum and the University will be able to supply facilities for work on the contract without a major expenditure of funds. When the work on the Navy contract is terminated, the additional space will be useful to the Department of Aeronautical Engineering.

Dr. H. F. Johnstone, Professor of Chemical Engineering, who is in charge of this research, requests that \$12,000 be assigned from funds accumulated under Government contracts covering research in Chemical Engineering for the construction and equipment of an extension to the Aeronautical Research Laboratory at the University Airport. The building itself will cost approximately \$7,000 and the extension of utilities (electric power, heat, water, telephone) will cost approximately \$7,000.

It is further proposed that the purchase of the additional building be made in conjunction with buildings for Aeronautical Engineering authorized by the Board on April 24. This plan is approved by Professor Roger Adams, Head of the Department of Chemistry, Professor H. S. Stillwell, Head of the Department of Aeronautical Engineering, and Director L. A. Bryan of the Institute of Aeronautics.

DISPOSAL OF STOCK RIGHTS IN PACIFIC GAS AND ELECTRIC COMPANY STOCK

(26) The University is the owner of 100 shares of Pacific Gas and Electric Company common stock. Rights are being issued to subscribe for one additional share common stock for each 10 shares held and thus the University will receive rights to subscribe to 10 additional shares. The First National Bank of Chicago recommends that the rights, currently selling at around \$1 a share, be sold, and the Comptroller concurs.

Authorization to sell such rights and approval of the following resolution is requested:

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is the owner of

100 shares of Pacific Gas & Electric Company common stock and has the right to subscribe to one share of stock for each 10 shares of stock held, and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees has approved the sale of such stock rights in

its meeting of May 27,

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, and H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, be authorized to execute any and all documents necessary to complete such sale.

The University often receives rights to subscribe to common stock held and very often the Investment Counsel recommends that such rights be sold. The selling price is usually nominal. In order to complete sale of such rights, a resolution of the Board is necessary, and present procedures are such that a separate resolution must be approved for each such sale. It is requested that the Board approve a blanket resolution authorizing the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board to execute all documents necessary to complete the sale of stock rights so received. This authority is requested with the limitation that it is to be used only for the sale of stock rights after such sale has been recommended by the Investment Counsel and approved by the Finance Committee of the Board and only in those cases where the amount to be received as the result of such sale does not exceed \$1,000.

If such action is authorized, the following blanket resolution should be approved:

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, as the owner of shares of stock of corporations, becomes the recipient of rights issued to stockholders of such corporations to subscribe to other shares of stock in such corporations, and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees wishes to delegate to its Secretary and Comp-

troller the authority to sell such rights to subscribe,

Therefore, be it resolved, that any of the persons now or hereafter holding the offices of Secretary and Comptroller of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be, and they hereby are, fully authorized and empowered to transfer, endorse, sell, assign, and deliver any and all rights to subscribe to shares of stock now or hereafter standing in the name of or owned by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and to make, execute, and deliver, under the corporate seal of this Corporation, any and all written instruments of assignment and transfer necessary or proper to effectuate the authority hereby conferred.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these resolutions were adopted and authority given as recommended.

ADDITIONAL STATE BUILDING APPROPRIATION REQUESTS

(27) A recommendation that the amounts provided in the schedule of revised capital appropriation requests approved April 24, 1947 (Minutes, page 339), for the addition to the Research and Educational Hospital and Equipment (\$5,800,000) and Experimental Research Building (\$500,000) on the Chicago campus be reconsidered and distributed as follows: Chronic Illness and Geriatrics Research Hospital and Equipment, \$2,500,000; Cancer Detection, Treatment, and Research Hospital and Equipment, \$3,800,000. The total remains the same.

Dr. Ivy discussed this recommendation.

HEARING OF CASE OF OTIS TAYLOR

Professor Britton presented the report of the Hearing Committee (Professor R. N. Sullivan, Professor H. W. Bailey, and Professor F. B. Seely) in the proceedings for the discharge of Otis Taylor from the University of Illinois Civil Service.

Conclusion of law: The Committee concludes that the unjustified striking of Walter Kieback by Otis Taylor constitutes just cause for discharge from the classified civil service of the State in relation to the University of Illinois.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

June 23, 1947



The June meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, on Monday, June 23, 1947, according to the following schedule:

12 m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

3 p.m. — Open session.

Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and, during part of the day, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meetings of April 24 and May 27, 1947.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 333 to 386 above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board discussed in executive session several matters included in the agenda, and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

RESEARCH HOUSES AND FIELD OFFICE FOR SMALL HOMES COUNCIL

(1) A report of action of the Executive Committee, pursuant to authorization by the Board on April 24, 1947 (page 341), and May 27, 1947 (page 372), awarding contracts to lowest bidders and authorizing the Comptroller and the Secretary to execute contracts as follows:

General work on six research houses in staff housing project to Mr. R. E.

Worsham for \$5,700.

General work on field office and slab laboratory to C. A. Petry & Sons for \$12,060.

General work on one research house to C. H. Siems for \$870.

This report was received for record.

TRAINING OF TEACHERS OF AGRICULTURE

(2) On October 20, 1939, the President of the University informed the Board of Trustees that two of the state teachers colleges had announced intentions to establish courses in agriculture that would meet State and Federal requirements for Smith-Hughes teacher-training. Existing facilities at the University of Illinois were amply sufficient at that time and still are to meet the demand for Smith-Hughes teachers. The Board of Trustees requested the President of the University to inform the Governor and the members of the State Board for Vocational Education that the Board considered the proposed expansion an unnecessary duplication of educational offerings (Minutes, October 20, 1939, pages 642-644).

Recently the State Board for Vocational Education has approved such work

for the Illinois State Normal University.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees again recognize the priority of the University of Illinois for teacher-training in vocational agriculture, and that the President of the University be authorized to address letters of protest on behalf of the Board to the Governor, to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, to each of the members of the State Board for Vocational Education, and to each of the presidents of the teachers colleges and normal universities.

The reasons for this request are contained in Exhibits A, B, and C (see

After full discussion, and on motion of Dr. Meyer, the Board reaffirmed its opposition to the dilution and weakening of agricultural education in the State of Illinois that would follow the unnecessary duplication of the program of the University in the state teachers colleges and normal universities, and authorized the President of the University to take measures to oppose the proposal, including presentation of the position of the University to the State Teachers College Board and the State Board for Vocational Education.

PURCHASE OF RESIDENCE PROPERTIES FOR STAFF HOUSING

(3) The Board of Trustees on May 27, 1947, authorized the purchase of a limited number of residence properties in Urbana-Champaign for rental, possibly for resale eventually, to administrative officers who have recently been appointed. All these houses are suitable for occupancy by University officials. In addition, the first two have the advantage of being in areas which the University needs to

acquire for future expansion.

The purchase prices of the first two have been checked by Newton C. Farr of Chicago, who is retained as consultant for this purpose and who personally inspected them. Appraisals have been secured on the other three by independent Urbana-Champaign real estate experts. I recommend the purchase of these properties and that an appropriation of \$125,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be made from the General Reserve Fund to cover the purchases and expenses incidental thereto, including the University's share of taxes. I also request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to conclude contracts for the purchase of these properties, the University to secure possession not later than September 1, 1947.

In approving this program on May 27, 1947 (page 362), the Board of Trustees authorized a total investment of \$150,000. It is recommended that the Executive Committee be authorized to purchase one additional house and that an appropriation of \$25,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary, be made from the

General Reserve Fund for this purchase.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these recommendations were approved and adopted. The appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. Williamson.

PLANS FOR RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITAL ADDITION

(4) The revised schedule of new capital appropriations requested for the biennium of 1947-1949, as approved by the Board on April 24, 1947, included an item of \$5,800,000 for an addition to the Research and Educational Hospital and equipment. The plans and working drawings for this addition have been under way and are nearing completion. The total cost of the plans to date is \$220,075. To complete them will cost \$12,400 more.

On recommendation of the Vice-President in Charge of the Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, and Pharmacy, the Board of Trustees has approved a revision of the new appropriation for buildings on the Chicago campus to include

provisions for the following:

Chronic Illness and Geriatrics Research Hospital and Equipment......\$2 500 000 Cancer Detection, Treatment, and Research Hospital and Equipment.... 3 800 000

The addition to the General Hospital would be postponed. The total of the appropriations for the Chicago Colleges remains the same, \$13,000,000.

Inasmuch as the plans for the General Hospital are so near completion, it is recommended that we expend the additional sum of \$12,400 for this purpose. It is my understanding that the General Hospital will still be needed.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this expenditure was authorized as recommended.

LEGAL SERVICES IN MILLIGAN CONDEMNATION SUIT

(5) The Henry I. Green Law Office has rendered a bill for services and expenses in the condemnation suit for the Milligan property in Urbana, in the amount of \$3,516.73. The Legal Counsel advises that he considers the bill satisfactory. The Director of the Physical Plant advises that land appropriations are insufficient to cover it and requests a special appropriation from the General Reserve Fund.

I recommend approval of the bill and an appropriation for it.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this bill was approved as recommended, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr.

Meyer, Mr. Nickell; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. Mc-Kelvey, Mr. Williamson.

PURCHASE OF CLARK PROPERTY

The Legal Counsel reviewed the negotiations by the University for the purchase of the following properties owned by Alice V. B. Clark:

The North half (N½) of the East Eighty-five (E 85) feet of Lot Eleven (11) in W. M. Goodwin's Addition to Urbana in Champaign County, Illinois;

The South half (S½) of the East Eighty-five (E 85) feet of Lot Eleven (11)

in W. M. Goodwin's Addition to Urbana in Champaign County, Illinois.

Mr. Chancy L. Finfrock, an Urbana attorney, is the Conservator of Alice
V. B. Clark and of her estate. Negotiations, over a period of some months, for the acquisition of these properties, have been conducted with the Conservator. A committee, appointed by the County Court of Champaign County, appraised the two properties at \$40,000. It is recommended that the Board of Trustees authorize an offer of \$38,000 to the Conservator for both properties as set forth in the Proposal herewith submitted to the Board of Trustees.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the Board approved this Proposal and authorized the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to submit the same to the Conservator as its offer to buy the properties on the terms therein stated.

CASE OF OTIS TAYLOR

The Secretary reported that he had received the objections to the findings, conclusions of law, and recommendations of the Hearing Committee in the case of Otis Taylor (Minutes, May 27, 1947, page 380), had referred the objections to the Legal Counsel, and had received the answer of the Legal Counsel to the objections.

Professor Britton discussed this matter, which was referred to the Committee on Civil Service and Employees for consideration and recommendation to be made to the Board at the next meeting.

INSTALLATION OF PRESIDENT STODDARD

Dr. Meyer, for the Special Committee on the Installation of the President (Dr. Meyer, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof), presented the following report.

The Chairman of the General Committee on the Installation of the President has submitted an estimate of \$28,500 as the total cost of all the ceremonies. These include the professional conferences at the Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, and Pharmacy, the convocation and functions at the Chicago Undergraduate Division (Navy Pier), the formal installation ceremony at Urbana, the symposium on higher education at Urbana, and the reception for visiting delegates and other official guests at Robert Allerton Park. The figure also includes the cost of the first edition of the Robert Allerton Park brochure which was distributed to the guests at the reception, and an estimate of \$2,000 for the publication of the proceedings of the entire installation. The Board of Trustees made a preliminary appropriation of \$10,000, so that a supplementary appropriation of \$18,500 is necessary.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. Williamson.

OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened in open session, the following members were present: President Livingston, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson.

The same officers were present as during the executive session.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE 1947 SUMMER SESSION

- (1) There is submitted for approval recommendations from the Dean of the Summer Session for appointments to the teaching staff for the 1947 Summer Session. This budget provides for a 16-week session at Urbana, an 8-week session at the Galesburg and the Chicago Undergraduate Divisions, and for some graduate teaching in the College of Pharmacy. Salaries recommended have been computed as follows:
- I. For 12-month appointees, it is proposed that a base amount of 1/48 of the annual salary be paid for each week of teaching.

2. For appointees on tenure of less than 12 months a base monthly salary is

proposed equal to that paid during the regular session.

3. The maximum salary of \$1,200 for eight weeks' service was used as a basis for calculating maximum compensation for assignments other than eight weeks. (This maximum was approved by the Board of Trustees on December 28, 1946, page 198.)

4. A minimum salary of \$275 for half time for eight weeks and \$550 for full time for eight weeks is proposed, this minimum to be used as a basis for computing

the minimum compensation for assignments other than eight weeks.

The total of the proposed appointments is \$783,829. This exceeds the amount allotted in the internal budget for 1947-1948 by \$188,370. The Dean of the Summer Session requests an appropriation of \$190,000 to cover the deficiency and to make other minor adjustments which may be necessary. I recommend that:

I. The appointments for the Summer Session be approved as submitted (for

list, see page 452).

2. All appointments or contracts for service during the Summer Session include a provision permitting reduction in time and salary or cancellation of the contract in the event that enrollment in certain courses or sections thereof does not warrant continuation of the appointment on the basis originally recommended.

3. An appropriation of \$190,000 be made from the University General Reserve Fund to the budget of the Summer Session.

4. The President of the University be authorized to make such changes and adjustments, including additional appointments and acceptance of resignations, as are necessary in accordance with the needs of the University.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this program was approved and authorized. The appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. Nickell.

EXEMPTION OF STAFF MEMBERS FROM PAYMENT OF TUITION FEES

(2) By authority of the Board of Trustees, members of the University staff and of the staffs of allied surveys and laboratories on the University campus in the lower salary brackets, and scholars and fellows in the Graduate School, are permitted to take graduate work without payment of tuition, laboratory, library, and supply fees.

The Board of Trustees has specified from time to time the salary rates to which the exemption will apply. At present the exemption applies to staff members receiving annual salaries of \$1,800 or less. A new minimum salary for full-time assistants of \$2,400 has been established. I therefore recommend the feeexemption regulations be amended to read as follows:

"Persons on the academic and administrative staffs of the University in any capacity, or who are on scholarship or fellowship appointment in the Graduate School, or who are on permanent employment on the nonacademic staff, may

¹ Teaching faculty whose services are required during the two semesters of the academic year (September-June) but whose salaries are paid in twelve monthly installments.

register in University courses for which they are eligible for admission without payment of the tuition fee and the laboratory, library, and supply fee, provided their annual salary is \$2,400 or less.'

I recommend that this become effective immediately so that it will apply to the 1947 Summer Session. This is desirable because the supplementary salary adjustments made effective as of September 1, 1946, affect the status of regular University employees who are now registered in the Summer Session.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the regulations were amended as recommended.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION IN THE SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM

(3) The University Senate recommends that Section (2) of the requirements for

graduation from the School of Journalism be amended to read as follows:

"(2) complete 64 semester hours of work in a curriculum in the School of Journalism including not less than 30 nor more than 40 hours of credit in professional courses of junior-senior level, and the balance in social studies, arts, sciences, and other subjects approved by the faculty.'

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this recommendation was adopted.

ADMISSION TO THE COLLEGE OF LAW

(4) Limitations of classroom and laboratory facilities make it necessary to limit the enrollment in the College of Law according to the following plan:

I. Applicants must file requests for admission on forms furnished by the College not less than sixty days before the opening of the term to which admission

is sought.

2. In selecting the persons to be admitted, preference will be given to applicants demonstrating the greatest ability, to veterans, and to residents of the State of Illinois. Nonresident applicants to be considered must present outstanding scholastic records.

The University Senate recommends that the Board of Trustees adopt the

following requirements for admission to the College of Law.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

Applicants to be eligible to apply for admission must have achieved a grade average of 3.5 in all college work taken and must meet the following quantitative requirements:

1. For admission to the four-year curriculum: The completion in residence of one-half the number of hours required for a bachelor's degree at the University of Illinois or one-half the number of hours required for a bachelor's degree in a college approved by the University.

2. For admission to the three-year curriculum: Graduation from, or senior standing in, a college of the University of Illinois or a college approved by the

University.

SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS APPLYING TO VETERANS

A veteran is defined, for purposes of admission, as one who has had active service since September 16, 1940, in the Armed Forces of the United States or one of its co-belligerents, and has been released or discharged therefrom under conditions other than dishonorable.

I. In meeting the general requirements stated above, a veteran who applies

for admission

(a) may count credit acceptable to the University of Illinois, based on an evaluation of educational experience, general educational development, and correspondence work taken while in the Armed Forces, provided that the applicant for admission has completed one academic year of work in residence in the University of Illinois or in a college approved by the University;

(b) will be permitted to disregard the grades in work passed before entering the service, provided that he has completed at least one academic year of college

work after release from service with a grade average of at least 4.0.

2. A veteran may also apply for admission to the three-year curriculum on satisfying all the following requirements:

(a) Active service for at least twelve months during the period of active

hostilities;

(b) Attendance in residence for a period of two academic years in a college of the University of Illinois or in a college approved by the University, and the completion in residence of one-half of the number of hours required for a bachelor's degree by the institution attended; and

(c) Attainment of a grade average in college work of at least 4.0.

In meeting the requirements of 2 (a) and 2 (b) above, the period a veteran was assigned for a course of education or training under the Army Specialized Training Program or the Navy College Training Program or as a cadet or midshipman in one of the service academies may be counted in satisfaction of either the requirement for resident study in an approved college or university or the requirement of one year of active military or naval service, but not both.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were adopted.

MASTER OF FINE ARTS

(5) The Executive Faculty of the Graduate School and the University Senate recommend the establishment of the degree of Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A.).

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this degree was established as recommended.

CHANGE IN REQUIREMENT FOR ADMISSION TO UNDERGRADUATE COLLEGES

(6) On January 23, 1943 (Minutes, page 240), the Board of Trustees approved a recommendation from the University Senate that the requirements for admission to the undergraduate colleges be amended to permit the admission of selected pupils who had achieved senior standing in high school prior to their graduation from high school. This was adopted as a war emergency measure to permit students of superior scholarship to secure a year or more of college training before going into military service.

The reasons for this special provision no longer exist, and the University

Senate recommends that it be rescinded.

I concur

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this provision was rescinded as recommended.

MINIMUM UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP REQUIREMENTS

- (7) The University Senate recommends the adoption of the following minimum University scholarship requirements. These regulations, in so far as they affect graduation, shall apply to all students who enter the University after October 1, 1947, and as they affect probation, to all students registered in the University after that date. They are being reported to the Board as a matter of information and for record.
- I. Graduation Requirement: A minimum average of 3.0 shall be required for graduation from all curricula.

2. Probation: If at the end of any semester a student's average for that semester falls below 3.0, he shall be placed on probation for the following semester.

- 3. Continuance in the University: If at the end of a semester on probation a student's average for the semester is 3.0 or above, he shall be removed from probation unless the college in which he is registered requires a higher average for removal from probation. If his average is below 3.0, he shall be dropped from the University.
- 4. Rules for Computing Averages: All letter grades received by the student at the end of the semester shall be used in computing the averages for the probation rules (A=5.0; B=4.0; C=3.0; D=2.0; E=1.0). The average for graduation is to be computed for those courses which are actually counted as fulfilling the requirements for graduation. When a student repeats a course, only the final grade

received shall be used in computing the average for probation and graduation. Courses in which the student receives credit as a result of special or proficiency examinations shall not be considered in computing averages either for probation or graduation. Colleges operating under the grade-point system shall maintain standards substantially equivalent to those stated in (2) and (3) above.

5. Readmission of Students Dropped for Poor Scholarship: Readmission of

students to the University who have been dropped under the above regulations shall

be at the discretion of the Deans and Directors of the respective colleges.

6. Higher Scholastic Standards: These regulations establish minimum requirements only, and the practice of requiring higher scholastic standards in certain colleges, schools, or curricula shall not be considered contrary to these regulations.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this minimum requirement was adopted under the conditions recommended.

CURRICULUM IN FOOD TECHNOLOGY

(8) The University Senate has adopted the following curriculum in food technology in the College of Agriculture leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Food Technology (for curriculum, see page 477).

The larger concerns engaged in the processing of foods will in general employ specialists; for example, bacteriologists and chemists for control work, chemical engineers for technical operation, and holders of the doctor's degree for research. The standard lines of training for these professions are all prescribed.

In the smaller plants it will not be possible to employ highly trained specialists for each particular job, but the technical operation and control will have to be directed by individuals with some general training in the fundamental sciences and perhaps a moderate degree of specialization in some particular line of food processing.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this curriculum was approved as recommended.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR FOREIGN STUDENTS

(9) At its meeting on May 27 the Board considered certain recommendations from the Faculty Committee on Fees and Scholarships, including one that the number of scholarships available to foreign students be increased from 10 to 25 as of September, 1947. This was referred to the Faculty Committee for further consideration and recommendation to the Board.

The Committee has reviewed the whole question again and renews its original proposal that the number of scholarships available to foreign students be increased from 10 to 25. In support of this the Committee has submitted a report on the records of foreign students who have held such scholarships since 1941-1942.

This record shows that:

1. During the earlier years preference was given to South American students because the scholarships were originally established for students from Latin-American countries.

2. During more recent years there has been a wider distribution of countries

represented, with Chinese students representing the largest number.

3. There have been a few bad scholastic records, especially among South American students. In each case this was due to language difficulties and as a rule the scholarship was discontinued after one semester. Recently language difficulties have been overcome by offering a special course in rhetoric for foreign students.

4. On the whole, the holders of scholarships have done extremely well at the University of Illinois. The degrees that have been earned are a noteworthy contribution to the countries from which the candidates have come.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, the number of scholarships available to foreign students was increased to twenty-five as recommended.

TITLE OF UNIVERSITY PURCHASING OFFICER

(10) The University Statutes, Section 50, specify the title of "Purchasing Agent" for the principal purchasing officer of the University, acting under the direction of the Comptroller. The Statutes provide that this officer "shall purchase or issue

orders for the purchase of all articles and materials for all departments of the University in all cases where the Board has not given this authority to some other person or committee."

It is necessary to issue purchase orders directly from the Chicago Professional Colleges and from the Undergraduate Divisions in Chicago (Navy Pier) and at Galesburg, and it is desirable that the officer in charge of purchasing at each of these branches have the title "Purchasing Agent." The Purchasing Agent works under the direction of the Business Manager of each branch and also under the general advisory guidance of the chief purchasing agent of the University.

The Comptroller recommends, and I concur, that the title of the chief purchasing officer of the University be "Director of Purchases," leaving the way to appoint a "Purchasing Agent" at each of the other divisions of the University.

A draft of proposed changes in the University Statutes to accomplish this is

A draft of proposed changes in the University Statutes to accomplish this is submitted for approval, and a few additional minor changes are incorporated to bring the Statutes up to date (see page 478).

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the Statutes were amended as recommended, effective July 1, 1947.

RELEASES OF FUNDS FROM STATE-WIDE PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS APPROPRIATION

(11) Governor Dwight H. Green has authorized the release of funds from the appropriation made to the University of Illinois by the 64th General Assembly in the "Act making appropriations for a State-wide system of public works projects, including all ordinary and contingent expenses relating thereto," as follows:

Funds are available and have been released for items 1 and 2, and funds are included in the capital appropriations requested for 1947-1949 for item 3.

The proposal from G. L. Tarlton Construction Co. was based on acceptance of "all or none" of the work. On June 2, 1947, they expressed willingness to accept a contract for items 1 and 2 with the understanding that a contract will be awarded to them for item 3 if funds are made available within the construction period.

The Director of the Physical Plant recommends the award of the contracts for the laying of cast iron water pipe and for the concrete reservoir to the G. L. Tarlton Construction Co. on the basis of their lowest bid and the award of the contract for the construction of the storm sewers to the same company subject to availability of funds. If they are not available by August 1, 1947, the storm sewers award shall be null and void.

I concur in these recommendations and request authorization of contracts in accordance with the conditions outlined above.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these contracts were awarded and authority granted as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR PIPE AND FITTINGS REQUIRED FOR FIRE PROTECTION FACILITIES

(15) The Physical Plant Department has requested an increase of \$1,575 in the contract with McWane Cast Iron Pipe Company for pipe and fittings required for the Fire Protection Facilities. The increase is to provide for additional lengths of pipe and fittings which are necessary because of changed requirements determined since the original contract was written (approved by the Board on November 22, 1946, at a base bid with an escalation clause). Funds are available for this increase, and it is approved by the Director of Purchases.

The Comptroller recommends approval of this increase and I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this addition to the contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDENDUM TO CONTRACT FOR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES ON NEW CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(16) The agreement with the architects, Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White (approved by the Board on June 30, 1945, and by the Committee on General Policy on November 23, 1945) for architectural services on the Chemistry Building does not cover services on laboratory equipment, which is a large item in this project.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department feels it is desirable to concentrate responsibility and has asked the architects for an estimate of the cost of this equipment, and a quotation for their services. They have estimated the equipment cost at \$217,000 and ask a fee of 8 per cent, or approximately \$17,360. The University Architect believes this fee is satisfactory for this type of work. Funds are available to cover this expense.

I recommend approval and authorization of an addendum to the contract with Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this addendum to the contract was approved and authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL INSTALLATIONS IN RE-MODELING ROOM 215 ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING LABORATORY

(17) The Director of the Physical Plant Department has requested an increase of \$2,637 in the contract with the J. M. Bean Electric Company covering the installation of three transformers required for the remodeling of Room 215 Electrical Engineering Laboratory. This work was not included in the original contract approved by the Board on February 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 271).

The J. M. Bean Electric Company has the transformers available for instal-

lation. Funds are available for this increase.

The Comptroller recommends approval of this increase and I concur.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this increase was authorized as recommended.

SURFACING WALKS, ROADS, AND PARKING AREAS OF TEMPORARY HOUSING PROJECTS

(18) On June 3, bids were opened for surfacing walks, roads, and parking areas of certain of the temporary housing projects (Nos. 11287, 11277, 11254, and 11306). Although approximately a half-dozen firms were approached, only one bid (Frank A. Somers Co., Inc., in the amount of \$30,418) was received. This bid has been checked with previous work by the same firm on other temporary housing projects and it is in agreement therewith. Funds are available for this work.

The Physical Plant Department recommends that a contract be awarded to Frank A. Somers Co., Inc., in the amount of \$30,418 for the above-described work. I concur and request authority for the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board to execute such a contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were adopted.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR SERVICE EXTENSIONS TO TEMPORARY CAFETERIA BUILDING

(19) The Physical Plant Department has requested an increase of \$2,350 in the contract with A. S. Schulman Electric Company for new service connections to the Temporary Cafeteria Building. The original contract (approved by the Board on January 25, 1947) did not provide for such connections, since the requirements for service connections were not known. They have now been determined and the requested increase provides for them. Funds are available for this increase.

The Comptroller recommends approval of this increase and I concur.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this increase was authorized as recommended.

PURCHASE OF COAL FOR URBANA CAMPUS

(20) Bids have been requested on 38,000 tons of screenings coal for use at the Abbott Power Plant, Urbana-Champaign, delivery as required during the period from July 1, 1947, to June 30, 1948. Invitations to bid on our specifications were submitted to 23 concerns and advertisements were run in Chicago papers.

submitted to 23 concerns and advertisements were run in Chicago papers.

Only one bid was received, from the Bell & Zoller Coal Co. of Murdock, Illinois, for 8,000 tons at \$2.90 f.o.b. mine, freight cost 85¢, delivered price \$3.75.

WATER SURVEY BUILDING

(23) The Act of the 64th General Assembly making appropriations for a state-wide system of public works projects includes funds for the construction of a State Water Survey Building on the University campus. This is not a part of the University's building program but is in the building program for the State Natural History Survey, State Geological Survey, and the State Water Survey, which by law are located at the University but are administered by the State Department of Registration and Education and the State Board of Natural Resources and Conservation.

On April 6, 1945, the Board of Trustees assigned as a site for this building the area between Wright Street and Burrill Avenue, fronting on Springfield Avenue, across from the Men's Old Gymnasium (now occupied by the Varsity tennis courts), subject to the execution of an agreement between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois as one party and the Department of Registration and Education and Board of Natural Resources and Conservation as the other party, which shall provide that all plans and specifications for the construction of the building and for future expansion shall be subject to approval by the University.

This question of site has recently been reconsidered and it is now proposed by the Director of the Physical Plant Department, the Dean of the College of Engineering, and the Chairman of the Campus Planning Committee that the University acquire property fronting on Springfield immediately west of Wright Street as a site for the new Water Survey Building for the following reasons:

Street as a site for the new Water Survey Building for the following reasons:

I. The site presently assigned will be needed for the development of the facilities of the College of Engineering. The proposed new site would not block such expansion.

2. It is desirable that the Water Survey Building be located close to the College of Engineering buildings, so that its facilities, which will include a hydraulic laboratory, will be conveniently accessible to certain departments, particularly Civil Engineering. The proposed new site offers this advantage.

3. The utilities distribution lines must eventually be extended across Wright Street into this area to service the new Fire Station which will be located adjacent to the proposed site. Funds have been included in the University's building program for the extension of the utilities service to the Fire Station.

4. This is one of the logical areas for future University expansion. It is more suitable for a scientific survey building than an academic building.

5. The new site is acceptable to the Chief of the State Water Survey.

The new site is acceptable to the Chief of the State water Survey. The relocation of the Water Survey Building as here proposed will require the purchase by the University of land at an estimated cost of \$75,000. On the other hand, the construction of the Water Survey Building in the area presently allocated will require the construction of tennis courts elsewhere and it is estimated that this would cost \$33,162.

I concur and recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this building was relocated as recommended.

RESIDENCE HALL REPLACEMENT FUND

(24) The first student residence hall in the University was placed in operation in 1919 (Mary E. Busey Hall). Evans Hall was added in 1926. During the years prior to 1932-1933, the net income of these halls was accumulated in a surplus fund with the intention of applying it toward building a new hall. The amount thus accumulated represented the excess of income over current expenditures without reserves for replacements.

On March 14, 1933, because of the acute financial situation of the State and the University, the Board of Trustees voted to transfer the balance of this accumulated surplus to the general funds of the University, where they were used for general operating expenses. The amount thus transferred was \$240,-

045.68 (Comptroller's Report, June 30, 1933, page 26).

Beginning with 1934, the sums for building repairs and equipment replacements on a reserve basis have been set aside out of each year's income. A study has been made of the operations of all halls from their beginning, as a result of which it has been determined that a deficiency of \$116,637 exists in present reserves, due to the fact that reserves were not set aside during the early years of operation and that in some other years the amount set aside was inadequate. The Director of the Physical Plant, the Dean of Students, and the Comptroller have recommended that this reserve be reinstated as soon as practicable. Since the funds that should have been applied to this reserve from the earnings of the halls were used for general University purposes as above stated, it is appropriate that they be replaced out of the General Reserve Fund.

As a partial step in this direction, it is recommended that one-half of the total accumulation at this time be appropriated from the General Reserve Fund to the reserve fund of Student Residence Halls. To that end I recommend such

an appropriation in the amount of \$58,319.

It is the intention, if funds permit, to recommend a similar appropriation during the biennium of 1947-1949, thus completing the adjustment.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. Nickell.

CALLING OF ILLINI UNION BUILDING AND RESIDENCE HALL LOANS

(25) The following loans on University buildings are callable on quarterly interest dates on or after the dates indicated:

Illini Union Building 3¾% (callable on October 1, 1947,

at a premium of 2% of unpaid balance).....\$481 800 Men's Residence Halls 3¾% (callable on September 1, 1947, at a premium of 2% of unpaid balance)........... 525 300

In the case of the Illini Union Building, accumulated funds will make possible some additional payment, so that the new loan will be somewhat less than the outstanding balance.

The present loans are mortgage loans, originally made through the University of Illinois Foundation, but later assumed by the Board of Trustees. The new loans will be in the form of revenue bonds issued under the special act of 1945, recently amended.

It is also necessary to borrow about \$700,000 additional to provide for completion of the new women's residence hall now under construction. It may be desirable to consolidate this requirement with refunding of the amount now outstanding on the men's residence halls. Income of present women's residence halls is merged with men's residence hall income for financing the existing loan.

The Comptroller recommends that the calling of these loans be authorized on or as soon as practicable after the first call date, the loans to be offered for bids by all interested parties, under such conditions as may be approved by the Finance Committee, the Committee to review and recommend to the Board an award after bids are received.

Approval of this recommendation is requested.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this recommendation was approved.

CHANGE IN "POLICY AND RULES RELATING TO COMPENSATION AND WORKING CONDITIONS OF NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES'

(26) The officials of the College of Agriculture recommend that the farm employees be placed on a 44-hour base work week schedule, instead of the present 48-hour schedule, effective July 1, 1947. The Director of Nonacademic Personnel

approves this change, and I concur.

An increase in hourly (or monthly) rates is contemplated July I, as a result of which the total earnings of this group will be approximately the same for the reduced schedule as the present one.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this change was approved as recommended.

NEW SALARY SCALES IN CIVIL SERVICE POSITIONS

(27) The Director of Nonacademic Personnel requests approval of new scales of minimum and maximum salaries in Civil Service classifications effective July 1, 1947, to replace the salary scales originally established in 1944 and modified from time to time.

These new salary ranges have been established after a thorough evaluation of our own positions as compared to similar ones in other services and in consultation with administrative officers who are concerned with these classifications. The changes will bring the University salary ranges up to date in the current labor market (see page 479 for list).

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these scales were approved as recommended.

SUPPLEMENTARY AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR SMALL HOMES CONSTRUCTION

(31) Specifications were sent to 41 interested agencies for automobile fleet insurance, including comprehensive public liability and property damage with \$25/50,000 and \$5,000 limits respectively; comprehensive fire and theft (non-collision except on a few automobiles) on a stated value-per-car basis; and public liability with \$15/20,000 limits covering motor propelled equipment not subject to State Vehicle Registration.

Quotations were received from ten companies. The lowest bids in companies meeting the minimum requirements as to financial status are:

AWARD OF CONTRACTS BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

(32) The Executive Committee reports the award of contracts as follows. The Secretary and the Comptroller of the Board have been authorized to execute these contracts.

General Construction Work on the Physical Environment Unit. — Contract awarded to E. H. Marhoefer, Jr., Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, in the amount of \$206,325. Contract award is subject to release of funds by the Governor for this project.

Automatic Fire Detection System in the W. A. Noyes Laboratory of Chemistry. — Contract awarded to the Gamewell Company, Newton Upper Falls, Massachusetts, the lowest bidder, in the amount of \$16,705. Funds are available in the Physical Plant Department budget for this purchase.

Fire Alarm Telegram Equipment. — Contract for equipment in the buildings at Urbana-Champaign awarded to the Gamewell Company, Newton Upper Falls, Massachusetts, in the amount of \$15,535.60. Two bids were received as follows: the Autocall Company, \$12,453.50; the Gamewell Company, \$15,535.60. The Executive Committee awarded the contract to the Gamewell Company because it made a firm bid and guaranteed delivery of all equipment within 100 days. The Autocall Company bid included an escalator clause, and the company could not make delivery in less than 9 to 12 months. Funds are available in the Physical Plant Department budget for this purchase.

General Work on Finishing Fourth Floor in Mumford Hall.—Contract for general work awarded to C. A. Petry and Sons, the lowest bidder, in the amount of \$21,084. The Board of Trustees on April 24 (Minutes, page 342) made an appropriation for this improvement.

This report was received for record.

REAPPROPRIATION OF BUILDING FUNDS

(33) On January 25, 1947, the Board of Trustees authorized a request to the 65th General Assembly of Illinois for the reappropriation of funds remaining unexpended as of June 30, 1947, in the appropriations made by the 64th General Assembly for the biennium of 1945-1947 for buildings and other capital improvements.

On April 24, 1947, the Board authorized a redistribution of the funds to be reappropriated so as to provide sufficient funds for the total cost of each high priority project which should be completed within the 1947-1949 biennium. This was done at the request of the Director of the State Department of Finance, following conferences with the President and other University officials. The State Administration had adopted the policy of releasing funds for construction work only if a sufficient appropriation was available to complete a usable unit.

The Director of Finance agreed to recommend this readjustment of funds in the State budget for 1947-1949, together with an addition of \$2,000,000 for

student residence halls. These items were in the budget recommended by the Governor to the General Assembly and in the omnibus bill introduced by the State Administration.

The Director of Finance had stated that this might represent the total amount of capital funds to be made available to the University during the biennium of 1947-1949. The statement was not accepted as binding on the University and the Director was so advised in writing by the President.

The total of the reappropriation requested by the University under the agreement with the Director of Finance was \$15,287,920. The original schedule of the propositions to be requested for the biopairm of 1947-1949.

of new capital appropriations to be requested for the biennium of 1947-1949 as approved by the Board on October 22, 1946, totaled \$29,450,000. This was reduced by the Board on April 24 to \$20,472,000. A bill for such an appropriation has been introduced in both houses of the General Assembly. It is now on the order of third reading in the House of Representatives, having been approved

unanimously by its Committee on Appropriations.

On June 17 the Senate Committee on Appropriations voted to reduce all building appropriations by 15 per cent. University officials were given a hearing by the Senate sitting as a Committee of the Whole on June 19. Following this hearing, University officials were requested to submit a schedule of reductions

in the aggregate of 15 per cent of the total sum.

I present herewith a schedule of the revision in these appropriations for basic building funds for 1947-1949, carrying out the mandate of the Senate.

The effects of this reduction were discussed by the President of the University, the Vice-President, and the Provost.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the action of the President in consenting to the revision of Senate Bill 662 was approved and confirmed, and the President was authorized to issue a statement on the seriousness of the situation. The following telegram was sent, over the signatures of the members of the Board, to the Governor, President of the Senate, President pro tempore, Speaker of the House, Chairman of the Appropriations Committees, to the Majority and Minority Leaders of the Senate and the House, and to the Senators and Representatives from the second and twenty-fourth districts and to the Honorable Peter C. Granata of the seventeenth district.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois has received the report of the President of the University with respect to the re-allocation of items in Senate Bill 662 in conformity to the action of the State Senate on June 19th reducing the total sum for the University from \$15,287,920 by \$2,293,188. The Board has approved the redistribution in full recognition of the fact that the Senate action will damage the effectiveness of the University's program in the next biennium. The elimination of the fine arts building alone will reduce the facilities at Urbana in 1948 by 25 classrooms.

The Board respectfully calls your attention to the urgency of the University building items in H. B. 844. This includes \$13,000,000 for crucial medical needs on the Chicago campus and \$7,000,000 for Urbana-Champaign. The latter in-

cludes \$1,400,000 for a veterinary building.

We vigorously urge that full consideration be given in the House and the Senate to House Bill 844. The items in this bill are identified with mounting demands for the instruction of veterans, doctors, nurses, veterinarians, teachers, and others whose services are everywhere in such short supply as to endanger the public welfare. The Board of Trustees and the officers of the University will welcome a hearing on these issues. We believe that we speak on behalf of the public interest as we are expected to do in matters of educational policy.

CHANGES IN UNIVERSITY (MEN'S) CLUB CONTRACT WITH UNIVERSITY

Mr. Fornof, for the special committee appointed May 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 367), to consider a change in contract with the University Club, reported as follows:

On May 27, 1947, the Board referred to the undersigned a recommendation of the President for a change in the contract of the University with the University (Men's) Club of Urbana, whereby the University would assume responsibility for food service at the Club. The original proposal placed on the University the probability of an operating loss estimated at \$1,800 a year in addition to capital expenditures of approximately \$16,000. That loss resulted chiefly from the provision that meals would be served to members of the Club at 10% less than menu prices.

This provision has been withdrawn by the Club, which has agreed that meals will be served to members and non-members at the same price, and on a self-supporting basis. The University (through the Illini Union which will operate the food service) will extend credit privileges to all Club members

ate the food service) will extend credit privileges to all Club members.

With these changes in the proposal, the special committee recommends that the recommendation of the President of the University be approved.

RELEASE OF PATENT ON WATER PURIFICATION PROCESS TO GOVERNMENT

The Legal Counsel presented the following report:

The Faculty Patent Committee had a meeting on June 13 to discuss the release of a discovery of Mr. Herbert E. Hudson, Jr., of a Water Purification Process and Apparatus, which discovery was made under Contract OEMsr-593.

The Committee considered the matter and voted to recommend to the President and the Board of Trustees that the same be released and that the Government be authorized to file an application for patent in the name of the discoverer, that the discoverer be directed to execute the necessary assignment to the Government, the Government to sustain all the costs incident thereto.

This matter was referred to the Committee on Patents for consideration and report.

University of Illinois Board of Trustees Fortieth Report, 1938-1940 October 20, 1939, pages 642-644

(31) Although the necessary approval of the Federal Office of Education and the State Board for Vocational Agriculture has not yet been secured, one of the five State Normal Schools in Illinois has, in the following words, announced its intention of establishing a curriculum in agriculture: "At latest by the end of the year all State and Federal requirements will be met with specialization in the following fields: . . . agronomy, horticulture, dairy, animal husbandry, agricultural economics, agricultural engineering." A mimeographed summary of steps taken in this direction further states: "A complete offering, the equivalent of any first-class college of agriculture, will be available to meet all State and Federal requirements."

Another Illinois Normal School has recently indicated its intention to establish

Another Illinois Normal School has recently indicated its intention to establish courses in agriculture that will meet State and Federal requirements for Smith-Hughes teachers. The president of a third Normal School is reported to have said, in effect, that he did not favor this type of duplication of University work and facilities, but if other Normal Schools established such training in agriculture he would be compelled to do likewise. It is obvious that once such a practice is established in any of the State Normal Schools it may be extended to include all five Normal Schools.

Leading students of education have clearly pointed out the costly dangers involved in such competitive activity. In many cases the institutions enter new fields as the result of outside pressure groups, such as alumni associations and chambers of commerce, which insist that the particular school should equal or excel every other school in every field of study. This has resulted in much duplication of effort and unwarranted expenditure of money. One of the best examples is the development of forestry schools in the United States. During recent years more men, well-trained in forestry, have been graduated from these schools than could be absorbed by the industry, and yet the establishment of more forestry schools goes on at public expense. Obviously, State and National economy will soon demand drastic action in regard to this problem. An effective analysis and discussion of the policy and the expensive futility of duplication in program and facilities may be found under the title of "Cooperation and Coordination in Higher Education" in the Studies of the American Council on Education, Series I, Volume II, Number 5, April, 1938.

Those responsible for teacher training in agriculture at the University of Illinois believe, notwithstanding the fact that not all available Federal funds have

been used, that teacher training in agriculture in Illinois has been expanded as rapidly as is wise. It must not be overlooked that each dollar of Federal vocational funds must be matched by another dollar from the State.

At present only about fifty new teachers in Smith-Hughes agriculture are needed annually for replacement and for manning new departments of agriculture in Illinois high schools. One hundred fourteen seniors in the University of Illinois College of Agriculture have applied for practice teaching during 1939-1940, and their present course of study, if completed satisfactorily, will qualify all of them for Smith-Hughes positions. The University of Illinois is, therefore, training ample numbers of Smith-Hughes teachers to meet all present and prospective needs in this State.

If the Normal Schools in Illinois enter this field, it is certain that the annual expenditure for agricultural education will be tremendously increased in Illinois and the average quality of training will be lowered unless the State be willing to expend large sums for essential equipment and facilities not now available at these schools. In past years the requests from other States for Illinois-trained Smith-Hughes teachers and the increase of Smith-Hughes high school units in our own State created an abnormal demand for teachers. This is rapidly diminishing. There is now positively no excuse for training greater numbers of Smith-Hughes teachers in Illinois. Increasing the quality of training can always be justified. Lowering the average quality of the training of our Smith-Hughes teachers by accepting men from schools where the staff for teaching vocational agriculture must be limited and where the equipment and scientific program are materially below that available at the University, not only lowers the dignity of the teaching profession, but robs the coming generations of Smith-Hughes students of their rightful educational opportunity. The University of Illinois College of Agriculture has been building up the quality and number of its staff and its equipment over a long period of time and at great expense to the State. Also the staff and equipment of the Illinois Agricultural Experiment Station and the Agricultural Extension Service materially increase the opportunities for superior training in agriculture at the University of Illinois. Teachers need as good subject-matter training as other workers in agricultural fields.

A college located within a great university with a number of professional curricula, as well as liberal arts courses, accords its students a great variety of educational disciplines and provides a better background for vocational guidance, a problem with which Smith-Hughes teachers have to contend.

Training teachers of vocational agriculture in the Land-Grant College will tend to promote cooperation between them and members of the Extension Service, which is necessary for the most effective contributions of both agencies in the

community.

Existing facilities at the University are amply sufficient to meet the demand for Smith-Hughes teachers, and there seems no justification for increased expenditures of State or Federal funds in this field. If increased expenditures for education in agriculture are warranted, it may be shown that there is greater need for money in fields other than Smith-Hughes teacher training. For example, there are only about half as many practicing veterinarians in Illinois as there were twenty years ago. This decrease has resulted from lack of replacements coming into the profession in this State, and has been due largely to inability of qualified graduates of Illinois high schools to secure admittance to colleges of veterinary medicine in other States. Careful study of the veterinary situation in Illinois shows the need for some remedial action, but those who have been most concerned with the problem believe that it is desirable to consider the possibility of regionalization of veterinary colleges before asking for appropriations to increase the number of State schools in this field.

In these critical times, when the States and the Federal government are struggling with serious budgetary problems, those of us who are in educational work, as well as responsible persons in the public service, should cooperate without stint with officials who face the serious task of carrying on essential governmental activities without further increasing the tax burden. We can best do this by scanning closely every new educational program involving the expenditure of public funds, and scrupulously avoiding duplication of efforts and facilities where obviously, as in the case at hand, the public interest cannot possibly be served by such duplication.

On motion of Mr. Cleary, the President of the University was requested to send to the Governor and to the members of the State Board for Vocational Agriculture a statement of the Fact that the Board of Trustees considers this proposed expansion an unnecessary duplication of educational offerings which is most undesirable from a standpoint of public policy.

EXHIBIT B

Some Reasons for Continuing the University of Illinois as the One Institu-TION IN ILLINOIS FOR QUALIFYING TEACHERS OF VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE 1

1. The arrangement for training teachers of vocational agriculture for Illinois has

operated successfully.

(a) From 1918 to 1947 the number of teachers of vocational agriculture in Illinois has increased from 15 to 409 and the number of schools teaching vocational agriculture has increased from 15 to 419. In addition, approximately 300 special teachers of farm veterans are now employed in connection with the Illinois program of vocational education in agriculture. There have, at times, been shortages of teachers but there have also been periods when more than enough teachers were

- being trained.

 (b) During the period from September I, 1045, to August 31, 1946, 139 new teachers of vocational agriculture were added in Illinois, probably the largest number of new teachers added in any state during that period. In the current year (1946-1947) approximately 60 new teachers will be qualified, almost enough and possibly quite enough to fill all vacancies in the state for the school year, 1947-1948. While there has been a shortage of teachers of vocational agriculture due to the war, in Illinois as in every other state, no long-time shortage of these teachers is in prospect. Institutions approved now for teacher-training could not get into efficient operation before the shortage will be eliminated. We should not let a temporary difficulty lead us to establishing a permanent system which will lead to permanent difficulties. If there had been a persistent shortage of teachers of vocational agriculture in Illinois, it would be expected that teachers would have been attracted from other states. Approximately 7 per cent of the Illinois teachers in 1946-1947 had received their training for teaching in other states before entering the teaching of vocational agriculture in Illinois.
- (c) Approximately 40 per cent of the graduates of the College of Agriculture of the University of Illinois qualify for the teaching of vocational agriculture. This is probably the highest percentage in any of the larger colleges of agriculture.

(d) The quality of the students preparing for the teaching of vocational agriculture is somewhat above the average of the students as a whole in the College

of Agriculture of the University of Illinois.

(e) The University of Illinois has given strong support to the training of teachers of vocational agriculture. Since 1938 the full-time teacher-training staff has been increased from two to six, and two more positions are provided in the budget for 1947-1949. In recent years the University has been increasing its expenditures for teacher-training without consideration of the possibility of receiving additional fodds for teacher-training. additional federal funds for teacher-training.

(f) The teacher-training staff of the University of Illinois has maintained a close liaison with the Agricultural Education Staff of the State Board of Vocational Education. It will be much harder to maintain close relationships between

- administration and teacher-training if there are several teacher-training institutions.

 (g) Because teacher-training has been done in connection with the College of Agriculture of the University, close relationships have been maintained with other agricultural and agricultural education agencies in the State. If teachers are trained in other institutions, the harmonious relationships among agricultural and agricultural education groups may disintegrate.
 - 2. Adding teacher-training institutions increases costs and decreases efficiency.
- (a) If Illinois State Normal University is approved for teacher-training, it can be expected that Southern Illinois Normal University and Western Illinois State Teachers College will also be approved. There are better arguments for approving them than for approving Illinois State Normal University, particularly

because Illinois State Normal University is only 50 miles from the University of Illinois while the other institutions are 145 to 200 miles from the University

(b) The facilities of the College of Agriculture of the University of Illinois could be duplicated at the other institutions only at enormous and unjustified expense. To provide facilities at the other institutions appreciably poorer than those at the University would be to lower materially the quality of teacher-training.

(c) Adding other teacher-training institutions would lead almost immediately to a surplus of teachers of vocational agriculture and a reduction of teachers' salaries. It could be expected that in a few years the salaries of teachers of vocational agriculture would be so low that only inferior persons could be attracted into

3. A legislative commission which surveyed Illinois institutions of higher education in 1943 recommended strongly against the approval of additional institu-tions for preparing teachers of vocational agriculture. The professional staff of the Commission was headed by Dr. George A. Works, who spent much of his professional life in the field of agricultural education. The special study of teacher-training in agriculture was made by Dr. C. B. Gentry, Vice-President of the University of Connecticut, whose teaching experience has been divided between a teachers'

college and a land-grant university.

4. A satisfactory arrangement for transferring students from two teachers' colleges to the University is now in effect. Working with the officials of Southern Illinois Normal University and Western Illinois State Teachers College, University officials have developed satisfactory working arrangements whereby students spend two years at these institutions and then transfer to the University, where they may qualify as teachers of vocational agriculture without loss of time. The officials of Illinois State Normal University have been interested instead in retaining their students for four years. The University of Illinois is probably the most liberal land-grant college in the United States in accepting credits from teachers' colleges and applying them toward graduation from an agricultural curriculum. A minimum of only 35 semester hours is required to be taken at the University if the student has completed at another institution the subjects he may take there.

EXHIBIT C

EXCERPTS FROM

Report of the Commission to Survey Higher Educational Facilities in Illinois January, 1945, pages 15, 37-38

The University of Illinois should have responsibility for the State's teachereducation work in agriculture. The State Board for Vocational Education should approve no institution in the State, other than the University of Illinois, for the preparation of teachers of vocational agriculture. None of the State Teachers Colleges should attempt to provide more than two years of education for teachers of vocational agriculture.

Reference was made above to the need for over-all coordination of the activities of the State's institutions which prepare teachers, and for proper allocation of certain functions among the institutions. An illustration of undesirable duplication due to lack of effective coordination is furnished by the situation in agricultural education. The University of Illinois is the only institution in the State that has received acceptance by the United States Office of Education for the preparation of teachers of vocational agriculture. The evidence indicates that the entire demand in the State for teachers of vocational agriculture can be met by the University. Nevertheless, Illinois State Normal University has developed a four-year program for the preparation of teachers in this field, and two other Teachers Colleges, Western Illinois State Teachers College and Southern Illinois Normal University, offer three years of a four-year program. Students preparing for the teaching of vocational agriculture at a State Teachers College may qualify by completing their work at the University of Illinois. Illinois State Normal University has been seeking approval of its program, but such acceptance has not yet been granted by the United States Office of Education.

C. B. Gentry of the University of Connecticut made an appraisal of the agricultural education situation in the State for the Commission. His major recom-

mendations are:

1. That the University of Illinois have responsibility for the undergraduate teacher-education work in agriculture;

2. That none of the Teachers Colleges should attempt to provide more than

two years of education for teachers of vocational agriculture;

3. That the Teachers Colleges should continue to teach agriculture. Such work should be designed: (1) as introductory work in the field of agriculture for prospective vocational agriculture teachers who plan to transfer to the University to complete their education; (2) to provide education for non-vocational agriculture teachers; (3) to meet the needs of rural school teachers; (4) to provide illustrative material for teachers of subjects such as biology, chemistry, physics, geology, and social studies;

4. That an adequate offering of terminal education should be provided in such centers as the Teachers Colleges to meet the needs of their farmer clientele on a regional basis. For the most part this would be a terminal two-year or shorter program. Those who need a more extensive program than the Teachers Colleges offer should transfer to the University College of Agriculture;

5. That teaching personnel, laboratory, and other facilities at the Teachers

Colleges should be brought into line with the objectives outlined above for the teaching of agriculture. In some Teachers Colleges this would mean a reduction of staff and facilities, while in others, additional staff and facilities might be needed. (The addition of such facilities in those institutions where they are not now available would provide for a regional service of the type discussed earlier in this chapter. It should be emphasized that this additional service should be provided only after adequate provision has been made for the primary function of the Teachers Colleges. This, as was pointed out above, is the preparation of elementary and high-school teachers.)

6. That the State Board for Vocational Education approve no institution in the State, other than the University of Illinois, for the preparation of teachers

of vocational agriculture.

REVISION OF UNIVERSITY STATUTES

(Approved by the Board, page 394)

(Present material to be deleted is in brackets; new material is in italics)

Business Organization and Procedure

A. General Business Organization

(1) The Comptroller shall:

(a) be the general fiscal [agent] officer of the Board. He shall approve for the Board all expenditures for which a general or specific appropriation has been made by the Board as evidenced by its records;

- (2) The Comptroller shall also:(a) be the general business [agent] officer of the University and shall have [general] supervision over those offices comprising the Business Office of the University, including those of the [Purchasing Agent] Director of Purchases, Bursar, Chief Accountant, Auditor, and Business [Agent] Manager of Chicago [Departments] Divisions, and the Business Managers of other branches and locations;
- [(d) act as the appointing officer for university positions under State Civil Service and shall represent the University in its relations with the State Civil Service Commission.]

C. Purchasing and Storerooms

(4) The [Purchasing Agent] Director of Purchases (or the Purchasing Agents of branch locations) shall purchase or issue orders for the purchase of all articles and materials for all departments of the University in all cases where the Board has not given this authority to some other person or committee. He shall see

that the materials or articles delivered are of the quality, kind, and price prescribed. He shall have supervision over all general storerooms except as otherwise provided.

F. Bonds of Employees

(1) The Comptroller, Bursar, [Purchasing Agent] Director of Purchases, all Business Managers, all Purchasing Agents, and all persons responsible for the collection or handling of money or for signing the name of the President or Secretary of the Board of Trustees to warrants and vouchers of the University, shall furnish adequate surety bonds, the amount thereof to be determined by the Board and the expense to be paid by the University.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

August 5, 1947



The August meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, on Tuesday, August 5, 1947, according to the following schedule:

4 p.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

8:30 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Livingston, General Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

President Stoddard was present; also Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in Charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and, during part of the day, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of June 23, 1947. On motion of Mr. Nickell, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 387 to 484 above.

ACTIONS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Secretary reported for record that the Executive Committee had taken action approving the following recommendations of the President of the University.

1. Award of contract for reroofing cattle feeding plant barn and feeding shed. Bids have been received on reroofing the cattle feeding plant barn and feeding shed, one of the projects on the University's remodeling and rehabilitation schedule:

The Raymond Development Company, Inc., bid \$7,612.50 for reroofing with wood shingles, with an alternate of \$100 for installation of new metal valleys. They also bid \$7,500 for reroofing with asphalt shingles.

The Industrial Roofing Company bid \$14,497 for reroofing with asphalt

shingles.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of the contract to the lowest bidder, the Raymond Development

Company, Inc., at a total cost of \$7,712.50. The President concurs.

2. Addition to contract for construction of piping in steam distribution tunnels to Temporary Cafeteria Building and new Fine Arts Building. The Physical Plant Department has recommended an increase of \$16,291 in the contract with W. A. Pope Company for construction of piping in the steam distribution tunnels to the Temporary Cafeteria Building which is being set up west and north of the College of Fine and Applied Arts Building. Of this amount \$3,201 is to be charged to the Illini Union Building operation budget and \$13,000 to the State appropriation for 1945-1947 for the Fine Arts Building which will be available until September 30, 1947. A part of this cost is a proper charge against this State appropriation because the tunnel is being constructed large enough to accommodate the new Fine Arts Building when the latter is built. The original contract was for the main distribution tunnels and was approved by the Board on January 25, 1947. The addition to the contract now proposed is for the branch line to the buildings. This work can be completed by September 1, and funds are available.

3. Award of a contract, in the amount of \$14,020, to the Connery Construction Company, Philadelphia, Pennsylvama, the lowest bidder, for flues, ducts, coal

valves, and spreaders for the Addition to the Power Plant.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board discussed in executive session several matters included in the agenda, and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENT OF DR. FRANCIS CORNELL AS PROFESSOR AND DIRECTOR OF THE BUREAU OF RESEARCH AND SERVICE

(1) I recommend the appointment of Dr. Francis Cornell, formerly a member of the staff of the United States Office of Education and more recently Education Expert for the United States Senate Committee on Labor and Public Welfare, as Professor of Education and Director of the Bureau of Research and Service in the College of Education, on indefinite tenure, beginning September 1, 1947, at an annual salary of \$10,500. This Bureau is the reorganization of the former Bureau of Educational Research.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the President of the University was authorized to conclude negotiations and make this appointment.

APPOINTMENT OF DR. ALLAN G. BRODIE AS DEAN OF THE COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY

(2) The Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges recommends the appointment of Dr. Allan G. Brodie as Dean of the College of Dentistry and as Professor and Head of the Department of Orthodontia, on part time, at an annual salary of \$10,000 beginning September 1, 1947. The appointment as Professor and Head of the Department of Orthodontia is on indefinite tenure. The appointment as Dean is for two years from September 1, 1947, conforming to the statutory provision relating to the tenure of deans.

