

The Results of a Study of Student Living Costs at the University of Illinois

TO PARENTS whose sons or daughters go to college, the question of cost of a university education is important. Several items entering into this cost are fairly constant—fees, books, study supplies, etc.,—and other items, such as clothing, laundry bills, entertainment and incidentals, vary with the students' individual tastes and means. But the two most expensive items—board and lodging are usually of most interest in a discussion of student living expenses.

Appreciating this fact, in April, 1926, the President of the University of Illinois sent a questionnaire to all students then in attendance at the University departments at Urbana, except students residing with their parents, requesting information about the amount of room rent per month, cost of board per week, the number of students in a room, and the place where the board was obtained. Usable answers were received regarding room rent per month from 5,964 students (4,243 men; 1,721 women), or 63.5 per cent of the second semester enrollment at Urbana. Of these replies, 3,778 were from members of organized houses and 2,186 from students living in unorganized houses.1 In reply to the question about cost of board per week, usable answers were received from 5,944 students (4,231 men; 1,713 women), or 63.3 per cent of of the second semester enrollment at Urbana. Of the total replies, 3,772 were from members of organized houses and the remainder of 2,172 from students rooming in unorganized houses.


Amount Spent for Rent

The average room rent per month, obtained by an analysis of the answers to the questionnaire, was:

\$14.81 for men students \$15.01 for women students \$14.87 for all students reporting

The room rent paid per month ranged from \$5 per student for a room occupied by three students to \$35 for a room occupied by one student. However, the ordinary range was from \$10 to \$20 per month per student. Of all students from whom replies were received, 60 per cent paid from \$12.50 to \$15 per month for room rent; the highest per cent paying any single rate was 35, paying \$15 per month.

An analysis of the reports received from seventyfour social fraternities showed that the average room rent for men students living in organized houses was \$15.81. Reports representing thirty-two social sor-



four other organized houses, showed that \$15.08 was the average room rent per month paid by women living in organized houses. The average room rent per month for men and women students living in organized houses was \$15.56, as found from reports from 114 groups representing 3,778 students.

The average room rent per month for the various classes of fraternal organizations and organized houses was:

The average room rent per month for men and women students living in unorganized houses, representing 2,186 students, was found to be \$13.67.



## Amount Spent for Board

The average amount paid for board per week as found from an analysis of 5,944 replies to the ques-



The minimum expenditure for board per week was \$1.50, paid by a student who prepared meals in her own room; and the maximum expenditure was \$15 per week, the usual range being from \$5 to \$8.50 per week. Only 740 students paid more than \$7.50 per week for board, or less than 13 per cent of the total number reporting. Of the students represented in this report, 57.7 per cent obtained board for \$7 per week.

The men students living in organized houses paid less for board per week than the men living in unorganized houses, while the reverse is true regarding the women students. The average board per week for organized men was \$7.07, for unorganized men \$7.19, for organized women \$6.93, for unorganized women \$6.78, for organized men and women, \$7.02, and for unorganized men and women, \$7.11.