Doctor Brodie has been serving as Acting Dean of the College of Dentistry since September 1, 1944. A special committee of the faculty, appointed by the Vice-President to study the qualifications of candidates who might be considered for the deanship of the College of Dentistry, has unanimously recommended the appointment of Doctor Brodie. I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this appointment was made as recommended.

MAJOR APPOINTMENTS AUTHORIZED

(3) I request authority to appoint heads of the departments of Geography, Food Technology, and Dairy Husbandry. Negotiations are now under way with desirable candidates.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the President of the University was authorized to make these appointments.

BOARD MEMBERS NOT TO SERVE ON COLLEGE COMMITTEES

After discussion of matters connected with the appointment of college and departmental advisory committees, the Board, on motion of General Davis, voted that the appointment of members of the Board to serve on such committees was not consistent with the best public policy.

DISCHARGE OF OTIS TAYLOR

Mr. McLaughlin presented the following report.

The Committee on Civil Service and Employees, having reviewed the Charges against Otis Taylor, an employee of the University of Illinois, preferred against him by the Appointing Officer of the University, the Answer thereto, the evidence and exhibits introduced at the Hearing on the Charges before the Hearing Committee duly appointed by the Board of Trustees, the Report of the Hearing Committee, the Objections thereto by the Respondent and the Reply thereto by the Appointing Officer, and the entire Record in the case, (1) concurs in the Findings of fact, conclusions of law and Recommendations of the Hearing Committee, and (2) recommends to the Board of Trustees the adoption of the following resolution:

Be it resolved that Otis Taylor be and he is hereby discharged from his employment by the University of Illinois as of the date of his suspension therefrom and that the Appointing and other Officers of the University are hereby directed to take such steps as may be necessary to carry this Resolution into effect.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this resolution was adopted.

DISCHARGE OF R. C. ELLIOTT

Mr. McLaughlin, as Chairman of the Committee on Civil Service and Employees, reported to the Board that on June 27, 1947, Ronald C. Elliott, a janitor employed by the University, was suspended for a period of thirty days on a charge of converting to his own use certain property owned by third parties then lawfully on the premises of the University of Illinois; that on the same date there was filed with the Secretary of the Board by Donald E. Dickason, Director of Nonacademic Personnel and the Appointing Officer of Ronald C. Elliott, an application for the discharge of Ronald C. Elliott; that an investigation showed that Mr. Elliott was guilty of the charges and confessed thereto; that Ronald C. Elliott did not demand a hearing on said application for discharge; that the time for filing such demand has expired.

Mr. McLaughlin further reported that his Committee has studied

the documents in the file and they find thereon that the charges have been established, and accordingly, recommend that the Board of Trustees ratify the extended suspension from July 28, 1947, and that Mr. Ronald C. Elliott be discharged from the service of the University of Illinois as of the date of his original suspension.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were approved and adopted.

RIGHT OF WAY ON NAVY PIER

The Legal Counsel presented the following resolution and recommended its adoption.

Whereas, there is included in the lease of space on the Navy Pier from the City of Chicago to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, the area designated as Bay No. 115, which area is now occupied by the University as a boiler room, and

Whereas, the City of Chicago desires to lease to the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Company for dock and berthing space on the south side of Navy Pier opposite Bay No. 115 with use of passage and gangway through said Bay No. 115 from dock to the center line of the pier, and

Whereas, permission of the University is necessary to make possible the execution of this lease from the City of Chicago to the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Company, and

Whereas, the use of such passageway from the south side of the Navy Pier opposite Bay No. 115 by the Navigation Company, its employees, agents, and patrons may increase the risk of accidental injury and death to persons and the risk of damage and loss of property;

Therefore be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that its duly authorized officers are hereby authorized to consent to the use of this passageway through Bay No. 115 in accordance with the terms of the lease between the City of Chicago as Lessor and the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Company, on the condition that the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Company shall execute releases satisfactory to the University from liability on the part of the University of Illinois, its officers, staff, agents, and students and shall furnish evidence of such indemnification satisfactory to the Comptroller of the University against such liabilities and risks as such officers deem it expedient in the interest of the University should be covered.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this resolution was adopted.

OPEN SESSION

MEMORIAL TO JAMES W. ARMSTRONG

Mr. McKelvey presented the following:

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois records with profound sorrow the death on May 30, 1947, of Mr. James W. Armstrong, a former member of this Board.

Mr. Armstrong was an alumnus of the University of Illinois, Class of 1893. Throughout his lifetime he was devoted to his Alma Mater. To him Illinois Loyalty meant service to the University.

He served as a member of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois two full terms from 1923 to 1935. There were many other services he performed throughout his lifetime which are not of public record but which were significant contributions to the welfare of his University.

Be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that this memorial be published in its records and a copy be sent by the Secretary to Mr. Armstrong's family, with an expression of the Board's sympathy in the great loss they have suffered.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this resolution was unanimously adopted.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in open session the following matters presented by the President of the University.

INTERNAL OPERATING BUDGET FOR 1947-1948

(1) I present the University's internal operating budget for all divisions and funds for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1947, and for academic and administrative appointments beginning September 1, 1947. This budget has been prepared by the Provost and the Comptroller in accordance with policies approved by the President and in conference with deans, directors, and other administrative officers.

I recommend that:

(1) This budget, covering the allocation of the University's operating income from all sources for the year beginning July 1, 1947, be approved (see

Appendix, page 522).

(2) The President of the University be authorized to (a) make such changes and adjustments as are needed, (b) make such additional appointments as are necessary, subject to the provisions of the University Statutes, and (c) accept resignations as are offered, all in accordance with the needs of the University and the equitable interests involved, and within the total income. All such changes will be covered in the Comptroller's quarterly reports.

Professor Griffith, Dr. Ivy, and Mr. Morey commented on the extensions of programs and other matters covered by this budget.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the budget was authorized as recommended, and authority was given to the President as requested, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR EQUIPMENT --- 1947-1948

(2) The biennial budget for 1947-1949 includes provisions for equipment and other nonrecurring items for the purpose of "catching up" on replacements and additions which were impossible during the war period. Many departments submitted items of that kind with their regular internal budget requests for 1947-1948. In some instances these equipment items in the regular budget requests

were reduced with the intention of providing nonrecurring appropriations.

All such requests have been reviewed in detail by the Provost and the Comptroller in conjunction with the review of the regular internal budget. They submit the following summary of recommendations for nonrecurring appropria-

(4) The Director of Intercollegiate Athletics submits on behalf of the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association the proposed budget of the Association for 1947-1948, which is summarized as follows with comparative figures for the preceding year:

On July 1, 1946, the Association had a net operating surplus of \$169,185, a reserve of \$50,955 for maintenance and replacement of plant, and a reserve of \$45,621 for equipment replacement. It is estimated that on June 30, 1947, the operating surplus will be \$205,345, the reserve for plant maintenance and replacement

will be \$50,955, and the reserve for equipment replacement will be \$39,951.

The budget has been examined by the Comptroller, and all salaries have been reviewed by the President; those salaries paid jointly by the Athletic Association and the School of Physical Education are concurred in by the Director of the School of Physical Education.

I recommend that this budget be approved and that the President of the University be authorized to make such changes and adjustments as are necessary, including new appointments and acceptances of resignations as are recommended by the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association within the total estimated income

On motion of Mr. Davis, this budget was approved as recommended, and authority was given to the President as requested.

APPOINTMENT OF DR. CHAUNCEY McKINLEY LOUTTIT AS PROFESSOR OF PSYCHOLOGY AND DEAN OF THE GALESBURG UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(5) In announcing the retirement of Dean Frederick R. Hamilton I wish to express appreciation of his faithful performance of the many arduous tasks associated with this unique undertaking. The Undergraduate Division at Galesburg has met every test; it is a branch of the University of which we may well be proud.

I recommend the appointment of Chauncey McKinley Louttit, recently Dean of the Faculty at Sampson College, one of the Associated Colleges of Upper New York, as Professor of Psychology on indefinite tenure and Dean of the Galesburg Undergraduate Division for two years beginning September 1, 1947, at an annual

salary of \$9,000.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this appointment was made as recommended.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTIES AS SITE FOR WATER SURVEY BUILDING

(7) On June 23, 1947, the Board authorized the purchase of properties fronting on the south side of Springfield Avenue between Wright and Sixth streets, Champaign, at an estimated cost of \$75,000, as a site for the Water Survey Building. The purchase of two properties at 603 and 607 East Springfield Avenue will provide an area of land 105 feet by 132 feet, which is sufficient for the first unit of the Water Survey Building.

The following purchases and other expenditures incidental to the acquisition of this land and for the extension of utilities to the site are recommended:

The comparatively higher price of the property at 607 East Springfield Avenue is based on its present rental income of \$400 a month and was the lowest

price the owner would consider.

Since the Board had authorized this land acquisition program, options were secured on these properties which expired August I, and required the payment of \$1,000 on signing of the contracts, the balance to be paid on September I when possession of properties is given. The Executive Committee of the Board authorized the acceptance of these options, the execution of contracts for purchases, and the payment of \$1,000 on each contract.

I recommend that these actions be confirmed and that an appropriation of \$60,000 from the General Reserve Fund be made for this property acquisition

program, including the extension of utilities to the site.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these actions were confirmed and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer.

PROGRESSIVE ADMISSIONS PLAN

(8) Reports from the Registrar and from the Deans and Directors of the undergraduate colleges and schools indicate that the Progressive Admissions Plan authorized by the Board of Trustees on April 24, 1947 (Minutes, page 349), to govern the admission of new students to all undergraduate divisions for the first

semester, 1947-1948, is working well.

It was the understanding that the plan would be studied on the basis of experience during the summer and modified if it appeared necessary to do so in order to carry out effectively the University's policy to admit, within the limits of its resources and capacities, all qualified students desiring to enroll. As of July 16, the beginning of the third period of admission, it appeared that it would be possible to admit to certain curricula a number of students who are now barred because of their previous scholastic records. It seemed logical that any relaxation should favor residents of Illinois, who desire to transfer to the University and who are required to have a scholastic average of 3.5 (between B and C) in previous college work. It will be recalled that beginning on July 16, Illinois high school graduates are admitted regardless of rank in class, but there is no such relaxation for transfer students who are residents of the State.

Consequently, as an administrative action I have authorized the Registrar of the University to admit to the University, beginning with the third period on July 16, transfer students, residents of Illinois, whose scholastic standing in previous college work meets the minimum standards of the University of Illinois curricula in which they desire to enroll. This authorization, of course, can be effective only to the extent that the capacities in the various divisions will permit the admission of students whose applications are pending, and who can be admitted under a general ruling applicable to all such cases.

This report was received for record.

REPORT ON THE TRAINING OF TEACHERS IN VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE

(9) In accordance with the action of the Board of Trustees on the training of teachers in vocational agriculture (Minutes, June 23, 1947, page 388) I sent a letter summarizing the University's position to Governor Dwight H. Green, Superintendent Vernon L. Nickell, the members of the Teachers College Board,

agriculture.

the members of the State Board for Vocational Education, and the presidents of

state normal universities and teachers colleges.

Under date of July 15, 1947, the Provost was instructed to represent and be spokesman for the University of Illinois at a special meeting of the Board for Vocational Education called by the Honorable Frank G. Thompson, Director of the Department of Registration and Education, and Chairman of the State Board for Vocational Education. One of the purposes of the special meeting was to hear one representative from the University of Illinois, as briefly as possible, at 1:30 p.m. on July 23 in Room 112 Capitol Building, Springfield, Illinois. The Provost did represent and speak for the University of Illinois at this meeting. He was accompanied by Dean H. P. Rusk of the College of Agriculture, Dean W. B. Spalding of the College of Education, Associate Dean R. R. Hudelson of the College of Agriculture, and Professor H. M. Hamlin of the College of Education. During the same session the State Board for Vocational Education heard Mr. Charles B. Shuman, President of the Illinois Agricultural Association. Mr. Shuman joined the University of Illinois in protesting against the proposed action of the State Board for Vocational Education in recognizing Illinois State Normal University as qualified to offer a four-year program in the training of teachers of vocational

Should the State Board for Vocational Education reaffirm its previous action, the effect will be to continue the standards which prevailed during the five-year period from 1942 to 1947 and to make it possible for Illinois State Normal University to qualify for the training of teachers of vocational agriculture at or near the minimum set forth by the standards.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, and after discussion, this matter was referred to the President of the University and the Committee on Agriculture for study and recommendation to the Board.

APPOINTMENT OF PROFESSOR HENNING LARSEN AS DEAN OF THE COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS AND SCIENCES

(10) On June 30, I presented to the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees a recommendation for the appointment of Professor Henning Larsen, now Head of the Department of English, as Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences for two years from September 1, 1947, at an annual salary of \$12,000.

Professor Larsen has been a member of the University of Illinois faculty since September 1, 1939. He became Acting Head of the Department of English in April, 1945, and permanent Head on September 1, 1946. He will continue to serve as Head of the Department of English for the time being.

The Committee approved this appointment, and its action is hereby reported for record.

This report was received for record.

INSTITUTE OF GOVERNMENT AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

(11) The increasing complexity of social life, resulting in greater demands on government at all levels for more expert services to the public, and the leadership of the United States in world affairs imposes on all branches of government greater and more difficult responsibilities than ever before in history. The University of Illinois through its professional colleges and schools provides training which is a valuable background to a student who later elects to enter public service, but the University has no organized program directed specifically to train students for public careers. Information and guidance has been provided for a number of years to students through an Advisory Council on University Training for the Public Service and through a bulletin on University Training for the Public Service, but this is a limited service and is inadequate for present needs.

The State of Illinois officially recognized the need for adequately trained personnel in government service by the adoption of House Joint Resolution No. 17, 65th General Assembly, creating a commission to study the appropriateness of establishing at the University of Illinois a "Curriculum in Government." The report of this commission, submitted May 28, 1947, recommends that the University proceed as rapidly as possible to develop a broad program of teaching, research, and extension in government and public affairs. It is therefore proposed

that there be established an Institute of Government and Public Affairs along the following lines, and I so recommend.

A. Functions

1. Teaching

(a) General instruction in government for all students, at the junior college

(b) Specialized professional training, at the senior college level, for students

desiring to prepare for government service.

(c) Graduate training, both research and professional, for especially qualified students who desire to prepare themselves for higher administrative and research positions in various types of public service.

2. Research

To investigate specific, practical problems that arise at all levels of government—local, state, federal, international—and to make the results of such studies freely available to all governmental agencies and public officials who may need such information.

3. Extension

(a) To provide general instruction in government for those whose circumstances make it impossible for them to study on the campus.

(b) To provide technical, on-the-job training for those engaged in govern-

ment service with a view toward improving their professional competence.

(c) To make available to all agencies of government technical information and counsel to assist them in the solution of problems with which they are confronted.

B. Organization

The Institute shall be an autonomous body under a Director responsible to the President, as provided in the statement of Policy adopted by the Board of Trustees on December 11, 1945 (Minutes, page 950). It shall have broad powers in respect to staff, educational program and budget, and shall not be subject to veto by departments, schools, or colleges.

There shall be an Advisory Committee, appointed by the President after consultation with the Director, composed of faculty members who are active participants in the program. Funds for the support of the Institute shall be budgeted separately and the Director shall be responsible for the budget.

The Institute shall be responsible for the development of an adequate educational and research program and for the administration of that program. While every effort should be made to utilize as fully as possible existing courses and personnel, and to bring about the maximum degree of interdepartmental cooperation, the Institute should not be dependent on departmental resources or be limited in its operations by departmental interests.

I further recommend that Professor H. M. Gray of the Department of Economics and Associate Dean of the Graduate School be appointed Director of the Institute of Government and Public Affairs. His combined position and salary will be Professor of Economics on indefinite tenure, Associate Dean of the Graduate School, and Director of the Institute of Government and Public Affairs for two years from September 1, 1947, at a total annual salary of \$10,000.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were approved and adopted.

APPOINTMENT OF HEAD OF DEPARTMENT OF ANIMAL SCIENCE

(12) The Dean of the College of Agriculture recommends that the name of the Department of Animal Husbandry be changed to the Department of Animal Science and that Dr. Leslie E. Card, Professor of Poultry Husbandry in the College and Chief of Poultry Husbandry in the Agricultural Experiment Station, be appointed head of the department on indefinite tenure beginning September 1, 1947, at an annual salary of \$8,500. Dr. William E. Carroll, former head of the department, has been appointed Associate Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were approved and adopted.

APPOINTMENT OF DIRECTOR OF DIVISION OF SPECIAL SERVICES FOR WAR VETERANS

(13) Professor H. W. Hannah, Director of the Division of Special Services for War Veterans, has asked that he be relieved of this service and be permitted to return to his former position of Associate Professor of Agricultural Economics on

a full-time basis effective September I, 1947. I recommend approval.

I also recommend the appointment of Dr. Robert G. Bone, Associate Professor of History, to the combined position of Director of the Division of General Studies in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and Director of the Division of Special Services for War Veterans for two years, effective September 1, 1947, at an annual salary of \$7,500. Doctor Bone has been serving as Director of the Division of General Studies on one-half time since September 1, 1946.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these recommendations were approved and adopted.

APPOINTMENT OF DR. WILLIAM F. HUGHES, JR., AS PROFESSOR AND HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF OPHTHALMOLOGY

(14) I request confirmation of the appointment of Dr. William F. Hughes, Jr., as Professor and Head of the Department of Ophthalmology, on indefinite tenure, beginning July 1, 1947, at a salary of \$10,000 a year.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this appointment was confirmed as recommended.

SABBATICAL LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR JOHN T. BUCHHOLZ

(15) On April 18, 1946 (Minutes, page 1075), the Board of Trustees approved a sabbatical leave of absence for Professor John T. Buchholz of the Department of Botany for the first semester of 1947-1948 on full pay. Professor Buchholz has requested that in lieu of this he be given a leave of absence for the full academic year 1947-1948 on one-half pay.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this recommendation was adopted.

DIRECTOR OF ADMISSIONS AND RECORDS

(16) The University of Illinois Statutes provide for the appointment of a Registrar and specify in general his functions. This officer is more than a Registrar, since much of his work has to do with the admission of students and the administration of entrance requirements. I therefore recommend that the title of the Registrar's Office and of the Registrar be changed to "Office of Admissions and Records" and "Director of Admissions and Records." This will require the following changes in the Statutes:

21. (a) The Director of Admissions and Records shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees on the recommendation of the President.

(b) He shall conduct general correspondence with prospective students, pass upon the credentials of students entering the colleges and schools, supervise their entrance examinations, and have charge of their matriculation, registration, and their academic records.

(c) The Director of Admissions and Records shall assess all term fees, tuition, and other fees of students imposed by their attendance on the University and shall report the same to the Comptroller for collection. He shall keep detailed records of all such fees assessed and shall submit these original records for audit at the time the accounts of the Comptroller and the Treasurer are audited.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this recommendation was adopted and the Statutes were amended as recommended.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(17) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded the following who have made applications therefor under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943 and who have submitted satisfactory evidence that they hold valid and unrevoked C.P.A. certificates issued by other states on the basis of their having passed the regular written examinations:

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these certificates were awarded as recommended.

AMENDMENT OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION BY-LAWS

(18) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has voted that Article

VI, Section 6, of the By-Laws of the Athletic Association has voted that Athletic Association be amended as follows:

Section 6. Working Fund. The Business Manager may be allotted a working fund of not more than \$10,000, the amount of which shall be determined by the Board of Directors. Its purpose shall be the payment of petty and emergency items for which it shall be reimbursed from time to time by regular voucher and check for the Association.

With the increased operations of the Athletic Association it has been found that the working fund is inadequate to take care of needs in a satisfactory manner. For this reason, an increase in the fund is needed. The Comptroller recommends approval of the change and I concur. The By-Laws of the Association provide that amendments shall be submitted to the Board of Trustees for consideration before taking effect.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these amendments were authorized.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS AND AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(19) The Board of Directors of the University of Illinois Athletic Association requests approval of special appropriations from the unappropriated surplus of the Athletic Association for the following purposes:

I. For remodeling office space to be used by the Director of Publicity and

the Director of Athletics, \$1,025.

2. For the purchase of 150 dozen ribbed No. 798 Cannon towels from the Pleetox Products Company, St. Louis, Mo., \$1,057. These towels are to be name woven and the manufacturer has guaranteed delivery not later than August 15, 1947, which is well in advance of the opening of the football season.

3. A donation of \$500 to the Military Bands for the purchase of special football music and the repair of instruments for use during the football season.

The Compttoller recommends approval and Leonour.

The Comptroller recommends approval and I concur.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these appropriations were approved as recommended.

ADJUSTMENTS IN ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION BUDGET TO JUNE 30, 1947

(20) In approving the Athletic Association budget for the current year (Minutes, June 27, 1946, page 1172), the Board of Trustees authorized the President to make changes and adjustments as recommended by the Association Board of Directors within the total estimated income.

REMODELING PHYSICS LIBRARY

(21) On February 24, 1945, the Board of Trustees authorized the remodeling of the Physics Library, but no appropriation was made. The work could not be undertaken at that time until priorities on materials and equipment were secured, and these did not materialize. The project is one of long standing and has been recommended by the Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures.

The following bids have been received for the general construction work: E. N. DeAtley, \$6,600; C. H. Siems, \$8,690.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of the contract for the construction work to E. N. DeAtley in the amount of \$6,600, and an appropriation in the amount of \$13,000 for the improvements outlined above.

REMODELING AND FURNISHING OF UNIVERSITY CENTER IN CHICAGO

(22) On April 24, 1947, the Board authorized a lease with the LaSalle Hotel, Chicago, for space to be used as a University Center and to house offices of various University activities in Chicago. This approval was with the understanding that later a request for a nonrecurring appropriation for furnishings and other expense would be submitted.

Estimates have been made of the costs necessary for this work as follows:

These estimates are preliminary and not based on bids. It is expected that the management of the hotel will assume a part of this expense although the exact amount has not yet been determined.

I recommend an appropriation of \$15,000 at this time and request that the President of the University be authorized to supplement this appropriation by such an amount, not in excess of \$4,000, as may be necessary to meet the University's share of this expense.

This matter was referred to the Executive Committee with power to act when complete estimates are received.

APPROPRIATION FOR BOOKLET ON ROBERT ALLERTON PARK

(23) An illustrated brochure on Robert Allerton Park was published and distributed to guests at the garden party at the Park on May 16, one of the events of the Installation of the President. The cost of this printing was charged against the

appropriation for the installation.

The supply of this brochure is nearly exhausted. The type is still standing and another edition of 5,000 copies can be printed for \$1,000. This brochure is needed for public distribution, particularly when Robert Allerton Park is opened to the public. I recommend that the University assume the cost as a general public service and that an appropriation of \$1,000 be made from the General Reserve Fund.

WORKING CASH FUND AT CHICAGO UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(24) Operations at the Chicago Undergraduate Division at the Navy Pier have become of such a nature that a separate working cash fund appears essential. During the past year such operations have been handled through the \$15,000 working cash fund at the Chicago Professional Colleges. This fund is inadequate to take care of the combined operations, and it is inconvenient to handle the trans-

actions through a single fund for both places.

The Business Manager of the Chicago Divisions requests a working cash fund of \$5,000 for the Undergraduate Division to be established under the rules for working cash funds in the University Statutes. The Comptroller endorses this and recommends that the First National Bank of Chicago be approved as the depository for this fund. It will be drawn against by the Assistant to the Business Manager at the Chicago Undergraduate Division. The present fund now designated for "Chicago Departments" and also deposited in the First National Bank of Chicago will henceforth be designated as "University of Illinois Medical Center Working Cash Fund."

I concur in and recommend approval of these recommendations and the transfer of the sum involved from the General Reserve Fund.

INCREASE IN WORKING CASH FUND FOR GALESBURG UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(25) On September 24, 1946, the Board approved a working cash fund of \$25,000 for the Galesburg Undergraduate Division. Experience has proved that this sum is insufficient to take care of the needs of that division, including service to veterans in cashing their government warrants. The Comptroller requests authority to increase this fund to \$35,000. I recommend approval of this request.

REPORT ON UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS LEGISLATION

(26) As a matter of official information and record, I report the passage by the 65th General Assembly, and the approval by the Governor, of the following legislation which affects the University of Illinois:

Appropriation Bills

Senate Bill 17. An Act appropriating \$9,903,146 (\$5,933,996 from State tax revenues and \$3,969,150 from University income) for the biennium of 1945-1947.

This was an emergency bill passed early in the session to make a supplementary appropriation to the University for the current biennium and was reported to the Board on February 27.

SENATE BILL 130. An Act establishing an institution for tuberculosis research for the production, distribution, and application of the bacillus Calmette-Guerin (BCG) and other methods and materials for the prevention of tuberculosis and for conducting research in tuberculosis. The Act appropriates \$32,000 for the biennium of 1947-1949 to the State Department of Public Health for operation and maintenance expenses. The Act directs the University to acquire land for the use of the Institution in the City of Chicago, erect a building, equip, maintain, and operate it. Senate Bill 662 appropriates to the State Department of Finance \$21,250 for the purchase of land for the Institution and \$340,000 to the State Department of Public Health for the construction of the building.

Because of the distribution of responsibilities and of the funds for this enter-

prise, negotiation and agreement with the various departments concerned will be necessary to carry out the objectives of the legislation. The State Auditor of Public Accounts has already credited the appropriation of \$32,000 for operation to

the University.

SENATE BILL 360. An Act appropriating \$60,083,818 (\$43,083,818 from State tax revenues and \$17,000,000 from University income) to the University of Illinois for the biennium of 1947-1949. This is the biennial operating appropriation for the

House Bill 240. An Act appropriating \$250,000 to the University of Illinois to provide through purchase, construction, or otherwise, housing facilities for staff members. This was reported to the Board of Trustees on April 24.

Other Legislation

Senate Bill 196. An Act authorizing the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to acquire by purchase or otherwise, construct, equip, complete, operate, control, and manage any student residence hall staff housing facility, dormitory, health and physical education building, or other revenue producing building or buildings, and providing for and authorizing the issue of bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of construction, acquisition, or equipment of any such building or buildings, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation thereof, and providing for and authorizing the refunding of any such bonds.

Senate Bill 238. An Act amending the Civil Service law to exempt student employee positions and removing professional and scientific positions from exemption as a class, and providing for credit for seniority acquired under the State Civil Service System. The Civil Service law relates only to nonacademic positions.

Senate Bill 603. An Act amending the Civil Service law by repealing present provisions authorizing the Board of Trustees to prescribe rules for promotions, and stating the basis on which promotions are to be made, which basis is the same as now being followed.

SENATE BILL 604. An Act increasing from \$200,000 to \$300,000 the Working Cash Fund which the University is authorized to withhold from its receipts and to

retain in its treasury for use as a revolving fund.

House Bill 567. An Act amending the General Assembly scholarship law making further provisions for appointments to vacant scholarships. Previously the law provided that only the member of the General Assembly who made the original appointment may fill a vacancy and only while he is still a member of the General Assembly. The amendment provides that vacancies may be filled by his successor or successors.

House BILL 579. An Act to provide annually one scholarship in the University for each county of the State for the benefit of the children of persons who served in the Armed Forces of the United States during the Civil War, World War I, or any time between September 16, 1940, and the termination of World War II, preference to be given to children of deceased or disabled veterans. This is an extension of an old scholarship law making its benefits applicable to children of veterans of World War II.

HOUSE BILL 764. An Act providing for reciprocal allowance of credit for retirement, death, and disability benefits between the State Employees' Retirement System of Illinois, the University Retirement System of Illinois, and the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois, making it possible for an employee who transfers from one system to another to retain equity earned prior to transfer.

This report was received for record.

RELEASES OF FUNDS FOR BUILDINGS

(27) The 65th General Assembly, in Senate Bill 662, has made appropriations totaling \$12,994,732 to the University of Illinois for buildings and other capital improvements. This is a reallocation of funds appropriated for the biennium, 1945-1947, only a small part of which could be used before they will lapse. It is in accordance with the plan and schedule of projects totaling \$15,287,920 reported to and approved by the Board of Trustees on April 24, 1947, except that by action of the State Senate (as reported to the Board on June 23, 1947) this building program was reduced by 15 per cent which resulted in the elimination of the Fine Arts Building and reductions in other items.

The appropriations were made with the provision that "No contract shall be entered into or obligation incurred for any expenditure from any appropriation herein made until after the purpose and amount of such expenditure has been approved in writing by the Governor." The Governor has approved the release

BIDS ON NEW CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(28) Bids were received on July 15 and July 22 for the new building for chemistry and chemical engineering for which funds totaling \$2,776,000 are included in the building appropriations for 1947-1949, of which \$2,500,000 has been

released by the Governor. A tabulation of bids is given below.

The Physical Plant Department has reviewed its estimate of total cost of the building and finds that the bids submitted, allowing for other necessary costs estimated, will exceed available funds by approximately \$75,000. In addition, approximately \$50,000 will be needed for movable equipment, not included in the building budget but requested by the Chemistry Department. The University Architect states that \$25,000 of construction work can be omitted or deferred, leaving a net deficiency of about \$100,000, including provision for equipment.

Since 1940 the Department of Chemistry has done a great deal of research work on military problems for the United States Government. The contracts with the Government provided for payments in excess of direct costs of the research work to cover administrative and other overhead expenses. The total payments for indirect costs accumulated under such contracts for research work in chemistry approximate \$482,000, of which \$56,327 has been expended and \$150,000 has been transferred to the General Reserve Fund, leaving a balance of about \$275,000 which is held in trust. A part of this may be claimed by the Government as a result of additional audits but in the opinion of the Comptroller it would be feasible and entirely appropriate to assign up to \$100,000 from this source toward the construction and equipment of the new Chemistry Building.

The Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommended that contracts be awarded to the lowest bidders in each of the respective categories, as follows, subject to reductions of \$25,000 in construction work to be effected

through change orders after contracts are drawn:

EMPLOYERS' LIABILITY INSURANCE

(29) Under a contract with the Research Division of the Navy Department, the University is required to maintain employers' liability insurance. The University now carries such insurance with the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company. A year ago this firm's bid was lower than any of the few bids then received. This year, however, no company except Liberty Mutual has bid for the insurance.

The Director of Purchases recommends the purchase of an employers' liability (occupational disease coverage included) and a scheduled general liability and property damage policy providing maximum coverage of \$50,000 for one individual and up to \$100,000 for two or more, effective August 7, 1947, for one year, to protect the operations necessary in research work under a contract (No. 60R1-71) with the Office of Research and Inventions of the United States Navy Department, from Liberty Mutual Insurance Company at an estimated gross premium of \$1,918.58. This company meets our rating requirements.

This recommendation was submitted by the Comptroller to the Finance

Committee and approved by all members.

I concur and recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were approved.

BOILER AND MACHINERY INSURANCE

(30) On June 22, 1944, the Board approved the purchase of boiler and machinery insurance from the Lumbermen's Mutual Casualty Company, which policy expires July 31, 1947. This insurance covers boiler and machinery located on University premises, owned, operated, or controlled by the University, subject to certain location insurance limits and sequence of indemnity payments. Requests for bids were sent to a number of insurance firms and 12 bids were received.

The Director of Purchases, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and the Comptroller recommend acceptance of the offer of the Lumbermen's Mutual Insurance Company, the low bidder meeting rating requirements, on the basis of a gross premium of \$10,200, subject to an estimated 20% dividend at policy period termination, or a net premium of \$8,160. This premium will be paid from the Physical Plant Operation and Maintenance appropriation.

I concur and recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this award was authorized as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR LIBRARY BINDING

(31) The contract for library binding for the past biennium with Ernst Hertz-

berg and Sons terminated June 30, 1947.

The following binderies were invited to submit proposals on our specifications for binding work for the two-year period beginning July 1, 1947, covering all requirements for Urbana, the Chicago Professional Colleges, the Chicago Undergraduate Division, and the Galesburg Undergraduate Division:

Ernst Hertzberg & Sons, Chicago Edwin Allen Company, Chicago Burgmeier Book Bindery, Inc., Chicago

Pfisterer's Bindery, Galesburg

New Method Book Bindery, Inc.

Bid on all binding. Bid on Chicago Professional Colleges and Chicago Undergraduate Division only. Bid on Galesburg Undergraduate Division only. No bid.

A careful analysis of the bids received has been made and the bid submitted by Ernst Hertzberg & Sons is low except for the binding for the Galesburg Undergraduate Division. The Director of Purchases recommends, therefore, that a contract be awarded to Ernst Hertzberg & Sons for all binding except for the Galesburg Undergraduate Division. The total expenditure involved for the two-year period is approximately \$100,000. This company has been doing most of the binding for University of Illinois libraries for a great many years and has always provided good service and quality work.

The Director of Purchase also accompanies that the contract of the

The Director of Purchases also recommends that a contract for binding of books for the Galesburg Undergraduate Division be awarded to Pfisterer's Bindery, Galesburg. The total expenditure on this contract will be approximately \$1,500. The location of this bindery will result in good service and their price on this group is low.

The Director of the Library and the Comptroller concur in this recom-

mendation and I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these recommendations were approved.

AUTHORIZATION OF PLAN OF OPERATION OF DIVISION OF SERVICES FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN

(33) The Children's Bureau of the United States Department of Labor makes grants to the Division of Services for Crippled Children. As a basis for these grants, it requires a certificate by an executive officer of the University. Responsibility and general oversight of the Division has been placed in Vice-President A. C. Ivy, who therefore may appropriately sign such certificates. The Children's Bureau requires that the Attorney General of the State certify as to the legality of the plan of operation of the Division. The Attorney General asks that the Board of Trustees, by resolution, designate the officer to certify documents on its behalf. Approval of the following resolution therefore is requested:

Whereas the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, by making appropriations to the University of Illinois for the Division of Services for Crippled Children, has placed the responsibility for coercition of that Division as the

Children, has placed the responsibility for operation of that Division on the

University, and

Whereas it is necessary that the Board of Trustees designate an officer of the University to act as executive officer in supervising the work of the agency and in executing documents required, particularly for the purpose of securing Federal grants:

Therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that A. C. Ivy, Vice-President of the Professional Colleges of the University, be and hereby is, authorized to act as executive officer of the Division of Services for Crippled Children and to sign any and all documents required in connection with securing funds for that Division.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this resolution was adopted as recommended.

PARTIAL DISTRIBUTION OF BEQUEST OF EDWARD C. EARL

(34) On May 26, 1945 (Minutes, page 485), Comptroller Lloyd Morey was authorized to serve as Executor of the Estate of Edward C. Earl. On February 27, 1947, a partial distribution of assets received by the Executor was made to the University.

One of the assets of the Estate was a house and lot in Mt. Ranier, Maryland. This property has now been sold and the proceeds amounting to \$5,633.86 have been received from the attorney. The check, in favor of the Board of Trustees, was not handled through the accounts of the Executor but was deposited directly with the Treasurer of the University and credited to the principal of the Earl endowment.

BIDS ON FURNISHING MAIN SWITCH-GEAR FOR ELECTRICAL DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM. CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(36) The following bids have been received for furnishing the main switch-gear for the 4,000-volt initial electrical distribution system to be installed on the Chicago Professional Colleges Campus:

The Allis-Chalmers' detailed proposal includes an extra charge of \$315 to meet the specifications for enclosed terminal boxes for the current transformer leads. The other bidders included this cost in their bids. The Allis-Chalmers' proposal increases their bid to \$38,813, changing their bidding position from low to high.

The time of delivery of the switch-gear is also important, as the installation will be necessary before power can be supplied to the new Physical Environment Addition to the Hospital. The Physical Plant Department recommends the contract award to the General Electric Company, the lowest bidder and the firm giving the shortest delivery time, based on their bid price of \$38,593, f.o.b. Chicago

Campus.

In the General Electric Company's transmitting letter of July 14, 1947, they have taken exception to the bid documents involving the guarantee and supervision clauses and the performance bond. The Physical Plant Department recommends that the contract be awarded with the stipulation that the contract terms would be similar to those incorporated in the turbine-generator contract for Unit 3 of Abbott Power Plant, since in that contract they were willing to accept the clauses and bond as originally submitted.

Funds are available in the 1947-1949 appropriation for the Electrical Distribu-

tion System, Chicago, to cover the above contract.

I recommend approval of the foregoing recommendations and authorization to the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these recommendations were approved and authority granted as recommended.

ILLINI UNION BUILDING REFUNDING LOAN

(37) As authorized by the Board of Trustees on June 23 (Minutes, page 403) and in accordance with invitations approved by the Finance Committee, the following bids were received on July 30, 1947, on \$425,000 revenue bonds of the Illini Union Building, Urbana, to be dated October 1, 1947, due serially through October 1, 1957.

The low bid is offered by Julien Collins & Company and White, Weld, & Co., both of Chicago, as a joint bid, at an effective interest rate of 1.5204 for all bonds; bonds maturing 1948 through 1956 to bear interest at 1½% and for 1957 at 1¾%; entire issue to be purchased at par plus a premium of \$313.00.

The Finance Committee has reviewed the bids and finds that the one offered by the low bidders meets all requirements. The Finance Committee recommends

that the award be made to the lowest bidders.

The bidders have proposed that the bonds, principal, and interest be payable at the Northern Trust Company of Chicago, and the Finance Committee recommends approval of that proposal.

The offering was made with the provision that the bonds will be delivered with the approving opinion of Chapman & Cutler, attorneys, of Chicago. The Finance Committee recommends that the employment of this firm for all necessary services in connection with this issue be authorized.

The new issue will result in a saving over the remaining life of the obligation estimated at \$75,200 on interest cost under that of the present loan.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the award was made as recommended, subject to a confirming opinion to be secured from Chapman and Cutler.

RELEASE OF PATENTABLE DISCOVERIES

(38) The Faculty Committee on Patents submits the following recommendations on patentable discoveries by members of the University staff which have been

reported to and considered by the Committee.

1. Low reactance shunt, a device which permits a recording instrument to record only a fraction of the total current; thyratron controlled automatic positioner, a device for the accurate control of arc voltage (used in arc welding) by "positioning" the welding head in general situations in which high speed "positioning" is necessary. These are joint discoveries by Gilbert H. Fett, Associate Professor, and Robert J. LaPlante, Special Research Assistant, in the Department of Electrical Engineering, and are the result of research work under contract No. N6ORI-71-EE with the Bureau of Ships of the Navy Department. In the opinion of the discoverers, these devices do not offer sufficient possibilities of commercial exploitation to warrant the University in expending funds to secure patents. The Committee recommends that these discoveries be released to the Navy Department.

2. High speed counter, a joint discovery by Gilbert H. Fett, Associate Professor, and Nathan Rynkowsky, Special Research Assistant, in Electrical Engineering. This discovery resulted from research work under Contract No. W28-099-AD-132 with the Air Materiel Command of the United States Army Air Forces. This is a restricted contract covering research work of a highly confidential nature, and it provides that any patentable discoveries shall become the property of the United States. The Committee therefore recommends that this

discovery be released to the Army.

3. Colonel George W. Gardes, Judge Advocate, General Division, Chief, Patents Group, presented through the office of the President of the University, a request that the University of Illinois release its right to file an application for a patent on a discovery described as a "Water Purification Process and Apparatus" which was made by Mr. H. E. Hudson, Jr., in the performance of the work contracted for by the University of Illinois with the Government of the United States in Contract No. OEMsr-593. It is recommended that this discovery be released, and that the Government be authorized to file an application for patent in the name of the discoverer, and that the discoverer be directed to execute the necessary assignments to the Government. The Government is to sustain all of the costs incident to the application for patent.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these patents were released as recommended.

PRINCIPLES GOVERNING RESEARCH CONTRACTS

(39) It is recommended that the following principles governing research contracts be submitted to the Board of Trustees to supersede Section VI of the policy relating to research contracts approved by the Board of Trustees October

18, 1945.

All research contracts are to be classified by the Director of the University research agency involved or by the Chairman of the University Research Board after consultation with those directly concerned and with the dean of the college involved. In the case of contracts involving the Chicago Professional Colleges only, the Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges will make this classification. Considering the direct value that accrues to the donor and in accordance with the scientific benefits resulting to the University and to the public, each contract should be classified as follows:

I. Those mainly for the benefit of outside donors with little or no research

objectives involved from the standpoint of the University.

II. Those which fit University research objectives but from which the sponsor derives some benefit.

III. Those which are supplemental to University research programs and provide funds for desirable expenditures which the University otherwise would not be able to make or, in some instances, would relieve the University of expenditures that it might otherwise make and thus release University funds for other

or additional research expenditures.

Notwithstanding the classification of any particular contract, the accrual of indirect costs will be recognized and the University officers involved should suggest to the grantor that all or a portion of such costs be met from contract funds. Projects in Group I should be charged with an amount that will compensate the University as fully as possible for all indirect costs to which it has been put in carrying out the project.

The rate and amount of indirect costs, if any, to be paid to the University on projects in Groups II and III will be determined by the administrative officer of the research agency involved after consultation with the Business Office. Such consultation will not be required in the case of research investigations involving

total payments of less than \$5,000.

Subject to the principles stated above, any University staff member who has been authorized by the proper administrative officer to negotiate with a prospective sponsor of an investigation shall prepare a budget for all estimated direct costs and to this amount shall be added the provision, if any, for indirect costs. Indirect costs include general, college, and departmental administrative costs, physical plant operating costs, and use of departmental, college, and general University facilities.

The following distribution of funds collected on account of indirect costs is

to be made:

Thirty per cent will be made available to the University department conducting the investigation, for use as approved by the administrative officer of the college. Costs of research investigations, not charged thereto as direct costs, and property purchased from contract funds for use on investigations, title to which remains with the donor, which is acquired by the University at the termination of

the contract by purchase, will be charged to this allocation.

Thirty per cent will be transferred to a general research fund to be allocated by the University Research Board for research purposes to any individual or

department of the University.

Balances remaining in the above allocations at the close of each fiscal year will be subject to reappropriation by the Board of Trustees.

Forty per cent will periodically lapse to general University income. Any administrative or physical plant costs which result from such research activities may be charged directly to these funds.

Certain contracts are negotiated, particularly with Federal agencies, in which a provisional rate of reimbursement for indirect costs is stated, to be subject to later review. Any amounts allocated in accordance with the above will be subject

to such review and renegotiation of rates, if applicable.

Employer contributions to the University Retirement System of Illinois for retirement annuities and disability and death benefits, covering the salaries of participants in the System paid from contract funds, are to be considered as direct

costs of all research contracts with outside sponsors.

To provide for possible losses under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 11/2% of all payments for personal services from contract funds will be assessed against such funds as direct costs. Such charge will not be made if the research contract provides indemnity to the University for any losses incurred under such Act, or if the interests of the University do not appear to require it. Such rate may be reduced if justified by experience, or if in the individual projects the probability of loss is small. The sums thus accumulated will be carried in a reserve account from which such claims will be paid.

These principles will be effective July 1, 1947.

This matter was referred to the President of the University and the Finance Committee for consideration and report.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT 805 WEST PENNSYLVANIA AVENUE

(40) The 65th General Assembly of Illinois has failed to make any appropriation to the University of Illinois for the biennium of 1947-1949 for the construction of a Veterinary Science Building. This was the top priority item on the Urbana

Campus in the \$20,472,000 building program requested by the University for the biennium of 1947-1949. An appropriation of \$750,000 was made by the 64th General Assembly for a veterinary building and equipment, but it was not possible to construct a building during the biennium of 1945-1947 and the appropriation was insufficient to construct a complete usable unit. This appropriation will lapse except

for funds which have been expended for architectural services.

It is necessary for the College of Veterinary Medicine to have some facilities for a research laboratory for its staff and for advanced students. I therefore recommend that the Board authorize the purchase of the property at 805 West Pennsylvania Avenue, Urbana, at a price of \$57,500 for use as a temporary research laboratory by the College of Veterinary Medicine.

This is a three-story and basement brick building on a lot 120 feet wide and 140 feet deep. The building was formerly a sorority house. In the basement are a large dining room, kitchen, chapter room, and a heating plant, with coal storage space. On the main floor are a living room, reception room, two bedrooms, and a bath. On the second floor are fourteen studies (or bedrooms), baths, showers, and toilets. On the third floor are five studies (or bedrooms) and a large dormitory or bedroom area. The house is equipped to accommodate about 40 students. The building is modern and in reasonably good condition and is unoccupied at the present time. It has been appraised by Mr. Newton C. Farr, Chicago Realtor, who reports that the price is substantially less than the replacement cost less depreciation based on age and condition, and he recommends its purchase.

When a new veterinary building has been provided, the building at 805 West

Pennsylvania Avenue can be used for student housing.

In a preceding memorandum I have recommended an appropriation of \$80,000 for the purchase of this building and for the remodeling necessary to adapt it for use as a College of Veterinary Medicine Research Laboratory.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this report was received for record.

APPRAISAL OF NOYES CHEMISTRY LABORATORY

Mr. McKelvey presented the following report.

In connection with the problem of insurance on the Noyes Chemistry Laboratory, approved by the Board on March 27, 1047 (Minutes, page 322), the need of an appraisal of the building has become apparent. The Director of Purchases and the Comptroller have suggested the firm of Marshall & Stevens, valuation engineers, of Chicago. The cost would be \$692 plus nominal expenses.

Marshall & Stevens state that, after a thorough survey of the structure is made by their engineers at the property, they would supply us with a building report and contents report, both of which would be in complete detail and furnish

a sound evaluation of the structure and its contents.

Such an appraisal should furnish complete information for the proper placement of insurance, assure us that we are complying with the coinsurance requirements of our insurance contracts, and would provide valuable descriptive and inventory data in the event of a partial or complete loss of the structure and its

The Buildings and Grounds Committee has considered this proposal and recommends that Marshall & Stevens be retained to appraise the Noyes Chemistry Laboratory and its contents, and a special appropriation of \$800 for this purpose.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this appraisal was authorized and the appropriation was made by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no. none; absent. Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer.

The Board adjourned.

THE UNIVERSITY BUDGET FOR 1947-1948

(Approved by the Board of Trustees August 5, 1947, page 489)

EXPLANATORY NOTES

This budget consists of: Summaries of all divisions; General University Administration; Urbana-Champaign Academic and Administrative Salaries, Wages, Expense, and Equipment; Urbana-Champaign Nonacademic Salaries; Chicago Professional Colleges and Schools; Chicago Undergraduate Division; and Galesburg Undergraduate Division.

Appropriations for Salaries are available for the term indicated in each case

but not for more than one year from September 1, 1947.

When appointments are made at salary rates less than the amounts provided in the budget, the unused balance is lapsed at that time, resulting in a reduction in

the budget.

Funds appropriated for positions in the salary budget which are not yet filled may, pending regular appointments, be drawn against by voucher to the Business Office for services of employees temporarily engaged to do the work contemplated by the position. Such temporary charges may not exceed the amount of time provided by the position unless indicated herein or otherwise approved by the

All unexpended balances remaining in the salary budget lapse at the close of each calendar month unless previously assigned or encumbered. Such lapses do not

result in a reduction in the budget.

Departmental appropriations are made under the captions "Salaries," "Wages," and "Expense and Equipment." No transfers may be made between "Salaries" and "Expense and Equipment" except with the approval of the President of the University. Requests for such changes should be submitted to the Comptroller, Adjustments may be requested between "Salaries" and "Wages" and between "Wages" and "Expense and Equipment" and "Expense and Equipment". and "Expense and Equipment" upon notice to the Comptroller.

Appropriations for Expense and Equipment and for Wages are available for one year beginning July 1, 1947, and ending June 30, 1948. All unexpended balances in Wages appropriations lapse June 30, 1948, and unencumbered balances in Expense and Equipment appropriations lapse on that date. The only allowable encumbrances for which funds will be carried forward on June 30, 1948, are those for the

purchase of equipment and other capital items. Unless otherwise indicated in the budget:

I. The service required under appointments in this budget to positions on the teaching faculty covers the academic year of the University, not including the Summer Session. Salaries of such positions of the rank of Associate and above are paid in twelve equal monthly installments; salaries of other ranks, in ten equal monthly installments.

2. The service required in all positions in experiment stations and bureaus of research, and in research positions in other departments, is for a full year of twelve months, with allowance of one month for vacations, and salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments. In these positions the letter "Y" follows the

tenure symbol.

3. The service required in all other positions, unless otherwise indicated administrative, clerical, and service positions—is for a full year of twelve months, with allowance for vacations, and salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments. All such positions in the academic budget are indicated by the letter "Y" following the tenure symbol.

A — Indefinite tenure.
B — Two years from September 1, 1947.

D — One year from September 1, 1947. E - Ten months from September 1, 1947

G — Special tenure.

H — July 1, 1947, to June 30, 1948.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

September 26, 1947



The September meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, on Friday, September 26, 1947, according to the following schedule:

12 m. — Open session.

2:30 p.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

The following members were present: President Livingston, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Meyer, and Mr. Nickell.

President Stoddard was present; also Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in Charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Professor Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and, during part of the day, Mr. V. L. Kretschmer, Manager of the Illini Union Building, and Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

RESOLUTIONS FOR ILLINI UNION REFINANCING

- (1) The Board of Trustees on August 5 approved the acceptance of bids for refinancing the Illini Union Building loan and authorized the employment of the firm of Chapman and Cutler for legal services in connection with the new bond issue. This firm has now prepared the following resolutions and submits them to the Board of Trustees for approval:
- 1. Resolution authorizing the issuance of Illini Union Building revenue bonds in the amount of \$425,000.
- 2. Resolution authorizing the President, Secretary, and Treasurer of the Board of Trustees to execute all instruments necessary for the termination of the trust.
- 3. Resolution designating two members of the Board of Trustees to act with the officers in executing the bonds as provided by statute.
 - I recommend the adoption of these resolutions.

I. RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF ILLINI UNION BUILDING REVENUE BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$425,000

RESOLUTION authorizing and providing for the termination of an existing trust between the University of Illinois Foundation, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and to reacquire the interest in the Illini Union Building conveyed to said Foundation pursuant to said existing trust, and authorizing the issue of \$425,000 Illini Union Building Revenue Bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of terminating said trust and reacquiring the interest in said property conveyed pursuant to said trust, prescribing all the details of said bonds, and providing for the collection, segregation and distribution of the revenues of said Illini Union Building for the purpose of paying the cost of maintenance and operation of said building, and payment of the principal of, premium if any and interest on said revenue bonds.

WHEREAS pursuant to "An Act to authorize the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to provide for the payment and termination of any trust created by and between the Board of Trustees and any person or corporation pursuant to any law involving any building used by said University for student social activities, or educational purposes, or for the acquiring or reacquiring of property or interest in property used by said University for student social activities or educational purposes and conveyed in connection with the creation of such trust by said Board of Trustees pursuant to any existing law, levy and collect service charges, rates or rentals for the use thereof, to complete the construction of or equip any such buildings, defining the duties of said Board with respect to the operation and maintenance and construction thereof, providing for and authorizing the issue of bonds to defray the cost thereof, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation of any such building or buildings, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 27, 1941, as amended, this Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is authorized to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of procuring funds to terminate any existing trust involving any building now used by the University for student social activities or educational purposes, and to establish rates or charges for the use of said building, and pledge the revenue from such charges or rates for the payment of the revenue bonds so issued; and

WHEREAS this Board of Trustees has heretofore, pursuant to existing law, created a trust by and between said Board and the University of Illinois Foundation, a non-profit corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Illinois, for the purpose of constructing the Illini Union Building, located on the campus at Urbana, Illinois, and said property has been conveyed in trust to said Foundation, which said trust now exists, and the Board of Trustees has leased said building

from said Foundation and it is now used by said University for student social activities and other educational purposes; and

WHEREAS it is deemed advisable and for the best interests of the University of Illinois that said trust be terminated and that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois reacquire the interest in said property so conveyed in trust;

WHEREAS the University of Illinois Foundation has agreed with this Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to terminate said trust upon payment to it as trustee the sum \$499,241.55, representing the principal amount on the outstanding note and mortgage of the University of Illinois Foundation plus interest due October I, 1947 and the premium necessary to call and pay the same, which was executed for the purpose of constructing the said Illini Union Building in accordance with the terms of the trust hereinabove referred to, and which sum, together with funds now on hand for that purpose will be sufficient to pay all the obligations and liabilities of said Foundation for the purpose of terminating said trust: and

WHEREAS it will be necessary for the purpose of procuring part of said sum of \$499,241.55 that this Board of Trustees borrow money and issue revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$425,000, as authorized pursuant to the Act, hereinabove referred to:

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It and It Is Hereby Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois as follows:

Section I. That it be and it is hereby determined by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that it is necessary and for the best interests of the University of Illinois that the existing trust entered into by and between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the University of Illinois Foundation, a non-profit corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Illinois, and dated as of the 27th day of September, 1940, be terminated and that the interest in property conveyed by said trust, consisting of the Illini Union Building located on the campus of said University at Urbana, Illinois, which was the subject matter of said trust, be reacquired, and that bonds be issued for the purpose of procuring funds necessary for the termination of said trust and the reacquiring of the interest in said property conveyed by said trust, all in accordance with the provisions of the Act passed by the Sixty-second General Assembly, referred to in the preambles of this resolution.

Section 2. That said bonds shall be designated "Illini Union Building Revenue Bonds," be numbered 1 to 425, inclusive, be of the denomination of \$1,000 each, be dated October 1, 1947, bonds numbered 1 to 395, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of one and one-half per cent (1½%) per annum, and bonds numbered 396 to 425, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of one and three-fourths per cent (14%) per annum, interest payable April 1, 1948, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of April and October in each year, and to become due

provided, however, bonds numbered 101 to 425, inclusive, maturing on October 1 of each year, beginning with October 1, 1950, up to and including October 1, 1957, shall be redeemable as a whole prior to their maturity on any interest payment date at the option of said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois on or after October 1, 1949, and up to and including April 1, 1953, at par and accrued interest and a premium of two per cent of the principal amount thereof.

Bonds numbered 286 to 425, inclusive, maturing on October I of each year, beginning with October I, 1954, up to and including October I, 1957, shall be redeemable prior to maturity on any interest payment date at the option of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois as a whole or in part through operation of the sinking fund on or after October I, 1953 and until maturity at par and accrued interest and a premium of one per cent of the principal amount thereof; provided, however, that if bonds numbered 286 to 425, inclusive, are called in part through the operation of the sinking fund, they shall be called and redeemed in the inverse order of their maturities. That is to say, bonds maturing on October I, 1957 shall be called and paid before any bonds maturing October I, 1956 and so on. If sinking fund moneys are on hand sufficient to redeem some, but not all of said bonds of any maturity at any time when such bonds become redeemable pursuant to the terms of this ordinance, the said bonds to be redeemed shall be designated by lot in any usual manner by the depositary hereinafter mentioned.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made once in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and such notice of redemption shall, with substantial accuracy (a) designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be at the office of the Depositary hereinafter mentioned in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois; and (b) designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of such bonds; and (c) state that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of principal thereof and the accrued interest thereon to date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of all bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

Section 3. Any of said bonds may be registered as to principal at any time prior to maturity in the name of the holder on the books of registration of said University to be kept in the office of the Depositary hereinafter mentioned, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by the said Depositary as registrar. After such registration no transfer of such bonds shall be valid unless made on the said books by the registered owner in person or by his duly authorized attorney and similarly noted on such bonds. Upon presentation of any of such bonds registered as to principal, accompanied by a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the Depositary hereinafter mentioned, executed by the registered owner, or by a duly authorized attorney, such bond shall be transferred upon such books. The registered owner of any such bond registered as to principal shall also have the right to cause the same to be discharged from registration by transfer to bearer, in which case transferability by delivery shall be restored, and thereafter the principal of such bond when due shall be payable to the person presenting such bond. Any such bond registered as payable to bearer may be registered again in the name of the owner with the same effect as the first registration thereof. Successive registrations and transfers as aforesaid may be made from time to time as desired. Registration of any of such bonds shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons thereto attached, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely and payable to the bearer thereof.

Said bonds shall be signed by the President and two members of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, sealed with the corporate seal of said University, attested by the Secretary of said Board, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be authenticated by the facsimile signature of the Treasurer of the University of Illinois.

Section 4. That said bonds and coupons, and form for registration, shall be in substantially the following form:

Both principal and interest of this bond are hereby made payable in lawful money of the United States of America at The Northern Trust Company, in the

City of Chicago and State of Illinois.

This bond is one of an authorized issue of Four Hundred Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$425,000), all of like date, tenor and effect, except as to rate of interest, maturity and redemption privilege, and is issued under authority of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois, entitled "An Act to authorize the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to provide for the payment and termination of any trust created by and between the Board of Trustees and any person or corporation pursuant to any law involving any building used by said University for student social activities or educational purposes, or for the acquiring or reacquiring of property or interest in property used by said University for student social activities or educational purposes and conveyed in connection with the creation of such trust by said Board of Trustees pursuant to any existing law, levy and collect service charges, rates or rentals for the use thereof, to complete the construction of or equip any such buildings, defining the duties of said Board with respect to operation and maintenance and construction thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issue of bonds to defray the cost thereof payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation of any such building or buildings and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 17, 1941, as amended, and a resolution duly adopted by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, for the purpose of defraying the cost of terminating an existing trust and reacquiring the interest in the Illini Union Building located on the campus of the University of Illinois, in the City of Urbana, Illinois, conveyed pursuant to said existing trust entered into between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the University of Illinois Foundation, a non-profit corporation duly organized under the Laws of the State of Illinois, and is payable solely from the net revenue to be derived from the operation of said building, and not otherwise, and this bond and the series of which it forms a part do not constitute an indebtedness of said University or of the State of Illinois within any constitutional or statutory limitation, and neither the taxing power nor the general credit of said University or the State of Illinois is pledged to the payment of this bond or the interest thereon,

Under said Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois and the said resolution adopted pursuant thereto, the net revenue derived from the operation of said building shall be deposited with The Northern Trust Company, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, under a Deposit Agreement entered into between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the said Bank, and used only for the purpose of paying the fees and expenses of such Depositary, principal of, premium if any and interest on the bonds of said University that are issued under authority of said Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois and the resolution of the

Board of Trustees, hereinabove referred to, and which are payable by their terms only from the net revenue of said Illini Union Building located on the campus of said University, in the City of Urbana, Illinois.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond by the Constitution and Statutes of the State of Illinois, and the applicable resolutions of said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, have been done and have happened and have been performed in regular and due form and time as required by law and that provision has been made for depositing the net revenue derived from the operation of said building with the said The Northern Trust Company, to be applied in

the manner as hereinabove set forth.

Bonds numbered 101 to 425, inclusive, of this authorized issue are redeemable as a whole prior to maturity at the option of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois on any interest payment date on or after October 1, 1949, and up to and including April 1, 1953, at par and accrued interest and a premium of two per cent of the principal amount thereof. Bonds numbered 286 to 425, inclusive, are redcemable as a whole at the option of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois or in part through operation of the sinking fund in the inverse order of their maturity, on and after October I, 1953 and prior to maturity thereof, at par and accrued interest and a premium of one per cent of the principal amount thereof. If sinking fund moneys are on hand sufficient to redeem some but not all of any maturity of said bonds numbered 286 to 425, inclusive, at any time when such bonds become redeemable, the said bonds to be redeemed shall be designated by lot in any usual manner by the Depositary hereinabove referred to.

Notice of redemption shall be published once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption; such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and when this bond shall have been called for redemption, interest thereon shall cease from and after

the specified redemption date.

This bond shall pass by delivery unless it is registered as to principal in the name of the holder on the books of registration of said University kept at the office of the Depositary hereinabove mentioned, such registration to be noted on the back hereof. After such registration no transfer hereof shall be valid unless made on such books by the registered holder in person or by attorney duly authorized in writing and similarly noted hereon, but this bond may be transferred in like manner to bearer, and thereupon transferability by delivery shall be restored and it may again from time to time be registered or transferred to bearer as before. Such registration, however, shall not restrict the negotiability of the coupons hereto appertaining, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely and payable to the bearer thereof.

This bond and all other bonds of this issue shall have all of the qualities of negotiable instruments, and during such time as this bond is payable to bearer, the same and each of the coupons hereto appertaining may be negotiated by delivery by any person having possession thereof, howsoever such possession may have been acquired, and any holder who shall have taken this bond while so payable to bearer or any of said coupons from any person for value and without notice shall thereby acquire absolute title to this bond or to such coupons as the case may be, free of any defenses enforceable against any prior holder and free from all equities and claims of ownership of any such prior holder, and the said University and any paying agent may deem and treat the bearer of this bond, or, if registered. the person in whose name it is registered and the bearer of any interest coupon

appertaining hereto as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes.

Said University of Illinois hereby covenants with the holder of this bond that it will keep and perform all the covenants and agreements in the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees of said University of Illinois, authorizing the issue of this bond and the series of which it forms a part and as provided in the Deposit Agreement hereinabove referred to, and hereby irrevocably obligates itself to deposit the net revenue derived from the operation of said building with the said Depositary, to administer the said net revenue as provided for in and by said Deposit Agreement, and to establish from time to time charges and fees for the use of said building and to maintain and collect charges and fees sufficient to pay the cost of maintenance and operation of said building, and pay the principal of and interest upon all revenue bonds which by their terms are payable from such revenues until all of such bonds have been paid in full, both as to principal and interest.

Section 5. That upon the issuance of any revenue bonds herein provided for there be and there is hereby established a fiscal year for the operation of said Illini Union Building and said fiscal year shall commence the first day of July of each year and end the last day of the next succeeding June and all revenues derived from the operation thereof shall be set aside as collected and kept separate and apart from any other funds of said University, and said University covenants that all the revenues, income, receipts, profits, rates, rents, charges, fees and returns derived from the said building and the operation thereof, after setting aside therefrom the reasonable cost of operating, maintaining, insuring and repair

ing said building, shall be paid over to the Depositary hereinafter mentioned semiannually not later than fifteen days prior to October I and April I of each year, and said revenues so paid over to the Depositary shall be used only in paying the fees and expenses of such Depositary, principal of, premium if any and interest upon the revenue bonds of said University that are payable by their terms only from such revenues, and such funds shall be used only for the purposes and in accordance with the Deposit Agreement hereinafter set out.

Section 6. That for the purpose of further securing the income and revenue to be derived from the operation of the said building and the application of the net revenue to the payment of the principal of and interest upon the said bonds hereby authorized, the net revenue derived from the operation of the said building shall be deposited with The Northern Trust Company, hereby designated as the Depositary for the said net revenue, and the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees and Treasurer of said University be and are hereby authorized and directed to execute for and on behalf of the University a Deposit Agreement with said bank as Depositary in substantially the following form, to wit:

THIS DEPOSIT AGREEMENT dated October 1, 1947, between the University of Illinois, a public corporate body duly organized and existing under the laws of and located in the State of Illinois (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "University"), party of the first part, and The Northern Trust Company, a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of Illinois and having its office in the City of Chicago, in the State of Illinois (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Depositary"), party of the second part,

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS the University, pursuant to a resolution of its Board of Trustees, entitled

"RESOLUTION authorizing and providing for the termination of an existing trust between the University of Illinois Foundation, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and to reacquire the interest in the Illini Union Building conveyed to said Foundation pursuant to said existing trust, and authorizing the issue of \$425,000 Illini Union Building Revenue Bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of terminating said trust and reacquiring the interest in said property conveyed pursuant to said trust, prescribing all the details of said bonds, and providing for the collection, segregation and distribution of the revenues of said Illini Union Building for the purpose of paying the cost of maintenance and operation of said building, and payment of the principal of, premium if any and interest on said revenue bonds."

Bonds numbered I to 425, inclusive, of the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each, bonds numbered 101 to 425, inclusive, maturing on October

I of each year, beginning with October I, 1950, up to and including October I, 1957, redeemable as a whole prior to maturity on any interest payment date at the option of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois on or after October 1, 1949, and up to and including April I, 1953, at par and accrued interest and a premium of two per cent of the principal amount thereof. Bonds numbered 286 to 425, inclusive, maturing October I of each year beginning with October I, 1954, up to and including October I, 1957 redeemable as a whole prior to maturity on any interest payment date at the option of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois or in part through operation of the sinking fund on or after October I, 1953 and until maturity at par and accrued interest and a premium of one per cent of the principal amount thereof. Bonds numbered 286 to 425, inclusive, called in part through the operation of the sinking fund shall be called and redeemed in the inverse order of their maturities. That is to say, bonds maturing on October 1, 1957 shall be called and paid before any bonds maturing October 1, 1956 and so on. If sinking fund moneys are on hand sufficient to redeem some but not all of any of said bonds numbered 286 to 425, inclusive, of any maturity at any time when such bonds become redeemable, the said bonds to be redeemed shall be designated by lot in any usual manner by the Depositary, said bonds being payable both as to principal and interest, and registered as to principal only, at the office of The Northern Trust Company, as paying agent and registrar, in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS the said bonds are payable both as to principal and interest and premium if any solely from the net revenues to be derived from the operation of the said building, the term "net revenues" as used herein meaning the gross revenues of the said building, less the reasonable cost of operating, insuring, maintaining and repairing the said building; and

WHEREAS the University has, in and by the said resolution, covenanted and agreed, for the benefit of the holders from time to time of the said bonds and the interest coupons thereto appertaining, that the net revenues of the said building will be from time to time deposited with the Depositary and used only for the payment of the fees and expenses of the Depositary, principal of, premium if any and the interest on the said bonds; and

WHEREAS the University has, in and by the said resolution, further covenanted and agreed that it would execute and deliver a Deposit Agreement in the form and terms hereof:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth and pursuant to the terms and provisions of the said resolution, the University and the Depositary have agreed and do hereby agree as follows for the equal and proportionate benefit and security of the holders of the said bonds of the University and the interest coupons thereto appertaining; that is to say:

Section I. The University covenants that proper books of record and account will be kept, in which full, true and correct entries will be made of all income, expenses and financial transactions of and in relation to the said building, and that it will furnish to the Depositary, on or before September I, 1948, for that period from October I, 1947 to June 30, 1948 and on or before September I in each year thereafter so long as any bonds remain outstanding, a statement certified as correct by the Comptroller and Treasurer of the University, showing the gross operating revenues, the operating expenses and the net revenues of the building for the twelve months period ended on the next preceding June 30. The Depositary shall have no duty to request any such information nor any duty relative to the statements from time to time furnished by the University, except to preserve the same for the inspection of the holders of the bonds during usual business hours.

Section 2. The University has covenanted with the holders of the bonds hereinabove referred to that all of the revenues, income, receipts, profits, charges, fees, rents and returns derived from the said building and the operation thereof shall be collected by the University and, after setting aside therefrom the reasonable cost of operating, maintaining, insuring and repairing the said building, shall be paid over to the Depositary semi-annually not later than September 15th for the previous six months period ending June 30th each year and March 15th each year for the previous six months period ending December 31 of each year, provided,

however, there shall be deposited on March 15, 1948 the net revenues for the period from October 1, 1947 to December 31, 1947, which amount shall not be less than the interest requirements due on said bonds April I, 1948, plus Depositary's fees, and the University hereby covenants and agrees so to do. All funds received by the Depositary under the terms of this agreement, after deducting fees and expenses of such Depositary, shall be held by the Depositary in a special trust account to be known as the sinking fund and shall be disbursed or applied by the Depositary as hereinafter provided.

At least five (5) days before each semi-annual interest payment date the Depositary shall, if the sinking fund moneys then on deposit are sufficient for that purpose, set aside an amount equal to the interest becoming due on the next ensuing interest payment date on all of the said bonds then outstanding, and such funds shall be and they are hereby appropriated irrevocably to the payment of such interest, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply the same to the payment of such interest on the next ensuing interest payment date upon surrender of the interest coupons becoming due on the said

interest date and appertaining to the outstanding bonds.

At least five (5) days before the express date of maturity of any of the bonds, the Depositary shall set aside from the moneys in the sinking fund, if such moneys then on deposit are sufficient for that purpose after making provision for payment of the interest becoming due on all the outstanding bonds on such maturity date, an amount equal to the principal of the bonds then maturing, and such funds shall be and they are hereby appropriated irrevocably to the payment of the principal of the said maturing bonds, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply the same to the payment of the principal of the said bonds upon surrender of the said bonds.

If, upon the forty-fifth (45th) day before any interest payment date on or after October 1, 1953, the Depositary has cash in the sinking fund after setting aside an amount sufficient to pay interest becoming due on all outstanding bonds on the next two ensuing interest payment dates and to pay the principal of any bonds theretofore called for redemption and not yet redeemed and the principal of all bonds theretofore due and unpaid and payment not provided for and be-coming due on the next succeeding principal payment date, such cash shall be applied by the Depositary to the redemption on the next ensuing interest payment date of outstanding bonds, which by their terms are redeemable, in an amount sufficient to exhaust as nearly as may be such cash, after deducting therefrom and paying all costs and expenses of such redemption.

The said bonds are each in the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) and are numbered from 1 to 425, inclusive. All paid bonds, including bonds redeemed through the operation of the sinking fund, together with the appertaining interest coupons, shall be canceled by the Depositary and delivered to the Treasurer of the University. The Depositary shall keep a record of the numbers of all

bonds so redeemed.

Notice of redemption through the operation of the sinking fund shall be published by the Depositary, either in the name of the University or in the name of the Depositary, as the Depositary may determine, once not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption. Such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois. Such notice shall with substantial accuracy:

(a) Designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be the

office of the Depositary, in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois;

(b) If the bonds to be redeemed are less than all of those outstanding, designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of such bonds; and (c) State that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be

redeemed by payment of the principal thereof and the accrued interest thereon, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of the bonds so called for redemption

Upon publication of notice of redemption of any bonds through the operation of the sinking fund, the Depositary shall set aside from the moneys in the sinking fund an amount sufficient to pay and redeem the said bonds as hereinabove provided, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby irrevocably authorized and directed to apply such funds to the payment and redemption of the said bonds on or after the specified redemption date upon surrender of the said bonds, together with all unmatured interest coupons thereto appertaining.

Section 3. The University has covenanted with the holders of the bonds, hereinabove referred to, that it will, so long as any of the said bonds shall remain outstanding and unpaid, keep in the office of the Depositary, in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois, books for the registration and transfer as to principal of bonds of the said issue, and the said Depositary is hereby appointed the agent of the University, with the title of Registrar, for the purpose of registering and trans-

ferring the said bonds as to principal only.

As to each bond registered, as to principal only, the person or entity in whose name the same is for the time being registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes, except for the purpose of receiving payment of the outstanding coupons, if any, appertaining thereto, and so long as the same shall be so registered payment of or on account of the principal thereof shall be made by the Depositary, as paying agent, only to the registered owner thereof. The bearer of any of the said bonds which shall not be registered as to principal and the bearer of any coupon appertaining to any such bond, whether or not such bond shall be registered as to principal, shall for all purposes be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner of such bond or coupon as the case may be for the purpose of receiving payment thereof and for all other purposes, and the Depositary, as paying agent, shall be fully protected in making payment of any such bond or coupon to the bearer thereof.

Section 4. The Depositary has executed this agreement and agrees to carry out the terms and provisions hereof on its part, but only upon and subject to the

following express terms and conditions:

(a) The Depositary shall not be responsible for any recitals herein or in the said bonds or for the validity of this agreement or of the said bonds, nor for the performance of any of the agreements herein contained on the part

of the University.

(b) The Depositary shall not be accountable for any of the proceeds of the bonds or of the revenues of the said building nor for any other funds of the University, except such funds as may be deposited hereunder. The Depositary shall not be required to allow interest on any funds at any time deposited hereunder. The Depositary may become the owner of bonds of the said issue with the same rights which it would have if not Depositary.

(c) The Depositary shall not be liable for any action taken or omitted to be taken by it in good faith and in the exercise of reasonable care and believed by it to be within the discretion or power conferred upon it by this agreement, nor shall the Depositary be responsible for the consequences of any error of judgment, and the Depositary shall not be answerable except for its own acts, neglect and default, nor for any loss unless the same shall happen through the negligence or want of good faith of the Depositary.

(d) The Depositary shall be entitled to advice of counsel concerning all matters arising under this agreement and its duties hereunder, and may in all cases pay such reasonable compensation as it shall deem proper to such counsel and all such outlays and expenditures shall be repaid to the Depositary

out of the sinking fund money.

(e) The Depositary shall not be required to give any bond or surety in respect of the exercise of the duties and powers conferred hereby or other-

wise in respect of the premises.

(f) The Depositary shall have a first lien hereunder upon the sinking fund moneys for reasonable compensation, expenses, advances and counsel fees incurred in and about the exercise and performance of its powers and duties hereunder, and the cost and expense of defending against any liability in the premises of any character whatsoever. The compensation of the Depositary shall not be limited to or by any provision of law in regard to the compensation of a trustee of an express trust.

tion of a trustee of an express trust.

(g) The Depositary at the time acting hereunder may at any time resign by giving not less than sixty (60) days' written notice to the University

specifying the date when such resignation takes effect.

Section 5. The University covenants that in case the Depositary at the time acting hereunder shall resign or be dissolved or shall be in the course of dissolution or liquidation or otherwise become incapable of acting hereunder, the University will forthwith appoint a successor Depositary which shall be a trust company or bank in good standing located in the State of Illinois and having a capital and surplus of not less than Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000), if there be such a trust company or bank willing, qualified and able to accept the appointment upon reasonable or customary terms.

Every successor Depositary appointed hereunder shall execute, acknowledge and deliver to its predecessor and also to the University an instrument in writing accepting such appointment hereunder, and thereupon such successor Depositary, without any further act, deed or conveyance, shall become fully vested with all of the estates, rights, powers, duties and obligations of its predecessor, and every predecessor Depositary shall deliver all moneys and securities, together with a record of the amount and the numbers of the outstanding bonds, to its successor; provided, however, that before such delivery is required or made, all fees, advances and expenses of the retiring Depositary shall be paid in full.

Any corporation into which the Depositary or any successor to it may be merged or converted or with which it or any successor to it may be consolidated, or any corporation resulting from any merger, conversion or consolidation to which the Depositary or any successor to it shall be a party, shall be the successor Depositary under this agreement without the execution or filing of any

paper on the part of either of the parties hereto.

Section 6. If there remain any funds in the hands of the Depositary after payment of all principal and all interest due on said bonds and the payment and discharge of said fees, charges and disbursements of the Depositary, said Depositary shall pay over any such surplus funds to the University of Illinois upon presentation to the Depositary of all bonds and coupons secured hereby marked or stamped "Paid" or "Cancelled", or upon presentation to the Depositary of other evidence satisfactory to the Depositary showing that all of such bonds and coupons have been paid or otherwise discharged.

Section 7. Nothing in this agreement expressed or implied is intended or shall be construed to confer upon any person, form or corporation, other than the parties hereto and the holders of the said bonds and the coupons thereto appertaining, any right, remedy or claim, legal or equitable, under or by reason of this agreement or

any covenant, condition or stipulation hereof.

Section 7. Said University hereby covenants that proper books of record and account will be kept, in which full, true and correct entries will be made of all income, expenses and financial transactions of and in relation to the said Building, and that it will furnish to the Depositary and to the original purchaser of said bonds on or before September I in each year so long as any bonds remain outstanding a statement certified as correct by the Comptroller and Treasurer of the University, showing the gross operating revenues, the operating expenses, and the net revenues of said Building for the twelve months' period ending on the next preceding June 30.

Section 8. The University covenants that while any of the bonds authorized hereunder remain outstanding it will establish charges and fees for the use of said building, adjusted so as to provide revenues at all times sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of maintaining, operating, insuring and repairing the said building, to pay the interest from time to time becoming due on the said bonds from time to time outstanding, and to provide for the payment of the principal of such bonds

at maturity.

Section 9. It is hereby covenanted and agreed that while any revenue bonds issued hereunder are outstanding no additional revenue bonds shall be issued which, by their terms, are payable from the revenues of said Illini Union Building, unless and until all revenue bonds issued pursuant to the terms of this resolution have been paid in full, both as to principal and interest, or until provision shall

have been made for such payment in full.

Section 10. That the fees and charges heretofore established for the use of said Illini Union Building in accordance with the terms of the trust to be terminated with the proceeds derived from the sale of the bonds hereby authorized and the method of the collection thereof now in full force and effect, shall remain in full force and effect until revised or changed in accordance with the terms of the covenants of this resolution. Said fees and charges as collected are hereby pledged and shall be applied to the payment of the reasonable maintenance and operation costs of said Illini Union Building and to the payment of the principal and interest of the bonds hereby authorized, all in accordance with the terms and covenants of this resolution.

Section 11. Said University of Illinois hereby covenants and agrees with the holder or holders of the bonds herein proposed to be issued, or any of them, that it will punctually perform all duties with reference to said building required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Illinois, including the making and collecting of sufficient charges and fccs for the use of said building, and segregating the revenue of said building and the application of the income and revenue thereof, as provided by this resolution; and it hereby covenants and agrees not to sell, lease, loan, mortgage or in any manner dispose of said building, including any and all extensions and improvements that may be made thereto, until all of the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall have been paid in full, both principal and interest, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment thereof in full, and the said University further covenants and agrees with the holders of said bonds to maintain in good condition and continuously operate said building as a Student Social Center and for other educational purposes and maintain and keep in full force and effect at all times adequate insurance for the protection of said building, including multi-risk insurance, covering loss or damage to said building and use and occupancy insurance covering loss of use of said building. The cost of maintaining all insurance shall be deemed to be an operating charge and shall be paid only from revenues.

Any proceeds derived by said University from any multi-risk insurance shall be applied to the payment of the said University's reasonable and necessary costs in reconstruction, repair or rehabilitation of the said building and any proceeds derived from any use and occupancy insurance shall be applied in the same manner

and to the same effect as gross operating revenues.

Section 12. The provisions of this resolution shall constitute a contract between the University of Illinois and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and after issuance of the bonds no changes, additions, alterations or amendments of any kind shall be made to this resolution in any manner, until such time as all of said bonds issued hereunder, and interest thereon, shall be paid in

full, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment of all bonds hereby authorized and interest thereon in full.

Section 13. Any holder of a bond or bonds, or any of the coupons of any bond or bonds issued under the provisions of this resolution, may either in law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other proceeding, enforce or compel the performance of all duties required by this resolution or the Act under which the bonds hereby authorized are issued, including the fixing, maintaining and collecting of such charges and fees for the use of such building as will be sufficient for all the purposes provided by this resolution, and the application of income and

Section 14. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this resolution shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision

Shall not affect any of the other provisions of this resolution.

Section 15. That said revenue bonds shall be executed as soon after this resolution becomes effective as may be, be deposited with the Treasurer of said University, and be by him delivered to Julien Collins and Company, and White, Weld & Co., the purchasers thereof, upon receipt of the purchase price, the contract for the sale thereof heretofore entered into be and the same is hereby in all respects ratified and approved. Any accrued interest or premium derived from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in the sinking fund hereinabove provided and

applied toward payment of interest or principal of said bonds as thereby required.

Section 16. This resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

APPOINTMENT TO BOARD OF EXAMINERS IN ACCOUNTANCY

(4) The faculty Committee on Accountancy recommends the appointment of Mr. Cyril Talbot, I North LaSalle Street, Chicago, as a member of the Board for three years from July I, 1947, succeeding Mr. Henry C. Hawes. Mr. Talbot is a partner in the firm of Barrow, Wade, Guthrie, and Company and manager of the Chicago office.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this appointment was made as recommended.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION AND AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR SIX RESEARCH HOUSES

(5) On April 24, 1947 (Minutes, page 341), the Board approved a program for additional_staff housing to be paid from the special State appropriation of \$250,000. The estimated distribution of this appropriation was:

> 25 additional prefabricated houses......\$154 300 FPHA housing units...... 67 750

The estimated cost of the six research homes was \$60,150, to be financed in part by the allocation of \$27,950, and the remaining funds were to be obtained through borrowing and through a grant for research work from the United States Department of Commerce. It is now estimated that the total cost of the research homes will exceed the original estimate by \$6,000.

The total amount of \$67,750 to be applied toward the cost of obtaining FPHA housing units will not be needed for that purpose. Therefore, it is recommended that the \$6,000 required for the completion of the six research homes be transferred from that portion of the State appropriation set aside for FPHA housing units to the appropriation for the six research homes.

On June 23, 1947 (Minutes, page 388), the Board approved the award of the contract for the general work on these six research houses. The Coordinator of the Small Homes Council recommends and the Comptroller concurs that contracts for the following work be awarded to the contractor indicated. In each case the contractor is the lowest bidder.

Plumbing.—Reliable Plumbing and Heating Company, Champaign, Illinois, on the basis of cost, plus a fee of 331/3 per cent. Estimated cost, including fee,

Heating. — F. R. Inskip & Company, Champaign, Illinois, on the basis of cost plus a 40 per cent fee on materials and a 60 per cent fee on labor. Total estimated cost, \$2,940.

Wiring. — R. A. Bland Electric Company, Champaign, Illinois, on the basis

of cost plus a fee of 50 per cent. Estimated cost, \$2,655.

I concur in the recommendations and request approval of the reallocation of the funds as indicated and request authority for the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to execute these contracts.

ADDITION TO THE CONTRACT FOR ELECTRIC CABLE SERVICE IN THE WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS AND THE ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(6) The Physical Plant Department has requested an increase of \$5,699 in the contract with the A. S. Schulman Electric Company for electric cable service to the Electrical Engineering Building and the Women's Residence Halls. The original contract (approved by the Board on January 25, 1947) did not provide for such service, since the requirements were not known at that time. They have now been determined and the requested increase provides for them. Funds are available for this increase.

The Comptroller recommends approval of this increase and I concur.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this recommendation was adopted.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR PLUMBING AND HEATING IN THE TEMPORARY CAFETERIA

(7) The Reliable Plumbing and Heating Company has submitted an estimate of \$4,789.93 to cover the University's portion of the plumbing and heating work required in connection with the construction of the temporary cafeteria. It is not possible to obtain competitive bids on this project because the Reliable Plumbing and Heating Company was the lowest bidder for the Federal Works Agency and is now actively at work on the site. The Physical Plant Department has analyzed the proposal and reports that it is reasonable.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that a contract be executed with the Reliable Plumbing and Heating Company for this work in an amount of \$4,789.93. I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees be authorized to execute

this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were approved.

FINAL REPORT ON BEQUEST OF EDWARD C. EARL

(10) On May 26, 1945 (Minutes, page 485), the Board of Trustees authorized Comptroller Lloyd Morey to serve as Executor, and Mr. Arthur L. Barton, of New York City, to act as Counsel for the University in the matter of the Estate of Edward C. Earl. On February 27 and August 5, 1947, reports of partial distribution of the Estate were made to the Board. The Executor now submits a final report of his administration of the Estate:

Below appears a condensed report of receipts and disbursements of the Executor and a statement of assets of the fund as finally received by the University, which includes assets distributed in kind and real estate, title to which was vested immediately in the Board of Trustees on the Testator's death. All disbursements indicated have been made with the exception of the fee due Mr. Barton as the attorney for the Estate and Executor, amounting to \$3,000, and final cash distribution to the University of \$747.61. These payments will be made on acceptance and approval of this report by the Board. No assets of the Estate other than the cash balance are held by the Executor except 100 shares of Wabash Railway Company Class A Preferred Stock and 150 shares of Wabash Railway Company Common Stock. The First National Bank of Chicago, in letter of February 7, 1946, advised that the Wabash Railway Company was reorganized in 1941 and that as a result of such reorganization the stock became worthless. Accordingly this stock was not transferred to the First National Bank of Chicago with other parts of the provider of the stock was not transferred to the First National Bank of Chicago with other securities as authorized February 27, 1947.

The Estate will be settled on a "Receipt and Release Basis" as authorized by the laws of the State of New York, and the final accounting, in the form of an agreement between the Board of Trustees, signed by its President, and the Executor, will be filed for record with the Surrogate's Court of the County of New York. The laws in New York do not require approval of such agreement by the Surrogate's Court under this procedure.

The Legal Counsel recommends the use of this method to close the Estate, and has approved the agreement. He furthermore has approved the amount of

the proposed attorney's fee as being reasonable.

The net estate is to establish an endowment fund, the income from which will be used for small prizes for superior architectural work in undergraduate classes of the Department of Architecture. Receipts of this fund are as follows:

The above funds have been invested in securities approved by the Finance Committee, as they became available.

The Executor requests the acceptance of this report and approval of the attorney's fee of \$3,000.

CONTINUED USE OF SKATING RINK FOR MEN'S HOUSING

(11) At its meeting on April 18, 1946 (Minutes, page 1076), the Board approved the conversion of the Skating Rink into a barracks-type housing unit for men during the academic year 1946-1947. University officials agreed with representatives of the Athletic Association that this area would be used for housing during the year 1947-1948 only after all other spaces had been filled. Accordingly, this space was held as the last University operated unit to be assigned. As of September 5, 1947, all University housing space had been assigned and 850 unfilled applications from single men were on file. In view of the increasing pressure from applicants for housing facilities and the fact that the Skating Rink could be used as a housing unit without delay and without further cost to the University, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Dean of Students recommended that the Skating Rink be continued as a housing unit during the coming year, and the recommendation was approved by the President on September 5.

The President of the University and the Provost commented on this matter.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, the action of the President of the University in assigning the Skating Rink for men's housing was approved and confirmed.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS JULY 11 TO SEPTEMBER 10, 1947

(13) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed, July 11 to September 10, 1947 (see Appendix, page 880).

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this report was received for record.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR RESURFACING OF THE SERVICE DRIVE BETWEEN THE PHYSICS BUILDING AND ENGINEERING HALL

(14) Bids were taken on the resurfacing of the service drive which extends northward between the Physics Building and the Engineering Hall. Only one firm, the Champaign Asphalt Company, submitted a bid, in the amount of \$2,800. Funds are available for this project within the Physical Plant operation and maintenance appropriation.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the

award of this contract to the Champaign Asphalt Company.

I concur and request authority to the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this recommendation was approved and authority was granted as recommended.

ADDITIONS TO CONTRACTS FOR ELECTRICAL **ENGINEERING BUILDING**

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends the following

contract additions:

I. An addition of \$2,281.25 to the contract with the Leverenz Electric Company for electrical work on the Electrical Engineering Building. This addition will provide for a lightning protection system which was not included in the original contract approved by the Board of Trustees on January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 229).

2. An addition of \$2,000 to the contract with the John Felmley Company for general work on the Electrical Engineering Building. The original contract was approved by the Board of Trustees on January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 229). This addition will provide for the acceptance of an alternate bid providing for the installation of weather strips submitted at the time of the original contract, but which was not accepted at that time.

The Comptroller recommends approval of the above additions and I concur. On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these additions to contracts were approved as recommended.

APPROPRIATION FOR LIGHT HORSE PROGRAM

(16) The Dean of the College of Agriculture requests an addition of \$5,250 to the budget of the Department of Animal Science to provide for a program of education and research in the breeding, feeding, and care of light horses. The Department has a well-established program of education and research in the breeding, feeding, and care of draft horses. REPORT OF THE LEASE FOR THE MAYO GENERAL HOSPITAL AT GALESBURG

(18) On September 24, 1946 (Minutes, page 38), the Board authorized the President and the Comptroller of the Board of Trustees to execute the documents necessary to complete the transfer to the University of the land, buildings, equipment, and supplies constituting the Mayo General Hospital at Galesburg.

The University took possession of the Mayo General Hospital on September 20, 1946, under an interim permit. A permanent lease has been drafted and is ready for execution. For the information of the Board, the following major pro-

visions of this lease are reported:

1. For the consideration of one dollar, the University is entitled to exclusive possession of the property and agrees to operate and maintain it at its own cost and agrees on the termination of the lease to yield up and surrender the premises to the Government in as good order, condition, and repair as when received, ordinary wear and tear excepted. The University is liable to make repairs arising out of fire, windstorm, and such other hazards as may be covered by insurance. (See paragraph 2)

2. The University shall procure and maintain at its own cost for the entire term of the lease, insurance, such insurance to be payable to the Treasurer of the United States, on the leased premises for fire, windstorm, and extended coverage protection. This insurance coverage shall be secured in companies and in such amounts as shall be required by and be satisfactory to the Government. In the event of loss the proceeds of the insurance will be made available to the University. If it is determined that the cost of such repairs will exceed the amount of insurance proceeds, the Government will not require such repairs at a cost greater than the insurance proceeds.

3. The University will not allow the premises to be used for any other purposes than those specified in the lease, nor allow the premises to be occupied

in whole or in part by any other persons and will not sublet the same without the written consent of the Government.

4. The University unconditionally indemnifies the Government against any and all claims of whatever type or nature and all costs or expenses that the Government may be caused to suffer due to any injuries to persons or property resulting from the use and occupation of the premises by the University.

5. The lease runs for three years from September 20, 1946. The University has the right to renew the lease for an additional period of two years on the same terms and conditions as set forth in the original lease. The Government and the

The University has the right to renew the lease for an additional period of two years on the same terms and conditions as set forth in the original lease. The Government and the University shall each have the right to cancel the lease by giving written notice to the other party of its intention to cancel the lease six months prior to the effective date of cancellation or termination, and such effective date of cancellation shall either be June 30 or February I of any year after the date of the original

This report was received for record.

CHANGES IN "POLICY AND RULES RELATING TO COMPENSATION AND WORKING CONDITIONS OF NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES"

Mr. McLaughlin, for the Committee on Civil Service and Employees, presented the following report.

The Director of Nonacademic Personnel, with the support of the Nonacademic Personnel Advisory Committee, recommends two changes in the "Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees." to bring the wording and policy in line with the original intent:

ployees," to bring the wording and policy in line with the original intent:

Section IV, Paragraph 5 now reads: "All time in excess of the units of hours constituting the work day and the work week is overtime and will be compensated at time and one-half in cash unless the local prevailing practice for this group varies from this procedure, in which case the local prevailing practice will be followed. By mutual agreement between a department..."

This paragraph should read: "All time in excess of the units of hours continuous continuous descriptions."

This paragraph should read: "All time in excess of the units of hours constituting the work day and the work week is overtime, and will be compensated at time and one-half in cash unless under local prevailing practice a higher rate is paid in which case the local prevailing practice will be followed. By mutual agreement between a department and an employee, an employee may work overtime with equivalent time off at straight time. . . ."

with equivalent time off at straight time. . . ."

Section VIII, Paragraph 2-B now reads: "In addition to the leave provided in the preceding paragraph, each full time, permanent and continuous employee who has served for one full year is entitled to an extended disability leave of one work week for each year of service, cumulative to a total of ten work weeks, which shall be allowed to reaccumulate to this maximum through additional service after being used in part or in full. No reduction shall be made in accumulations for prior service earned before March 1, 1944."

This paragraph should read the same as present paragraph, with the following addition: "Each permanent and continuous employee employed regularly on a part-time basis is entitled to such fraction of one work week with pay as is represented by the relationship between this part-time employment and the full time schedules in his classification."

Director Dickason commented on these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these changes were approved and adopted.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Following a recess for luncheon, the Board considered the following matters presented by and for the President of the University.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT 1116 WEST ILLINOIS STREET, URBANA

(1) The property at 1116 West Illinois Street, Urbana, is available for purchase. It is in the area of anticipated future University expansion. It consists of a frame building containing two five-room apartments and a four-car garage building, on a lot 54 by 130.

The property can be used to advantage for staff housing, in which there continues to be an urgent need. It is offered for sale at the appraisal price of the

Champaign County Real Estate Board, namely, \$23,800, providing the purchase is made by September 30, 1947.

I recommend that authority be given for the purchase of this property and that a special appropriation be made from the General Reserve Fund of \$24,000, or so much thereof as may be required, for the purchase and completion of the transaction.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this purchase was authorized and the appropriation made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin. Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Mever, Mr. Nickell.

PURCHASE OF PRINTING EQUIPMENT

(2) On March 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 312), the Board authorized the purchase of a new press to be installed in Gregory Hall for joint use by the Illini Publishing Company, the University Press, and the School of Journalism to replace the press now owned and operated by the Illini Publishing Company in Illini Hall. An appropriation of \$25,000 was made to apply toward the cost of the press, the balance of cost of the press to be paid by the Illini Publishing Company.

Specifications were prepared by a committee representing the three interested parties, inviting bids on either a unit-type tubular or semi-cylindrical plate newspaper press of 12-page capacity. Bids were invited from all manufacturers able to furnish satisfactory equipment of either of these types. The only bid received was that of the Goss Printing Company of Chicago at a price of \$59,710 for the press and complete equipment as specified, with an escalator clause providing for an increase in price to cover any increase in costs of manufacture subsequent to this date and before delivery. The Company agrees that, if the readjusted price is

not satisfactory, the contract may be cancelled by the buyer without penalty.

Date of delivery is estimated at 18 months. The bidder insists on an advance payment of 10 per cent to establish the order on its production schedule in accordance with standard practice. He also asks for payments approximately in accordance with the following schedule: 25 per cent on notification of completion of manufacture; 15 per cent on shipment; balance of 50 per cent on installation and acceptance. Responsibility for installation will be assumed by the Company, the University to prepare the space for the installation, for which a separate additional appropriation will be necessary when costs are determined.

These conditions are somewhat unusual in University contracts and purchases, but the Company will not accept an order under any other terms. Demand for such equipment is so great that it is necessary that the University comply with these terms in order to have assurance of the equipment within any reasonable time. To postpone the purchase until more favorable conditions and prices can be

secured may mean a delay of several years.

The Director of Purchases, the Director of the School of Journalism, the Director of the University Press, the Chairman of the Illini Publishing Com-

pany, and the Comptroller make the following recommendations:

1. The preparation of a joint contract of purchase on the foregoing terms between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the Illini Publishing Company, and the Goss Printing Press Company for the purchase of a 12-page unit-type tubular plate press with motor and necessary accessories, the University to pay \$25,000 toward the cost of the equipment and the Illini Pub-

lishing Company to assume the balance of the cost.

2. The preparation of a declaration of trust between the Illini Publishing Company and the Board of Trustees placing the title of the property in trust in the University with the responsibility for operation and maintenance of the press in the Illini Publishing Company and making other necessary provisions incident to

operation.

I concur in these recommendations and recommend approval and request authority for the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute the necessary contracts subject to approval by the Legal Counsel of the University.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these recommendations were approved and authority granted as recommended.

REVISION OF COMPENSATION PLAN AND CLASS SPECIFICATIONS FOR NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES

(3) The Director of Nonacademic Personnel has submitted a complete revision of the "University of Illinois Civil Service Compensation Plan and Index to Class Specifications for Nonacademic Employees, September, 1947." Practically all of the changes have been approved by the Board of Trustees from time to time, but the complete schedule should be presented to the Board for formal approval as a whole. In addition to the changes already approved by the Board, the following additional changes are recommended:

The first edition of this compensation plan and class specifications was published in January, 1945. The new edition represents a complete revision and brings the class specifications situation up to date, placing it on a current useful basis. Future revisions will, of course, be necessary as conditions in the University and outside employment change.

I recommend that this be referred to the Committee on Civil Service and

Employees.

Mr. Dickason commented on this matter.

Mr. McLaughlin, for the Committee on Civil Service and Employees, recommended that the revision of the Compensation Plan and Index be approved as presented.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this recommendation was adopted.

WAGES OF OPERATING ENGINEERS IN CHICAGO

(4) A statement by Mr. D. E. Dickason, Director of Nonacademic Personnel, on the status of negotiations between the University and Local No. 399, International Union of Operating Engineers, in the Chicago departments.

This matter was presented by Director Dickason. After discussion, no action was taken.

The Comptroller presented the following items for the President of the University.

SALE OF HOUSES PURCHASED FOR STAFF

(5) On May 29, 1946 (Minutes, page 1115), the Board approved a resolution authorizing the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute all documents relating to the staff housing project for the purchase of 50 prefabricated houses. This resolution authorized the conveyance of the properties to the Foundation for the purpose of borrowing additional funds and requires the return of the properties to the University when all indebtedness has been paid. Under this program 44 houses, the maximum possible within the available funds, have been erected.

The University now has the opportunity to sell one of these houses at a price equal to the total cost of the house to a staff member who would otherwise be eligible to rent such a unit. By selling the house, funds will be released which will enable the University to purchase an additional unit. To complete this sale, it is necessary that the Board of Trustees approve the following revised resolution which will enable the University of Illinois Foundation to complete such sales and to hold the funds for direction by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

I recommend adoption of this resolution, the sale of the property, and reinvestment of the funds realized from the sale in an additional unit.

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, at its meeting on May 29, 1946 (Minutes, pages 1113-1115), adopted a Resolution pertaining to the Staff Housing Project which read as follows:

"Therefore, be it resolved, that the Comptroller of the University of Illinois and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be and the same are hereby authorized to execute all agreements and documents necessary, to acquire sites for fifty (50) units to be constructed and used for faculty housing; to construct thereon such units within the limitation of \$176,000 expenditure; to convey such sites and units to the University of Illinois Foundation under an agreement that they will be reconveyed to the Board of Trustees when all indebtedness against them has been paid and to enter into a lease agreement with the University of Illinois Foundation whereby the Board of Trustees as Lessee is given the right to operate and manage such units."

Whereas, the sale of individual houses and lots which form a part of said project will be facilitated by a restatement of this Resolution;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Resolution above quoted be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Therefore, be it resolved, that the Comptroller of the University of Illinois and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be and the same are hereby authorized to execute all agreements and documents necessary, to acquire sites for fifty (50) units to be constructed and used for faculty housing; to construct thereon such units within the limitation of \$176,000 expenditure; to convey such sites and units to the University of Illinois Foundation under an agreement whereby the University of Illinois Foundation will lease all of said properties to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois with full right to operate and manage such sites and units; that the University of Illinois Foundation may sell and convey in fee simple, free and clear of encumberance and lease, by appropriate instruments of conveyance any or all of said sites and units to purchasers at prices per site or unit not less than the amount required to liquidate a pro rata share of the total indebtedness outstanding at the date of the sale of said sites and units, the proceeds of such sale to be held or disposed of as the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois shall direct; the purchasers of said sites or units shall be under no duty to see to the application of the purchase money; that any sites or units not so sold and conveyed shall be reconveyed by the University of Illinois Foundation to the Board of Trustees of the University of

Illinois or to its nominee when all indebtedness against the respective sites and units has been paid.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the resolution was adopted and the sale of the property and reinvestment of funds realized was authorized as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell.

FINANCING SUPPLEMENTARY STAFF HOUSING

(6) On April 24, 1947 (Minutes, page 341), the Board of Trustees approved a supplementary staff housing program which provided for the construction of 25 prefabricated houses and six conventional type houses. Funds for this project were to be provided in part by borrowing. As in the original staff housing project, the best medium for borrowing the necessary funds is through the University of Illinois Foundation. The Board of Directors of the Foundation has indicated its willingness to cooperate in this project, and the adoption of the attached resolution is necessary to complete the transfer to the Foundation.

I recommend adoption of the following resolution.

Whereas, at a meeting on April 24, 1947, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois approved in principle the proposed program that the University of Illinois undertake a Staff Housing Program by constructing thirty-one (31) residence units, borrowing \$83,700.00 of the required amount and liquidating the loan from income over a ten (10) year period, and

Whereas, information since received indicates that a total expenditure of \$285,150.00 will be involved in constructing such units, \$83,700.00 of which may be borrowed from The First National Bank of Chicago, payable over a period of ten (10) years and bearing an interest rate of three per cent (3%), and

Whereas, The First National Bank of Chicago prefers that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois convey the sites for such units to the University of Illinois Foundation and that the loan be made by The First National Bank of Chicago to the University of Illinois Foundation and not directly to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, such loan to be secured by a mortgage, and

Whereas, the University of Illinois has obtained thirty-one (31) sites for such units, and

Whereas, The Board of Directors of the University of Illinois Foundation has expressed a willingness to cooperate with the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois by accepting title to the sites and the units to be constructed thereon at the expense of the University of Illinois, and to borrow the necessary funds to complete the proposed project from The First National Bank of Chicago by mortgaging the units and to lease the units to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois in order that they may be made available for members of the staff of the University of Illinois;

Therefore, be it resolved, that the Comptroller of the University of Illinois and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois be and the same are hereby authorized to execute all agreements and documents necessary to construct upon the sites already acquired within the limitation of \$201,450 expenditure, including the cost of such sites, to convey such sites and units to the University of Illinois Foundation under an agreement whereby the University of Illinois Foundation will lease all of said properties to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois with full right to operate and manage such sites and units; that the University of Illinois Foundation may sell and convey in fee simple, free and clear of encumberance and lease, by appropriate instruments of conveyance any or all of said sites and units to purchasers at reasonable prices per site or unit, but not less, in any event, than the amount required to liquidate a pro rata share of the total indebtedness outstanding at the date of the sale of said sites and units, the proceeds of such sale to be held or disposed of as the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois shall direct; the purchasers of said sites or units shall

be under no duty to see to the application of the purchase money; that any sites or units not so sold and conveyed shall be reconveyed by the University of Illinois Foundation to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois or to its nominee when all indebtedness against the respective sites and units has been paid.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this resolution was adopted, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell.

ADDITIONAL CONSTRUCTION ON POWER PLANT ADDITION

(7) Sargent and Lundy, Chicago, engineers and designers for the addition to the Power Plant at Urbana-Champaign, have tried to obtain bids for gallery and miscellaneous steel required for the construction of this project. Bids were first requested for opening on June 30. No bids were received. Recently, however, a bid has been received from the Anderson Iron Works, 5836 South Loomis Boulevard, Chicago, in the amount of \$16,955, f.o.b. trucks at the building site, Urbana, Illinois.

Sargent and Lundy report that they have exhausted the possibilities of obtaining other bids. Accordingly, the Physical Plant Department recommends award

of a contract to the Anderson Iron Works on the bid of \$16,955.

This bid includes furnishing of material only. It is proposed to ask the Kuhne-Simmons Company, contractor for construction of the building, for an estimate of all installation costs to handle this by a change order in their contract. The estimated total installed cost of this phase of the project is from \$20,000 to \$22,000. Funds are available for this.

Approval of these proposals is recommended.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these proposals were approved as recommended.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE ON PRINCIPLES GOVERNING RESEARCH CONTRACTS

(8) At the meeting of the Board on August 5, 1947 (Minutes, page 512), the President of the University presented recommendations for changes in the regulations and policy of the Board governing research contracts. These changes would affect only the provisions relating to direct and indirect costs and the distribution

of funds resulting from indirect cost charges.

The Board referred these recommendations to the President of the University and the Finance Committee. The Committee has given careful consideration to these proposed changes. They have also been studied by the Directors of the Engineering and Agricultural Experiment Stations, the former and present deans of the Graduate School, the Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, the Coordinator of the Small Homes Council, and the Bursar. These officers, who are representative of all University agencies concerned with research contracts, and the President of the University, have recommended approval of the changes.

The Finance Committee concurs and recommends that the proposals as sub-

mitted to the Board of Trustees on August 5 be approved.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these proposals were approved as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF MISS MIRIAM A. SHELDEN AS DEAN OF WOMEN

(9) The Executive Committee of the Board on August 29, 1947, appointed Miss Miriam A. Shelden of Millbrook, New York, and Washington, D. C., as Dean of Women at an annual salary of \$6,500, effective September 15, 1947. Miss Shelden began her duties on September 15 and will be on the campus for at least 30 days, after which time she will report to the Bureau of Naval Personnel for as much time as may be necessary to train a successor in her assignment in the Navy. She will return to the University not later than January 1, 1948.

This report was received for record.

LEASE OF JOHN KATSINAS IN ARCADE BUILDING

(10) A report of a meeting of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.

MINUTES OF THE BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE MEETING HELD AUGUST 23, AT 1:30 P.M. IN THE ILLINI UNION BUILDING, URBANA

Those present were: Mrs. Doris S. Holt, Mr. John R. Fornof, and Mr. Frank H. McKelvey, Chairman. Also attending were Mr. Norval Hodges, Mr. C. C. De Long, Mr. S. E. Thompson, Mr. C. S. Havens, Mr. C. E. Tate, and Mr. John Katsinas.

This meeting was called as a result of Mr. Tate's letter to Mr. Britton, under date of July 29, in which he asked permission to appear personally before the Board of Trustees to present the request of Mr. Katsinas for an extension of his lease of space in the Illini Arcade.

Mr. Tate outlined the history of this case and the wishes of his client which were stated in his letter to Mr. Britton under date of June 19 and are as follows:

I. He is willing to assign his present lease to a prospective purchaser who has stated that he is willing to eliminate the clause in the present lease under which the Lessee agrees he will not, during the term of the lease, knowingly permit students of the University of Illinois or other persons to use intoxicating beverages, other than beer, on the premises and such purchaser has stated that he would not demand an extension of the present lease for more than six (6) years from its expiration, or in other words, ten (10) years from the present date. This purchaser has offered a purchase price in excess of those shown below, but because of other matters considered by Mr. Katsinas he would rather consider the University of Illinois as a purchaser.

2. He is willing to sell to the University of Illinois for the sum of \$35,000.00, all of his right, title and interest in said premises, surrender his lease, and turn over possession immediately of the place of business, furniture, fixtures, and equipment, including air conditioning equipment, ice cream freezer, the juke box and two scales (the juke box and scales being leased equipment), and stock of

merchandise and monogrammed dishes, or

3. He is willing to sell to the University of Illinois all of his right, title and interest in and to said place of business for the sum of \$30,000.00, excepting the equipment, stock of merchandise and monogrammed dishes, which he agrees to remove from said premises within a reasonable time after the consummation of said sale for the sum of \$30,000.00.

Although the University has a real need for the leased space in order to provide facilities for general University functions, such as office space for academic staff members, it was agreed that the demand for food service was equally acute at the present time and that the University should therefore encourage Mr. Katsinas to continue with the food service operations during the balance of his contract. The Committee accordingly recommends the following:

I. That the University should proceed as rapidly as possible to remodel the building to comply with the minimum requirements of the State Department of Public Health assuming that the area will continue to be used for the service

of food.

2. That the Lessee be notified that the University will proceed with the remodeling of the kitchen and toilet areas but will not extend the lease at the present time nor commit itself to the extension of the lease in the future.

3. That after completing the remodeling program in this building the University will expect the Lessee to operate food service facilities in accordance with the terms of the lease and the local health standards.

The Legal Counsel discussed this matter.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, the recommendations of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds were adopted.

AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR REMODELING IN THE ARCADE BUILDING

(11) At its meeting on August 22, 1947, the Buildings and Grounds Committee of the Board recommended that the University proceed as rapidly as possible to remodel that part of the Arcade Building occupied by the Katsinas Confectionery,

in order to comply with the minimum requirements of the State Department of Public Health (assuming that the area will continue to be used for the service of food). This report has been sent to the Executive Committee of the Board for approval.

In order that the University may proceed with the alterations as soon as the Executive Committee has acted on the recommendations of the Buildings and Grounds Committee, the Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends that contracts for this work be let to the following firms, in accordance with their proposals received on September 4, 1947, for minor alterations on a cost-plus basis:

General work — Kuhne-Simmons Co., Champaign and Rantoul.

Electrical work — Square Deal Electrical Co., La Porte, Indiana. Plumbing and heating work — Champaign Plumbing & Heating Co., Champaign.

Ventilating and sheet metal work—Schroeder's, Champaign.
Cost of this remodeling is estimated by the contractors as approximately
\$30,000. Funds are available for this program of alterations in the reserves accumulated from the past operations of the Arcade Building.

The Provost, acting for the President, recommends that authority be granted to the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board to execute such contracts, payable from the funds as indicated, if the Board of Trustees approves the report of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these recommendations were adopted, subject to the acceptance by Mr. Katsinas of the action on the lease (see item 10).

CONTRACTS FOR MINOR ALTERATIONS

(12) On March 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 317), the Board approved a procedure and contracts for minor alterations and remodeling in the Urbana-Champaign division. These contracts were effective until June 30, 1947, and were on a cost-plus-fee basis. The work under the contracts was initiated on individual order from the Physical Plant Department, approved by the Comptroller within Board ap-propriations for jobs which were so small or of such a character as to make com-petitive bidding impractical. This procedure has proved advantageous to all parties concerned. To continue the policy, bids were received on a similar basis for the year 1947-1948.

A general analysis of the bids indicates that, if the awards are made to the

contractors noted below, the lowest total costs to the University will result:
General work—Kuhne-Simmons Co., Champaign and Rantoul.
Electrical work—Anderson Electric Co., Danville, and Square Deal

Electrical Co., La Porte, Indiana.

Plumbing and heating work - Champaign Plumbing & Heating Co., Champaign.

Ventilating and sheet metal work - Schroeder's, Champaign.

In the case of the electrical work it would be difficult to anticipate the low bidder

for all contracts in advance, and two contractors are recommended.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the continuation of the procedure and the award of standing contracts until June 30, 1948, to the companies indicated above. I concur and recommend that authority be granted to the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute such contracts.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these recommendations were adopted.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT WITH E. H. MARHOEFER COMPANY FOR GENERAL CONSTRUCTION WORK ON PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT ADDITION

(13) On June 23, 1947 (Minutes, page 406), the Board of Trustees approved the award of a contract for the general construction work on the Physical Environment Addition with the E. H. Marhoefer Company. In connection with the construction of this addition, temporary power service must be installed as the present electrical distribution system crosses the site of the new building. The exact cost of rerouting this service can not be accurately computed in advance, and it is proposed that this work be undertaken on a cost-plus contract with a guaranteed maximum.

The E. H. Marhoefer Company has agreed to accept this additional work on the basis of reimbursement for time and materials at cost plus 15% for overhead and 5% for profit. The Company further guarantees a maximum cost to the University not to exceed \$18,060. This proposal has been checked and approved by the Architects, Holabird and Root.

Funds are available for this work in the special state appropriation for this

project.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that the Board approve this addition to the original contract with E. H. Marhoefer Company.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these recommendations were adopted.

ACTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Secretary presented for record the following report of actions by the Executive Committee on recommendations submitted by the President of the University:

August 20, 1947

1. The retirement of Professor Edna E. Walls of the Department of Home

Economics, effective September 1, 1947.

2. The award of a contract in the amount of \$129,000 to the Kuhne-Simmons Company, Incorporated, the lowest bidder, for the construction of the superstructure of the Power Plant Addition.

3. Award of a contract to the W. A. Pope Company, Chicago, in the amount of \$17,358, subject to a maximum of 18% escalation, for the installation of a high pressure steam line between the University Library Building and the Auditorium. This is in addition to the contract with the W. A. Pope Company for the Utilities Distribution project.

4. Award of a contract to the Otis Elevator Company in the amount of \$16,612 for the installation of an elevator and a dumb waiter in the Electrical Engineering Building.

5. Amendment of the contract with the A. S. Schulman Company for elec-

trical work in the Utilities Distribution System to provide service connections to the Mechanical Engineering Building at a cost of \$2,274.

6. A special appropriation of \$2,500 for interior improvements in several engineering buildings to provide additional classroom space.

7. Purchases amounting to \$1,000 and over (see Appendix, page 877). 8. Award of contract to the John Felmley Company, the lowest bidder, to move the houses on the site of the Chemistry Building to new foundations and connect utilities at a cost of approximately \$26,500. It was estimated that an additional \$1,000 was necessary to cover expenses incurred by the Physical Plant Department on this job.

The Executive Committee therefore made a nonrecurring appropriation in the amount of \$27,500 for the necessary capital expenditures and a recurring ap-

propriation of \$7,000 for annual operation and maintenance expense.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

October 30, 1947



The October meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Undergraduate Division, in Galesburg, on Thursday, October 30, 1947, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

2:30 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Livingston, General Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin,

and Dr. Meyer.

President Stoddard was present; also Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Professor Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Mr. I. L. Porter, Treasurer, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, Mr. Wilbur Schramm, Director of the Institute of Communications Research and Assistant to the President, and, during part of the day, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of August 5, 1947. On motion of Mr. Davis, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 485 to 804 above.

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MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

RESIDENCE FOR THE VICE-PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY IN CHARGE OF THE CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(1) Since there is no adequate housing available in the vicinity of the Chicago Professional Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, and Pharmacy, most of the faculty, including administrative officers, must live a considerable distance from their laboratories and offices. The correction of this situation requires faculty housing on a large scale and is a long-time project.

Some progress can be made in the near future. The interests of the Chicago Professional Colleges will be served more effectively by providing a residence near them for the Vice-President in charge. It would save time which he could devote to administration and to the supervision of important research projects. It would be a convenience to the University.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the construction of such a

residence. Later a recommendation will be submitted to the Board on the location, the size and type of house, and an estimate of the cost. In the meantime, I recommend that an appropriation of \$7,500 be made from the General Reserve Fund to cover the cost of preliminary studies, plans, and specifications.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this matter was referred to the Committee on Chicago Departments, in conference with the Committees on Buildings and Grounds and General Policy, for study and report at the next meeting of the Board.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY AT 1007 SOUTH WRIGHT STREET, CHAMPAIGN

(2) The property at 1007 South Wright Street, Champaign, owned by the Episcopal Canterbury Foundation, is believed to be available for purchase at a price of \$41,500. This is a valuation set by an appraisal committee of the Cham-

paign County Real Estate Board.

The property is located immediately opposite Lincoln Hall and Gregory Hall on the west side of Wright Street. It includes a lot with 94 feet frontage and 174 feet depth on which two frame houses are located. The houses are in reasonably good condition and could relieve somewhat the present shortage of office space in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the College of Education. The land

would be suitable for construction of a housing unit at a future date.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Provost recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the purchase and offer to the Foundation

\$41,500 for this property. It is believed that this offer will be accepted.

I concur in this recommendation and recommend a special appropriation of \$42,000 for this purchase and any expenses incident to concluding the transfer that may be found necessary.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this purchase was authorized, and the appropriation made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

SPECIAL COUNSEL FOR EVICTION PROCEEDINGS

(3) It is necessary to institute and carry through eviction proceedings against all occupants of nine buildings owned by the University located between 825 and 919 South Wood Street and one combination store and residence building at 1923 West Polk Street, Chicago.

These properties were acquired by the University between April, 1945, and December, 1946, for campus expansion. The buildings are in bad condition and should be demolished as soon as possible. Notices were served on September 24 on all occupants of the Wood Street properties to vacate by November 1 and on the occupants of the Polk Street property to vacate by December 1. Court proceedings can be started at any time after those dates.

In the interest of efficiency and economy, it is desirable to employ special counsel in Chicago to assume primary responsibility for these proceedings. The real estate firm of Farr and Company, which has represented the University in the acquisition of these properties, has recommended Joseph Lowitz, III West Washington Street, Chicago. The law firm of Chapman and Cutler concurs. The Legal Counsel has been authorized to retain Mr. Lowitz as counsel for this purpose.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the action of the President of the University in authorizing the employment of special counsel was approved and confirmed.

OFFER OF GUERNSEY HERD

(4) Mrs. Chauncey McCormick, St. James Farm, Naperville, Illinois, who has one of the finest Guernsey herds in this part of the country, is planning to dispose of the herd and has offered to present it to the University of Illinois. The details of this have not been worked out, but the Dean of the College of Agriculture recommends that the Board of Trustees authorize acceptance of this gift if upon further investigation it is found acceptable.

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the President of the University was authorized to accept this gift as recommended.

COLLEGE ADVISORY COMMITTEES IN AGRICULTURE AND EDUCATION

(5) For many years some of the colleges and other divisions of the University have had advisory committees appointed by the Board of Trustees. For example, the College of Agriculture and the Agricultural Experiment Station have an Advisory Committee for each department and a general committee for the College. The functions of these committees are of a specialized nature. The members are selected because they are experts in their respective fields and they are called on to advise the departments and the College on questions of public policy. The committees assist in keeping the educational and research programs "in tune" with

economic developments and public needs.

At the meeting of the Board of Trustees on August 5 there were presented recommendations for appointments of Advisory Committees in the Colleges of Agriculture, Commerce, and Veterinary Medicine. The question was again raised about the status of these committees with the suggestion that the college and departmental committees should be subcommittees of the Citizens Committee and selected from its membership. In my judgment, this would not work satisfactorily. It would be difficult to select from the present membership of the Citizens Committee all of the committees desired by the various colleges and be sure of having the experts needed without greatly enlarging the Citizens Committee. The question is largely one of procedure. The same thing can be accomplished by adding the people whose services are desired on the college committees to the Citizens Committee and assigning them to specific departmental or college committees. I would not add anyone to the Citizens Committee for such an assignment unless he is recommended by the college. Accordingly, I submit herewith the following nominations for additional appointments to the Citizens Committee and recommend the assignment of these men to the college advisory committees as specified (new members are indicated by an asterisk):

At this point, at 11:30 a.m., the Board recessed in order to make a tour of inspection of the facilities of the Undergraduate Division and to attend a luncheon at the Hotel Custer tendered by a group of Galesburg citizens.

OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened in open session at 2:30 p.m., the same members and officials were present as during the morning session; also Dean Louttit, Mr. R. V. Nystrom, and other officers and heads of departments of the Galesburg Division.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

ILLINOIS AREA REDEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

(1) An Act (Senate Bill No. 618) of the 65th General Assembly approved by the Governor has created the "Illinois Area Redevelopment Commission" to make a thorough study and investigation of the industrial, agricultural, recreational, and

other economic resources in areas of the State in which such resources have not been fully developed or have suffered deterioration, and report its findings to the 65th General Assembly in 1949.

The Act provides that the Commission should consist of five members of the Senate appointed by its President, five members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker, three persons appointed by the Governor, and the following ex-officio members: The Director of the Department of Public Works and Buildings, the Director of the Department of Agriculture, the Director of the Department of Conservation, the Public Aid Executive of the Illinois Public Aid Commission, and one Trustee or Officer of the University of Illinois to be selected by the Board of Trustees thereof.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the President of the Board was selected to represent the University on this commission.

GRADUATE COLLEGE

(2) I recommend that the name of the Graduate School be changed to Graduate College and that any provisions in the University of Illinois Statutes in which the name Graduate School appears be amended accordingly.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the change was approved as recommended.

DEPARTMENT OF DAIRY PRODUCTION

(3) The Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station has recommended that the name of the Department of Dairy Husbandry be changed to the Department of Dairy Production. I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this change was approved as recommended.

REVISION OF POLICY REGARDING ACCEPTANCE OF APPOINTMENTS TO THE UNIVERSITY STAFF

(4) The University of Illinois Statutes provide that appointments to the staff of the University must be accepted within thirty days after the date of the appointment unless the President of the University extends the period of acceptance. This length of time is not necessary in most appointments and causes unnecessary delay in processing payrolls and making salary payments to staff members.

The Provost, Comptroller, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees recom-

mend that the period of acceptance be reduced to 10 days and that section 27F of the University of Illinois Statutes be amended by striking out "thirty days" and substituting in lieu thereof "ten days."

I concur and recommend approval.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this change was approved as recommend**e**d.

REQUEST FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY FOR A LEAVE OF ABSENCE

(5) Last year the Board of Trustees granted me a leave of absence without pay to serve as one of the United States delegates to the First Session of the General Conference of United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization which met in Paris in November and December, 1946. I was away from the University from November 15 to December 17, inclusive.

The Second Session of the General Conference of UNESCO will meet in Mexico City from November 6 to December 3, 1947. I have been appointed one of the United States delegates. I do not expect to attend throughout the entire session but request a leave of absence from the University, with adjusted salary,

from November 10 to 21, inclusive.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this leave was granted as requested.

REQUEST OF REPRESENTATIVE JOHN K. MORRIS

(6) Honorable John K. Morris of Chadwick, Illinois, Representative of the General Assembly from the Twelfth Senatorial District, has requested an opportunity to appear before the Board of Trustees when the Board is considering the

biennial budget for 1949-1951 and particularly appropriations to be requested for buildings. He wishes to speak in behalf of the building for the College of Veterinary Medicine. Mr. Morris has been informed that these matters will be up for consideration by the Board in September and October, 1948. The budget requests must be filed with the Department of Finance not later than November 1, 1948.

During the presentation of this item, President Livingston, being called from the room, requested Dr. Meyer to take the chair.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the request of Mr. Morris for a hearing was granted.

REMODELING AND FURNISHING OF UNIVERSITY CENTER IN CHICAGO

(7) On April 24, 1947 (Minutes, page 348), the Board authorized lease of space in the LaSalle Hotel, Chicago, to be used as a University Center and as offices of University agencies. This approval was with the understanding that at a later time a request for funds for furnishings and other expense would be submitted.

Estimates have been made of the costs necessary for this work as follows:

The hotel proposes to do the remodeling at cost, plus overhead with the guaranteed maximum above stated and will allow two months' rent to offset the cost of painting and decorating usually done by a landlord.

These estimates have been checked by the Physical Plant Department and

the Architect and found satisfactory.

In view of delay in occupancy of the new quarters, not all of the appropriation for rent and other expenses will be required for the current year. This saving, together with the credit on remodeling allowed by the hotel, provides \$2,500 to apply toward the remodeling and furnishings.

The Comptroller recommends a special appropriation of \$17,500, or so much thereof as may be necessary to carry out this program, and authorization of the

above specified provisions in the lease.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were approved, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR GENERAL WORK ON BUILDINGS SECURED FROM FEDERAL WORKS AGENCY

(8) The University has secured from the Federal Works Agency four temporary buildings—two warehouses, a cafeteria, and a recreation building. The buildings have been brought to the campus and some of the construction work has been done by contractors employed by FWA, but some of the work must be done by the University.

It is not feasible to have two general contractors on the same project. The Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller therefore recommend that contracts be entered into with the J. L. Simmons Company of Decatur and Illiopolis,

the FWA contractor, for the following work:

Warehouse No. 2, general construction work, \$7,565. The Board awarded the general contract on Warehouse No. 1 to this company on May 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 376). It is recommended that the original contract be increased to provide for this additional work.

Recreational Building, \$3,355.05. This includes principally such construction as drives, sidewalks, fences, insulation, and shelving.

These contractor's estimates have been checked by Physical Plant Department engineers and are considered satisfactory. Funds are already available in University appropriations for these projects.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be

authorized to execute these contracts.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these recommendations were approved.

CONTRACT FOR CAMPUS WALK IMPROVEMENTS ON MATHEWS AVENUE

(9) On June 24, 1947, bids were received for the construction of a new sidewalk on the west side of Mathews Avenue from south of the Boneyard north to Springfield Avenue. Frank A. Somers Company, Urbana, is the lower of two bidders with a lump sum bid of \$6,135. These bids were taken with the expectation that there would be balances at the end of the 1940-1947 budget year that would permit this construction. Such funds were not available, and on July 18 the bid cheque of the Frank A. Somers Company was returned.

Funds have since become available in the appropriation for Minor Improvements in the Physical Plant budget, and the Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the award of this contract to the Frank A. Somers Company in the amount of \$6,135. The Frank A. Somers Company will still accept the contract on the basis of the original bid.

I concur and request authorization of the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute a contract with the Frank A. Somers Company in the amount of \$6,135.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, authority was granted as requested.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK ON MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(10) On March 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 317), the Board of Trustees awarded the contract for general work on the Mechanical Engineering Building to James McHugh Sons, Inc. Certain changes are now recommended involving both increases and decreases in the contract which will result in a net addition of \$1,756.91.

Additions to the contract are due to an increase in the size of lockers and the inclusion of interior construction for a shop area. At the time the contract for this building was awarded, certain interior construction in the shop area was omitted due to a last minute decision of the Mechanical Engineering Department to change the use of the space from a machine and forge shop to an internal combustion engine shop, and it was not desirable to hold up the contract for the detailed design. This addition provides for the necessary construction. Some decreases in the contract are realized principally from simplification of the exterior elevation and the fact that it was not necessary to drive the piles for the shop foundations as deep as specified.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that the contract with James McHugh Sons, Inc., be increased in the amount of \$1,756.91.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this addition to contract was authorized.

ADDITION TO THE CONTRACT FOR PLUMBING WORK IN THE MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(11) On March 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 317), the Board of Trustees awarded the contract for plumbing work on the Mechanical Engineering Building to Frank S. Bellis. At the time the contract for this building was awarded, certain construction in the shop area was omitted due to a decision of the Mechanical Engineering Department to change the use of this area.

Plans for its use are now complete and the Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$4,040.65 in the contract with Frank S. Bellis to provide for the necessary construction. A minor change is also included which provides for some shifting of process piping from the heating contract to the plumbing contract.

Funds for this change are available in the State appropriation for the

building.

I concur in the above recommendation and request authorization of the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute an addition to this contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this authorization was approved.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR MINOR CONSTRUCTION WORK IN MECHANICAL ENGINEERING LABORATORY

(12) On August 5, 1947, the Board of Trustees appropriated funds for the installation of a decompression chamber in the Mechanical Engineering Laboratory.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that the general work on the installation of the decompression chamber be done by Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., in accordance with their standing contract for minor construction work which was approved by the Board of Trustees on September 26, 1947. The estimated cost of this work is \$11,877.18.

I concur and recommend authorization of an addition to the standing con-

tract with Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., for the above work.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this authority was granted as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF GENERAL CAMPUS FIRE ALARM SYSTEM

(13) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$3,772.50 to the contract with the Gamewell Company, Newton Upper Falls, Massachusetts (\$15,535.60 approved by the Board on June 23, 1947, Minutes, page 406), for the installation of a general campus fire alarm system at Urbana-Champaign. The additions are for installation of central office equipment, fire alarm call transmitter, and some additional facilities in the temporary housing area.

This work was not included in the original contract since it was not then known if sufficient funds would be included in the 1947-1949 appropriations. The amount of protection necessary in the temporary housing areas was not known, and the inclusion of the transmitter would have limited the number of bidders on the items included in the original specifications. Funds are now available.

This estimate has been checked and approved by Graham, Anderson, Probst,

and White, Architects.

I concur in this recommendation and request authorization of the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute an addition to the contract with the Gamewell Company in the amount of \$3,772.50.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this addition to contract was authorized.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR STAFF HOUSING

(14) On March 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 313), the Board approved a contract with the Twin City Builders for the construction of 25 prefabricated houses on Hessel Boulevard. The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$1,150 to this contract for the furnishing and installation of venetian blinds, window shades, and curtain rods in these houses. This work was not included in the original contract, but it is desirable to furnish these items. I concur in this recommendation for an addition of \$1,150 to the contract. The

expenditure is covered by funds already provided for the project.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this addition to contract was authorized.

RELOCATION OF ILLINI PUBLISHING COMPANY

(15) On March 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 312), the Board approved the relocation of the Illini Publishing Company in Gregory Hall, which involves the transfer of the Speech Clinic from Gregory Hall to Illini Hall where the Illini Publishing Company is now housed. On September 26, 1947, the Board approved a contract

for the purchase by the University and the Illini Publishing Company of a new newspaper press for this reorganization. The remodeling in Gregory Hall and Illini Hall necessary for these changes will require a large appropriation. An accurate estimate of the cost involved can not be made now. It is necessary to employ a mechanical engineer to prepare the drawings and specifications for the plumbing, heating, ventilating, air-conditioning, and electrical work that will be required in Gregory Hall.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department believes it advisable to employ the engineers who originally handled this work for the construction of this building, as they know the building and have complete data on its design. Accordingly, he recommends employing Samuel R. Lewis and Associates, Chicago, engineers who designed the mechanical installations for Gregory Hall.

The basis of payment will be ten per cent of the cost to the University of the work designed by the engineers, plus \$100 a day and travel and hotel expenses for each visit to Urbana as requested by the University, except that the preliminary inspection visit shall be included in the ten per cent compensation. Not more than one or two special trips are expected. Considering the size of the project, the fee appears to be satisfactory. Although we can not at this time estimate exactly the total of the fee that will be due them, it should not exceed

I concur and recommend an appropriation of \$2,000 for this purpose and that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract for these services.

The Comptroller commented on this matter.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. Mc-Laughlin, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, the President of the University was requested to make a broader survey, to include the needs of the University Press for expanded quarters.

RATES OF PAY FOR PREPARATION AND GRADING OF EXAMINATIONS IN HIGH SCHOOL AND COLLEGE SUBJECTS

(16) The University through the Office of Admissions and Records offers examinations in high school and college subjects for the benefit of candidates who desire to qualify for admission to the C.P.A. examinations and the State Bar examinations. Fees are charged by authority of the Board of Trustees for such examinations to cover the expenses thereof, the receipts going into an Entrance Examination Fund. The Board has likewise authorized remuneration at the rate of \$1.00 an hour for grading papers. There has been no change in this scale of pay since it was established by the Board of Trustees on July 6, 1921 (Minutes, pages 6 and 7).

The Director of Admissions and Records recommends that this scale of

remuneration be increased to \$1.50 an hour.

The present scale of remuneration for preparing questions was established by the Board of Trustees on March 10, 1942 (Minutes, page 811). The Director of Admissions and Records recommends that the rates of pay for this work be

increased 50 per cent to the following rates:

For High School Subjects: \$3.00 a set for all subjects except English Composition and Appreciation of English Literature; \$6.75 a set for English Composition and Appreciation of English Literature.

For College Subjects: \$3.50 a set for all subjects except Accounting; \$4.50

for each examination in Accounting.

Income from the examinations is sufficient to meet the increases recommended. Members of the staff are engaged to perform these services outside the time required of them under their University contracts, and receive additional compensation for such services.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these recommendations were adopted.

TOXICOLOGICAL SERVICE TO LOCAL AGENCIES

(17) The Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, on recommendation of the Dean of the College of Medicine and the Head of the Department of Pharmacology, proposes the establishment of an analytical service for law-enforcing agencies in the State of Illinois. Toxicological analyses of the organs of persons dying of poison, or the analysis of the organs of any individual whose death was unexpected, will be made by the laboratory on request of the coroner or the State's attorney of any county in the State. The fees proposed for this service are:

Blood alcohol\$10
Barbiturates
Heavy metals
Blood carbon monoxide
Alkaloids 10
Complete analysis (where cause of death is unknown) 75

The service described was contemplated in the establishment of the new Department of Toxicology in the budget for 1947-1948. One of the specific duties of this department is the type of service above described.

It is proposed to credit the income from fees charged for this service to a "Toxicological Revolving Fund," the receipts to be deposited in the University Income Fund. The new fund will be used to pay the expenses of the work and any balance remaining at the close of each fiscal year, in excess of a moderate working balance, will lapse into general University funds.

I recommend approval of this program and the establishment of the proposed

revolving fund.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted.

ADDITIONAL FACILITIES FOR ANIMAL HOSPITAL IN CHICAGO

(18) Vice-President A. C. Ivy reports that additional facilities are essential for housing animals needed in research programs in the Chicago Professional Colleges. Unused space is available in the Rush Medical Building of Presbyterian Hospital to the University for an indefinite period, without rent, the University to pay all expenses of remodeling and to meet operation and maintenance expenses of the space occupied. The estimated remodeling cost is: animal cages and installation, \$7,900; other remodeling and improvement, \$10,100; total, \$18,000.

Provision would also have to be made for operation and maintenance expense, either by an addition to the budget of the Physical Plant Department or by inclu-

sion of this expense in the lease with Presbyterian Hospital.

Bids on the remodeling have been secured and the Physical Plant Department recommends a contract with the Mutual Contracting Company on a cost-plus basis with a guaranteed maximum of \$18,000.

I recommend:

- I. Authorization of the Comptroller, with the advice of other University officials concerned, to negotiate a lease with Presbyterian Hospital for the space needed and authorization of the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board to execute such a lease when terms have been agreed on by all parties concerned.
- 2. An appropriation of \$18,000 for remodeling and equipment of this area.

 3. Authorization of the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board to conclude a contract with the Mutual Contracting Company for the animal cages and installation and other remodeling under the conditions above set forth.

4. Authority to adjust the internal budget to cover the operation and maintenance expenses of the space involved.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were adopted, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS HOSPITALS

(19) The Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges recommends that the Research and Educational Hospitals be hereafter known as the

"University of Illinois Hospitals."

These hospitals were established under an agreement between the Board of Trustees of the University and the State Department of Public Welfare dated July 5, 1919, at which time the title "University Clinical Institute" was used. The buildings were constructed by the State of Illinois for the Department of Public Welfare. Subsequently the name was changed to the "Research and Educational Hospitals." In 1931 the agreement with the Department of Public Welfare was incorporated into law by an Act of the General Assembly entitled "An Act in relation to the founding and operation of Research and Educational Hospitals of the State of Illinois." In subsequent legislation the term "Research and Educational Hospitals" was continued in use.

Previous to 1941 the hospitals were operated jointly by the University and the Department of Public Welfare, the University providing the professional staff and the Department providing all other operating personnel. The funds for the operation of the hospitals were appropriated to the Department. In 1941 it was agreed between the Department and the University, the General Assembly concurring, that the operation of the hospitals should be transferred fully to the University and since then the appropriations have been made to the University. The Illinois Neuropsychiatric Institute, the Illinois Eye and Ear Infirmary, and the Institute for Juvenile Research are still operated jointly under the revised

agreement.

It would appear, therefore, that the name "Research and Educational Hospitals" is fixed by law and by the agreement between the Department of Public Welfare and the University, so that the change in name may involve legal and

contractual considerations.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the change in name to "University of Illinois Hospitals" to take effect after clearance of any legal and contractual questions that may be involved. This may require a revision of the agreement between the Department of Public Welfare and the University and the amendment of the law authorizing the agreement.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this change was authorized under the conditions recommended.

CENTRAL FOUNDRY COMPANY STOCK

(20) The Finance Committee of the Board recommends that one share of Preferred stock and one share of Common stock of the Central Foundry Company, New York, be sold. This stock was received by the University in October, 1936, in settlement of an account receivable for services rendered by the Theoretical and Applied Mechanics Department. During recent years industrial activity has enabled the company to operate profitably and at the present time the Preferred stock has a value of approximately 85 and the Common 834.

Authorization for this sale and approval of the following resolution is re-

quested:

RESOLUTION REGARDING SALE OF STOCK

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is the owner of one share of Preferred stock and one share of Common stock of the Central Foundry Company, New York, and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees has approved the sale of such stock in its

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, and H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, be authorized to execute any and all documents necessary to complete such sale.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this sale was authorized and the resolution was adopted, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

AMERICAN UNIVERSITY AT CAIRO CITATION

FROM THE COUNCIL OF THE AMERICAN UNIVERSITY AT CAIRO TO THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS, URBANA, ILLINOIS

On behalf of the administration, faculty, and student body of The American University at Cairo, the University Council hereby records its gratitude for the services rendered to The American University by the High School Visitor's Office of the University of Illinois in the person of Dr. Fred C. Hood, who was visiting professor of Education during the school year 1946-1947. Dr. Hood contributed to the program of the Department of Education of The American University at Cairo through the classes he has conducted and through the suggestions

and advice he has offered. He has served Education in Egypt in general through consultation, lectures, and visits to schools.

ADDITIONS TO CONTRACTS FOR PLUMBING AND ELECTRICAL WORK IN WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL

(28) On February 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 270), the Board of Trustees awarded contracts to Frank S. Bellis for plumbing and to Ernest Freeman and Company for electrical work on the new Women's Residence Hall. Certain changes are now recommended which will result in a net addition of \$4,321.72 to the plumbing contract and \$2,032 to the electrical contract.

The additions to the electrical contract cover changes recommended by the Housing Division. Also, the additions to the plumbing contract cover certain changes recommended by the Housing Division, and other changes are for the purpose of reducing maintenance costs. The estimates have been checked by the consulting architects, Naess and Murphy, who have approved them.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for Residence Halls for these

changes.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that the contract with Frank S. Bellis be increased in the amount of \$4,321.72 and that the contract with Ernest Freeman and Company be increased in the amount of \$2.032.00.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these additions to contract were authorized as recommended.

November 29, 1947



The November meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, on Saturday, November 29, 1947, according to the following schedule:

10:30 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

2:00 p.m. — Open session.

President Stoddard was present; also Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Professor Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and, during part of the day, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of September 26, 1947.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 805 to 880 above.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Secretary reported for record that action had been taken on November 13, 1947, approving the award of contract as recommended in the following matter.

Contract for Remodeling of Space for Telephone Equipment and Exchange in the Chicago Professional Colleges

The President's Office submitted to the Executive Committee the following bids received November 5 for the remodeling of space for relocation of the central telephone equipment and exchange in the Chicago Professional Colleges:

Mutual Contracting Company, Chicago\$4	496

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommended, the President's Office concurring, that a contract be awarded to the lowest bidder, the Mutual Contracting Company, in the amount of \$4,496. This is a lump sum bid with percentages to be added or deducted for any variations from the original specifications. Funds are available in the special appropriation made by the Board of Trustees on August 5, 1947 (Minutes, page 491), for the relocation of this telephone system.

The Executive Committee on November 13 authorized the award of the

contract as recommended.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in executive session the items on the agenda, and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

PURCHASE OF EQUIPMENT FOR BETATRON

(1) Construction of the new 300-million-electric-volt betatron requires: (1) backwound "A" coil; (2) core blocking; (3) transformer bank. These component parts of the betatron are being designed and specified by the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company with whom the Board of Trustees on May 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 368), authorized a contract on a cost basis for engineering services in the design and preparation of working drawings for the betatron.

design and preparation of working drawings for the betatron.

The items above listed are very special and must comply exactly with detailed specifications. In the opinion of University officials and Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company engineers, it is not possible for any manufacturer to determine in advance what the cost of production will be. Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company, while not willing to quote any definite price, is willing to undertake the manufacture on an open order with the understanding that billing will be at their cost, to be determined by their usual cost accounting methods, including manufacturer's profit. The cost to the University is estimated to be about \$40,000.

Professor D. W. Kerst, in charge of construction and of the betatron research program, Professor F. W. Loomis, Head of the Department of Physics, the Director of Purchases, and the Comptroller recommend that an open order be placed with the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company to produce these items at prices to be determined when they are completed

at prices to be determined when they are completed.
Funds are available in the State appropriation for "Completing construction

of the Betatron and associated equipment."

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this matter was referred to the Executive Committee with power to act.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM FACULTY COMMITTEE ON PATENTS

- (2) The Faculty Committee on Patents submits the following report and recommendations relating to patentable discoveries made by members of the University staff:
- 1. "Supersonic detection of infra-red radiation" or the application of coupling effects between electromagnetic radiation and suitably chosen supersonic fields.

Discovery by Messrs. William J. Fry, Special Research Assistant Professor, and H. L. VanVelzer, Special Research Associate Professor of Electrical Engineering. Mr. Fry has submitted this statement about the discovery:

"It is possible to detect a modulated infra-red beam by irradiating a supersonic field and observing the resulting changes in sound pressure amplitude at a

suitably placed detector.

"Two distinctly different types of coupling have been observed. The first is due to a heating of the gas under irradiation. The magnitude of this effect de-

creases rapidly as the modulating frequency is increased.

"The second type of coupling has been observed by irradiating a column of CO2 gas which is excited at a supersonic frequency in the neighborhood of maximum absorption. When the gas is irradiated under these conditions there is no appreciable decrease in the magnitude of the coupling effect as the modulating frequency is increased. This is distinctly different from the other type of coupling and it indicates that this effect is not dependent on heating the gas.

The scope of this work is described as (I) supersonic fields generated in any fashion and incident electromagnetic radiation generated in any fashion, and (2) coupling effects utilizing heating due to absorption, and changes in acoustic

absorption coefficient.

There are a number of applications for this discovery, the more prominent being (a) covering device utilizing the observed interaction such as detectors of radiation, dectector amplifiers, power measuring devices, temperature measurement devices, and (b) image forming devices using these mechanisms.

Professor W. L. Everitt, Head of the Department of Electrical Engineering, has expressed doubt that this discovery will have any commercial possibilities and

stated that its principal application would likely be in military operations.

This work was done under a contract between the University of Illinois and

the Air Materiel Command of the Army Air Forces.

The Faculty Committee on Patents recommends that the University release to the discoverers the right to file an application for a patent on this discovery subject to the rights of the Air Materiel Command.

2. Procedure for concentration of anhydrous hydrazine.

Messrs. L. F. Audrieth, Professor of Chemistry, and R. A. Penneman, a graduate student in the Department of Chemistry last year, have reported that during the course of researches designed to make more readily available anhydrous hydrazine they have worked out a procedure for concentration of this material. Professor Roger Adams, Head of the Department, has expressed the opinion that this procedure is not patentable and that while it might have a technical value in industry it would not be for a long time.

The Committee recommends that this discovery be released to the discoverers so that they may be free to bring it to the attention of industries interested in this method of anhydrous hydrazine. The Committee also considered the possible interest of the University of Illinois Foundation but came to the conclusion that because the discovery is chiefly of interest to the Army neither the Foundation nor the University should apply for a patent.

3. "Continuously variable resonant frequency crystal systems, composed of a

single material or any combination of materials."

Discovery by Mr. William J. Fry, Special Research Assistant Professor of Electrical Engineering. Mr. Fry has submitted the following statement concerning this discovery:

"The variable resonant frequency is obtained by coupling any mode of vibration of any type of cut of any crystalline or non-crystalline substance to a material of variable shape, size or volume. This coupling is obtained in any fashion. The driving force may be a voltage applied to various faces of the crystalline or non-

crystalline material.

"Examples: (a) Crystal cut coupled to a liquid through a combination of intermediate materials such as a crystal, metal, mercury combination. The liquid volume may be varied. (b) Crystal cuts coupled to a system whose shape is continuously variable, but not necessarily the volume. The coupling at interfaces may take place through liquids.

"Application of such systems to filters, sound sources or receivers, vibration pickups, treatment of biological material or organisms. This would be of interest in

the medical and aeronautical fields, i.e., the blacking out of pilots during operation of high speed aircraft.'

Professor W. L. Everitt, Head of the Department of Electrical Engineering, has stated that the chances of developing this discovery to any commercial extent

The Committee recommends that the University's rights with respect to this discovery be released to the University of Illinois Foundation, with the recommendation that it work out a cooperative arrangement with the discoverer, or in the event that the Foundation is not interested in attempting exploitation of this discovery that the same be released to the discoverer.

4. A simple procedure for the preparation of the mono-fluophosphates.
Discovery by Messrs. L. F. Audrieth, Professor of Chemistry, and O. F. Hill,
Research Fellow in Chemistry.
Professor Roger Adams, Head of the Department of Chemistry, reports that
this material has no industrial use, that there is none in sight, and in view of these considerations and the cost, recommends that the discovery be released to the discoverers.

The Committee recommends that this discovery be released to the discoverers.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these releases were referred to the Board Committee on Patents for investigation and recommendation to the Board. The Board also concurred in the President's proposal that all recommendations involving the application for or release of patent rights should have the approval of the University Research Board, as well as that of the Faculty Committee on Patents, before coming to the Board of Trustees.

UNIVERSITY WATER SUPPLY

(3) For several years the water level in the ground resources from which the University and the Illinois Water Service Company (the utility which supplies water to Champaign and Urbana) take their supply has been dropping at the rate of one foot per year. During the year 1945-1946 the water level dropped approximately five feet. The Illinois Water Service Company is developing a new source of supply and plans to discontinue pumping from its present areas, except in emergencies or until such time as the ground water supply has been replenished by natural infiltration.

Repeated efforts have failed to locate an additional supply on University property. Engineers have advised the Physical Plant Department, and the Director concurs in their conclusions, that it would be more economical for the University to purchase its entire water supply from the Illinois Water Service Company than to go off campus the distance that would be necessary to obtain an adequate water supply, in as much as the Illinois Water Service Company has already begun the development of new resources. The increased cost of purchasing water from the Illinois Water Service Company is estimated at about \$17,000 a year, but it is not as great as the comparable capital cost of increasing the facilities necessary to maintain the University's own water supply.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department therefore recommends that a contract be entered into with the Illinois Water Service Company for the entire University's water supply at Urbana-Champaign. I recommend that this proposal be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for consideration and

report to the Board.

This matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds as recommended.

The Board recessed for luncheon.

OPEN SESSION

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered in open session, after luncheon, the following matters presented by the President of the University.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(1) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded the following who have made applications therefor under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943 and who have presented evidence that they are holders of valid and unrevoked C.P.A. certificates issued by other states and that they qualified for these certificates by passing the regular written examinations:

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these certificates were awarded as recommended.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR EDGAR L. ERICKSON

(2) The Under Secretary of the Army has requested that Dr. Edgar L. Erickson, Associate Professor of History, be granted a leave of absence from the University for service to the Department of the Army in the writing of its war history. As an officer in the Army of the United States, and later as a civilian staff member of the Civil Affairs Division, Professor Erickson conducted research in the records of the World War II military government experiences. Since his return to the University, the research has been completed and Professor Erickson now is needed to write that portion of the history pertaining to Germany and Austria.

to write that portion of the history pertaining to Germany and Austria.

It is anticipated that this work can be completed during the second semester and summer of the current academic year. The Department of the Army will make satisfactory salary arrangements with Professor Erickson covering the full period

of his services.

I recommend that Professor Erickson be given a leave of absence without pay from March I to September I, 1948.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this leave was granted as recommended.

RETIREMENT OF PROFESSOR O. F. WEBER

(3) Professor O. F. Weber of the College of Education has requested that he be retired from active service beginning May I, 1948, under the provision in the law creating the University Retirement System of Illinois which permits retirement "on or after the attainment of age sixty-five (65) in exceptional cases and for substantial cause at the request of the Employee and upon certification of the Employer."

Professor Weber will be 66 years of age on March 6, 1948, and has requested retirement because of his health. At the end of the current semester Professor Weber will have been in the service of the University 25½ years. He has been

granted sick leave from November 1, 1947, until May 1, 1948.

I recommend approval.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this retirement was authorized as recommended.

APPOINTMENTS OF UNIVERSITY REPRESENTATIVES ON BOARD OF MEDICAL DIRECTORS OF INSTITUTION FOR TUBERCULOSIS RESEARCH

(4) An Act of the 65th General Assembly provides for the establishment of an Institution for Tuberculosis Research in Chicago for the production, distribution, and application of the bacillus Calmette-Guerin (BCG) and other methods and materials for the prevention of tuberculosis and for conducting research in tuberculosis.

Professional operation and all other management of the institution is vested jointly in the Municipal Sanitarium of Chicago and the University of Illinois, to be exercised through a board of five medical directors, two of whom shall be directors of the Sanitarium, two appointed by the University, and one elected by the medical directors representing the Sanitarium and the University. The elected member

shall serve for five years. The tenure of University members shall be designated by the Board of Trustees of the University. The Sanitarium members shall serve during their tenure as directors on the Board of Directors of the Sanitarium. The terms of the University members and elected member shall commence July I of the year of appointment. Vacancies of University members and the elected member shall be filled for the balance of the unexpired term. All members shall serve until their successors are appointed. Members shall serve without compensation but will be reimbursed for expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

Funds have been appropriated for the purchase of land for the institution and

for the construction of a building and equipment.

I recommend the appointment of Dr. Andrew C. Ivy, Vice-President of the University in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, and Dr. John B. Youmans, Dean of the College of Medicine, as the University of Illinois representatives. I recommend also that the terms of the University representatives be for two years.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these appointments were approved as recommended.

REGISTRATION FEE FOR NURSERY SCHOOL FOR CHILDREN OF STUDENT WAR VETERANS

(5) It is recommended that the registration fee for children entering the Nursery School for Children of Student War Veterans be set at \$10 a semester for the first child accepted from a family and \$5 for each additional child from the same family.

The School started on November 17, 1947, and as an emergency the fee for the current semester was set at \$7.50 for the first child from a family and \$5 for each additional child, the reduction from the recommended fee being due to

the decrease in the period of instruction.

The Provost and the Comptroller recommend approval of this fee schedule and of the reduction for the current semester.

I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these fees were approved and confirmed as recommended.

FISCAL OPERATIONS OF DIVISION OF SERVICES FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN AND DELEGATION OF SIGNATURES

(6) The State appropriations for the operation of the Division of Services for Crippled Children are made to the University of Illinois. Because of the professional nature of its services, the Division is under the general supervision of the Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges. Consequently, the accounting and other financial services for the Division are being performed by the Chicago Business Office. Vouchers for disbursement of the Division's funds are prepared in its office in Springfield, sent to Chicago for processing and accounting, and then sent to the Auditor of Public Accounts in Springfield for payment.

The Comptroller has reviewed this financial procedure with the Director of the Division and others concerned and has worked out a system which will make possible the processing of vouchers in the office of the Division in Springfield, and transmittal directly to the State Auditor of Public Accounts for payment. The accounts will be centralized within the office of the Division. The Comptroller reports that adequate means of control and responsibility have been set up to protect the University, keep the operations of the Division in line with the business practices of the University, and provide a satisfactory independent check.

Delegation of Signatures

The Comptroller requests adoption of the following resolution as an addendum to the resolution for the delegation of signatures approved by the Board on March 27, 1947. The purpose is to provide for centralizing and expediting the preparation of vouchers against the State Auditor by the Division of Services for Crippled Children from its own funds. Resolved, That the President and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois are authorized to delegate the signing of their names as President and Secretary respectively to vouchers against funds of the Division of Services for Crippled Children to be presented to the State Auditor under the following conditions:

The President of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to Herbert R. Kobes and Mabel F. Meek authority to sign his name as President of the Board of Trustees on vouchers against the State Auditor approved in accordance with

regulations of the Board.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to Mrs. Freida M. Hicks and to Lean C. Ryan authority to sign his name as Secretary of the Board of Trustees to vouchers against the State Auditor approved in accord-

ance with the regulations of the Board.

And be it further resolved that the Auditor of Public Accounts is hereby authorized and directed to honor vouchers bearing facsimile signatures of the President and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois if such facsimile signatures resemble the facsimile specimen duly certified to or filed with the Auditor of Public Accounts by the Secretary.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this resolution was adopted as recommended.

COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION RESEARCH AND MARKETING FUND BUDGET

(7) Federal funds have been allocated to the College of Agriculture and the Agricultural Experiment Station for further research into the basic laws and principles relating to agriculture and to improve and facilitate the marketing and distribution of agricultural products. The amount which has been made available is \$52,936 for the fiscal year 1947-1948, and the following budget is submitted:

The foregoing budget has been prepared by Dean and Director H. P. Rusk and has been reviewed by the Comptroller. I recommend its approval subject to adjustment within the total.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this budget was approved as recommended; the funds were appropriated by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Meyer.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

- (8) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following purposes:

SPECIAL APPROPRIATION OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FUNDS

(9) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association requests approval by the Board of Trustees of an appropriation made by it of \$25,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to cover expenses of sending the University of Illinois Band

to the Illinois-Army game in New York. The contract with the Army provides for a refund to the association of approximately \$10,000 of this amount when all accounts are settled.

The Association has agreed in its contract to share the expenses of bringing the United States Military Academy Cadet Corps and Band to the game at the University in 1948 on a similar basis.

I recommend approval of this appropriation.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this appropriation was approved as recommended.

ADDITION TO THE CONTRACT WITH W. A. POPE AND COMPANY FOR PIPING IN UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION TUNNELS

(10) W. A. Pope and Company, Chicago, are installing piping in the heat tunnel of the Utilities Distribution System under a contract awarded by the Board of

Trustees January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 228).

One division of the original bid provided for a line to the site of the new Veterinary building. Since funds are not available for the construction of this building, it is not necessary for the present to construct the line to that site, and this division of the bid was not included in the contract. It is necessary, however, to construct a short section to the Dairy Manufactures building to complete the loop of the heat tunnel.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$4,168 in the contract to provide for this additional piping installation. The estimate has been checked and approved by Sargent and Lundy, Engineers, for this project and funds are available in the State appropriation for

the Utilities Distribution System.

I recommend approval.

Plus an estimated cost of \$1,675 for installation.

1115), was sold to a staff member in accordance with the general policy of the program. Proceeds of the sale were used to erect another staff house. The staff member who purchased the house is now leaving the University and has offered to sell the house to the University for the original purchase price plus an allowance for the improvements which he has made.

There is still acute need for staff housing, and the Provost, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the Comptroller recommend that this house be reacquired. An additional allotment of \$8,500 will be necessary to complete the transaction.

2. It was estimated that the original program of 44 prefabricated houses and the supplementary program of 25 houses would cost \$577,000 in total. Actual costs will exceed this amount by \$4,500, and an additional allotment of this amount is

The total amount allocated for the F.P.H.A. housing units from the State appropriation will not be needed, and the Comptroller recommends that the distribution of the special State appropriation for staff housing be revised to provide for the above changes. ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR SUPPLEMENTAL STAFF HOUSING PROJECT

(13) On April 24, 1947 (Minutes, page 341), the Board of Trustees approved a supplemental staff-housing program consisting of 25 prefabricated houses and six research houses on Hessel Boulevard in Champaign. While Hessel Boulevard, prior to University construction activities, had some gravel surfacing, construction work has left it in a very bad condition. The City of Champaign has some responsibility

for maintaining and restoring the surface, but it is unlikely that it will do anything.

It is proposed to grade and resurface the street with gravel, the cost to be borne by the various property owners. Twin City Real Estate Exchange, from whom the University purchased the land and prefabricated houses, owns most of the remaining property affected. The University's share of the cost of improving the road is estimated at \$3,035 and could be included as an addition to the original contract of purchase, in establishing the basis of resale.

Funds are available in the special State appropriation for staff housing.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that this contract with the Twin City Real Estate Exchange be increased to provide for this work.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this increase of contract was authorized as recommended.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS FOUNDATION TO EXECUTE CONTRACTS FOR DEVELOPMENT OF 4-H CLUB CAMPS

(14) The Dean of the College of Agriculture, the Comptroller, the Legal Counsel, and the Manager of the University of Illinois Foundation request that the Board of Trustees adopt the following resolution to clarify certain financial and contractual problems which have arisen in the development of the 4-H Club Camp at Robert Allerton Park and the expenditure of funds raised for that purpose by 4-H Clubs.

Whereas, by virtue of its Resolution adopted at its meeting on June 14, 1947, The University of Illinois Foundation expressed its willingness to assume the responsibility of receiving, holding, and disbursing funds for such 4-H Club Camp, as requested by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and is now in possession of such funds, and by reason thereof, it seems that, if The University of Illinois Foundation would be willing to assume responsibility for the execution of such contracts, under circumstances where its separate funds and property will not be identified thereby such proceeding would be desirable. property will not be jeopardized thereby, such procedure would be desirable;

Therefore, be it resolved by The Board of Trustees of the University of

Illinois that The University of Illinois Foundation be and it is hereby requested to consider the acceptance of such responsibility under conditions where its liability is limited to the funds held by The University of Illinois Foundation in

PURCHASE OF FIDELITY AND BURGLARY INSURANCE

(20) Fidelity and burglary insurance now in force will expire January 1, 1948. Quotations were requested from seventy agents representing both stock and mutual companies for comprehensive insurance described as "Dishonesty, Disappearance, and Destruction" coverages as follows:

I. Blanket position bond coverage in the amount of \$10,000 applicable to each full or part time University employee, including employees of the University of

Illinois Alumni Association.

2. Excess position bond coverage on certain positions.

3. Blanket location coverage on the loss of money, securities, and property occurring within the premises, including damage to the premises, furnishings, equipment, and fixtures in the amount of \$40,000 at Urbana-Champaign, Chicago, Galesburg, and Dixon Springs.

4. Blanket location coverage in the amount of \$20,000, with \$3,000 additional on a second custodian at Urbana-Champaign, on the loss of money, securities,

and property occurring outside the premises, and covering Urbana-Champaign, Chicago, and Galesburg.

5. Loss caused by forgery or alteration of any check, draft, or promissory note or similar written direction or promise to pay of a certain sum of money. Coverage in the amount of \$10,000 is to attach to the University's own account in

any bank in which the University of Illinois has an account.

Quotations were received from thirteen companies of annual premiums ranging from \$1,149.80 to \$3,026.67. The three-year premiums (2½ times the annual premium)

annual premium) range from \$2,873.53 to \$7,566.68.

On January 1, 1048, all companies in the State of Illinois will be required to file with the State a list of the rates applicable to each type of risk and the amount of discount credit applicable to each risk. It appears likely that the companies will file moderate or averaged discount rates and the University will not be able to obtain as large a discount, because of exceptionally good loss experience, as is possible now when companies are permitted to discount the rates as they see fit.

The Director of Purchases and the Comptroller recommend that the University take advantage of the low rates now in effect by placing this insurance in effect prior to January I and having the coverage written for three years. They further recommend that the policy be written by the American Motorists Insurance Company, Chicago, Illinois, the lowest bidder, at a premium of \$2,873.53 for a threeyear period.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this contract was awarded as recommended.

AMENDMENT OF POLICY AND RULES RELATING TO COMPENSATION AND WORKING CONDITIONS OF NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES

Mr. McLaughlin, for the Committee on Civil Service and Employees, reported as follows.

The second sentence of Section III, paragraph 4-A, of the Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees now reads as follows:

In all those classifications where the maximum rate in April 1945 was \$235 per month or less, there shall be automatic increases at least once each year until

the mid-point of the range of the classification is reached."

At the time the policy was written it was desirable to put in this rather specific and limited statement in order to meet the condition which existed, but now it is desirable that the statement be made more general and that the figure used conform to the schedule of ranges recently approved by the Board.

The Director of Nonacademic Personnel has recommended that this provision

be amended to read as follows:
"In all those classifications where the maximum rate is \$250 per month or less there shall be automatic increases at least once a year until the mid-point of the range of the classification is reached."

The Committee recommends approval.

The January meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, on Thursday, January 8, 1948, according to the following schedule:

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meetings of October 30 and November 29, 1947.

ACTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Secretary reported for record that the Executive Committee, on December 16 and December 29, 1947, had taken action on recommendations of the President of the University as follows.

DECEMBER 16, 1947

RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT OFFER OF CITY OF CHICAGO OF PERMISSION TO INSTALL AND MAINTAIN DUCT RUNS AND MANHOLES

(1) On October 29, 1947, the City of Chicago passed a City Ordinance granting to the University of Illinois permission to install concrete duct runs under and across certain city streets. The Director of the Physical Plant Department asks adoption of resolution by the Board of Trustees accepting this offer.

This is necessary to enable the University to carry out its extensions of

service lines at the Chicago Professional campus.

The attached resolution has been drawn by the Legal Counsel and its adoption is recommended by the Comptroller.

I concur in the recommendation.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the following resolution was unanimously adopted as recommended.

RESOLUTION

Be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that:

The Ordinance of the City of Chicago, passed by the City Council at its regular meeting on October 29, 1947, which grants permission to the University of Illinois to install and maintain concrete duct runs and manholes under and across certain streets in the City of Chicago, a copy of which Ordinance is hereto attached, be and the same is hereby accepted according to the terms of the Ordinance.

> University of Illinois Granted Permission to Install and Maintain Concrete Duct Runs and Manholes

The following is said ordinance as passed:

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

Section 1. Permission and authority hereby are given and granted to The University of Illinois, a corporation, its successors and assigns, upon the terms and subject to the conditions of this ordinance, to excavate for, install and maintain concrete duct runs, seventy inches by twenty-four inches in size, under and across W. Taylor Street, east of S. Hermitage Avenue; a concrete duct run twenty-four inches by seventy inches in size west under and along the north side of W. Taylor Street, crossing S. Hermitage Avenue and S. Wood Street and under and along the north side of W. Taylor Street to the west line of S. Wood

Street, thence north into private property, together with the necessary manholes.

Also a concrete duct run twenty-four inches by seventy inches in size under and along the west side of S. Wood Street connecting with the concrete duct run in W. Taylor Street and running north to W. Polk Street, together with the

necessary manholes.

Also a concrete duct run twenty-four inches by seventy inches in size under and along the east side of S. Wolcott Avenue from a point north of the north line of W. Taylor Street to a point seventy-five (75) feet south of the south line of W. Polk Street, together with the necessary manholes, all of such privileges for a period of ten (10) years from and after the date of the passage of this ordinance.

The location of said concrete duct runs and manholes shall be as shown on print hereto attached which, by reference, is made a part of this ordinance. Said concrete duct runs shall be installed under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works and shall be maintained in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Chicago and the directions of the Commissioner of Public Works. The grantee shall keep that portion of the public way over said concrete duct runs and the openings to said concrete duct runs in good condition and repair, safe for public travel to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Section 2. This ordinance is subject to amendment, modification or repeal and the permission and authority herein granted may be revoked by the Mayor in his discretion at any time without the consent of said grantee. Upon termination of the privileges herein granted, the grantee, without cost or expense to the City of Chicago, shall remove the structures and appliances herein authorized and restore the public way where disturbed by said structures or appliances, or by the removal thereof, to a proper condition under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and in the event of the failure, neglect or refusal of said grantee so to do, the City of Chicago may do said work and charge the cost thereof to said grantee.

Section 3. The grantee will hold and save the City of Chicago harmless from any and all liability for cost of removal, relocation, alteration, repair or maintenance of the structures or appliances herein authorized and from any and all damages thereto on account of the location, construction, reconstruction, alteration repair or maintenance of any public ways, bridges, subways, tunnels, vaults, sewers, water mains, conduits, pipes, poles and other utilities.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage; provided said grantee file a written acceptance of this ordinance with the City Clerk within sixty (60) days after the passage of this ordinance.

RETIREMENT OF KATHARINE PATTERSON, HOME ADVISER IN GRUNDY COUNTY

(2) Miss Katharine Patterson, Home Adviser in Grundy County, has requested that she be retired from active service beginning December 1, 1947, under the provision in the law creating the University Retirement System of Illinois which permits retirement "on or after the attainment of age sixty-five (65) in exceptional cases and for substantial cause at the request of the Employee and upon certification of the Employer."

Miss Patterson became 65 on July 9, 1947, and has requested retirement because she is not physically able to carry the strenuous load required of a Home Adviser. In fact, she wanted to retire beginning September 1, 1947, but continued in service because of the difficulty of securing a replacement. She has been in the service of the University as a member of the extension staff in the Department of Home Economics and as a Home Adviser since September 1, 1929.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this retirement was approved.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR PIPING WORK AT ABBOTT POWER PLANT

(2) Bids were requested on piping work in the Abbott Power Plant addition from a number of contractors and by advertisement. Two bids were received: William A. Pope Company, \$131,770.00, and Phillips-Getschow Company, \$138,945.00. The bid of William A. MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

TERMS OF EMPLOYMENT OF ACADEMIC, ADMINISTRATIVE, RESEARCH, AND EXTENSION STAFF

(1) Under present University statutory provisions, salaries of the instructional staff are payable in ten or twelve equal installments for an academic year's service. The professional or instructional year for which members of the teaching staff are employed extends through two regular semesters beginning in September and ending in June. Supplementary salaries are paid for teaching services during the summer session on the basis of 16 per cent of the annual salary, with a present maximum of \$1200 for full-time service for an eight-week session.

During the World War II period the University operated on as many as three different, overlapping academic calendars, viz.: (1) the regular civilian program; (2) the Navy College Training Program; and (3) the Army Specialized

Training Program. Some members of the instructional staff were required to teach continuously, and at times carried more than normal teaching loads in order to service these programs. Administrative adjustments were made in the terms of employment, and the Board of Trustees has authorized at least three changes in the Statutes:

(a) Services to be performed by the teaching staff shall extend through two semesters of the regular academic year beginning in September and ending in June.

(b) The maximum summer session salary be increased from \$900 to \$1200 for eight weeks of service, with supplementary adjustments for 12 and 16 weeks of service.

(c) The deadline on the acceptance of appointments to the staff has been

reduced from 30 days to 10 days.

Various practices developed during the war period, and certain new factors have created inconsistencies in terms of employment. The University has many contracts with industrial and government agencies for research projects which run continuously through the year. Competition for summer employment has increased, making it difficult to retain staff members for teaching during the summer session. To clarify the situation, the Provost has conferred with the deans, directors, department heads, and other University officials who are chiefly concerned. As a result of these discussions and study, he recommends adoption of the following principles governing employment of the academic, administrative, research, and extension staff effective at the beginning of the 1948 Summer Session:

1. The academic year shall consist of two regular semesters (in the Chicago Professional Colleges the academic year shall consist of three terms) beginning in September or October and ending in June, the exact dates to be determined

in the University Calendar.

2. Unless otherwise specified, services of the instructional staff shall be required during the two semesters (in the case of the Chicago Professional Colleges, three terms) of the academic year, and they shall be free for other employment, either in the University or elsewhere, during the summer months.

3. An appointment for one semester shall call for four and one-half months of service and the rate of compensation shall be one-half of the rate for the full academic year. Temporary and intermittent employment, full time or part time, shall ordinarily be on a pro rata basis as to term of service and salary, but heads of departments may, with the approval of the Dean and the President, establish special rates for part-time assistants.

4. Members of the instructional staff for the academic year who are employed for teaching in the Summer Session or for research in the three summer months shall receive a monthly compensation at the rate of one-ninth of the salary rate

paid them for instructional service during the preceding academic year.

5. Members of the instructional staff for the academic year who are employed on research at full time for the three summer months will be given the equivalent of a month's vacation with pay, to be accumulated in periods when classes are not in session, including the Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter recesses.

6. The terms of employment shall be stated explicitly by the nominating officer for all members of the academic staff, indicating that services are required for (a) the academic year; (b) twelve months except for allowable vacation; (c) the Summer Session.

- 7. Staff members of the rank of instructor and above shall receive their salaries in twelve monthly installments for each academic year of service, or on a pro rata basis for shorter periods. Unless otherwise specified, teaching assistants shall be paid their salaries for each academic year of service in ten installments, of which the first and last shall be one-half installments, and the other eight shall be full installments each equal to one-ninth of the salary for the academic year.
- 8. Appointments to administrative, research, and extension positions generally, and to teaching and other positions requiring service throughout the year except for allowable vacations, shall be on a yearly basis ("Y" appointments; see 9 and
- 9. Services of staff on "Y" appointment will be required for twelve months, with stated vacations with pay, and salaries shall be paid in twelve monthly installments.

- 10. Staff members on yearly service ("Y" appointment) will not receive additional compensation for the Summer Session. For staff members, partly on "Y" and partly on "non-Y" appointment, this regulation applies to the "Y" portion. Vacations taken during holiday recesses, other than the actual holidays recognized by the University, shall be considered a part of the annual vacation allowance of one month.
- 11. Positions in the University are classified in the following categories and are designated in the budget by the symbols indicated:

A — Indefinite tenure

B — Two years from September

D—One year from September

E — Nine months from the beginning of the academic year

G — Special tenure Y — Twelve months

I concur in these recommendations.

When the Statutes are revised, these changes should be incorporated.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these changes were approved and the Statutes were amended accordingly.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR GEORGE H. ROCKWOOD

(2) Dean M. L. Enger of the College of Engineering recommends that Professor George H. Rockwood of the Department of Electrical Engineering, who is seriously ill, be given sick leave with full pay for the first semester, 1947-1948 (Sep-

tember 1, 1947, to March 1, 1948).

Professor Rockwood has been in the service of the University since February 1, 1947. Under the rules of the Board he is eligible for 25 days' sick leave with pay from the date his services were required. Since the present semester's instruction began October 9, 1947, this would give him leave on full pay to November 3. He has not accumulated extended disability leave with full pay allowance beyond the 25 days.

Professor Rockwood left an attractive position in the Bell Telephone Laboratories, New York, where he was in charge of a group doing research work on important developments in electrical engineering, to accept a professorship at the University of Illinois. He thereby gave up pension and disability benefits accumulated since he joined the Bell Telephone Laboratories in 1929. He is not eligible for disability benefits from the University Retirement System of Illinois.

In view of these circumstances, I recommend that the Board of Trustees consider this as a special case and that the leave on full pay be granted from September I, 1947, through February 29, 1948, or one-half of the current academic year. The Department of Electrical Engineering is carrying Professor Rockwood's teaching load without additional expense to the University.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this leave was granted as recommended.

DEVELOPMENT OF GOLF COURSE ON KIMMEL FARM

(3) On July 30, 1943 (Minutes, page 450), the Board approved the purchase from Mrs. Alice N. Kimmel of her farm of 171.82 acres in Tolono Township adjoining the village of Savoy as a site for the University of Illinois Airport. This farm was in the area originally selected by the Civil Aeronautics Administration as a site for the Airport. Subsequently, and to meet Army Air Forces requirements, the C.A.A. selected a site one-half mile south and one-half mile west of the area originally selected. In the meantime, a contract had been made with Mrs. Kimmel for the purchase of her farm and the purchase was consummated. An assignment of \$55,000 (Minutes, pages 489 and 739) for the purchase was made from the General Reserve Fund, and no part of the State appropriation of \$250,000 for the purchase of Airport land was used for this purpose. The farm is leased to a tenant who operates it under the general supervision of the College of Agriculture.

In the judgment of Director Leslie A. Bryan of the Institute of Aeronautics, the farm will not be needed for expansion of the Airport. If expansion is necessary, it would have to be to the south and west. The farm is not needed for Agri-

cultural Experiment Station purposes.

The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has proposed the development of an eighteen-hole golf course on this farm. The Association will provide the funds required for the construction, estimated to cost not more than \$200,000. The Association's financial condition will permit such expenditures, and this would be in keeping with the policy of using surplus funds to provide recrea-

tional facilities for the students and faculty.

The Directors of the Athletic Association further propose that the present nine-hole golf course at Florida Avenue and Fourth Street be converted into a baseball park and playing fields. One-half of the area would be needed for baseball and the other half would be available for general recreational purposes. This would concentrate all of the recreational facilities for men in the vicinity of the George Huff Gymnasium and the Stadium.

The Athletic Association would release Illinois Field for general University

purposes.

This proposal has been considered by the University faculty Building Program Committee, and it is in favor of doing this. I recommend that the Board

of Trustees approve it.

I further recommend that consideration be given to the acquisition of additional land surrounding the Kimmel farm for possible development as a residential housing area of the suburban type. This might be undertaken jointly by the Board of Trustees and the Athletic Association. To implement this idea, if the Board agrees it is worth developing, I recommend that it be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for consideration and report to the Board.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the proposals involving the construction of a golf course on the Kimmel farm, the future use of the site of the present golf course, and the release of Illinois Field were approved.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the matter of the acquisition of additional land was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for study and report to the Board.

PURCHASE OF ELECTRONIC DIGITAL COMPUTER (EDVAC)

(4) I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the purchase of an electronic digital computer (EDVAC) at an estimated maximum cost of \$150,000

from the Reeves Instrument Company, New York.

These machines are now being constructed by the Reeves Instrument Company on a limited basis, with orders thus far from the Ordnance Department and the Signal Corps of the United States Army, the University of Pennsylvania, and the Bureau of Standards. Prompt action by the University of Illinois in acquiring such equipment will give the University leadership in the whole Middle West in various areas of scientific development. In performance this machine is the equivalent of 1,000 electrically operated calculating machines. It performs difficult mathematical problems in periods of time ranging from a few seconds to a few hours. It will perform some problems in mathematics, electrical engineering, genetics, meteorology, and psychology that have been the despair of scientists until now.

In further explanation of what this machine will do and how it will be used in research programs, I have asked Dean Ridenour of the Graduate College and Chairman of the University Research Board and Professor Nathan M. Newmark of the Department of Civil Engineering to appear before the Board today and explain the case.

It is proposed to pay half the cost of the machine from research funds already budgeted for the Graduate College and the rest by special appropriation. I therefore recommend an appropriation of \$75,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, from the General Reserve Fund for this purpose.

Dean Ridenour and Professor Newmark discussed this matter.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the purchase was approved and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken.

REVISION OF REGULATIONS RELATING TO PATENTABLE DISCOVERIES

(5) The Board of Trustees on October 18, 1945 (Minutes, page 866), established the following procedure for dealing with potentially patentable discoveries made by members of the staff, as they are reported:

(a) The Faculty Committee on Patents may consult with the University's patent attorneys immediately, without prior authorization by the Board of Trustees.

(b) If, in the judgment of counsel, the discovery should be patented, an application for patent shall be filed immediately and reported to the Board at the next opportunity.

(c) If in the judgment of the Faculty Committee, the University would not

be justified in expending funds for a patent application, a recommendation shall be made to the Board for the release of the discovery to the discoverer. I recommend that sections (a), (b), and (c) above be rescinded and replaced

by the following:

(a) The University Research Board will review all potentially patentable

discoveries and advise the President.

(b) No application for a patent shall be filed, nor shall a discovery be released to the discoverer, with right to file his own application, without prior authorization by the Board of Trustees or its Executive Committee. All patent applications so authorized will be initiated by the President's Office, through the Legal Counsel, acting on behalf of the Board.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the procedure with respect to patents was amended as recommended.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, a letter from Dean Ridenour proposing a plan for the distribution of royalties was referred to the Committee on Patents for consideration and report.

NEW STORAGE SYSTEM FOR HIGH-SPEED COMPUTERS

(6) Professor Arthur L. Samuel of the Department of Electrical Engineering has developed ideas for a new system which will permit the electrostatic storage of a large amount of information for use in connection with high-speed digital computers. The electrostatic storage field is developing so rapidly that in the judgment of the University Research Board steps should be taken promptly by the University to secure patents on Professor Samuel's work. I recommend that the Board authorize the filing of a patent application or applications if multiple applications are necessary.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this recommendation was approved and adopted.

PURCHASE OF EQUIPMENT FOR BETATRON

(7) The Board of Trustees requested at its meeting on November 29, 1947, that further negotiations be conducted with the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, for the following equipment for the Betatron:
(1) backwound "A" coil, (2) core blocking, and (3) transformer bank.

These negotiations have been completed, and the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company has agreed to furnish the equipment under the following conditions:

I. The contract price shall be \$35,000, with the provision that if actual costs (as determined by their usual accounting methods) are less than this amount the cost to the University will be reduced.

2. Monthly statements of cost incurred will be submitted by the Company and

the University will pay such costs.

3. The University will have the right, for its convenience, to terminate the contract at any date. Upon such termination, the University will pay all costs plus 10% of such costs for profit to the Company and will acquire title to the equipment.

Professor Kerst, who is in charge of construction and of the research program for which the Betatron is being built, Professor F. W. Loomis, the Director of Purchases, and the Comptroller recommend that a contract as described be executed with the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company. Funds are available in the special State appropriation for Betatron development and equipment.

I concur and request authority for the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, the execution of this contract was authorized as recommended.

POLICY AND RULES RELATING TO COMPENSATION AND WORKING CONDITIONS OF NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES

Mr. McLaughlin presented a recommendation of the Committee on Civil Service and Employees on the definition of work week.

The Board of Trustees on May 24, 1943 (Minutes, page 366), voted to amend the wages policy to provide that "... in those University operations in which continuous seven-day work is essential because of the character of the services furnished, the work week will be set so that Sunday becomes a part of the regular work week; however, the work of the Groundsmen and the Janitors is not considered as work in which seven-day work is essential and in these groups the work week will start on Monday, and time and one-half will be paid for overtime and

Stundays, and double time for holidays."

This is inconsistent with Section IV, Paragraph 3, of the "Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees," adopted by the Board in 1945, which provides that "in those positions in which continuous seven-day service is required Saturdays and Sundays (Section V) shall not be recognized as such but as though they were regular work days.'

The Director of Nonacademic Personnel has recommended, the President of

the University concurring, that the action of May 24, 1943, be rescinded.

The Committee recommends that the Board rescind its action of May 24,

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the action of May 24, 1943, quoted above, was rescinded as recommended.

EXPENSE OF OPERATING PRESIDENT'S HOUSE

At this point, Dr. Meyer requested that the Board consider an adjustment of the expense of operating the President's House.

President Livingston appointed the following special committee to consider this matter and report to the Board: Dr. Meyer, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, and Mr. Williamson.

LUNCHEON IN HONOR OF MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FROM THE TWENTY-FOURTH DISTRICT

At this point, the Board recessed. Senator Everett R. Peters, and Representatives Charles W. Clabaugh, Ora D. Dillavou, and Charles R. Simpson, of the Twenty-fourth District, were the guests of the Board at a testimonial luncheon given in recognition of their loyal and effective support of the University in the General Assembly.

OPEN SESSION

The Board considered in open session the following reports of committees.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GENERAL POLICY ON VOLUNTARY PAYMENT OF TAXES

Mr. Davis presented the following report.

The Board of Trustees has directed its Committee on General Policy to consider the question whether the University of Illinois should or should not voluntarily pay taxes on certain properties belonging to the University which are not used for educational purposes. In its study of this question, the Committee has also given careful consideration to requests from local governments that the University contribute to the costs of operating municipal services and of public improvements because of the increased demands upon these services.

The Committee is sympathetic with the needs of local governments for increased operating revenues and recognizes the effect of the tax exemption status of the University on their budgets. However, the ultimate decision which the Board of Trustees must make will involve the question of the University's legal right, regardless of what the Board may wish to do as a matter of public policy.

In view of previous court decisions in cases which have a direct bearing on this question, the Committee has grave doubts about the *legal* right of the University to pay from State appropriations, or other public funds, taxes assessed by local governments, or to make contributions from public funds to local governments for the operation of municipal services.

In a matter of such far reaching importance as that of the tax status of the University, this Committee recommends that the opinion and assistance of qualified counsel, independent of the University, be obtained on the various questions

involved.

To this end the Committee recommends the employment of the firm of Chapman and Cutler to render such an opinion, to advise with respect to the trial of any lawsuits which involve any of such questions, and if found necessary, to participate therein until final decisions have been obtained.

APPOINTMENT OF UNIVERSITY AUDITORS

Mr. Williamson presented the following report.

The Finance Committee recommends that the firm of George Rossetter and Co., Certified Public Accountants of Chicago, be engaged as auditors for the year ended June 30, 1948, in place of Arthur Young and Co., who handled the audit for the past five years, such services to be charged on the basis of per diem rates and expenses with the understanding that the aggregate charge will not exceed the following sums:

These maximum costs are based on the assumption that, if the audit discloses extraordinary needs beyond the scope of the usual examination, further compensation for such additional work will be allowed after review and approval by the Finance Committee.

CANCELLATION OF SABBATICAL LEAVES OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSORS F. W. TANNER AND OSWALD TIPPO

(2) Professor F. W. Tanner, Head of the Department of Bacteriology, and Associate Professor Oswald Tippo of the Department of Botany were given sabbatical

leaves of absence for the second semester of 1947-1948.

Because the Department of Bacteriology has been unable to fill the position of Associate Professor on its staff, Professor Tanner has asked that his leave be postponed until 1948-1949.

Professor Tippo is serving as Acting Head of the Department of Botany and

because of this service he has been asked to defer his leave.

I recommend that the leaves granted be cancelled without prejudice as to future leaves.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these leaves were cancelled as recommended.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE CITIZENS COMMITTEE AND TO ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE COLLEGE OF VETERINARY MEDICINE

SERVICES OF PROFESSOR H. K. ALLEN AS RESEARCH DIRECTOR FOR THE STATE REVENUE LAWS COMMISSION

(4) The State Revenue Laws Commission, by its Chairman, Senator Merritt J. Little, has requested the services as Research Director for the Commission of Professor H. K. Allen of the Department of Economics and Director of the Bureau of Economic and Business Research. The plan proposed would require Professor Allen's services on a part-time basis from February I to September I, 1948, and full time from September I, 1948, to February I, 1949. He would continue his services as Professor of Economics throughout the academic year 1947-1948.

I recommend approval of Professor Allen's services as Research Director for the State Revenue Laws Commission and that the President of the University be authorized to make such changes in Professor Allen's University status as are necessary to accomplish this.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this recommendation was adopted.

SERVICES OF DEAN H. P. RUSK TO COMMISSION ON ORGANIZATION OF THE EXECUTIVE BRANCH OF THE GOVERNMENT

(5) Dean H. P. Rusk of the College of Agriculture has been requested by Mr. Herbert Hoover, Chairman of the Commission on Organization of the Executive Branch of the Government recently created by an Act of Congress, to serve on the Commission's Agriculture Committee. The farmers of Illinois, the College of Agriculture, the Agricultural Experiment Station, and the Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics staffs are vitally interested in the over-all policies to which the Dean's services would contribute.

After consultation with the President of the University, Dean Rusk was

authorized to accept the appointment.

This report was received for record.

DISCONTINUANCE OF INTERNSHIP REQUIREMENT FOR THE DOCTOR OF MEDICINE DEGREE

(6) From 1921 to 1941 the University required a fifth year, or an internship, before granting the degree of Doctor of Medicine. In 1941 the Board of Trustees authorized waiving the internship requirement for the duration of the war, and the degree of Doctor of Medicine is now awarded instead of the Certificate in Medicine formerly given at the end of four years of study. The Executive Faculty of the College of Medicine has proposed that the requirement of the fifth year for the M.D. degree be permanently discontinued, that the degree be awarded at the end of the fourth year, and that the award of the Certificate in Medicine be discontinued. The Bachelor of Science degree will be awarded at the end of the second year as heretofore.

The chief reason for the change is that the control of students serving internships in hospitals not operated by the University is largely out of the hands of the College of Medicine. At least one year of internship is, of course, still required by medical examining boards for licensure and admission to licensing

examinations.

The University Senate recommends approval of this change and I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this change was authorized.

DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY IN PHYSICAL EDUCATION

(7) The graduate faculty in the School of Physical Education has proposed a graduate program leading to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Physical Education. This has been approved by the Executive Faculty of the Graduate College. The University Senate has recommended that the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Physical Education be authorized.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this degree was established as recommended.

UNIVERSITY CALENDAR, 1948-1949

(8) The University Senate has approved the calendar for the academic year 1948-1949 for the colleges and schools at Urbana-Champaign. The academic calendars for the Chicago and Galesburg Undergraduate Divisions have been approved by the University Committee on Calendar acting for the Senate. These are presented to the Board for information and record (Appendix, page 966).

This report was received for record.

CALLING OF MEN'S RESIDENCE HALL LOAN

(9) On June 23, 1947 (Minutes, page 403), the Board of Trustees authorized the calling of the men's residence hall loan as soon as practicable after the first call date, September 1, 1947.

A plan has now been concluded for calling this loan and replacing it by a new issue of revenue bonds as of March 1, 1948, in the amount of \$400,000.

In making such an offer, it is necessary that there be an approving opinion of independent counsel. The Legal Counsel and the Comptroller recommend that the firm of Chapman and Cutler, attorneys of Chicago, be engaged for all necessary services in connection with this bond issue.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this recommendation was adopted. In connection with this matter, a telegram from the Executive Council of the Men's Residence Halls Association was read to the Board. This telegram was referred to the President of the University for reply and report to the Board.

PLANS FOR STUDENT AND STAFF APARTMENT PROJECT AT URBANA

(10) The State appropriations made to the University for the biennium of 1947-1949 include \$400,000 for student and staff apartments at Urbana-Champaign. This project is to provide housing for married students, including graduate students who are also staff members. The \$400,000 may be augmented by an assignment from a general to proportion of \$600,000 for continuously.

capital appropriation of \$618,845 for contingencies.

The architectural firm of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill has completed plot plans, floor plans, and elevations for this project, to be erected at Green and Goodwin Streets. These plans have been approved by the Building Program Committee. Additional funds must be secured by borrowing, but whether the entire

project can be carried out now will depend upon the cost.

The Committee has recommended:

I. That the architects be authorized to complete detailed plans and specifications for the entire project.

2. That the sum of \$250,000 from the contingent item in the biennial capital

appropriation be tentatively earmarked for the project.
3. That when plans are completed, bids be taken in such form as to make possible the award of contracts for such part of the work as can be financed.

I recommend approval of these proposals.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the proposals of the Building Program Committee were approved.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(11) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following purposes:

These proposed improvements have been carefully studied by the Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures. Its reports giving details of the reasons for these improvements are submitted herewith.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these appropriations were made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken.

ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR EMERGENCY LIGHTING SYSTEM FOR McKINLEY HOSPITAL

(12) Electric power service to McKinley Hospital is supplied by the Abbott Power Plant through a load center which also serves the South Farm area. Part of the transmission from the load center is overhead and during storms a number of power failures have occurred at McKinley Hospital. Several years ago the

University installed transmission lines connecting with those of the Illinois Power Company, with an automatic cut-off, so that in the event of power failure from the University plant, power service will automatically come in from the Illinois Power Company. Unfortunately continuous service has not resulted. On at least three

occasions power service from both sources has failed simultaneously.

The Physical Plant Department, the Dean of Students, and the University Health Officer have recommended the installation of a battery operated emergency lighting system in McKinley Hospital. The proposal has been approved in principle by the Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures. It is necessary to prepare plans and specifications and secure bids before an appropriation can be recommended.

The Physical Plant Department requests authority to engage the firm of Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White to prepare plans and specifications at a cost of \$2,500. Funds are available in the Physical Plant budget for 1947-1948.

I recommend approval of this proposal.

This matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for consideration and report.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR THE SUPERVISION OF THE ASSEMBLY AND ERECTION OF THE BETATRON

(13) On May 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 368), the Board of Trustees approved a contract with the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company of Milwaukee for the preparation of the design and working drawings for the Betatron.

It will be necessary to secure experienced engineering assistance in actual construction of the Betatron on the site. Since the Allis-Chalmers Company has prepared the drawings and specifications, it will be advantageous if the engineering

assistance can be secured from this company.

Professor D. W. Kerst, in charge of construction and of the Betatron Research Program, Professor F. W. Loomis, Head of the Department of Physics, Dean M. L. Enger, Dean of the College of Engineering, and the Comptroller recommend that a contract be executed with the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company to provide engineering assistance under the following terms: Services of supervisory erection engineers will be provided at the rate of \$75 a day and services of assistant erection engineers will be provided at the rate of \$28 a day. The University will have the option of terminating the contract at any time by written notice to the Company. It is also recommended that the Company be given authority to purchase necessary miscellaneous materials and tools, and to hire labor, during the assembling, with the provision that all purchases of material or equipment of \$25 or over shall be approved in advance by the University and that the total of such purchases shall not exceed \$25,000. All purchases of \$1,000 or more will be submitted to the Board for approval in accordance with the usual procedure.

I concur in the above recommendation and request authority for the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute a contract in accordance with

these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these recommendations were adopted.

REPORT OF AUDIT OF UNIVERSITY ACCOUNTS

(14) The Secretary of the Board reports that he has received from Arthur Young and Company, auditors, the report of their examination of the accounts of the University for the year ended June 30, 1947. Copies of the report have been sent to President Stoddard and all the members of the Board of Trustees. The report includes a certification of the balance sheet, a statement of current income and expenditures and current funds surplus, and summaries of transactions of all departments.

This report was received for record.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR BUILDING LIGHTING IMPROVEMENTS

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant recommends an increase in the amount of \$2,500 in the contract with Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White for engineering services in designing lighting improvements. The present contract provides for such engineering service on the Architecture and the Physics Laboratory buildings (Minutes, October 30, 1947, page 922). The addition is for similar service on the Transportation Building.

The Comptroller concurs in this recommendation.

I recommend approval and authorization of the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute the addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this addition was authorized and authority given as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL WORK ON THE MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(16) The Director of the Physical Plant requests an addition of \$3,821.24 to the contract with the Square Deal Electric Company for electrical work on the Mechanical Engineering Building. The original contract was approved by the Board of Trustees on March 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 317). It has been found that the provision for corridor lighting as specified by the architects was below the present University standards. This addition covers revisions to bring lighting up to present standards.

Funds are available in the Special State Appropriation for this building.

The Comptroller recommends that the requested addition be made. I concur and request authorization of the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute this addition to the contract with the Square Deal Electric Company.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this addition was approved and authority given as recommended.

PURCHASES

(17) There are submitted herewith (Appendix, page 968): A. Recommendations for purchases for approval by the Board, and B. Purchase authorized by the President of the University.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the purchases recommended were authorized, and the action of the President of the University in authorizing an emergency purchase was approved and confirmed.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS

(18) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed, November 11 to December 10, 1947 (see Appendix, page 969).

This report was received for record.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(19) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association request approval of

the following special appropriations:

- (1) Olympic Fund Contribution. Colleges and universities in the United States have been called upon to make contributions to the United States Olympic fund, inasmuch as a large percentage of the Olympic contestants will come from American colleges and universities. The Board recommends a special appropria-
- tion of \$1,000 as the initial contribution to this fund.

 (2) Repair of Toilets in Memorial Stadium.— During the war years, three of the toilets in Memorial Stadium were rendered inoperative because of failure in the lead sheathing used in these areas. Both labor and material are now available for the correction of these difficulties. Because of the prospect of large attendance for home games next year and the consequent need for adequate rest room facilities, a special appropriation from the reserve from plant maintenance in the amount of \$9,500 is requested.

Funds are available for these expenditures and I recommend approval.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these appropriations were approved as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR DIES AND SERVICES FOR BETATRON PROJECT

(20) In the construction of the Betatron between 40,000 and 50,000 field magnet laminations are required. Steel required for this purpose has already been purchased. Specially constructed dies are necessary to complete the work.

The Director of Purchases and the Physics staff explored all possible sources for this work. Only one company could be located which would accept an order

for making the dies and processing the steel, the Verson Manufacturing Company,

Dallas, Texas. This firm has made the following proposal:

1. Manufacture of two special dies in accordance with drawings prepared by Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company, \$10,200, payable in semi-monthly payments on certified statements of progress of work. Final payment upon satisfactory completion of dies.

2. Cutting and punching, with the above dies, field magnet laminations from Trancor 52 steel supplied by the University, at 50 cents a lamination, estimated

total, \$25,000, payable as completed laminations are delivered.
3. Varnishing laminations as required by University, \$3.50 a labor hour, material at cost plus 10 per cent. Guaranteed maximum \$15,000 with right of

University to examine cost records.

The Director of Purchases and persons in charge of the Betatron consider this arrangement satisfactory, and recommend the placing of an order with Verson Manufacturing Company, with the foregoing conditions. The Comptroller requests

I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the placing of this order was authorized as recommended.

ADDITIONS TO CONTRACTS FOR MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(21) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend that

the following additions be made to the contracts indicated:

(1) An increase in the general contract with James McHugh Sons, Inc., in the amount of \$6,073. This increase will provide for the substitution of 3/16" asphalt tile in lieu of the 1/8" asphalt tile originally specified, and for the furnishing and installation of folding doors across Room 108. The change in the size of the tile is recommended in order to obtain a more satisfactory surface and reduce future maintenance and replacement costs, and the folding doors are requested in order to permit the subdivision of the room as needs arise. The original contract with James McHugh, Inc., was approved by the Board on March 27, 1947 (Minutes, page 317).

(2) An increase in the contract with the Square Deal Electric Company (original contract approved by the Board on March 27, 1947, Minutes, page 317) for electrical work in the amount of \$5,433.63, and an increase in the contract with Fugard, Burt & Wilkinson (original contract approved by the Board on November 23, 1945, Minutes, page 916) for architectural service in the amount of \$3,897.98. These increases provide for the costs of electrical changes and architectural services necessary due to the decision on the part of the Mechanical Engineering Department to change the foundry and forge shop to an internal

combustion engine shop.

Funds are available for the above increases.

I concur and request authority for the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute the additions to these contracts.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these additions were approved and authority was given as recommended.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

February 21, 1948



The February meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held at 10 a.m. on Saturday, February 21, 1948, at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session, as in committee of the whole.

2 p.m. — Open session.

When the Board convened, the following members were present: Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson. During the early part of the session, before the arrival of President Livingston, Dr. Meyer acted as Chairman.

President Stoddard was present; also Mr. A. J. Janata, Assistant to the President, Professor C. R. Griffith, Provost, Mr. H. E. Cunningham, Secretary, Professor Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, Professor W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel, and during the open session, Mr. J. F. Wright, Director of Public Information.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of January 8, 1948. On motion of Mr. Fornof, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 947 to 970 above.

ACTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, JANUARY 21, 1948

The Secretary reported for record that the Executive Committee, on January 21, 1948, had taken action on recommendations of the President of the University as follows:

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR RELOCATION OF HOUSE AT 607 EAST SPRINGFIELD AVENUE, CHAMPAIGN

(1) On November 25, 1947, the University opened bids for the moving of the house at 607 East Springfield Avenue, Champaign, but only one bid was received. This bid was submitted by Mr. V. Rhodes of Gibson City, in the amount of \$9,875. Since the Board on September 26, 1947 (Minutes, page 827), appropriated \$8,000 for this project, the bid was rejected. This project has been discussed with Mr. Rhodes and the scope of the project reduced by the elimination of certain interior lighting improvements, exterior walk replacements, and the use of the present heating system instead of extending the University's steam service to the building. All of the items eliminated are highly desirable but not absolutely necessary, although we may in the future connect this house with the existing utilities service if its use is continued over a period of time. The contractor is willing to undertake the revised project for \$7,875.

In view of the urgency to move the house from the site prior to starting construction for the State Water Survey Building, and also to provide temporary office space for the Electrical Engineering staff, the Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the acceptance of this proposal in the amount of \$7,875.

PURCHASE OF RESIDENCE PROPERTY FOR STAFF HOUSING

(1) The Board of Trustees has authorized the purchase of a number of residence properties in Urbana and Champaign for rental to administrative officers (Minutes, May 27 and June 23, 1947, pages 362, 388). Five houses have been purchased and the Executive Committee was authorized by the Board to purchase an additional house.

I recommend the purchase of the property at 302 West Vermont Street, Urbana (William Habberton, owner), at a price of \$18,000. This price was determined on the basis of negotiations with the owner and an appraisal made by the Champaign County Real Estate Board. An additional assignment of \$1,300 is recommended for needed improvements (\$1,200) and cost of acquisition

(\$100). Funds have already been appropriated for this purchase.

In order to secure personnel for important major positions and to hold present staff members in such positions, it will be necessary for the University to acquire additional residence properties of this type. This is as crucial in some cases as having funds to pay salaries to attract and to hold men of first rank. I therefore recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the purchase of six additional residence properties, and that an appropriation of \$100,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be made for this purpose.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY ON WEST ILLINOIS STREET, URBANA

(2) The property at 1205-1207 West Illinois Street, Urbana, is offered to the University for immediate purchase at a price of \$5,950. It is located in the block immediately east of the campus and across from the Men's University Club and other properties owned by the University on the opposite side of the street in the same block.

The property consists of a frontage of 93.5 feet on Illinois Street and a depth of 130 feet. The Physical Plant Department proposes to make immediate use of it for an additional parking area urgently needed in this location. The price is reasonable as compared to amounts paid for other properties. This purchase has been recommended by the Building Program Committee. The additional sum of \$6,000 is required to prepare it for parking purposes.

I concur in this recommendation and request authorization for the purchase and an appropriation of \$12,000 to conclude the purchase and make the necessary

improvements for parking.

COLLUSION IN BIDS ON UNIVERSITY CONSTRUCTION WORK

(3) The Comptroller, Legal Counsel, and Director of the Physical Plant Department have submitted to the President of the University a report of investigations they have made following up information they received from reliable sources which indicated irregularities in bids on certain University construction projects. The conclusions drawn by these officers from the information obtained indicates the possibility of collusive bidding.

The Legal Counsel was directed to present all the information and evidence secured by University officers to the Attorney General of Illinois.

This report was received for record.

ADMISSION OF STUDENTS FROM THE CANAL ZONE

(4) Superintendent Vernon L. Nickell has received a letter from the Executive Secretary of The Panama Canal requesting that the University of Illinois admit students from the Canal Zone on the same basis as it admits residents of Illinois but charge the out-of-state tuition fee.

The policy of the University of Illinois governing the admission of new students permits the admission of non-residents of Illinois who rank in the upper twenty-five per cent of their high school graduating classes, or in the case of transfer students those who have an average of 4.0 in previous college work

in terms of the grading system of the University.

Under this plan applicants from the Canal Zone have the same opportunity for admission to the University of Illinois as students from any state in the Union or from foreign countries. The proposal from the Executive Secretary that applicants from the Canal Zone be admitted on the same basis as residents of Illinois would put them in a preferred class and give them priority over students from other states and territories of the United States. Since Mr. Nickell is unable to be present today, he has asked that this matter be brought to the attention of the Board for appropriate consideration.

I do not recommend giving preferential consideration or priority for admission to the University to non-residents of Illinois of any one state or

territory.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the Board concurred in the opinion of the President of the University.

ILLINI SCHOLARSHIPS, INC.

(5) Illini Scholarships, Inc., a non-profit educational aid corporation, organized by a group of University of Illinois alumni in Chicago, has established a fund to provide undergraduate scholarships at the University for young men and women from the Chicago area. The Scholarship Plan, including the procedure

and conditions governing the awards, is as follows:

1. Illini Scholarships, Inc., Chicago, Illinois, has established a fund to provide undergraduate scholarships at the University of Illinois for young men and women from the Chicago area, to be awarded in the manner and under the conditions stated below. The Chicago area is defined as the territory within a fifty-mile radius of Chicago. Each scholarship shall be awarded for a period of eight semesters and shall have a value of \$125 a semester. Illini Scholarships, Inc., agrees to keep on deposit with the Comptroller of the University at all times sufficient funds to cover all scholarships awarded. The Bursar of the University will pay the holders of these scholarships \$125 a semester on completion of each semester's registration in the University. Scholarship holders

will be certified to the Bursar by the Director of Admissions and Records.

2. These scholarships will be awarded to young men and women in the Chicago area. To be eligible for a scholarship the candidate (a) must meet in full the requirements for admission to the University of Illinois, (b) must have a superior record in scholarship and in some form of student activity in high school or preparatory school, and (c) must show need of financial aid in order

to attend the University.

3. Whenever a holder of a scholarship leaves the University before completing four academic years of work, his scholarship is forfeited, unless the University Committee rules otherwise. Furthermore, if the holder of the scholarship fails to maintain a satisfactory scholastic record in the University, the University Committee on Undergraduate Scholarships may refuse to renew the scholarship for the next academic year. All withdrawals of scholarship holders from the University and any cancellations of scholarships because of poor records in the University will be promptly communicated to the Scholarship Committee of Illini Scholarships, Inc. Any scholarship money unused because of withdrawal from the University or scholarship deficiency will revert to the fund on deposit with the Comptroller.

4. The Scholarship Committee of Illini Scholarships, Inc., agrees to rec-4. The Scholarship Committee of Illini Scholarships, Inc., agrees to recommend to the University not fewer than three candidates for each scholarship to be awarded. The final selection is to be made by the University Committee on Undergraduate Scholarships. If at any time no candidate recommended by Illini Scholarships, Inc., is acceptable to the University Committee on Undergraduate Scholarships, the University Committee may recommend to the Scholarship Committee of Illini Scholarships, Inc., a candidate or candidates from the University Committee's list of scholarship applicants and on mutual agreethe University Committee's list of scholarship applicants, and on mutual agreement of the two committees the scholarship may be awarded to the most acceptable candidate. In every case the award shall be made to a young man or young woman who is acceptable both to the Scholarship Committee of Illini Scholarships, Inc., and to the University Committee on Undergraduate Scholarships.

5. All parties agree that once a scholarship has been awarded it will be maintained without interruption as long as the recipient is a student in residence

at the University and is maintaining a satisfactory scholastic record.

6. The recipient of the scholarship shall receive in writing from the University Committee on Undergraduate Scholarships a statement of the terms and conditions of the scholarship as outlined in this Scholarship Plan.

The Plan has been approved by all University officials concerned. I recom-

mend that the offer of these scholarships be accepted and that the Bursar of the University be authorized to receive and disburse the funds given to the University by Illini Scholarships, Inc., for this purpose.

The number of these scholarships will vary from year to year so that the exact amount of funds to be turned over to the University can not be specified. in advance. Two of these scholarships were awarded, in accordance with the Plan, by Illini Scholarships, Inc., before the beginning of the academic year 1947-1948 and the organization paid the first semester installments directly to the scholarship holders. The University has received \$1,750 to cover the payments due on these scholarships for the remaining seven semesters.

I recommend approval of this plan and acceptance of the funds for these

scholarships.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this plan was approved and the acceptance of funds was authorized as recommended.

NORVAL H. PIERCE TRUST

(6) On March 5, 1929, Dr. Norval H. Pierce, who was for many years Professor of Surgery and of Otolaryngology in the University of Illinois College of Medicine, and a distinguished member of the medical profession, set up a trust, naming the Northern Trust Company of Chicago as Trustee, for the benefit of Mrs. Drusilla W. Pierce, his former wife. The primary purpose of the trust is to provide a life income for Mrs. Pierce. The trust provides that in the event Mrs. Pierce predeceased Doctor Pierce the principal of the trust would be deliverable to him, and he also reserved the power to dispose of the principal of the trust estate by will or by deed. In default of such disposal, the trust instrument provides for a distribution of the trust estate, following the death of Mrs. Pierce, of four-ninths to the University of Illinois, three-ninths to St. Luke's Hospital in Chicago, one-ninth to the American Otological Society, Incorporated, and one-ninth to the Chicago League for the Hard of Hearing, Incorporated. The provision naming the University of Illinois as a beneficiary

is as follows:

"(1) Four-ninths (4/9) thereof to University of Illinois, for the use of Medicine and genits College of Medicine, for research, in such branches of Medicine and generally in such manner as the settlor may in his lifetime, at any time and from time to time, designate in writing, and in default of such designation, for such research as the trustees or other proper officers of the University of Illinois may in their discretion deem best;"

No such designation was made by Doctor Pierce. On June 20, 1931, he executed his will which named Johns Hopkins University as residuary legatee.

Doctor Pierce died in October, 1946. Mrs. Pierce is still living, in Chicago. Counsel for Johns Hopkins University has contended that the residuary clause in the will constitutes an exercise of Doctor Pierce's power of disposal of the principal of the trust estate, and that therefore the University of Illinois and the other beneficiaries designated in the trust have no rights therein. The controversy involves such questions of law and fact as this contention of counsel for Johns Hopkins University, and whether Doctor Pierce was domiciled in the State of Illinois at the time he executed the trust agreement and consequently whether the law of California or the law of Illinois shall apply. California has a statute which declares that a general residuary clause not referring to such a power of disposal, nor to the property covered thereby, will constitute exercise of power. The law of Illinois is the reverse, namely, that a general residuary clause does not of itself constitute an exercise of the power of disposal.

The University's Legal Counsel has participated in numerous conferences

The University's Legal Counsel has participated in numerous conferences with counsel for the other parties at interest in the trust and under the will. In the early conferences, representatives of Johns Hopkins University took the position that their client was entitled to the entire trust estate. Counsel for the other parties took the contrary position. Litigation would be necessary to resolve the issues. In later conferences various degrees of compromise were considered. Representatives of the beneficiaries under the trust have asked representatives of Johns Hopkins University if the latter would be interested in a settlement whereby \$25,000 of the trust estate would be given to Johns Hopkins University in consideration of a commitment not to litigate the issues in the courts of California and Illinois. Counsel for Johns Hopkins University has indicated that if such offer were made it would be accepted.

Legal Counsel recommends that the University of Illinois join with the other four beneficiaries under the trust in making this offer. The present appraised

value of the trust estate is \$210,000.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this offer was approved, and the officers of the Board were authorized to execute the necessary contract.

APPLICATION OF CITY ORDINANCES TO THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

(7) On December 3, 1947, the City of Chicago instituted proceedings against the University of Illinois in the Municipal Court of Chicago, No. 237079. This case involves the question whether or not the City of Chicago may legally assess a license fee, fixed by City Ordinance, for the maintenance of a storage tank for fuel oil at the Chicago Undergraduate Division on Navy Pier. In other words, it raises the issue of the right of a municipality to license a State agency.

Conferences with city officials thus far have failed to resolve the issue, but other conferences are contemplated. The case is set for trial for March 11, 1948.

In the opinion of the Legal Counsel, the University of Illinois should not yield to local municipal licensing ordinances and he recommends that if the case can not be resolved in any other way the issue be litigated.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the Legal Counsel was instructed to try to secure an adjustment of this matter, and if this failed, to resort to litigation.

EMPLOYMENT OF SPECIAL COUNSEL IN ANTI-VIVISECTION LITIGATION

(8) The medical schools and other institutions in Chicago have had difficulty in securing animals, particularly dogs, for teaching and research because of the activities of anti-vivisection societies. To protect the interests of the educational institutions a local organization, the Chicago Scientific Association, and a national organization, the National Society for Medical Research, were formed. All of the medical schools in Chicago, the University of Illinois included, are members of this group.

Last summer, in the case of Harz v. City of Chicago, et al., Superior Court of Cook County No. 47S8943, an injunction was sought to prevent the city pound from providing dogs for teaching and research. The University of Chicago and Northwestern University were named in this action, but the Chicago Scientific Association and its member schools and agencies entered the case, having been granted leave by the Court to intervene as parties defendant. The law firm of Tenney, Sherman, Rogers, and Guthrie was retained to represent the Association and other intervenors.

On the argument in the Superior Court, the suit was dismissed. The fee charged the intervenors was \$300, of which the share of the University of Illinois was \$142.56. The University of Chicago, represented by the same firm,

was charged a fee of \$900.

The case is now on appeal in the Appellate Court, First District, No. 44349. Legal Counsel recommends that the firm of Tenney, Sherman, Rogers, and Guthrie be retained to represent the University of Illinois as one of the intervenors in the Appellate Court and until this litigation has been concluded. I concur and recommend further that the Board authorize the payment of the fee of \$142.56 for legal services in the trial court.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the retainer of counsel and the payment of this fee were authorized.

C.P.A. LITIGATION

(9) Legal proceedings have been instituted in the case of Chatkin and Tondrow v. The University of Illinois and Frank G. Thompson, Director of the State Department of Registration and Education, in the Circuit Court of Cook County, No. 48C327, attacking the constitutionality of the Illinois Accountancy Act of 1943. Messrs. Chatkin and Tondrow failed in the examinations for the C.P.A. certificate required by this law. A similar suit was started in 1945 but was subsequently dismissed on motion of the plaintiffs, without trial, after they had passed the examinations.

The Legal Counsel is defending the present suit. In his opinion it is almost

certain to go to trial and probably will go to the Supreme Court.

This report was received for record.

GREAT LAKES AREA CASE

(10) The University of Illinois was an intervenor in a petition filed with the Civil Aeronautics Board for authorization of commercial air transportation service from the University of Illinois Airport to various points. A decision was handed down on September 3, 1947, giving Parks Air Transport, Incorporated, a conditional and temporary certificate to operate between St. Louis and Indianapolis via the University of Illinois Airport, and from Indianapolis to Moline, Bloomington, and Galesburg via the University of Illinois Airport. Application for certificate authorizing service between Chicago and St. Louis via the University of Illinois Airport was denied. On a petition for reconsideration, in which the University of Illinois joined, the Civil Aeronautics Board has given Parks Air Transport, Incorporated, authority to operate air transportation service between St. Louis and Chicago via the University of Illinois Airport and that the flights between Champaign-Urbana and Chicago shall be non-stop.

This report was received for record.

At this point, President Livingston took his place with the Board.

APPLICATION FOR ADDITIONAL PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION TO THE NAVY PIER

(11) An application was filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission to order the Chicago Surface Lines and Chicago Motor Coach Company to provide additional service to the Navy Pier. This case was later transferred to the Chicago Transit Authority, but retained by the Commission as far as the Chicago Motor Coach Company is concerned. Such additional service was promptly established by order of the Commission following an agreement with the Chicago Surface Lines. Several hearings have been held. The Dean of the Chicago Undergraduate Division reports that service has been substantially increased and is as good as can be expected.

This report was received for record.

APPLICATION FOR ADDITIONAL MOTOR COACH SERVICE FOR CHAMPAIGN-URBANA

(12) A temporary order was issued by the Illinois Commerce Commission on December 10, 1946, establishing the "Stadium Route" to provide bus service for the students and staff living in the area of the Stadium. A year later a third interlocutory order was continued to July 1, 1948. The next hearing is set for June 15, 1948.

This report was received for record.

EVICTION CASES

(13) The Legal Counsel reports that twenty eviction suits were filed against fifty-four (54) adults and thirty-three (33) children during November and

December, 1947, who are occupants of nine three-flat buildings acquired by the University in Chicago during the years 1943-1946 and located at 825, 827, 829, 831, 837, 839, 907, 917, and 919 South Wood Street and a stone building located at 1923 West Polk Street. Judgments of eviction have been obtained in these cases. Writs of Restitution have been stayed until April 21, 1948. In a few cases by stipulation a Writ of Restitution will be available prior to April 21, 1948.

By action of the Board of Trustees on October 30, 1947, Mr. Joseph Lowitz of Chicago was retained for the purpose of having charge of this litigation.

This report was received for record.

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SALARY ADJUSTMENTS IN THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(14) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association requests approval of the following salary adjustments approved at their meeting on December 29, 1947. These adjustments are to be effective March 1, 1948, for the year 1948-1949. Unless otherwise indicated, salaries are paid in part by the University. In all cases the total increases in salary will come entirely from Athletic Association funds. Proposed Proposed Procent

APPROPRIATION FOR MEDICAL BETATRON

(15) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures has recommended an appropriation of \$110,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, from the General Reserve Fund for the purchase of a medical betatron in the Chicago Professional Colleges. This betatron will be used for research in the medical sciences.

Applications for grants of funds for this purpose have been made to the United States Department of Public Health and to the Atomic Energy Commission but with no favorable results. Attempts have been made to secure a part of the funds from the Damon Runyon Memorial Fund. If any grants of funds for this purpose are forthcoming, the amount to be expended on this project from University funds would be reduced accordingly.

It is desirable to have assurance of funds for this project so that an order can be placed for a betatron immediately. The Allis-Chalmers Company has five betatrons in production scheduled for completion in the summer of 1948. One of these can be secured by the University of Illinois if the order is placed immediately. Otherwise there will be an indeterminate delay in securing this equipment.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this purchase was authorized, and the funds were made available, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell.

CASE OF WALTER R. REEVE

At this point, President Livingston presented a letter from Mr. H. F. Simonson, attorney, in the case of Mr. Walter R. Reeve, Aircraft Maintenance Employee, provisionally employed at the Airport, who had been notified on January 31, 1948, at the end of his probationary period, that his services would not be required after that date.

The Legal Counsel commented on this matter and read from the file of correspondence pertaining to it. After discussion, the Legal Counsel was requested to draft a resolution reciting the circumstances and referring the matter to the Director of Nonacademic Personnel (see page 1003).

EXPENSE OF OPERATING PRESIDENT'S HOUSE

At this point, Dr. Meyer, for the special committee to consider an adjustment of the expense of operating the President's House, reported as follows:

The special committee on expenses of operating the President's House recommends an appropriation of \$5,000 a year additional to the Physical Plant Department for services and expenses at the President's House. This appropriation is to cover all necessary services at the House in addition to those covered by present appropriations, and all other expenses of official entertainment at the House and necessary house supplies for this purpose.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this report was adopted and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell.

OPEN SESSION

The Board, in open session, considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

SERVICES OF PRESIDENT STODDARD TO COMMISSION ON ORGANIZATION OF THE EXECUTIVE BRANCH OF THE GOVERNMENT

(1) The President of the University has been requested by Mr. Herbert Hoover, Chairman of the Commission on Organization of the Executive Branch of the Government, recently created by an Act of Congress, to serve on the Commission's Policy Committee.

This is being reported to the Board of Trustees as a matter of record.

This report was received for record.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PROFESSOR WARREN H. COLE

(2) The Provost, acting for the President, has approved a recommendation from the Dean of the College of Medicine that Dr. Warren H. Cole, Professor and Head of the Department of Surgery, be granted a leave of absence on full pay for approximately ninety days beginning February 7, 1948. This leave is for service as Senior Scientific Attaché under the auspices of the United States Department of State on a commission to Great Britain to establish working relations with scientific bodies in Great Britain for the exchange of essential scientific information, and to provide for media for the permanent exchange of information. Professor Cole's University work will be taken over by his colleagues without additional expense to the University.

Confirmation of this action is requested.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the action of the Provost in granting this leave was approved and confirmed.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(3) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded the following who have made applications therefor under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943 and who have presented evidence to the Committee that they hold unrevoked C.P.A. certificates issued by other states on the basis of having passed a written examination, and that they satisfy the other conditions set forth in Section 5 under the Act:

On motion of Mrs. Holt, the award of these certificates was authorized as recommended.

CURRICULUM PREPARATORY TO TEACHING DEAF AND HARD OF HEARING CHILDREN

(4) The University Senate recommends authorization of the following curriculum (see Appendix, page 1027) preparatory to teaching deaf and hard of hearing children leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Science and Master of Science in the Education of the Deaf. I concur.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this curriculum was approved as recommended.

CURRICULUM PREPARATORY TO TEACHING MENTALLY HANDICAPPED CHILDREN

(5) The University Senate recommends authorization of the following curriculum (see Appendix, page 1029) preparatory to teaching mentally handicapped children leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Science and Master of Science in the Education of Mentally Handicapped Children. I concur.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this curriculum was approved as recommended.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR SENIORS CALLED INTO THE SERVICE OF THE ARMED FORCES

(6) On June 19, 1943 (Minutes, page 388), the Board of Trustees authorized special provisions, recommended by the University Senate, for the granting of credit and permitting the graduation of seniors in good standing who withdrew for military service before the completion of their University work.

This was a war-time measure and is still in operation, but the emergency under which these provisions were adopted no longer exists. The University Senate recommends that they be rescinded as of February 1, 1948.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these provisions were rescinded as recommended.

POLICY AND PROCEDURE GOVERNING ADMISSION TO RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS IN CHICAGO

(7) On May 27, 1947, the Board adopted the following general policy with

respect to charges for services in the Research and Educational Hospitals:
"That patients admitted to the Research and Educational Hospitals may be required to pay an established per diem cost of hospital care and other services, excepting doctors' services, or such proportions thereof as may be properly charged according to a liberal interpretation of their ability to pay, such ability to include coverage of hospital prepayment insurance, similar plans, or other resources; provided, however, that no restriction be placed on the admission of patients without charge when such admission is otherwise indicated."

In line with that general statement studies have been carried out to determine an appropriate schedule of charges and suitable procedures for their administration. The Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges, on recommendation of the Hospital Administrator, the Executive Committee, and the Dean of the College of Medicine, has submitted with his endorsement a statement of policy and procedure governing admission of patients with a complete schedule of proposed charges (see Appendix, page 1031).

These proposals have been reviewed by the Provost and the Comptroller who

also recommend their approval.

I recommend adoption of this statement and schedule of charges, effective March 1, 1948, and replacing all procedures and charges previously approved.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, these recommendations were approved and adopted.

MASTER OF ARTS DEGREE IN LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

(8) The University Senate recommends authorization of a curriculum to be set up as follows leading to the degree of Master of Arts in Labor and Industrial Relations:

A. A candidate must meet the general requirements for admission to the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations which include 21 hours in the social sciences including one semester course in statistics and 9 hours in Economics, of which at least one semester course is to be in labor problems.

B. Eight units of graduate work will be required for the master's degree and will include:

I. One (or two) units in a professional seminar.

2. Two units in a thesis.

3. Five (or four) units in the fields of Human Relations in Industry, Labor Economics, Labor Union Organization and Administration, Personnel Management.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this curriculum was approved as recommended.

FOREIGN PATENTS ON DISCOVERIES RESULTING FROM RESEARCH WORK FOR UNITED STATES NAVY

(9) The University of Illinois has a basic contract with the Office of Naval Research of the United States Navy covering research work on Navy problems

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which is being done in several departments. Under this contract the University has prior rights to patents on all discoveries; if the University does not choose to apply for a patent then under the contract it must release the discovery to the Navy.

The University has been informed by the Office of Naval Research that in future contracts the Navy desires to include the following provisions relating to foreign patent rights and publication of invention disclosures (the Contractor referred to below is the University):

"Section G — The Contractor agrees, in addition to the terms and condi-

tions set forth in the section of the contract entitled 'Patent Rights,' (i) to grant to the Government, upon request, title to the foreign rights in each Subject Invention, (ii) not to publish or cause to be published a disclosure of such invention until permission shall have first been obtained from the Contracting Officer or his designee, and (iii) to deliver to the Contracting Officer or his designee, duly executed, such instrument of assignment, application papers and rightful oaths, prepared by the Government, as the Contracting Officer or his designee deems necessary to vest in the Government the sole and exclusive ownership in patent applications and any patents that may issue thereon and the right to apply for and prosecute such patent applications, but limited to countries

other than the United States of America, covering each Subject Invention."
Section 20 of Contract Néori includes the following definition: ". . The expression 'Subject Invention' means each invention, improvement and discovery (whether or not patentable) conceived or first actually reduced to practice in the performance of this contract. . ."

It is the opinion of the University Research Board that the possibility of foreign eatent rights being useful to the University is as a remote that it should

foreign patent rights being useful to the University is so remote that it should waive its claim to such rights. The Legal Counsel of the University concurs in this opinion. However, the Research Board takes exception to the stipulation (ii) on the basis that this provision controls the right of free publication which the University has always retained in such contracts. The Bursar explored this matter with the Office of Naval Research and found that they would be willing to delete Section G (ii) at our request.

The changes being proposed will not affect the University's rights to

domestic patents.

I recommend that (I) the Board of Trustees authorize execution of research contracts with the United States Government Office of Naval Research containing provisions which vest in the United States Government rights to foreign patents resulting from contract work; (2) the Board of Trustees authorize the policy that the University reserves all control of scientific publication.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these recommendations were adopted.

GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS AND FELLOWSHIPS FOR 1948-1949

(10) On recommendation of the Dean of the Graduate College, I recommend that an appropriation of \$145,000 be made for graduate scholarships and fellowships for 1948-1949. Of this amount, \$125,000 is to be appropriated from operating funds for 1948-1949 and \$20,000 is recommended as a reappropriation from unexpended scholarship funds made available for 1947-1948.

I further recommend authorization of the following schedule of stipends:

First year\$		700

The last category of special fellowships is to provide awards to exceptional students in the Graduate College to enable them to complete special programs of study recommended by the major departments concerned. These fellowships shall be of two types:

I. The resident post-doctoral fellowship now awarded to permit a graduate student who in the course of completing work for the Ph.D. degree has initiated a very significant research program which he could finish in another year of work if he were free to continue it.

2. The nonresident fellowship to be awarded to a graduate student for the purpose of enabling him to make direct observations or to do archival work away from the University in accordance with a plan recommended by his department. The maximum for one year is \$2,400. Some fellowships may be awarded with smaller stipends, the amount depending on the character of the project. No supplementary item for travel or other expense would be allowed under this plan.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, these recommendations were adopted. and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. Mc-Kelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell.

MASTER PLAN FOR COMMUNITY AND UNIVERSITY DEVELOPMENT AT URBANA-CHAMPAIGN

(11) About a year ago there was organized in Champaign-Urbana a "Community Housing and Development Council," to give impetus to intelligent planning for the civic growth and development of Champaign-Urbana and of the University of Illinois. In fact, the University is largely responsible for the organization of this Council, which includes representatives of the University and of both cities. Its work has been significant in promoting the development of additional residential housing, but it has been chiefly concerned with a long-

range plan for over-all development.

The Council has requested the University to share in the cost of preparing a master plan for the community. Satisfactory development of the University depends to a large degree on the sound development of the community of Champaign-Urbana. Among advantages to the University which would result

from the development and application of a master plan are:

1. Better housing and civic improvement which would aid in securing staff

and in providing living quarters for both students and staff.

2. A reduction in the amount of staff housing the University will need to provide.

3. Improvement of traffic conditions; additional utilities and other municipal services.

4. Proper coordination of University and community expansion.

The University has a crucial interest in the kind of development which takes place in the community as a whole. The University's expansion has been a major factor in community expansion. It would be necessary for the University to do a considerable part of the planning to be included in the proposed master plan, and the cost of this to the University would be at least as much as its

It is estimated that the master plan will cost \$50,000. The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures has considered the University's participation and states that it would be appropriate for the University to share in the cost to the extent of \$20,000. Such a contribution should be contingent upon the community's raising the remainder necessary to carry out the plan. It is agreed that the experts selected to make the study would be acceptable to the University.

This matter has already been discussed with the Committee on Buildings

and Grounds which met at the University on January 17.

I recommend an appropriation of \$20,000 for this purpose to be disbursed on authorization of the President of the University. It is anticipated that a joint administrative group on which the University will be represented will be set up to administer the expenditure of these funds.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR ERECTION OF STEEL FOR ABBOTT POWER PLANT ADDITION

(13) Bids have been received for the erection of steel for the Abbott Power Plant addition from the Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., in the amount of \$11,250 and from the American Boiler and Tank Company in the amount of \$11,388. Both firms have contracts for other phases of work on this project. As these are the only bids that Sargent and Lundy, engineers for the project, have been able to obtain, they recommend, the Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller concurring, that the contract for the erection of this miscellaneous steel work be awarded to the Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., on the basis of their proposal of \$11,250.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for enlargement of Power

Plant by constructing an addition thereto.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute an addition of \$11,250 to the present contract with Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., to provide for the erection of steel.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was awarded and authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT FOR THE **ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING**

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an addition to the contract with the John Felmley Company in the amount of \$1,362.44 covering the cost of changing asphalt tile in the Machine Laboratory in the new Electrical Engineering Building to a grease-proof type. The original contract with the John Felmley Company was approved by the Board on January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 229). This change is requested by the Electrical Engineering Department, as the oil to be used in the Machine Shop is detrimental to the ordinary type of asphalt tile. The extra cost of the grease-proof type of floor covering will soon be recovered through reduced maintenance costs. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the construction of a new Electrical Engineering Building for this addition.

Electrical Engineering Building for this addition.

I concur and request authorization of the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board to execute an addition of \$1,362.44 to the present contract with John Felmley Company to provide for changing the tile flooring.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this addition to contract was approved and authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO PLUMBING CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$2,180.77 in the contract with W. T. Mahoney and Sons, contractors for the plumbing work on the new Electrical Engineering Building. The original contract was approved by the Board on January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 229). This increase is to provide for additional gas, water, and compressed air outlets in certain ground floor rooms of the building, as requested by the Department of Electrical Engineering.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for the construction of a new

Electrical Engineering Building for this addition.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the addition to this contract.

On motion of Mr. Fornof, this addition to contract was approved and authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT WITH G. L. TARLTON CONTRACTING COMPANY FOR CONSTRUCTION OF WATER LINES

(16) The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend an increase in the contract of G. L. Tarlton Contracting Company, St. Louis, Missouri.

The contract provides for construction of pipe lines for fire protection facilities and Water Station improvements, for construction of a concrete reservoir, to be financed by a State appropriation for these projects, and for construction of storm sewers. The water main extensions for the fire protection facilities and Water Station improvements included only the extensions to the main grid system that were considered most urgent to strengthen the water distribution system in accordance with the National Board of Fire Underwriters Report of 1940, and to furnish a main source of supply from which laterals could be extended for only those building projects to be completed from 1947-1949 funds. Funds were not available in the State appropriation to provide for all the improvements recommended by the N.B.F.U. and by our consulting engineers, Alvord, Burdick, and Howson.
Funds are now available in the Physical Plant renewals and replacements

budget for the following additional improvements:

Install tee on existing 4" water main on the south side of St. Mary's road and extend 6" main west and another main south for a total distance of 1050', \$2,700.

Install 6" tee on an existing main on Lincoln Avenue and extend a 6" main

from this point east approximately 1370', \$3,210.

It is recommended that this additional work be considered as an addition to the present contract, since the bid for the original work of G. L. Tarlton Contracting Company was substantially lower than other bids and they have demonstrated the contracting company was substantially lower than other bids and they have demonstrated the contracting contracting the contracting contracting the contracting contracting the contracting c strated that they have the equipment and personnel and are able to complete the work in a satisfactory manner.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to increase the contract with G. L. Tarlton Contracting Company in

the amount of \$5,010.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this addition to contract was approved and authority was given as recommended.

MEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS REFUNDING BOND ISSUE

(17) As authorized by the Board of Trustees on June 23, 1947 (Minutes, page 403), bids were received on February 10, 1948, on \$400,000 revenue bonds of the Men's Residence Halls. The lowest bid is offered by the Milwaukee Company, Chicago; First of Michigan Corporation, Detroit; Martin, Burns, and Corbett, Inc., Chicago; and Farwell, Chapman, and Co., Chicago, as a joint bid at an effective interest rate of 2.626% for all bonds. Bonds maturing September I, 1948, through March 1, 1953, will bear interest at 3% and bonds maturing from September 1, 1953, through March 1, 1960, will bear interest at 2½%. The entire issue is purchased at par plus a premium of \$100. The bidders have proposed that the bonds, principal and interest, be payable at the First National Bank of Chicago.

The Comptroller reports that the lowest bidders have met all requirements

and recommends that the award be made to them.

The new issue will result in a saving over the remaining life of the obligation estimated at \$30,007 on interest cost under that of the present loan.

In connection with this refinancing, the firm of Chapman and Cutler has prepared the following resolutions which should be adopted by the Board of Trustees:

I. Resolution authorizing the issuance of Men's Residence Halls revenue

bonds in the amount of \$400,000.

- 2. Resolution authorizing the President, Secretary, and Treasurer of the Board of Trustees to execute all instruments necessary for the termination of the trust.
- 3. Resolution designating two members of the Board of Trustees to act with the officers in executing the bonds as provided by statute.

I recommend adoption of these resolutions.

The Finance Committee has been asked to review the bids and report to the Board.

Mr. Williamson reported that the Finance Committee had reviewed these bids and resolutions and recommended adoption.

RESOLUTION NO. 1

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF MEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS
REVENUE BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$400,000

Resolution authorizing and providing for the termination of an existing trust between the University of Illinois Foundation, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and to reacquire the interest in the Men's Residence Halls, located at 1215 South Fourth Street in the City of Champaign, Illinois, conveyed to said Foundation pursuant to said existing trust, and authorizing the issue of \$400,000 Men's Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1948 for the purpose of defraying the cost of terminating said trust and reacquiring the interest in said property conveyed pursuant to said trust, prescribing all the details of said bonds, and providing for the collection, segregation and distribution of the revenues of said Residence Halls for the purpose of paying the cost of maintenance and operation of said buildings, and payment of the principal of and interest on said revenue bonds.

Whereas pursuant to "An Act to authorize the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to provide for the payment and termination of any trust created by and between the Board of Trustees and any person or corporation pursuant to any law involving any building used by said University for student social activities, or educational purposes, or for the acquiring or reacquiring of property or interest in property used by said University for student social activities or educational purposes and conveyed in connection with the creation of such trust by said Board of Trustees pursuant to any existing law, levy and collect service charges, rates or rentals for the use thereof, to complete the construction of or equip any such buildings, defining the duties of said Board with respect to the operation and maintenance and construction thereof, providing for and authorizing the issue of bonds to defray the cost thereof, payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation of any such building or buildings, and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 27, 1941, as amended, and other acts supplementary thereto, this Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is authorized to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of procuring funds to terminate any existing trust involving any building now used by the University for student social activities or educational purposes, and to establish rates or charges for the use of said building, and pledge the revenue from such charges or rates for the payment of the revenue bonds so issued; and

Whereas this Board of Trustees has heretofore, pursuant to existing law, created a trust by and between said Board and the University of Illinois Founda-

tion, a non-profit corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Illinois, for the purpose of constructing the Men's Residence Halls, located at 1215 South Fourth Street in the City of Champaign, Illinois, and said property has been conveyed in trust to said Foundation, which said trust now exists, and the Board of Trustees has leased said building from said Foundation and it is now used by said University; and

Whereas it is deemed advisable and for the best interests of the University of Illinois that said trust be terminated and that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois reacquire the interest in said property so conveyed in trust; and

Whereas the University of Illinois Foundation has agreed with this Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to terminate said trust upon payment to it as trustee the sum \$526,931.78, representing the principal amount on the outstanding note and mortgage of the University of Illinois Foundation plus interest due March I, 1948, and the premium necessary to call and pay the same, all of which were issued for the purpose of constructing the said Men's Residence Halls in accordance with the terms of the trust hereinabove referred to, and which sum, together with funds now on hand for that purpose will be sufficient to pay all the obligations and liabilities of said Foundation for the purpose of terminating said trust; and

Whereas it will be necessary for the purpose of procuring part of said sum of \$526,931.78 that this Board of Trustees borrow money and issue revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$400,000, as authorized pursuant to the Acts, hereinabove referred to;

 $\it Now, therefore, Be$ It and It Is Hereby Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois as follows:

Section I. That it be and it is hereby determined by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that it is necessary and for the best interests of the University of Illinois that the existing trust entered into by and between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the University of Illinois Foundation, a non-profit corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Illinois, and dated as of the First day of September, 1941, be terminated and that the interest in property conveyed by said trust, consisting of the Men's Residence Halls located at 1215 South Fourth Street in the City of Champaign, Illinois, which was the subject matter of said trust, be reacquired, and that bonds be issued for the purpose of procuring funds necessary for the termination of said trust and the reacquiring of the interest in said property conveyed by said trust, all in accordance with the provisions of the Acts referred to in the preambles of this resolution.

Section 2. That said bonds shall be designated "Men's Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1948," be numbered 1 to 400, inclusive, be of the denomination of \$1,000 each, be dated March 1, 1948, bonds numbered 1 to 211, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of Three per cent (3%) per annum, and bonds numbered 212 to 400, inclusive, to bear interest at the rate of Two and One-Half per cent (2½%) per annum, interest payable September 1, 1948, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of March and September in each year, and to become due as follows:

provided, however, said bonds shall be redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to their maturity on any interest payment date at the option of said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois on or after March I, 1951, and up to and including September I, 1953, at par and accrued interest and a premium of two per cent of the principal amount thereof and a premium of one per cent of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on March I, 1954 or on any interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty days prior to the date of redemption, such publication to be made once in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and such notice of redemption shall, with substantial accuracy (a) designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be at the office of the Depositary hereinafter mentioned in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois; and (b) designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of such bonds; and (c) state that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of principal thereof and the accrued interest thereon to date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of all bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

Section 3. Any of said bonds may be registered as to principal at any time prior to maturity in the name of the holder on the books of registration of said University to be kept in the office of the Depositary hereinafter mentioned, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by the said Depositary as registrar. After such registration no transfer of such bonds shall be valid unless made on the said books by the registered owner in person or by his duly authorized attorney and similarly noted on such bonds. Upon presentation of any of such bonds registered as to principal, accompanied by a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the Depositary hereinafter mentioned, executed by the registered owner, or by a duly authorized attorney, such bond shall be transferred upon such books. The registered owner of any such bond registered as to principal shall also have the right to cause the same to be discharged from registration by transfer to bearer, in which case transferability by delivery shall be restored, and thereafter the principal of such bond when due shall be payable to the person presenting such bond. Any such bond registered as payable to bearer may be registered again in the name of the owner with the same effect as the first registration thereof. Successive registrations and transfers as aforesaid may be made from time to time as desired. Registration of any of such bonds shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons thereto attached, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely and payable to the bearer thereof.

Said bonds shall be signed by the President and two members of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, sealed with the corporate seal of said University, attested by the Secretary of said Board, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be authenticated by the facsimile signature of the Treasurer of the University of Illinois.

Section 4. That said bonds and coupons, and form for registration, shall be in substantially the following form:

per annum, payable September I, 1948, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of March and September in each year, until maturity hereof, in accordance with and upon presentation and surrender of the annexed interest coupons as they severally become due.

Both principal and interest of this bond are hereby made payable in lawful money of the United States of America at The First National Bank of Chicago,

in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois.

This bond and the Series of which it forms a part is issued under authority of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Illinois, entitled "An Act to authorize the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to provide for the payment and termination of any trust created by and between the Board of Trustees and any person or corporation pursuant to any law involving any building used by said University for student social activities or educational purposes, or for the acquiring or reacquiring of property or interest in property used by said University for student social activities or educational purposes and conveyed in connection with the creation of such trust by said Board of Trustees pursuant to any existing law, levy and collect service charges, rates or rentals for the use thereof, to complete the construction of or equip any such buildings, defining the duties of said Board with respect to operation and maintenance and construction thereof, and providing for and authorizing the issue of bonds to defray the cost thereof payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation of any such building or buildings and for the refunding of any such bonds," approved May 17, 1941, as amended, and all other Laws supplementary thereto, and a resolution duly adopted by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, for the purpose of defraying the cost of terminating an existing trust and reacquiring the interest in the Men's Residence Halls located at 1215 South Fourth Street, in the City of Champaign, Illinois, conveyed pursuant to said existing trust entered into between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the University of Illinois Foundation, a non-profit corporation duly organized under the Laws of the State of Illinois, and is payable solely from the net revenue to be derived from the operation of said building, and not otherwise, and this bond and the series of which it forms a part do not constitute an indebtedness of said University or of the State of Illinois within any constitutional or statutory limitation, and neither the taxing power nor the general credit of said University or the State of Illinois is pledged to the payment of this bond or the interest thereon.

Under said Acts of the Legislature of the State of Illinois and other Laws supplementary thereto and the said resolution adopted pursuant thereto, the net revenue derived from the operation of said building shall be deposited with The First National Bank of Chicago, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, under a Deposit Agreement entered into between the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the said Bank, and used only for the purpose of paying the fees and expenses of such Depositary, principal of and interest on the bonds of said University that are issued under authority of said Acts of the Legislature of the State of Illinois and the resolution of the Board of Trustees, hereinabove referred to, and which are payable by their terms only from the net revenue of said Men's Residence Halls located at 1215 South Fourth Street, in the City of Champaign, Illinois.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond by the Constitution and Statutes of the State of Illinois, and the applicable resolutions of said Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, have been done and have happened and have been performed in regular and due form and time as required by law and that provision has been made for depositing the net revenue derived from the operation of said building with the said The First National Bank of Chicago, to be applied in the manner as hereinabove set forth.

This bond is one of an authorized issue of \$400,000, all of like date and of the denomination of \$1,000 each, numbered from 1 to 400, inclusive, and said bonds are redeemable as a whole or in part in the inverse order in which they are numbered, prior to maturity, on any interest payment date on or after March 1, 1951, and up to and including September 1, 1953, at par and accrued interest and a premium of two per cent (2%) of the principal amount thereof, and a premium of one per cent (1%) of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on March I, 1954, or on any

interest payment date thereafter before maturity.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be published once not less than thirty days prior to date of redemption; such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, and when this bond or any of the bonds of such authorized issue shall have been called for redemption interest thereon shall cease from and after the specified redemption date.

This bond shall pass by delivery unless it is registered as to principal in the name of the holder on the books of registration of said University kept at the office of the Depositary hereinabove mentioned, such registration to be noted on the back hereof. After such registration no transfer hereof shall be valid unless made on such books by the registered holder in person or by attorney duly authorized in writing and similarly noted hereon, but this bond may be transferred in like manner to bearer, and thereupon transferability by delivery shall be restored and it may again from time to time be registered or transferred to bearer as before. Such registration, however, shall not restrict the negotiability of the coupons hereto appertaining, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely and payable to the bearer thereof.

This bond and all other bonds of this issue shall have all of the qualities of negotiable instruments, and during such time as this bond is payable to bearer, the same and each of the coupons hereto appertaining may be negotiated by delivery by any person having possession thereof, howsoever such possession may have been acquired, and any holder who shall have taken this bond while so payable to bearer or any of said coupons from any person for value and without notice shall thereby acquire absolute title to this bond or to such coupons as the case may be, free of any defenses enforceable against any prior holder and free from all equities and claims of ownership of any such prior holder, and the said University and any paying agent may deem and treat the bearer of this bond, or, if registered, the person in whose name it is registered and the bearer of any interest coupons appertaining hereto as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes.

Said University of Illinois hereby covenants with the holder of this bond that it will keep and perform all the covenants and agreements in the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees of said University of Illinois, authorizing the issue of this bond and the series of which it forms a part and as provided in the Deposit Agreement hereinabove referred to, and hereby irrevocably obligates itself to deposit the net revenue derived from the operation of said Men's Residence Halls with the said Depositary, to administer the said net revenue as provided for in and by said Deposit Agreement, and to establish from time to time charges and fees for the use of said buildings and to maintain and collect charges and fees sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of operating, maintaining, insuring and repairing of said buildings, and pay the principal of and interest upon all revenue bonds which by their terms are payable from such revenues until all of such bonds have been paid in full, both as to principal and interest.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, said University of Illinois, by its Board of Trustees, has caused this bond to be signed by the President of the Board of Trustees and two members thereof, its corporate seal to be hereto affixed, attested

Section 5. That upon the issuance of any revenue bonds herein provided for there be and there is hereby established a fiscal year for the operation of said Men's Residence Halls located at 1215 South Fourth Street, in the City of Champaign and said fiscal year shall commence the first day of July of each year and end the last day of the next succeeding June and all revenues derived from the operation thereof shall be set aside as collected and kept separate and apart from any other funds of said University, and said University covenants that all the revenues, income, receipts, profits, rates, rents, charges, fees and returns derived from the said Men's Residence Halls and the operation thereof, after setting aside therefrom the reasonable cost of operating, maintaining, insuring, and repairing said Men's Residence Halls, shall be paid over to the Depositary hereinafter mentioned semi-annually not later than the dates as hereinafter specified in the said deposit agreement prior to March I and September I of each year, and said evenues so paid over to the Depositary shall be used only in paying the fees and expenses of such Depositary, principal of and interest upon the revenue bonds of said University that are payable by their terms only from such revenues, and such

funds shall be used only for the purposes and in accordance with the Deposit Agreement hereinafter set out.

Section 6. That for the purpose of further securing the income and revenue to be derived from the operation of the said Men's Residence Halls and the application of the net revenue to the payment of the principal of and interest upon the said bonds hereby authorized, the net revenue derived from the operation of the said Men's Residence Halls shall be deposited with The First National Bank of Chicago, hereby designated as the Depositary for the said net revenue, and the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees and Treasurer of said University be and are hereby authorized and directed to execute for and on behalf of the University a Deposit Agreement with said bank as Depositary in substantially the following form, to wit:

THIS DEPOSIT AGREEMENT dated March I, 1948, between the University of Illinois, a public corporate body duly organized and existing under the laws of and located in the State of Illinois (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "University"), party of the first part, and The First National Bank of Chicago, a national banking association duly organized under the laws of the United States of America and having its office in the City of Chicago, in the State of Illinois (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Depositary"), party of the second part,

WITNESSETH:

Whereas the University, pursuant to a resolution of its Board of Trustees, entitled

"Resolution authorizing and providing for the termination of an existing trust between the University of Illinois Foundation, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and to reacquire the interest in the Men's Residence Halls located at 1215 South Fourth Street in the City of Champaign, Illinois, conveyed to said Foundation pursuant to said existing trust, and authorizing the issue of \$400,000 Men's Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1948 for the purpose of defraying the cost of terminating said trust and reacquiring the interest in said property conveyed pursuant to said trust, prescribing all the details of said bonds, and providing for the collection, segregation and distribution of the revenue of said residence halls for the purpose of paying the cost of maintenance and operation of said buildings, and payment of the principal of and interest on said revenue bonds."

Whereas the said bonds are payable both as to principal and interest solely from the net revenues to be derived from the operation of the said men's residence halls, the term "net revenues" as used herein meaning the gross revenues of the said building, less the reasonable cost of operating, insuring, maintaining and repairing the said men's residence halls; and

Whereas the University has, in and by the said resolution, covenanted and agreed, for the benefit of the holders from time to time of the said bonds and the interest coupons thereto appertaining, that the net revenues of the said men's residence halls will be from time to time deposited with the Depositary and used only for the payment of the fees and expenses of the Depositary, principal of and the interest on the said bonds; and

Whereas the University has, in and by the said resolution, further covenanted and agreed that it would execute and deliver a Deposit Agreement in the form and terms hereof:

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth and pursuant to the terms and provisions of the said resolution, the University and the Depositary have agreed and do hereby agree as follows for the equal and proportionate benefit and security of the holders of the said bonds of the University and the interest coupons thereto appertaining; that is to say:

Section I. The University covenants that proper books of record and account will be kept, in which full, true and correct entries will be made of all income, expenses and financial transactions of and in relation to the said men's residence halls, and that it will furnish to the Depositary, on or before September I, 1948, for that period from March I, 1948, to June 30, 1948, and on or before September I in each year thereafter so long as any bonds remain outstanding, a statement certified as correct by the Comptroller and Treasurer of the University, showing the gross operating revenues, the operating expenses and the net revenues of the said men's residence halls for the twelve months' period ended on the next preceding June 30th. The Depositary shall have no duty to request any such information nor any duty relative to the statements from time to time furnished by the University, except to preserve the same for the inspection of the holders of the bonds during usual business hours.

Section 2. The University has covenanted with the holders of the bonds hereinabove referred to that all of the revenues, income, receipts, profits, charges, fees, rents and returns derived from the said men's residence halls and the opera-

tion thereof shall be collected by the University and, after setting aside therefrom the reasonable cost of operating, maintaining, insuring and repairing the said men's residence halls, shall be paid over to the Depositary semi-annually not later than July 15, for the previous six months' period ending June 30th each year, and January 15, for the previous six months' period ending December 31st of each year, provided, however, there shall be deposited on August 15, 1948 the net revenues for the period from March 1, 1948 to June 30, 1948, which amount shall not be less than principal and interest requirements due on said bonds September 1, 1948, plus Depositary's fees, and the University hereby covenants and agrees so to do. All funds received by the Depositary under the terms of this agreement, after deducting fees and expenses of such Depositary, shall be held by the Depositary in a special trust account to be known as the sinking fund and shall be disbursed or applied by the Depositary as hereinafter provided.

At least five (5) days before each semi-annual interest payment date the Depositary shall, if the sinking fund moneys then on deposit are sufficient for that purpose, set aside an amount equal to the interest becoming due on the next ensuing interest payment date on all of the said bonds then outstanding, and such funds shall be and they are hereby appropriated irrevocably to the payment of such interest, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply the same to the payment of such interest on the next ensuing interest payment date upon surrender of the interest coupons becoming due on the

said interest date and appertaining to the outstanding bonds.

At least five (5) days before the express date of maturity of the bonds, the Depositary shall set aside from the moneys in the sinking fund, if such moneys then on deposit are sufficient for that purpose after making provision for payment of the interest becoming due on the outstanding bonds on such maturity date, an amount equal to the principal of the bonds then maturing, and such funds shall be and they are hereby appropriated irrevocably to the payment of the principal of the said maturing bonds, and the Depositary, as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply the same to the payment of the principal of the said bonds upon surrender of the said bonds.

If, upon the fortieth (40th) day before any interest payment date, the Depositary has cash in the sinking fund after setting aside an amount sufficient to pay interest becoming due on all outstanding bonds on the next two ensuing interest payment dates and to pay the principal and premium, if any, of any bonds theretofore called for redemption and not yet redeemed and the principal of all bonds becoming due on the next succeeding principal payment date, such cash shall be applied by the Depositary to the redemption on the next ensuing interest payment date of outstanding bonds, which by their terms are redeemable, in an amount sufficient to exhaust as nearly as may be such cash, after deducting there-

from and paying all costs and expenses of such redemption.

The said bonds are each in the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) and are numbered from 1 to 400, inclusive. All bonds redeemed through the operation of the sinking fund, together with the appertaining interest coupons, shall be canceled by the Depositary and delivered to the Treasurer of the University. The Depositary shall keep a record of the numbers of all bonds so redeemed.

Notice of redemption through the operation of the sinking fund shall be published by the Depositary, either in the name of the University or in the name of the Depositary, as the Depositary may determine, once not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption. Such publication to be made in one newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois. Such notice shall with substantial accuracy:

(a) Designate the date and place of redemption, such place to be the office of the Depositary, in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois;

(b) If the bonds to be redeemed are less than all of those outstanding, designate the numbers and the aggregate principal amount of such bonds; and

(c) State that on the designated date of redemption said bonds will be redeemed by payment of the principal thereof and the accrued interest thereon, plus the applicable redemption premium, and that from and after the designated redemption date interest in respect of the bonds so called for redemption will cease.

Upon publication of notice of redemption of any bonds through the operation of the sinking fund, the Depositary shall set aside from the moneys in the sinking fund an amount sufficient to pay and redeem the said bonds, and the Depositary,

as paying agent, is hereby authorized and directed to apply such funds to the payment and redemption of the said bonds on or after the specified redemption date upon surrender of the said bonds, together with all unmatured interest coupons thereto appertaining.

Section 3. The University has covenanted with the holders of the bonds. hereinabove referred to, that it will, so long as any of the said bonds shall remain outstanding and unpaid, keep in the office of the Depositary, in the City of Chicago and State of Illinois, books for the registration and transfer as to principal of bonds of the said issue, and the said Depositary is hereby appointed the agent of the University, with the title of Registrar, for the purpose of registering and transferring the said bonds as to principal only.

As to each bond registered, as to principal only, the person or entity in whose name the same is for the time being registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes, except for the purpose of receiving payment of the outstanding coupons, if any, appertaining thereto, and so long as the same shall be so registered payment of or on account of the principal thereof shall be made by the Depositary, as paying agent, only to the registered owner thereof. The bearer of any of the said bonds which shall not be registered as to principal and the bearer of any coupon appertaining to any such bond, whether or not such bond shall be registered as to principal, shall for all purposes be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner of such bond or coupon as the case may be for the purpose of receiving payment thereof and for all other purposes, and the Depositary, as paying agent, shall be fully protected in making payment of any such bond or coupon to the bearer thereof.

Section 4. The Depositary has executed this agreement and agrees to carry out the terms and provisions hereof on its part, but only upon and subject to the following express terms and conditions:

- (a) The Depositary shall not be responsible for any recitals herein or in the said bonds or for the validity of this agreement or of the said bonds, nor for the performance of any of the agreements herein contained on the part of the University.
- (b) The Depositary shall not be accountable for any of the proceeds of the bonds or of the revenues of the said men's residence halls nor for any other funds of the University, except such funds as may be deposited hereunder. The Depositary shall not be required to allow interest on any funds at any time deposited hereunder. The Depositary may become the owner of bonds of the said issue with the same rights which it would have if not Depositary.
- (c) The Depositary shall not be liable for any action taken or omitted to be taken by it in good faith and in the exercise of reasonable care and believed by it to be within the discretion or power conferred upon it by this agreement, nor shall the Depositary be responsible for the consequences of any error of judgment, and the Depositary shall not be answerable except for its own acts, neglect and default, nor for any loss unless the same shall happen through the negligence or want of good faith of the Depositary.
- (d) The Depositary shall be entitled to advice of counsel concerning all matters arising under this agreement and its duties hereunder, and may in all cases pay such reasonable compensation as it shall deem proper to such counsel and all such outlays and expenditures shall be repaid to the Depositary out of the sinking fund money.
- (e) The Depositary shall not be required to give any bond or surety in respect of the exercise of the duties and powers conferred hereby or otherwise in respect of the premises.
- (f) The Depositary shall have a first lien hereunder upon the sinking fund moneys for reasonable compensation, expenses, advances and counsel fees incurred in and about the exercise and performance of its powers and duties hereunder, and the cost and expense of defending against any liability in the premises of any character whatsoever. The compensation of the Depositary shall not be limited to or by any provision of law in regard to the compensation of a trustee of an express trust.
- (g) The Depositary at the time acting hereunder may at any time resign by giving not less than sixty (60) days' written notice to the University specifying the date when such resignation takes effect.

Section 5. The University covenants that in case the Depositary at the time acting hereunder shall resign or be dissolved or shall be in the course of dissolution or liquidation or otherwise become incapable of acting hereunder, the University will forthwith appoint a successor Depositary which shall be a trust company or bank in good standing located in the State of Illinois and having a capital and surplus of not less than Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000), if there be such a trust company or bank willing, qualified and able to accept the appointment upon reasonable or customary terms.

Every successor Depositary appointed hereunder shall execute, acknowledge and deliver to its predecessor and also to the University an instrument in writing accepting such appointment hereunder, and thereupon such successor Depositary, without any further act, deed or conveyance, shall become fully vested with all of the estates, rights, powers, duties and obligations of its predecessor, and every predecessor Depositary shall deliver all moneys and securities, together with a record of the amount and the numbers of the outstanding bonds, to its successor; provided, however, that before such delivery is required or made, all fees, advances and expenses of the retiring Depositary shall be paid in full.

Any corporation into which the Depositary or any successor to it may be merged or converted or with which it or any successor to it may be consolidated, or any corporation resulting from any merger, conversion or consolidation to which the Depositary or any successor to it shall be a party, shall be the successor Depositary under this agreement without the execution or filing of any paper on the part of either of the parties hereto.

Section 6. Nothing in this agreement expressed or implied is intended or shall be construed to confer upon any person, firm or corporation, other than the parties hereto and the holders of the said bonds and the coupons thereto appertaining, any right, remedy or claim, legal or equitable, under or by reason of this agreement or any covenant, condition or stipulation hereof.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, said University of Illinois, acting by and through its Board of Trustees, has caused this agreement to be signed in its name by the President of the Board of Trustees and the Treasurer thereof and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by the Secretary thereof, and said The First National Bank of Chicago has caused this agreement to be signed in its corporate name by one of its Vice Presidents and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by one of its Assistant Secretaries, all as of the day and year first above written.

Section 7. Said University hereby covenants that proper books of record and account will be kept, in which full, true and correct entries will be made of all income, expenses and financial transactions of and in relation to the said men's residence halls, and that it will furnish to the Depositary and to the original purchasers of said bonds on or before September I in each year so long as any bonds remain outstanding a statement certified as correct by the Comptroller and Treasurer of the University, showing the gross operating revenues, the operating expenses, and the net revenues of said men's residence halls for the twelve months period ending on the next preceding June 30.

Section 8. The University covenants that while any of the bonds authorized hereunder remain outstanding it will establish charges and fees for the use of said men's residence halls and all of its facilities adjusted so as to provide revenues at

all times sufficient to pay the reasonable cost of maintaining, operating, insuring and repairing the said men's residence halls, to pay the interest from time to time becoming due on the said bonds from time to time outstanding, and to provide for the payment of the principal of such bonds at maturity.

Section 9. It is hereby covenanted and agreed that while any revenue bonds issued hereunder are outstanding no additional revenue bonds shall be issued which, by their terms, are payable from the revenues of said men's residence halls, unless and until all revenue bonds issued pursuant to the terms of this resolution have been paid in full, both as to principal and interest, or until provision shall have been made for such payment in full.

Section 10. That the fees and charges heretofore established for the use of said men's residence halls and all of its facilities in accordance with the terms of the trust to be terminated with the proceeds derived from the sale of the bonds hereby authorized and the method of the collection thereof now in full force and effect, shall remain in full force and effect until revised or changed in accordance with the terms of the covenants of this resolution. Said fees and charges as collected are hereby pledged and shall be applied to the payment of the reasonable maintenance and operation costs of said men's residence halls and to the payment of the principal and interest of the bonds hereby authorized, all in accordance with the terms and covenants of this resolution.

Section 11. Said University of Illinois hereby covenants and agrees with the holder or holders of the bonds herein proposed to be issued, or any of them, that it will punctually perform all duties with reference to said men's residence halls required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Illinois, including the making and collecting of sufficient charges and fees for the use of said properties and all of the facilities thereof, and segregating the revenue thereof and the application of the income and revenue thereof, as provided by this resolution; and it hereby covenants and agrees not to sell, lease, loan, mortgage or in any manner dispose of said men's residence halls, including any and all extensions and improvements that may be made thereto, until all of the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall have been paid in full, both principal and interest, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment thereof in full, and the said University further covenants and agrees with the holders of said bonds to maintain in good condition and continuously operate said men's residence halls and maintain and keep in full force and effect at all times adequate insurance for the protection of said building, including multi-risk insurance, covering loss or damage to said properties and use and occupancy insurance covering loss of use of said properties. The cost of maintaining all insurance shall be deemed to be an operating charge and shall be paid only from revenues.

Any proceeds derived by said University from any multi-risk insurance shall be applied to the payment of the said University's reasonable and necessary costs in reconstruction, repair or rehabilitation of the said properties and any proceeds derived from any use and occupancy insurance shall be applied in the same manner and to the same effect as gross operating revenues.

Section 12. The provisions of this resolution shall constitute a contract between the University of Illinois and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and after issuance of the bonds no changes, additions, alterations or amendments of any kind shall be made to this resolution in any manner, until such time as all of said bonds issued hereunder, and interest thereon, shall be paid in full, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment of all bonds hereby authorized and interest thereon in full.

Section 13. Any holder of a bond or bonds, or any of the coupons of any bond or bonds issued under the provisions of this resolution, may either in law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other proceeding, enforce or compel the performance of all duties required by this resolution or the acts under which the bonds hereby authorized are issued, including the fixing, maintaining and collecting of such charges and fees for the use of such properties and all facilities thereof as will be sufficient for all the purposes provided by this resolution, and the application of income and revenue therefrom.

Section 14. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this resolution

shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this resolution.

Section 15. That said revenue bonds shall be executed as soon after this resolution becomes effective as may be, be deposited with the Treasurer of said University, and be by him delivered to The Milwaukee Company and Associates, the purchaser thereof, upon receipt of the purchase price, the contract for the sale thereof heretofore entered into be and the same is hereby in all respects ratified and approved. Any accrued interest or premium derived from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in the sinking fund hereinabove provided and applied toward payment of interest or principal of said bonds as thereby required.

Section 16. This resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its

RESOLUTION NO. 2

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE PRESIDENT, SECRETARY, AND TREASURER OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO EXECUTE ALL INSTRUMENTS NECESSARY FOR THE REFINANCING OF THE MEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS INDEBTEDNESS

Resolved that the President, Secretary, and Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, be and they are each and all of them hereby authorized and directed to execute all instruments, papers and documents necessary or convenient to accomplish the issuance of \$400,000 Men's Residence Halls Revenue Bonds of 1948, and the reacquiring and revesting of all of the trust property held by the University of Illinois Foundation, as Trustee under that certain Trust Agreement dated the 1st day of September, 1941, and known as the "Men's Residence Hall, University of Illinois Operating Trust Agreement," and that the Treasurer is authorized and directed to deposit the proceeds of the sale of said bonds, including funds now available in the Men's Residence Halls Fund Account, in such bank or banks as may be requested by the Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company or the University of Illinois Foundation.

PURCHASE OF COAL FOR URBANA-CHAMPAIGN POWER PLANT

(22) The Director of Purchases reports:

"On July 1, 1947, we placed a contract with Taylor-English Coal Company for 30,000 tons and with Bell & Zoller Coal Company for 8,000 tons (Minutes, June 23, 1947, page 399). It was contemplated that coal received on these contracts would meet our requirements but the severe weather this winter has resulted in greater consumption than had been estimated and the mines being unable to meet their schedules. The amount of storage has been reduced to 3,500 tons which is not sufficient reserve as it represents but one month's supply. The purchase of 3,000 tons of coal to replenish our reserve stock is recommended to enable us to increase our reserve to two months' supply by April 1."

Quotations were solicited from 22 companies; the following were received:

The Director of Purchases, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, and the Comptroller recommend that an order be placed with C. V. Beck & Company, Inc., the lowest bidder, for 3,000 tons at a cost of \$13,500, plus \$5,250 freight, or a total cost of \$18,750.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this purchase was authorized as recommended, subject to constitutional provisions.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR CONCRETE FLOOR IN **TEMPORARY WAREHOUSE**

(23) At the request of the University, the Federal Works Agency extended the foundation of the temporary warehouse to a greater depth than is their usual practice in temporary construction of this kind. This was done with the understanding that if the F.W.A. did not have the funds to complete the project the deeper foundation would be constructed in lieu of a finished concrete floor (which approximately equaled the cost of the additional foundation work) and that the University would complete the work. The deeper foundation was

and that the University would complete the work. The deeper foundation was advantageous to the University since it would provide additional storage space. It has been determined that the Federal Works Agency will not have the money to complete the floor. The Physical Plant Department has secured the following quotations on a finished reinforced concrete floor: E. N. DeAtley, \$5,000; Kuhne-Simmons Co., Inc., \$4,502; C. A. Petry and Sons, \$4,420.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract to C. A. Petry and Sons, the lowest bidder, in the amount of \$4,420. Funds are available

the amount of \$4,420. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board of Trustees be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was awarded and authorization was given as recommended.

CHANGES IN OLD BOILER ROOM OF PHYSICAL PLANT SERVICE BUILDING FOR BRICKLAYERS' TRAINING CLASS

(24) A request has been received from the Director of Industrial and Vocational Education of the Champaign Public Schools for space for a training class for bricklayers.

The basement area in the old boiler room in the Service Building, the old power plant building, which is to be converted into a Naval Science Building,

will be satisfactory for this purpose if the following changes are made:

I. Completion of tile partitions which must be installed eventually in accordance with the plans for converting the building into a Naval Science Building.

2. Installation of additional lighting and a few receptacle outlets.

3. Installation of a water supply outlet for the mixing of mortar.

The bricklayers' union has agreed to erect the partitions, provided the University furnishes the necessary materials, estimated to cost \$2,540.

In view of the need for additional bricklayers by the construction industry, the Director of the Physical Plant Department, the Provost, and the Comptroller recommend cooperation with the Champaign Public Schools in continuing this program through the winter, and therefore recommend a nonrecurring appropriation of \$2,540 for the purchase of the necessary materials.

I concur.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(25) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$5,556.47 in the contract with the John Felmley Company for the construction of the Chemistry Building for the installation of a finished concrete floor in the south half of the basement.

No provision was made in the original budget of funds for this building for a concrete floor in the south half of the basement; the plans and specifications provide for a dirt floor. Funds are now available in the State appropriation for the "Construction of a new Chemistry Building" to include this improvement, which can be made at less cost while the building is under construction than later.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Davis, this addition to contract was approved, and authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF ADDITION TO HOSPITAL BUILDING FOR RESEARCH IN PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT IN CHICAGO

(26) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$18,977 in the contract with E. H. Marhoefer, Jr., Company for the general work on the construction of an addition to the present Research and Educational Hospitals Building for research in physical environment to provide for all labor, material, and other expenses necessary for furnishing and installing electrical service feeders to the research in physical

environment addition and omitting some service conduits.

This building was designed at the same time as the addition to the Research and Educational Hospitals and the installation of electrical service feeders was included as a part of the general hospital addition. When the latter project was postponed, it became necessary to include the installation of the electrical service feeders in the addition for research in physical environment.

Funds are available for this additional work in the State appropriation for

"Construction of addition to present Hospital Building for Research in Physical Environment.'

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this addition to contract was approved, and authority was given as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR GENERAL WORK ON THE MECHANICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(27) In the planning of the Mechanical Engineering Building it was anticipated that certain basement areas would not be immediately needed and it was indicated in the contract drawings that these areas would be finished and subdivided at a later date. The Department of Mechanical Engineering has now asked that these areas be completed. The work can be done at less cost while the building is under construction than later. Moreover, finishing these areas will provide much needed additional classroom space.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller rec-

ommend an increase of \$1,970 in the contract with James McHugh Sons, Inc., the general contractor on this project, for the additional work. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the "Construction of a new Mechancial Engineering Building" for this work.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this addition to contract was approved, and authority was given as recommended.

EMERGENCY LIGHTING SYSTEM IN McKINLEY HOSPITAL

Mr. McKelvey presented the following report.

The Board of Trustees has referred to its Committee on Buildings and Grounds a recommendation from the President of the University for authorization of a contract with Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White for the preparation of plans and specifications for the installation of a battery operated emergency lighting system in McKinley Hospital.

On January 17 the Committee met at Urbana to consider this and other matters. The Physical Plant Department was requested to restudy the project to determine how extensive an installation is necessary to provide adequate safe-

guards in the event of power failure. The Department has consulted with the University Health Officer on this question and he has reported as follows:

"It is our opinion that the following areas should be protected by such service: (1) the first floor, including the X-ray room, laboratory, and emergency room; (2) the surgery unit on the third floor, which of course takes in the operating room, sterilizing room, etc. By having such protection on the first floor, you will have provided a room for the use of the so-called 'iron lung,' or mechanical respirator, power-driven apparatus in the laboratory, etc.

"As we understand it, power has been unavailable at no time for longer than an hour, and that you propose providing standby battery service for four

hours or longer.'

In view of this reduction in the amount of emergency lighting to be installed, the estimate of the total cost of the project has been reduced from

\$12,000 to \$8,000, including engineering services.

The Committee recommends that the firm of Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White be engaged to prepare plans and specifications and complete working drawings for this installation on a cost-plus basis. No appropriation is required as funds are available in the Physical Plant Department budget for this purpose.

RESOLUTION, CASE OF WALTER R. REEVE

At this point, the Legal Counsel presented the following resolution, as requested during the morning session (page 979).

Whereas, the President of the Board read a letter, dated February 20, from Mr. H. F. Simonson, attorney for Walter R. Reeve and for the University of Illinois Employees Union No. 698, asking the Board of Trustees to investigate the facts which led to the termination of the employment by the University of Walter R. Reeve as an Aircraft Maintenance and Line Mechanic within his probationary period; and

Whereas, the letter also questions the functions of the Board of Trustees and the Chief Administrative Officer of the Board under the Civil Service Law;

and

Whereas, the President of the Board, through the office of the President of

the University, requested the Legal Counsel to report on the case; and

Whereas, the Legal Counsel reported that, from the files and from his participation in conferences, he was fully familiar with the history and circumstances of the case and summarized the facts and issues, and read from the files of the case; and

Whereas, the Legal Counsel also reported that, in his opinion, the University officers concerned had proceeded in accordance with the Policy and Rules governing Nonacademic Employees approved by the Board and in accordance with the Civil Service Law and that no violations of the rights of the employee in question has occurred; and

Whereas, the matter was fully discussed by members of the Board; and Whereas, the Board took occasion to reaffirm its faith in the collective pargaining and related procedures under the Civil Service Law; now be it

bargaining and related procedures under the Civil Service Law; now be it Resolved that the Board sees no reason for disapproving of any of the actions taken in this case by the Officers of the University and it therefore refers the issues back to the Director of Nonacademic Personnel for such further action as may be necessary under the Civil Service Law and the Rules of the Board of Trustees.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this resolution was adopted.

BUDGETARY PROVISION FOR THE UNIVERSITY

President Livingston made a statement on the budgetary needs of the University for plant and operation and requested the President of the University to continue the discussion. President Stoddard reported briefly on the possible ways and means of meeting the increased demands and needs of the youth of the State. The Provost reported on the progress of a study of probable growth of the student body.

The members of the Board discussed this matter.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the President of the University was requested to complete the study and to present his plan and recommendations to the Board and to the State at large.

CURRICULUM PREPARATORY TO TEACHING DEAF AND HARD OF HEARING CHILDREN

For the Degree of Bachelor of Science in the Education of the Deaf

Required for Admission: Fifteen units of secondary-school work, including English, 3 units, Algebra, 1 unit, Geometry, 1 unit. Recommended, Science, 2 units, Language, 2 units.

Additional Standards: (a) The student must rank in the upper 25 per cent of his high-school graduating class or, if a transfer student, must have a grade point average of at least 3.5.

(b) The student who is preparing to teach the deaf must possess normal hearing acuity and normal formation of the teeth and lips. This will necessitate a personal interview with, and tests administered by, a staff member of the College of Education.

Graduation: A minimum of 124 hours of credit, not counting the first two years of work in military science and physical education, is required for graduation

RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

POLICY AND PROCEDURE GOVERNING ADMISSION OF PATIENTS EFFECTIVE MARCH 1, 1948

The Research and Educational Hospitals are operated and maintained by the Uni-

versity of Illinois for the advancement of medical education and research.

The limited bed capacity necessitates basing admission primarily on the teaching or investigative value of the case and the lack of family income to procure medical attention from private sources. Citizenship and residence in the State of Illinois of at least one year are required.

The Hospitals offer two types of service — Inpatient and Outpatient (Clinic). The University reserves the right to assign patients to either, depending on individual need and available facilities. The plan of admission limits the number of cases of any one particular type which may be accepted during a given period.

¹ Under special circumstances, other courses may be substituted with the approval of the adviser.

The period of hospitalization is necessarily limited; therefore patients are discharged at the discretion of the department to which they are assigned.

Application for admission of a patient should be addressed to the Medical Director and accompanied by a letter from the attending physician stating the name, age, sex of applicant, history of present complaints, clinical and laboratory findings, impression or diagnosis, and family income. The referring physician should also state whether the patient's condition will permit use of the Outpatient service, which normally requires several visits to the clinic before completion of diagnostic procedures and therapy. All admission requests are reviewed for medical interest by the service concerned, and the applicant or referring physician will be informed whether or not the case may be admitted.

Policy Governing Charges

Medical services are provided free of charge. However, certain other charges are made. All charges are computed at cost, and assessed in accordance with the patient's ability to pay, with particular consideration of benefits available under any hospitalization insurance plan carried by the patient. Charges apply to patients eligible for or receiving financial assistance from public or private welfare agencies, whose policies provide payment toward medical costs. They apply alike to Clinic and Hospital patients and cover registration, laboratory service, drugs, X-rays, special appliances, and other costs.

All patients applying for admission to the Clinic or Hospital are to be screened for eligibility and ability to pay. They shall be informed of the fees in effect and classified as follows: (a) no payment, (b) partial payment, (c) full

payment.

Biopsy:

Except as otherwise indicated, all receipts of the Hospital are to be treated as general income. All expenses of the Hospital are to be covered by budget appropriations.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

March 9, 1948



The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Tuesday, March 9, 1948, at the Blackstone Hotel, in Chicago, according to the following schedule:

10 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole. 2 p.m. — Open session.

The following members were present: President Livingston, General Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr.

McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson.

President Stoddard was present; also Provost C. R. Griffith, Assistants to the President A. J. Janata and Wilbur Schramm, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton, and, during part of the day, Mr. D. E. Dickason, Director of Nonacademic Personnel.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the agenda for the meeting and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR PROPERTY PURCHASES AND IMPROVEMENTS

(1) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends that appropriations be made from the General Reserve Fund for the

I. Purchase of the property at 404 South Mathews Avenue, Urbana — 20,000. This is a lot, 50' x 100' with a 19-room frame house which has been used as a student rooming house. The property is in the block bounded by Green Street, Goodwin Avenue, Illinois Street, and Mathews Avenue, and is in an area which the University needs to acquire for future campus expansion. The University already owns two properties adjoining the one at 404 South Mathews.

2. Purchase of the property at 1106 West Green Street, Urbana —\$15,000.

This is a vacant lot with a frontage of 76 feet and is 264 feet deep. It is contiguous to University owned land and is in an area which the University will need to acquire for future campus expansion. In the meantime, the property could be used as a parking lot for the occupants of the Student and Staff Apartments to be constructed on the other side of Green Street.

3. Alterations and furnishings for the houses at 402 and 404 South Mathews Avenue and at the rear of 606 South Mathews for office space—\$28,000.

The houses at 402 South Mathews and at the rear of 606 South Mathews, already owned by the University, have been assigned to the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences for staff offices. The house at 404 South Mathews will also be used as office quarters but has not yet been assigned.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these purchases were authorized, and the appropriations were made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Meyer.

PATENTABLE DISCOVERIES

(2) The University Research Board has submitted the following reports and recommendations relating to patentable discoveries by members of the staff:

I. Solvent Extraction of Thorium. In studying the problem of separation I. Solvent Extraction of Thorium. In studying the problem of separation of the rare earths by solvents extraction, a means has been found which permits the preferential extraction of thorium. This is the result of research work in the Department of Chemistry under a task order on a contract the University has with the Office of Naval Research. The work was done under the supervision of Professor Ludwig F. Audrieth. Under the terms of the contract with the Navy the University must in any case give the Navy a royalty-free non-exclusive license under any patent that may issue. Aside from this consideration, the new process is almost exclusively of governmental interest. The Research Board therefore recommends full release of patent rights to the United States Government through the Office of Naval Research. Others who have participated in this research are Professor E. W. Comings and Mr. George F. Asselin, a graduate student.

2. Development of a New Polymer. Professor C. S. Marvel of the Department of Chemistry and Paul H. Aldrich, Assistant in Chemistry, have developed a new polymer, made by the addition of hexamethylene dimercaptan to diallyl. This polymer melts too easily to make a suitable synthetic fiber, but on oxidation it is converted to a polysulfone which does melt high enough to be of interest as a fiber. They have not yet been able to cold-draw the polysulfone, but believe of prior art in this field and two previous patents issued will undoubtedly dominate any claims which can be made by Messrs. Marvel and Aldrich. It is the judgment of the University Research Board that the University is not in a position to benefit from a possible patent on this discovery and the Board recommends release to the discoverers.

I concur in the recommendations of the Research Board.

Dr. Luken reported that the Committee on Patents recommends approval.

On motion of Dr. Luken, these releases were authorized as recom-

mended.

OPEN SESSION

On motion of Mr. Nickell, the nominations were closed, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous vote of the meeting for Mr. Fornof as President. The ballot was cast, and Mr. Fornof was declared elected President of the Board.

Mr. Fornof took the chair and expressed his appreciation of the honor.

APPRECIATION OF SERVICES OF PRESIDENT LIVINGSTON

On motion of Mrs. Holt, the Board made record of its appreciation of the untiring efforts and effective leadership of Mr. Park Livingston as President of the Board during the past five years. On request of President Stoddard, the President and the administrative staff of the University were permitted to join with the Board in this expression of good will to Mr. Livingston.

MR. HARRISON E. CUNNINGHAM ELECTED SECRETARY

On nomination of Mr. Livingston and on motion of Mr. Williamson, Mr. Harrison E. Cunningham, of Urbana, was elected Secretary of the Board for one year.

PROFESSOR LLOYD MOREY ELECTED COMPTROLLER

On nomination of Mr. McLaughlin and on motion of Mr. Nickell, Professor Lloyd Morey, of Urbana, was elected Comptroller for one year.

The programs of research, study, and travel for which these leaves are The programs of research, study, and travel for which these leaves are being requested have been examined by the University Research Board which advises the President in such matters. The Research Board's report to the President includes a supporting evaluation of the program in terms of benefits to the University and to the individual in each specific case recommended.

While the number of sabbatical leaves being recommended for 1948-1949 may seem large, it should be remembered that relatively few sabbatical leaves were requested and granted during World War II, so that there is an accumulation

of such requests. In the two years immediately preceding the war, twenty leaves were granted for 1938-1939 and twenty-three for 1939-1940, although some in the latter group were subsequently cancelled at the requests of the applicants after the war began.

ADDITION TO THE GENERAL CONTRACT FOR THE ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

The survey of mechanical facilities in the Chicago Professional Colleges by Holabird and Root, indicates that the present fire alarm systems, particularly in the buildings acquired from the Department of Public Welfare, are in a deplorable state, a serious situation in the operation of hospitals. This project has been given top priority in the replacement and modernization projects scheduled for 1947-1948.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of the contract to the lowest bidder, the E. P. Allison Company, at \$32,108. Funds are available in the Physical Plant operation and maintenance budget.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM, URBANA-CHAMPAIGN

(12) The contract for the construction of the enlargement and extension of the utilities distribution system at Urbana-Champaign does not include lateral connections to the various buildings. The cost of such connections is properly chargeable to the appropriation for each building and in most cases the new building construction details had not been developed to include lateral connections at the time the contract for the utilities distribution system was let.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$4,328.85 in the contract with the Warner Construction Company for the construction of a conduit duct connecting the new Women's Residence Hall on Lincoln Avenue with the utilities distribution system. SUB-CONTRACT FOR BETATRON ERECTION

(13) On January 8, 1948 (Minutes, page 961), the Board of Trustees approved a contract with the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company of Milwaukee for the supervision of the assembly and erection of the 300-mev Betatron. As a part of this contract, authority was given to the Allis-Chalmers Company to employ labor and purchase material if such purchases of over \$25 were approved in advance by the University and did not exceed in total the sum of \$25,000.

The Allis-Chalmers Company now requests authority to execute a contract with the Pennoyer Merchants Transfer Company for the actual rigging required for the 300-mev Betatron. This proposed contract provides for charges to be computed on the basis of fixed hourly rates varying by the class of labor used. The estimated total cost of this work is \$20,800.

The proposed hourly rates to be charged under this contract have been checked and have been found to be about the same as those quoted by other firms

for this work.

Professors Donald W. Kerst, F. W. Loomis, and Dean M. L. Enger recommend that the Allis-Chalmers Company be authorized to sub-let this work for the following reasons:

1. The supervision of the erection is the responsibility of the Allis-Chalmers

erection department.

2. There will be no question of divided responsibility as there would be if

the University contracted directly with the rigging company.

3. Pennoyer Merchants Transfer Company has worked with Allis-Chalmers before on similar jobs and Allis-Chalmers' erection engineers are satisfied the Company can do this one satisfactorily.

The Director of Purchases and the Comptroller have reviewed the proposed

contract and concur in the recommendation.

5. The Upjohn Company, Kalamazoo, Michigan, \$1,461.60 for the renewal of the Upjohn Fellowship in Chemistry under the direction of Professor C. S. Vestling during the academic year, 1948-1949.

6. Abbott Laboratories, North Chicago, \$1,200 in support of a postdoctoral fellowship in chemistry for a study of mariahuana-like compounds under the di-

rection of Professor Roger Adams.
7. Monsanto Chemical Company, St. Louis, Missouri, \$1,200 for the renewal of the Monsanto fellowship in chemistry during the academic year, 1948-1949, under the direction of Professor C. S. Marvel.

8. Illinois Clay Products Company, \$2,200 in support of a fellowship in Ceramic Engineering during the period September 1, 1947, to June 1, 1948.

9. Titanium Alloy Manufacturing Company, New York City, \$2,000 in support of a fellowship in Ceramic Engineering during the year 1947-1948.

10. United States Public Health Service, National Institute of Health, \$5,508 for a study of the isolation of cholecystokinin by Dr. A. C. Ivy, Vice President

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

April 10, 1948



The April meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Saturday, April 10, 1948, at the Illini Union Building, in Urbana, according to the following schedule:

10:30 a.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

2:30 p.m. — Open session.

When the Board convened, the following members were present: President Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson. Mr. Livingston took his place

with the Board during the forenoon.

President Stoddard was present; also Provost C. R. Griffith, Assistants to the President A. J. Janata and Wilbur Schramm, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton, and, during part of the day, Mr. D. E. Dickason, Director of Nonacademic Personnel, Professor W. L. Everitt, Head of the Department of Electrical Engineering, and Mr. E. L. Stouffer, Architect.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the agenda for the meeting and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

CONTRACT FOR TABULATING EQUIPMENT

(I) For a number of years the University has maintained tabulating (punch-card) equipment, leased from the International Business Machines Corporation. This equipment is under the supervision of the Comptroller and is used about two-thirds time for payrolls, tax reports, and other business functions, and the remaining one-third for service to educational departments.

It is highly desirable that the student registration procedure in the Urbana-Champaign departments be mechanized through the punch-card system. The Director of Admissions and Records and the Comptroller compiled a schedule of the equipment which must be added. The plan of administration has not been worked out, but since approximately 16 months is required for delivery of the the equipment after an order is placed, it is necessary to make a contract now to have the equipment available for the first semester of 1949-1950. An annual net rental, after allowing for educational discount, totaling \$14,602, is indicated at present price schedules. Additional services, estimated to cost \$7,800 a year, and a nonrecurring appropriation for filing and other office equipment will also be required.

Some additional equipment is needed in the Business Office installation to make it possible to serve more completely the needs of educational departments. The total rental of the equipment needed is \$15,423 as compared with the present schedule of \$13,580. The cost of tabulating services rendered is charged to the departments receiving the service. The new installation will be used for further service to educational departments after the requirements of the registration

system have been covered.

I recommend that general approval be given to this program, and that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to conclude contracts with the International Business Machines Corporation for equipment indicated herein, with authorization to make minor adjustments in the schedule as further studies progress, or the needs for various services indicate.

The Comptroller discussed this matter.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this program was approved in principle, and authority was given as recommended.

FINANCING OF CHICAGO HOUSING PROJECTS

(2) On September 24, 1946 (Minutes, page 55), Vice-President A. C. Ivy presented to the Board of Trustees the housing needs of the Chicago Professional Colleges, including staff residential facilities, student residence halls, and a nurses' residence. On October 22, 1946 (Minutes, page 129), the Board approved the recommendation of a special committee for the construction of student and nurses' residence facilities in Chicago and authorized requests for State appropriations for these facilities. These appropriations were not secured.

Meanwhile, studies have been made and discussions carried on of the possibilities of securing loans for these projects. The Equitable Life Assurance Society of New York is willing to consider an application for a loan for the total construction costs of the projects, up to a tentative maximum of \$6,000,000, to be payable in 20 to 25 years, interest at 4% to 4½%. The loan would be made to the University of Illinois Foundation, to which the sites for the projects would be conveyed by the Board of Trustees. The Foundation would lease the projects to the University. Such leases would have to be on a biennial basis, with option of renewal.

Present estimates of the costs of the projects are as follows:

These figures are subject to check after detailed plans and specifications have been completed. The loan would not cover any movable equipment, such as furniture, kitchen equipment, and other household furnishings.

On a \$6,000,000 loan at 4½%, straight line amortization in 20 years, the debt service for the first year would be \$570,000, which sum would decrease each year, the decrease the second year being \$13,500. The average annual debt service would

be \$441,750.

Income from the projects is presently estimated at \$92,000 a year. This would result in a deficiency of \$478,000 during the first year, which would have to be made up from general funds of the University, thus necessitating an increase in the biennial budget of the University for 1949-1951 in an amount sufficient to cover this requirement. In addition, a special, nonrecurring appropriation would be required for movable equipment, estimated to cost \$323,100. If the construction cost is less than \$6,000,000, and more favorable loan conditions can be secured, the amount of debt service would be correspondingly decreased.

Information concerning the projects has been presented to six other parties representing life insurance companies. Two have indicated that they are definitely not interested, two have made no reply, and two others are studying the projects

but have given no final answer.

To carry this forward the following steps are necessary:

(a) Sites for all the projects must be selected, and if additional land is necessary it must be acquired.

(b) Detailed plans and specifications must be completed and definite bids

secured.

(c) Approval in principle by the Board of Trustees of the plan of meeting the difference between the debt service on these projects and the net income from the projects (after allowing for operating expenses) from its general funds, and authorization of the inclusion of the necessary sum in the biennial budgets.

(d) Approval by the Board of Trustees of the plan for financing and a re-

quest to the University of Illinois Foundation to file an application for the loan

on these projects.

(e) The University of Illinois Foundation Board of Directors will then

- have to approve the filing of such an application.

 (f) The whole matter is, of course, subject to the standard legal and financial requirements of the University, the Foundation, and of the two Boards.
- I have a few reservations concerning these tentative proposals: I. We should try again to get substantial appropriations for this type of construction on the Chicago campus. These halls do not yield a large income and are essentially State projects.
 - 2. Following (1) we could then borrow a smaller sum than the total cost.

3. The proposed interest rate is high.
4. It may be harder to get the operating increase (nearly \$1,000,000 the first biennium) than the capital sum of \$6,000,000.

The matter is brought to the Board for discussion.

Mr. Livingston took his place with the Board during the discussion of this matter.

Action was deferred.

ADDITIONS TO ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR THE ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

- (3) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend two additions in the amount of \$5,557.30 and \$2,603.61 respectively to the contract with the Leverenz Electric Company, contractors for electrical work on the Electrical Engineering Building.
- (a) The first addition will provide for the following changes requested by the Electrical Engineering Department:
 - I. The extension of wood block flooring now provided in Room 120 in the ground story to Rooms 126 and 127. This necessitates a change in conduit raceway

from concrete trenches with angle edges and plate covers to a complete metal trough type of raceway now furnished by this contractor.....\$2 917 00

I have asked a representative of the Department of Electrical Engineering to appear at the Board meeting and explain the need for these changes.

(b) The second addition will provide for the following changes:

Total.....\$2 603 61

Funds are available in the State appropriation for the "Construction of a New Electrical Engineering Building."

Professor Everitt and Mr. Stouffer discussed this matter.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these additions to contract were approved.

ESTATE OF WILLIAM T. ROGERS

(4) On June 30, 1945 (Minutes, page 500), there was reported to the Board the probate of the will of the late William T. Rogers of Buffalo, Sangamon County, Illinois. This will devised to the University as remainderman certain real estate, which on the death of the life tenant, was to be liquidated and the proceeds transferred to the University to be administered as a loan fund for deserving students. The life tenant, Sallie V. Rogers, predeceased the Testator.

The attorney for the estate, Mr. Clifford M. Blunk, of Springfield, advises that Mr. Robert J. Saner, Trust Officer of the Springfield Marine Bank, which is the Executor of the estate, has reduced all property to cash and is now ready to

make final distribution.

The amount which will be paid to the University is in the neighborhood of \$107,000. Authorization is requested to receive these funds, which will be used to establish the "William T. Rogers Loan Fund," to be held and administered in accordance with the terms of the will.

The Comptroller and the Legal Counsel concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the Comptroller was authorized to receive this fund for the purpose specified.

PURCHASE OF HOUSE AT 206 WEST VERMONT

(5) Pursuant to the residence properties acquisition program for staff housing authorized by the Board of Trustees, I am recommending the purchase of the property at 206 West Vermont Street, Urbana (Dr. G. L. Porter, Owner), at a price of \$21,000. The University has secured an option on this property. This is a seven-room brick house, approximately 22 years old, and is well constructed. It will be available for assignment to a University staff member on or before September 1, 1948. The price has been fixed by negotiations with the owner.

The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has also authorized the purchase of a house for rental to a member of its staff. I recommend that the Board of Trustees approve the action of the Board of Directors of the Athletic

Association and the assignment of Athletic Association funds for this purpose; I further recommend that if it appears desirable to transfer the option on the property at 206 West Vermont Street to the Athletic Association, this be authorized by the Board of Trustees.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this purchase was authorized as recommended, the action of the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association in authorizing the purchase of a house for rental to a member of its staff and assigning funds for the purpose was approved, and the transfer to the Athletic Association of the option on the property at 206 West Vermont Street was authorized if found desirable, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken.

POLICY AND RULES RELATING TO COMPENSATION AND WORKING CONDITIONS OF NONACADEMIC EMPLOYEES

(6) At the March meeting, the Board discussed informally a proposed revision of the Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Non-academic Employees. The point at issue is the clarification of the policy on prevailing rates. It may be helpful to consider these questions: (1) What is meant by "prevailing rates"? (2) How closely in time should changes in prevailing rates be followed by changes in wages paid—for example, immediately (as is now the case), at the beginning of a fiscal year, or at the beginning of a biennium? (3) Under any plan, what provision can be made in the budget to take care of extraordinary changes in wage rates?

As I follow the decisions and interpretations of the Board, I feel that we are committed to a two-fold policy: (1) to maintain a high wage standard equal, if not superior to, wages paid for similar work in the community and (2) to maintain the principle of conservation of State funds. We want to avoid both a short-changing of employee groups and a charge of wastefulness of University funds.

After discussion, and on motion of Mr. Williamson, the Board reaffirmed its support of the principle of paying the prevailing wages as defined in *The Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees* (effective July 1, 1945), and the appropriate University officers were directed to initiate such negotiations with employee groups as may be necessary to bring into conformity with that policy any elements of the University wage policies which now deviate from it; and further, the principle of active participation by the University in negotiations which affect the University's interest was approved.

REQUEST FROM REPRESENTATIVE OF UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS EMPLOYEES' UNION

(7) At the meeting of the Board of Trustees on March 9, 1948, Mr. Park Livingston presented the following letter under date of March 2 which he had received from Mr. Sherdie C. Jones, representative of Local 698, American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees:

DEAR MR. LIVINGSTON:

Prolonged negotiation between Local No. 698 and the University of Illinois through the Office of Nonacademic Personnel over a period of eight months has failed to produce an agreement on wage rates for employees covered by the negotiations.

The negotiations have been hampered by the claim of the Director of Nonacademic Personnel that the prior obligation of the University to meet wage adjustments for employees whose rates are determined by prevailing rates makes it impossible for him to agree upon adjustments for employees who negotiate directly with the University through their representative.

The Policy and Rules Relating to Compensation and Working Conditions of Nonacademic Employees provides three methods of determining wage adjustments.

The Policy does not state, however, that employees whose wage rates are determined by one method shall be denied adjustments because employees whose wages are determined by another received adjustments.

We therefore ask the Board of Trustees to take steps to make it possible for employees who negotiate directly with the University through their collective bargaining representative to realize the fruits of collective bargaining.

We will welcome the opportunity to confer with any committee named by the Board to consider our request.

President Stoddard was present; also the officers present during the morning session, and Director J. F. Wright.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meetings of February 21 and March 9, 1948.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 971 to 1054 above.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, MARCH 25, 1948

The Secretary reported for record that the Executive Committee on March 25, 1948, approved a recommendation from the President of the University that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded to the candidates who have fulfilled all requirements and who have passed the C.P.A. examination given in November, 1947. (See Appendix, page 1083.)

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPROPRIATION FOR MEDICAL BETATRON

(1) On February 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 979), the Board of Trustees, on recommendation of the Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures, approved an appropriation of \$110,000 for the purchase of a medical betatron for the Chicago Professional Colleges, provided a grant for this purpose could not be secured from a Federal agency, or a private source. Applications for a grant from such sources all have been declined, so that if the betatron is to be secured the cost must be met from University funds.

Subsequent to the February 2I meeting, it was found that the cost will exceed the original estimate. This is due to: (1) the Allis-Chalmers Company, the manufacturer, will require escalation protection of 20 per cent in the event of an increased cost over the present estimate; and (2) the cost of installation, which requires the building of a structure to house the equipment, will exceed the previous estimate.

Exact bids for construction have not yet been secured, so that it is still impossible to determine the ultimate cost. However, we may lose the betatron unless a contract is let soon. The matter has been reviewed by the Committee, which now recommends a further appropriation of \$65,000, making a maximum total of \$175,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary. Any excess over final costs

vill lapse.

The increase in electric current will cost about \$2,000 a year, which must be provided for in the budget of the Physical Plant Department beginning with

1048-1040.

I recommend the additional appropriation of \$65,000 and authorization of the purchase of one 100 Roentgen Unit Betatron X-Ray machine (as per specifications No. 42172) from the Allis-Chalmers Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, at a base price of \$85,000 plus allowance for any increase in cost of manufacture between the date ordered and the time of delivery, the maximum price not to exceed \$102,000, f.o.b. Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this purchase was authorized and the appropriation made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(2) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded the following on the basis of their having satisfactorily passed the written examination given by the Special Board of Examiners under the provisions of Section 4b of the Accountancy Act of 1943. They have also satisfied all of the condition requirements of that section of the Act:

CURRICULA IN LIBRARY SCIENCE

- (3) The University Senate recommends that effective September 1, 1948, the following new programs be offered:
- I. A two-year curriculum leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Library Science.

Admission. Fifty-six hours of university work, not including military training and physical education, will be required for admission to the Library School. Students in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences who plan to enter the Library School are advised to register either in the Division of General Studies

or the general curriculum. Students in the general curriculum are advised to distribute their work according to the College plan including foreign languages, humanities, social studies, and natural sciences. Students registered in other colleges are advised to follow a regular program in that college.

Scholarship. A minimum scholarship average of 3.5 will be required for admission and for graduation,

Requirements for Graduation. 120 hours exclusive of military training and physical education. In this 120 hours must be included eighteen hours of Library Science and a major and minor. The major will consist of twenty hours and the minor of sixteen hours, both chosen from the following list of subjects:

Agriculture
Art and Architecture
Biology
Business Administration
Chemistry
Classics
Economics
Education
Engineering
English

Foreign Languages

Geography and Geology History Journalism Mathematics Music Philosophy Physical Sciences Political Science Psychology Sociology

Part of this work may be completed prior to admission to the Library School. The remainder of the curriculum may be elected from courses offered by other colleges and schools as approved by the student's adviser.

Prescribed Subjects. Eighteen hours in Library Science, chosen from the following courses: Lib.Sci. 201, Library in the Social Order, 3 hours; Lib.Sci. 202, Use of Books and Libraries, 3 hours; Lib.Sci. 251, Organization and Operation of Libraries I, 3 hours; Lib.Sci. 252, Organization and Operation of Libraries II, 3 hours; Lib.Sci. 301, Humanistic and Social Science Literature, 3 hours; Lib.Sci. 302, Literature of Science and Technology, 3 hours; Lib.Sci. 303, Library Materials for Children, 3 hours; Lib.Sci. 304, Library Materials for Adolescents, 3 hours.

Electives. The remainder of the curriculum may be elected from courses offered by other colleges and schools in the University as approved by the Director or Assistant Director of the Library School.

II. A fifth year program leading to the degree of Master of Science in Library Science, replacing the present two-year program leading to the degree of Master of Science.

The degree will be taken without thesis but nine units of graduate work will be required. A reading knowledge of one modern foreign language will be required for admission to the curriculum.

A reading knowledge of at least two foreign languages will be required of students specializing in bibliographical work or college library administration.

III. A two-year graduate program beyond the master's degree leading to the degree of Doctor of Library Science (L.S.D.).

The Graduate College requirements as to major and minor subjects, residence, period of study, knowledge of languages, preliminary and final examinations, and research which apply to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) will apply to the degree of Doctor of Library Science.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these curricula and programs were approved as recommended.

THOMAS J. SMITH SCHOLARSHIPS IN MUSIC REGULATIONS

(4) Under an agreement with the late Captain Thomas J. Smith of Champaign, a former member and president of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois who gave the University certain farm lands which were sold and the proceeds used for the construction of the Smith Music Hall, the Board of Trustees established four scholarships to be awarded each year to women in the School of

Music who are unable to pay the accustomed tuition. These scholarships are awarded on the basis of comparative promise in music as judged by a special committee appointed for that purpose and under regulations of the Board of Trustees. The committee of the School of Music which nominates candidates for the Thomas J. Smith Scholarships in Music has recommended the following changes in the regulations:

I. Regulation No. 3 which reads as follows:

"Each applicant shall submit an essay of not fewer than 250 words on some subject in music, chosen by herself, to show that she had adequate training in English composition."

to be changed to read:

"The Committee in selecting the candidates for the scholarship shall consider in addition to evidence of promise in music and financial need, the student's previous scholarship record."

2. Regulation No. 5 which reads as follows:

"These scholarships shall be good for one year and shall exempt the holders during this period from matriculation, incidental, and music fees. They may be renewed for one, two, or three years provided the scholars maintain at least an average grade of B in all subjects."

to be changed to read:

"These scholarships shall be good for one year and shall exempt the holders during this period from the tuition fee. They may be renewed for one, two, or three years, providing the scholarship holder maintains a superior scholarship average in her work in the University."

The matriculation and special music fees have been discontinued. The incidental fee is now called the tuition fee. The benefits to the scholarship holder are

not diminished by this change.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these changes were approved and adopted as recommended.

REQUEST FOR ASSIGNMENT OF LAND TO THE STATE NATURAL HISTORY AND GEOLOGICAL SURVEYS

(5) The following letter from the Chairman of the State Board of Natural Resources and Conservation and resolution adopted by that Board are submitted at his request:

March 10, 1948

Members of the Board of Trustees, University of Illinois.

GENTLEMEN:

Herewith I hand you copy of Resolution adopted by the Board of Natural Resources and Conservation on February 24th, 1948, with reference to allocation of lands for future construction by this Board on the campus of the University of Illinois.

This matter has been thoroughly gone into and discussed among the members of the Board, including President George D. Stoddard. President Stoddard informs us of a proposed 25-year plan in conjunction with the cities of Urbana and Champaign. He does not sign the Resolution because in his capacity as President of the University, he feels that this matter should be left to the committee and then to the Board itself. He expressed the view that we should have more land allocated to us according to our needs and that it should be adjacent to our present building.

We are in complete sympathy with some 25-year plan and desire to work

in complete harmony with the University.

It is highly important that land should be allocated to the Board which will be adjacent to the present Natural Resources Building, and we shall be glad to have our representative confer with the committee now in the process of planning, and also to appear before your Board when and if necessary.

I earnestly request that our suggestions be given your very serious consideration, and assure you that we desire to assist you in future plans as well as carry on our own particular functions. Sincerely yours,

Whereas space now available to the Geological Survey and the Natural History Survey on the campus of the University of Illinois at Urbana is inadequate both for present plans and normal future needs, and

Whereas the needs of these Surveys for expansion will be a continuing and increasingly important matter for which plans must be developed with foresight,

and

Whereas there seems but one direction in which space expansion logically can

be developed.

Therefore, the Board of Natural Resources and Conservation of the State of Illinois respectfully requests the University of Illinois to reserve the following area for the expansion of the Geological and Natural History Surveys on the University of Illinois campus, Champaign, Illinois:

That area adjacent to and west of the presently allotted Natural Resources Building area, bounded on the east by Sixth Street, the south by Pennsylvania Avenue, the west by Fourth Street and the north by Stadium Drive.

Approved in Quarterly Meeting February 24, 1948.

The State Natural History Survey, the State Water Survey, and the State Geological Survey are divisions of the State Department of Registration and Education. A State Board of Natural Resources and Conservation administers the research, investigational, and other scientific programs of the surveys including the selection and appointment of the scientific staff. The President of the University, or his representative, is by law a member of the Board.

I did not sign the resolution because: (1) as President of the University and as the executive agent of its Board of Trustees, I shall doubtless be asked by the Board of Trustees for a recommendation and therefore I should not commit myself in advance by signing the resolution as a member of the Board of Natural Resources and Conservation; and (2) the proposed plan for the general development of the communities of Champaign and Urbana and the University may conceivably affect the University's campus planning and assignments of areas.

In the meantime, the resolution has been referred to the University's Building Program Committee for its consideration and advice to the President.

This report was received for record.

EASEMENT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF POWER LINE ON ALLERTON FARMS

(6) The Illinois Power Company has requested an easement to build a power line along the north edge of the University of Illinois property in Section 14, Monticello Township. The Dean of the College of Agriculture reports that the granting of this easement will not affect the operation of the farms. The Dean of the College of Agriculture and the Comptroller recommend that the easement be granted to the Illinois Power Company.

I concur and recommend the adoption of the attached resolution.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the following resolution was adopted as recommended.

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is the owner of that part of the West One-half (W1/2) of the Southwest Quarter (SW1/4)

(lying North of the Sangamon River), Section Fourteen (14), Township Eighteen North (18N), Range Five (5), East of the Third Principal Meridian in Piatt County, Illinois, and

Whereas, the Illinois Power Company proposes to construct an electrical dis-

tribution system through that land, and

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois will benefit from the construction of such electrical distribution system in that electrical service will be available to certain properties owned by The Board of Trustees, and

Whereas, the Illinois Power Company has requested The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to grant to it an easement to permit the construc-

tion of such electrical distribution system,

Now therefore be it resolved, that the Comptroller and the Secretary of The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois are hereby authorized in behalf and in the name of The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to execute an easement to the Illinois Power Company to permit such Company, its successors and assigns, to enter upon the land owned by The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and described as

"That part of the West One-half (W½) of the Southwest Quarter (SW¼) (lying North of the Sangamon River), Section Fourteen (14), Township Eighteen North (18N), Range Five (5), East of the Third Principal Meridian in Piatt County, Illinois."

and to construct, operate, repair, maintain, patrol, remove, relocate, and reconstruct thereon an electric transmission or distribution line or system, including the right to cut and trim trees and shrubbery and remove other obstacles to the extent necessary to keep them clear of said electric line.

EASEMENT FOR TELEPHONE CABLE ON WRIGHT FARMS

(7) The Illinois Bell Telephone Company has requested permission to install and maintain an underground cable along the south edge of Wright Farm No. 3 in DeKalb County for a distance of approximately 260 rods. It has offered to pay fifty cents a rod for this privilege, plus reimbursement for damages to fences and growing crops arising from the construction and maintenance of this system.

The Dean of the College of Agriculture and the Comptroller recommend that the Illinois Bell Telephone Company be granted an easement.

I concur and recommend the adoption of the attached resolution.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the following resolution was adopted as recommended.

Now therefore be it resolved, That the Comptroller and the Secretary of The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois are hereby authorized in behalf and in the name of The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to execute an easement to the Illinois Bell Telephone Company to permit such Company, its successors and assigns, to enter upon the land owned by The Board

of Trustees of the University of Illinois and described as

"The South One-half (S½), of the South One-half (S½), of the South One-half (S½), of the South One-half (S½) of Section Nineteen (19), Township Forty North (40N), Range Three East (3E) of the Third Principal Meridian, located in the County of DeKalb, State of Illinois,"

and to construct, operate, maintain, replace and remove a communication system consisting of such underground cables, wires, conduit, drains, and splicing boxes and surface testing terminals, markers and other appurtenances as the Company may from time to time require upon, over, under and across such property for a consideration of fifty cents (50¢) per rod it being understood and agreed that such communication system shall be located within a strip of land two (2) rods wide.

SALE OF ADDITIONAL CABLE TO THE ILLINOIS BELL TELEPHONE COMPANY

(8) The Board of Trustees on April 18, 1946 (Minutes, page 1065), authorized the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to execute a contract with the Illinois Bell Telephone Company for (a) the installation of an Illinois Bell Telephone Company PBX exchange to centralize all University telephone service on the Urbana Campus, and (b) the sale of the present University owned intercommunicating exchange and cable plant for the sum of \$18,000.

Additional telephone cable over and above that originally contemplated is available to be sold to the Illinois Bell Telephone Company at an additional sum of \$16,002.70, or a total price including the original equipment of \$34,002.70.

The Director of the Physical Plant and the Comptroller recommend the sale of this equipment at a total price of \$34,002.70.

I concur and recommend the adoption of the attached resolution.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, the following resolution was adopted as recommended.

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, at its meeting on April 18, 1946, authorized the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board to execute a contract with the Illinois Bell Telephone Company for:

(a) The installation of an Illinois Bell Telephone Company PBX Exchange

to centralize all University telephone service on the Urbana Campus, and

(b) The sale of the present University owned intercommunicating exchange and cable plant for the sum of eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000.00).

And whereas, in accordance with their authority, the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board of Trustees did, on October 14, 1946, execute such a contract with the Illinois Bell Telephone Company,

And whereas, it is now advisable to sell to the Illinois Bell Telephone Company house cable for the sale price of thirteen thousand and twelve dollars and forty-nine cents (\$13,012.49) and buried cable for the sale price of two thousand nine hundred and ninety dollars and twenty-one cents (\$2,990.21) the sale of which was contemplated at the time of the execution of the contract, but no determination could be made at that time as to the amount of additional cable to be sold.

Be it therefore resolved, that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be and the same hereby are authorized to execute a contract with the Illinois Bell Telephone Company and to execute a bill of sale to such company for the sale of the University owned intercommunicating exchange and cable plant referred to in the minutes of the meeting of the Board on April 18, 1946, house cable for the sale price of thirteen thousand and twelve dollars and forty-nine cents (\$13,012.49) and buried cable for the sum of two thousand nine hundred and ninety dollars and twenty-one cents (\$2,990.21), making a total sale price of thirty-four thousand two dollars and seventy cents (\$34,002.70).

SALE OF DUPLICATE JOURNALS FROM HERTZLER LIBRARY

(9) In 1944 (Minutes, July 18, page 14), Dr. Arthur E. Hertzler gave the University a collection of medical books. It includes duplicate copies of a number of sets of journals which, although valuable, are not needed by the University. The Director of the Library recommends that such duplicates be sold and the proceeds used to purchase other works to be added to the Hertzler Library. A tentative estimate of the receipts from such sales of approximately 2,875 volumes is \$8,625. There are no restrictions in the gift which prevent such a sale.

I recommend that the sale of these publications be authorized and that the proceeds be appropriated for additional purchases for the Hertzler Library.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this sale was authorized and the proceeds were made available for the purchase of books as recommended, by

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR AIR-CONDITIONING INSTALLATION IN ROOM 157 NATURAL HISTORY BUILDING

(11) The following bids have been received for an air-conditioning installation in Room 157 Natural History Building. This space is used for photosynthesis research by Professor Robert Emerson. The humidity is so high in the summer months that it is impossible to make necessary electrical measurements. Air-conditioning will reduce humidity and make possible continuation of the research during the summer:

Professor Emerson, the Comptroller, and the Director of the Physical Plant Department recommend acceptance of the lowest bids on Proposals 1 and 2 of F. R. Inskip and Company in the total amount of \$4,570. Funds are available for this installation.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with F. R. Inskip and Company for \$4,570.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was awarded and authority given as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR PRACTICE ORGANS

(12) On September 26, 1947 (Minutes, page 827), the Board appropriated \$18,000 for the purchase of practice organs in the School of Music to replace two practice organs. Tentative specifications were prepared and submitted to several builders, discussions were carried on with those interested, and inspections were made of organs of various builders. The Director of the School of Music recommends that a contract for the two organs be made with Aeolian-Skinner Organ Company of Boston, Massachusetts, through their Chicago representative, Mr. Walter D. Hardy.

The University has had experience with organs built by six makers, including Aeolian-Skinner Company, which built the organ in Smith Music Hell This

The University has had experience with organs built by six makers, including Aeolian-Skinner Company which built the organ in Smith Music Hall. This organ has been the most satisfactory mechanically of any organ at the University. Less mechanical difficulty has been experienced and it has stood up well under the strain of constant playing to which University organs are subjected. From a

maintenance standpoint the Skinner organ is believed to be the best organ avail-

able. Its tonal quality is of the highest character.

This company also has pioneered in a somewhat different type of pipe organ known as the Baroque type which has been installed in several music schools. These schools report satisfaction with this instrument for training purposes. It is a small instrument that produces tonal effects previously to be had only in the largest organs. It is proposed that the University have one of the new organs built according to this design and the other in accordance with the more conventional design. In both cases the number of pipes and consequent scope of the instruments is greater than that of the original specifications. The bid of the Skinner Company on the two organs under the new specifications is only \$100 greater than its bid on the original specifications.

The total quoted cost of the two new organs is \$19,000 which is in excess of the special appropriation made for this purpose. The two organs being replaced, which will be of no use to the University, can probably be sold for an amount at least equal to this excess and it is requested that such receipts be appropriated for this purpose. The Director of the School of Music has agreed that any difference

may be taken out of his regular equipment appropriation.

The Director of Purchases and the Comptroller concur in this recommendation and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with the Aeolian-Skinner Organ Company for two practice organs for the School of Music for the total sum of \$19,000, payment to be made as the work of construction and installation progresses up to 75% of the purchase price, and the remaining payment to be made after installation and acceptance which is presently expected by September 1, 1949. I concur.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this purchase was authorized and the appropriation of receipts made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR REPLACEMENT OF ELEVATOR BRAKES IN RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was awarded and authority given as recommended.

ADDITIONS TO CONTRACTS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF TEMPORARY WAREHOUSE NO. 1 AND VETERANS' TEMPORARY RECREATION BUILDING

(14) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend:

I. An addition of \$2,075 to the contract with the Champaign Plumbing and Heating Company for the heating installation, not provided by the Federal Works Agency, in Temporary Warehouse No. 1.
2. An addition of \$2,895.31 to the contract with J. L. Simmons Company,

Incorporated, for the construction of the Veterans' Temporary Recreation Building.

These contract additions are necessary to carry out the University's obligations on the projects. Under FWA regulations the Government contractors on the buildings could not undertake doing the University's part of the work until all of the FWA contracts had been completed. The contractors are now free to do the University's work.

In the case of the warehouse the FWA installed the heating equipment in the building but the University must assume the cost of constructing a steam conduit

from the nearest source of supply to the building.

The Veterans' Temporary Recreation Building is being used for recreational activities and also as a Nursery School. Under Federal law, the FWA could not allocate this building to the University of Illinois as a Nursery School building, but could do so as a Veterans' Recreation Building. All construction and installations were therefore pointed toward such use. It is desirable to make certain installations in this building so that it can be used more effectively as a Nursery School. The contract addition recommended here is for improvements to make the building more usable for Nursery School purposes without detracting from its use as a recreation building.

Funds are budgeted for these improvements.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contract changes.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, these changes were authorized and authority given as recommended.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR THE NEW CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(15) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$1,120 to the contract with the John Felmley Company for general work on the Chemistry Building for diversion of a storm sewer encountered in the construction of the underground tunnel from the new building to the present tunnel connecting Noyes Laboratory and the Chemistry Annex. The sewer was not shown in any existing records.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be

authorized to execute this addition to the contract. Funds are available.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this addition to contract was approved and authority given as recommended.

ASSIGNMENTS OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FUNDS

(16) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has made assignments of its funds for the following purposes and requests approval of the same by the Board of Trustees:

IMPROVEMENTS AT THE STADIUM

- I. Food Service in the Southwest Tower. By paying the floor and making other improvements in the southwest tower, space can be provided for a cafeteria accommodating 300 patrons and two private dining rooms each accommodating 50 people. The estimated cost of this improvement is \$10,000. The Illinois Sport Service, with which the Athletic Association has a contract for food service at the Stadium, has agreed to provide and install at its expense the necessary equipment for operating the dining rooms. The facilities would take care of the training table during the football season and would also provide a public food service on days of football games.
- 2. Paving Under South Stand. It is desirable to complete the paving of the area west of the new truck entrance under the south stand to furnish storage space for bleachers and other equipment. The estimated cost of this improvement is \$3,000.

DEVELOPMENT OF GOLF COURSE

1. Contract with Ralph A. Bachert. - The Board of Trustees has authorized the use of Kimmel Farm in Tolono Township as a golf course to be constructed and operated by the Athletic Association. The farm is under lease to Ralph A. Bachert until March 15, 1949. He has agreed to surrender his lease and supply the Athletic Association with his labor, furnishing tractor, plow, disk, and harrow, from April 1, 1948, to January 1, 1949, for a total consideration of \$5,000. The Board of Directors has approved this arrangement and has made an assignment of \$5,000 from Athletic Association funds for this purpose.

2. Topographical Survey and Test Borings. — The Board of Directors has

also made an appropriation of \$2,500 for a topographical survey and test borings which are necessary in connection with the development of the golf course.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees approve these recommendations and actions of the Athletic Association Board of Directors.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these actions of the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association were approved and confirmed as recommended.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NONRECURRING EXPENDITURES

(17) The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures recommends assignments from the General Reserve Fund for the following

I. Small Homes Council for further improvements to Home Research Center

and Mumford House, \$5,500.

2. School of Physical Education for additional improvements in Room 305 George Huff Gymnasium, \$1,650. This assignment of funds was authorized by the President as an emergency because it was desirable to have the work done as soon as possible. Confirmation is requested.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these appropriations were made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson; no, none: absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell.

APPROPRIATION FROM SURPLUS AGRICULTURAL INCOME

(18) The University Research Board with the approval of the President of the University has assigned \$15,000 for the operation of a Radiocarbon Laboratory at Urbana. In addition, an appropriation will be necessary for remodeling and equipment.

The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures has approved the improvements in principle. A definite recommendation of an appropriation for the remodeling is being deferred until an accurate estimate of

the cost can be obtained.

It is estimated that the equipment for this laboratory will cost \$6,000. Funds are available in the accumulated receipts of the Department of Animal Science. The Dean of the College of Agriculture and the Comptroller recommend an appropriation of \$6,000 from surplus agricultural receipts for the equipment of the Radiocarbon Laboratory. Orders should be placed soon to expedite delivery. I concur.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell.

PURCHASE OF STOCK FOR LIGHT HORSE PROGRAM

(19) The Board of Trustees has approved (Minutes, September 26, 1947, page 826), a program of education and research in the breeding, feeding, and care of light horses. It has made an appropriation for operating expenses and a special appropriation for the purchase of the basic stock of animals needed for this project. The Department of Animal Science has been studying ways in which these purchases can best be carried out. Representatives have attended several auctions and sales to become acquainted with the kind of stock available and current prices. They have come to the conclusion that it would be unwise to attempt to purchase the needed stock at such sales. Preliminary contacts with various owners, both in Illinois and elsewhere, who might be interested and willing to make sales at reasonable prices, indicate that such purchases can be made below auction sale prices by direct negotiations with owners. Some additional inspections will be necessary to complete such purchases.

It is essential that the animals to be purchased be selected by competent representatives of the department. Prices can thus be set up through negotiation. The Head of the Department and the Dean of the College of Agriculture

The Head of the Department and the Dean of the College of Agriculture recommend, and the Director of Purchases and the Comptroller concur, that the Department of Animal Science be authorized to make selections of animals for this program, and to reach agreements on prices; and that the Director of Purchases be authorized to issue purchase orders for such selections when so recommended, the total of all purchases and other necessary expenses to be within the appropriation of \$20,000 made for this purpose.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these purchases were authorized as recommended.

PURCHASES

(20) There are submitted herewith recommendations for purchases for approval by the Board, and purchases authorized by the President of the University (see Appendix, page 1084).

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the purchases recommended were authorized, and the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed.

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS EXECUTED

(21) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed from February 11 to March 10, 1948 (see Appendix, page 1086).

This report was received for record.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PATENTS

Mr. Williamson, for the Committee on Patents, presented the following report of the Committee on matters referred to it on November 29, 1947 (page 926), and January 8, 1948 (page 955).

1. Recommendation that patentable discoveries showing promise of commercial importance be released to the discoverers as agents of the University of Illinois Foundation. The Committee recommends approval.

2. Recommendation that a discovery by William J. Fry and H. L. VanVelzer of "Supersonic detection of infra-red radiation" be released to the discoverers, subject to the Rights of the Air Materiel Command. The Committee recommends approval.

3. Recommendation that a discovery by L. F. Audrieth and R. A. Penneman

of procedure for concentration of anhydrous hydrazine be released to the discoverers, so that they may be free to bring it to the attention of industries interested in this method. The Committee recommends approval.

4. Recommendation that a discovery by William J. Fry of "Continuously variable resonant frequency crystal systems, composed of a single material or any combination of materials," be released to the University of Illinois Foundation of the Uni tion, with the recommendation that it work out a cooperative arrangement with the discoverer; or in the event that the Foundation is not interested, that the discovery be released to the discoverer. The Committee recommends approval.

5. Recommendation that a discovery by L. F. Audrieth and O. F. Hill of "a simple procedure for the preparation of monofluophosphates" be released to the

discoverers. The Committee recommends approval.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these several recommendations were approved and adopted.

PURCHASE OF WATER FOR UNIVERSITY

Mr. McKelvey, for the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, presented a recommendation that the Board enter into a contract with the Illinois Water Service Company for the purchase of all water required by the University at Urbana and Champaign, under the following conditions, formulated in a report to President Stoddard by Mr. Lloyd Morey and Mr. C. S. Havens.

In accordance with a request of the Buildings and Grounds Committee, we have given further consideration to the possibility of the University purchasing its entire water supply from the Illinois Water Service Company.

As a result of negotiations with representatives from the water company, the Illinois Water Service Company will agree to the following in the event the

University contracts to purchase its entire supply:

1. To provide a water supply and all auxiliary equipment including pumps, filtration plant, storage facilities, etc., to meet the recommendations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters. The Illinois Water Service Company further agrees to show evidence that steps have been taken to comply with the recommendations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, within six months after receiving the report.

2. To submit annually to the University such data, as may be requested, indicating the changes in the local water consumption, characteristics of pumping,

operation, etc.

- 3. That the division of responsibility for the maintenance of facilities will be at the property line of the University at which points all metering facilities will be located unless changed at the request of the University. The Illinois Water Service Company will provide and maintain all metering facilities including bypass piping and valves on either side of the meter. Such meter or meters shall be of the recording type.
- 4. That in addition to meeting the specific recommendations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, the Illinois Water Service Company further agrees to conduct such studies as may be necessary for the long-term future water supply of the University and the community.

The University will be asked to agree:

I. To discontinue pumping except: (a) To maintain, in a satisfactory operating condition, existing equipment for emergencies. (b) To provide raw water for special uses - such as biological research. Such water, if made available to the academic departments, will not be cross-connected with the other water service facilities. (c) If and when the Illinois Water Service Company has not taken steps within six months after receiving the National Board of Fire Underwriters' report to insure and provide an adequate supply for the University and the community including that necessary for fire protection.

2. To comply with all regulations applicable to other customers relative to the use and conservation of water with the understanding that: (a) The University will be given a period of three to five years within which to correct existing violations of such regulations. (b) For industrial use, as defined by the Illinois Commerce Commission, water may be used for cooling purposes. In the event of a disagreement on the application of the regulations, further interpretations can and will be obtained from the Illinois Commerce Commission.

3. To pay in accordance with established rate schedules for water as metered

for all isolated properties.

4. To assume the cost of constructing a pit for metering facilities, or if the University requests that the meters be installed in the Filtration Plant, the University will provide and maintain the piping from the University property line into

The Illinois Water Service Company is proposing to submit the following rate schedule to the Illinois Commerce Commission increasing existing unit rates by approximately 50 per cent in the quantity brackets in which practically all of the University water will be purchased:

In recognition of the quantity of water to be purchased by the University, the company has offered to request the Illinois Commerce Commission to approve a rate of 9 cents per 100 cubic feet on all water supplied over 300,000 cubic feet per quarter. The lowest rate previously proposed was 10 cents per 100 cubic feet for all over 30,000 cubic feet per quarter. The above rates contemplate softened water.

The rate of 9 cents per 100 cubic feet, although not a major reduction, is materially below the estimated cost to the University of supplying its own water from a new source which would have to be developed in an area approximately six to nine miles from the community. In a report submitted to the Board of Trustees Buildings and Grounds Committee under date of January 5, 1948 estimates on operation and maintenance were included which indicated that the lowest cost of a new University water supply would be 11.22 cents per 100 cubic feet (2.22 cents per 100 cubic feet over the rate quoted by the Illinois Water Service Company) based on double the present consumption. On the basis of present consumption, the rate for softened water would be 13.2 cents per 100 cubic feet. As also indicated in this report, an immediate minimum capital investment of \$493,000 (plus an additional \$220,000 to provide softened water) would be necessary. This report was prepared by the University's engineers, Alvord, Burdick

and Howson, who are also serving as engineers for the water company.

As a result of negotiations with the Illinois Water Service Company, it is our conclusion:

I. That the University's future water supply will be adequately protected

through the above outlined measures.

- 2. That it will be more economical for the University to purchase its water supply from the Illinois Water Service Company than to develop a new supply if the rate of 9 cents per 100 cubic feet is approved by the Illinois Commerce Commission.
- 3. That the University is adequately protected as to: (a) scientific needs; (b) reasonable assurance of adequate supply; (c) right to resume its own pumping in emergency or failure of the company to meet its commitments.

At the present time there are only four brackets. The fifth has been added here to

permit comparison.

We, therefore, request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with the Illinois Water Service Company in accordance with the above conditions and subject to approval of the Illinois Commerce Commission.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this contract was authorized as recommended.

HOUSING DEVELOPMENT NEAR NEW GOLF COURSE

Mr. McKelvey, for the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, reported a recommendation that, in view of studies and reports made by Professor W. H. Scheick on the probable success of a small-cost housing development near the golf course to be constructed on the Kimmel Farm, and in view of the drainage problem and the cost of drainage improvements necessary to make the area suitable for housing, no attempt be made at this time to further such development.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this recommendation was adopted.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

May 21-22, 1948



The May meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was held on Friday, May 21, and Saturday, May 22, 1948, at the Illini Union Building, in Urbana, according to the following schedule:

May 21, 8 p.m. — Executive session as in Committee of the Whole.

May 22, 9:30 a.m. — Open session.

When the Board convened, the following members were present: President Fornof, General Davis, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson. Mr. McLaughlin took his place with the

Board during the evening.

President Stoddard was present; also Provost C. R. Griffith, Assistants to the President A. J. Janata and Wilbur Schramm, Secretary H. E. Cunningham, Comptroller Lloyd Morey, Legal Counsel W. E. Britton, and, during part of the evening, Mr. D. E. Dickason, Director of Nonacademic Personnel, Mr. C. S. Havens, Director of the Physical Plant Department, and Mr. E. L. Stouffer, Architect.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the agenda for the meeting and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

PROPERTY PURCHASES

(1) Purchase of the following properties is recommended as a part of the special program of acquisition of resident properties for faculty housing authorized by

the Board of Trustees:

1. 407 West Washington Street, Urbana — \$16,000. Edwin Park, owner. Lot size 60' x 135'. House—frame, 7 rooms (plus enclosed sleeping porch); living room, study, dining room, and kitchen on first floor; three bedrooms, sleeping porch, and bath on second floor. Hand-fired warm air furnace, gas water heater, two-car garage. The house was constructed 26 years ago, has been well maintained, and is in excellent condition.

Appraised at \$16,500; purchase price, \$16,000. Option, \$500.
2. 207 West Washington Street, Urbana—\$12,000. Robert D. Carmichael, owner. Lot size 60' x 135'. House—frame, 8 rooms; living room, dining room, kitchen, study, bedroom, and part bath on first floor; three bedrooms and bath on second floor. Hand fired warm air furnace, gas water heater, one-car garage.

Appraised at \$14,000; purchase price negotiated with owner, \$12,000. Option,

\$300.

The house will require a thorough internal overhauling as well as some the standard of other houses of this type which exterior repairs to bring it up to the standard of other houses of this type which are being acquired by the University for rental to the faculty. This was considered in the negotiations with the owner and the price has been set to allow for the expenditure of up to \$3,000 for repairs. The appraisal of \$14,000 was on the house in its present condition.

I recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the expenditure of \$15,000

for the acquisition and repair of this property.

3. 301 West Pennsylvania Avenue, Urbana — \$19,250. Robert Thompson, owner. Lot size 60' x 115'. House — frame, 7 rooms; living room, dining room, kitchen, and study on first floor; three bedrooms and bath on second floor. Oilfired warm air heater (new installation), automatic gas water heater, water softener, new kitchen equipment, one-car garage. The house was purchased two years ago by present owner, who made extensive internal and external improvements, and it is in an excellent state of maintenance.

Appraised at \$18,500; purchase price, \$19,250. The owner has an appraisal of \$20,000; the University's appraisal is \$18,500. The owner agreed on a price half

way between the two. Option, \$500.

4. 709 West Michigan Avenue, Urbana — \$22,500. Warren A. Ruth, owner. Lot size 100' x 193'; well landscaped. House — frame, shingle siding, 7 rooms; living room, dining room, kitchen, general room (which may be used as a study or library), master bedroom with complete bath on the first floor; two bedrooms and bath on the second floor; large storage space in attic which could be converted into another room. Large porch in front of house and a terrace in the rear. Stoker warm air heating recently overhauled. Automatic gas water heater. The house has been occupied by only one family, the present owner, who built it 34 years ago. It has been well maintained and is in good condition.

Original asking price, \$28,000; appraised at \$22,500; purchase price, \$22,500. Option, \$200. In negotiations with the owner it was agreed that the University would pay the 1948 real estate taxes payable in 1949. The 1947 taxes payable in

1948 amounted to \$268.15.

The University has secured from the Champaign County Real Estate Board an independent appraisal of each of these properties. Mr. Newton C. Farr of Farr and Company, Chicago, who has served as consultant to the University on real estate acquisitions, was also consulted. He has inspected the properties and concurs in the prices recommended.

The University has purchased options on these properties, as indicated in each case, to June 1, 1948.

As reported to the Board at a previous meeting, the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has also decided to purchase a house for rental to a member of the Athletic Department staff. Authority is requested to transfer any one of the options on the houses now being recommended for purchase in the event the Athletic Association officials decide to purchase it.¹

On motion of Mr. Davis, these purchases were authorized as recommended, and the appropriation was made, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer.

On motion of Mr. Davis, authority to transfer any one of these houses to the Athletic Association was given as recommended.

EMPLOYMENT OF FOREIGN STUDENTS

(2) On June 28, 1940 (Minutes, page 978), the Board of Trustees adopted a policy that no individual shall be appointed to the faculty or employed in any other capacity who is not a citizen of the United States unless he has declared his intention of becoming naturalized, except for temporary appointments of visiting professors and lecturers. The Board subsequently amended the policy to permit appointments of foreign students to scholarships and fellowships and also authorized, for the duration of World War II, the employment of students who are citizens of countries with which the United States was allied.

Various department heads consider the work of their departments handicapped by these restrictions on employment of foreign graduate students. In many cases it is not possible to secure the services of citizens of the United States for a particular job, especially on short notice as, for example, when the enrollment in certain courses increases beyond what had been anticipated and it is necessary to secure additional staff immediately. A competent foreign student may be as useful as a competent American student. At a time when departments face serious shortages in staffs they are handicapped in not having an opportunity to use an available supply of foreign graduate students. Furthermore, a competent foreign student may render valuable services by virtue of the fact that he is a foreigner.

foreigner.

The restrictions in regard to the employment of foreign graduate students have been responsible in some cases for the deflection to other universities of foreign graduate students whom the departments concerned would like to have held.

This matter has recently been studied by Dean Louis N. Ridenour of the Graduate College, Dean M. L. Enger of the College of Engineering, and Arthur Hamilton, Assistant Dean of Men for Foreign Students, who recommend that the existing policy be amended to provide that:

"Foreign students may be given part-time employment (subject to the regulations of the United States Immigration Service) when equally well-qualified American students are not available."

I concur in this recommendation except that I would amend it to read as follows:

"Foreign graduate students may be given part-time teaching and research appointments, or may be given other part-time University employment, subject to the regulations of the United States Immigration Service, when equally well-qualified American students are not available."

Mr. Williamson offered a motion that this recommendation, as amended, be approved. On vote, the motion did not receive a majority vote, and the chair declared that it was lost.

WAGES OF JANITORS

(3) A suggested basis of agreement between the University and Local No. 119, Building Service Employees Union International, for the establishment of the principles of paying prevailing rate for janitor service on the Urbana campus is presented.

President Stoddard and Mr. Dickason commented on this matter. After full discussion, on motion of Mr. Nickell, the statement was

approved as a basis of further negotiation, and the President was requested to send the statement to the Executive Committee for its consideration and action.

WAGES OF OPERATING ENGINEERS IN CHICAGO DIVISIONS

Mr. Dickason commented on the status of negotiations with the operating engineers in the Chicago divisions.

Mr. McLaughlin took his place with the Board during the discus-

sion of this matter.

Action was deferred until the June meeting.

WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL GENERAL CONTRACT

(4) The general contract for the construction of the Residence Hall for Women was authorized by the Board of Trustees on December 28, 1946 (Minutes, page 194), and was awarded to the Warner Construction Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, on two proposals:

> No. 1. Excavating, foundation walls, and rearrangement of utilities.....\$ 180 000 No. 2. Balance of general work to complete building... I 820 000

Both bids were on the basis of a cost plus fixed fee contract with a contractor's fee of \$30,000 and a guaranteed limit of cost of \$180,000 on No. 1, and a contractor's fee of \$160,000 and a guaranteed limit of cost of \$1,820,000 on No. 2. Under this contract, savings below the guaranteed maximum are to be divided 75

per cent to the University and 25 per cent to the contractor.

Completion date of construction under proposal No. 1 was June 28, 1947; completion date of construction required by proposal No. 2 is 365 days "after the Contractor is authorized by the Owner to proceed and perform the work as described in Proposal No. 2." Notice by the University to the Contractor to proceed with No. 2 was given July 16, 1947, and the completion date therefore is July 16, 1948. This provision in the contract was necessary since at the time it was let the University did not have sufficient funds to complete the project.

An appropriation of \$1,500,000 was made for the biennium of 1945-1947 of which \$258,250 was expended during the biennium and the balance lapsed. An appropriation of \$2,000,000 was made for the biennium of 1947-1949 and became effective on the approval of the same by the Governor.

Construction work has not proceeded as rapidly as it should and default by the Contractor in the time of performance is virtually a certainty. Almost from the beginning of construction, controversies with the Contractor over performance have arisen and a large number remain unsettled. The Contractor admits probable default and, in the main, attributes the cause to his lack of freedom of operation under the present contract, particularly his ability to offer without limit such employment rates or other inducements as he may consider necessary to obtain sufficient tradesmen. The Contractor claims that he can not get a sufficient number of bricklayers, carpenters, and other tradesmen to enable him to accelerate construction and believes that he should be allowed by the University to pay premium rates to attract a sufficient number. The University, except for emergency purposes, can not approve the payment of such premium rates because (a) the University is committed by law and policy to the payment of prevailing rates, and (b) the granting of permission to the Contractor to pay rates above scale would deflect available labor from other construction work for the University, i.e., from the Mechanical Engineering Building and the Electrical Engineering Building, to the prejudice of their completion in accordance with the terms of the contracts. The Contractor proposes that, as a solution of the problem, the present cost plus fixed fee with a guaranteed maximum cost contract be modified by the elimination of the "cost plus" feature and the substitution of a "lump sum" provision. The Contractor has made no statement as to whether he wants the proposed lump sum to be the present guaranteed maximum or a greater or

Numerous conferences have taken place between representatives of the Physical Plant Department, the University's Architects, and other University

officers and the Contractor and his representatives with respect to various detailed matters of controversy such as the proper rentals for equipment, transfers of equipment from the Women's Residence Hall job to the tunnel job, time schedules, and other problems.

The Contractor now proposes:

I. That the present contract be changed from a cost plus guaranteed maximum basis to a fixed sum. The amount of the sum, however, was not discussed but, in view of statements by the Contractor "that there would not be a saving to the owner under the present contract," it is assumed that this amount would not be less than \$2,000,000.

2. That if the above change in the contract is approved, the Warner Construction Company will complete the project by September except for interior painting. Furthermore, a surety bond will be provided as a guarantee of completion if the proposal is acceptable.

3. That the company is unable to submit a progress schedule based on the present contract.

These proposals have been reviewed carefully by the Physical Plant Depart-

ment, the Legal Counsel, and the Comptroller. Their conclusions are:

A. In our opinion, proposal (1) above if granted would represent a material change in the contract and we seriously question the right of the University to take such action.

B. The offer to complete the project by September I and to furnish a surety bond as a guarantee is no additional protection to the University over its present position. The present contract provides for completion by July 16, 1948, on which the Contractor has submitted a surety bond.

C. At this time, it is impossible to know definitely whether the University will either gain or lose by the acceptance of the offer. In view of the legal restrictions on the University in awarding and changing contracts together with the impossibility of determining whether the University will gain or lose by such a change, the proposals should not be accepted by the University.

This report is presented for consideration and action by the Board.

The President of the University stated that since the preparation of this report, a request has been forwarded through Mr. Livingston for a hearing before the Executive Committee for the discussion of this matter.

Professor Britton presented a memorandum in reply to the statement of the Warner Construction Company accompanying the letter of Mr. T. L. Warner to Mr. Livingston, dated May 12, 1948.

President Fornof stated that he had notified Mr. Warner that the Board would give him and his associates a hearing at noon on Saturday, May 22. (See page 1113).

Mr. C. S. Havens and Mr. E. L. Stouffer commented on this

After full discussion, action on this matter was deferred until after the hearing. In this connection, Mr. Davis requested that the Secretary record him as voting against any change in the contract with the Warner Construction Company.

CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF BETATRON AT THE CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(5) Bids have been received for construction work to house and service the new betatron which is being purchased for the Chicago Professional Colleges.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of the following contracts to the lowest bidders:

General work to E. H. Marhoefer, Jr., Company, Chicago....\$18 717 00 Electrical work to B-H Electric Company, Chicago...... 4 997 70 Heating, plumbing, and ventilating work to Cutler and Price,

Funds are available in appropriations made by the Board of Trustees for this project.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these contracts.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these contracts were authorized as recommended.

Cunningham, Secretary, Mr. Lloyd Morey, Comptroller, and Mr. W. E. Britton, Legal Counsel; also, during the open session, Director J. F. Wright.

HOUSING AT MEDICAL CENTER

Dr. Ivy presented the following letter and discussed it.

May 10, 1948

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois

GENTLEMEN:

With the permission of President Stoddard I should like to call a critical situation to the attention of the Board of Trustees.

When I came to the University of Illinois in September, 1946, I found the

staff in urgent need of housing.

I took steps to remedy that situation and would have had it remedied if it had not been found that the FHA will not insure loans on housing in the Medical Center District. On several occasions I have tried to obtain an exception from the FHA and have failed. The FHA refuses to insure loans because of a "reverter clause" in the Medical Center Act. The details relative to this matter and my efforts over the last fifteen months to remedy the situation need not be mentioned, since they are irrelevant to the point I desire to make, namely, that no more time should be lost in providing staff housing as soon as it can be built.

For this reason I am appealing through President Stoddard to the Board for

assistance.

I have observed that a private real estate concern is constructing an apartment building which provides priorities for renting the apartments to the staff members of the University of Chicago. The rentals will range from \$65 for two-

room dwellings to \$150 for five rooms. The building will contain 124 suites and will cost \$1,000,000. The building is covered with an FHA loan of \$749,000.

If such an arrangement can be negotiated by the University of Chicago, I see no reason why similar arrangements can not be negotiated by the University of Illinois. A similar building located just east or north of the Medical Center District (preferably east, since that is the first slum clearance project of the Chicago Housing Authority) would meet about half of our staff needs for housing as determined by a recent survey.

With the influence that the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois may exert on private capital and builders of the Chicago area, and in view of the desirability of investing near the Medical Center, I believe the construction of an apartment building on the border of the Medical Center, with arrangements similar to those obtained by the University of Chicago, could be started before September 1st.

SITE FOR NEW Y.M.C.A. BUILDING IN CHICAGO

OPINION ON TAXATION

Mr. Britton reported on the status of various attempts to tax property owned by the University.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the Executive Committee was authorized to release the opinion of Chapman and Cutler when received.

OPEN SESSION

The Board convened in open session at 10 a.m.

MINUTES APPROVED

The Secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of April 10, 1948. On motion of Mr. Nickell, the minutes were approved as printed on pages 1055 to 1090 above.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

DISSOLUTION OF AGREEMENT ENTERED INTO MARCH 26, 1923, BETWEEN THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS AND THE OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION CONCERNING THE HIGH SCHOOL VISITOR'S OFFICE

(1) This agreement provides for a sharing, by the two offices, of the authoritative inspection of public four-year high schools. In effect, the University of Illinois has maintained this office for accreditation purposes as an agency of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. In downstate areas the division has been geographical, the University and the Office of Public Instruction alternating; in Chicago the inspection has been carried on jointly. A final provision of the agreement states that it "may be dissolved without prejudice at any time upon the request of either of the agreeing parties."

While the agreement was made in 1923 between President David Kinley and Dr. F. G. Blair, Superintendent of Public Instruction, with subsequent confirmation by the Board of Trustees of the University, I feel that a matter of policy is involved and I am, therefore, bringing it to the attention of the Board for action. Following the agreement referred to above, the Board authorized the appointment of a Senate committee to implement it. Changes will be indicated in the functions of this committee, and, of course, staff adjustments will need to be made. The actual machinery of inspection and accreditation as carried on by the University follows the action of the Board of Trustees dated May 10, 1935:

"There shall be a Committee on Admissions from Secondary Schools which shall be a committee of the University Senate and which shall consist of rot

"There shall be a Committee on Admissions from Secondary Schools which shall be a committee of the University Senate and which shall consist of not fewer than five nor more than seven members. No two members shall be from the same department and not more than two members shall be from any one college of the University. The High School Visitor and the Registrar shall be members of this committee. The High School Visitor shall be, ex officio, its secretary.

"The Committee on Admissions from Secondary Schools shall supervise the accrediting of high schools by the University of Illinois for admission to the University of Illinois. It shall be the duty of this committee to determine, with the approval of the University Senate, the conditions for the accrediting of high schools, to specify the criteria by which they shall be evaluated, to give advice and guidance to the secondary schools, and to encourage and promote the development of sound educational policies pertaining to secondary education in the State of Illinois. The High School Visitor, with the approval of the Committee on Admissions from Secondary Schools, shall publish information pertaining to the accrediting of high schools and such other material as may appear necessary to fulfill the functions of the Committee."

This matter of accreditation by University of Illinois staff members has been explored in the past few years, the studies having been carried on by the Senate Committee on Educational Policy, the office of the Provost, the College of Education, and the High School Visitor's Office. They indicate that the University of Illinois should discontinue formal inspections, devoting the talent and funds available to research and to field services and conferences. Along with other educational institutions in the State we are already engaged in an elaborate study of the secondary school curriculum and in programs of research and advice concerning the reorganization of the schools of Illinois. We plan to maintain such functions at a high professional level. We feel that it is valuable to all concerned to keep the high schools in close contact with the work and resources of the University. We do not feel, however, that accreditation is a necessary condition of such helpfulness; it may, in fact, operate to reduce effectiveness.

As far back as 1944, the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Admissions

from Secondary Schools pointed out certain weaknesses in the present arrange-

ment:

A. Related functions are scattered and uncoordinated.

B. The University controls unduly the high-school education of pupils who will not attend the University.

C. Inspection of high schools by the University does not necessarily lead to

better high schools and may lead to poorer ones.

D. Inspection by the University overemphasizes secondary education and underemphasizes elementary and adult education.

E. The present system does not send to the University the kind of students who most need a University education.

F. The requirements of the University regarding the pattern of high-school subjects can not be defended. G. School inspection and service to the schools (i.e., by the University of

Illinois) can not be successfully combined.

H. Service to the schools should be a function of the College of Education and the University Extension Service, not of the High School Visitor's Office.

I. No other state university follows a plan similar to ours in dealing with the

secondary schools.

J. Even if the present system were continued, the rules and controls governing the secondary schools should be simplified and made more relevant to the

educational process.

Of course, these weaknesses are relative and they are balanced to some degree by special activities in the High School Visitor's Office. I should say that increasingly the Office has emphasized its responsibility in discussion and demonstration; it has set up some very effective conferences in various areas. Its chief value now is not in inspectional enterprises but in terms of professional leadership. In recommending a reversion of the full responsibility for inspection to the State Department of Public Instruction, we contemplate the retention and expansion of these professional services in the College of Education.

The University, of course, retains full control over its requirements for the

admission of students.

I should point out that some of our educational friends are fearful that the withdrawal of the University from these inspection, policing, and accrediting services will have unhappy effects. However, joint conferences held recently between the officers of the Illinois Secondary School Principals' Association and the officers of the University did not yield any explicit argument against the proposed transfer, but only the general feeling that in some fashion the work would

be affected by "politics." All concerned have expressed confidence in the present Superintendent of Public Instruction, but they may not feel that his office can continue to be as objective and fair-minded as the visitors going out from the University. However, we have no evidence of differences in the approach of the professional workers as between Springfield and Urbana; visitors from either office sometimes temper their recommendations, not with politics, but with expediency. It is evident that the original agreement called for a meeting of minds between the two groups with respect to methods of inspection, standards, reports, and decisions.

On May 1st the history of this enterprise and the arguments for and against the present plan were reviewed in my office. Following this meeting Mr. Vernon L. Nickell, Superintendent of Public Instruction, concurred in the proposal to dissolve the agreement, returning the High School Visitor's Office entirely to the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. With respect to the staff members involved who have academic tenure, we shall make arrangements to continue their services in the University, unless they are offered positions on the staff of the Superintendent of Public Instruction and desire to transfer. Appropriate changes can be made now in the internal budget of the University while a permanent adjustment can be made in the budget of the new biennium.

Accordingly, I recommend that the High School Visitor's Office in the University be abolished as of September 1, 1948, and that the agreement of March 26, 1923, be dissolved.

President Stoddard and Mr. Nickell commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were adopted. Mr. Nickell asked to be recorded as "present and not voting."

ACADEMIC CALENDAR, 1948-1949

(2) At the meeting of the Board of Trustees on January 8, 1948 (Minutes, pages 966-68), I presented the University's calendar for the departments at Urbana-Champaign, Chicago Undergraduate Division, and the Galesburg Undergraduate Division for the academic year 1948-1949.

The University Senate has approved the following changes to provide more time between the first and second semesters, this being applicable only to the

departments at Urbana-Champaign:

On motion of Mr. Davis, these changes were approved.

SERVICES OF PROFESSOR H. C. M. CASE TO UNITED STATES SENATE

(3) As a matter of official record, I wish to report that Professor H. C. M. Case, Head of the Department of Agricultural Economics, has been given leave of absence without pay from April 16, 1948, and continuing until further notice, so that he may serve as consultant to the United States Senate Subcommittee on Appropriations for Agriculture. He was given a leave of absence without pay for similar service from May 12 to July 12, 1947.

Professor L. J. Norton has been designated as Acting Head of the Depart-

ment to serve during Professor Case's absence.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this report was received for record.

SERVICES OF DEAN JOHN B. YOUMANS TO THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY

(4) The Department of the Army is sending a mission of experts to Europe to make a nutritional survey of the people in the Bizonal Areas and has requested the services of Dean John B. Youmans on this mission. This will require his

absence from the University for a period of two to three weeks from about the tenth of May.

I have authorized a leave of absence with pay for Dean Youmans so that he may render this service to the United States Army.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this report was received for record.

APPOINTMENT OF JOSEPH GERMANO TO ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF INSTITUTE OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

(5) I recommend the appointment of Mr. Joseph Germano, East Chicago, Indiana, President of the Illinois State Industrial Union Council and Director of District 31 of the United Steelworkers of America, CIO, as a member of the advisory committee of the Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations. Mr. Germano will replace Mr. James Matson who has resigned.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this appointment was made as recommended.

CHANGE IN STATUS OF DIRECTOR OF NURSES IN THE RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL HOSPITALS

(6) The Vice-President in charge of the Chicago Professional Colleges recommends that the position of Director of Nursing Service in the Research and Educational Hospitals, which is now a civil service classification, be removed from civil service and be designated as an academic-administrative position.

I concur.

Dr. Ivy commented on this matter.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, these recommendations were approved.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE 1948 SUMMER SESSION

(7) The Dean of the Summer Session has submitted a budget for the 1948 Summer Session (see Appendix, page 1124). The budget provides for an eight-week session at Urbana-Champaign, at the Chicago and Galesburg Undergraduate Divisions, and at the College of Pharmacy. Salaries of present members of the faculty who are being recommended for appointments to the Summer Session staff are computed on the basis of two-ninths of the salary of the academic year for two months of summer service. This is in accordance with the terms of employment of the academic, administrative, research, and extension staffs authorized by the Board of Trustees on January 8, 1948 (Minutes, page 952). The budget proposed totals \$617,801 for Urbana-Champaign, \$92,039 for the Chicago Undergraduate Division, \$17,503 for the Galesburg Undergraduate Division, and \$2,139 for the College of Pharmacy.

I recommend that:

- 1. The appointments to the Summer Session staff be approved as submitted.
- 2. All appointments or contracts for service during the Summer Session include a provision permitting reduction in time and salary or cancellation of the contract in the event that enrollment in certain courses or sections thereof does not warrant continuation of the appointment on the basis originally recommended.

not warrant continuation of the appointment on the basis originally recommended.

3. The President of the University be authorized to make such changes and adjustments, including additional appointments and acceptance of resignations, as are necessary in accordance with the needs of the University.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, these recommendations were approved, and authority was given as requested.

HARRY G. AND HARRIETTE A. WRIGHT SCHOLARSHIPS

(8) Under the will of the late Senator Harry G. Wright of De Kalb, and pursuant to an agreement entered into by the Board of Trustees on October 29, 1943, with the executor of Mrs. Harriette A. Wright's estate for settlement of litiga-

tion and a division of the properties involved, the University of Illinois has acquired four farms, totaling 952 acres, in De Kalb County. Senator Wright's

will includes the following provision relating to his bequest:

"Fourth: Subject to the foregoing I give, devise and bequeath all the rest, residue and remainder of my estate, of whatsoever kind or character, and wheresoever situated, to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois at Urbana, Illinois, the same to become the absolute property of said University of Illinois, to be known as the Harry G. Wright and Harriette A. Wright Endowment, to be administered by the College of Agriculture of said University in so far as constitution in the industry of Illinois, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois. practicable in the judgment of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

"It is my desire that the devise and bequest to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois herein made shall be administered and used for the purpose of promoting agricultural education and for founding scholarships, but nevertheless the use made of the devise and bequest hereunder shall rest in the sole discretion and judgment of said Board of Trustees."

When Senator Wright conferred with University officials about his proposed bequest, he presented certain suggestions made by him and Mrs. Wright for using the income. While the University is the absolute owner of the farms without restriction, there is at least a moral obligation to consider the wishes and

Durposes of Senator and Mrs. Wright in setting up the endowment.

A special committee consisting of Mr. G. P. Tuttle, Director of Admissions and Records, Associate Dean R. R. Hudelson of the College of Agriculture, and Associate Dean H. M. Gray of the Graduate College was appointed to set up a plan including the policy, priorities, and conditions governing the scholarships under this endowment. The Committee has submitted its report. The following regulations to govern awards of scholarships under the Harry G. Wright and Harriette A. Wright Endowment are based largely on this report:

I. These scholarships shall be available to both graduate and undergraduate

students.

- 2. In cases of students making their original applications for these scholarships, other qualifications being equal, preference shall be given to those expressing a desire and an intention to prepare for work in agriculture or in fields closely
- Graduate scholarships shall be assigned by the Graduate College. Undergraduate scholarships shall be assigned by the Committee on Awards of Undergraduate Scholarships.

4. The funds available each year will be allocated to graduate and undergraduate scholarships by consultation and agreement between the Graduate College and the Committee on Awards of Undergraduate Scholarships.

5. Qualifications of applicants for graduate scholarships being equal, preference will be given to residents of Illinois. The value of graduate scholarships will be at the prevailing rate for Graduate College scholarships and fellowships, plus an amount sufficient to cover University fees.

6. Undergraduate scholarships shall be awarded only to residents of Illinois. Qualifications of candidates being equal, preference will be given to residents of De Kalb, Randolph, Lee, and Whiteside counties. The value of undergraduate scholarships shall be \$400 a year, plus an amount sufficient to cover University fees.

I recommend approval of these regulations.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these regulations were adopted as recommended.

DELEGATION OF SIGNATURES AT THE GALESBURG UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(9) During the first two years of operations at the Galesburg Undergraduate Division, it was advisable that the vouchers to be presented to the State Auditor of Public Accounts for payments of funds be routed through the Urbana Business Office. Now that the Galesburg office has been satisfactorily organized and adequate procedures installed to insure the handling of routine business according to University business practices, it is desirable that this procedure be changed to permit the Galesburg Business Office to certify vouchers directly to the State Auditor. To effect this change, the Comptroller requests adoption of the following resolution as an addendum to the resolution for the delegation of signatures

approved by the Board on March 9, 1948 (Minutes, page 1042):

"Resolved that the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois are authorized to delegate the signing of their names as President and Secretary respectively to vouchers to be presented to the State Auditor under the following conditions:

"The President of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to W. J.

English and to B. W. Benedict in the Galesburg Division authority to sign his name as President of the Board of Trustees to vouchers against the State Auditor. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees is authorized to delegate to L. O. Kerwood and to Lois S. Herron in the Galesburg Division authority to sign his name as Secretary of the Board of Trustees to vouchers against the State Auditor.

"And, be it further resolved that the Auditor of Public Accounts is hereby authorized and directed to honor vouchers having facsimile signatures of the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois if such facsimile signatures resemble the facsimile specimens duly certified to or filed with the Auditor of Public Accounts."

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this resolution was adopted as recommended.

APPROVAL OF ACTIONS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(10) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association requests approval of the following actions:

1. An appropriation of \$9,000 for digging a well at the new golf course on the Kimmel Farm. The estimated distribution of this appropriation is as follows:

2. The award of a contract for the drilling of the well to Hayes-Sims, Champaign, at a cost of \$20 a foot. This company has drilled most of the University wells and those for the City of Champaign, is in a position to proceed

immediately with the work, and can obtain the necessary strainers and casings.

3. The award of a contract to John D. Bolton Company, Evanston, for repairing the concrete treads in Memorial Stadium, an area of 15,000 square feet. The quoted price from this firm is one dollar and five cents a square foot on the lower deck and one dollar and twenty-five cents a square foot on the upper deck. Most of the work to be done is in the upper deck. The total estimated cost is \$18,500. This company has been recommended because its services are immediately available; similar work done by it in the past has withstood freezing and thawing; the company is recommended by Holabird and Root, architects for the Stadium; and because of the lack of other bids for this work. This firm is one of the few able to use the Gunnite process which is the only effective method of repair. Funds are available for this contract in the accumulated reserve for plant maintenance.

Early approving action on these matters was requested because the contractors have full programs of work and any delay in the award of the contracts might postpone the work for several months. In the case of the Stadium repairs, it was desirable to have at least a part of this work done before the Inter-scholastic Track and Field Meet on May 15-16. After consultation with the Presi-dent of the Board of Trustees, I approved assignments of funds and authorized the award of the contracts. Confirmation of this is requested.

The Athletic Association has secured the following bids for the installation of three-inch cast iron pipe (previously purchased by the Association) as a part of an irrigation system for the practice gridiron east of Memorial Stadium:

and recommends the award of the contract to W. L. Hall, the lowest bidder. I concur in this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these actions of the Athletic Association were approved and confirmed as recommended.

AUTHORITY TO DEMOLISH AND REMOVE BUILDINGS ON THE KIMMEL FARM

(11) On January 8, 1948 (Minutes, page 954), the Board of Trustees authorized the use of the Kimmel Farm for the construction of a golf course by the Athletic Association. As a part of this project, the Athletic Association requests authority to demolish or remove all existing buildings and fences on the Kimmel Farm and the authority to use all or any part for construction of new buildings on the proposed golf course. In the event all of the lumber so obtained is not needed, authority is requested to trade any of the unused portion for equipment to be used in the operation of the golf course.

The Comptroller has reviewed this proposal and recommends that the author-

ity requested be granted.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this authority was granted as recommended.

DEMOLITION OF OLD BUILDINGS AT THE CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL CAMPUS

(12) The Board was advised on October 30, 1947 (Minutes, page 882), of the need for demolition of old buildings on property acquired by the University for expansion of the Chicago Professional Colleges. The Board authorized the employment of special counsel to aid in actions necessary.

Bids have been secured for wrecking buildings on the following properties:

Group 1. Buildings at 825, 827, 829, 831, 837, 839, 907, 917-919 South Wood

Street. All of these properties are ready for demolition.

Group 2. Buildings at 913 and 815 South Wood Street; 1923 and 1743 West

Polk Street. These properties will become available for demolition in the near future.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend acceptance of the bid of the Harvey Wrecking Company, the lowest bidder for the entire job, work in group two to proceed as the properties become available.

I concur in these recommendations and recommend a special appropriation of \$3,450 from the General Reserve Fund for this work.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this contract was awarded and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin. Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR EMERGENCY LIGHTING SYSTEMS

(13) Bids were received for the installation of emergency lighting systems in the auditorium areas of the George Huff Gymnasium, the Auditorium, Lincoln Hall, and Smith Memorial Hall, in accordance with plans and specifications prepared by Graham, Anderson, Probst, and White, Architects, Chicago.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract to the Fedco Electric Contractors, Inc., of Danville, Illinois, the lowest bidder, on the basis of the lump sum bid of \$14,529.63. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with the Fedco Electric Contractors, Inc.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this contract was awarded as recommended.

IMPROVEMENT OF PARKING AREA AT CORNER OF TAYLOR AND WOLCOTT STREETS, CHICAGO

(14) The northeast corner of Taylor and Wolcott Streets, Chicago, which is University property, is used as a parking lot. It has a cinder surface and, therefore, during the summer and spring the dust from this area is a nuisance to occupants in adjacent buildings. The Director of the Physical Plant Department recommends the resurfacing of this area with crushed stone and an asphalt topping which will eliminate the dust and also provide a better parking area for the use of University staff members. The following bids have been received on this resurfacing:

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of the contract to the Black Top Roads Company, the lower bidder for this work. Funds for this are available in the budget.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this contract was awarded as recommended.

SANITARY SEWER SERVICE FOR TEMPORARY HOUSING AREA

(15) Since early spring the sanitary sewer on First Street, Champaign, serving the temporary housing area, has been overloaded to the extent that it is backing

up in the temporary housing area, has been overloaded to the extent that it is backing up in the temporary housing units and in private property along First Street.

It is the opinion of all concerned (including the City Engineer of Champaign, the City Commissioner, and the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District Engineer) that the only practical solution is the construction of a relieving sewer from Gregory Drive and First Street to Third and Healey Streets, where a junction can be made with an existing 24-inch interceptor sewer of the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District.

To expedite this needed improvement the University should construct the sewer, financing the entire cost, but with the approval of the City of Champaign and of the Urbana-Champaign Sanitary District.

The Physical Plant Department recommends that Wilson and Anderson, Champaign, engineers on the interceptor sewers for the Sanitary District (the University paid part of the cost of this improvement), be engaged to make a study of the project. Authority is requested to employ them at a cost of 71/2 per cent on all work up to \$50,000 and 7 per cent above that amount. A preliminary estimate of the total cost is \$60,000. Four per cent of this fee will cover the design stage up to taking bids.

If, after receiving bids, it is concluded that the University should carry

out this project, further consideration will be given to the relationship between the University and the Sanitary District. Funds are available for the entire cost of this project, if undertaken, from the State capital appropriation for temporary student housing facilities. The Legal Counsel believes that the University has a legal basis for such an expenditure, and particularly in view of the emergency aspects of the problem.

The Comptroller concurs in this recommendation.

I recommend (a) approval of the program in principle, subject to further consideration when engineers' estimates and bids are received, and necessary agreements with the Sanitary District are reached; and (b) authority to employ Wilson and Anderson as consulting engineers.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, this program was approved and authority granted under the conditions recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR ADDITIONS TO THE POWER PLANT AND THE UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

(16) In cost studies of the 1949-1951 building program it is necessary to have estimates of the costs of additions to the Abbott Power Plant and the utilities distribution system.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend, and the Chairman of the Building Program Committee concurs, that Sargent and Lundy, Engineers, Chicago, be employed to make these estimates.

It is proposed to pay for the actual costs of such estimates plus 100 per cent of the salaries of engineers and draftsmen for indirect costs. In the event that this firm is employed to do the engineering work on the additions to the power plant and utilities distribution system, the University will receive a credit to reduce the indirect cost charge to 50 per cent. The estimated cost of this preliminary contract is \$250 for the power plant and \$1,250 for the distribution system. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute such a contract with Sargent and Lundy.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the execution of this contract was authorized as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF AUTOMATIC FIRE ALARM SYSTEM IN ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

(17) Bids were taken on April 30 for the installation of an automatic fire alarm system in the Administration Building, a necessary protection for important records. Six firms were invited to bid but only the Gamewell Company, Newton Upper Falls, Massachusetts, did so, submitting a base bid of \$5,398.23.

Upper Falls, Massachusetts, did so, submitting a base bid of \$5,398.23.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that a contract be made with the Gamewell Company in accordance with the base bid plus \$50 for extension of the system into three vaults and one storage room. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, the execution of this contract was authorized as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR MOVING AND OVERHAULING AND INSTALLATION OF ADDITIONAL EQUIPMENT IN COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY LABORATORIES

(18) The following bids have been received for moving and overhauling three dental laboratories and the installation of eighteen additional dental units in the Dentistry, Medicine, and Pharmacy Building:

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of the contract to the lower bidder, Fettes-Love and Sieben, Inc., in the amount of \$9,200. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute the contract accordingly.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, the execution of this contract was authorized as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR AND INSTALLATION OF NEW FIRE ALARM SYSTEM-CHICAGO

(19) Bids were received in November, 1947, on the installation of a new fire alarm system in the Chicago Professional Colleges. The E. P. Allison Company of Chicago was the lowest bidder on two counts—a firm bid of \$32,108 and a proposal for a cost plus fixed fee form of contract with a fixed fee of \$5,028 and a guaranteed maximum of \$33,713. It was necessary to clear up a number of details so that the recommendation for the award of a contract could not be presented to the Board of Trustees until March 9, 1948 (Minutes, page 1046). The Board approved the award of a contract to the E. P. Allison Company on the basis of the firm bid of \$32,108.

In the meantime, the E. P. Allison Company had informed the University that a new wage scale and increases in costs of materials which went into effect before the contract was awarded would affect their bid, increasing it by \$676.86. This was not reported by the Physical Plant Department at the time the recommendation for the award of the contract was presented on the theory that the increase could be accomplished through a change order. The E. P. Allison Company has stated that it will not accept the contract without an additional allowance of \$676.86 for increased costs, but will accept a contract on the basis of its alternate proposal, namely, a cost plus fixed fee form of contract with a guaranteed maximum of \$33,713.

The Legal Counsel has advised that the University can not revise the original award without rejecting all bids and taking new ones. He further advises that the alternate proposal for a cost plus fixed fee contract can be accepted because at the time of the original bidding it was also lower than any other bid received. Under this proposal 75 per cent of any saving below the guaranteed maximum cost

would be retained by the University.

Because of the time required in securing new bids and the probability that they would be higher than the previous bids received, due to increase in labor and materials costs, the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend that the alternate bid of the E. P. Allison Company, Chicago, be accepted and a cost plus fixed fee contract under the terms specified be authorized.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, the execution of this contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITIONS TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(20) The Department of Electrical Engineering has requested the following additions to the contract with the John Felmley Company for general work on the

I. To provide for additional installations of chalkboards, \$8,418.72.

a. The enrollment in the department will exceed the capacity of the new building to provide adequately for instruction. The resulting overcrowding in the classrooms will require chalkboard space wherever it can be made available. Many small spaces will have chalkboards where not originally planned.

b. Chalkboards were originally omitted in the four laboratory conference

rooms, due to a misunderstanding by the architects.

c. It is desirable to add chalkboard space to one research room so that it can be used as a classroom, at least until the peak enrollment has been passed.

d. To make the two lecture-demonstration rooms more flexible, as much chalkboard space as possible has been added.

e. Chalkboard space in the student shop is also being added along one wall

to improve the value of the shop.

2. Installation of wood block flooring in the machine and wood shops, \$2,033.48. The preliminary planning of the building included wood block flooring in the shops but it was not included in the final specifications. This type of flooring is desirable for the welfare of workmen who must stand all day and also as

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend these additions. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the "Construction of a new Electrical Engineering Building."

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these changes.

On motion of Mr. Davis, these additions to contract were authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO THE ELECTRICAL CONTRACT FOR THE UTILITIES DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

(21) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$1,500 to the contract with the A. S. Schulman Electric Company, Chicago, for the electrical work in the construction of the utilities distribution system. The original contract was approved by the Board of Trustees

on January 25, 1947 (Minutes, page 228).

When plans and specifications were prepared for this work, it was the opinion of Sargent and Lundy, Engineers, Chicago, that the number and location of cable racks in existing manholes should be determined by inspection of the manholes and mutual agreement between representatives of the Physical Plant Department and the contractor awarded the work for installing new electrical cables. Hence, unit prices were requested in the original proposal for cable racks and supports to be installed in existing manholes. The addition to the contract now recommended is based on the unit price included in the original plan.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board

be authorized to execute this contract change.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, the execution of this contract change was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO THE CONTRACT FOR DRILL FIELD SIDEWALKS

(22) On November 29, 1947 (Minutes, page 938), the Board of Trustees awarded a contract for sidewalks along the north, south, and west sides of the drill field to the Wascher Concrete and Insulation Company. It was not considered necessary to complete a sidewalk along the east side of the field. Experience has shown that such a walk, which will complete the square and will be an extension of the present concrete walk on the west side of Fourth Street from the Men's Residence Halls to Peabody Drive, is desirable. This walk will be of immediate service to occupants of the temporary housing in Stadium Terrace and will also serve other students going to and from recreation areas in the vicinity of the Stadium. A permanent improvement, the walk will also serve future dormitories west of Fourth Street.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$2,500 to the contract with the Wascher Concrete and Insula-

tion Company to complete this walk.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board

be authorized to execute the amendment of the contract.

The cost may be charged to the State appropriation for the "Construction of temporary student housing, including all necessary costs and charges incident to the completion thereof."

On motion of Mr. Davis, the execution of this amendment to contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO THE CONTRACT WITH J. L. SIMMONS COMPANY, INC., FOR PARKING AREA CURBS AT TEMPORARY CAFETERIA BUILDING

(23) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$1,518.30 in the contract with J. L. Simmons Company, Inc., to provide all material, labor, and equipment necessary to install concrete curbs for parking areas around the Temporary Cafeteria on the south campus.

When this building was completed last fall it was not feasible to finish construction of the delivery and parking areas around it due to the season and weather conditions. To confine and control truck and passenger car movements within these areas it is necessary to enclose them with concrete curbing. I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this amendment. Funds are available.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, the execution of this amendment to contract was authorized as recommended.

At this point, Mr. Livingston took his place with the Board.

PURCHASE OF WATER TREATMENT EQUIPMENT

(25) To provide additional water treatment equipment needed in the Abbott Power Plant, the Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the purchase of another Zeo-Karb unit from the Permutit Company, Chicago, at a price of \$19,573.

The purchase of this equipment is recommended by Professor Frederick G. Straub of the Department of Chemistry and by Sargent and Lundy, Engineers,

Chic<u>a</u>go,

The Permutit Company is the only manufacturer of this type of equipment. It is possible to use a hot process softener for silica removal and demineralization, but this would take too much room in the plant. The equipment on which the Permutit Company has quoted is compact and is largely for use in power plants. Tests have shown this equipment removes more silica than any other developed to date. The Permutit Company supplied the present units at the Abbott Power Plant and it is desirable that the additions be of the same type. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to purchase this equipment.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this purchase was authorized as recommended.

INSURANCE ON GOVERNMENT PROPERTY AT GALESBURG UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

(26) The lease with the United States War Assets Administration covering the Mayo General Hospital, used by the University for the Galesburg Undergraduate Division, requires fire, extended coverage (broad form), sprinkler leakage,

vandalism, and malicious mischief insurance in amounts and values the Administration has prescribed. From the appraisal made by the Administration, the total insurable value of the realty and personalty, is set at \$4,054,387. By special stipulation of its Regional Director, the Administration interposes no objection to 90 per cent coinsurance, provided the amount of coverage be no less than \$3,650,000, plus added coverage for sprinkler leakage at 10 per cent coinsurance of \$221,680.

The Business Office has secured proposals from all companies suggested by the W.A.A., and from other companies acceptable to it and locally represented.

These proposals have been submitted to the Finance Committee.

The general policy of the Board of Trustees with regard to such insurance on University property is that not more than 25 per cent of any risk may be placed with mutual companies in non-assessable policies, and the remainder with stock companies, all having satisfactory financial ratings.

The Finance Committee recommends that insurance be purchased as follows: twenty-five per cent from the Northwestern Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Seattle, Washington, through the Leland Smith Agency, and the remainder equally from eleven other agencies, including the General Insurance Company, through the Huff Insurance Agency, a mutual company with dividend estimated

at 15 per cent payable at policy termination.

The total cash premium is \$25,684.08. Allowing for estimated dividends, the estimated net cost is \$24,352.38. All premiums run for a period of three years from May 24, 1948, and are 2½ times the annual premium cost.

Temporary insurance has been carried, since possession of the property was turned over to the University, at a cost of \$8,567.61 which is provided for to the extent of \$7,000 in the current year's operating budget. To meet the total outlay required for the proposed insurance program will require an additional special appropriation of \$27,251.69.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this insurance was awarded and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken.

PURCHASES

(27) The University of Illinois Statutes provide that purchases shall be made on the basis of competitive prices wherever practicable, quality, suitability, and service considered. Purchases amounting to \$1,000 or more made from general funds or uniternized appropriations shall be submitted to the Board of Trustees or to the Executive Committee, unless, in the opinion of the President of the University, urgent necessity exists that requires immediate action, in which case the President shall act and report promptly to the Board.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, purchases were authorized as recommended (see Appendix, page 1119), and the action of the President of the University in authorizing emergency purchases was approved and confirmed.

THE COMPTROLLER'S REPORT OF CONTRACTS EXECUTED

(28) The Comptroller's report of contracts executed, March 11 to April 30, 1948 (see Appendix, page 1123).

APPOINTMENT OF DR. BRYAN L. WADE AS PROFESSOR AND HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HORTICULTURE

(30) The Dean of the College of Agriculture recommends the appointment of Dr. Bryan L. Wade, now Director of the United States Regional Vegetable Breeding Laboratory, Charleston, South Carolina, as Professor and Head of the Department of Horticulture on indefinite tenure beginning September 1, 1948, at an annual salary of \$9,500.

I recommend approval of this appointment.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this appointment was made as recommended.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATES OF CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

(31) The Committee on Accountancy recommends that the certificate of Certified Public Accountant be awarded the following who have made applications therefor under Section 5 of the Accountancy Act of 1943 and who have submitted evidence that they are holders of valid and unrevoked certificates of certified public accountants obtained in other states by passing the regular written examinations. They have also met the other requirements specified in Section 5 of the Act.

CONTRACT FOR EMERGENCY AND EXIT LIGHTING SYSTEMS IN CHICAGO PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

(34) Bids have been secured on the installation of new emergency and exit lighting systems in the Research and Educational Hospitals, including the dining room and kitchen unit, orthopedic unit, and in the Institute for Juvenile Research. This is one of the improvements recommended by Holabird and Root in their survey of mechanical facilities in the Chicago Professional Colleges. It is required to comply with the Chicago Fire Department's recommendation.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of the contract to the E. P. Allison Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, on the basis of their proposal for the various parts of the complete installation, in the amount of \$21,055. Funds are available.

I concur and recommend that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board

be authorized to execute the contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this award was made and authority was granted as recommended.

APPLICATION OF CITY ORDINANCES TO THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

(35) As reported to the Board on February 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 976), the City of Chicago instituted court proceedings against the University of Illinois to enforce the collection of a license fee for the maintenance of a fuel oil storage tank on the Navy Pier under an ordinance providing for licensing of fuel oil storage tanks.

The Legal Counsel reports that on May 7, 1948, he filed a motion to dismiss the action, setting up the various reasons why the ordinance should not be applicable to the University. On May 11 the Corporation Counsel of Chicago moved to dismiss the complaint against the University.

This ends the case without prejudice to the right of the city to institute another suit if its officials see fit to do so.

This report was received for record.

APPOINTMENT OF ACTING DIRECTOR OF UNIVERSITY BANDS

(36) Professor A. A. Harding will retire as Director of the Military Bands on September 1, 1948, after forty-three years of distinguished service. Several months ago a special committee was appointed by the President of the University to study the qualifications of potential candidates for the directorship of the University Bands and to submit recommendations. The committee was also directed to study the administrative relationship of the University Bands to other University agencies and to consider whether the Bands should be continued in an independent administrative status or should be placed under the administration

of the School of Music or the College of Fine and Applied Arts.

The committee recommends that Mark H. Hindsley, Associate Professor of Music and Assistant Director of the Military Bands, be appointed Acting Director for a period of two years from September 1, 1948.

The committee has expressed judgment that it is not necessary to make major change in the committee of the Ronds but suggests that the title "Military

changes in the organization of the Bands but suggests that the title "Military Bands" be discontinued and that the Bands be called "The University of Illinois Bands." The Professor of Military Science and Tactics concurs in this change in title.

I recommend that:

I. Mr. Mark H. Hindsley be appointed Acting Director of the University of Illinois Bands and Associate Professor of Music for two years beginning Sep-

tember 1, 1948, at an annual salary of \$6,500.

2. The title of the Bands be changed to "The University of Illinois Bands" and that the Bands continue to be organized as a separate administrative unit.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this appointment was made and the title of the Bands was changed as recommended.

APPRECIATION OF DIRECTOR HARDING

On motion of Mr. Livingston, the Secretary was instructed to prepare an expression of the Board's appreciation of Director Harding's services, for presentation to Director Harding.

The Secretary of the Board prepared the following tribute which was presented to Director Harding on June 6.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, to Albert Austin Harding, Director of the University Bands and Professor of Music, Greetings:

The Board of Trustees has observed with appreciation your eminent career

over forty-three years as leader of the bands, which has won for you distinction at home and abroad. We are mindful of your contributions to the education of thousands of students who have played in the bands, many of whom have gone on to successful careers as leaders and all of whom have profited by your influence. There is not room here to recite your many accomplishments, not the least of which is the pleasure of great audiences in the performance of the Illinois bands.

As you retire, we know it will not be into inactivity, and we wish you all health, success, and happiness in your work and in your life.

In witness whereof we have inscribed our names hereto and have caused our Secretary to affix his name and the Seal of the University, this sixth day of June, in the year of our Lord the nineteen hundred and forty-eighth, and of the University of Illinois the eighty-first.

DAIRY CATTLE BARNS

At this point, Dr. Meyer called attention to the fact that the Dairy Cattle Barns, on which construction was begun in 1924, were still incomplete, and that the work of the department, and its relations with the public, were thereby hindered.

On motion of Mr. Nickell, this matter was referred to the President of the University for consideration and recommendation.

Mr. T. L. Warner, Mr. Albert, and Mr. L. A. Lawson, Attorney, representing the Warner Construction Company, were introduced. On request of Mr. Warner, Mr. Lawson made a statement concerning the contract for the Women's Residence Halls, and the progress of construction.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this matter was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, to prepare, with the Legal Counsel, a stipulation of facts and to report to the Board.

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CHAPMAN AND CUTLER'S OPINION ON TAXATION

The Legal Counsel presented the following opinion of Chapman and Cutler on the power of the University to pay taxes assessed on its property.

May 26, 1948

William Britton, Counsel University of Illinois 314 Altgeld Hall Urbana, Illinois

DEAR SIR:

We have been considering the brief submitted by you and the inquiries directed to us by President Stoddard regarding the question of whether or not the local taxing bodies of De Kalb, Piatt, and Champaign Counties may validly levy taxes upon properties owned by the University of Illinois and located in said respective counties.

This problem involves the construction of the constitutional and statutory provisions with respect to the exemption from taxation of property owned by the state and its political subdivisions or any public body corporate which has

been created as an instrumentality of the state.

The power of the General Assembly to exempt property from taxation arises under Section 3 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State, which

provides as follows:

"The property of the state, counties, and other municipal corporations, both real and personal, and such other property as may be used exclusively for agricultural and horticultural societies, for school, religious, cemetery and charitable purposes, may be exempted from taxation; but such exemption shall be only by general law. In the assessment of real estate incumbered by public easement, any depreciation occasioned by such easement may be deducted in the valuation of such property.

Pursuant to the power conferred upon the General Assembly by this constitutional provision it has in Section 19 of the Revenue Act of 1939, as amended, granted exemptions from taxation of certain property, such exemptions (so far as they may possibly be applicable to property owned by the University) being found in subdivisions 1 and 5 of Section 19 of the Revenue Act of 1939, as amended (Ill. Rev. Stat., Ch. 120, Para. 500), said exemptions reading as

"(1) All lands donated by the United States for high school purposes not sold or leased; all property of schools, including real estate on which the schools are located, and any other real estate used by such schools exclusively for school purposes not leased by such schools or otherwise used with a view to profit; and all lands, moneys or other property heretofore or hereafter donated, granted, received or used for public schools, college, seminary, university or other educational purposes and the proceeds thereof whether held in trust or absolutely****.

"(5) All property of every kind belonging to the State of Illinois." There cannot be any doubt about the provision as to exemption from taxation being applicable to all property owned by the University prior to the adoption of the Constitution in 1870, and there also can be no doubt as to the exemption of property title to which vests in the State of Illinois or title to which vests in the University and is used exclusively for school and educational

There have been numerous decisions of the Supreme Court involving the exemption of property from taxation and quite a few decisions involving the properties of the University of Illinois. One of the earliest decisions involving the University of Illinois is found in Illinois Industrial vs. Board of Supervisors of Champaign County, Illinois, 76 Ill. 184, wherein the Supreme Court held that the property held by the University belongs to and is under the entire control of the State, and being the property of the State, the Constitution authorizes its exemption from taxation and that the General Assembly had exempted it.

There seems to have been no deviation in this principle in any of the later

cases and as late as 1943, in the case of People vs. Barrett, 382 Ill. 321, involving the University, the Supreme Court reiterated this principle and stated that the University could only acquire and hold property as Trustee and agent for the State and that all the property of the University of Illinois though held by the

Board of Trustees belongs to the State.

While there have been some exceptions to the principle above stated, particularly in the Olmsted case, 328 Ill. 377, involving certain property held in trust by the Board of Trustees in Vermilion County, the principle enunciated in the Industrial University case and the Barrett case above cited nevertheless seems to be the law and there seems to be no doubt that all property, title to which is in the Board of Trustees of the University and used by the University is exempt, and if the courts adhere to the principle established in the Industrial case and the Barrett case above referred to, to the effect that the property of the University of Illinois though held by the Board of Trustees belongs to the State, all property, title to which is in the University, would be exempt from taxation under the provisions of the Constitution and the existing revenue law of the State.

There may be some question as to the exemption feature of certain properties held by the University where they are leased with a view to profit, or where they have been conveyed to the University in trust for certain purposes, particularly in view of the fact that in the Barrett case the Supreme Court held that the University is not a part of the state government, but that it has been created as a state agency and the corporate entity created is a public corporation.

created as a state agency and the corporate entity created is a public corporation.

The same is true of the University of Illinois Foundation. The Foundation is a corporation not for profit organized under the laws of the State to assist in developing and increasing the educational facilities of the University, and in reality has been created as an agency of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and it could very well be that if the Supreme Court followed the principle involved in the Barrett case it might hold that any properties belonging to the Foundation were held in trust for the State, in which case obviously the constitutional exemption and the legislative exemption found in the Revenue Act could be invoked for the benefit of any properties held by the Foundation. In addition, it is our understanding that the Legislature has made no specific

In addition, it is our understanding that the Legislature has made no specific appropriation for payment of taxes. Under the Barrett case above referred to there is considerable question as to the authority of the Trustees of the University to apply appropriations for the payment of taxes in the manner contemplated without first having had an appropriation made by the Legislature, unless the courts specifically determine that certain properties are taxable and that by operation of law they are payable from any one or more of the pertinent objects for which appropriations were made for the biennium.

Under the circumstances, we do not believe the decisions of the court are sufficiently clear for us to recommend to the Board of Trustees payment of taxes on any of the properties without an appropriate decision by the Supreme Court involving the facts surrounding the ownership and use of the particular

properties.

After general discussion, and on motion of Mr. Williamson, the Legal Counsel was authorized to take whatever steps may be necessary to clarify and maintain the rights of the University in this matter.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board in executive session discussed the agenda for the meeting and took action on the following matters presented by the President of the University.

APPOINTMENT OF TURPIN CHAMBERS BANNISTER AS PROFESSOR AND HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ARCHITECTURE

(1) I request authority to appoint Dr. Turpin Chambers Bannister, now Dean of the School of Architecture and the Arts, and Head Professor in the Department of Architecture, Alabama Polytechnic Institute, as Professor and Head of

the Department of Architecture on indefinite tenure beginning September 1, 1948, at a salary of \$10,000 a year.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this appointment was authorized as recommended.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR PRESIDENT STODDARD

(2) According to present plans, I shall fly to Paris from New York City July 6, remaining there ten days as the American representative on the Executive Board of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO). I shall then spend four days at Oxford University as a guest of the British Universities Congress, representing the American Council on Education. On August 4 I have been asked to give a talk at an international universities conference to be held at Utrecht University, Holland. I should return to the United States by air August 6. Accordingly, I request a half month's leave with salary adjusted as previously for UNESCO, the other half of this trip to be a part of my vacation.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, this request was granted.

PROPERTY PURCHASE

(3) Purchase of the property at 305 North Prospect Avenue, Champaign, owned by Mrs. Ruth H. Rockwood, at a price of \$20,000 (seller to pay brokerage fee), is recommended as part of the special program of residence properties acquisition for faculty housing previously authorized by the Board of Trustees. This is a lot 71½' x 122' with a brick and stucco house consisting of living room, dining room, kitchen, study, large hall, and lavatory on first floor; four bedrooms, sleeping porch, and bath on second floor; stoker-fired coal furnace; gas water heater; garage. This property was originally priced at \$21,000, with an independent appraisal of \$20,000. The owner will accept the University's appraisal.

At its meeting on May 22 the Board authorized the purchase of four residence properties with the provision that one of them may be transferred to the Athletic Association if the Association decides to purchase it for rental to a member of the Athletic Department staff. The Athletic Association has elected to purchase one of those houses at \$19,500, which releases funds for another

property acquisition by the University.

This matter was presented by Mr. Janata.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this purchase was authorized as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Nickell.

At this point, Mr. McLaughlin took his place with the Board.

PARTICIPATION OF FARM AND HOME ADVISERS IN UNIVERSITY RETIREMENT SYSTEM

(4) County farm and home advisers have requested an arrangement by which the salaries paid to them by county farm bureaus may be included as a basis for benefits to which they are eligible in the University Retirement System by virtue of their being members of the extension staff of the University College of Agriculture. The salaries of these persons are paid in part from State appropriations to the University, in part from Federal funds received by the University, and in part by the county farm bureaus.

Retirement System benefits are based on the amount of salary paid by the

Retirement System benefits are based on the amount of salary paid by the University. At the present time, therefore, such benefits are limited to the sums paid from State and Federal funds. To extend these benefits to include the total salary would necessitate that the county farm and home bureau deposit its share of the salary of each farm and home adviser with the University, for disbursement by it to the adviser. Since the entire salary would then be paid by the University, the benefits would be computed thereon. The farm bureau would also be required to pay the University the employer's contribution to the System covering the estimated cost of the employer's share of the benefits (estimated

at 8 per cent of salaries). Deductions from employees' salaries (now 3½ per cent) would make up the remainder. Both of these contributions would then be

remitted by the University to the Retirement System.

The matter has been discussed at length over a considerable period of time by representatives of the Extension Service, farm advisers, University officials, and officials of the Retirement System. A trust agreement is necessary between each farm bureau and the University covering the proposed arrangement. The form of trust agreement has been worked out by the Legal Counsel of the University and the Legal Adviser of the Retirement System. It has been accepted by fifty-six of the farm bureaus involved. Others are expected to follow. The home bureaus will take action later if the program is approved by the University. The Director of Agricultural Extension and the Comptroller recommend approval. In view of the relation of the county farm and home advisers to the University and the fact that they are members of our educational staff, and the fact that the cost of the added benefits would be borne to a large degree by the farm bureaus and the advisers, I concur and recommend that this be referred to the Committee on Agriculture for consideration and report to the Board.

The Comptroller commented on this proposal.

The matter was referred to the Committee on Agriculture as recommended.

WAGES OF OPERATING ENGINEERS IN CHICAGO DIVISIONS

(5) I present reports from the Director of Nonacademic Personnel and the Legal Counsel on the status of negotiations on the wages of operating engineers in the Chicago divisions.

Director Dickason, Professor Britton, and Dr. Ivy commented on this matter.

It was the opinion of the Board that the prevailing rate principle should be adhered to, and that the hospitals should be kept open as long as possible (see page 1153).

At this point, General Davis took his place with the Board.

SALE OF BOOK RIGHTS ON PUBLICATION OF SMALL HOMES COUNCIL CIRCULAR

(6) The William H. Wise Company, 50 West 47th Street, New York City, has offered the University of Illinois \$15,000 for book rights on a publication which

will consist of twenty-one Small Homes Council circulars.

The Coordinator of the Small Homes Council and the Director of the University Press recommend acceptance of the offer. I concur and recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize either the direct sale of the copyright to the William H. Wise Company by the University or the assignment of the copyright to the University of Illinois Foundation for sale, whichever method is the more feasible, and that the proceeds be made available for the research program of the Small Homes Council.

On motion of Dr. Meyer, these recommendations were adopted, subject to the approval by the University Press of the content of the manuscript of the book.

PATENTABLE DISCOVERIES

(7) The University Research Board submits the following reports and recom-

mendations on potentially patentable discoveries by members of the faculty:

1. Process for production of chlorine by Dr. H. F. Johnstone, Professor of Chemical Engineering. During World War II, Professor Johnstone was requested by the National Research Council to make a survey of nonelectrolytic processes for the production of chlorine which would be important in case of a serious shortage of electric power. In making this survey, he found a plan mentioned in old German literature which had previously been overlooked. This is the catalytic decomposition of chlorosulfonic acid in the liquid state to give sulfuryl chloride and sulfuric acid. This process has the advantage of using materials which are already in large production. After the report was submitted the War Production Board had the process investigated by several research laboratories. At the same time Professor Johnstone undertook studies, in which he was assisted by two of his students, Messrs. R. J. Kallal and R. C. Johnson, and as a result of their work an improvement in the method was developed which was more promising than any of those developed by War Production Board contractors. Professor Johnstone wishes to publish the results of his work. Because of the interest of large chemical companies the question of possible patent protection arises.

Professor Roger Adams, Head of the Department of Chemistry, has recommended that the University not apply for a patent because there is considerable doubt that a patent can be obtained since there is already established prior art in this field. Aside from this, the University Research Board is of the opinion that the possibilities of any financial returns from such a patent are too

remote to justify the expense of securing one.

2. Control mechanism for fatigue testing machine by Associate Professor Howard C. Roberts of the Department of Civil Engineering. Professor Roberts has designed a control mechanism for machines which test fatigue of metals and other materials. The control mechanism was designed to work together with a device for adjusting the load applied by the machine during its testing operation.

Dr. N. M. Newmark, Research Professor of Structural Engineering in the Civil Engineering Department, has expressed the opinion that while this device and an improved one which has not yet been constructed may be worth patenting, the utility of these devices is so limited that the financial returns from the patent would not justify the expense of securing one. The University Research Board concurs in this judgment.

The University Research Board recommends that the above discoveries be

released to the discoverer in each case.

I concur.

On motion of Dr. Luken, these releases were granted as recommended.

CONTRACT FOR EXTENSION OF STEAM SERVICE FROM MAIN DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM TO VARIOUS BUILDINGS AT URBANA

(8) Bids were opened at 11:00 a.m. (C.D.S.T.) June 1, 1948, in the office of Sargent and Lundy, Engineers, Chicago, for the extension of steam service from the main distribution system to each of the various buildings now under

construction at Urbana.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of the contract to the L. H. Prentice Company, Chicago, the lowest bidder, in the amount of \$131,814\$ less \$13,266\$ for omission of high pressure steam service to the Mechanical Engineering Building. This deduction is being recommended to bring the cost within available funds. High pressure steam will not be required in this building now but will be needed in the future when additions to the building are constructed.

I concur in these recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this contract was authorized as recommended.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS ON WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALL GENERAL CONTRACT

(9) The Board on May 22, 1948 (Minutes, pages 1994, 1113), referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, for consideration and recommendation to the Board, a request of the Warner Construction Company for an adjustment in its general contract on the Women's Residence Hall at Urbana. The Committee met in Chicago on May 27, 1948, at 6:30 p.m. to consider this item.

mittee met in Chicago on May 27, 1048, at 6:30 p.m. to consider this item.

Present: Frank H. McKelvey, Chairman, Mrs. Doris S. Holt, Park Livingston, Walter W. McLaughlin (members of the Committee); C. F. Murphy and C. P. Severns of Naess and Murphy, architects on the building; W. E. Britton, C. S. Havens, A. S. Davis (of the University architectural staff), and Lloyd

Morey.

The Committee received copies of statements by L. A. Lawson, attorney for

the Warner Construction Company, and M. Alperin, Vice-President of the Warner Construction Company; a complete outline of the history of wage rates on this construction, concurred in by both the contractor and University officers; a report of a survey by Director Donald E. Dickason of rates in various cities; and a complete summary of the history of the facts and issues involved. All of this information was reviewed and discussed in detail.

Legal Counsel Britton stated that in his opinion the contract can not legally be changed in the manner proposed by the Warner Construction Company. Subsequent to the meeting of the Committee, he prepared a written opinion on the

subject which will be made a part of this report.

After full discussion, the Committee voted unanimously to recommend that the Warner Construction Company be advised that the Board can not assent to the proposed changes in the contract requested by the Company.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this recommendation was adopted.

EMPLOYMENT OF FOREIGN STUDENTS

(10) At the meeting of the Board on May 21, 1948 (Minutes, page 1993), I presented a request for revision of the policy of the University in regard to the employment of foreign students so as to permit their employment, subject to the regulations of the United States Immigration Service, when equally well-qualified American students were not available. This proposal was not approved

by the Board. I feel that I did not present it adequately.

Since I believe that the immediate effect of cutting off the proposed services will be detrimental to the work and the standing of the University in various departments, I should like to review the situation briefly and to make a further recommendation. Up to June 28, 1940, no restrictions were in effect and many departments were strengthened by the availability of excellent students from foreign countries on part-time appointments. Even during the war the Board's policy was to permit the employment of foreign students who were citizens of countries with which the United States was allied. During the war the problem was not acute since international travel was out of the question. It now appears to be highly desirable to return to the pre-1940 status. There is no question of the illegal entry of nationals from former enemies and it is practically impossible for a known Communist to receive travel authority. All persons coming to this country are investigated both by the United States Immigration Service and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. In addition, on entering the employ of the University of Illinois they sign an affidavit of loyalty. In fact, the departments concerned report that their foreign students come from the stable and conservative families, often with a previous history of wealth.

The foreign students employed during the past year have been of extreme importance to the University at a time when skilled workers have been hard to obtain. It is felt by all concerned that to keep up war-time limitations would have a crippling effect, particularly in the language departments. For example, the French Department has had the services of five French assistants, of whom three are not prospective American citizens. In the Department of Spanish and Italian an effective program of instruction has been built up on the basis of securing informants from Latin America. During the present year they have come from Mexico, Chile, Colombia, and Brazil. Generally, it is not possible for Americans to replace such persons, who are in this country only for a few years

and are glad to work on this basis.

Similarly, in some departments in which we have substantial research contracts we are, to some extent, dependent upon foreign assistants. In the Department of Electrical Engineering we have seven in important assignments: two from India, two from China, two from Switzerland, and one from Canada. The Department of Chemistry employs two expert Chinese engaged in fundamental rubber research under a grant. The Department of Civil Engineering has for years attracted a large number of foreign students. They have returned to their countries as great supporters of Illinois and of the United States. I can testify to this in the case of Dr. Mikishi Abe, who worked under Professor Talbot and is now one of the most distinguished engineers in Japan. He is in charge of the

whole reconstruction program. Even during the war he remained friendly to the United States and suffered greatly for his devotion. Professor N. M. Newmark has a Chinese student especially needed on a Navy research project and Professor W. M. Wilson has a Chinese student on a project with the Copper and Brass Research Association. Another Chinese is engaged in hydraulic research.

However, the above cases are simply illustrations. The plain fact is that the

However, the above cases are simply illustrations. The plain fact is that the University of Illinois increasingly is a leader in research, not only in the United States but over the world. We are building up slowly a reputation which Harvard, Yale, and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology have cultivated at great pains and at great cost. While doing so we have ourselves profited richly from the services of able students. These students no longer can help themselves because of the unprecedented value of the American dollar. A truckload of Chinese money would not be enough to support one of these highly selected workers.

On June 7 I was appointed by Governor Dwight H. Green as a member of a Commission on Displaced Persons to conduct a survey of employment opportunities for displaced persons in Illinois. The churches of Illinois have taken particular leadership in the formation of this Commission but business, industry, labor, and education are also represented. I mention this only to indicate that there is a general feeling that steps should be taken better to connect the United States with the nationals of friendly countries.

I recommend, therefore, that the Board of Trustees rescind its war-time rules concerning the employment of foreigners, reverting to the policy in effect

prior to June 28, 1940.

If the Board will approve this recommendation, Dean Louis N. Ridenour of the Graduate College will take upon himself the personal responsibility for examining all such appointees with respect to both their research standing and their political acceptability. Joining me in the recommendation above, in addition to Dean Ridenour, are Professor J. F. Jackson, Head of the Department of French; Professor John Van Horne, Head of the Department of Spanish and Italian; Professor W. C. Huntington, Head of the Department of Civil Engineering; and Professor Roger Adams, Head of the Department of Chemistry.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the war-time rules with respect to the employment of foreigners were rescinded, and the President of the University was authorized to revert to the policies and practices in effect prior to June 28, 1940, under the conditions stated above.

INTERNAL OPERATING BUDGET FOR 1948-1949

(11) I present the University's internal operating budget for all divisions and funds for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1948, and for academic and administrative appointments beginning September 1, 1948. This budget has been prepared by the Provost and the Comptroller in accordance with policies approved by the President and in conference with deans, directors, and other administrative officers.

I recommend that:

1. This budget, covering the allocation of the University's operating income from all sources for the year beginning July 1, 1948, be approved (see Appendix,

page 1213).

2. The President of the University be authorized, in accordance with the needs of the University and the equitable interests involved and within total income, to (a) make such changes and adjustments as are needed, (b) make such additional appointments as are necessary, subject to the provisions of the University Statutes, and (c) accept resignations as are offered. All such changes will be covered in the Comptroller's quarterly financial reports, or in reports of the Secretary of the Board on appointments.

The President, the Provost, and the Comptroller discussed the

budget.

On motion of Mr. Davis, the internal operating budget for 1948-1949 was approved, authority was granted as requested, and the appropriations made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. Mc-

Kelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Nickell.

BUDGET FOR DIVISION OF SERVICES FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN, 1948-1949

(12) The budget of the Division of Services for Crippled Children for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1948, has been prepared by the Director of the Division, Dr. Herbert R. Kobes, and is endorsed by Vice-President A. C. Ivy. It is summarized as follows:

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this budget was approved, authority was granted to the President as requested, and appropriations were made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Dr. Luken, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Green, Mr. Nickell.

OPEN SESSION

When the Board convened in open session at 2 p.m. on June 15, 1948, the same members and officials were present as before; also Director J. F. Wright, and, for the consideration of the rates of wages of operating engineers in the Chicago divisions, Mr. Anthon J. Imhahn, Second Vice-President of the International Union of Operating Engineers, A.F.L., and Mr. Charles E. Reid, Assistant Chief Operating Engineer at the Chicago Professional Colleges, Mr. Harry W. Pearce, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds of the Chicago divisions, Mr. H. N. Cooley, Assistant to the Dean of the Undergraduate Division, and Mr. C. L. Williston, Manager of the Office of Public Information in the Chicago divisions.

During the presentation and discussion of the wages of operating engineers, Mr. Robert Gordon, State Director of Labor, was present.

WAGES OF OPERATING ENGINEERS IN CHICAGO DIVISIONS

President Fornof announced that the Board had invited Mr. Anthon J. Imhahn, Second Vice-President of the International Union of Operating Engineers, A.F.L., and President of Local 399 of the same union, to appear before the Board for the purpose of making a statement of his reasons for requesting an increase in wages for operating engineers in the Chicago divisions. President Fornof then stated that the Board was glad to afford Mr. Imhahn this public hearing and that Mr. Imhahn was present. He then asked the Legal Counsel, Mr. Britton, to conduct the hearing.

Mr. Britton then introduced Mr. Imhahn who read a prepared statement in support of his position and he also spoke extemporaneously. Mr. Imhahn was shown a statistical summary, prepared by Director Dickason, of wage rates paid to operating engineers by a large number of employers in various lines of business and service, including a number of governmental agencies in the Cook County area. This summary showed a higher wage level for operating engineers employed by governmental agencies than it did of operating engineers employed by private employers. Mr. Imhahn's contention was that the wage rates paid by the University of Illinois to its operating engineers should be fixed with reference to wages paid by public agencies rather than by the wage rates paid by private employers.

Robert L. Gordon, Director of the Illinois Department of Labor, testified that it was the policy of the State in the fixing of wages for operating engineers to use as a basis therefor the rates paid by employers, both governmental and non-governmental, where the duties

of such employees were most nearly alike.

Mr. Charles E. Reid who accompanied Mr. Imhahn also testified. Director Dickason testified pointing out that the policy of the University under which he was directed to negotiate wage rates was that of the prevailing wage rate in the community, and he supported the statistics of wage rates prepared by him with testimony as to how they were obtained.

On the conclusion of the hearing, Mr. Livingston moved that the Board request President Stoddard and Mr. Imhahn to undertake the settlement of the issues by negotiations and that in the event that they were unable to agree, they agree upon an arbitrator to assist in the settlement of the issue subject to the acceptance of the proposed settlement by the Union and by the Board of Trustees. Mr. Imhahn stated that if this motion carried, this procedure was agreeable to him.

The motion was duly seconded and carried.

President Fornof expressed the appreciation of the Board to Mr. Imhahn, whereupon he, his associate, Mr. Reid, and Director Gordon withdrew.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT STODDARD

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

BUDGET OF ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(1) The Director of Intercollegiate Athletics submits on behalf of the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association the proposed budget of the Association for 1948-1949, which is summarized as follows, with comparative figures for the preceding year:

On July 1, 1047, the Association had a net operating surplus of \$225,047, a reserve of \$50,055 for maintenance and replacement of plant, and a reserve a reserve of \$50,055 for maintenance and replacement of plant, and a reserve of \$28,283 for equipment replacement. It is estimated that on June 30, 1948, the operating surplus will be \$312,004, the reserve for plant maintenance and replacement will be \$12,523, and the reserve for equipment replacement will be \$28,283.

The budget has been examined by the Comptroller, and all salaries have been reviewed by the President; those salaries paid jointly by the Athletic Association and the School of Physical Education are consequent in the Discontinuous salaries and the School of Physical Education are consequent in the Discontinuous salaries paid to the Discontinuous salaries pa

ciation and the School of Physical Education are concurred in by the Director

of the School of Physical Education.

I recommend that this budget be approved and that the President of the University be authorized to make such changes and adjustments, including approval of new appointments and acceptances of resignations, as are necessary and recommended by the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association within the total estimated income, such changes to be reported to the Board of Trustees.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, this budget was approved and authority was given as recommended.

APPOINTMENT OF JOHN GORDON PACE AS PERSONNEL MANAGER OF THE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(2) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association has appointed John Gordon Pace, now a member of the faculty of the Physical Education Department and baseball coach at Northern Illinois State Teachers College, De Kalb, as Personnel Manager of the Athletic Association beginning July 1, 1948, at an annual salary of \$5,000.

I recommend confirmation of this appointment.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this appointment was confirmed.

APPOINTMENT OF DR. STEWART S. CAIRNS AS HEAD OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MATHEMATICS

(3) I recommend the appointment of Dr. Stewart S. Cairns, now Professor and Head of the Department of Mathematics at Syracuse University, as Professor and Head of the Department of Mathematics on indefinite tenure beginning August 1, 1948, at a salary of \$11,000 a year.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this appointment was made as recommended.

LABORATORY EQUIPMENT FOR NEW CHEMISTRY BUILDING

(4) Bids have been received by the Physical Plant Department for laboratory equipment to be specially constructed and installed in the new Chemistry Building at Urbana. The aggregate of low bids received for both manufacture and installation is approximately \$571,000. Three bids were received on the manufacture and installation is approximately \$571,000. facture of the equipment. In five of the six bids for installation, however, only one bid was received for each type of service.

The maximum amount available for the purchase and installation of equipment in the State appropriation for this building is \$300,000. The lowest bid for the manufacture of the equipment is that of the Kewaunee Manufacturing Company, \$276,879.60. Hence, practically the entire amount now available is needed to cover the contract for the manufacture of the equipment, not including

installation.

The Chemistry Department recommends that there be no change in specifications and that the contract for equipment be let to the lowest bidder in accordance with the bids received. If that procedure is followed, additional funds of about \$271,000 (based on bids received) would be necessary in future appropriations to provide for installation of the equipment. If the contract for equipment is made as recommended, this additional amount should be a high priority item in the 1949-1951 biennial capital funds.

The Physical Plant Department recommends that all bids for installation be

rejected and that new bids be requested at a later date.

After a careful review of the problem, I recommend that the contract for the manufacture of the equipment be awarded to the lowest bidder, the Kewaunee Manufacturing Company, in the amount of \$276,879.60 (excluding an alternate bid providing a reduction of \$19,568.50 which is considered undesirable); that all other bids received on this project be rejected; and that the funds needed to complete the installation of this equipment be included in the biennial capital budget for 1949-1951.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these recommendations were approved and adopted.

REMODELING IN SMITH MUSIC HALL BASEMENT

(5) Bids have been received for the remodeling in the basement of Smith Music Hall to provide three additional studios and some remodeling in Lincoln Hall basement for storage space for material which must be removed from Smith Music Hall.

The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the award of a contract to the lowest bidder, Kuhne-Simmons Co., Inc., in the amount of \$9,808.

The Board of Trustees has previously assigned funds for this project.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and the Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a contract with Kuhne-Simmons Co., Inc.

On motion of Mrs. Holt, the execution of this contract was authorized as recommended.

REMODELING TEMPORARY BUILDINGS FOR STAFF HOUSING

(6) The need for additional housing for staff in the Urbana-Champaign departments is still acute. It is possible to release three temporary buildings on the Drill Field which can be remodeled to provide nine apartments. Two of these buildings are now being used as warehouses, so that only one building previously used for student housing would be transferred. The cost of remodeling is estimated at \$32,000.

Bids have been secured for work to be done by outside contractors. The Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend the following awards to the lowest bidders:

I recommend an appropriation of \$32,000 from the General Reserve Fund, and the award of the above contracts as recommended.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, contracts were awarded and the appropriation was made as recommended, by the following vote: Aye, Mr. Fornof, Mrs. Holt, Mr. Livingston, Mr. McKelvey, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Williamson; no, none; absent, Mr. Davis, Mr. Green, Dr. Luken, Dr. Meyer, Mr. Nickell.

CONTRACT FOR BROAD WALK ON CARR AVENUE ON CENTRAL CAMPUS

(7) For many years campus plans have included the construction of a concrete broad walk on the east side of the central campus in front of the Noyes Laboratory of Chemistry and Davenport Hall, from Harker Hall at the north to the Auditorium at the south. The time has now come for this improvement. The old walks are narrow, in a bad state of repair, and are a hazard. With the construction of the Chemistry and other buildings, increase in pedestrian traffic will require a new and wider walk. It will match the walk on Burrill Avenue.

The site of the proposed new walk is already lined with trees planted and maintained from funds donated for them by the late Robert F. Carr, Class of 1893, a former member and President of the Board of Trustees. The avenue was named "Carr Avenue" by the Board of Trustees. Lighting is already installed.

Bids have been taken on the construction of this walk. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend award of the contract to the Raymond Construction Company, Champaign, the lowest bidder in the amount of \$11,720. Funds are budgeted for this work.

I concur and recommend that the Secretary of the Board and the Comptroller be authorized to execute a contract with the Raymond Construction

Company.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, this contract was authorized as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR INSULATION ON ABBOTT POWER PLANT ADDITION PIPING

(8) Bids were received for insulation on the Abbott Power Plant addition piping. The Comptroller and the Director of the Physical Plant Department recommend the award of the contract to the lowest bidder, the Asbestos and Magnesia Materials Company of Chicago, on the basis of their firm bid of \$27,648.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for the Power Plant addition.

I concur.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, this contract was awarded as recommended.

AWARD OF CONTRACTS AND PURCHASE OF PIPE FOR GOLF COURSE CONSTRUCTION

(9) The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association requests approval of the award of a contract in the amount of \$166,924.58 for the construction of a new golf course to C. D. Wagstaff and Company of Glenview, Illinois, the lowest bidder on the project. The Comptroller has examined all bids and recommends approval of the award of the contract to C. D. Wagstaff and Company.

mends approval of the award of the contract to C. D. Wagstaff and Company. Specifications for the new golf course at the Kimmel Farm to be developed by the Athletic Association provide that the Association shall furnish the pipe required, amounting to 25,050 feet of varying sizes. The Association has invited bids from all sources of supply and has found only one source that will accept an order and assure delivery by July 1, 1948. The contractor has stated that the pipe must be available by that time if the work is to be advanced sufficiently to open the course in the 1949 season.

The Board of Directors of the Athletic Association requests authority to purchase pipe from the Columbia Pipe Supply Company of Chicago at their quoted prices and approval of an appropriation of \$33,000 to cover the cost of

pipe, transportation, and hauling to the course.

Approval of this recommendation is requested.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, the award of contract was approved and the appropriation and the purchase of pipe were authorized as requested.

ADDITIONS TO CONTRACT WITH JOHN FELMLEY COMPANY FOR GENERAL WORK ON CHEMISTRY AND CHEMICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(10) The Department of Chemistry has recommended a number of changes in the new Chemistry Building not originally specified but now considered essential. These changes would involve an addition of \$5,590.88 to the contract with the John Felmley Company for the general construction work. The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend these additions to the contract. Funds are available in the State appropriation for the construction of this building.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute these changes.

On motion of Mr. McLaughlin, these changes in contract were authorized as recommended.

ADDITIONS TO GENERAL CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING

(11) Additions of \$2,924.60 to the general contract with the John Felmley Company for the construction of the Electrical Engineering Building are recommended for (1) changing the interior of Room 219 from a research room to a room for classes in illuminating engineering, and (2) furnishing and installing exterior lighting fixtures and railings around the main entrance platform.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for the Electrical Engineer-

ing Building.

I recommend that the Secretary of the Board and the Comptroller be authorized to execute these changes.

On motion of Mr. Livingston, these changes in contract were authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL EQUIPMENT INSTALLATION AT ABBOTT POWER PLANT

(12) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an addition of \$1,628.05 to the contract of the A. S. Schulman Electric Company for the electrical equipment installation at the Abbott Power Plant, to provide for the installation of additional pumps and rearrangement of controls,

Funds are available for this addition in the State appropriation for enlargement of the Power Plant.

I concur and request that the Comptroller and Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute this addition to the contract.

On motion of Mr. McKelvey, this addition to contract was authorized as recommended.

ADDITION TO CONTRACT FOR SUBSTRUCTURE FOR ABBOTT POWER PLANT ADDITION

(13) The Director of the Physical Plant Department and the Comptroller recommend an increase of \$3,064.17 in the contract with Kuhne-Simmons Company, Inc., for the substructure work in the construction of the Power Plant addition to cover revisions of plans which were made after the bids were submitted.

Funds are available in the State appropriation for the Power Plant addition. I concur and recommend that the Secretary of the Board and the Comptroller be authorized to execute this change.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, authority to execute contract for this change was given as recommended.

APPROPRIATION AND AWARD OF AIR-CONDITIONING CONTRACT FOR RADIOCARBON LABORATORY

(14) On April 10, 1948 (Minutes, page 1070), the Board of Trustees appropriated \$6,000 for the purchase of equipment for the Radiocarbon Laboratory at Urbana, with the understanding that additional funds for remodeling of Room 125.2 Davenport Hall for this project would be requested when accurate estimates were available. The Physical Plant Department has secured an estimate of \$16,047 for all construction costs.

The Committee on Special Appropriations and Nonrecurring Expenditures

recommends such an appropriation.

AUTOMOBILE INSURANCE

Purchases amounting to \$1,000 or more made from general funds or unitemized appropriations shall be submitted to the Board of Trustees or to the Executive Committee, unless, in the opinion of the President of the University, urgent necessity exists that requires immediate action, in which case the President shall act and report promptly to the Board.

SITE FOR NEW Y.M.C.A. BUILDING IN CHICAGO

(18) The President of the Board of Trustees received and referred to the President of the University a letter from the President of the Medical Center Commission requesting that the Board of Trustees concur in the construction of a new mission requesting that the Board of Trustees concur in the construction of a new Y.M.C.A. Building at 1933-53 West Polk Street, Chicago, which is within the area tentatively allocated for the future expansion of the University of Illinois and other institutions. The present "Professional Colleges Y.M.C.A." Building will be demolished to make way for the Congress Expressway. In view of this, the Y.M.C.A. is studying the future needs of the Medical Center District and the Medical Center Commission has offered its cooperation.

This proposal was referred to the University Building Program Committee for study. The Committee recommends that the University concur in the selection of this site for the new Y.M.C.A. Building subject to the following conditions:

1. That the Y.M.C.A. continue making an allotment of space in this building to students from the University of Illinois Professional Colleges comparable with

to students from the University of Illinois Professional Colleges comparable with the allotment now being made in the present building.

2. That the Y.M.C.A. endeavor to include in its ultimate program the Chicago Board of Education Warehouse, which adjoins the proposed building site, to insure

a suitable future development of this area.

3. That the University offer to release for a building site for the Y.M.C.A. the land required by it, either through sale to the Y.M.C.A. or by exchange with the Medical Commission for other property desired by the University, providing the proposed new Y.M.C.A. building project is carried out on the proposed site.

I concur in these recommendations.

AWARD OF CONTRACT IN CONNECTION WITH ELECTRICAL DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM IN CHICAGO

THE UNIVERSITY BUDGET FOR 1948-1949

(Approved by the Board of Trustees June 15, 1948, page 1152)

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Appropriations for Salaries are available for the term indicated in each case but not for more than one year from September 1, 1948.

When appointments are made at salary rates less than the amounts provided in the budget, the unused balance is lapsed at that time, resulting in a reduction in

the budget.

Funds appropriated for positions in the salary budget which are not yet filled may, pending regular appointments, be drawn against by voucher to the Business Office for services of employees temporarily engaged to do the work contemplated by the position. Such temporary charges may not exceed the amount of time provided by the position unless indicated herein or otherwise approved by the President.

All unexpended balances remaining in the salary budget lapse at the close of each calendar month unless previously assigned or encumbered. Such lapses do not result in a reduction in the budget.

Departmental appropriations are made under the captions "Salaries," "Wages," and "Expense and Equipment." No transfers may be made between "Salaries" and "Expense and Equipment" except with the approval of the President of the University. Requests for such changes should be submitted to the Comptroller. Adjustments may be requested between "Salaries" and "Wages" and between "Wages" and "Expense and Equipment" upon notice to the Comptroller.

Appropriations for Expense and Equipment and for Wages are available for one year beginning July 1, 1948, and ending June 30, 1949. All unexpended balances lapse June 30, 1949. The reappropriation of funds will be considered only in special

situations.

The services required for members of the academic and administrative staff are in accordance with "Terms of Employment" adopted by the Board of Trustees on January 8, 1948.

(1) For those positions indicated entirely as "Y", or for that portion of time indicated as "Y", services are required for the full year of twelve months, with allowance of one month for vacation. No additional compensation is allowed for summer session services for any salary or portion of salary indicated as "Y".

(2) For those positions in the academic budget not indicated as "Y", or for

that portion of time not indicated as "Y", services are required only during the regular academic year of two semesters (three terms in the Chicago Professional Colleges). If teaching is required during the Summer Session, it will be covered by an additional appointment with salary.

The services required for members of the nonacademic staff are for a full year of twelve months, with allowance for vacation, in accordance with civil service regulations. Salaries are paid in twelve equal monthly installments and positions are indicated as "H".

Symbols:

A - Indefinite tenure, payable in twelve monthly installments.

B — Two years from September 1, 1947, payable in twelve monthly installments.

D—One year from September I, 1948, payable in twelve

monthly installments.

E — The academic year 1948-1949, payable in ten installments of which the first and last shall be half installments and the other eight full installments equal to one-ninth of the annual salary.

- G Special tenure as described.
- H-In accordance with civil service regulations, beginning July 1, 1948.
- I Present salary sub-total includes 1947-1948 positions discontinued.
- Y When following A, B, D, or G, indicates that services are required throughout the year, except for allowable vacation, without additional compensation.

Part-time:

When any of the above symbols is combined with a number, the number indicates the fraction of time in per cent covered by the position.
